2003 NOTRE DAME BASEBALL Irish Head To Jacksonville For Spring Break Kennel Club Classic

The Notre Dame baseball team (3-4) – ranked as high as 17th in the national polls – returns to the road this week by playing seven games in eight days at the Kennel Club Classic in Jacksonville, Fla. (the Irish also played in the 2000 KCC) … ND's starting pitcher rotation (in order) is slated to include sophomore RHPs Chris Niesel and John Axford, followed by senior RHPs Ryan Kalita and Peter Ogilvie … the Irish open play on Saturday, March 8 (3:00 p.m. at host North Florida's Harmon Stadium) vs. a 9-5 Vanderbilt team that already has posted three wins at the KCC … the Commodores have not announced a starter but the Irish could face sophomore Jeremy Sowers, one of the nation's top-rated young LHPs … the Irish – coming off a landmark 2002 season that ended with a trip to the College World Series (the program's first CWS appearance since '57) – already have played four games vs. teams ranked in the top 20 (three in the top seven).

FOLLOWING THE ACTION – ESPN Radio 1620 (WDND) and its sister station WDNV 1490 AM again will provide commercial broadcasts of the entire ND season ... bonus gametracker "live stats" may be available, based on phone-line availability (check und.com main page for links when applicable).

ND QUICK NOTES – Junior 2B Steve Sollmann was named BIG EAST player of the week after hitting 8-for-17 in the season-opening four games ... senior RHP **J.P. Gagne** (6 shutout IP) then was named BIG EAST pitcher of the week for his win in the 13-inning game vs. #7 Wake Forest at Minnesota's DQ Classic ... the seven freshman position players combined to hit .389 (21-for-54) in opening week while the offense enjoyed one its most productive opening weeks in recent memory (.367 batting, 36 runs; compared to .273, 22 R in first four games of '02).

MATCHUP NOTES

EARLY CHALLENGES – Notre Dame completed one of the most challenging five-game stretches in the program's history, with a pair of games at then-No. 4 Arizona State (which rose as high as No. 2 in last week's polls) before the daunting Dairy Queen Classic field that included Nebraska (ranked as high as 16th), the host Gophers (who beat the Irish with 5,343 Metrodome fans cheering them on) and Wake Forest (ranked as high as 7th) ... the win over WFU averted what would have been the first five-game losing streak in the nine-year Paul Mainieri era, with the Irish also losing four straight in 1995, '99 and 2002.

PLAYERS TO WATCH – In addition to Notre Dame's highly-rated prospects in the junior and sophomore class (see notes below, ND's Kennel Club Classic opponents include several other players who are rated among the nation's top prospects ... Vanderbilt sophomore LHP **Jeremy Sowers** – a teammate and roommate of ND's Grant Johnson with the 2001 USA Junior National Team – has

been forecasted as high as the No. 3 college prospect for the 2004 MLB draft (according to *Baseball America*'s survey of MLB scouting directors, with the MLB Scouting Bureau's 2002 fall rankings forecasting Sowers 4th) ... the scouting directors also listed Johnson 5th while the Scouting Bureau listed Notre Dame RHP **Chris Niesel** as its top prospect for 2004 ... the *BA*/Perfect Game top-200 prospects list for the 2003 draft includes three other players from ND's Kennel Club opponents: Navy senior LHP Matt Foster (68th), Creighton LHP **Tom Oldham** (83rd) and Vanderbilt RHP **Robert Ransom** (94th).

SCOUTING THE IRISH – Notre Dame returns the bulk of its pitching staff and several position starters (see p. 1), led by senior RF **Kris Billmaier**, junior 2B **Steve Sollmann**, junior 1B **Joe Thaman** and junior **Javi Sanchez** (who is slated to shift from shortstop to catcher) ... highly-touted sophomore SS **Matt Macri** made his ND debut at that position in the opener vs. Dayton , after missing most of his freshman season due to injury (he was limited to 14 starts at DH and two at 2B in '02).

BEEN THERE – After last week's 2-1, 13-inning win over Wake Forest, the Irish now own a mark of 15-2-1 in their last 18 extra-inning games (dating back to 1997; 6-1 in the last seven, dating back to the 2001 NCAAs).

7 DOWN, 49 TO GO – The Irish traditionally have started slow (now 26-26 in Jan./Feb. during the nine-year Paul Mainieri era) compared to 97-41-1 in March and 159-36 in April, with plenty of the 56-game regular season still to be played.

WALK-TO-K RATIOS – One of the most noticeable differences in ND's team stats at this point in the season (compared to the seven-game totals in 2002) is the batters' ratio of walks to strikeouts (21 BB/44 Ks in '02, 16 BB/57 Ks in '03) and the pitchers' K-to-BB ratio (60 Ks/15 BB in '02, 25 Ks/40 BB in '03).

MAN WITH THE AX – Sophomore RHP **John Axford**'s strong start to the 2003 season (2.08 ERA) has dropped his career ERA to 3.66 in 19 appearance and 83.2 IP, with the team's other top starters owning similar career ERAs: senior RHPs **Ryan Kalita** (3.50) and **Peter Ogilvie** (3.72) and sophomore RHP **Chris Niesel** (4.04), plus solid numbers from senior RHP relievers **J.P. Gagne** (4.21) and **Brandon Viloria** (2.84).

STANDARDS OF EXCELLENCE – Junior 2B Steve Sollmann made a fielding error in the Nebraska game, just his second error in his last 24 games with the Irish (including the Minnesota and WFU games) ... a converted CF, Sollmann totaled just eight Es in 2002 ... Sollmann had not struck out in16 games with ND, including nine NCAA Tournament games in 2002, before a pair of Ks vs. Minnesota (he totaled just three multi-K games in 2002).

INJURY UPDATE: Sophomore RHP **Grant Johnson** and sophomore DH **Brent Weiss** both are slated to miss the 2003 season after undergoing preseason shoulder surgery.

PRESEASON HONORS

THREE NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICANS – An unprecedented three Notre Dame players – junior 2B Steve Sollmann, sophomore SS Matt Macri and sophomore RHP Grant Johnson – were tabbed for preseason All-America honors, with Sollmann and Macri earning preseason BIG EAST player-of-the-year recognition from different sources (see listings on p. 3).

STRONG UP THE MIDDLE – Notre Dame boasts the only pair of middle infielders who each received 2003 preseason All-America honors, with junior 2B Steve Sollmann earning a second-team nod from the National College Baseball Writers Association while sophomore SS Matt Macri (who saw most of his freshman season cut short by an elbow injury that ultimately required "Tommy John" reconstructive surgery) was a Baseball America third team preseason All-American ... BA and the BIG EAST coaches forecasted Sollmann as the 2003 BIG EAST player of the year while Collegiate Baseball magazine predicted Macri for that honor ... three other second basemen and five shortstops were named to at least one of the three major preseason All-America teams (which featured 10 total middle infielders) ... Southern University 2B Rickie Weeks and Florida State SS Stephen Drew were unanimous first-team picks (also Collegiate Baseball) while Texas 2B Tim Moss was the only other middle infielder named to all three teams ... middle infielders cited on two of the preseason teams also included Georgia Tech SS Eric Patterson, Eastern Michigan 2B Brian Bixler and Louisiana State SS Aaron Hill ... two other shortstops – Richmond's David Reaver and USC's Anthony Lunetta – also received preseason All-America honors.

PROSPECTS-A-PLENTY – Six Irish players also have been listed among national college prospect rankings, as compiled by *Baseball America*/Perfect Game and Team One Baseball ... the Dec. 15 *BA*/PG list forecasting the top-100 prospects for the 2004 draft included four ND sophomore RHPs: **Grant Johnson** (5th), **John Axford** (19th), **Chris Niesel** (49th) and **Martin Vergara** (78th) ... no other school had more than three pitchers among that top-100 prospects list (Rice had three, Texas and Old Dominion two) ... Macri (a draft-eligible sophomore) was listed 40th (second among shortstops) on the *BA*/PG prospects list for the 2003 draft while Sollman was 124th on that list ... two other sophomores from BIG EAST teams – Boston College RHP Chris Lambert (12th) and Rutgers OF Jeff Frazier (17th) – also are among the top prospects on the *BA*/PG top-100 prospects list for the 2004 draft ... the BIG EAST is the only conference with four-plus schools represented on that top-100 prospect list while the six total BIG EAST players matches the ACC for the most from one conference among the *BA*/PG top 100 prospects for the '04 draft.

NIESEL HIGHLY-REGARDED – Sophomore RHP **Chris Niesel** impressively was forecasted by the Major League Scouting Bureau's 2002 fall rankings as the No. 1 overall college prospect for the 2004 draft, followed by Florida State SS Stephen Drew, Ohio State LHP Scott Lewis, Vanderbilt LHP Jeremy Sowers and Clemson LHP Tyler Lumsden ... the Irish saw Lewis and Drew up-close during the 2002 NCAAs (posting a pair of wins over both OSU and FSU) and could face Sowers at next week's Kennel Club Classic in Jacksonville (Lumsden and his Clemson teammates joined Niesel and the Irish at the 2002 CWS).

TEAM NOTES

SEASON STARTS – Notre Dame's average seven-game start in the nine-year Paul Mainieri era has been 4-3, ranging from 2-5 in 1998 to 6-1 in 2001.

SLUMP BUSTERS – Notre Dame's winning sequence in the 13th inning vs. Wake Forest included hits from several players who had struggled in their previous at-bats at the DQ Classic ... ND entered the bottom of the 13th riding a frustrating 0-for-12 day with runners in scoring position before staging the winning rally ... three freshmen sparked the sequence with singles, as CF Cody Rizzo ended a 1-for-11 slump by sending RHP Adam Hanson's first-pitch offering into center field (he then was picked off for the second out) before reserve DH Alex Nettey (who was 1-for-5 in '03) stroked another first pitch into shallow left field ... LF Craig Cooper then snapped out of his 0-for-9 funk by delivered on a 1-0 pitch, placing a linedrive into left-center that moved Nettey to third (Cooper took second on a bad throw) ... junior 1B Joe Thaman shook off his own 0-for-9 slump by working ahead in the count before sending an 0-2 pitch that sliced between the second-base bag and a diving 2B Chris Getz, with Nettey racing home to end the three-hour, 44-minute game.

EXTRA-INNING DRAMA – Junior 1B **Joe Thaman** now has ended two noteworthy extra-inning games for the Irish ... as a freshman, Thaman hit a double that held up as the game-winner in a similar game at Mississippi State early in the 2001 season (4-2, in 11 innings) ... much like the 2002 game at MSU (which would have ended in a tie after the 11th inning), Sunday's game could have ended as a tie in the record books if neither team had scored by the end of the 14th.

CLUTCH HITTING – One of the key statistical categories in college baseball continues to be batting with runners in scoring positions ... the Irish hit just .273 with runners in scoring position during the first seven games, led by freshman CF Cody Rizzo (3-for-4), sophomore 3B Matt Edwards (2-for-4), freshman OF Brennan Grogan (2-for-5), junior 2B Steve Sollmann (1-for-3) ... other ND batting average with RBI opportunities include: senior RF Kris Billmaier (4-for-13), junior C Javi Sanchez (2-for-7), freshman DH Steve Andres (1-for-4), freshman OF Craig Cooper (2-for -11), freshman IF Greg Lopez (1-for-6), sophomore SS Matt Macri (1-for 6) and junior 1B Joe Thaman (2-for-12).

THE RIGHT STUFF – ND's lineup – predominantly lefthanded the past four seasons - will take on a decidedly lefthanded slant in 2003, following the graduation of four lefthanded starters (CF and leadoff batter Steve Stanley, 3B/cleanup/ #5 hitter Andrew Bushey, C Paul O'Toole and DH Matt Bok) and the pro signing of iunior LF/3-hole hitter Brian Stavisky ... those five players were among the teams's top hitters from 2000-02, with Stanley, Bushey and O'Toole also playing in 1999 alongside fellow lefthanded hitters Jeff Felker (1B, '97-'00), Ben Cooke (IF/OF, '98-'01) and Jeff Perconte (IF/OF, '97-'00) ... junior 1B Joe Thaman is the only lefthanded hitter among the returning starters, with 2B Steve Sollmann, RF Kris Billmaier and C Javi Sanchez (the '02 SS) all hitting from the right side ... the spots held by Stanley and Bushey both have been filled by righthanded hitters (freshmen CF Craig Cooper/Cody Rizzo and sophomore 3B Matt Edwards) while O'Toole's spot essentially has been filled by sophomore righthanded-hitting SS Matt Macri (after Sanchez' switch to C) ... freshman LF Brennan Grogan gives the Irish another lefthanded bat at that position while his classmate Steve Andres is available to fill the lefthanded DH role.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICA CANDIDATES – Several Notre Dame players will be under consideration for Academic All-America honors in 2003, with an unmatched two ND baseball players earning that honor in each of the past three seasons ... top Academic All-America candidates in 2003 include senior RHPs Brandon Viloria (3.63, electrical engineering), J.P. Gagne (3.35, finance) and Peter Ogilvie (3.21, product design), plus junior 2B Steve Sollmann (3.26, marketing).

KEY PIECE OF THE PUZZLE – The Irish were **45-11** in 2002 games started by 2B Steve **Sollmann**, compared to just 5-7 in games when he was out of the starting lineup (due to a quad pull).

TEAM NOTES

TEAM TRI-CAPTAINS – Notre Dame's 2003 team is led by its tri-captains: senior RF **Kris Billmaier** (Woodinville, Wash.), senior RHP **J.P. Gagne** (Bloomington, Minn.) and junior 2B **Steve Sollmann** (Cincinnati) ... Gagne is just the fourth pitcher in the last 27 seasons (since Bob Stratta in 1976) to serve as an ND baseball captain, with others including Craig Allen ('96), Alex Shilliday ('99) and Aaron Heilman ('00, '01) ... Sollmann is just the third junior in the last nine seasons to serve as an ND baseball captain, with others recently including 3B Andrew Bushey ('01), Heilman, SS Brant Ust ('99), C Bob Lisanti ('94) and 1B Joe Binkiewicz ('91) ... Gagne – who made a key move to the bullpen in '02 – joined the ND program as a walk-on before excelling in several roles during 2000-02 (21-10, 6 SV, 64 GP, 238 IP) ... he could join former greats Chris Michalak ('93) and Heilman ('01) as the third ND pitcher to post 20-plus wins and 10-plus saves ... Billmaier has been a prime-time performer, batting .471 in 2000-02 NCAA Tournament games (33-for-70), a full 200 points higher than his batting average in the other '00-'02 games (.271) ... Sollmann hit .362 in 2001 and again in '02, overcoming a nagging quad injury to play a key role in the 2002 postseason push ... the former prep CF has developed into a steady 2B (just 8 Es in '02) and earned national player-of-the-week honors after batting 13-for-16 in the 2002 NCAA South Bend Regional.

GAGNE RECEIVES BIG EAST SCHOLARSHIP – Senior righthander J.P. Gagne – an Academic All-America candidate who carries a 3.35 cumulative GPA as a finance major – recently was named the 2002-03 BIG EAST/Aéropostale Male Scholar-Athletes of the Year for Notre Dame and will receive a \$2,000 stipend, which will be applied to graduate studies (he intends to pursue postgraduate studies in law or business) ... Gagne joins former LHP Mike Naumann ('01) as the second ND baseball player to receive the BIG EAST postgraduate scholarship in the last three years ... he combines with Virginia Tech shortstop Spencer Harris and West Virginia third baseman Tim McCabe as the only 2003 baseball players who were selected by their respective schools as the BIG EAST scholarship recipients.

MORE J.P. HONORS – J.P. Gagne was named BIG EAST pitcher of the week for the second time in his career, after a stellar relief performance in the 2-1, 13-inning win over #7 Wake Forest at Minnesota's Dairy Queen Classic ... Gagne closed the game in relief of starter John Axford by logging six shutout innings (4 H, BB, 2 Ks, 86 pitches) ... he retired the final 10 batters he faced, with his outing also including 12 groundball outs and just four flyouts ... it was the 22nd of Gagne's ND career, moving him into a tie for 10th in the Irish record book. He also made his 67th career appearance with the Irish, tying Brian Piotrowicz ('90) and former teammate John Corbin ('00) for 8th in ND history ... Gagne was named BIG EAST pitcher of the week in mid-April of his junior season, after picking up a pair of key relief wins in shutout outings vs. Pittsburgh (12-2; 2 IP, H, BB) and Virginia Tech (2-1 in 11 innings; 5 IP, 3 H, BB, K).

HEAD COACH PAUL MAINIERI

Ninth-year Notre Dame head coach Paul Mainieri owns a 689-425-1 (.618) record in 20-plus college seasons ... in addition to his 357-146-1 (.709) mark in eight-plus seasons at ND, Mainieri's teams were 180-121 in six seasons at St. Thomas (Fla.) and 152-158 in six seasons at Air Force ... his ND teams have combined for a 121-41(.747) record in regular-season BIG EAST games, making the Irish skipper the winningest coach in BIG EAST history (based on win pct.) ... he also ranks second all-time at ND in career coaching wins, behind Hall of Famer Jake Kline (558-449-5, 1934-75)

GAME #500 – Last week's first game vs. Arizona State was the 500th game of the Paul Mainieri era at Notre Dame (he enters this week with a 357-146-1 record at ND) ... Mainieri also is nearing his 700th victory as a college head coach (689-425-1, in 20-plus seasons)

HONORARY MONOGRAM – Paul Mainieri counted himself among those who were not surprised in the least when his Notre Dame baseball team made its historic run to the 2002 College World Series, an accomplishment that was

Career Record Book

FOR OPENERS - After the 10-9 win over Dayton, Notre Dame is 5-4 in season openers in the Paul Mainieri era (5-1 in the last six), with those nine games including several challenges vs. top-ranked opponents ... the Irish lost their season openers in 1995 (6-10 vs. Texas, at Cal State Fullerton), 1996 (4-12 at Georgia Tech) and 1997 (8-10) before knocking off Florida State (10-1) at the 1998 ACC/Disney Blast in Orlando ... ND added two more season-opening wins in 1999 (8-4 vs. James Madison, at Florida International) and 2000 (6-0 vs. Air Force, in Millington, Tenn.) before losing a heartbreaker to New Orleans at the 2001 Mississippi State Classic (6-7) ... the Irish opened 2002 with a 7-6 win over Missouri in 10 innings (at the New Orleans Classic).

DOLPHINS TO BECOME 280TH ALL-TIME OPPONENT: The opening week of the 2003 season saw Newman become the 279th different baseball opponent in the 111-year history of Notre Dame baseball, with Jacksonville slated to become No. 280 at the Kennel Club Classic ... Fairfield, Sacred Heart, Arkansas-Little Rock and Rice joined the ND opponent list in 2002 ... other teams that have faced ND for the first time in recent years include James Madison, Florida International, Missouri and Oakland (all in 1999), North Florida and Akron (both in 2000) and 2001 opponents Florida Atlantic, New Mexico, Pacific, Sam Houston State, South Florida and UC Santa Barbara ... the most noteworthy opponents that ND has vet to face include Oklahoma and Texas Tech ... ND's most common all-time opponents include: Northwestern (130 games), Michigan State (125), Western Michigan (122), Wisconsin (119), Michigan (115) and Purdue (114).

UPSET SPECIALS – The Notre Dame base-ball program – dating back to the late 1980s and the early days of the Pat Murphy era – has a tradition of knocking off high-ranked opponents (most often on those team's home fields) ... most recently, the 2000 Irish squad nearly no-hit eventual NCAA champion Miami in a 1-0 game at Eck Stadium while the 2002 squad knocked off top-ranked Florida State in the 2002 NCAA Super Regionals (10-4, 5-12, 3-1; at FSU) ... see p. 14 of the 2003 ND baseball media guide for a complete list of the most noteworthy upsets posted by the Notre Dame baseball program during the previous 15 seasons.

SERIES NOTES

IRISH RETURN TO THE KCC – Notre Dame posted a 7-1 record at the 2000 Kennel Club Classic, with wins over Duquesne (5-1), Central Michigan (5-0), Illinois (5-1, 12-3), Butler (3-2), Iowa (3-2) and Akron (10-3) – plus a 6-1 loss to host North Florida.

THE ND-VANDERBILT SERIES (3-2) – Saturday's game will be the first between the teams since 1989 (an 11-2 win by the Commodores, at Rollins College) ... it's also just the second game in the series since 1960 and just the third in the last 76 seasons ... the teams split a pair of 1923 games at Vanderbilt (3-1 ND win, 10-1 VU win), with ND winning a 1927 game at VU (4-2) ... 33 years later, the Irish returned to Vanderbilt and posted a 6-4 win (in 1960).

THE ND-UNF SERIES (0-1) – North Florida (ranked #3 in Division II at game time) beat Notre Dame at the 2000 Kennel Club Classic (6-1), behind freshman RHP Brian Rauch (7 IP, R, 6 H, 4 Ks) and an offense that chipped away for runs in four different innings ... UNF opened the scoring in the 2nd, on a Jeff Stockton RBI double and Nick Steppe's run-scoring single ... the Ospreys manufactured another run in the 5th and stretched to 5-0 on a bases-loaded walk and hit batter in the 6th ... ND scored in the 8th, after doubles from Ben Cooke and Steve Stanley ...

THE ND-NAVY SERIES (6-3-1) – Recent meetings in the series include ND wins at USA Baseball Stadium (Millington, Tenn.) in the annual Service Academies Classic (7-6 in '92, 1-0 in '96) and a rare 4-4 tie in 2001 at the Fresno State Classic (the game was halted due to time limits) ... the first three games of the series came during the early 1900s (when the schools were growing football rivals), with games at Annapolis in 1913 (7-1 Navy win) and 1914 (4-2 ND win) and a 1915 game at Notre Dame (5-2 Navy win) ... ND then won the next three (6-4 at home in '29, 5-2 at home in '31 and 5-4 at Navy in '40), with the Midshipmen posting a 5-4 win at ND in 1941.

THE ND-EIU SERIES (4-1) – The series opened with a pair of games at Eck Stadium in 1994 (an 8-4 EIU win and 10-3 ND win), followed by three ND wins in the Mainieri era (all at Eck): 9-3 in '95, 5-0 in '96 and 7-5 in '97.

THE ND-CREIGHTON SERIES (5-3) – Notre Dame and Creighton split a pair of Spring Break games in 2002, with CU posting an 8-7 win over ND at the Round Rock Express Classic before the Irish won two days later in San Antonio (6-2, at the Irish Baseball Classic) ... that game is one of five in the series played at Wolff Stadium, with a 7-3 ND win and 8-5 CU win (title game) in the 1997 IBC while the Irish posted two wins over CU at the 1999 IBC (5-4, 5-3 title game) ... the teams met a third time in 1999, an 8-1 win for the Irish in the NCAA South Bend Regional opener ... the first game of the series came in 1983 at Oral Roberts (a 6-5 Creighton win).

THREE GAMES, THREE SITES – The Notre Dame-Creighton series already has featured four different sites (Oral Roberts, San Antonio's Wolff Stadium, ND's Eck Stadium and Round Rock's Dell Diamond) but the teams are slated to play three times in 2003 at three more sites: March 15 (at Jacksonville University's Brest Field), April 12 (at Omaha's Rosenblatt Stadium) and April 13 (at Creighton).

FRIEND OR FOE? – Several players from the Kennel Club Classic opponents are former teammates of current ND players ... sophomore SS Matt Macri is a former teammate of Creighton's Ryan Fitzgerald (Dowling HS and Belizza MacRae Legion team) and Mike Sirianni (Perfect Game Wood Bat League) ... Irish senior RHP J.P. Gagne and Navy's Andy Froistad were teammates during their youth baseball days ... another senior RHP, Peter Ogilvie, and CU's Keith Hood were teammates at Stevenson HS ... sophomore RHP John Axford and Creigthon ace LHP Tom Oldham were on the same staff with the 2002 Hyannis Mets of the Cape Cod summer league ... injured ND sophomore RHP Grant Johnson and Vanderbilt ace sophomore LHP Jeremy Sowers were roommates on the 2001 USA Junior National Team ... freshman walk-on LHP Matt Arminio was a prep teammate of Vanderbilt's Ryan Mullins (Father Ryan HS).

- The 2003 Notre Dame baseball includes players from 19 states, with two from Florida: sophomore RHP **Chris Niesel** (Plantation/St. Thomas Aquinas HS) and freshman OF **Brennan Grogan** (Tequesta/Benjamin School) ... 11 Florida natives have played for the Irish during the Paul Mainieri era.
- Niesel is one of several noteworthy Florida RHPs who have played for the Irish, with the others including: **Mike Passilla** (Windemere/Bishop Moore HS; '87-'89; 4.85 ERA, 17-11, 3 SV, 78 Ks, 200.1 IP), **David Sinnes** (Miami/Palmetto HS; '90-'93; 2.91, 32-8, 6 SV, 315 Ks, 297.1 IP), **John Corbin** (Hollywood Hills HS; '98-'00; 4.64, 13-7, 20 SV, 112 Ks, 114.1 IP) and **Danny Tamayo** (Miami/Ransom Everglades HS; '98-'01; 3.27, 12-5, SV, 141 Ks, 160 IP) ... Sinnes held ND records for career win pct. and Ks (bested by Aaron Heilman in 2001) while Corbin is the Irish career saves leader and Tamayo formed a potent 1-2 punch with Heilman in '01.
- Other noteworthy ND baseball letterwinners from the sunshine state have included: SS Daniel Cunha (St. Petersburg; '33-'35), IF Joe LaRocca (Ft. VS. THE SEC – Notre Dame owns a 37-42 all-time record vs. teams that currently comprise the Southeastern Conference (7-3 in the Paul Mainieri era), with ND's most-common SEC opponents including Georgia (7-5), Arkansas (6-6), Kentucky (5-5), Alabama (4-3), LSU (4-3) and Mississippi State (4-2) – plus a handful of games vs. Vanderbilt (3-2), Mississippi (1-4), Tennessee (1-4), Florida (1-3), Auburn (0-4) and South Carolina (1-1) ... games vs. SEC teams in the Mainieri era include: a pair of 1995 games at Eck Stadium vs. Alabama (5-3, 1-9), an 11-5 loss to Mississippi at the 1997 Long Beach State Classic, an 8-5 win over Arkansas at the '97 Service Academies Classic (in Millington, Tenn.), a 6-4 win over Georgia at the 2000 McAA Starkville Regional (1-8, 7-0, 9-10) and the early-season wins at MSU in 2001 (7-5, 4-2) ... the Irish also competed at the 1996 NCAA South I Regional in Tuscaloosa (ND did not face Alabama at that regional).

OPENING NIGHT DINNER AGAIN A SMASH HIT – Nearly 1,000 area baseball fans were on hand Feb. 4 in the Joyce Center Fieldhouse for the Notre Dame baseball program's second annual Opening Night Dinner, with Chicago Cubs GM **Jim Hendry** the keynote speaker ... the night included a ballpark-style dinner and also featured videos recapping ND's 2002 CWS season and previewing the Cubs' 2003 campaign ... admission price included becoming members of the second seasonticket-holder base in the history of ND baseball (for season tickets, call 574-631-7356) ... attendees also had the chance to receive autographs from the current ND players, who sat with fans at individual tables ... more than 100 pieces of sports memorabilia were awarded as door prizes ... Hendry – a longtime friend of ND head coach Paul Mainieri (they coached together at Miami's Columbus High School) – also was a successful coach at Creighton, with current ND associate head coach Brian O'Connor playing on Creighton's 1991 CWS squad.

BIG SHADOWS – Notre Dame's 2003 roster includes some big bodies, with eight players 6-4 or taller – led by freshman RHP Ryan Doherty (7-1, 230), senior 1B Mike Holba (6-8, 240), freshman LHP Tom Thornton (6-6, 205), sophomore RHPs Grant Johnson (6-6, 220) and John Axford (6-5, 180), and sophomore 1B Joe Thaman (6-4, 215).

OTHER KENNEL CLUB CONNECTIONS

- Notre Dame associate head coach **Brian O'Connor** now in his ninth season on the Notre Dame staff is a 1993 Creighton graduate and was a top relief pitcher on CU's 1991 College World Series team.
- Notre Dame (4th, 85%) and Vanderbilt (6th, 80%) own two of the nation's best graduation rates for student-athletes.
- Third-year Navy head coach **Steve Whitmyer** lettered with the 1981 and '82 Notre Dame baseball teams (as a RHP), posting nine career wins and 109 Ks in 135.2 IP.
- Several current ND head coaches have connections to military academies, with 9th-year baseball coach **Paul Mainieri** coaching six previous seasons at Air Force while men's tennis coach **Bobby Bayliss** and women's rowing coach **Martin Stone** coached at Navy before coming to Notre Dame.
- Current Xavier athletic director **Mike Bobinski** who lettered at ND as a RHP in '78 and '79 served as AD at Navy before accepting the Xavier position.
- The Notre Dame football team has competed in Jacksonville at the Gator Bowl following the 1976, 1998 and 2002 seasons.
- Eastern Illinois has competed in NCAA Tournament women's soccer action at Notre Dame during each of the past two seasons.

ROADTRIPPERS – Notre Dame – which typically plays its first 20-some games on the road (first 16 in 2002) – regularly travels to top-notch facilities and noteworthy cities ... in Paul Mainieri's nine seasons (including '03), the Irish have visited: Fullerton and Long Beach, Calif., Seattle (Kingdome), San Antonio and Round Rock, Texas, five Florida cities (Miami, Orlando, Jacksonville, St. Petersburg and Tallahassee), Atlanta, New Orleans, Boston, Washington, D.C. New York City, Minneapolis (Metrodome) and Tempe, Ariz.

OHIO CONNECTIONS – Several Ohio natives have played key roles for Notre Dame baseball in recent years, with the 2001 squad including eight from Ohio ... the 2002 College World Series team then was led by five starters from Ohio, including four seniors – DH Matt Bok (Akron), 3B/C Andrew Bushey (Boardman, near Youngstown), C/3B Paul O'Toole (Cleveland suburb of Lakewood) and CF Steve Stanley (Upper Arlington, near Columbus) – plus current junior 2B Steve Sollmann (Cincinnati) ... another Upper Arlington native, freshman IF Greg Lopez, has joined the Notre Dame program for 2003.

GAME NOTES FROM OPENING WEEK

- The first game vs. Arizona State marked the 500th game at Notre Dame for ninth-year head coach Paul Mainieri (he's now 357-145-1), who also is nearing his 700th career coaching win (689-424-1).
- Kris Billmaier's 8th-inning solo home run thwarted Dayton's upset bid (10-9) ... ND took a 9-4 lead into the 7th before seeing UD rally to tie the game ... the Irish offense despite losing five starters from the '02 CWS team pounded out 18 hits for one of the most productive openers in ND history (the '02 squad managed just eight hits in its 7-6 opening win over Missouri) ... the 10 runs equal the most by ND in a season opener since the '93 squad posted an 11-3 win at ASU ... the '95 Irish team also scored 10 runs in its opener, vs. Florida State at the ACC Disney Blast in Orlando (10-1).
- In the first game vs. ASU (16-3 loss), ND took a 1-0 lead into the bottom of the 5th before ASU cashed in a pair of defensive miscues to claim the lead ... sophomore SS Matt Macri allowed a routine double-play ball grounder to skip under his glove, setting up a 2-out grand slam (all four runs were unearned).
- In the second ASU game, ND used a 7-run top of the 6th to claim an 8-4 lead but ASU answered with a 2-out, 9-run rally (the inning took 53 minutes, the game 3:24) ... three ND errors led to six unearned runs and provided the margin of defeat ... freshman CF Cody Rizzo hit an early home run for the Irish while Macri capped the top of the 6th with a 2-run shot.

- ROLLERCOASTER RIDE ND's seven freshman position players had an impressive debut in the four games played at Arizona State, batting .389 (21-for-54; 13 RBI, 14 R, 2 HR, 3B, 3 2B, 3 BB, 10 Ks, SB, 5 HBP, SAC) including HRs from DH **Steve Andres** and CF **Cody Rizzo** (a rarity in recent years for ND freshmen) ... the rookies joined their teammates in coming back to earth vs. challenging pitching at the DQ Classic Nebraska LHP Aaron Marsden (8 IP, R, 5 H, 10 Ks), Minnesota RHP C.J. Woodrow (6 IP, UER, 4 H, 8 Ks), Wake Forest LHP Tim Morley (6.2 IP, R, 4 H, 3 BB, 7 Ks) with the freshmen combining to hit just .128 (5-for-39, 13 Ks).
- Sophomore 3B **Matt Edwards** (5-for-12) was the only ND starter to hit above .290 in the three games.
- The 2-1, 13-inning win over Wake Forest game ranks as the third-longest in the nine-year Paul Mainieri era and is the longest for the Irish in five years, since Alec Porzel's home run ended a 15-inning, 5-3 game vs. West Virginia on May 3, 1998 (at Eck Stadium) ... the longest game of the Mainieri era came on May 2, 1995, when the Irish outlasted Michigan in a 16-inning game at Old Kent Park in Grand Rapids, Mich. (7-6).
- ND outhit WFU 11-8 but the Irish left 12 runners on base (with two others picked off) ... ND had the potential winning run on base every inning from the 9th-12th before finally ending the game in the 13th.
- Nebraska CF Jeff Leise sparked the NU offense with an early HR and a 2-run triple ... Minnesota scored its first three runs on RBI groundouts before 2B Luke Appert's 2-run blast in the 5th.
- ND overcame its offensive struggles by making just one error and turning five doubles plays.

Position Player Notes

LINEUP TAKING SHAPE – ND's lineup continues to evolve as the Irish replace five starters from the '02 CWS team ... sophomore SS Matt Macri has made four starts in the leadoff spot (after entering 2003 as the likely 3-hole hitter, where he hit at the DQ Classic vs. Nebraska and Minnesota) while Cody Rizzo's hot-hitting start (5-for-8, 5 RBI, HR, 2B) placed him in the CF mix, along with fellow freshmen Craig Cooper and Brennan Grogan ... senior RF Kris Billmaier was shifted from the cleanup to No. 3 spot for opening week and responded by batting 8-for-19 (.421) with nine RBI and three home runs (equaling his 2002 HR total, with 10 career HRs prior to '03).

LONG-BALL LONGING – Notre Dame is looking to replace several long-ball threats, including C Paul O'Toole (11 HRs in '02), LF Brian Stavisky (9), 3B Andrew Bushey (6) and DH Matt Bok (3) ... all told, ND's current active players accounted for just 17 of the team's 53 HRs (32%) in 2002, led by junior 1B Joe Thaman (6), junior C Javi Sanchez (5) and senior RF Kris Billmaier (3; plus two by junior 2B Steve Sollmann and one from sophomore SS Matt Macri, who played just 17 games in '02 due to injury) ... other 2002 HRs came from '02 graduates Ken Meyer (2), Matt Strickroth (1) and Steve Stanley (1), with current sophomore Brent Weiss (2, out for all of '03 season due to injury) and former walk-on IF Geoff Milsom (1) rounding out the 2002 HR total.

ANDRES EMERGES – Freshman C/DH Steve Andres (a 4th-generation ND student) was a pleasant surprise in 2002 fall workouts, after deciding at the last-minute to attend walk-on tryouts ... he then delivered in opening week, batting 6-for-14 (.429) with a home run, triple, double, two RBI, eight runs, two walks and two times hit-by-pitch (before going 0-for-5 at the DQ Classic) ... the smooth-swinging lefty didn't draw much attention from college recruiters while dominating in several sports at Justin Sienna HS in Napa, Calif. (he also was an option quarterback and came back from a major broken-leg injury) ... he could follow former catcher William Andres ('16'-18) as the first great-grandfather/great-grandson combination in the ND baseball all-time letterwinner list ... William Andres played as right end on the 1917 football team (during the early days of the Knute Rockne era) and earned three baseball monograms while serving as a teammate of future legendary Irish coach Jake Kline.

TOP TOOLS (defense): Baseball America rated several Notre Dame players among its "top tools" list for the 2003 BIG EAST Conference ... the junior rightside infield tandem of **Joe Thaman** (1B) and **Steve Sollmann** (2B) both were rated by BA as the BIG EAST's best defensive players for their respective positions ... Thaman also earned that recognition prior to the 2002 season ... Sollmann has made an impressive transition from center field (where he starred as a prep) to the middle infield.

DEFENSE NOTES

NEW NAMES IN CENTER - Freshman Craig Cooper became just the second ND player to start in center field during the last five seasons, with '02 graduate Steve Stanley starting all 256 games from '99-'02 (he played all but 25 innings in that span) ... Cooper's classmate Cody Rizzo then also drew a CF start, in the second game vs. ASU (and at the DQ Classic) ... the last player (other than Stanley) to start in center field for the Irish was switch-hitter and leadoff batter Allen Greene (in '98) ... other recent CFs include Randall Brooks ('97), Scott Sollmann ('94-'96), Eric Danapilis ('90, '93), Dan Bautch ('91-'92) and Dan Peltier ('87-'89) - with Peltier (.406), Danapilis (.405), Stanley (.384) and Scott Sollmann (.372) ranking atop the ND career batting list (dominating several other categories) ... the only players other than Stanley who patrolled CF for the Irish during '99-'02 included catcher Paul O'Toole (2 innings), utility player Ben Cooke (5), LHP Mike Naumann (1) and walk-ons John Heintz (5) and George Howard (11).

ON THE MOVE ... AGAIN – Junior Javi Sanchez – who filled in admirably as the starting SS in 2002 (he played 2B as a prep) – has tackled another new position, as ND's starting catcher ... under the guidance of first-year assistant coach David Grewe, Sanchez has made significant progress behind the plate in the past few months as the Irish look to replace graduates Paul O'Toole and Andrew Bushey ... Sanchez made just one error at SS during the 2002 NCAAs (nine games) ... two sophomores – SS Matt Macri "Tommy John" reconstructive elbow surgery) and 3B Matt Edwards (broken leg) have returned to anchor the left side of the infield.

LOOKING FOR LEADOFF: Notre Dame heads into the third week of the season still searching for its top option at the leadoff spot, held down during the past four seasons primarily by All-America CF Steve Stanley (he hit leadoff in 187 of 256 games from 1999-2002) ... two of Stanley's classmates – DH Ken Meyer (43) and C Paul O'Toole (11) – accounted for 54 of the other 69 leadoff starts from '99-'02 ... sophomore SS **Matt Macri** (4 games) and freshman CF **Cody Rizzo** (3) have been featured in the leadoff role this season, combining to hit just .185 (5-for-27) with a .313 on-base pct. (3 BB, 2 HBP) and .333 slugging pct. (HR, 2B), plus three runs, three RBI, no stolen bases and nine Ks ... Macri has hit 4-for-19 (.211) in the leadoff role (3 RBI, 3 R, HR, 2B, 3 BB, 2 HBP, 4 Ks) while Rizzo is batting 1-for-8 (.125, 5 Ks) as the leadoff man ... as a team, ND owns a .406 overall on-base pct. when leading off the inning (Macri .286, Rizzo .364).

Chris Niesel Notes

DANDY DEBUT – Current sophomore RHP **Chris Niesel** (Plantation, Fla.) became the first Notre Dame freshman ever to post double-digit strikeouts in his debut, vs. Southern Illinois at the 2002 New Orleans Classic (Feb. 24) ... Niesel left that game with a 2-1 lead (ND lost 6-2) while racking up 10 Ks in five innings (5 H, 0 BB) ... he then posted nine Ks and one walk the next week vs. Fairfield (in Homestead, Fla.), yielding 19 Ks and just one walk in his first 12 innings.

JUST WIN, BABY – Chris Niesel headed into 2003 with an impressive streak of winning decisions that began with the start of his senior season at Aquinas High School (13-0) and continued with the Irish in 2002 (4-0, in addition to leaving several other games in line for wins) – followed by a 3-1 record with the Falmouth Commodores in the Cape Cod League during the summer of '02 ... Niesel also opened ND's annual Blue-Gold intrasquad series with impressive wins (in the fall of '01, and again in the fall of '02), yielding a mark of 22-1 in 23 decisions (before last week's loss to Nebrasksa).

BACK IN STEREO - Chris Niesel (Plantation/Aguinas HS) - who tossed the clinching win at Florida State in the 2002 NCAA Super-Regional series - missed five weeks in '02 due to a bout with mononucleosis (April 8-May 11) before three solid relief efforts, strong starts in the BIG EAST Tournament vs. Virginia Tech (his first start in seven weeks) and another solid start vs. Ohio State in the South Bend Regional (he was the winner in the 9-6 clincher; 6 IP, 2 H, 2 R, 2 BB, 4 Ks, 94 pitches) ... he then added the clinching 3-1 win at FSU (8 IP, 6 H, 3 BB, 5 Ks) and had a strong outing vs. Rice in the CWS (6.2 IP, 5 H, 2 R, 2 BB, 7 Ks; with ND rallying for a 5-3 win in the 9th) ... his 2002 postseason stats included a 2.05 ERA in five outings (four starts, 22 Ks, 7 BB, 23 H in 26.1 IP).

DECEIVING W-L MARK – Chris Niesel's 4-0 season record in 2002 (in 11 starts) could have included several more early-season wins, as he left with leads vs. Southern Illinois (2-1, ND lost 6-2), Arkansas-Little Rock (5-1, with ND scoring twice in 9th to win 7-5), Connecticut (8-3, lose 9-8) and St. John's (2-1, with ND scoring three in 7th for 5-2 win) ... the trend continued last week in the opener vs. Dayton, as Niesel left with a 9-4 lead (6 IP, 6 H, 2 BB, K) only to see UD rally for to forge a 9-9 tie (ND won, 10-9) ... Niesel was one of five high school pitchers in the nation who were named by Baseball America as a 2001 first team All-American.

PITCHING STAFF NOTES

HARD TO HIT – Sophomore RHP John Axford has proven tough to hit in 19 outings with the Irish ... Axford has allowed just .237 opponent batting and 71 hits in 83.2 career innings at ND (7.6 H per 9 IP), surrendering just one home run in 374 batters faced ... Axford owns a 2.08 season ERA to 2.08 in 13 IP (12 H, 4 BB, 5 Ks) and is averaging just 2.8 BB per 9 IP (compared to 7.5 BB per 9 IP as a freshman) ... he rolled up his second and third double-play balls of the season in the Wake Forest game, after serving up a team-best 18 DP groundballs in '02.

CLOSING THE DEAL – ND's starters combined for a 4.35 ERA and .336 opponent batting in opening-week action (20.2 IP, 7 Ks, 12 BB, 22 H) but the bullpen was touched for a 19.06 ERA and .400 opponent batting in 11.1 IP (4 Ks, 16 BB, 24 H).

PUT AWAY THE BB's – The ND pitching staff has an uncharacteristically high walk total (40 BB in 61 IP, or 5.9 BB per 9 IP) – after averaging just 3.6 walks per 9 IP in 2002 ... the ND pitchers averaged 3.47 BB per 9 IP in the first eight seasons of the Mainieri era (led by a team-record 2.5 in '01 and 3.0 in '00)

ELITE E.R.A. – Notre Dame has finished in the top-16 of the national charts for team ERA in four of the previous five seasons, owning the nation's best team ERA in portions of 2000 and '01 ... the 2000 staff surged atop the national ERA charts in late April (2.72) and finished 16th (3.93) ... the Irish returned to the top spot among the 2001 team ERA leaders for three weeks in April, finishing fifth at 3.22 (best at ND since '92, third-best since '75) ... ND finished 13th in the '02 ERA rankings (3.57), joining Texas and Rice as the only teams among the nation's top-20 ERA leaders in '00, '01 and '02 ... the Irish were 12th in the '98 team ERA rankings (4.02) while the first eight ND staffs coached by **Brian O'Connor** ('95-'02) averaged a 4.10.

TALL TOM TERRIFIC – Freshman LHP **Tom Thornton** had another strong relief outing in the Nebraska game (4 IP, UER, 3 H, BB, K) and now owns a 1.42 ERA in two outings with the Irish (6.1 IP, 6 H, 2 BB, K).

PLENTY OF EXPERIENCE ON THE HILL – Despite the loss of Grant Johnson, Notre Dame's other 11 returning pitchers combined to log 77 percent of the team's innings in the 2002 season (449 of 584), in addition to posting 39 of the 50 victories, making 54 of the 68 starts and combining for 358 strikeouts in 2002.

SOPHOMORE SURGE? – Hard-throwing sophomore RHP John Axford (13 IP, 4 BB, 5 Ks) is looking for more consistent pitch location in '03, after totaling the same number of walks and strikeouts (89) in his combined 2002 ND (59 BB/64 Ks) and Cape Cod League seasons (with the Hyannis Mets, 30 BB/25 Ks) ... Axford's .231 opponent batting was best among the 2002 staff (also 10th-best by an ND pitcher, since '91) and he actually turned in some of the best numbers ever by an ND freshman pitcher in the eight-year Paul Mainieri era (notably his 3.95 ERA, 70.2 IP and 64 Ks) – but his season was somewhat overshadowed by the dominating postseasons turned in by his classmates Grant Johnson and Chris Niesel.

THREE AMIGOS – Three senior RHPs could be key parts of ND's '03 success, as starters **Peter Ogilvie** (3.50, 12-7, 136.1 IP, 90 Ks/39 BB, 138 H, 26 GP/22 CS, 5 CG) and **Ryan Kalita** (3.50, 7-0, 61.2 IP, 49 Ks/33 BB, 65 H, 23 GP/7 GS, CG) and former weekend starter/current closer **J.P. Gagne** (4.21, 22-11, 7 SV, 245.2 IP, 163 Ks/66 BB, 274 H, 67 GP/33 GS, 2 CG) own the following combined career stats: 3.96, 41-18, 7 saves, 447.2 IP, 305 Ks/140 BB, 483 H, 117 GP/63 GS and 8 CG.

JOHNSON LOST FOR SEASON – Sophomore RHP Grant Johnson (Burr Ridge, Ill.) underwent arthroscopic shoulder surgery in late Dec. and is slated to miss the '03 season ... a 2003 preseason All-American, he enjoyed a stellar 2002 Freshman All-America season (3.46 ERA in 18 GP), ranking second among BIG EAST pitchers in wins (9-5), third in starts (14) and sixth in Ks (86) ... the 6-6, 220-pounder's other '02 stats included 44 walks, 94 hits allowed, .249 opponent batting, five wild pitches and nine hit batters ... *CB* named Johnson national pitcher of the week after his 1-hit, 1-walk masterpiece in the 25-1 NCAA win over South Alabama – the 13th pitcher (4th since '81) ever to toss a no-hitter or 1-hitter in the NCAAs ... he posted an openinggame win in the Super Regional at Florida State and started the opener vs. Stanford at the CWS ... Johnson logged 20 IP with Team USA in the summer of '02 (1.80 ERA, 2-1, 5 GP/3 GS, 25 Ks, 13 BB, 11 H), helping the staff post a team-record 1.48 ERA.

PITCHING STAFF NOTES

ROOKIE RARITY – Notre Dame's first 24 all-time BIG EAST Tournament games featured just three freshman starters on the mound – with the Irish equaling that number in '02, when **Grant Johnson** and **Chris Niesel** started the first two games of the BIG EAST Tournament and **John Axford** started ND's decisive fourth game (3-2 vs. Rutgers) ... ND started two freshman pitchers in all three NCAA rounds, with Johnson drawing Game-1 starts in the Regional (vs. Ohio State), Super Regional (vs. Florida State) and CWS (vs. Stanford) while Niesel won the clinching third games in the Regional (also short relief stint) and Super Regional – followed by a strong start in the CWS elimination-game win over Rice (Axford added impressive relief vs. FSU and Stanford) ... the trio's combined '02 postseason stats included a 5-1 record, 2.71 ERA and .229 opp. batting in 12 GP/9 GS (50 Ks, 27 BB, 53 H in 63 IP).

TOP TOOLS (pitching) – Baseball America rated several ND players among its "top tools" list for the BIG EAST Conference ... sophomores **Chris Niesel** ("best breaking ball") and **Grant Johnson** ("best control") joined Boston College sophomore Chris Lambert ("best fastball") as pitchers cited by BA for BIG EAST top tools.

CLOSING WITH THE CLOSER – Current senior RHP and closer **J.P. Gagne** had some rocky moments early in the 2002 postseason but posted an amazing ratio of strikeouts (15) to walks (1) in 18 IP of '02 postseason ... his best two outings came at key times, retiring nine straight to close the 10-4 opening win at Florida State before coming on to strike out the side in the 9th inning of the 3-1 clincher in that Super-Regional series ... he also went 7-2 in his final nine decisions of the 2002 season.

SENIOR SAVERS – ND's senior class includes three RHPs – J.P. Gagne (7), Brandon Viloria (5) and Matt Laird (5) – who have totaled five-plus saves in their ND careers ... Laird and his three-quarters delivery produced four saves in the closing role with the 2001 team that climbed to No. 1 ... his more noteworthy saves that season included the first of two wins on opening week at Mississippi State (7-5, 0.2 IP) and the final two innings to cap a 3-0 shutout of Cleveland State.

MR. CONTROL – Senior RHP Brandon Viloria has averaged just 1.56 walks per 9 IP during his career (11/63.1) – which would best the ND record of 1.64 set by RHP Alan Walania from 1990-93 (59/324) ... Viloria posted a 2.45 season ERA in 2002 (second-best on the staff), plus a 2-1 record and three saves, with just five walks in 21 IP (no wild pitches and one hit batter) and an eye-popping .203 opponent batting avg. (16-for-79) ... he has yet to throw a wild pitch in 63.2 career innings, with just one hit batter ... several other ND pitchers also have low career walk ratios, including sophomore Chris Niesel (2.30) and seniors J.P. Gagne (2.42) and Peter Ogilvie (2.63).

PITCHING WITH CLASS – Notre Dame's current group of six sophomore pitchers – which led the way in helping ND earn top recruiting class honors from *Baseball America* in 2002 – combined for a 3.64 ERA, 25-8 record and four saves during the 2002 season (also 263 Ks, 148 walks and 273 hits allowed in 299.1 innings. 71 appearances and 43 starts) ... the five active members of the sophomore pitching group (minus injured ace Grant Johnson) combined for the following 2002 numbers: 3.73 ERA, 16-3, 4 SV, 53 GP/29 GS, 198.0 IP, 177 Ks/104 BB and 179 H:

FIREMAN – Senior **Brandon Viloria** has inherited five baserunners in '03 (allowing none to score), after allowing seven of 15 inherited baserunners to score in 2002.

GOOSE EGGS ALL AROUND: Current senior RHP Ryan Kalita had a unique memento from the 3-2, 10-inning win over Rutgers that clinched the 2002 BIG EAST Tournament title ... Kalita entered in the 5th inning and tossed seven shutout innings, allowing six hits and three walks (six Ks) ... what made that performance all the more remarkable was that Kalita took a linedrive off the right side of his forehead (off the bat of RU hitting ace Val Majewski), with the ball glancing off Kalita's glove before thumping off his skull ... after being examined by the medical staff (and monitored throughout the game), Kalita returned to the mound to continue the biggest outing of his career ... a couple hours later, as the Irish celebrated their first BIG EAST title on the field at Commerce Bank Ballpark, Kalita still was sporting the major welt – a fitting souvenir to his gutsy outing that wrapped up an NCAA bid for the Irish (and launched the run to the College World Series).

ANOTHER BIG W: Kalita also turned in a clutch effort as the starter in ND's key 2-1 win over Virginia Tech (4/12/02) ... that 7-inning game extended to 10, with the Irish outlasting the Hokies ace LHP (and eventual 1st-round draft pick) Joe Saunders ... Kalita logged the first six innings, allowing an unearned run (6 H, BB, 5 Ks) ... ND then won in the 10th, after Matt Bok's pinch-hit triple and Joe Thaman's single back to the mound ... that win essentially helped ND claim the BIG EAST's No. 1 seed, after the Irish and Hokies both finished 18-8 in league play – with ND going on to sweep the doubleheader for the eventual tiebreaker.

WINDY-CITY WONDERS: Three Chicagoarea natives emerged among ND's top-five starting pitchers in '02: current senior RHPs Peter Ogilvie (Buffalo Grove/Stevenson HS) and Ryan Kalita (Oak Park/OP-River Forest HS) and current sophomore RHP Grant Johnson (slated to miss all of the '03 season after undergoing shoulder surgery) ... that Windy City trio combined in '02 for a 21-10 record and 3.83 ERA (180 Ks, 84 BB, 229 H hits in 223.1 IP) ... some top players in the Mainieri era have hailed from Chicagoland, including IF/C Mike Amrhein (OPRF HS), CF Randall Brooks (Hazelcrest/ Hillcrest HS), C Bob Lisanti (Chicago/Fenwick HS) and SS Alec Porzel (Lisle/Naperville North HS) - plus pitchers Tim Kalita (Ryan's brother and Detroit Tigers 40-man Spring Training invitee) and Darin Schmalz (Barrington HS).

2002 SEASON NOTES

TWO-YEAR TEAR - Notre Dame's combined victory total from the 2001 (49-13-1) and 2002 (50-18) seasons represented the third-most wins (99) in Division I baseball during that two-year span, trailing only Florida State (107) and South Carolina (106).

BOOMERANG SEASON - The sixth-ranked Notre Dame baseball team ended up in the 2002 College World Series and the NCAA "final six" - ultimately living up to its billing as the nation's No. 5-ranked team in the Baseball America preseason poll (ND was 13th in the USA Today/ ESPN preseason coaches poll and 19th in the Collegiate Baseball poll) ... the eight CWS teams all were in the top-14 of the BA preseason poll: Stanford (1), Clemson (2), ND (5), Nebraska (8), Texas (9), Rice (11), Georgia Tech (13) and South Carolina (14) ... others in the BA preseason top 10 included Miami (3), USC (4), Florida State (6), LSU (7) and Tulane (10).

HOSTS WITH THE MOST - Notre Dame is one of nine schools to serve as a Regional host team three-plus times since the NCAA field expanded to 64 teams in 1999 (Florida State, Stanford and LSU are the only host teams all four years) ... others included fellow '02 hosts USC, Rice, Clemson and South Carolina (plus Miami, a host team from 1999-2001).

CLASSY CLASS - Notre Dame's eight-member 2002 senior class - DH Matt Bok, 3B Andrew Bushey, C Paul O'Toole and CF Steve Stanley, plus DH Ken Meyer, OF Matt Strickroth and RHPs Matt Buchmeier and Drew Duff - helped ND compile a four-year record of 188-67-1 (.736) from 1999-2002 ... that ranks as the most wins ever by an ND graduating class and is the fourthbest four-year winning pct. in the last 87 seasons of ND baseball.

1-0 GAME A RARITY - The 2002 narrow win over BYU marked just the fourth 1-0 game in Mainieri era at ND – with one in a 7-inning game (vs. Navy, at the '98 Service Academies Classic) ... the Irish posted a 1-0 win over Valparaiso on April 22, 1998 (7-inning game extended to 9) before the 1-0 win over the Miami Hurricanes, on May 12, 1999, at Eck Stadium (Alex Shilliday, Chris McKeown and Aaron Heilman combined on a near-no-hitter).

HOMEBODIES - Several 2002 ND players hit significantly higher at Eck Stadium than on the road, including current junior 1B Joe Thaman (148 pts higher, .206-.354) and current senior RF Kris Billmaier (+83, .279-.362) ... the '02 team hit 54 pts higher at home (.290-.344) while the staff ERA was smaller (3.99-2.84).

ROAD-TESTED - Current junior C Javi Sanchez was ND's only 2002 starter who hit better on the road (.299, 40-for-134) than at Eck Stadium (.263, 25-for-95) ... Sanchez hit four of his five 2002 HRs on the road, including a 2-run blast (after an RBI single) at Third Fifth Ballpark vs. Michigan (a rare HR in the ND-UM series at the minor-league park) and postseason HRs in minor-league parks vs. Rutgers (BIG EAST Tournament, Commerce Bank Ballpark) and vs. Stanford (CWS) ... his also played a key role in the pivotal comeback at West Virginia (10-4, in 10 inn.), with his 2-for-4, 2-RBI, 2-run day including the go-ahead double in the 10th.

DOGPILES - After coming up short in previous seasons, Notre Dame broke through with four major postseason celebrations in 2002 - winning the BIG EAST Tournament, the NCAA South Bend Regional and the Super Regional at Florida State (plus a 9thinning rally vs. Rice in the CWS) ... just two of those celebrations featured the traditional dogpile as the BIG EAST title game and the 5-3 CWS eliminationgame win over Rice ended on Brian Stavisky hits.

HOMESTANDERS – ND's impressive home record during the 2002 season (26-3, .897) ranks as the third-best home winning pct. in the program's history (min. 15 home games) ... the 1997 squad went 25-2 at Eck Stadium while the 1980 team won 19 of its 20 home games at Jake Kline Field ... ND's all-time home record in 110 seasons is 1,062-330 (.763), well above the program's overall win pct. of .623.

SIX IN BIG-LEAGUE CAMP – Three former Notre Dame baseball players currently are on 40-man rosters for MLB Spring Training: IF Craig Counsell (Arizona), RHP Brad Lidge (Houston) and LHP Tim Kalita (Detroit) ... three others are non-roster invitees to Big-League Camp: RHPs Aaron Heilman (rated by Baseball America as the No. 3 prospect in the New York Mets organization) and Christian Parker (Yankees) and LHP Chris Michalak (Colorado).

OTHER PRO PLAYERS – Seven other former ND players are in minor-league spring training: C Paul O'Toole (Cubs), 3B/C Andrew Bushey (Colorado), OFs Steve Stanley and Brian Stavisky (both with Oakland), IF Brant Ust (Detroit), RHP Danny Tamayo (Kansas City) and OF Matt Bok (Los Angeles).

DEAR DIARY – Several Notre Dame baseball players made internet diary entries during their respective 2002 summer seasons (see baseball page at www.und.com for Summer Diaries link button) ... pitchers **Grant Johnson** (Team USA), **J.P. Gagne** (Alaska Goldpanners) and **Chris Niesel** (Falmouth Commodores, of the Cape Cod League) joined infielder **Javi Sanchez** (Hays, Kan., Larks of the Jayhawk League) in sharing their various – and unique – summer tales.

SCORING STREAKS – Notre Dame saw its team-record scoring streak end on May 15, 2002, in an 11-0 loss to BIG EAST rival Rutgers ... the Irish scored in the final 57 games of '99, in every game of 2000 (64) and '01 (63), and in the first 46 of 2002 – for a 230-game scoring streak that stretched back to a 12-0 loss at Florida International (2/21/99) ... the previous record 132-game scoring streak began with the first game of the Paul Mainieri era, a 10-6 loss to Texas at the Anaheim Classic, on Feb. 24, 1995 (the Irish were shut out by Auburn, 8-0, in the '94 NCAA East Regional at Clemson) ... that streak ended vs. another Texas team, 2-0 vs. Texas Pan-American in a seven-inning game on March 10, 1997 (in San Antonio) ... ND has scored in 98.8 pct. of its games in the Mainieri era (498 of 504), with the other shutouts vs. BIG EAST teams: at Seton Hall (16-0; 3/22/97), vs. St. John's (3-0; 5/9/98) and vs. Rutgers in the BIG EAST Tournament (12-0; 5/16/98).

Heading into the Kennel Club Classic, the Irish have **scored in 302 of 304 non-conference games** during the Mainieri era (99.3%), including **141 straight** ... prior to the Mainieri era, the longest ND scoring streaks were: 121 (April 23, 1930-May 26, 1937) and 103-games (May 25, 1907-May 17, 1912) ... ND's five shutout losses under Mainieri have included two on the opponent's field, one at Eck Stadium and two on neutral fields.

GOOD FOR 40 – Notre Dame owns **14 straight seasons** with 40-plus wins, led by the 50-18 season in 2002, 49 wins in '01, 48 in '89 and '92, 46 in four seasons ('90, '93 '94, '00), 45 in '91 and 44 in '95 ... that's the fourth-longest active 40-win streak in Div. I baseball, behind Florida State (25), Wichita State (25) and Clemson (17).

GOING THE DISTANCE – Prior to its heartbreaking 2001 NCAA Tournament loss to Florida International (7-6, 10 inn.), Notre Dame had gone unbeaten in its previous 10 extra-inning games (9-0-1) – including three at the 2001 Fresno State Classic and clutch 11-inning wins at Mississippi State (4-2) and Rutgers (5-4) in that '01 season ... the Irish quickly rebounded from the FIU loss, winning a 10-inning game later that day vs. UC Santa Barbara (11-10), and went 4-1 in 2002 extra-inning games – followed by last week's 13-inning win over Wake Forest ... ND heads into the Kennel Club Classic with a 15-2-1 mark in its last 18 extra-inning games, dating back to '97 (6-1-0 in the last seven, starting with the 2001 NCAA win over FIU).

FAR & WIDE – The Notre Dame list of all-time baseball monogram winners includes players from 43 home states ... current senior RHP Brandon Viloria (Wailuku, Hawaii) in 2000 became the program's first letterwinner from the island state while current junior LHP Cody Wilkins (Hudson, N.C.) could become the first from the Tar Heel state ... the only other states that have not produced ND baseball letterwinners include Alaska, Idaho, Nevada, New Hampshire, South Carolina and Vermont ... the nine-year Paul Mainieri era has featured players from 34 states/provinces (see p. 33 of media guide), including 19 states represented on the 2003 squad: California, Colorado, Florida, Hawaii, Illinois, Iowa, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Missouri, New Jersey, New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Ontario, Tennessee, Texas, Virginia and Washignton.

Notre Dame signed nine highly-touted high school seniors to national letters of intent in the 2002 early fall period (see www.und.com for complete release) ... the signees included four RHPs - 6-0, 170-pounder Jeff Manship (San Antonio, Texas), 6-3, 210 **Derik Olvey** (Pelham, Ala.), 6-4, 210 **Jess Stewart** (Manassas, Va.) and 6-5, 195 Dan Kapala (Royal Oak, Mich.) - plus one of the nation's premier utility players in 6-220-pound Chris Vasami (Mamaroneck, N.Y.), 6-4, 210 switch-hitting first baseman Mike Dury (Indianapolis), 6-1, 185 infielder Chris Fournier (Fairfield, Conn.), 6-1, 175 lefthandedhitting catcher Sean Gaston (Brownsburg, Ind.) and 5-9, 160 lefthanded-hitting centerfielder Danny Dressman (San Jose, Calif.).

Four of the signees were ranked among the nation's top-100 high school players by either the Perfect Game/Baseball America "Prospects Plus" (first number) or by Team One Baseball: Manship (6th/18th), Olvey (58th/86th), Dury (277th/ 37th) and Vasami (100th/NR), with Dury the top-rated first baseman by Team One ... Fournier (225) and Stewart (269) were included on PG/BA's list of top 300 prep players.

Perfect Game/BA ranked eight of the nine Irish signees among the top-11 in their respective states, led by Manship, Olvey, Vasami (first in their states), Kapala (2nd), Dury (6th), Gaston (9th) and Stewart (11th) ... Team One cited Fournier (10th) and Vasami (14th) among the nation's "best pure hitters," projecting Dury as the No. 4 "best pure hitter for the future" among 2003 draft-eligible preps ... Vasami ranked 7th for "best raw power," 10th for "best linedrive power" (Fournier was 9th in linedrive power) ... Vasami was one of just two players in the nation included on Team One's top 15 for each of the pure hitting, raw power and linedrive power categories.

Vasami could combine with Manship and Olvey as one of the nation's toprated trios of freshman pitchers in '04 (Manship was the #2 pitcher listed on the PG/BA lists, Olvey 32nd, Vasami 53rd).
