With solid finishes at the Pre-National meet behind them, Irish focus on conference championship: This is the time of the year that the Notre Dame men's and women's cross country teams have been working toward throughout the 2001 season. The championship season has arrived, with the 2001 BIG EAST Championships this weekend at Van Cortlandt Park in Bronx, NY.

The BIG EAST meet will be one of the top conference events in the nation this year, featuring numerous ranked teams in both the men's and women's field. On the men's side, Notre Dame (#5), Providence (#8) and Villanova (#14) are currently in the MONDO men's cross country rankings. Georgetown also has appeared in the rankings this year. The women's race will feature #3 Georgetown, #5 Boston College, #8 Providence, #16 Villanova and the Irish (who have been ranked as high as 24th this season).

After the BIG EAST race this weekend, the Irish will get one week to rest up for the Great Lakes Regional Championship in Terre Haute, Ind., on Nov. 10. Both teams are in position to earn a bid for the NCAA Championship meet (Nov. 19, Greenville, SC), but solid efforts at the BIG EAST and Great Lakes Regional meet will be crucial to earn a spot in the NCAA field.

Notre Dame BIG EAST cross country history: In one of the top cross country conferences in the nation, the Notre Dame cross country program has been able to leave its distinctive mark in just six years of competition. The men's team has finished no lower than fourth in six races and have claimed two team titles ('99 and '97). The women's team peaked at fourth in 1997 and own four top-five finishes in the championship meet.

The men's team boasts 13 top-10 finishes in the cross country championship, including Ryan Shay's individual title in 1999. Current Irish senior Luke Watson has finished in the top-10 all three previous years of competition in the event (third, 1999, seventh in 1998 and 2000).

The last time the BIG EAST Championship was run at Van Cortlandt Park, the men earned the team title with 43 points (Georgetown finished second with 57 points). Shay ran the third-fastest time recorded at the Van Cortlandt course (24:22) in the race, while Watson's seventh-place effort (24:36) is ranked as the ninth-best time in Van Cortlandt history. The BIG EAST cross country meet has been run at Van Cortlandt eight times since 1988.

The men's team finished fourth last season, led by Watson in seventh place. Marc Striowski took eighth place, followed by Pat Conway (21st), Todd Mobley (26th), Sean Zanderson (38th), David Mertens (48th) and Tom Lennon (49th). Striowski, Conway, Mobley, Watson and Zanderson all will return to run for the Irish in 2001.

The women's team took sixth place in 2000, led by Chrissy Kuenster (18th). Jennifer Handley (31st), Rachel Endress (32nd), Megan Johnson (39th), Jennifer Fibuch (40th), Kari Eaton (41st) and Hilary Burn (44th) rounded out the Irish field. Endress, Fibuch, Handley and Johnson will be in the race for Notre Dame on Friday.

Analyzing the Irish rosters in 2001: The Notre Dame men's cross country team is enjoying one of its most successful seasons in school history. The #5 spot the Irish have earned in the MONDO poll is the highest the team has ever been ranked during the regular season. Returning all five top runners from the 2000 team that ended up ninth at the NCAA Championship, Notre Dame has won four meet titles this season and finished fourth in the combined results of the Pre-National meet in Greenville, SC, two weeks ago (Oct. 13).

The fourth-place finish is impressive, but upon further review the men's team ended the race without two of its top runners. All-Americans Ryan Shay and Pat Conway were forced to drop out of the race due to illness and Notre Dame's five, six,

seven and eight runners were suddenly forced to race to the front of the field. Marc Striowski and Todd Mobley were in their accustomed positions at 12th and 14th, but Sean Zanderson stepped up to take 51st while Mario Bird came through with a 91st-place effort as Notre Dame finished second in the gold division race.

It was a great showing for the men's team, which eventually was computed to finish fourth in the combined field of the top two races at the Pre-National meet. Irish fans, coaches and runners alike cannot help but think, though, of what is in store for the NCAA Championship race with the addition of two All-Americans in the final team results. Shay has finished first and second in the two races he completed this season (National Catholic and Notre Dame Invitational) while Conway took eighth at the National Catholic and a tough 70th-place effort at the Notre Dame Invitational while suffering from the same symptoms that made him drop out of the Pre-National race.

Both Shay and Conway have recovered enough to be put on the travel roster for the BIG EAST Championship this weekend.

The women's team received a boost last month with the addition of freshman Lauren King to the roster. King, who finished 26th at the World Junior Cross Country Championships, did not run with the team until the Notre Dame Invitational. She made quite an impression in her rookie race, though, taking first and leading the Irish to the team title.

In just her second collegiate race, King finished 15th at the Pre-National meet on Oct. 13. Combined with the steady performance of junior Jen Handley and sophomore Megan Johnson, Notre Dame's top three runners can compete with anyone in the field at the BIG EAST Championship this Friday.

Handley was among the top 20 runners in her race at the Pre-National meet before developing a cramp that forced her to drop back in the field. Jennifer Fibuch was cruising along until she suffered a wasp sting halfway through the course that affected her performance.

King is not the only freshman to have an impact on the roster this season. Christi Arnerich has three top-20 finishes on her resume (fourth at Valparaiso

Invitational, 19th at National Catholic Invitational and 20th at Notre Dame Invitational).

In the combined results of the two women's races at the Pre-National meet, Notre Dame was placed 21st, although the Irish finished 11th in their race.
