In 13 years leading the Notre Dame volleyball team, Debbie Brown, a former collegiate All-American and captain of the 1980 U.S. Olympic team, has led the Irish to 12 consecutive NCAA Championship berths, a dozen regular-season conference titles, 11 league tournament championships, and eight finishes in the national top 25.

Debbie Brown, formerly a two-time winner of the Mikasa Award as the best all-around collegiate player in the country as well as a captain of the 1980 U.S. Olympic team, has proven it is possible to make the transition from being one of the best volleyball players in the world to having an incredibly successful coaching career. While her playing credentials are virtually unmatched among collegiate coaches across the country, Brown also has turned into one of the nation's elite mentors, leading her teams to 17 consecutive winning records, a dozen finishes in the top 25 of the AVCA national rankings, and 17 invitations to the NCAA Championship (in 19 years), including a current streak of 12 in a row.

Now in her 14th season at Notre Dame and 20th overall as a collegiate head coach, Brown has compiled a 440-192 (.692) career record, including a 323-109 (.748) mark at Notre Dame. Her squads have reached the round of 16 in the NCAA Championship five times, highlighted by a trip to the 1993 quarterfinals. A dozen regular-season conference championships and 11 league tournament titles are among the other accomplishments of Brown-led teams, which have won 20 or more matches 15 times in the last 17 seasons.

In her time at Notre Dame, Brown has transformed the Irish from a program that had just five winning seasons in its first 11 years of varsity volleyball to one that has been ranked in the AVCA national top 25 in 11 of her 13 seasons. Notre Dame cracked the national top 10 in consecutive campaigns, peaking at an all-time best fifth in 1995 and sixth in '96 in the *Volleyball* magazine rankings.

She has helped Notre Dame to a variety of dominating performances, including a 125-5 (.962) record in regular-season action against conference teams (27-0 vs. Midwestern Collegiate Conference, 98-5 vs. BIG EAST

Conference). That includes a perfect 72-0 record at home and, at one point, a 79-match winning streak against conference foes (regular season and postseason), which ranks as the third-longest conference winning streak in Division I volleyball history (AIAW and NCAA). A further measure of Notre Dame's success is that the longest losing streak for the Irish over the past 13 seasons was four, which occurred just once.

Overall, the Irish are 159-23 (.874) in the Joyce Center under Brown, including winning streaks of 36 and 27 matches. Against unranked teams at home, Notre Dame holds a 152-6 (.962) record in the Brown era.

Since becoming a member of the BIG EAST Conference in 1995, Notre Dame has opened league play 11-0 in all but one season, going on to win eight regular-season titles in nine years to go along with seven tournament championships. The Irish have won 38 team BIG EAST statistical crowns, as well as 24 individual statistical championships. The league's player of the year has been from Notre Dame six times, while Irish student-athletes have garnered 32 all-conference accolades, including 20 first-team honors (which account for more than one-

third of the spots on the all-BIG EAST first team during that span).

Brown has seen her Irish players gain All-America accolades on nine occasions, including a quartet – setter Kristen Kinder, opposite Emily Loomis, and middle blockers Lauren Brewster and Lauren Kelbley – being named honorable mention in 2003. It was the first time in the program's history that more than one player gained All-America mention in the same season.

Additionally, Brown has helped her players to twice be honored as CoSIDA Academic All-Americans, while they have won the conference player-of-the-year award nine times and been named the top player in the league tournament in 10 instances. In all, Brown-era Irish players have combined for 46 all-conference honors, including 29 first-team selections. Also, Notre Dame student-athletes have garnered all-region or all-district honors from the AVCA 38 times since Brown's arrival.

Under Brown's tutelage, Irish student-athletes also have earned three invitations to join the U.S. National Team program and have made four trips to the U.S. Olympic Festival.

Since the NCAA began keeping official national statistics in 1994, Brown's Irish teams have 17 times been mentioned in the final listings and individuals have appeared 14 times. Among the 19 top-15 finishes were Notre Dame's first two national statistical crowns, which both came in 2003. The Irish led Division I with a team blocking average of 3.72 (second-best Cornell averaged just 3.52), while Brewster was

tops in individual blocking with a 1.78 mark.

The Irish record books have been rewritten almost constantly since Brown stepped on campus, as all-time best marks in over 110 team and individual categories have been eclipsed. A testament to her recruiting and coaching prowess is the fact that nearly all of the top players in the Notre Dame career record book have played for Brown. That group includes 11 of the 14 players to have registered 1,000 career kills, all six who notched both 1,000 kills and 1,000 digs, the top six competitors on the career hitting percentage list, six of the top seven on both the assists and service aces lists, and each of the top nine student-athletes in career digs.

Perhaps the top player in Irish volleyball history, Christy Peters, played at Notre Dame during Brown's first four seasons, being tabbed a third-team All-American in both 1993 and '94. She still stands as the program's career leader in both kills (1,683) and digs (1,640).

Among the other standouts coached by Brown were Jessica Fiebelkorn (1992), two-time BIG EAST Player of the Year Jaimie Lee (1997), and Denise Boylan (2000), who all earned honorable mention All-America status. Lee and Boylan were invited to train with the United States national program during the summer of

1998, while the former earned a spot on the 1997 World University Games team. Kristy Kreher (1998-2001) also was one of just 20 players named to the USA Junior National Team in 2000.

Seven of Brown's former Irish players have gone on to play professionally. Lee, Angie (Harris) Akers, and twins Kristen and Jessica Kinder are currently active on the

beach for the Association of Volleyball Professionals (AVP), while three former Notre Dame competitors were active in the United States Professional Volleyball league in 2002. Akers was the 2002 AVP Rookie of the Year, while Lee earned the same honor a year later. Boylan and Kreher were members of the Minnesota Chill and Molly Stark played for the St. Louis Quest.

Brown also coached several premier players at Arizona State, including three-time Olympian Tammy (Webb) Liebl (1988-96) and All-Americans Christy Nore and Regina Stahl.

The Sun Devils were ranked among the top programs in the nation for six seasons and in 1986, Brown led the Sun Devils to a 27-7 record and was named Pacific-10 Conference coach of the year. She compiled a 117-83 record en route to five NCAA tournament berths while at Arizona State and took a leave of absence in 1988 to serve as an assistant coach for the United States national team before accepting a full-time national team position in 1989.

Brown's duties centered on helping improve the national team's defense and her efforts played a role in the U.S. bronze-medal finish at the 1990 World Championship in China. She also coached teams in the 1985 and '91 Olympic Festivals.

Since picking up the sport late in her high school days, Brown has become one of the most respected and accomplished individuals in all of volleyball. She grew up in the Los Angeles suburb of El Segundo to become one of the nation's top players. She competed as a 17-year-old for the United States at the '74 World Championship in Mexico City and a year later played on the adidas team that won the USVBA title.

After graduating from El Segundo High School, she captained the University of Southern California to a 72-1 two-year record and national titles in both 1976 and 1977, including a 38-0 run in '77 that until 1998 was the only unbeaten season in Division I women's volleyball history. That squad is still considered one of the all-time greats at any level of volleyball. Brown (then Debbie Landreth) twice was named a collegiate All-American and received the Mikasa Award as the "nation's best all-around player" in both 1976 and '77.

The 5-8 outside hitter left USC prior to her junior year, accepting an invitation to train full-time with the U.S. national team. She co-captained the U.S. to fifth place at the '78 World Championships. A year later, she and her teammates — including such all-time greats as Debbie Green, Flo Hyman, Sue Woodstra and Rita Crockett — qualified for the Olympics in Moscow. Four of Brown's former USA teammates went on to become college head coaches while a fifth, Debbie Green-Vargas, is in her 18th season as an assistant at Long Beach State.

After serving as co-captain of the team that did not compete at the Olympics due to the U.S. boycott, Brown completed her degree in physical education at Arizona State in 1982.



She began her coaching career as an assistant under Dale Flickinger at ASU from 1980-82 and served in the same capacity at Central Arizona College during the '82 season. She returned to Arizona State as head coach in 1983.

Brown's association with the national team continued in 1986 as a consultant, and she emerged as a full-time U.S. assistant in 1988, aiding in the team's Olympic effort and a 1990 campaign that resulted in a bronze-medal finish at the World Championships. As a result of all her time with the national team, Brown has played and coached in 22 countries. In honor of her work, Brown was selected as an Olympic Torchbearer for the 2002 Winter Olympic Torch Relay when it traveled through the Northern Indiana area (see story on page 37).

In May of 1995, USA Volleyball named Brown an "All-Time Great Volleyball Player," the highest honor given by the organization. Brown and fellow honoree Karch Kiraly, a three-time Olympic gold medalist and beach legend, were recognized at the U.S. Open Championships in Springfield, Mass., and have had their photos and records added to the Volleyball Hall of Fame in Holyoke, Mass. Established in 1954, the All-Time Great designation honors players with

Olympic or national teams, All-America honors, U.S. Open Championships and overall dominance during an era. Among the 51 previous winners are Hyman, Woodstra, Green, Crockett and Laurel Brassey, all former teammates of Brown.

Brown earned USVBA All-America honors eight times and won the USVBA's

Kilgore Sportsmanship Award in 1983. A six-time USVBA first-team All-American, Brown was a member of the USVBA Board of Directors and the U.S. Olympic Committee's Athletes Advisory Council. She served a two-year term (1995-96) as president of the American Volleyball Coaches Association and was a member of its All-America selection committee.

In 2003, Brown was recognized for her outstanding career by the NCAA with the Silver Anniversary Award, which annually recognizes six distinguished student-athletes for their accomplishments since concluding their collegiate playing days 25 years ago.

Brown remains active in volleyball and played for the 1975, '85 and '86 USVBA national championship teams. In 1992, she joined several of her former Olympic squad teammates to capture the USVBA senior division national title in Reno, Nev.

As a recognition of

Brown's effort and success, Notre Dame's National Monogram Club bestowed upon her an honorary monogram at the annual Monogram

Club awards dinner in 1999.

Brown has been actively involved in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Young Life, serving as a motivational speaker and coach at national banquets and camps. She also has volunteered for Christmas in April, a home-rehabilitation program in South Bend.

Brown and her husband of 23 years, Dennis, have two sons, Connor and Ryan.



Brown Carries the Olympic Torch

Debbie Brown's Olympic career reached another milestone on Jan. 4, 2002, when she participated in the Winter Olympic Torch Relay, carrying the flaming torch .02 miles in South Bend.

The captain of the 1980 U.S. Olympic team that missed out on the Moscow games due to the United States boycott, Brown also served as an assistant coach for the U.S. National Team during its 1988 Olympic effort.

In frigid temperatures she stepped off the torch runners' bus just a few steps from the Joyce Center, where she has coached the Fighting Irish volleyball team for 13 seasons. She was handed the torch by local news personality Maureen McFadden and took off down Eddy Street toward downtown South Bend (where the torch was hosted for 30 minutes at the Century Center before continuing on its path to Salt Lake City for the opening ceremony).

While a junior at USC in 1978, Brown accepted an invitation to train full-time with the U.S. National Team. She captained the squad to a fifth-place finish at the '78 World Championships, before earning a spot on the '80 Olympic team. In May of 1995, Brown was named an "All-Time Great Volleyball Player" by USA Volleyball.

Even though she missed out on competition during the 1980 boycott, Brown still remembers her national team experience fondly: "Nothing is going to make up for the disappointment of 1980. I am happy, though, that I occasionally can still be connected to the Games. I never ever felt like I wasted four years of my life. That was a special time."

Brown was chosen as a torchbearer due to her embodiment of the inspirational spirit of the Olympics, shown by serving and motivating the community.

A former head coach and 15-year veteran of the college game, Robin Davis is in his fourth season as an assistant coach at the University of Notre Dame. In addition to assisting in all aspects of the Irish program, he works closely with Notre Dame's middle and outside blockers and has been instrumental in building the Irish into one of the top blocking teams in the country.

Notre Dame, which has compiled a 69-22 (.758) record during the span, has finished among the top five in the NCAA Division I blocking leaders in each of the seasons since Davis' arrival, culminating in the 2003 squad leading the nation in blocking (3.72 per game) and setting the school record for the second year in a row (after the previous mark had stood since 1988). Additionally, Irish sophomore Lauren Brewster was tops in Division I in individual blocking (1.78) in '03 after finishing fourth as a rookie. They marked the first two NCAA statistical crowns in Notre Dame history.

Davis has been instrumental in the development of Brewster and classmate and fellow middle blocker Lauren Kelbley, who both were tabbed honorable mention All-America in '03 after Kelbley was the BIG EAST and AVCA Northeast Region Rookie of the Year in '02. They stand as two of the three most accurate hitters in Irish history: Kelbley's .325 career attack percentage is the second-highest in program history, while Brewster's .318 mark ranks third. Brewster's career block average of 1.73 stands as the best-ever for a Notre Dame player, while Kelbley's 1.17 mark ranks fifth.

"There is no question Robin is an outstanding blocking coach. He gets the credit for us being the best blocking team in the country and for Lauren Brewster doing the things she did. He is really good in making the really small adjustments that change an average blocker into a great blocker. He also brings a tremendous amount of experience and wisdom and decision-making. The experiences he had as a head coach have been really helpful to our staff."

In his three years, Davis has helped Brewster, Kelbley, and 2001 graduate Malinda Goralski account for three of the top eight individual seasons by Irish in both hitting percentage and blocking. Brewster set a Notre Dame freshman record for both blocks (175) and block average (1.68) in '02, while her 161 block assists were the most-ever for an Irish player in a single season.

In Davis' first season, Goralski led the BIG EAST Conference in blocking (1.66) and finished sixth in Division I, while the team's average of 3.42 was good for fifth nationally and the top mark by a Notre Dame squad since 1988. The average was 0.49 higher than Notre Dame's mark in 2000. Goralski, the BIG EAST Player of the Year, also was second in the conference with a .379 hitting percentage that was the second-highest by an Irish player in school history.

In 2002, the Irish broke the 14-year-old school record with a block average of 3.66 that was bettered by only one Division I team, Nebraska. Kelbley was a first-team all-conference selection, while Brewster led the league in individual blocking.

In the 91 matches over the last three seasons, Notre Dame has been outblocked by its opponent on just 12 occasions. The Irish have led the BIG EAST in both overall blocking and blocks in conference matches each season. Additionally, Notre Dame players led the league in individual blocking in every campaign, while four players ranked among the BIG EAST's top eight blockers in 2003.

Prior to Davis' tenure, Notre Dame had never seen a quartet of players register 100+ blocks apiece in a season. Brewster, Kelbley, Emily Loomis, and Katie Neff accomplished the feat in both 2002 and '03.

Other highlights for the Irish over the past three years included three regular-season BIG EAST titles and a pair of league tournament championships, as well as three NCAA tournament berths. All three squads were ranked in the AVCA national top 25, with the '03 team climbing to 12th, the highest for Notre Dame since 1996. That squad also put together a 14-match winning streak en route to opening the season with a 21-2 record.

Before moving east to join the Irish staff, Davis was an assistant coach at his alma mater, Northern Arizona, after enjoying 10 highly successful years as head coach at Biola (Calif.) University.

Davis spent two years at Northern Arizona, helping it qualify for the NCAA tournament in 1999 for the first time in school history. NAU also captured a share of the Big Sky Conference title in 2000, also a first in school history. Davis served as NAU's recruiting coordinator and was heavily involved in on-court



coaching, focusing on the middle blockers and helping with advance scouting, as well.

Davis led Biola to the NAIA final four twice, including a loss in the title match in 1997. His Biola squads posted 20 wins six times, advanced to the regional semifinals seven times and captured two league titles. In '97, Biola earned the national sportsmanship award. Davis left Biola in '97 as the winningest coach in the history of the school, accruing 221 wins and a .734 winning percentage.

A 1979 graduate of Northern Arizona with a degree in physical education, Davis also served as athletics director and assistant principal at Brethren Christian High School in Cypress, Calif., spending nine years coaching volleyball, basketball and baseball.

As a player, Davis was a member of the NAU men's volleyball club team while in college and spent time on the USVBA indoor tour (1979-85), the beach volleyball circuit (1982-87) and the AVP tour (1986-87). When he left California five years ago, Davis held a AAA rating as an open beach player.





Louella Lovely

Assistant Coach

Second Season

Cal Poly '97



A former standout setter at the Air Force Academy, California-Berkeley and Cal Poly, Louella Lovely is in her second year as an assistant coach for the Notre Dame volleyball team. Her duties include assisting in all aspects of the program with an emphasis on coaching the Irish setters.

After joining the staff in the spring of 2003, Lovely helped the Irish to one of their most successful seasons in recent years, as the '03 squad used a 14-match winning streak to open 21-2 and rocket to 12th in the national rankings.

Among the keys to the '03 success were Irish setters Kristen Kinder and Kelly Burrell. Notre Dame's .288 hitting percentage in conference matches was

by far the best in the BIG EAST (Miami was next at .245), while its 16.26 kills and 14.79 assists per game were second to the Hurricanes. The Irish finished 47th in Division I in overall team hitting percentage (.251), while Kinder was a first-team all-BIG EAST selection and the first Notre Dame setter ever named honorable mention All-America by the AVCA.

A 1997 graduate of Cal Poly, Lovely began her playing career at the Air Force Academy in 1993 before moving to California-Berkeley in 1995. She garnered AVCA all-region honors in 1993 and '94 as a setter for the Falcons, also earning AVCA All-America honors in '94.

The 1996 season found Lovely at Cal Poly in San Luis Obispo, where she was team captain under former Notre Dame assistant coach Steve Schlick. She excelled both on and off the court at Cal Poly, earning the Big West Conference Scholar Athlete of the Year award in 1998 and Arthur Ashe Jr. Sport Scholar Awards in both 1997 and '98. She capped her stellar academic career with an NCAA Ethnic Minority Postgraduate Scholarship in 1999.

Lovely utilized that scholarship at California, where she earned a master's degree in Education, Language, Literacy and Culture: Athletes and Academic Achievement.

Born April 25, 1974, in Kingsport, Tenn., Lovely also worked as an assistant coach at California in 1998 before moving to Deutsche Bank Securities in 1999. She also coached 18-and-under players for the Golden Bear Volleyball Club from '99 until she accepted the position at Notre Dame.

**Andrew Richardson
Volunteer Assistant Coach**

An extremely accomplished coach on the club and high school levels, Andrew Richardson is in his first season as a volunteer assistant coach for the Notre Dame volleyball team. He previously coached for east central Indiana's ASICS Munciana Volleyball Club from 1997-2004 and was Elwood High School's head coach from 2002-03. In all, Richardson has coached teams to a pair of national championships and four Indiana state titles, while mentoring over 100 eventual Division I collegiate players.



ASICS Munciana teams coached by Richardson have managed seven top-25 finishes at the national club championships, winning a pair of gold medals in 2001 (14 open and 18 open divisions), as well as bronze medals in 1999 (17 open) and 2001 (16 open).

In all, since '97 ASICS Munciana has captured eight gold medals, two silvers, and 13 bronze medals, accruing 47 top-10 finishes.

Richardson has coached 39 Junior Olympic All-Americans, as well as four players tabbed open division MVPs and a pair that has gone on to garner AVCA All-America accolades in college: Georgia Tech's Lynette Mosler (2002 and '03) and Nebraska's Melissa Elmer ('03).

After Elwood High School in north central Indiana went 3-17 in 2001, Richardson took over and led the Panthers to an 8-12 mark the following year and a 12-8 record in '03. The latter campaign marked just the second time in school history Elwood's volleyball team posted a winning record.

From 1997-2000, Richardson served as an assistant to current Purdue head coach Dave Shondell at Muncie Central High School, helping the Bearcats to four Indiana state championships (1997-99, 2002) and one state runner-up result.

Before becoming a coach for ASICS Munciana, Richardson played for the team from 1994-96.

Born Nov. 12, 1978, Richardson married the former Jessica Hickman on May 15, 2004. He is currently employed at Yesterday's in Granger, while finishing his undergraduate education at Indiana University-South Bend.
