#9/#9 Notre Dame Travels To Alaska For Series With #14/#13 Nanooks

- Irish to face nation's top defensive team as Nanooks have given up just seven goals in the first six games of the season.
- Notre Dame finishes month of October with a 4-3-1 overall record, 3-3-1 at home.
- Irish drop first shoot out in program's history with 2-1 loss in penalty shots to Ohio State on Oct. 31.

NORTH TO ALASKA: Notre Dame takes to the road for its first weekend road series of the season when the Irish travel to Fairbanks, Alaska for a pair of games on Nov. 6-7 versus the Alaska Nanooks. Game times at the Carlson Center are 7:05 p.m. (AT) (11:05 p.m. in South Bend) both nights. Live audio streaming can be found on the Notre Dame website at und.com. Live video is available at www.b2livetv.com under the CCHA schedule. There is a fee of \$7.50 per game. Notre Dame enters the weekend with a 4-3-1 overall record and is 1-0-1-0 in the CCHA, good for four points in the league standings. The Nanooks bring a 5-0-1 mark into the game and are 2-0-0-0 in the conference for six points. The Irish, ranked ninth in both the the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* poll and the USCHO.com poll, are coming off a 1-0-1 weekend versus Ohio State. Notre Dame won, 3-1, on Oct. 30 before tying the Buckeyes, 2-2, on Halloween. OSU won the shoot out in that game, 2-1. Notre Dame has played seven of its first eight games on the road this season with the lone road game coming on Oct. 20 at Boston University. Alaska, ranked 14th in the the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* poll and 13th in the USCHO.com poll, is coming off a weekend sweep of Ferris State at home, winning, 3-1, on Oct. 30 before taking a 3-2 overtime decision on Oct. 31. The Nanooks are 3-0-1 at home while their other two games were played in Anchorage, Alaska in the season-opening Kendall Hockey Classic. Alaska's first trip out of the state will come next weekend when the Nanooks travel to Bowling Green. Notre Dame will next be in action on Nov. 14-15 when the Irish host the Northern Michigan Wildcats.

TIME CHANGE: Notre Dame's game with Northern Michigan on Nov. 14 has had its starting time changed. Originally scheduled for 7:05 p.m., the game will now start at 5:05 p.m. to avoid a conflict with the Notre Dame-Pitt football game that will be televised at 8:00 p.m. on ABC. The starting time at Pittsburgh was announced by ABC on Monday, Nov. 2

IRISH AND THE NANOOKS: Notre Dame and Alaska have met 49 times in the all-time series with the Irish holding a 25-20-4 record in those games. At Fairbanks, Alaska leads the series, 12-9-3. A year ago, the teams met twice at Notre Dame where former Irish goaltender **Jordan Pearce '09** pitched a pair of shutouts, winning back-to-back nights, 2-0 and 3-0, on Jan. 9-10 at the Joyce Center. Since the start of the 2006-07 season, the Irish are 9-0-1 against Alaska. The last Notre Dame loss came in the 2006 CCHA playoffs when the Nanooks swept the Irish, two games to none. Since **Jeff Jackson** took over as coach at Notre Dame in 2005-06, the Irish are 10-3-1 versus the Nanooks.

NANOOK NOTES: Alaska has gotten off to a fast start in 2009-10, going 5-0-1 through its first six games. Defense and goaltending have been the name of the game in Fairbanks as the Nanooks have given up just seven goals in their first six games and have the stingiest defense in the country, giving up just 1.14 goals per game. Leading the way in the Alaska goal is sophomore Scott Greenham, who is 5-0-1 with a 1.14 goals against and a .949 save percentage. A two-time CCHA goaltender of the week, Greenham was named the league's player of the month for October. Leading the Nanook offense is senior center Dion Knelsen who has two goals and five assists for seven points. Sophomore defenseman Joe Sova (3g, 3a) and freshman right wing Andy Taranto (2g, 4a) are second in scoring with six points each. Alaska has scored 18 goals in the first six games for a 3.00 goals-per-game average. On the power play, the Nanooks are eight-for-35, for a 22.9% success rate. On the penalty-killing side, Alaska has surrendered just two power-play goals in 23 chances for a 91.3 penalty-killing mark.

OHIO STATE RECAP:**Friday, Oct. 30 -**

Freshman goaltender **Mike Johnson (Verona, Wis.)** stopped 27-of-28 Ohio State shots and got all the offense he needed with goals from **Calle Ridderwall (Jr., Stockholm, Sweden)**, **Dan Kissel (Sr., Crestwood, Ill.)** and **Billy Maday (So., Burr Ridge, Ill.)** in a 3-1 win over the Buckeyes on Oct. 30. Ridderwall and Kissel scored on the power play while Maday's goal was into an empty net with 18 seconds left. Ohio State's John Albert and Ridderwall traded first period power-play goals for a 1-1 score. The game would stay that way until 9:17 of the third period when Kissel scored off the rebound of a **Christiaan Minella (Sr. Aurora, Colo.)** deflection to make it 2-1. That goal came on a five-minute power play for the Irish. On the night, Notre Dame out shot Ohio State, 33-28. Dustin Carlson made 30 saves for the Buckeyes. The Irish were 2-for-9 on the power play while OSU converted on one of eight chances.

Saturday, Oct. 31 -

Notre Dame and Ohio State battled to a 2-2 after 65 minutes of action on Saturday night with the Buckeyes getting the extra point in a shoot out with a 2-1 win versus the Irish. Freshman **Riley Sheahan (St. Catharines, Ont.)** got Notre Dame on the scoreboard at 14:56 of the first period with a power-play goal, his second goal of the season. Ohio State evened the score at 19:23 of the first on a Hunter Bishop power-play marker

SHOOTING IT OUT: The 2008-09 season was the first year that the CCHA used the shoot out to determine the winner of games that remained tied after 60 minutes of regulation and a five-minute overtime period. During that season, the Irish were involved in three shoot outs, going 3-0 in all three games. In 2009-10, the Irish have been in one shoot out, dropping a 2-1 decision to Ohio State on Oct. 31. Here's a look at Notre Dame's career shoot out stats.

to make it 1-1 after one period. After a scoreless second period, Notre Dame retook the lead on **Kyle Lawson's (Sr., New Hudson, Mich.)** second goal of the year at 2:31 for the second Irish power-play goal of the game. The Buckeyes got the equalizer at 5:02 of the third when Zac Dalpe's wrist from the right wing circle got by **Brad Phillips (Jr., Farmington Hills, Mich.)** for a power-play goal. That would end the scoring as the two teams finished overtime with a 2-2 score. In the shoot out, OSU got goals from John Albert and Bishop while the Irish saw just **Billy Maday (So., Burr Ridge, Ill.)** score on a penalty shot. With the shoot out win, the Buckeyes pick up the extra point in the standings. For the game, Notre Dame out shot Ohio State, 32-28. Phillips finished with 30 saves while Cal Heeter had 26 saves in the Buckeyes' goal.

SHOOT OUT LOSS: Notre Dame's 2-1 loss to Ohio State in the shoot out on Oct. 31 marked the first time that Notre Dame lost a shoot out since the CCHA implemented the tie breaker for the start of the 2008-09 season. The Irish are 3-1 all-time in the shoot out.

WHERE'S THE GOALS? Through the first eight games of the season, Notre Dame has scored a total of 19 goals on the year. Of the 19 goals, only eight have come with the two teams skating at even strength. The Irish have 10 goals on the power play and one short-handed tally to go with the eight even strength goals.

SCORING STRUGGLES: Through the first eight games of the 2009-10 season, Notre Dame has scored just 19 goals for a 2.38 average. The Irish have not scored more than three goals in any of their first eight games this season.

BEST OF THE BEST: Over the past three-plus seasons, the Notre Dame hockey program is tops in the nation. Since the start of the 2006-07 campaign, the Irish have won 94 games and own a .726 winning percentage over that period. Notre Dame leads Michigan (92) in wins and winning percentage (.721). Here are the top five teams by wins and winning percentage since 2006-07.

HOT HAND: Junior center **Ben Ryan (Brighton, Mich.)** ran his point-scoring streak to five games with assists in each game of the series versus Ohio State. Ryan has two goals and five assists for seven points in the last five games. That ties his career high of five consecutive games that he set between March 1 and March 21 of 2008. Ryan leads Notre Dame in scoring with two goals and six assists for eight points in the first eight games of the season.

POWER-PLAY NOTES: Notre Dame scored a pair of power-play goals in each game of its weekend series with Ohio State and has three games this season with two power-play goals. During the 2008-09 campaign, the Irish had 13 games with two or more power-play goals. This season, the Irish have at least one power-play goal in seven of the first eight game and for the year are 10-for-50 with the man advantage (20.0%) opponent power plays for a 93.5% success rate.

THE NEW KID BETWEEN THE PIPES: Freshman goaltender **Mike Johnson** has made the most of his two starts this season in goal for the Irish. His first start came against Providence College on Oct. 16 where he stopped all 29 shots he faced in a 2-0 shutout win. He became the second Notre Dame goaltender to record a shutout in his first career start. On Friday night, Johnson gave up just one goal, a 5-on-3 power-play goal while stopping 27-of-28 shots in a 3-1 win over Ohio State. The rookie puckstopper is 2-0-0 on the year with a 0.50 goals-against average and a .982 save percentage with one shutout.

GOAL-SCORING MACHINE: Junior left wing **Calle Ridderwall** leads Notre Dame with four goals this season with three of them coming on the power play. His four-game, goal-scoring streak that started on Oct. 16 versus Providence came to an end on Oct. 31 against Ohio State. During his streak, Ridderwall had four goals with one assist for five points. Over the last two seasons, the Stockholm native has scored 21 goals for Notre Dame with 14 of them coming via the power play.

JUST LIKE LAST SEASON: Notre Dame goes into the series with Alaska with a 4-3-1 record. A year ago after eight games, the Irish were 5-3-0.

HOME ICE STRUGGLES: Last season, the Irish were 13-3-2 at the Joyce Center and over the last three seasons were 37-9-7 on home ice. This season, the Irish are just 3-3-1 in their own barn. Last year, the Irish were 11-2 in one-goal games while this season, they have already dropped three games by one goal.

CCHA GOALTENDER OF THE WEEK: Junior goaltender **Brad Phillips (Farmington Hills, Mich.)** was selected as the CCHA's goaltender of the week for games played during the week of October 19. The 6-2, 181-pound puckstopper was 1-1 on the week with a 1.51 goals-against average and a .940 save percentage as he stopped 47-of-50 shots in the two games. On Oct. 20, Phillips made a career high 34 saves in a 3-0 shutout of third-ranked Boston University. On Oct. 23, he stopped 13-of-16 shots in the 3-2 loss to Boston College. On the season, Phillips is 1-3-0 with a 2.27 goals-against average and a .918 save percentage with one shutout.

OUT OF ACTION: Junior defenseman **Teddy Ruth (Naperville, Ill.)** has missed the first eight games of the season due to a lower body injury. He will not play in either game of the weekend series at Alaska.

HOME AWAY FROM HOME: Notre Dame will take its home show on the road on Sunday, Nov. 22 when the Irish play host to the Michigan State Spartans at the Allen County War Memorial Coliseum in Ft. Wayne, Ind. That game will have a 4:05 p.m. starting time. Tickets for that game are \$14.00, \$12.00 and \$7.00 and are available at the Memorial Coliseum Ticket Office, all Ticketmaster outlets, online at www.ticketmaster.com or at (800) 745-3000. BACK ON TRACK: After being stopped on the power play by Boston College on Oct. 23 (0-for-8), Notre Dame was able to get back on track on the power play against Ohio State. The Irish were 2-for-9 in the 3-1 win on Oct. 30 and followed that with a 2-for-3 effort in the 2-2 tie on Oct. 31, for a 4-for-12 weekend (33.3%). For the year, the Irish are 10-for-50 (20.0%) with the man-advantage. Notre Dame has now scored two power-play goals in a game three times this season.

DEETH TOPS 100: Senior center **Kevin Deeth (Gig Harbor, Wash.)** became the 44th player in the 42-year history of the Notre Dame hockey program to reach 100 points for his career on Oct. 23. His assist on Calle Ridderwall's first-period goal gave Deeth 32 goals and 68 assists for his 100th career point. He reached that mark in 133 games. In the Oct. 30 game with Ohio State, Deeth added his team-best sixth assist of the season. His 101 career points moves him into a tie for 42nd on the all-time points list. Right behind him is senior teammate **Ryan Thang (Sr., Edina, Minn.)** who has now played in 128 career games, scoring 49 goals with 46 assists for 95 points. He needs just one goal to reach the 50 mark and a goal and four assists to join the 50/50 club for players with 50 goals and 50 assists in a career.

STEALING THE SHOW: Junior goaltender **Brad Phillips** made a career-high 34 saves as he handed the Boston University Terriers a 3-0 loss at Agganis Arena. Phillips got all the offensive support he needed in the second period when **Billy Maday (So., Burr Ridge, Ill.)** and **Ben Ryan** scored 12 seconds apart to give the Irish a 2-0 lead. **Calle Ridderwall** added a power-play goal in the third period for the 3-0 final score. Maday, Ryan and Ridderwall each had a goal and an assist in the game. Phillips made 27 of his 34 saves in the first and third periods, including 17 in the final stanza. Notre Dame was 8-for-8 killing penalties on the night and 1-for-6 on the power play. BU out shot the Irish, 34-16, in the game. The win was the first-ever for the Friars against Boston University.

TWO WEEKS IN HOCKEY EAST: The Irish closed out their run of four consecutive games with teams from Hockey East with a 2-2-0 record. The Irish split two games with Providence on Oct. 15-16, losing 3-2 in the first game before taking a 2-0 decision in the second contest. Notre Dame then won 3-0 at Boston University before falling 3-2 at home on Oct. 23. All-time, the Irish are 27-33-4 versus teams from Hockey East. Notre Dame now has just two non-league games remaining on the schedule with both games coming in the Shillelagh Tournament versus Colgate and either Niagara or North Dakota.

All four NCAA hockey regionals will sell tickets in three-game packages only. If Notre Dame is selected to participate in the 2010 NCAA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship, they will be assigned to play in the Midwest Regional at Ft. Wayne, Ind.

Game times on March 27 are set for 4:00 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. with the regional championship on March 28 set for 8:00 p.m.

CCHA DIFFERENCES: With the start of Notre Dame's CCHA schedule this weekend, there are a couple differences to remember with the final results of a game. First is the shootout - should a game remain tied after 60 minutes of regulation and a five-minute overtime, a winner will be decided via a shootout. Each team will select three shooters who will go one-on-one versus the opponent's goaltender with the winner being the team that scores the most. If the game remains tied after the first three shooters, single shooters will continue until a winner is found. The team winning the shootout will receive two points in the standings while the loser just one. On the national level, the game is still considered a tie. Secondly, the standings in the conference will be different. A regulation or overtime win will see the winning team awarded three points with the loser none. If the game goes to a shootout, both teams will get one point with the shootout winner getting the extra point in the standings.

STREAK BUSTERS: Notre Dame's 3-0 shutout win over Boston University, snapped a streak of 99-consecutive games that the Terriers had not been shutout. The last time BU was shutout came on Dec. 2, 2006 when the Terriers shutout Boston College, 1-0. The win also marked the first time since Jan. 15, 2008 that Boston University lost a non-conference game, a streak of 10 consecutive wins.

A STUNNING START: Prior to **Brad Phillips'** 3-0 shutout at Boston University, freshman goaltender **Mike Johnson (Verona, Wis.)** showed the way with a 2-0 shutout of Providence College in his rookie debut on Oct. 16. Johnson stopped all 29 shots he faced in blanking the Friars, 2-0, becoming the second Irish goaltender to record a shutout in his first career contest. He joins teammate **Tom O'Brien (Sr., Mokena, Ill.)** who picked up a shutout in his first start last season, a 7-0 blanking of Sacred Heart on Oct. 18, 2008.

SWEEPLESS IN SOUTH BEND: Twice this season, Notre Dame found itself in a position that hasn't happened very often over the last four seasons - looking at a possible opponent sweep. Since Jeff Jackson took over behind the Irish bench for the 2005-06 season, the Irish have lost back-to-back games on a weekend just eight times. Five of those series losses came during the 2005-06 season with two coming in 2007-08 and one last year (2008-09). The last time the Irish dropped a weekend series came on Oct. 24-25, 2008 when they lost twice to Miami at the Joyce Center.

ROAD WARRIORS: During the 2008-09 season, Notre Dame turned in a 14-2-1 record on the road, the best in the program's history. That included a nine-game road win streak and a 10-game unbeaten mark (9-0-1). The Irish got this season off to a good road start with the 3-0 win at Boston University on Oct. 20.

BACK BETWEEN THE PIPES: Junior goaltender **Brad Phillips** has had a successful return to the Notre Dame lineup this season. The 6-2, 181-pound goaltender missed all of last season due to a knee injury suffered in the preseason that required surgery. Phillips, who made five starts in his freshman year (2007-08) and was 4-1-0 with a 1.53 goals-against average and a .923 save percentage to go with one shutout, has started four games this season and is 1-3-0 with a 2.27 goals-against average and a .918 save percentage with one shutout.

IRISH VERSUS TOP-RANKED TEAMS: Notre Dame enters the week of Nov. 2 with a 1-1 record versus teams ranked nationally. Last week, the Irish defeated #3/#3 Boston University, 3-0, on Oct. 20 before dropping a 3-2 decision on Oct. 23 to #15/#14 Boston College. Notre Dame was 5-5 during the 2008-09 season against nationally ranked teams.

LIGHTING THE LAMP: When senior defenseman **Brett Blatchford (Temperance, Mich.)** scored his power-play goal in the first period of the Oct. 10 game with Alabama-Huntsville, it was his first time lighting the lamp since his freshman year. Blatchford's last goal came on Jan. 20, 2007 when he scored versus Western Michigan. Before that goal, Blatchford went 99 games without scoring. The Temperance, Mich., native would rather set them up than score them as he now has three career goals to go with 54 assists for 57 points. He was second on the team in assists in 2008-09 when he had 25 helpers on the year.

FRESHMEN FIRSTS: Notre Dame freshmen forwards **Riley Sheahan (St. Catharines, Ont.)** and **Kyle Palmieri (Montvale, N.J.)** wasted little time getting on the scoresheet in the 3-2 loss to Alabama-Huntsville on Oct. 9. Sheahan scored on his first career shot, scoring on the power play at 3:02 of the first period to give Notre Dame a 1-0 lead. He joins **Billy Maday (So., Burr Ridge, Ill.)** in **Wallace '06** as recent Notre Dame players to score on the first shots of their college careers. Palmieri joined in with a second-period power-play goal to get his first career score in his first game. He added a second goal on Saturday in the 3-1 victory. Palmieri led the team with 12 shots on goal for the weekend while Sheahan had 10 in the series.

LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS AWARD: Notre Dame senior captain **Ryan Thang** has been named one of 20 nominees for the 2009-10 Lowes Senior CLASS Award. The award is given annually to an NCAA Division I student-athlete in nine sports based on achievement's in the "Four C's" of classroom, character, community and competition. CLASS is an acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School.

Last season, two members of the Irish hockey team - **Erik Condra '09** and **Jordan Pearce '09** - were selected as one of 10 finalists for the honor. For the 2007-08 campaign, captain **Mark Van Guilder '08** made it to the list of 10 finalists. For the 2006-07 season, goaltender **David Brown '07** was selected as the first winner of the hockey award. The list of 20 candidates will be narrowed down midway through the season with the final 10 going on a ballot to select the national winner.

TOUGH TICKET: With seven home games in the month of October, Notre Dame recorded sell out crowds in five of those seven games and is averaging 2,726 per game (a sell out is 2,713). On Oct. 15, the Irish saw their streak of consecutive sellouts (12) snapped against Providence. A new streak started the following night as a standing-room only crowd of 2,857 saw the Irish defeat the Friars, 2-0. They followed that with a crowd of 2,997 on Friday, Oct. 23 versus Boston College. Notre Dame has now sold out 14 of its last 16 home games, dating back to Dec. 13, 2008 versus Bowling Green. The opening night crowd of 2,994 against Alabama-Huntsville is the largest crowd to see a home opener since 1995 as the building's seating capacity was reconfigured following that year with 2,713 being a sellout since then.

CAPTAINS: Senior left wing **Ryan Thang** will serve as Notre Dame's captain for the 2009-10 season. Joining Thang as alternate captains in '09-'10, are senior defenseman **Kyle Lawson (New Hudson, Mich.)**, senior center **Kevin Deeth (Gig Harbor, Wash.)** and junior defenseman **Teddy Ruth (Naperville, Ill.)**. Thang and Lawson served as alternate captains in 2008-09, while this is the first season as captain for Deeth and Ruth.

STINGY IRISH: Over the last three seasons, the Irish have been ranked first in the nation twice with lowest goals-against average. For the 2006-07 season, Notre Dame was best in the nation with a 1.67 goals against. The Irish followed that in 2007-08 with a 2.13 goals-against average to rank fifth in the country and last year the goals-against average was best with a 1.73 average. Through the first eight games of the 2009-10 season, the Irish are sixth in the nation, giving up just 1.62 goals per game

NUMERO UNO: Notre Dame reached the top of the college hockey rankings twice during the 2008-09 season, marking the third and fourth time in the program's 42-year history that the Irish sat atop the national polls. From Dec. 1 to Jan. 26 (seven weeks), Notre Dame was ranked first in both the *USA Today/American Hockey Magazine* and USCHO.com/CSTV polls. The Irish then reached the top spot one time in each poll the rest of the season - the week of Feb. 23 in the *USA Today* poll and the week of March 16 in the USCHO.com rankings. Previously, Notre Dame reached number one in the nation status during the 2006-07 season. The Irish moved into the top spot in both polls on Feb. 5, 2007 and remained there for seven consecutive weeks through March 25. The Irish finished the year ranked fourth in the USA Today poll that covers the entire season and finished number one in the USCHO.com poll that ended with the finish of the regular season. During the '07-'08 season, the Irish were ranked every week of the season for the first time in the program's 41-year history. Going back to the 2006-07 season, Notre Dame has been ranked in both polls for 62 consecutive weeks, the longest stretch for the Irish icers.

FAMILY GUYS: Three members of the Notre Dame hockey team – junior goaltender **Brad Phillips (Farmington Hills, Mich.)** and freshmen forwards **Kevin Nugent (New Canaan, Conn.)** and **Riley Sheahan (St. Catharines, Ont.)** – have family ties to the Irish athletics program. Phillips' uncle is former Irish quarterback **Terry Andrysiak '89**, who played at Notre Dame from 1985 to 1988. Nugent's father, **Kevin Nugent, Sr. '78**, played hockey for the Irish between 1974-78, scoring 54 goals with 75 assists for 129 career points. Kevin, Jr., becomes the second Notre Dame hockey player to follow his father to South Bend. He follows goaltender **Rory Walsh '06** who followed his father, **Brian Walsh '77** who was a teammate of the elder Nugent, playing for coach Lefty Smith. Sheahan is a second cousin of former Irish defenseman **Brock Sheahan '08** who played for the Irish from 2004-08.

ALL-AMERICANS: Two Notre Dame players were selected AHCA/Reebok All-Americans following the 2008-09 season. Current junior defenseman **Ian Cole (Ann Arbor, Mich.)** was selected as a first team All-American while right wing **Erik Condra '09** was selected second team. That marked the third time in the program's history that the Irish had two players selected All-American in the same year. The previous times came in 1972-73 when **Eddie Bumbacco '74** and **Bill Nyrop '74** were chosen and again in 1976-77 when **Jack Brownschidle '77** and **Brian Walsh '77** were honored.

CLUTCH SCORER: During his first three seasons at Notre Dame, senior left wing **Ryan Thang** has proven to be a clutch player. In those three seasons, Thang has amassed 13 game-winning goals, getting six in 2006-07, five in 2007-08 and two last season. He is currently tied for the top spot with 13 game-winning goals. That ties him with **Rob Globke '04**, **Brian Urlick '99** and **Dave Poulin '82**, with all three having 13 game winners.

DROP THE PUCK: For the fifth year in a row, Notre Dame hockey opened its season with the annual "Drop The Puck Reception" at the Joyce Center for season ticket holders and fans. This year's event was held on Oct. 6 and featured Garth Snow, the general manager of the New York Islanders. A goaltender with the Islanders from 2001-06, Snow was on Long Island when Jeff Jackson was an assistant coach there. Snow joins Brian Burke, who was the executive vice-president and general manager of the Anaheim Ducks at the time and the G.M. of the 2010 U.S. Olympic hockey team in 2008, Detroit Red Wings' player and current team vice-president Steve Yzerman (2007), Chicago Black Hawk and Versus/NBC TV analyst Ed Olczyk (2006) and Hall of Fame coach Scotty Bowman, who handled the honors at the first Drop The Puck reception on Sept. 6, 2005 with over 400 fans in attendance. Bowman, who won nine Stanley Cups in his illustrious coaching career, also was invited by Notre Dame head football coach Charlie Weis to address his team at practice that day, just four days prior to the upset win at Michigan.

SHILLELAGH TOURNAMENT: Notre Dame will host the second ever Shillelagh Tournament on Jan. 2-3, 2010 at the Sears Centre in Hoffman Estates, Ill. The tournament will feature North Dakota, Niagara and Colgate. On Saturday, Jan. 2, North Dakota and Niagara will meet in the 3:05 p.m. (CT) game with the Irish facing Colgate at 6:05 p.m. (CT). On Sunday, Jan. 3, Colgate will face either North Dakota or Niagara at 2:05 p.m. (CT) with Notre Dame playing either the Fighting Sioux or the Purple Eagles at 5:05 p.m. (CT). The Irish won the first tournament last season with 3-1 wins over Union College and Minnesota-Duluth in the championship game.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICAN HONORS: For the first time in the program's history, two members of the Notre Dame hockey team were selected as ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans on the at-Large team following the 2008-09 season. Senior goaltender **Jordan Pearce (Anchorage, Alaska)** was selected first team after recording a 3.816 grade-point average in his double major of anthropology/pre-med. For Pearce, it marked the second consecutive year that he was named Academic All-American after taking second team honors in '07-'08. He was joined by fellow

senior **Erik Condra (Livonia, Mich.)** who was a second team selection after turning in a 3.55 grade point with a double major in psychology and pre-med. Pearce became the second Irish player to be named twice as he joined Steve Noble '98 who was selected in 1997 (first team) and 1998 (second team). The Irish have had six players all-time named Academic All-American as Condra and Pearce are joined by Dan Carlson '01 (third team), Andy Jurkowski '00 (third team), Forrest Karr '99 (second team) and Noble in '97 and '98.

LORD STANLEY, LORD STANLEY: For the second consecutive season, a former Notre Dame defenseman played for a Stanley Cup winning team. This time it was Pittsburgh defenseman **Mark Eaton** who became the fourth Notre Dame player to hoist the Stanley Cup. Eaton, who played just one season for the Irish in 1997-98, joins **Brett Lebda '04** who won the Stanley Cup versus Eaton's Penguins in 2008. They follow two other Notre Dame defenseman who have their names etched on the Cup three times - **Bill Nyrop '74** and **Don Jackson '78**. Nyrop played on three Stanley Cup winners with the Montreal Canadiens (1975-78) and Jackson was a member of three Cup-winning teams with the Edmonton Oilers (1982-85). The Pittsburgh defenseman was honored by Notre Dame at halftime of the season-opening game versus Nevada on Sept. 5.

NATIONAL JUNIOR TEAM: Notre Dame defensemen **Ian Cole** and **Teddy Ruth** were selected to play for Team USA in the 2009 World Junior Championships in Ottawa, Ont. The Irish now have 12 players to play on the Junior National Team with Cole making his second appearance. The defensive duo were part of a team that finished fifth. Cole had two goals and two assists for four points in six games while Ruth was scoreless in six contests. This past summer,

defenseman **Sean Lorenz (Littleton, Colo.)** and forward **Kyle Palmieri** were invited to the 2010 Junior National Evaluation Camp to try out for this winter's squad. Cole and Ruth join Jack Brownschidle ('76-'77, '78-'79), Ben Simon ('96-'97, '97-'98), Joe Dusbabek ('97-'98), Dan Carlson ('98-'99), Connor Dunlop ('99-'00, '00-'01), Brett Henning ('99-'00), David Inman ('99-'00), Rob Globke ('00-'01, '01-'02), Brett Lebda ('01-'02) and Kyle Lawson ('06-'07) as former Irish players to play in the World Junior Championships.

NHL DRAFTEES: The Irish have nine players on the 2009-10 roster who have been selected in the National Hockey League's Entry Draft. Two incoming freshmen added to the list this season. Left wing **Nick Larson (Apple Valley, Minn.)** was a 2008 selection of the Calgary Flames in the fourth round, 108th overall. Right wing **Kyle Palmieri** was a first round pick, 26th overall in the 2009 Draft last June. He became the second Notre Dame player ever selected in the first round. They join defenseman **Sean Lorenz** who also was selected in the 2008 draft by the Minnesota Wild in the fourth round, 115th overall. Defenseman **Ian Cole** was a first-round selection of the St. Louis Blues, who took him with the 18th pick overall. Cole became the first Irish player ever selected in the first round and was selected earlier than any other Notre Dame player (**Rob Globke '04** was the previous highest selection when he was picked 40th overall by Florida in 2002). Cole was followed by fellow defenseman **Teddy Ruth** who went in the second round, 46th overall to the Washington Capitals. **Ryan Thang** was selected in the third round, 81st overall by the Nashville Predators. Sophomore center **Ben Ryan (Brighton, Mich.)** joined Thang when the Predators made him the 114th pick (fourth round). Goaltender **Brad Phillips** rounded out the Notre Dame selections in the 2007 draft when the Philadelphia Flyers selected him in the seventh round, 182nd overall. Defenseman **Kyle Lawson** rounds out the group of nine players as he was selected in the 2005 NHL Draft by the Carolina Hurricanes in the seventh round, 198th overall.

HOMETOWNS: The 2009-10 Notre Dame hockey team features players from 10 states, one Canadian province and Sweden. Over the past 15 seasons, the Irish have had monogram winners from 21 different states and provinces – those listed below, plus: Delaware, Massachusetts, Maryland, New York, North Dakota, Alberta, Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. Junior Calle Ridderwall (Stockholm) is the first Notre Dame hockey player from Sweden.

NEW HOME FOR THE IRISH: The University of Notre Dame announced on Feb. 12, 2009 that construction on a new, freestanding, on-campus ice arena designed to meet both the needs of the nationally ranked Irish hockey team and the local community would begin next year.

The announcement was made by Notre Dame executive vice-president **John Affleck-Graves** and athletics director **Jack Swarbrick**. The construction is expected to begin in the spring of 2010 on a projected 5,000-seat arena - with the venue ready for play to start the 2011-12 season.

The University's Board of Trustees approved the project at its meetings on campus during the first week of February.

"We're thrilled about the plans for a new ice arena on our campus, particularly based on the superb job **Jeff Jackson** and our hockey team have done to position our program as one of the best in the nation," said Swarbrick.

"In addition to providing a first-rate home for our hockey team, this new facility will be made available whenever possible to our community as a whole, and, in particular, to the many area youth hockey and figure skating programs that are in need of an additional venue," Affleck-Graves said.

"This is the most important and missing piece of the puzzle to this hockey program. The new building will create an environment that our fans, the students, the players, and our hockey alumni can be proud of," said Irish coach Jeff Jackson.

The new ice arena will be located south of the Joyce Center, just north of Edison Road, and just west of where the new Irish track and field facility is being constructed. In addition to the track and field project, the University currently is in the process of building new stadia for both soccer and lacrosse (both scheduled for completion this year) - in addition to the ongoing Joyce Center arena addition and renovation that began in September 2008.

The majority of the general public arena seating will be of the chair-back variety. The facility will include two sheets of ice (one of them Olympic-sized), with limited seating availability for the second sheet.

The plan also will include offices and locker room and weight and cardio training facilities for the Notre Dame hockey program. Locker rooms also will be available for campus and community use of the facility.

The new ice arena will replace the Joyce Center fieldhouse as Notre Dame's home for ice hockey. The Joyce Center was dedicated in December 1968 as the Athletic and Convocation Center. It was renamed in 1987 in honor of **Rev. Edmund P. Joyce, C.S.C.**, Notre Dame's executive vice president and chair of the Faculty Board on Athletics from 1952 to 1987.

LEFTY'S RINK: When Notre Dame's new ice hockey arena is built the new ice hockey rink will be named the Charles W. "Lefty" Smith, Jr., Rink, in honor of the first coach in the program's history, **Charles "Lefty" Smith**. The announcement was made in April of 2008 at the team's annual awards banquet.

The plans for naming the new ice surface in honor of Smith were made possible by the generosity of the John and Mary Jo Boler family of Inverness, Ill., and Sanibel Island, Fla., their daughter Jill Boler McCormack '84 and her husband, Dan; and their son Matthew Boler '88 and his wife, Christine. They were joined by the family of Frank '57 and Mary Beth O'Brien of Albany, N.Y., who have six children who all graduated from Notre Dame. Their late son, Frankie, played both lacrosse and hockey for the Irish from 1984-88.

Smith came to Notre Dame in 1968 to start the varsity hockey program and coached the Irish for 19 years, retiring in 1987 with 307 career victories. Under his tutelage, Notre Dame produced six All-Americans but most importantly, all 126 student-athletes who played for him completed their collegiate eligibility and earned college degrees.

Smith, who continues to work as the director of the Loftus Sports Center on campus, served two years as the president of the American Hockey Coaches Association. He was inducted into the Minnesota Hockey Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 1992. He played an integral in bringing the International Special Olympics to Notre Dame in 1987.

Married for 57 years, Lefty and his wife, Mickey, are parents of seven living children, with 16 grandchildren and two great grandchildren.
