Irish Set To Make Second NCAA Tournament Appearance In Grand Rapids, Michigan; Will Face Alabama-Huntsville In 5:00 p.m. Game on Friday, March 23.

Notre Dame captures first-ever CCHA Championship with wins over Lake Superior (3-0) and Michigan (2-1). David Brown selected CCHA tourney MVP and is joined on all-tourney team by Wes O'Neill and Erik Condra.

BACK IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT: The Notre Dame Fighting Irish make their second NCAA tournament appearance ever and their first since 2004 when they hit the ice in Grand Rapids,

Mich., on Friday, March 23 versus Alabama-Huntsville. Game two of the Midwest Regional will feature Boston University and Michigan State at 8:30 p.m. The regional championship game will be played on Saturday, March 24 at 8:30 p.m. with the winner advancing to the NCAA Frozen Four in St. Louis, Mo., April 5 and 7. Notre Dame comes into the regional ranked No. 1 in the nation for the seventh straight week and owns a 31-6-3 overall record. The second seed in the entire tournament, the Irish are the top seed in Grand Rapids, Mich. Notre Dame's opponent, Alabama-Huntsville is 13-19-3 overall and is the fourth-seeded team in the regional. The Chargers represent College Hockey America (CHA). The number two seed this weekend is Boston University from Hockey East. The Terriers are ranked ninth in both polls coming into the NCAAs and are 20-9-9 on the year. Michigan State is no stranger to the Irish



as they advance to Grand Rapids from the CCHA. The Spartans are ranked 10th in both polls and are the third seed this weekend with a 22-13-3 overall record.

NOTRE DAME NCAA HISTORY: Notre Dame's history in the NCAA Tournament is brief. The Irish made their first and only visit until this weekend on March 27, 2004 when they were in the Grand Rapids Regional, facing two-time NCAA Champion, Minnesota. The Irish scored twice in the first period to build a 2-0 lead, but dropped a 5-2 decision to the Gophers to give Notre Dame an 0-1 record in NCAA Tournament play.

IRISH IN VAN ANDEL: The Irish have played three times at Van Andel Arena in their history and own an 0-3 record in Grand Rapids, Mich. Notre Dame played here on Nov. 24, 1998, dropping a 4-2 decision to Ferris State. On Oct. 24, 1999, the Irish again faced Ferris State in Grand Rapids and lost a second 4-2 decision. Then on March 27, 2004, Notre Dame paced Minnesota in a Midwest Regional game and lost a 5-2 game.

HOW THEY GOT HERE: The Irish advanced to the Midwest Regional after getting the automatic bid for winning the 2007 CCHA title on Saturday, March 17 with a 2-1 win over Michigan. The Irish were 4-0 in the CCHA playoffs. Alabama-Huntsville, received the CHA automatic bid after winning the CHA Tournament with wins over Wayne State, Niagara and Robert Morris in the championship game. Boston University received an at-large bid after falling to Boston College in the Hockey East semifinals last weekend in Boston and will be the second seed at Grand Rapids. The Terriers' opponent, Michigan State joined Notre Dame in Detroit at Joe Louis Arena for the CCHA Championship. The Spartans, the region's third-seeded team lost to Michigan, 5-2, in the semifinals and then defeated Lake Superior State, 7-6 in overtime.

IRISH AND CHARGERS: Notre Dame and Alabama-Huntsville have met 16 times in the all-time series with the Chargers holding an 8-7-1 edge. The two teams have not met since Nov. 23-24, 1990 when the Irish swept a series in South Bend by 8-7 and 3-2 scores. The Irish have won the last two meetings in the series.

OH-FOR-TWO: Notre Dame and Boston University have met just twice in the all-time series between the two schools with the Terriers winning both games. On Dec. 29, 1970, Notre Dame dropped a 7-3 decision to the Terriers in the Boston Arena Christmas Tournament in Boston. The teams would next meet on Dec. 29, 1995 at the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown, in Milwaukee, Wis., with the Terriers again winning, 7-3, in the championship game.

IRISH AND SPARTANS: Notre Dame and Michigan State have been getting together on the ice since the 1921-22 season and have met 96 times with the Spartans holding a 57-31-8 edge in the series. The two teams met twice this year in a home-and-home series with the Irish winning, 4-1, on Nov. 17 at the Joyce Center. Michigan State followed that by handing Notre Dame a 2-0 loss at Munn Arena on Nov. 18. That game was the only time this season that Notre Dame was held scoreless.

NCAA EXPERIENCE: Seven members of the Irish senior class were team members (Tom Sawatske transferred from Wisconsin after the 2004-05 season) when Notre Dame played Minnesota in the 2004 NCAA tournament. Six members of that class saw action in the game as goaltender David Brown (Stoney Creek, Ont.) served as Morgan Cey's back up in goal. Noah Babin (Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.) and Wes O'Neill (Essex, Ont.) saw action on the blue line in the game. Current captain, T.J. Jindra (Faribault, Minn.) had six minutes in penalties and three shots on goal. Josh Sciba (Westland, Mich.) had four minutes in penalties, Michael Bartlett (Morton Grove, Ill.) had two penalty minutes and two shots on goal while Jason Paige (Saginaw, Mich.) had two shots in the game.

SOLID REPRESENTATION: The CCHA has sent four teams to this year's NCAA tournament. Joining Notre Dame in the Midwest Regional is Michigan State. The Spartans are making their 25th appearance in the NCAA tournament. Michigan State was fourth in the league this season. Participating in the West Regional in Denver is the University of Michigan. The Wolverines are a two seed in Denver where they will open with North Dakota on Saturday at 7:30 p.m. Michigan was second to the Irish in the regular season and the CCHA Tournament this year. The fourth CCHA team is Miami. The RedHawks, who lost in the first round of the CCHA tournament to Lake Superior, are a number-four seed in Manchester, N.H., where they will face New Hampshire in a 1:00 p.m. game on Saturday. The RedHawks were third in the CCHA this season.

CCHA CHAMPIONS: Notre Dame won its first ever CCHA Tournament championship in 17 years as a member of the conference on Saturday, March 17 when they defeated Michigan, 2-1, in the championship game. Notre Dame advanced to the title game by defeating Lake Superior State, 3-0 in the semifinal game. Notre Dame had participated in two previous CCHA finals. In 1981-82, the first year the Irish were in the CCHA, they defeated Bowling Green, 8-5, in the semifinals before losing to Michigan State, 4-1 in the finals. In 1999-2000, Notre Dame advanced to the semifinals only to have the season come to an end at the hands of Michigan State, 4-0, in the semis.

ALL-TOURNAMENT HONORS: Three members of the Notre Dame team were selected to the 2007 CCHA all-tournament team. Leading the way was goaltender David Brown who gave up one goal in two games for a 0.50 goalsagainst average and a .980 save percentage (48 of 49 saves) and a 2-0 record. Defenseman Wes O'Neill joined Brown on the team. He score the game winner in the 3-0 win against Lake Superior in the semifinals. Right wing Erik Condra (So., Livonia, Mich.) led Notre Dame in scoring with a goal and two assists for three points. Brown was then named the tournament's most valuable player.

TWICE AS NICE: By winning the CCHA tournament. Jeff Jackson became the third coach in the conference's history to win the tournament with two teams. Jackson won this year with Notre Dame and four times with Lake Superior ('91, '92,'93, '95). He joins Ron Mason who won three times with Bowling Green ('77,'78,'79) and 10 times with Michigan State. Rick Comley won twice with Northern Michigan ('80, '81) and once at Michigan State (2006).

ONLY THE SECOND: By guiding Notre Dame to its first-ever CCHA regular-season championship, Irish head coach Jeff Jackson became just the second coach in CCHA history to win titles with two different teams. Jackson won regular-season titles at Lake Superior State (1990-91, '94-'95) prior to this season's title with Notre Dame. He joins Michigan State Athletics Director Ron Mason who won two league titles while coaching at Bowling Green ('77-'78 and '78-'79) and five while behind the bench at Michigan State ('88-'89, '89-'90, '97-'98, '98-'99 and 2000-01).

THE BEST OFFENSE: Notre Dame's defensemen scored six of the teams' 15 goals in the CCHA playoffs. Wes O'Neill had three goals while Brock Sheahan (Jr., Lethbridge, Alb.) scored a pair and Kyle Lawson (Fr., New Hudson, Mich.) had a single goal.

IRISH AT THE JOE: Notre Dame is now 6-9-0 all-time at Joe Louis Arena after going 2-0 last weekend. That makes the Irish 3-6-0 at "the Joe" in CCHA touranment play.

HOBEY BAKER CANDIDATE - DAVID BROWN: Notre Dame senior goaltender David Brown (Stoney Creek, Ont.) was one of 10 players selected as finalists for the Hobey Baker Award on March 15. Brown did his part in the CCHA Championship, showing the committee that he was deserving by giving up just one goal in the tournament on 49 shots, shutting out Lake Superior (3-0) and knocking off Michigan, 2-1. The senior was named to the CCHA all-tournament team and was the tournament's most valuable player.

Earlier in the weekend, Brown was named the CCHA player of the year and was a first team all-CCHA selection. In four CCHA playoff games, Brown was 4-0 with a 0.75 goals-against average and a .966 save percentage with one shutout. For the entire season, Brown is 29-6-3 with a 1.58 goals-against average and a .931 save percentage with six shutouts. He leads the CCHA and the nation in wins and goals-against average. His six shutouts are tops in the CCHA and tied for second nationally while his save percentage is tied for best in the CCHA and second in the nation. He is currently ranked second by CSTV.com's Hobey Watch and second by Inside College Hockey. com's Hobey Tracker.

PLAYOFF SUCCESS: Notre Dame head coach Jeff Jackson has had his share of success in the CCHA playoffs during his career. In eight seasons between Notre Dame and Lake Superior State, he is 28-4 (.875), including 24-2 in six years at Lake Superior State. The two losses came in CCHA tournament championship games as his team played for the title in all six seasons, winning four times. Jackson has now led his teams to the CCHA finals in seven of his eight seasons, winning CCHA tournament titles five times, four with Lake Superior and once with Notre Dame.

SAVING THE BEST FOR LAST: Irish defenseman Wes O'Neill (Sr., Essex, Ont.) went 36 regular-season games without scoring a goal while racking up 17 assists. He finally got on the scoreboard versus Alaska (Mar. 9) with a first-period goal in the 7-1 win over the Nanooks. He added an assist for two points in that game. In game two of the series, O'Neill scored his second goal of the weekend and his first of the year on the power play. He ran his goal-scoring streak to three games with a first-period, game-winning, power-play goal in the 3-0 win over Lake Superior State in the semifinals. In 40 games this season, O'Neill has three goals and 18 assists for 21 points.

ON THE SIDELINES: Irish radio announcer Mike Lockert will be on the sidelines for the Midwest Regional due to eye surgery last week. Steve Penstone, the play-by-play announcer for Penn State hockey, will fill in for Lockert. He did four games earlier this season when Lockert was out with eye problems.

TAKING IT TO THE LIMIT: Notre Dame's two-game sweep of Alaska marked the first time since 1981-82 that the Irish swept a playoff series. The Irish downed Michigan by 6-5 and 5-3 scores that season.

BY THE NUMBERS: The Irish have now won five straight games since their Feb. 23 loss to Ferris State. The five goals scored by Ferris were the most given up all season by Notre Dame. They are are now 12-1-2 in their last 15 games and since Dec. 2, have a 21-3-2 record. The 139 goals scored by the Irish this season are the most by a Notre Dame team since 1989-90 when that team scored 151 goals in 33 games.

CCHAAWARDS: Several Notre Dame players picked up honors at the CCHA's annual award night on March 15. Leading the way was goaltender David Brown who was named the CCHA player of the year and was a first team all-CCHA selection. That makes him just the second Notre Dame player ever to take first team honors from the CCHA. Defenseman Benoit Cotnoir '99 was a first team choice in 1998-99. In all, the Irish have only had seven other players selected second team by the league's coaches. Right wing Erik Condra and defenseman Noah Babin (Sr., Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.) received honorable mention honors and defenseman Kyle Lawson also received votes. Brown also was Notre Dame's Perani Cup Three Star winner and the league's top goaltender. Three Notre Dame

freshmen were selected to the all-rookie team. Forwards Kevin Deeth (Gig Harbor, Wash.) and Ryan Thang (Edina, Minn.) were joined by Lawson among the conference's top six freshmen. Off the ice, senior Jason Paige was Notre Dame's scholar-athlete choice by the CCHA. Head coach Jeff Jackson became the first Notre Dame coach selected as the conference's coach of the year. Defenseman Brock Sheahan is a finalist for defensive defenseman honors while Thang is a finalist for rookie of the year.

PLAYOFF SHUTOUT: David Brown's 17save, 3-0 shutout of Lake Superior State in the CCHA semifinals was the fourth by a Notre Dame goaltender in the program's 39-year history. The first came in the 1973 WCHA playoffs when Mark Kronholm '74 had 26 saves in a 2-0 blanking of North Dakota. Morgan Cey '05 recorded back-to-back shutouts of Miami in the 2003 CCHA playoffs, making 37 and 32 saves in 1-0 and 5-0 wins to take the series, 2-1, over the RedHawks.

BIGGEST PLAYOFF WIN: Notre Dame's game one win over Alaska, 7-1, was the biggest margin for Notre Dame in any playoff game in the school's history. The Irish have scored eight goals twice in the past: March 6, 1973, an 8-3 win over North Dakota in the WCHA playoffs and on March 13, 1982, an 8-5 win over Bowling Green in the CCHA playoffs.

CRAFTY CONDRA: Sophomore right wing Erik Condra (Livonia, Mich.) recorded the third four-assist game of his career and the second of the season in the 7-1 win over Alaska in game one of the series on March 9. Condra had four assists on Jan. 5 in a 6-2 win at Robert Morris in a game that he scored once for a five-point night. He now leads the Irish in scoring with 14 goals and 33 assists for 47 points. That's the most points by a Notre Dame player since Curtis Janicke '93 had 50 points in the 1990-91 season. His 33 assists are the most since Connor Dunlop '03 had 36 assists in the 2001-02 campaign. Condra is Notre Dame's leading playoff scorer with a goal and seven assists for eight points.

MONEY SCORER: Senior center Jason Paige has scored two of the biggest goals in the history of the program. As a freshman in 2004, he scored the overtime game winner in game three of the first round series versus Western Michigan. The win sent the Irish to the CCHA Super Six and helped wrap up the first-ever NCAA tournament bid for the Îrish. His game winning goal against Michigan when he fired the rebound of a **Garrett** Regan (So., Hastings, Minn.) shot over Billy Sauer for the 2-1 lead helped Notre Dame to its first CCHA tournament championship. goal was the 11th of the year for Paige, giving him career highs in goals (11), assists (10) and points (21).

REGANOMICS: Garrett Regan continued his strong play this season as he helped set up Jason Paige's game winner against Michigan in the CCHA finals. He had the first three-point game of his career in the 7-1 win over Alaska with two goals and one assist. The two-goal game was his team-best fourth of the season and his first goal of the game was his fourth game-winning goal of the year, tying him for second on the team. Regan now has career highs in goals (14), assists (12), points (26), power-play goals (4), short-handed goals (1) and game winners (4). He is fifth on the team in scoring overall and has two goals and three assists in four postseason games.

WIN RECORD: Notre Dame's 31 wins this season are a school record. The previous record was 27 wins as the 1987-88 team was 27-4-2 playing as a Division I independent.

THE REAL THANG: Freshman right wing Ryan Thang continued his impressive rookie season in the CCHA tournament, getting three assists in the two Irish wins. He is now tied for the team lead in goals (18) and leads in powerplay goals (9), game winners (5) and shots on goal (115). Thang's 18 goals are most by an Irish freshman since Tom Mooney '85 had 19 in 1984-85. He ranks seventh all-time with 18 goals. Thang is second in the CCHA among freshmen goal scorers, trailing Western Michigan's Mark Letestu who has 24. Fellow freshman Kevin **Deeth,** with 17 goals this season, is tied with Rob Globke '04 and Brian Walsh '74 for eighth with 17 goals.

Thang now has 18 goals and 21 assists for 39 points and Deeth has 17 goals and 22 assists for his 39 points. The dynamic duo are rapidly climbing the charts on Notre Dame's single-season freshman scoring list and are tied for 10th with Tom Mooney '88. They currently rank second among CCHA freshmen scorers and tied for 12th nationally.

WHAT CAN BROWN DO FOR YOU: Senior goaltender David Brown continues to be one of the leading contenders for the Hobey Baker Memorial Award for college hockey's top player. He has been selected the CCHA player of the year, first team all-CCHA and was named to the alltournament team and was the tournament MVP. He also is a finalist for Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. Brown owns single-season school records for wins (29), goals-against average (1.58), save percentage (.931) and shutouts (6). Overall, he has now appeared in 37 of Notre Dame's 40 games and has a 1.58 goals-against average and a .931 save percentage to go with a 29-5-3 record. The Hobey Baker candidate is first among CCHA goaltenders in wins (29), goals-against average (1.58) and shutouts (6). He is tied for second in save percentage (.931) and second in minutes played (2,235:37). He ranks first nationally in wins, first in goals-against average, second in minutes played, third in shutouts and tied for third in save percentage. His .823 winning percentage is first in the CCHA and second nationally. Brown and the Irish defense are best in the nation, giving up just 1.65 goals-per-game (66 in 40 contests). The senior goaltender now has 54 career wins at Notre Dame to rank second on the all-time wins list. (record is 56). A three-time CCHA goaltender of the week (Oct. 23, Nov. 6 and Jan. 29), Brown was also the all-tournament goaltender at the Lightning College Hockey Classic. This season, Brown has taken over Notre Dame's all-time top spot for career goalsagainst average (2.38), save percentage (.914) and shutouts (12). Brown's 2,235:37 minutes this season is the most by any Irish goaltender in the program's history.

HOME SWEET HOME: Notre Dame is 13-2-2 at home this season for an .824 winning percentage that is the best since the 2003-04 season when the Irish were 14-2-2 at the Joyce Center for an .833 winning percentage. Only two other Irish teams have had better home records – 1987-88 team was 18-2-0 (.900) and the 1969-70 team was 12-1-1 (.893).

PENALTY-KILLING SUPREME: Notre Dame's penalty killers gave up just one powerplay goal in four CCHA playoff games, stopping 20-of-21 (.952) opponent chances. The Irish have now killed 38-of-40 (.950) opponent power plays in the last nine games. Since Jan. 13, a span of 17 games, the Irish have given up just five powerplay goals in 85 chances (94.4%). Notre Dame has the top-rated penalty killers in the CCHA and the nation, killing penalties at a 91.0% success rate in 2006-07.

SCORING IN BUNCHES: Through the first 40 games of the season, Notre Dame has scored two or more goals in a period a total of 36 times, including five goals in the opening period of the 7-1 win over Alaska on March 9. Twice this season, the Irish have scored five goals in a period (Dec. 3 vs. Alaska). The totals include 24 periods with two goals, nine periods with three goals, two periods with four goals and two with five lamplighters.

GAMES PLAYED LIST: Four Notre Dame seniors continue to climb on the all-time games played list as Jason Paige and Wes O'Neill have climbed into the top 10 with 152 games in their careers while Michael Bartlett (Sr., Morton Grove, Ill.) and T. J. Jindra (Sr., Faribault, Minn.) have played in 150 in their careers.

THE KID LINE: Notre Dame's line of Ryan Thang, Kevin Deeth and Erik Condra (two freshmen and a sophomore) has been the team's top scoring trio this season. The threesome has three goals and 15 assists for 18 points in four playoff games. Condra leads the way with a goal and seven assists for eight points while Deeth and Thang each have a goal and four assists for five points. For the season the trio now has 49 goals and 76 assists for 125 points. Included in the 49 goals are 19 power-play goals, three shorthanded goals and 12 game winners. The three players are a combined +77. Condra and Deeth are second and third respectively while Thang is ninth in the CCHA +/- rankings.

MR. STEADY: Junior Mark Van Guilder continues to be Notre Dame's steadiest player as he is tied for the team lead with 18 goals and is fourth with 34 points. He is second on the Irish with eight multiple-point games on the year. His 18 goals are a career high, surpassing his eight goals of a year ago. The Roseville, Minn., native now has his eyes set on Notre Dame's "Iron Man" record of 153 consecutive games, set by Tim Wallace (2002-06) as he has now played in 114 consecutive games in his career.

MOVING TO THE TOP: Last season (2005-06), Notre Dame tied for eighth in the CCHA with an 11-13-4 record for 26 points. Only one other CCHA team has made a bigger jump in a season to first place in the conference's history over one season. In 2001-02, Ferris State finished in ninth place in the conference with 25 points. The following season (2002-03), the Bulldogs finished first with 45 points, going from ninth to first in one season.

WORST TO FIRST: Just two seasons ago, Notre Dame was 5-27-6 overall and finished last in the CCHA with a 3-20-5 record. In the CCHA's 35-year history, no team has ever gone from worst-to-first in one season. There have been three teams go from worst to first in a two-season span. They are:

1975-76 Bowling Green – Falcons finished last in 1973-74 in a three team conference and finished first in '75-'76 in a five-team league.

1992-93 Miami – RedHawks were last in 1990-91 with nine points in a nine-team conference. They finished first in 1992-93 with 49 points in a 12-team conference for a 40-point improvement over two seasons.

2006-07 Notre Dame – Irish were last in 2004-05 with 11 points in a 12-team conference. This season, the Irish take first place with 43 points (with two games remaining) for a 32-point improvement over two seasons.

FRIDAY NIGHT FUN: With the 5-2 loss to Ferris State on Feb. 23, Notre Dame saw its' record in the first game of CCHA series fall to 12-2-0 on the year. With the win in the second game of the weekend, Notre Dame is now 9-2-3.

SWEEPING ALASKA: The Notre Dame Fighting Irish have been traveling to Fairbanks, Alaska since the 1985-86 season. In 20 games there, the Irish had never swept the Nanooks... until the weekend of Feb. 16-17. The 1-0 and 3-2 overtime wins at the Carlson Center marked Notre Dame's first-ever sweep of Alaska in Fairbanks.

HELPING HAND: Sophomore Justin White (Traverse City, Mich.) notched the first three-point game and three-assist game of his career in the 7-1 win over Alaska on March 9. The three-assist game was the third multiple-point game of his career. He added an assist in the second game of the series to tie for second on the team with four points in the playoffs. On the season, White now has two goals and 13 assists for 15 points in 27 games this year.

JOYCE CENTER SELLOUTS: Notre Dame closed out its' home schedule on March 10 with the eighth consecutive sellout crowd and 10th in the last 11 games going back to Dec. 10. On the year, the Irish had 11 sellouts in 17 home games and for the year averaged 2,478 per game. Standing room capacity at the Joyce Center is 2,763.

ALL TIED UP: Notre Dame's 3-2 overtime win at Alaska on Feb. 17 was the second overtime win for the Irish this season and they are now 2-1-3 in the extra session. The two wins mark the first time the Irish have won two overtime games since the 2001-02 season when they were 2-1-5. Notre Dame has never won more than two games in overtime in a season. The 2-2 tie with Nebraska-Omaha on Feb. 10 was the fifth overtime game for the Irish this season. On Jan. 27, the Irish battled back from a 2-0 deficit to tie Miami, 2-2. On Jan. 12, at Lake Superior, the Irish took a 4-3 overtime win that was the first for the Irish since Dec. 10, 2004 when the Irish defeated Michigan State, 3-2, at the Joyce Center. The last time that the Irish won an overtime game on the road was March 9, 2002, a 2-1 win at Nebraska-Omaha in the CCHA playoffs. In 58 overtime games since the start of the 1999-2000 season, the Irish are 9-7-42 in overtime.

PEARCE'S TURN: Sophomore goaltender **Jordan Pearce (Anchorage, Alaska)** made his first start since Jan. 7 and just his third start of the season in the 3-2 overtime win at Alaska on Feb. 17. The Anchorage native put together an outstanding performance in the game, stopping 33 shots (the second highest-save total in his career) and helped stop six Nanook power plays in the win. The victory improved him to 2-1-0 on the year with a 2.01 goals-against average and a .895 save percentage.

RANKINGS UPDATE: For the seventh consecutive week, Notre Dame is ranked number one in both the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* and USCHO.com/CSTV polls. The Irish have been in the polls for 20 consecutive weeks, the longest span for any Irish team. Prior to this season, the last time the Notre Dame was ranked was the 2003-04 campaign when the Irish

ROAD SWEEPS: After not having a road sweep for over four years, the Irish have three this season and all came against CCHA teams. Notre Dame won two at Alaska (Feb. 16-17), two at Bowling Green (Feb. 2-3) and two at Lake Superior (Jan. 12-13). Prior to this season, the last road sweep came on Feb. 14-15, 2003 when they won a pair of games at Bowling Green.

LOST LEADS: The Irish have lost just two third-period leads this season with the 2-2 tie on Feb. 10 with Nebraska-Omaha being the first two-goal lead that Notre Dame has surrendered this season. The other time was on Jan. 7 when the Irish took a 2-1 lead into the third period and gave up three goals to Robert Morris in a 4-2 loss. Notre Dame is 21-1-1 when they lead after two periods of play. The Irish gave up their second two-goal lead of the season on Feb. 23 when they led Ferris State, 2-0, in the second period, but gave up five consecutive goals over the final 25:34 in a 5-2 loss.

COMING FROM BEHIND: Notre Dame's 4-2 win versus Nebraska-Omaha (Feb. 9) marked the fifth time this season that the Irish rallied from a third-period deficit as they trailed 2-1 before scoring the final three goals of the game. On Dec. 2 versus Alaska, the Irish trailed 1-0 going into the third period and scored three times for a 3-1 win. On Dec. 10, ND trailed Michigan, 3-2, entering the third period and scored twice for a 4-3 win. On Dec. 30, the Irish trailed Northern Michigan, 2-1 entering the third and scored three times in a 4-3 win. On Jan. 27, Notre Dame trailed Miami, 2-0 entering the third and scored twice for a 2-2 tie. On the year, when trailing going into the third period, the Irish are 3-3-1.

BARTLETT SCORES: Senior Michael Bartlett scored a goal in each of the games at Bowling Green. His goal in the 3-2 win was the game winner and snapped a 24-game goal-less drought that started after his Oct. 30 goal at Providence. The game winner was his first since Oct. 30, 2003 when he had the game winner against Nebraska-Omaha. He added his third goal in the 2-1 win on Saturday, tying the game in the second period. Bartlett's three goals this season are the most he's scored since getting six goals as a freshman in 2003-04.

BETTER THAN LAST YEAR: With 139 goals in the first 40 games this season (3.48 goals-pergame), Notre Dame has already surpassed its goal total from a year ago when the Irish had 89 goals in 36 games for a 2.47 goals-per-game average. The last time the Irish averaged more than 3.48 goals-per-game was 1990-91 (4.06). This year's Irish offense is eighth in the nation and the +1.82 goals margin is best in the country.

FIRST-PERIOD GOALS: Michigan (3/17) became just the ninth team this season to score the first goal of the game against the Irish (ND is 6-2-1 in those games). On the year, the Irish have given up just 13 first-period goals while scoring 41 of their own. Notre Dame has scored the first goal of the game 31 times this year and is 25-4-2 in those games. Versus Michigan on Dec. 10, Notre Dame surrendered two goals in the first period for the only time this season and trailed the Wolverines 2-1 after one period. Notre Dame is 18-3-1 when they lead after one period and 9-2-1 when tied after one period. The Irish are now 4-1-1 when they trail after one period of play.

IRISH RANKING HISTORY: Notre Dame hasn't been ranked often in its 39-year hockey history. During the 1972-73 season, the Irish finished ranked fourth overall in the WMPL radio poll and were ranked for eight weeks during the year. That season, Notre Dame lost to Wisconsin in the WCHA finals. The following year (1973-74), the Irish opened the season ranked second (WMPL) and stayed as high as No. 2 through the first four weeks of the year before dropping out. In 1976-77, the Irish were ranked in the final seven weeks of the season, reaching as high as No. 2 on Jan. 31, finishing the year ranked third in the WMPL radio poll. They lost to Minnesota in the WCHA playoffs in a total-goal series. Notre Dame would not be ranked again until October 26 of the 1981-82 season when they reached 10th but weren't ranked again. In 1998-99, the Irish spent 16 consecutive weeks (Oct. 19-Feb. 16) in both the USA Today and USHCHO.com polls, before falling out at the end of the year. In 2002-03, the Irish were ranked for one week and in 2003-04, they were ranked six weeks in total, including the final four weeks in a row to finish 12th in the USA Today Poll and 13th in the USCHO.com final polls.

CLUTCH SCORER: Freshman **Dan Kissel** (**Crestwood, Ill.**) picked up his sixth goal of the season with a power-play goal in the 3-2 win at Bowling Green on Feb. 2. Kissel now has six goals in 22 games this season with three of them being game winners.

KID STUFF: Notre Dame's freshman class continues to excel on the ice and has put together and outstanding rookie year. In the 40 games, the freshmen have combined for 48 goals and 78 assists for 126 points, 19 power-play goals, three short-handed tallies, 12 game-winning goals and are a combined +84. Leading the way are **Kevin** Deeth (17g, 22a) and Ryan Thang (18g, 21a). Thang leads the team with nine power-play goals and is followed by Deeth with six. Thang's five game-winning goals leads the team and is third in the CCHA. Defenseman Kyle Lawson has become a force on the Irish blue line with four goals and 14 assists on the year and is third on the team with a +21. Fellow blueliner Brett Blatchford has 15 points on two goals and 13 assists and is +9. Left wing Dan Kissel has six goals and three assists for nine points in 20 games. Christian Minella has scored one goal and added five assists in 21 games. The freshmen class has accounted for 12 of Notre Dame's 31 game-winning goals (Thang - 5, Kissel - 3, Deeth - 3 and Blatchford one).

CCHA WINNING STREAK: Notre Dame saw its eight-game CCHA winning streak come to an end with the 3-2 loss at Western Michigan on Jan. 19. The streak started on Dec. 2 versus Alaska and included two wins versus the Nanooks, two versus Michigan, two against Northern Michigan and a pair versus Lake Superior State. The streak was the longest conference win streak for the Irish in their 17 years (1981-83, 1992-07) in the league. The previous best win streaks were five games (Oct. 9-Oct. 23, 1998 and Feb. 9-Mar. 2, 2002). Since the streak ended, the Irish have gone 5-0-2 to be 13-1-2 in their last 16 CCHA games.

PLAYING WITH THE LEAD: Through the first 40 games of the season, Notre Dame has played a total of 2424:50 minutes. In those 40 games, the Irish have trailed for just 290:26 minutes (or 12.0% of the time). On the year, the Irish have been in the lead or tied for 88.0% of the time or 2134:24 minutes. That breaks down to being tied for 834:37 minutes (34.4%) and leading 1,299:47 (53.6%).

MAD HATTERS: Freshman Kevin Deeth recorded his first career hat trick in the Jan. 5, 6-2 win over the Robert Morris. The hat trick was the third of the year for the Irish as Deeth joins Mark Van Guilder and Dan Kissel (Crestwood, Ill.) with three goal games. The last time the Irish had three hat tricks in a season was the 1991-92 campaign when they had four.

TOP 10 MEETINGS: Notre Dame's game with #9/#9 Michigan on March 17 marked the seventh game this season that the Irish played in that involved two teams in the top 10. Notre Dame has played Miami twice along with two series with Michigan and Michigan State when they were in the top 10. Over the program's history, Notre Dame has played in 37 games when both teams were top-10 teams. Here's a look at the record in those games.

CLUTCH SCORER: Sophomore Erik Condra made the most of his two goals at Lake Superior (1/12 and 1/13). Both of Condra's goals proved to be the game winner. His goal on Jan. 12 came in overtime and was his third game winner. On Saturday, Jan. 13, a second-period power-play goal proved to be the game winner. Condra now has a career-high 11 goals with four of them winning games. His four game winners are second on the team. Condra now has 20 career goals with five of them the game-deciding goal.

CONDRA CAPERS: Sophomore right wing Erik Condra has picked up where he left off as a freshman when he led the Irish in scoring (6g, 28a) as he again leads the team with 14 goals and 33 assists for 47 points. Condra scored two goals and added an assist in the sweep at Lake Superior with both his goals being game winners and now has four on the season. He recorded a careerhigh five-point game at Robert Morris on Jan. 5, the first five-point game by an Irish player since Dec. 20, 2000 when Brett Lebda '04 had five points (1g, 4a) in a 7-4 win at Nebraska-Omaha. Condra has four games this season with three or more points.

HOME SWEET HOME: Notre Dame's loss to Robert Morris on Jan. 7 snapped an 8-0-0 start for the Irish at the Joyce Center. A year ago, Notre Dame was 7-11-3 on home ice. Through the first 40 games, the Irish have played 17 games at home (13-2-2) and 23 on the road (four neutral site games). The Irish are 12-4-1 in away games and 6-0-0 in neutral site games. The last time the Irish won more than 12 games on the road was in 1997-98 when they were 12-11-0 away from the Joyce Center.

BACK WITH A BRONZE: Notre Dame freshman defenseman Kyle Lawson (New Hudson, Mich.) returned to the Irish lineup at Lake Superior State after missing four games while playing for the U.S. Junior National Team at the 2006-07 World Junior Championships in Sweden. Lawson, an alternate captain for the U.S. team, and his teammates collected a bronze medal in the tournament. He has four goals and 14 assists for 18 points. His +21 is third on the team and the best among Irish defensemen. Lawson is the 10th Notre Dame player to be selected to

the U.S. Junior National Team and the first since **Rob Globke '04** and **Brett Lebda '04** played for the 2001-02 team. Besides Globke and Lebda, the seven other Irish players to play in the world juniors are: **Jack Brownschidle** ('76-'77 and '78-'79), **Ben Simon** ('96-'97 and '97-'98), **Joe Dusbabek** ('97-'98), **Dan Carlson** ('98-'99), **Connor Dunlop** ('99-'00 and '00-'01), **Brett Henning** ('99-'00), **David Inman** ('99-'00). Globke was a member of the 2000-01 and '01-'02 teams while Lebda was on the '01-'02 teams.

SPORTS ILLUSTRATED: The Notre Dame hockey program was featured – "Puck of the Irish," – in the Dec. 11 issue of *Sports Illustrated*. The story was written by Rick Lipsey and covers the fast start in the 2006-07 season by the Irish hockey program.

BLATCHFORD BITS: Freshman defenseman Brett Blatchford (Temperance, Mich.) set up a pair of goals in the weekend series at Bowling Green to raise his point totals to two goals and 12 assists for 14 points in 21 games this season. Versus Michigan, on Dec. 8, Blatchford had a career-high three assists, including an assist on Josh Sciba's second-period game-winning goal. He is fourth among Notre Dame defensemen in scoring and fourth among freshmen on the scoresheet.

TWO-GOAL GAMES OR MORE: Scoring is definitely contagious. Through 40 games this season, the Irish have seen players score two or more goals in a game 15 times. Last season, Notre Dame had a total of seven multiple-goal games, including two hat tricks.

IRISH ADD SEVEN: Notre Dame head coach **Jeff Jackson** has announced that seven players have signed national letters-of-intent to attend Notre Dame beginning in the fall of 2007. The group of seven is made up of one goaltender, two defensemen and four forwards. The goaltender is Brad Phillips (Farmington Hills, Mich.), who is currently a member of the USA Under-18 team as are the two defensemen, Ian Cole (Ann Arbor, Mich.) and Teddy Ruth (Naperville, Ill.). All four forwards are currently playing in the USHL. Robin Bergman (Stockholm, Sweden) is a member of the Cedar Rapids RoughRiders while Billy Maday (Burr Ridge, Ill.) plays for the Waterloo Black Hawks. Calle Ridderwall (Stockholm, Sweden) is with the Tri-City Storm and Ben Ryan (Brighton, Mich.) is in his second year with the Des Moines Buccaneers. Bergman and Ridderwall are the first two Swedish players to play at Notre Dame. Ridderwall and Maday were midget teammates last season with the Chicago Chill. All seven of Notre Dame's recruits for the 2007-08 season are ranked in the National Hockey League's Central Scouting Mid-term Rankings. Phillips is ranked fourth among 30 North American goaltenders and is the highest rated goaltender who will attend college. Leading the skaters is Ruth who is ranked 34th among 210 North American skaters. He is followed by Ryan (50th), Bergman (97th), Ridderwall (109th), Cole (113rd) and Maday (177th).

A POOLEY HOMECOMING: Notre Dame associate head coach Paul Pooley made his fourth homecoming of sorts when the Irish visited Lake Superior (Jan. 12-13). He spent three seasons with the Lakers as an associate head coach to Jeff Jackson from 1991-94. During his tenure, the Lakers advanced to the NCAA finals three times, winning the national title in 1992 and 1994. Earlier this season, Pooley returned home to Ft. Wayne, Ind. on Dec. 30 when played Northern Michigan at Ft. Wayne. As a player, Pooley spent the 1986-87 season with the Ft. Wayne Komets, serving as a co-captain of the Western Division championship team that was 48-28-6. He was fourth in scoring with 28 goals and 44 assists for 72 points. In the fall (No0v. 3-4), he had his number as a player at Ohio State retired in a ceremony held on Sat., Nov. 4 when Notre Dame played at Ohio State. The Irish also played in October at Providence College, where Pooley was the head coach for 11 seasons. A 1984 graduate of Ohio State, Pooley is still the Buckeyes' all-time leading scorer with 114 goals and 156 assists for 270 points. A member of the CCHA's all-Decade Team for the 1980s, Poolev was the CCHA player of the year in 1984 and a first team All-American as he led the nation in scoring with 32 goals and 64 assists for 96 points **IRISH VERSUS TOP 15-RANKED TEAMS:** Notre Dame's 2-1 CCHA Championship win over #9/#9 Michigan on March 17 gives Notre Dame a 10-1-1 record this season in games against Top 15 teams. The Irish are now 8-0-1 in their last eight games against ranked teams. Notre Dame is 4-1 on the road against ranked teams and 5-0- at home and 1-0 on neutral ice. Last season, the Irish were 0-8-2 in games versus ranked teams.

in 41 games. A three-time CCHA all-academic selection, Pooley was an Academic All-American in his senior year. He began his coaching career at Ohio State as an assistant before joining Jeff Jackson's staff at Lake Superior in 1992. Pooley became the head coach at Providence College in 1994 and was the there for 11 seasons where his teams compiled a 185-187-40 record, won one Hockey East title (1995-96) and advanced to the NCAA tournament twice (1996 and 2001). He was selected to the OSU Hall of Fame in 1994. He is the first Ohio State hockey player to have his number retired.

STREAKING IRISH: Notre Dame's 4-2 loss to Robert Morris on Jan. 7 snapped a seven-game winning streak, the longest for the Irish since Nov. 13 to Dec. 4, 1987. The Robert Morris loss also ended Notre Dame's eight-game home winning streak to start the season. That was the longest home win streak since Nov. 23, 1990 to Jan. 26, 1991 when that team was in the midst of a 12-game win streak.

IRISH IN NHL BUILDINGS: Notre Dame's win at Mellon Arena on Jan. 5 improved the Irish to 3-0-0 this season in games played in buildings that host teams from the National Hockey League. In October, the Irish won a pair of games at the St. Pete Times Forum in Tampa, Fla., the home of the Tampa Bay Lighting, winning the Lightning College Hockey Classic with a 3-0 win over Army and a 2-0 win over Air Force on Oct. 27-28. Should Notre Dame advance to the CCHA Championship weekend, the Irish would play in a fourth NHL building - Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, Mich.

JUST JOSHING: Josh Sciba returned to the Notre Dame lineup for the Alaska series after missing nine games with a broken wrist suffered on Jan. 26 versus Miami. Sciba had seven goals and 10 assists for 17 points before the injury. Nine of his points (4g, 5a) have come on the power play. For his career, Sciba now has 37 career goals with 19 of them coming with the man advantage.

SAWATSKE FOR TWO: Senior defenseman Tom Sawatske (Duluth, Minn.) recorded the first two-point game (1g, 1a) of his collegiate career in the 7-3 win over Michigan on Dec. 8. Prior to that game, Sawatske, who played the first two years of his career at Wisconsin, had one point in a game 19 times in 100 career games. He followed that goal with a goal on Dec. 30 in Notre Dame's 4-3 win over Northern Michigan and his third goal of the year on Jan. 20 at Western Michigan proved to be a game-winning goal.

YOST BUSTERS: Notre Dame's 7-3 win on Dec. 8 at Yost Arena snapped an eight-game Michigan winning streak versus the Irish that covered the 2004-05 and 2005-06 seasons. The win was just the first for the Irish at Yost since Nov. 23, 2002 and snapped a five-game Michigan home winning streak. Since a 9-5 Notre Dame win at Yost on Oct. 22, 1982, the Irish have won just three times at Yost (3-23-1).

LUCKY SEVEN: The seven goals scored by the Irish on Dec. 8 in the 7-3 win versus Michigan were the most scored by the Irish against the Wolverines since Oct. 22, 1982 in a 9-5 Notre Dame win at Yost Arena. In that 54-game span, the Irish scored six goals once and five three times, with Michigan winning 42 times, Notre Dame eight, with four ties.

POWER-PLAY PRODUCER: Wes O'Neill now has three goals and 18 assists for 21 points on the season. He has led Irish defensemen in scoring in each of the last three seasons. So far this season, 10 of his 18 assists have come on the power play. For his career, O'Neill has scored 12 goals and 34 assists on the power play. In 152 all-time games, the veteran defenseman has 16 goals and 62 assists for 78 career points.

FIRST TIMER: Freshman right wing Christiaan Minella (Aurora, Colo.) had to wait until the 10th game of the season to see his first collegiate hockey action but wasted little time making the most of it. Minella scored his first collegiate goal on his first shot at 9:04 of the first period to give the Irish a 2-0 lead. The last Notre Dame player to score on his first career shot was Tim Wallace '06 who did it on Oct. 11, 2002 at Minnesota-Duluth. The hard-hitting right wing added his first career assist in the 4-1 win over Michigan State and then had a pair of assists on Dec. 3 in the 6-2 win over Alaska.

TOURNEY HONORS: Three members of the Irish hockey team were selected to the Lightning College Hockey Classic all-tournament team: goaltender David Brown, defenseman Brock Sheahan (Jr., Lethbridge, Alb.) and center Christian Hanson. Hanson was named the tournament's most valuable player as he scored a goal in each game, including the game winner in the championship game versus Air Force.

BEATING THE BEST: Notre Dame has defeated the No. 1 ranked team nine times in the program's 39-year history. Each of the last three times have come at the expense of the Boston College Eagles ('03-'04, '04-'05 and '06-'07). Here's the list of Irish wins versus top-ranked teams in the 39-year history of the program.

BACK-TO-BACK: The Irish recorded back-to-back hat tricks in the games at Boston College and Providence. In the 7-1 win on Friday night, Mark Van Guilder picked up the second, three-goal game of his career. The following night, Dan Kissel scored three times in the 6-1 win over the Friars. That marked the first time since Feb. 7-8, 1992 that Irish players recorded hat tricks in back-to-back games. On Feb. 7, 1992, Lou Zadra had three versus Western Michigan in a 10-4 loss. The following night, Sterling Black scored three times in a 7-5 loss at Western Michigan.

CAPTAINS: Senior right wing T.J. Jindra (Faribault, Minn.) will serve as Notre Dame's captain for the second consecutive season. Jindra becomes the first Irish player to serve as captain twice since Evan Nielsen '03 held the responsibility from 2001-03. There have been 14 players to serve as two-time captains with the Irish. Joining Jindra as alternate captains in '06-'07, are senior center Jason Paige (Saginaw, Mich.) and senior defensemen Wes O'Neill (Essex, Ont.) and Tom Sawatske (Duluth, Minn.). Paige has served as an alternate captain since his sophomore year. O'Neill and Sawatske will be alternate captains for the first time at Notre Dame.

FAMILY MATTERS: Two members of the Notre Dame hockey team – forwards Erik Condra (Livonia, Mich.) and Garrett Regan (Hastings, Minn.) – have family ties to the Irish hockey program. Condra's uncle is All-American forward Kirt Bjork (*83) who played at Notre Dame from 1979-83. He scored 76 goals with 85 assists for 161 career points in 141 career games. He took All-America honors in 1983 when he had 29 goals and 34 assists for 63 points. Regan's uncle - Sean Regan - was a defenseman for the Irish from 1981-83 before finishing his career at the University of Minnesota.

CCHA SCHOLAR-ATHLETE: Senior Jason Paige (Saginaw, Mich.) was Notre Dame's representative on the CCHA Scholar-Athlete team for the 2005-06 season. Paige was one of 12 players (one from each school) selected to the team by the league's faculty representatives. Paige has a 3.71 grade-point average in finance. He follows former Irish captain, Cory McLean ('05), who was selected as the CCHA's first-ever Scholar-Athlete of the Year award winner following the 2004-05 season. McLean was a five-time Dean's List selection and graduated with a degree in Finance from the Mendoza College of Business with a 3.592 grade-point average. To be considered for the CCHA Scholar-Athlete Award, a player had to have a cumulative GPA of 3.25 through the fall term of the selection year to receive the school's Scholar-Athlete award. The award is selected by the 12 faculty representatives, voting based on a system awarding five points for a first-place vote, three points for a second-place vote and one point for a third-place vote. Previously, the CCHA honored an all-Academic team that saw the Irish have at least one honoree in all but one season (2002-03) since their return to the CCHA in '92-'93. The nine first-team selections were: Curtis Janicke and Carl Picconatto ('92-'93), Garry Gruber ('95-'96), Steve Noble ('96-'97, '97-'98), Forrest Karr and Aniket Dhadphale ('98-'99), Andy Jurkowski (99'-'00), Dan Carlson (2000-01), David Inman (2001-02) and Rob Globke (2003-04). During that 12year span, only Western Michigan (14) produced more CCHA All-Academic selections than Notre Dame's 11.

TURNAROUND YEAR: A year ago, the Notre Dame hockey team turned in a 13-19-4 record in Jeff Jackson's first season behind the bench. A closer look at the mark shows vast improvement for the Irish. Through the first 13 games of the season, Notre Dame was 3-9-1. Over the remaining 23 contests, the Irish were 10-10-3. In CCHA play, Notre Dame went from 3-20-5 in '04-'05 to 11-13-4 in '05-'06, a 15-point improvement from one season to the next. Only Miami's 16-point improvement in the standings was better than Notre Dame's 15-point turnaround.

IRON MAN: Graduated right wing **Tim Wallace** (Anchorage, Alaska) finished his Notre Dame career in 2005-06 as the Notre Dame's all-time 'Iron Man." Wallace played in every game of his career, 153 in all. He finished third on the all-time games played list for his four seasons with the Irish. Junior center **Mark Van Guilder**

(Roseville, Minn.) is next in line as he now has played in every game in his first two-plus seasons for a total of 114 consecutive games.

PUTTING ON THE FOIL: Notre Dame sophomore Christian Hanson (Venetia, Pa.) is the sixth Irish player whose father played in the National Hockey League. His father, Dave Hanson, played 10 years of professional hockey between 1974-75 and 1983-84, including stints with the Detroit Red Wings and the Minnesota North Stars and the World Hockey Association's (WHA) Minnesota Fighting Saints and the New England Whalers. Fans might also be familiar with Dave Hanson, as one of the famed Hanson Brothers, made famous in the hockey movie Slapshot. Hanson currently is the director of the Island Sports Center, home of Robert Morris University's hockey team, in suburban Pittsburgh.

NHL DRAFTEES: The Irish have four players on the 2006-07 roster who have been selected in the National Hockey League's Entry Draft. Last June, sophomore right wing Erik Condra (Livonia, Mich.) was selected in the seventh round, 211th overall by the Ottawa Senators. He is joined by freshman defenseman Kyle Lawson (New Hudson, Mich.) who was selected in the 2005 NHL Draft by the Carolina Hurricanes in the seventh round, 198th overall. Condra and Lawson are joined by senior defenseman Wes O'Neill (Essex, Ont.) who was chosen in the fourth round of the 2004 Entry Draft, 115th overall by the New York Islanders. Also selected in 2004 was senior goaltender David Brown (Stony Creek, Ont.) who went in the eighth round, 228th overall to the Pittsburgh Penguins.

PLAYING IN THE NHL: At times during the 2005-06 season, Notre Dame had five former players in the NHL at the same time. The five were: Ben Simon '00 (Columbus), Rob Globke '04 (Florida), Brett Lebda '04 (Detroit), Mark Eaton (Nashville) and Yan Stastny (Edmonton-Boston). Only one other time, have the Irish had five players in the NHL in one season. That came during the 1982-83 campaign when the Irish had five players see time, in the NHL. That group included: Jim Brown '82 (three games with Los Angeles), Jack Brownschidle '77 (72 games with St. Louis), Jeff Brownschidle '81 (four games with Hartford), Don Jackson '78 (71 games with Edmonton) and Dave Poulin '82 (two games with Philadelphia). As of March 18, Eaton (Pittsburgh), Lebda (Detroit) and Globke (Florida) are skating with their NHL teams. Stastny was traded to St. Louis and assigned to the Blues' AHL team in Peoria.

HOMETOWNS: The 2006-07 Notre Dame hockey team features players from eight states and two Canadian provinces - Alberta and Ontario. Over the past 12 seasons, the Irish have had monogram winners from 21 different states and provinces – those listed below, plus: Delaware, Massachusetts, Maryland, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Wisconsin, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. This season, the Irish have their first-ever player from the state of Washington – freshman Kevin Deeth (Gig Harbor).

RIVALRY CLUSTERS: The CCHA begins its fifth season with the 12 teams grouped in "rivalry pairings." In the pairings, Notre Dame is paired with Bowling Green. The league's other pairings include Michigan-Michigan State, Miami-Ohio State, Lake Superior State-Northern Michigan, Ferris State-Western Michigan and Alaska Fairbanks-Nebraska-Omaha. Each season the teams are divided into three, four-team clusters and play a 28-game conference schedule. Cluster teams will face each other four times during the season with two games against each of the remaining eight teams. In 2006-07, Notre Dame will play Bowling Green, Alaska and Nebraska-Omaha four times with two games at home and two away. The Irish will also play home-and-home series with Michigan and Michigan State. Notre Dame hosts two-game home series with Miami, Northern Michigan and Ferris State while playing two-game road series at Lake Superior, Ohio State and Western Michigan. Last year, the Irish were 4-5-3 against Bowling Green, Ohio State and Miami, the three teams in their cluster.

THE IRISH AND THE U.S. NATIONAL TEAM DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRAM:

Notre Dame's current roster includes six players who have past experience with USA Hockey, as members of the National Team Development Program (NTDP). Since the program began, the Irish have had a total of 16 NTDP alums grace their roster. The current contingent includes seniors Noah Babin (Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.), Michael Bartlett (Morton Grove, Ill.), Tom Sawatske (Duluth, Minn.) and Josh Sciba (Westland, Mich.). The lone sophomore is goaltender Jordan Pearce (Anchorage, Alaska) while defenseman Kyle Lawson (New Hudson,

Mich.) represents the freshman class. Other former NTDP players who played at Notre Dame and their years in the national program include: Brett Henning (1997-98), Michael Chin (1997-98), Connor Dunlop (1997-99), Paul Harris (1997-99), John Wroblewski (1997-99), Neil Komadoski (1998-2000), Brett Lebda (1998-2000), Rob Globke (1998-2000), Derek Smith (2000-01) and Tim Wallace (2002-06).
