Streaking St. John's Back On The Road To Take On No. 14/15 Notre Dame

- Off to the best BIG EAST start in 11 seasons and winners of five-straight contests, **Steve Lavin** and the upperclass St. John's men's basketball team (10-3, 3-0 BIG EAST) head back out on the road to take on No. 14/15 Notre Dame (13-2, 2-1 BIG EAST). The Red Storm and Fighting Irish meet on Saturday at 8 p.m. E.T. in what will be St. John's second-straight nationally televised contest (ESPNU), with announcers Beth Mowins and Mike Kelley calling the action, and a possible special appearance by Digger Phelps. The matchup can be viewed on ESPN3.com, and heard live on the official flagship of St. John's Basketball, Bloomberg Radio 1130-AM, and on RedStormSports.com (subscription), with John Minko and analyst Tarik Turner.
- Pretty wins on some nights and gritty wins others have added up to a five-game win streak for St. John's, which includes two-straight road victories, a 3-0 BIG EAST mark and a share of first place in the league standings after three contests for the first time since the 1999-2000 season. That year, STJ won its first four games in league play (two home, two road). The only occasion where St. John's opened better than 4-0 in league play was during the storied 1984-85 season, when the Redmen rattled off 14-straight league-opening victories.
- Currently listed at No. 14/15 in the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today Coaches polls, Notre Dame is the second ranked opponent of the 2010-11 season for the Red Storm — and the second of eight-straight opponents currently ranked in ESPN's Top 25. Before toppling No. 13/13 Georgetown, 61-58, on Monday, St. John's senior class had defeated only one Top 25 team over the past three years — No. 7/10 Notre Dame on Jan. 3, 2009 — with that victory coming at Madison Square Garden. Lavin now owns 29 career wins against ranked opponents.
- The Red Storm is 5-2 away from home in the young 2010-11 season, though the clash with Notre Dame marks St. John's fifth true road game of the year (2-2). Road warriors early this season, trips to Moraga, Calif., and Anchorage, Alaska, for the 2010 Great Alaska Shootout title saw St. John's cover 12,860 miles via air prior to Dec. 1. An early reward for the Red Storm's road mettle: St. John's was listed at No. 7 in the NCAA's first RPI report, released Jan. 4.
- Saturday's game marks the 36th meeting all-time between St. John's and Notre Dame. The series started in 1959, with the Red Storm trailing, 16-19 and 8-10 in BIG EAST play. St. John's is 7-11 on Notre Dame's home court, though St. John's took a 69-68 win at Purcell Pavilion in the last meeting on Feb. 14, 2010. **Dwight Hardy** scored a team-high 16 points, going 5-of-7 from 3-point range. **Anthony Mason Jr.**, **D.J. Kennedy** and **Justin Burrell** each scored 12 points, while the Irish's **Tim Abromaitis** led all scorers with 24 points. St. John's has actually captured three out of the last five games in the series, and the Red Storm's 10-man senior class is 2-2 all time against UND, with one road and one home victory.

Storm Tracker

- Dynamic senior swingman **D.J. Kennedy** paced the Red Storm in scoring (15.1 ppg), rebounding (202, 6.1 rpg), assists (102, 3.1 apg), steals (38, 1.2 spg), free throw percentage (.756), 3-point field goal percentage (T-1st, .383) and minutes played (31.4 per game) in 2009-10, and was listed second among St. John's leaders in blocked shots (22). Kennedy — whose scoring (19th) and rebounding (21st) averages ranked him among conference leaders — was a six-time BIG EAST Honor Roll member last season and is a two-time first team All-Met selection from the Metropolitan Basketball Writers' Association (2008-09, 2009-10). He is now 23rd on STJ's all-time scoring list with 1,325 career points, and if he matches last season's point total (497), Kennedy will finish his career in the Top 10 among St. John's all-time scorers — a list that includes legends **Chris Mullin** (first, 2,440), **Malik Sealy** (second, 2,402), **Felipe Lopez** (third, 1,927) and **Tony Jackson** (ninth, 1,603).
- New York City playground legend **Dwight Hardy** made quite an impression as a prolific scorer in 2009-10, finishing second on the squad with a 10.5 ppg average. This season Hardy is pacing the Red Storm, starting all 13 games and hitting at a 16.3 ppg clip to rank seventh among all BIG EAST players. A multi-dimensional athlete with the ability to get into the paint and draw contact, Hardy's .918 free throw percentage (67-of-73) is currently second in the league, and tied for 15th nationally.
- Lightning-quick and Queens-tough, senior **Malik Boothe** returns as the incumbent floor general. He currently ranks in the Top 20 among all BIG EAST players with a 3.3 assists per game average, and his 2.8 assist-to-turnover ratio (39 assists, 14 turnovers on the year) ranks third among league leaders. His efforts have helped the Red Storm rate among league leaders and as high as second nationally in turnover margin (+5.0).
- Holiday Festival and Great Alaska Shootout MOP **Justin Brownlee** has been in the starting lineup for 11 games in 2010-11 after making three starts last season. His 14.4 ppg rank 16th in the league, and his .553 field goal percentage is eighth in the BIG EAST and ranks in the Top 30 among all NCAA Division I players.

- Rookie forward **Dwayne Polee II** — the 2010 Los Angeles City Section and MaxPreps State of California High School Player of the Year — impressed in the preseason and has made an immediate impact in the first 13 games. The athletic newcomer with the 40-inch vertical has averaged 6.0 points and 3.2 rebounds over the past five contests, while making 15-of-26 field goals (.577) and swatting 1.0 shots over 19.2 minutes per game.
- Senior guard **Paris Horne** — one of STJ's toughest perimeter defenders — is also on-pace to leave his mark in the Red Storm's offensive career record books. With 131 career 3-point field goals made — including the game-winner at Providence (Jan. 1) — Horne currently is third all-time and is only 20 treys short of moving into first place. His 1,027 career points make him St. John's 46th member of the 1,000-point club.
- Senior forward **Justin Burrell** has contributed in all 13 games after missing four weeks in the preseason with a fractured metacarpal (hand). The big man is averaging 12.8 ppg over the last four games on a 19-of-27 effort from the field, and has added 4.8 rebounds per contest in 25.8 minutes.
- Bruising forward **Sean Evans** established himself among the Red Storm's most consistent performers in 2009-10. Evans' 10 career double-doubles include a 19-point, 10-rebound effort against UConn in the BIG EAST Tournament. He averaged 15.5 ppg and 8.5 rpg while shooting .765 from the field and 1.000 at the free throw line (5-for-5) in last year's end-of-year conference event.
- Imposing big man **Dele Coker** returns to the post after leading the squad in field goal percentage (.629) and rejections (24, 0.9 bpg, Top 20 in the BIG EAST). He scored buckets vs. St. Bonaventure (Dec. 7), Fordham (Dec. 11) and Georgetown (Jan. 3).
- Local guard **Malik Stith** has seen time at the one and the two after dealing 37 assists and only 22 turnovers as a freshman. He is averaging 5.1 ppg this season, with 19 assists and six turnovers.

1st Season At St. John's

Steve Lavin - whose seven-year coaching record at UCLA included six NCAA Tournament appearances, five trips to the NCAA Round of 16, and six seasons of 21 wins or more - became the 19th head men's basketball coach in St. John's University's 102-plus years of storied tradition on the hardwood on March 30, 2010.

"Today is the start of a new era in the venerable history of St. John's basketball," said Red Storm Director of Athletics Chris Monasch. "Steve brings the skill set and persona that we feel gives us a chance to compete at the highest level in the BIG EAST. Since Coach Lavin was unveiled as a candidate, you could feel the excitement throughout the city. St. John's is poised to recapture its legacy as New York's college team."

Lavin's coaching career was forged over 15 years in head and assistant roles at both UCLA and Purdue University. As the head coach at UCLA from the 1996-97 to 2002-03 seasons, Lavin amassed a career record of 145-78. He guided UCLA to six consecutive seasons of 21 wins or more, and to six consecutive NCAA tournaments (1996-2002).

"This is an opportunity of a lifetime to be able to return to the sidelines coaching college basketball at a school like St. John's that has

such tradition and heritage in terms of the history of basketball," Lavin said. "Then you add the academic dimension, as well as New York City and Madison Square Garden, it's as good as it gets."

During Lavin's tenure as the head coach at UCLA, he was one of only two coaches in the country, along with Duke's Mike Krzyzewski, to lead his team to five NCAA regional semifinal games (Sweet 16s) in six years ('02, '01, '00, '98, '97). As UCLA's head coach, his career record in the first two rounds of the NCAA Tournament was 10-1. Lavin's winning percentage (90.9 percent) in the first two rounds of the tournament is second only to Dean Smith in NCAA Tournament history. In his inaugural season as head coach, Lavin directed the Bruins to the 1997 Pac-10 Championship and the NCAA Regional Final (Elite Eight).

In 2001, after the Bruins finished 23-9, Lavin was honored as the Pac-10 Coach of the Year. He is the only head coach in NCAA men's basketball history to lead his team to victory over the No. 1 team in the country in four consecutive collegiate seasons (Arizona '03, Kansas '02, Stanford '01, Stanford '00). Lavin compiled a 12-4 record in contests involving overtime periods. Additionally Lavin's Bruins had a 10-4 record against the rival USC Trojans.

During his time as the head coach or as an assistant at both Purdue and UCLA, Lavin's teams qualified for 13 consecutive NCAA tournament appearances (1989-2002). Lavin was an assistant coach on the Bruins' 1995 national championship team that completed the season with a 32-1 record.

As the head coach at UCLA, Lavin recruited and signed the No. 1 rated recruiting class in the country in both 1998 and 2001. He totaled seven McDonald's High School All-Americans during his tenure. At least one of his former UCLA players or recruits was

selected in the NBA draft for a run of 10 straight years (1997-2006). As a result, the Bruins own the longest national streak of any college or university for consecutive years with a NBA draft pick. Seven of Lavin's former Bruin recruits or players are currently members of NBA teams, including Trevor Ariza (Houston Rockets), Baron Davis (L.A. Clippers), Dan Gadzuric (Milwaukee Bucks) and Jason Kapono (Philadelphia 76ers).

Lavin's coaching career began in 1988 when he was hired as an assistant by Purdue mentor Gene Keady. In March of 2003, after 12 years on the UCLA staff, Lavin posted his first losing season as a head coach (10-19) and was relieved of his duties as head coach. Shortly thereafter, Lavin was signed to a multi-year contract with ESPN and ABC, where he has been serving as a nationally-renowned analyst on both game and studio broadcasts for "The Worldwide Leader in Sports."

Lavin served as a college basketball Analyst on ABC and ESPN for seven years, largely working alongside legendary broadcasting partner Brent Musburger. Lavin has provided color commentary and expertise on ESPN's coverage of the NBA Pre Draft Camp as well as the NBA Draft.

Lavin is frequently an invited keynote speaker throughout the country for business, community and collegiate events. He addresses a wide range of topics including effective communication, motivation, management, recruiting, leadership, and naturally, college basketball.

On Aug. 17, 2007, Lavin was married to Mary Ann Jarou, a professional actress who has made television series appearances on "How I Met Your Mother," "General Hospital," "Entourage," "Brothers and Sisters," "Secret Girlfriend," and appropriately, "King of Queens." Lavin's father, Cap Lavin, was inducted into the San Francisco Prep Basketball Hall of Fame in 1992 and is a 1997 honoree of the University of San Francisco Hall of Fame. Cap Lavin was a three-time (1946-48) all-city performer at St. Ignatius High School, and went on to earn three varsity letters (1950-52) and serve as the basketball team's captain at the University of San Francisco. While at San Francisco, Cap Lavin played for two Naismith Hall of Fame coaches, Pete Newell (1949-50) and Phil Woolpert (1950-52). A collegiate guard, Newell has described Cap Lavin as a "ballhandler way ahead of his time, one of the great dribblers and passers in the game."

"We are pleased to have a coach with the distinguished career and success of Steve Lavin take over our men's basketball program," said St. John's University President Rev. Donald J. Harrington, C.M. "This is an exciting day, not only for St. John's University, but for our alumni, supporters and fans. We look toward the future under Coach Lavin's direction as we take the steps necessary to propel our program back to the success it so richly deserves in the BIG EAST and among college basketball's elite."

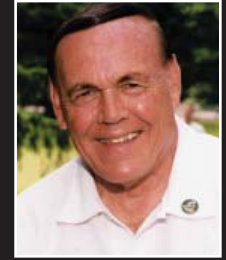

In The Community

The Red Storm basketball team and head coach Steve Lavin are active members of the St. John's University and greater New York City community. The men's basketball team is involved in extensive charity, fund-raising and public speaking events throughout the year, particularly in the offseason.

Lavin has been involved with numerous charities throughout his coaching career, including Coaches vs. Cancer, City of Hope, the Jimmy V Foundation, the USO and the Special Olympics. Since arriving at St. John's, Lavin and wife Mary Jarou have adopted the Bread & Life Soup Kitchen in Bedford-Stuyvesant, Brooklyn. Joined in an October ceremony with Brooklyn-born redshirt senior Rob Thomas, Steve Starker of BTIG Brokerage and Anthony Butler, Executive Director of St. John's Bread & Life, the Lavins have made a \$35,000, multi-year pledge to aid New York City's homeless and hungry.

St. John's men's basketball players work with University Campus Ministry in outreach efforts that include the St. Nicholas of Tolentine shelter, Habitat for Humanity, the St. John's Bread and Life Soup Kitchen and other organizations.

LAVIN'S RECRUITING SUCCESS: EIGHT NLI'S IN NOVEMBER PERIOD

- Head men's basketball coach **Steve Lavin** announced the beginning of his 2011-12 St. John's basketball recruiting class, as eight heralded student-athletes have now signed National Letters of Intent (NLI) to join the Red Storm for the 2011-12 season. The early signing period began Wednesday, Nov. 10, 2010, and concluded on Wednesday, Nov. 17. As the 2010-11 squad has nine scholarship seniors and is carrying one open spot, Lavin could sign as many as 11 student-athletes by the time this class takes to the court next fall.
- To date, St. John's first wave of recruits under Lavin is made up of six freshmen that are rated as consensus top 100 prospects by recruiting services – **Amir Garrett** (Los Angeles, Calif./Findlay Prep(Nev.), **Maurice Harkless** (Queens, N.Y./South Kent (Conn.), **D'Angelo Harrison** (Sugar Land, Texas/Dulles), **Norvel Pelle** (Compton, Calif./Price), **Sir'Dominic Pointer** (Detroit, Mich./Quality Education Academy (N.C.) and **Jakarr Sampson** (Akron, Ohio/Brewster Academy (N.H.) – one under-the-radar front line player with New York roots in **Dwight Meikle** (Uniondale, N.Y./Quality Education Academy (N.C.) and a highly-regarded junior college point guard, **Nurideen Lindsey** (Philadelphia, Pa./Overbrook/Redlands C.C. (Okla.), who is expected to have three years of eligibility when he joins the Red Storm next fall.
- "This class, which will become one of the largest signed in collegiate basketball, comprises the foundation of the St. John's program moving forward," said Lavin. "The arrival of the 2011-12 class, along with an elite returning talent in Dwayne Polee II, is the core group that will carry the Johnnies into the future."
- The Red Storm's incoming class is currently rated No. 2 in the nation by Rivals.com and No. 3 by ESPN, and is sure to move up with the pair of recent signings. Lavin already has been credited with two No. 1 classes (1998, 2001) and one No. 2 class (1997) as a head coach.

Amir Garrett • F • 6-6 • 190 • Fr.-H.S.
Los Angeles, Calif. (Findlay Prep)
Wednesday, Nov. 17, 2010 – 11:23 a.m.

Garrett is rated as high as the nation's No. 51 overall player and the No. 14 small forward by recruiting services. With superior athleticism and a prototypical frame, Garrett is a tenacious offensive threat who specializes in transition with hard drives to the rim that result in show-stopping dunks. He is also a hard-nosed defender who has a penchant for swatting away shots in transition. Garrett transferred to Findlay Prep (Henderson, Nev.) after leading Leuzinger High (Lawndale, Calif.) to the California Interscholastic Federation 55 Division I-A championship in 2009-10. As a junior, he averaged 16.8 points, 7.2 rebounds, 1.6 assists and 1.6 steals per game. He was named CIF 55 Division I-A Co-Player of the Year and tabbed for the first-ever Cal-Hi Sports all-state team. The Long Beach Press-Telegram named Garrett to its 2010-11 Best in The West First Team, along with fellow St. John's incoming freshman Norvel Pelle. An accomplished left-handed pitcher, Garrett has also garnered interest from Major League Baseball scouts with a fastball in the low-90 m.p.h. range. His travel teams are Double Pump and Belmont Shore. Garrett's coach at Findlay is Mike Peck.

Queens, N.Y. (South Kent (Conn.))
Wednesday, Nov. 10, 2010 - 1 p.m.

Rated as high as the nation's No. 41 prospect overall and the No. 11 small forward by recruiting services, Harkless is a complete basketball player and an extremely skilled local talent. The 6-8, 190-pound swingman averaged 16.5 points per game and 11.5 rebounds at Forest Hills High School in Queens as a junior in 2009-10. An athletic, rangy shooter with great length on the defensive end of the floor, Harkless was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Hoop Group Elite Camp in Reading, Pa., this past summer, and led his New York Panthers AAU squad to a top four finish at the Fab 48 event in Las Vegas, and the Desert Duel title in Phoenix, Ariz. Harkless is spending his senior season at South Kent School (Conn.), playing for Kelvin Jefferson.

Sugar Land, Texas (Dulles)

Harrison, a 6-3, 186-pound athlete known both for his deadly accuracy and ability to get to the rim, averaged 20.8 points, 5.2 rebounds, 4.2 assists and 2.2 steals as a junior in 2009-10 at Dulles High School in Sugar Land, Texas, playing for coach Mike Carrabine. Last season's Houston Chronicle Player of the Year is known for his explosive first step, long-range game and his ability to fill up the stat sheet, and is rated as high as the nation's No. 9 shooting guard and No. 41 overall prospect by recruiting services.

Nurideen Lindsey • G • 6-3 • 185 • So.-J.C.
Philadelphia, Pa.
(Overbrook/Redlands C.C. (Okla.))
Wednesday, Nov. 10, 2010 – 3:37 p.m.

At 6-3, 185-pounds, Lindsey is a formidably-built floor general with outstanding ballhandling, playmaking and scoring skills. Lindsey's ability to get to the rim as a lead guard is evident, as he threatened the legendary Wilt Chamberlain's scoring totals as a prep player at Philadelphia's Overbrook High School, and now averages 28.0 points per game, 7.0 assists, 6.0 rebounds and 4.0 steals at Redlands Community College in El Reno, Okla. In his Redlands debut – his first organized basketball game in two seasons – he scored 48 points with 10 assists and five rebounds against Fort Scott C.C. (Kansas). Lindsey is on track to graduate with an associate's degree from Redlands in the spring of 2011, but would arrive at St. John's with three years of NCAA eligibility remaining. His coach at Redlands is Yaphett King.

Through five games in 2010-11, Meikle is averaging 13.2 points, 6.4 rebounds and 2.2 blocks for Quality Education Academy where he is teammates with fellow St. John's recruit Sir'Dominic Pointer. His coach at Quality Education Academy is Isaac Pitts.

Rated as high as the nation's No. 2 center and the No. 19 prospect overall by recruiting services, Pelle utilizes his 6-10, 200-pound frame and superior jumping ability to make him one of the country's best shot blockers and most dominant inside players. He is extremely quick for his size and his high motor around the rim generates a great deal of scoring off the offensive glass. Pelle also has face-up skills in the paint and a deceptive first step to the bucket. He played at Dominguez High School in Compton, Calif., (the same school that produced NBA standouts such as Tayshaun Prince and Tyson Chandler) from 2007-09. Pelle transferred to Price High School and sat out his 2009-10 junior season due to transfer rules. He continued his skill development as a member of the 2009-10 USA Basketball Developmental National Team. The Long Beach Press-Telegram named Pelle to its 2010-11 Best in The West First Team. Pelle plays AAU ball for the Compton Magic. Pelle's coach at Price is Michael Lynch.

Sir'Dominic Pointer • G/F • 6-6 • 205 • Fr.-H.S.
Detroit, Mich. (Quality Education Acad. (N.C.))
Thursday, Nov. 11, 2010 – 1:47 p.m.

Pointer, a 6-6, 205-pound native of Detroit, Mich., is in his second year at Quality Education Academy in Winston Salem, N.C. Rated as high as the No. 14 small forward in his class and the No. 55 prospect overall by recruiting services, Pointer averaged 16.3 points, 5.8 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 2.8 assists as a junior in 2009-10. Considered among the most athletic and tenacious defenders at the high school level, and a tremendous rebounder for his size, Pointer possesses versatility on both ends of the floor and improved offensive skills allow him to play at the shooting guard, small forward or power forward positions. His coach at Quality Education is Isaac Pitts.

Opening Tips

- Three of the Red Storm's past five wins were by five points or less. On the season, St. John's is 4-3 in games decided by five points or less and 7-3 in games decided by 10 points or less. St. John's played its share of close battles last season with 11 of its 16 losses coming by 10 or fewer points. The Red Storm held leads in the second half in seven of its 12 BIG EAST defeats in 2009-10, and led at halftime in six of those losses, including three against ranked opponents. Attaining, playing with and keeping leads — particularly on the road — have been major points of emphasis in the 2010-11 preseason.
- St. John's 6-3 on the season and 3-0 in BIG EAST play when leading at the half. The team is 4-0 when trailing at halftime, with second-half comebacks against Columbia, Arizona State, Davidson and Northwestern.
- Dec. 29's 81-71 victory at West Virginia helped first-year head coach **Steve Lavin** continue a trend he established in seven years as the head man at UCLA, as he now owns a 6-2 career record in conference openers. St. John's has now won three of its last 11 league debuts (2010-11, at West Virginia; 2006-07, DePaul at MSG; 2000-01, Virginia Tech at Carneesecca Arena).
- St. John's has been doing an outstanding job taking care of the basketball in 2010-11. The Red Storm is ranked 19th among all NCAA Division I programs (Jan. 2 report) in turnover margin (+5.0), tied for 25th in turnovers (10.9 per game) and 37th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.3). St. John's is currently second in the BIG EAST in turnover margin, and is eighth in steals and assist-to-turnover ratio.
- St. John's earned win No. 1,700 in program history by defeating Notre Dame (69-68) on Feb. 14, 2010, won No. 1,701 with a victory at USF (74-58) on Feb. 20, captured No. 1,702 with its triple-overtime thriller over DePaul (90-82) on March 5, and knocked off UConn on March 9 for No. 1,703. Ten wins in 2010-11 make 1,713.
- In taking the 33rd Great Alaska Shootout title, the Red Storm became the fifth of six BIG EAST squads to capture a November tournament championship this season. No. 5/5 Pitt topped Maryland and No. 22 Texas to post a 2K Sports Coaches vs. Cancer Classic victory, while Georgetown downed Coastal Carolina, Wofford and NC State to take the Charleston Classic title and UConn upended Wichita State, No. 2/2 Michigan State and No. 8/9 Kentucky to claim the EA Sports Maui Invitational title. Syracuse won the Legends Classic with victories over Detroit, William & Mary, Michigan and Georgia Tech, while Notre Dame earned the Old Spice Classic title with wins over Georgia, Cal and Wisconsin.

We're Going Streaking!

- St. John's is riding a five-game win streak, with three victories coming in league play, two wins on the road, one over an undefeated foe and one over a ranked opponent. St. John's last won three-straight conference games in the 2007-08 season.
- Over the last five games, St. John's seniors **Dwight Hardy** (19.4 ppg), **Justin Brownlee** (15.6 ppg), **D.J. Kennedy** (12.4 ppg) and **Justin Burrell** (11.2 ppg) have each averaged double-figures in scoring. The quartet is shooting 55.1 percent (98-of-178) from the field and has accounted for 82.3 percent of St. John's offense over that stretch.
- St. John's has hit at a 52.3 percent clip from the field during its five-game winning streak. Burrell has led the way in shot efficiency during that span, converting 71.4 percent (20-of-28) of his shots. In the Red Storm's first eight games, the team was converting at a 45.0 percent rate from the field.
- Improved free throw shooting has also played a role in St. John's recent success. Over the last five games, the team is shooting 76.5 percent (88-of-115) from the line – a major improvement from 63.2 percent in the first eight games. Hardy (94.7 percent, 36-of-38), Kennedy (85.7 percent, 18-of-21) and Brownlee (76.5 percent, 13-of-17) have bolstered that effort. St. John's has enjoyed a +6.4-point advantage over its opponents from the line during the winning streak.
- St. John's 81-71 road win over West Virginia on Dec. 29 snapped a 10-game losing streak to the Mountaineers and a five-game losing streak in Morgantown, W.Va. It also marked the Red Storm's first time defeating WVU head coach Bob Huggins, who was previously 4-0 against STJ.
- The Red Storm's 67-65 victory over Providence on Jan. 1 ended a seven-game road losing streak to the Friars. The win also marked STJ's first "W" against Providence head coach Keno Davis, who was previously 2-0 against the Red Storm.
- St. John's has held its opponent's top scorer below his season average in four of the past five games. STJ limited Davidson's Jake Cohen to 14 points (14.7 ppg prior to the game), West Virginia's Casey Mitchell to 12 points (17.5 ppg), Providence's Marshon Brooks to 20 points (23.4 ppg) and Georgetown's Austin Freeman to just six points (19.2 ppg).

Kennedy, Horne and The 1,000-Point Plateau

- Red Storm swingman **D.J. Kennedy** became the 44th St. John's player in history to reach the 1,000-point plateau on Feb. 2, 2010, hitting the mark dead-on at 1,000. He totals 1,325 career points (23rd), now in the top 25 and only four points from surpassing legend **Mark Jackson** (22nd, 1,328, 1984-87. Kennedy is actually only 251 points away from cracking St. John's all-time top 10 (1,576), a feat he may accomplish toward the end of his senior season.
- With 14 points at Fordham on Dec. 11, the 46th Red Storm player to join the elite group was senior **Paris Horne**. He currently has 1,027, tied for 44th and climbing.
- 2010 grad **Anthony Mason Jr.** became the 45th player all-time, finishing his career with 1,059 career points (40th). He is currently 40th on the all-time list, and is now playing in the NBA Developmental League.

STJ Basketball History

- One of the storied programs in the history of men's collegiate basketball, St. John's began the 2010-11 season as the seventh all-time winningest program in the NCAA Division I record book with 1,703 wins and 884 losses.
- The school's .658 winning percentage ranks ninth all-time in NCAA history, while St. John's 26 all-time NCAA Tournament appearances are tied for 18th.
- The program's 27 NIT appearances and five titles are unprecedented. Helms Foundation national champions following the 1910-11 season, St. John's appeared in NCAA Final Fours in 1952 and 1985.
- The program boasts 11 consensus All-Americans, 59 NBA Draft choices and 46 players that have scored 1,000 career points or more.

RED STORM
 Nike Hyper Elite Uniforms

- The St. John's men's basketball team introduced the latest system of dress from Nike for college basketball on Feb. 11, 2010. St. John's was one of eight teams in college hoops that debuted the Nike Hyper Elite uniforms in February, which celebrate the rich spirit, tradition and culture of the nation's top basketball programs.
- The Nike Hyper Elite uniform, which is 70 percent lighter than a traditional elite level basketball uniform, is now worn by St. John's, Miami (Fla.), Syracuse, Texas, Connecticut, Kentucky, Gonzaga and Michigan State.
- Paying tribute to the rich history of St. John's basketball, Nike designers worked with the University to create a distinctive look for the Red Storm. Inspired in part by Hall of Fame coach **Lou Carnesecca**, the St. John's jerseys feature a Chevron design to represent Carnesecca's "lucky" sweater. Elements of the iconic ceiling of Madison Square Garden, where Carnesecca coached some of the programs most memorable games, are also included in the design.
- In addition, five stripes honor the "Wonder Five" who helped lead the program to prominence. Clouds and lightning reference St. John's nickname, "Red Storm," and the University's seal and its year of establishment, 1870, help complete the design.
- St. John's new uniforms incorporate several Nike innovations that were originally introduced in Beijing. The Hyper Elite uniforms take advantage of Nike Aerographics - an engineered mesh providing zoned cooling that reduces up to half the yarn, making the uniforms more lightweight and breathable.
- Nike made specific adjustments to the jersey, eliminating 13 inches of material, while the use of Dri-FIT woven fabric in the short reduced its weight to six ounces; 66 percent lighter than a traditional elite level Nike basketball short. Overall, the Nike Hyper Elite uniform is a striking 70 percent lighter than the traditional basketball uniform.
- Dri-FIT technical fabric is a moisture-wicking material that provides increased comfort and thermo regulation to help enable players to perform at their optimal level on the court. The Nike Hyper Elite uniform also dries 30 percent faster compared to a standard professional level uniform when wet.
- Completing the new system of dress for St. John's is Nike Pro Combat, an ergonomically designed base layer that provides basketball-specific protective padding without restricting mobility on the court.



Postgame Notes: St. John's 61, No. 13/13 Georgetown 58

- With the win, St. John's opened BIG EAST play with three-straight wins for the first time since the 1999-2000 season when the squad began its conference schedule with a 4-0 mark.
- The victory marks the first St. John's win against a ranked opponent since defeating then-No. 7/10 Notre Dame exactly two years ago on Jan. 3, 2009.
- St. John's held the Hoyas to just 23.5 percent (4-for-17) from long range. Georgetown entered the contest shooting 40.3 percent from distance on the year.
- St. John's set a new season-low with just four turnovers.
- St. John's limited Austin Freeman to just six points on 2-of-10 shooting. The Preseason BIG EAST Player of the Year, Freeman entered the contest averaging 19.2 points per game.
- **Dwight Hardy** finished with 20 points, reaching the 20-point plateau for the fourth-straight game. The senior is averaging 21.3 points per game in the stretch, while also shooting 52.3 percent (23-for-44) from the floor in that same four-game span. Hardy was a perfect 10-for-10 from the line and is now 24-for-24 from the charity stripe in three BIG EAST games.
- With a 15-point effort, **Justin Brownlee** reached double-figures for the fifth-straight game. Brownlee is averaging 15.6 point in the current five-game winning streak. The senior also dished out a career-high six assists and added a team-high seven rebounds.
- **D.J. Kennedy** tallied seven points, four rebounds, three assists and three steals. Kennedy is averaging 10.7 points, 7.3 rebounds and 4.0 assists in the past three games. Kennedy now has 1,325 points, just three shy of tying **Mark Jackson** (1,328) for No. 22 on the all-time list.
- **Justin Burrell** finished with eight points and four rebounds. The senior is averaging 12.8 points and 4.8 rebounds in the past four games.
- **Dele Coker** made his sixth-straight start and totaled two points, his first points since Dec. 11 against Fordham.
- **Dwayne Polee II** made his first start since Dec. 7 against St. Bonaventure.

Stormin' Second Halfs

- Over the past five games, St. John's has dominated the second half, combining to shoot 59.1 percent (65-of-110) from the field and 75.6 percent (62-of-82) from the free throw line. In that stretch, the Red Storm has averaged 40.2 points after halftime while limiting opponents to just 35.0 points.
- The Red Storm has also benefited from better ball security in the second half. Over the past five games, St. Johns has averaged 1.0 fewer turnovers in the second half than it has allowed in the first half. STJ's assist-to-turnover ratio in the second half is 1.37 while its first-half ratio is 0.89.
- **Dwight Hardy, Justin Brownlee, Justin Burrell** and **D.J. Kennedy** have played major roles in the Red Storm's recent success as each is averaging double-figure scoring over the last four games. The quartet's impact has shown mostly in the second half. Hardy is averaging 11.0 points in the second half over that stretch, doing much of his work from the free throw line (26-of-28). Brownlee is averaging 10.0 points after halftime while shooting 64.5 percent (20-of-31) from the field. Burrell is 10-of-12 from the field (83.3 percent) after halftime over the past five games and averaging 6.6 points. Kennedy has been accurate from both the field (8-of-13) and the free throw line (14-of-15) to average 6.0 points per second half.
- On the year, the Red Storm has scored 500 points in the second half (38.5 ppg) vs. 463 in the first half (35.6), including:
 - 29 vs. Georgetown (Jan. 3): 9-of-24, 37.5%, FT: 10-of-15, 66.7%, 3PT: 1-of-5, 5 assists
 - 39 vs. Providence (Jan. 1): 15-of-27, 55.6%, FT: 5-of-6, 83.3%, 3PT: 4-of-8, 9 assists
 - 47 vs. WVU (Dec. 29): 13-of-17, 76.5%, FT: 20-of-24, 83.4%, 3PT: 1-of-4, 9 assists
 - 48 vs. Northwestern (Dec. 21): 16-of-20, 80.0%, FT: 14-of-19, 73.7%, 3PT: 2-of-3, 13 assists

Tournament Notes: Holiday Festival Champions

- St. John's captured its 16th Holiday Festival crown and first since 2005 with its 85-69 win over previously-unbeaten Northwestern on Tuesday, Dec. 21. Already champions of the 2010 Great Alaska shootout, last week's 2010 Holiday Festival title gave St. John's two regular-season tournament championships for the first time since the 1990-91 season. Twenty years ago, **Lou Carnesecca's** Redmen opened the season with victories over Monmouth (85-60, Nov. 23, 1990) and Central Connecticut State (135-92, Nov. 24) to win the Joe Lapchick Memorial Tournament at St. John's Alumni Hall, and went on to down George Mason (76-65, Dec. 7) and Brigham Young (67-62, Dec. 8) to claim the BYU Cougar Classic crown in Provo, Utah.
- St. John's is now 69-38 all-time in 45 Holiday Festival appearances and owns 15 championships: 1958, 1964, 1972, 1979, 1981, 1982, 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987, 1991, 1996, 2004, 2005 and 2010.

- Against Northwestern in the 85-69 title game victory, the Red Storm had five players in double-figures for the first time this season. Those five players combined to score all 89 points.
- Lou Carnesecca Holiday Festival MVP **Justin Brownlee** scored a career-high 21 points in the championship game. The senior averaged 16.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.0 assists in the two games. Brownlee, who was also the Most Outstanding Player in the Great Alaska Shootout, has averaged 20.5 points in two regular season tournament championship games this year.
- Senior guard **Dwight Hardy** tied a career-high with five 3-pointers en route to a team-high 24-point effort. A member of the Holiday Festival All-Tournament Team, Hardy averaged 18.0 points, 3.0 assists and shot 40.0 percent (6-for-15) from long range in the two games.

Tournament Notes: 2010 Great Alaska Shootout Champions

- St. John's shot a season-best 57.7 percent (30-for-52) in its 82-39 win against Drake and fired at a 50.9 percent clip (81-for-159) for the entire Shootout.
- The Red Storm posted a tournament-record defensive effort in the Drake victory, holding the Bulldogs to the lowest point total in the Shootout's 33-year history. The 39 points allowed by St. John's were the fewest since the squad held Columbia to the same total on Dec. 27, 2005.
- St. John's registered a 1.8 assist-to-turnover ratio, dishing out 51 assists against just 28 turnovers in the Shootout. Sophomore guard **Malik Stith** and senior **Dwight Hardy** combined for 21 assists and just two turnovers.
- The defense averaged 8.0 steals per game and forced a total of 49 turnovers (16.3 per game).
- St. John's fought back from a 10-point halftime deficit against Arizona State in the Shootout title game. The team is 2-0 this season when trailing at the break, having also defeated Columbia after trailing by four points at halftime.
- STJ averaged 75.7 points per game in the three-game stretch and allowed just 56.7 points.
- Named the Most Outstanding Player of the 2010 Carrs/Safeway Great Alaska Shootout, **Justin Brownlee** had a pair of 20-point contests and averaged 17.7 points, 4.3 rebounds and shot 66.7 percent (20-for-30) from the floor.
- **Dwight Hardy** averaged 13.0 points in the Shootout and was named to the All-Tournament team. The senior added 3.3 rebounds, 3.3 assists and shot 82.4 percent (14-for-17) from the charity stripe.
- Also named to the Shootout's All-Tournament team, **D.J. Kennedy** averaged 7.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 2.0 assists and shot 52.6 percent (10-for-19) from the floor.



STJ And the 40/40 Club

- St. John's 83-39 win over Drake on Friday, Nov. 26, in the 2010 Great Alaska Shootout semifinals marked the first time since Dec. 27, 2005, that the Red Storm held an opponent under 40 points in a game. On that date, St. John's defeated Columbia in a 63-39 win in the Panasonic Holiday Festival at MSG. The last time STJ held a team under 40 points away from home came in 1981 with a 42-37 win at Princeton, while the last time the team posted that defensive performance at a neutral site was 1952 in a 54-36 win over St. Francis at the 69th Rgt. Armory in New York. Those games mark the only times that an opponent has failed to score 40 points dating to 1952.
- St. John's wide margin of victory in defeating Drake 83-39 marked the first time since 1999 that the Red Storm has defeated a team by 40 or more points, when the team beat Niagara, 115-70, on Jan. 4. The last time that St. John's won by such a margin away from home came on Dec. 7, 1971, when the Redmen roughed up Georgetown on the road by a margin of 107-67. The last time the team won by that margin on a neutral site was Dec. 29, 1965, when STJ defeated LSU, 102-60, in Los Angeles, Calif.
- In the program's 103-plus years, St. John's has held a team under 40 points while winning by a margin of 40 or more just six times. The last time STJ accomplished that feat before Friday was in 1950, when the Johnnies defeated Pratt 90-39 at Alumni Hall. Friday marked only the second time that St. John's has ever completed the feat away from home, the only other occurrence coming in 1945 when the Red Storm defeated Niagara 80-39 in the Buffalo, N.Y. Memorial Auditorium.

Scouting Notre Dame

- No. 14/15 Notre Dame is 13-2 this season and a perfect 10-0 at home. The Fighting Irish are averaging 78.4 points per game and holding opponents to 63.8 points. ND has one of the best rebounding margins in the country as the Fighting Irish are outrebounding their opponents by 7.9 rebounds per game. Notre Dame is also tied for ninth in the country with 18.1 assists per game and the team's 1.7 assist-to-turnover ratio leads the BIG EAST. The Fighting Irish are 2-1 in BIG EAST play and are coming off a 73-70 home win over No. 8/9 Connecticut on Jan. 4. Notre Dame has won 12-straight home contests and has not lost in Purcell Pavilion at the Joyce Center since St. John's took a 69-68 win on Feb. 14, 2010.
- Notre Dame has very balanced offensive attack as all five of its senior starters are averaging double-digit scoring. Senior Tim Abromaitis leads the team in scoring (16.5 ppg) and rebounding (7.2 rpg) and her 40.2 percent shooting (35-of-87) from 3-point range ranks second on the team. The 6-8 forward has elevated his game in BIG EAST play, averaging 18.0 points per game and shooting 50 percent from the field over three conference games. In conference play, he ranks fourth in 3-point shooting at 61.1 percent (11-of-18). Senior guard Ben Hansbrough leads the team with 4.0 assists per game, ranks second on the team in scoring at 15.6 points per game and has a team-best 44.6 3-point shooting percentage (37-of-83). Hansbrough, who scored 21 against No. 8/9 Connecticut has averaged 16.7 points over three BIG EAST games. Senior forward Carleton Scott (11.9 ppg), senior forward Tyrone Nash (10.2 ppg) and senior guard Scott Martin (10.0 ppg) have also been steady contributors offensively.
- The St. John's senior class is 2-2 against Notre Dame. Seniors **Justin Burrell** and **D.J. Kennedy** have been key for the Red Storm against the Fighting Irish. Burrell has averaged 13.8 points and 5.8 rebounds and shot 44.2 percent from the field over four career games against UND. Kennedy has averaged 12.0 points and 6.8 boards and shot 45.9 percent against the Fighting Irish. Senior guard Paris Horne has averaged 8.5 points against UND.
- Notre Dame's two losses came against ranked opponents in then-No. 17 Kentucky on Dec. 8 and then-No. 5 Syracuse on Jan. 1. Against Kentucky, both teams were tied at 40 at halftime but ND shot just 20 percent (6-of-30) from the field in the second half and lost, 72-58. In its loss to Syracuse, Notre Dame trailed, 34-33, at the break. A defensive breakdown allowed the Orange to shoot 53.6 percent in the second half as the ND fell, 70-58, in the Carrier Dome.
- In 2009-10, Notre Dame went 23-12 overall and tied for seventh in the BIG EAST with a 10-8 conference record. ND was 17-3 at home and 7-2 at home against conference opponents. Notre Dame's season ended with a 51-50 loss to Old Dominion in the first round of the NCAA Tournament's South Regional in New Orleans, La. The Fighting Irish returned 10 letterwinners from last season, including three starters.
- Notre Dame's Mike Brey is in his 16th year as a head coach and 11th season leading the Fighting Irish. Brey has a 323-167 overall record and has gone 224-115 at ND while leading the Fighting Irish to seven 20-win seasons and six NCAA Tournament appearances. Brey is 5-6 against St. John's and just 1-4 against the Red Storm at the Joyce Center.

On The Biggest Stage

- St. John's is 391-259 (.602) all-time at "The World's Most Famous Arena," which has served as a home court for St. John's basketball for more than 76 years. St. John's played its first men's basketball game at Madison Square Garden on Jan. 19, 1931 — a 17-9 victory over CCNY in a special charity game arranged by mayor Jimmy Walker. St. John's first-ever regularly-schedule game was a doubleheader on Dec. 29, 1934, where NYU defeated Notre Dame, 25-18, before the Redmen fell to Westminster, 37-33.
- The Red Storm is 3-0 at The Garden this season, having defeated No. 13/13 Georgetown (61-58, Jan. 3), and Davidson (62-57, Dec. 20) and Northwestern (85-69, Dec. 21) en route to the 2010 MSG Holiday Festival title. St. John's is averaging 69.3 points per game at The Garden in 2010-11, while limiting opponents to 61.3 ppg. St. John's is hitting at a .497 percent clip from The Garden floor and a .333 rate from long distance at The Garden, while limiting opponents to a .396 field goal percentage.
- A quartet of seniors are excelling at MSG early in 2010-11. Bronx guard **Dwight Hardy** — who once led his high school squad to a city title on the hardwood of the venerable venue — leads the Red Storm with an 18.7 ppg average, while shooting .452 from the field, .333 from long range and .917 from the free throw line. Big man **Justin Brownlee** is scoring 15.7 ppg in Garden games, hitting at a .472 rate from the

 2010 Tip-Off Success

- A crowd of 3,315 St. John's fans eager for the start of the 2010-11 basketball season filled Carnesecca Arena on Friday, Oct. 15, for the opportunity to see both the men's and women's basketball teams in action for the first time at the 2010 Red Storm Tip-Off. The event, which aired as part of the live, four-hour "whip-around" Midnight Madness Special on ESPNU, featured live music from Harlem performing artist Ron Browz and New York City's own D.J. S&S – the D.J. of music and entertainment mogul Sean "Diddy" Combs.
- Hosted by ESPN SportsCenter anchor John Anderson and co-hosted by legendary Rucker Park emcee "E.J. Da Mayor," the event also featured scrimmages from both the men's and women's basketball teams, a dunk contest and a \$10,000 half-court shot. ESPN college basketball analyst Doug Gottlieb was also in attendance to provide live updates to the broadcast team of Jay Bilas, Hubert Davis, Andy Katz and Bram Weinstein back in the studio.
- The women's team was introduced first and treated fans to both a choreographed skit and a scrimmage.
- "Thank you everyone for being here tonight," said head coach Kim Barnes Arico. "We had a great run last year and we're back this season with a lot of talent and a lot of drive and we're excited to start playing. We have six nationally televised games and a game at The Garden against UConn. We're expecting big things this season. We've been practicing for about a week now, but tonight is about having a good time."
- After the men's team and coaching staff was introduced, head coach Steve Lavin took the microphone to address the crowd, which was on its feet chanting his name.
- "I want to start by expressing our genuine gratitude to everyone here tonight," Lavin began. "We are all overwhelmed by the turnout tonight and the support, the passion and the energy that is on display. Looking ahead to this season, it is imperative that we take the energy that's on display tonight and sustain it throughout the season so that we can continue to make the climb through this



floor and a .733 rate from the charity stripe. Swingman **D.J. Kennedy** is scoring 12.3 ppg in Garden games, firing at a .577 clip from the floor and a .714 rate from the line, while upperclass forward **Justin Burrell** is averaging 10.0 points on a 10-for-13 field goal effort thus far.

- St. John's head coach **Steve Lavin** is now 4-1 all-time at MSG, having participated in the 2000 Coaches vs. Cancer Classic as the head coach at UCLA before his appointment at St. John's. Lavin's No. 17 Bruins fell to No. 7 Kansas, 99-98, on Nov. 9, 2000, before topping No. 12 Kentucky, 97-92 in overtime, on Nov. 10. Lavin has also served as an analyst on close to 20 basketball broadcasts at The Garden, calling games in the Coaches vs. Cancer event, the NIT and the Jordan Brand Classic.
- All seven of St. John's victories over ranked teams since 2004-05 have come at Madison Square Garden: No. 13/13 Georgetown (Jan. 3, 2011; 61-58), No. 7/10 Notre Dame (Jan. 3, 2009; 71-65), No. 22/21 Notre Dame (Jan. 23, 2007; 71-68), No. 9 Pitt (Jan. 21, 2006; 55-50), No. 17/15 Louisville (Jan. 17, 2006; 68-56), No. 21 Pittsburgh (Jan. 18, 2005; 65-62) and No. 17 NC State (Dec. 20, 2004; 63-45).

Kings Of Queens

- Now in its 50th season, St. John's is 418-79 (.841) in 49-plus years at Carnesecca Arena, which underwent Phase III of its interior renovation in the summer of 2009 as part of the multi-phase upgrade to the facility. The installation of a new high-resolution video scoreboard and sound system, a refurbishing of the arena ceiling and the implementation of a new lighting system are among the series of changes Red Storm fans enjoyed in 2009-10. A new playing surface, an overhauled seating bowl with 800 chairback seats, and enhanced ticketing and lobby areas were among the improvements made for 2008-09.
- The building, constructed in 1961, was re-named for St. John's Hall of Fame coach **Lou Carnesecca** during the 2004-05 season.
- The Red Storm is 2-1 in Queens in 2010-11, scoring at a 71.3 points per game clip and limiting opponents to 64.7 ppg. Senior **D.J. Kennedy** is averaging 14.7 points and 5.3 rebounds on campus, while making 50.0 percent of his field goals and 40.0 percent of his 3-point attempts. Classmate **Justin Brownlee** is scoring 15.3 ppg this season at Carnesecca Arena with 4.7 boards. He is firing at a 56.3 percent rate from the field, is 3-for-4 from long distance and has hit 77.8 percent from the line.
- St. John's went 6-3 on campus last season, and posted the offensive and defensive numbers to show for it. The Red Storm scored an average of 68.3 points per game at Carnesecca Arena, while limiting opponents to 60.4 ppg. St. John's averaged 42.2 rebounds per game and outboarded its opponents by 8.1 caroms per contest. Kennedy (13.8 ppg, 46.5 percent field goals, 6.2 rebounds), **Dwight Hardy** (9.2 ppg), **Paris Horne** (8.9 ppg, 42.3 percent field goals), and Brownlee (8.6 ppg, 47.8 percent field goals) all enjoyed the comforts of home with high scoring averages at Carnesecca Arena.
- The Red Storm posted a 9-1 record in its on-campus venue in 2008-09, averaging 72.1 ppg on campus, while allowing opponents only 58.0 ppg. The Red Storm fired at a 45.1 percent clip from the field while limiting opponents to 39.2 percent shooting, and outrebounded its foes by an average of 41.9 to 31.2. **Paris Horne** averaged 13.4 ppg while shooting 45.8 percent from the field and 39.1 percent from 3-point range at the Red Storm's on-campus home, and grabbed 4.5 rebounds. Kennedy averaged 13.2 ppg and 6.4 boards in games on campus during the 2008-09 season.

Kennedy Finishes 2009-10 With Six BIG EAST Honor Roll Mentions

- St. John's junior forward **D.J. Kennedy** was named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll for the sixth time in 2009-10 on March 7, for pacing the Red Storm with a 25.5 points per game average to wrap up the regular season in road games at Syracuse and DePaul.
- For four straight weeks from Monday, Nov. 30, to Monday, Dec. 21, Kennedy had been named to the BIG EAST Honor Roll – becoming the first player in the conference to make four overall honor roll appearances. Honored again on Monday, Feb. 15, and then on Sunday, March 7, Kennedy's six mentions placed him in extremely elite company as he joined USF's first team All-BIG EAST selection Dominique Jones (three-time Player of the Week, four-time honor roll selection) as the only BIG EAST players honored as many times.
- Villanova's Scottie Reynolds (three-time Player of the Week, two-time honor roll selection) and Notre Dame's Luke Harangody (two-time Player of the Week, three-time honor roll selection) – also both All-BIG EAST first team selections – finished the season with five honors, while Marquette's Lazar Hayward, an All-BIG EAST second teamer, finished with four citations.

 On TV/Radio

- The BIG EAST Conference released the St. John's University men's basketball team's finalized schedule, complete with game times and television broadcast information, on Oct. 8. A total of 28 St. John's regular season matchups will appear on television.
- The Red Storm will appear in 14 nationally-televised games during the regular season, including late January/early February matchups with Duke and UCLA on CBS and nine additional games on the ESPN family of national networks (ESPN, ESPN2, ESPNU). In addition, STJ will make 13 appearances on New York regional sports networks (SNY, MSG, MSG Plus).
- For the third-straight season, St. John's men's basketball games will be carried on the Red Storm's powerful flagship station, Bloomberg Radio 1130-AM. Expert commentary will be provided by veteran broadcaster John Minko and former St. John's standout guard Tarik Turner. Any non-televised home game will be carried live by RedStormSports.com's subscription-based broadband Internet video service, StormTracker All-Access, with play-by-play announcer Ralph Bednarczyk on the call.
- The Lavin Era officially begins on the road and on national television, as St. John's will take on 2010 NCAA Tournament participant Saint Mary's (Calif.) at the Gaels' home in Moraga, Calif., on Tuesday, Nov. 16 at 2 a.m. E.T. The matchup is the second game as part of ESPN's third annual College Hoops Tip-Off Marathon, which features 12 live college basketball games in 24 consecutive hours on the network.
- St. John's plays 16 regular season home dates in all, with eight at Madison Square Garden, "The World's Most Famous Arena," and seven on campus at Carnesecca Arena, plus an exhibition contest against Westmont in Queens at 7 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 6. In all, St. John's could play 19 regular-season games against teams that participated in postseason tournaments in 2009-10 (NCAA – Duke, Georgetown, Louisville, Marquette, Notre Dame, Pitt, Saint Mary's, Syracuse, Villanova, West Virginia; NIT – Arizona State, Cincinnati, Connecticut, Northwestern, Seton Hall, USF).



Toppling The Top 25

- With a 61-58 victory over No. 13/13 Georgetown on Jan. 3, 2011, St. John's has now defeated seven teams ranked in the Top 25 since 2004-05.
- **ST. JOHN'S 61, NO. 13/13 GEORGETOWN 65 — Jan. 3, 2011 — Dwight Hardy** had 20 points — his sixth 20-point performance in seven games — to lead the Red Storm to its best BIG EAST start since 1999-2000. St. John's came into this game off two conference road wins and came up with another solid effort, especially on the defensive end. The Red Storm's constantly changing defenses, with a tendency toward zones most of the time, were so effective that Georgetown's three guards and leading scorers — Austin Freeman, Chris Wright and Jason Clark — were a combined 7-of-25 from the field — 2-of-13 on 3-pointers — and had a total of 20 points, 26.1 below their combined averages coming in.
- **ST. JOHN'S 71, NO. 7/10 NOTRE DAME 65 — Jan. 3, 2009 — STJ** used a total team effort in its Jan. 3 victory over No. 7/10 Notre Dame at Madison Square Garden. **D.J. Kennedy** recorded his fourth double-double of the season with 20 points and 10 boards (to go along with four assists), while **Paris Horne** scored 14 points and held Fighting Irish sharpshooter Kyle McAlarney in check to take home BIG EAST and MBWA Honor Roll accolades. Playing in his third game while wearing a protective face shield, big man **Justin Burrell** bullied his way to 18 points and six boards, while **Rob Thomas** provided a spark off the bench with 10 points and five boards (three offensive) in 18 minutes. St. John's shot 44.6 percent from the floor and 45.5 percent from long-distance in the win.
- **ST. JOHN'S 71, NO. 22/21 NOTRE DAME 68 — Jan. 23, 2007 — St. John's** had many heroes in its win over Notre Dame, beginning with then-senior Wooden and Naismith Award candidate **Lamont Hamilton**, who posted a 23-point, 12-rebound effort — the 17th double-double of his career and second in two games. Freshman Larry Wright capped off a game in which he posted then-career-highs in points (11), field goals (4-of-6), 3-pointers (3-of-4), steals (2) and minutes played (28) by drilling the winning long-range bucket with 10.4 seconds to play. Junior captain **Eugene Lawrence** contributed 13 points, seven assists and four boards, while **Anthony Mason Jr.** added nine and eight.
- **ST. JOHN'S 55, NO. 9/9 PITT 50 — Jan. 21, 2006 —** Against Pittsburgh at Madison Square Garden on Jan. 21, 2006, St. John's raced out to a 14-0 advantage and showed gritty defense and poise down the stretch to seal a 55-50 victory. Junior big man Hamilton tied a career-high with 24 points and added eight rebounds (six offensive) in the win. Lawrence scored 10 with five boards and four assists. That victory came on a day in which St. John's celebrated the legendary contributions of 10 individuals to its men's basketball program by conferring 'Basketball Legacy Honors' upon them and hanging permanent banners in Madison Square Garden to commemorate their tremendous athletic achievements.
- **ST. JOHN'S 68, NO. 17/15 LOUISVILLE 56 — Jan. 17, 2006 —** The Red Storm stunned No. 17/15 Louisville on Jan. 17, 2006, 68-56, using a total team effort by the time the final buzzer sounded. Lawrence scored the team's first 12 points en route to his game and then career-high 18. Hamilton scored 11 of his 15 and Mason Jr. contributed 12 of his 14 points in the second half. Mason Jr. completed his first career-double double, adding 11 rebounds (five offensive).
- **ST. JOHN'S 65, NO. 21 PITT 62 — Jan. 18, 2005 — Daryll Hill** scored 26 points, including three free throws in the final 25 seconds, and St. John's downed a ranked opponent with a 65-62 victory over No. 21 Pittsburgh on January 18. Hill only had three points over the final 15 minutes but they were enough to give the Red Storm the victory. St. John's opened the second half with a 16-6 run to take a 52-41 lead with 13:37 to play. Hamilton broke a STJ field goal drought with 5:15 to play, tying it at 56. Carl Krauser made two free throws with 1:39 to go to give Pittsburgh a 62-59 lead, and the Red Storm tied it for the last time on a three-point play by **Dexter Gray** with 48 seconds left.
- **ST. JOHN'S 63, NO. 17 NC STATE 45 — Dec. 30, 2004 —** The Red Storm had fans thinking of the glory days on Dec. 30, 2004, with a 63-45 thrashing of No. 17 NC State in the championship game of the Holiday Festival. It was St. John's 39th appearance in the annual tournament, and this was the 13th title — the last coming in 1996. The Red Storm led 27-10 at halftime and pulled away by holding the Wolfpack without a field goal for a 14-minute stretch. Hill had 19 points for the Red Storm and was selected the tournament's MVP, while Lawrence had 10 points and seven rebounds. The game marked the Red Storm's first win over a ranked team since a 72-71 victory over No. 6 Duke on March 2, 2003, at Madison Square Garden.

BIG EAST Holds Media Day, Kennedy Named Preseason 2nd Team

- St. John's head coach **Steve Lavin** was joined by Red Storm seniors **D.J. Kennedy**, **Paris Horne**, **Malik Boothe** and Special Assistant **Gene Keady** at the BIG EAST Conference's annual Men's Basketball Media Day on Wednesday, Oct. 20. More than 200 reporters from television stations, newspapers, magazines, radio stations and websites from around the country attended the event, held at Madison Square Garden in the Red Storm's hometown of New York City.
- Lavin and the Red Storm student-athletes were among the most-popular interview subjects as they discussed the upcoming season and touched upon a myriad of other BIG EAST and college basketball topics with reporters from the New York City area and the national media.
- St. John's was picked sixth in the 2010-11 preseason vote of the league's head coaches, earning 145 points and even one first place vote, and marking the highest preseason ranking for the Red Storm since 1999-2000, when the team was tabbed third. With 12 first-place votes and 222 total points, Pittsburgh was the favorite to win the regular-season title in the 2010-11 Preseason Coaches' Poll, followed closely by Villanova, which received 208 points.
- Georgetown senior Austin Freeman was named the BIG EAST Preseason Player of the Year, also voted upon by the league's head coaches. St. John's senior swingman Kennedy was named a Preseason All-BIG EAST Second Team member, marking the first Red Storm player to be selected to a preseason all-conference team since Daryll Hill in 2005-06.
- "Our program is pleased to be picked by the coaches to finish in the upper half of the rigorous BIG EAST Conference, yet we are also mindful that our team's success this season will be determined by taking a hardworking and pragmatic approach to improve in the areas of play that resulted in us finishing tied for 13th place last season," said Lavin. "We are clearly optimistic about the upcoming season and the present direction of our basketball program, but at the same fully recognize it will be an arduous task to climb the ladder of the BIG EAST. This is a senior class that has worked together, grown together and taken it on the chin together. So far, our team has been totally receptive to everything we've asked."

MORAGA, Calif. - Red Storm rookie Dwayne Polee II was dazzling with 16 points in his collegiate debut, but it was not enough as Clint Steindl scored a career-high 22 points, Matthew Dellavedova added 15 points and nine assists, and Saint Mary's beat St. John's 76-71 late Monday night in Steve Lavin's return to coaching.

Polee had 16 points for the Red Storm (0-1), making 6-of-16 field goals, drilling 2-of-5 3-point attempts, grabbing four boards, making four steals, swatting one shot and punctuating his line with a rip and run-out that resulted in a monster first-half jam. Senior floor general Malik Boothe scored a career-high 15 points, connecting on 5-of-8 field goals and splashing in 5-of-7 free throws. Malik Stith added 13 points, and Justin Burrell collected seven rebounds as the never-say-die Red Storm battled the Gaels until the absolute closing seconds.

Steindl, one of three returning starters from last season's surprising Saint Mary's team that reached the NCAA tournament round of 16, did nearly all his scoring from the perimeter. The 6-foot-7 forward, who had six 3-pointers in a season-opening win Friday against the College of Idaho, made five in the second half and seven overall for the Gaels (2-0).

St. Mary's led by as many as 13 in the second half, then held off a late surge by St. John's over the final 4 minutes. D.J. Kennedy made two free throws to pull the Red Storm within 54-47 with 3:15 remaining, but Mickey McConnell sank a 3-pointer and Dellavedova made eight free throws down the stretch.

Polee made a 3-pointer to give the Red Storm a 40-39 lead with 11:31 remaining, but Steindl answered with his fourth 3-pointer of the half. That sparked a 14-0 run by St. Mary's and gave the Gaels a 53-40 lead. The Red Storm made one more push and were within 68-62 on Stith's layup. STJ was forced to foul after that, however, and Dellavedova went 8-for-8 from the free throw line over the final 25 seconds. The St. John's offense managed only four free throws by Boothe over the final 5 minutes of the first half.

The Gaels, who beat College of Idaho by 44 points in their opener, pulled within 31-28 at halftime and then scored the first six points in the second half on two 3-pointers by Steindl.

QUEENS, N.Y. - Facing Columbia less than 39-hours after a grueling five-point loss at Saint Mary's, and having traveled 5,160 miles by air in the last 84 hours, it was only natural for the St. John's men's basketball team to feel even the slightest effects of jetlag. Trailing by four at the half, and being outrebounded by nine, the Red Storm players made adjustments and re-committed themselves to the glass to gut out a 79-66 victory - the first for head coach Steve Lavin on the St. John's sidelines.

Red Storm senior forward Justin Burrell had only two points - but what is marked as a common field goal at 6:31 in the scorebook signified much more. St. John's trailed by as many as six in the contest, but Burrell's monster second-half posterizing alley-oop slam from classmate Malik Boothe officially marked the end of the Red Storm's jetlag, ignited the crowd of 4,657 at Carnesecca Arena, and put the Red Storm up by 13.

Justin Brownlee scored St. John's first five points and a Paris Horne 3-pointer coupled with a Quincy Roberts jumper gave the Red Storm a 15-5 lead. After a Malik Stith 3-pointer, Brownlee added a long-range bucket before Stith splashed another trey to give St. John's its largest first half lead, 24-12 at the 10:17 mark. Columbia, however, went on a 14-2 run sparked by a trio of 3-pointers from Diami Starks to tie the game at 26-26. The Lions, which missed their first five 3-point attempts, closed out the half by converting eight of their next 10 attempts from beyond the arc to take a 39-35 lead into halftime.

Less than three minutes into the second half, the Red Storm used an 11-3 run to seize a 46-42 lead. The game stayed within four points over the next four minutes before the Red Storm took command with an 11-2 run that was capped off by a 3-pointer by Dwayne Polee II that gave STJ a 66-53 advantage.

D.J. Kennedy led the Red Storm with 18 points to go with six boards, two assists and three steals. Brownlee added a career-high 15 points and four boards, Stith had 11 points and Polee nearly posted double-double with 10 points and nine rebounds. Paris Horne enjoyed a solid night off the bench with eight points, four rebounds, two assists and three blocks.

St. John's outrebounded Columbia 41-40 and posted an impressive 16:8 assist-to-turnover ration in the win. The Red Storm also shot 45.5 percent from 3-point range, hitting 10-of-23 from long distance.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska - Playing at 2 a.m. Eastern time for the second time in its first three games and having already traveled 9,010 miles by air to begin the 2010-11 season doesn't seem to have drummed up enough intrigue for the Red Storm men's basketball team.

Adding to the unique start to the year, the St. John's men's basketball team was forced into overtime in its opening game of the 2010 Carrs/Safeway Great Alaska Shootout, eventually rallying in the extra session to post a 78-73 victory. Justin Brownlee poured in a career-best 20 points and forced the extra session with a game-tying bucket with 33 seconds in regulation. The Red Storm fired at a season-best 50.9 percent (28-for-55) from the field, helping head coach Steve Lavin improve to 13-4 all-time in overtime games.

St. John's (2-1) had to erase a 62-56 deficit with 2:15 left in regulation after sur-rendering a 13-point second-half lead. The Red Storm also got a big lift from senior wing D.J. Kennedy, who made all three of his 3-pointers and finished with 15 points and three assists.

The Red Storm also received a huge effort from Dwight Hardy, who had 14 points and dished five assists without a turnover. Hardy was 5-for-6 from the charity stripe in overtime and was 9-for-12 from the line in the contest. Paris Horne came off the bench to score 11, including five points in the extra session, as St. John's had four players in double-figures for the second-straight game.

After St. John's built a 47-34 lead with 14:24 left in regulation, the Cardinals went on a 22-4 tear over the next 10 minutes to take a 62-56 lead. Kennedy, however, sliced the deficit in half with a three-pointer at the 2-minute mark.

Ball State's Pierre Sneed split a pair of free throws to make it 63-59, but the Cardinals would not score for the remaining 97 seconds of regulation. Brownlee converted an offensive rebound with 1:14 on the clock and powered to the hoop for a soft layup to tie it 63-63 with 33 seconds showing. Ball State got the last shot of regulation, but an off-balance jumper from Davis came up short of the rim.

Brownlee and Horne began the overtime with back-to-back baskets to give St. John's the lead for good before Horne added a fastbreak layup with 56 seconds left made to give the Red Storm a 72-65 advantage.

ANCHORAGE, Alaska - St. John's used a tournament-record defensive effort and Dwight Hardy took home player of the game honors with an 11-point night as the Red Storm routed Drake, 82-39, in the semifinals of the Carrs/Safeway Great Alaska Shootout. St. John's, which held the Bulldogs to just 26.5 percent (13-for-49) shooting, allowed fewer than 40 points in a game for the first time since a 63-39 win against Columbia on Dec. 27, 2005.

Hardy, who was 4-for-7 from the floor, also added four rebounds, two assists, and one steal to help pace St. John's (3-1). He did all of his scoring in the first half of play.

Justin Brownlee scored a game-high 13 points to lead the squad in scoring for the second-straight game, while Sean Evans added a season-best 10 points to help the Red Storm advance to its first Shootout title game.

Aaron Hawley and Rayvonte Rice had 10 points apiece to lead Drake (2-2), but the pair could not help the Bulldogs avoid setting the record for fewest points scored in the 33-year history of the Shootout. The previous record occurred in 1984 when Illinois defeated Idaho State, 64-44.

Drake trailed just 22-17 midway through the first half, but the Red Storm proceeded to blitz the Bulldogs with 23-straight points to finish the stanza. St. John's, in fact, did not allow another Drake field goal until the 17:05 mark of the second half.

D.J. Kennedy and Justin Burrell each grabbed a game-high eight rebounds and Malik Boothe added eight points and six assists for St. John's, which shot a season-best 57.7 percent (30-for-52) from the floor.

QUEENS, N.Y. - Dwight Hardy scored a career-high 24 points and Justin Brownlee added 14, but it was not enough as St. John's had a five-game winning streak snapped by St. Bonaventure, 67-66. The Red Storm (5-2) and Bonnies (5-2) battled back-and-forth throughout the contest - and even saw five lead changes in the game's final 91 seconds - but Hardy's final attempt from the corner fell short before a crowd of 4,408 at Carnesecca Arena.

Hardy's last-second attempt came after St. Bonaventure big man Andrew Nicholson splashed in a 19-foot jumper with 5.2 seconds remaining. The Johnnies held the Bonnies' preseason Atlantic-10 first team selection to two first-half points, but his totals of 19 points and 13 boards helped St. Bonaventure to a 41-30 advantage on the glass, and eventually, the win.

St. John's made 14 steals, caused 19 Bonnie turnovers and scored 21 points off of the miscues, but was plagued at the free throw line with a 50 percent effort. The Red Storm entered the contest ranked second among the nation's best ballhandling teams with an average of only 9.5 turnovers per game, and kept with the trend by committing only eight miscues on the night.

Hardy scored St. John's first five points of the first half, and a fast break dunk from Brownlee capped a 13-0 run that gave the Red Storm a 13-2 lead with 15:13 remaining. The Bonnies, however, answered with a seven minute, 15-4 run of their own to tie the game at 17-17. After a pair of treys from Ogo Adegbeye and a 3-pointer from Michael Davenport gave St. Bonaventure a lead at 28-25, a Hardy shot from long range opened up an 8-3 run that closed out the frame and gave the Red Storm a 33-31 halftime advantage.

An early second-half spurt keyed by Hardy gave St. John's a 10-point lead at 47-37 with 10:02 to play, but Nicholson came alive for the Bonnies after the ensuing timeout. With the Bonnies holding a one-point lead with 1:31 to go, a Paris Horne (six points) transition steal and feed to D.J. Kennedy (six points) put the Red Storm up, 64-63. The Bonnies went up again after a pair of free throws by Da'Quan Cook, but Hardy was able to get a left-handed lay-up to fall with 29 seconds left. That set the stage for Nicholson's long jumper, avenging a one-point loss at the hands of the Red Storm from Nov. 17, 2009, in Rochester, N.Y.

NEW YORK - Sometimes a team just needs a gritty, gut-check win, and that's what St. John's gave head coach Steve Lavin in his first victory at Madison Square Garden as the Red Storm's head coach. STJ overcame a three-point half-time deficit by battling defensively and putting forth a mighty second-period effort on the glass, and the result was a 62-57 victory over Davidson on Monday night in the opening round of the MSG Holiday Festival.

Neither team had a field goal over the final five minutes and both teams combined for three points over that span. Those all came on free throws by Dwight Hardy over the final 16.8 seconds. It was the Red Storm's persistence on the glass - a 21-7 advantage in the second half and a 31-25 margin overall - that may have made the difference.

Brendan McKillop scored 15 of his 17 points in the second half - all on 3-pointers - for Davidson, which lost to Cornell in the first round of the Festival last year, and Jake Cohen had 14 points and eight rebounds.

Davidson led, 27-24, at halftime and neither team was able to mount any kind of run as they answered every big basket with one of their own.

St. John's led, 59-57, and J.P. Kuhlman missed a 3 for Davidson with 53 seconds to play. Hardy then missed a 3-pointer with 20 seconds left but Justin Brownlee grabbed the offensive rebound and Davidson was forced to foul. Hardy made one of two for the 60-57 lead and Davidson had a chance to tie.

McKillop's 3-point attempt with seven seconds left went around the rim and out and Hardy was fouled, making the two free throws for the final margin.

NEW YORK - Since his introductory news conference in March, first-year head coach Steve Lavin has spoke of incremental progress for his upperclass squad, which though checks in as one of the nation's veteran teams with 10 seniors, has never reached the NCAA Tournament or finished in the BIG EAST's upper echelon. Just before Christmas in the Madison Square Garden Holiday Festival, Lavin's team may have made another major breakthrough.

St. John's (7-3) once again shined in the second half, using solid defense versatile scoring, and earning a 85-69 victory over previously-unbeaten Northwestern in the championship game of the Holiday Festival - its 15th overall in 45 appearances, and the first since 2005.

Dwight Hardy scored 24 points and Justin Brownlee added a career-high 21 as St. John's shot 80 percent from the field in the second half to hand the Wildcats their first loss of the season.

John Shurna had 28 points and Drew Crawford added 17 for the Wildcats (8-1), who were trying to match their best start since 1993-94. They entered the game as one of the last nine unbeaten teams in Division I.

The Red Storm, whose last of 15 Festival titles was in 2005, won their second in-season tournament. Brownlee had his then-career-high of 20 points in the championship game win over Arizona State at the Great Alaska Shootout. It is the first time St. John's has won two in-season tournaments since Hall of Fame coach Lou Carnesecca led the then-Redmen to wins in the Lapchick Memorial and the Cougar Classic. Brownlee was named MVP of both of the tournaments.

Northwestern led 40-37 at halftime and it didn't take long for the Red Storm to start hitting almost everything they threw at the basket. St. John's hit eight of its first 10 shots from the field with a side jumper by Polee giving the Red Storm a 54-51 lead with 11:49 to play. They kept shooting — they finished 16 of 20 from the field in the second half, and the lead kept growing.

Justin Burrell, who finished with a season-high 17 points, made it 75-62 with 2:56 left and most of the crowd of 5,583 started celebrating the win.

MORGANTOWN, W. Va. - St. John's shot a season-high 61.0 percent (25-for-41) from the floor, Dwight Hardy scored a game-high 20 points and D.J. Kennedy recorded his 11th career double-double (17 points, 11 rebounds) as the Red Storm defeated West Virginia, 81-71, in the BIG EAST opener for each team, and the first league win of the Steve Lavin Era.

Defeating the Mountaineers in Morgantown for the first time since an 80-68 triumph on Feb. 9, 1999, St. John's (8-3, 1-0 BIG EAST) also shot 76.9 percent (30-for-39) from the charity stripe and grabbed a 37-27 rebounding advantage to start 1-0 in BIG EAST play for the first time since the 2006-07 season. The game also marked West Virginia's first home loss since Feb. 8 against Villanova.

Twice in the second half, West Virginia (8-3, 0-1 BIG EAST) – the defending BIG EAST champion and a 2010 Final Four participant – cut the Red Storm's lead to three points, but both times Justin Brownlee came up with a big bucket to slow down the Mountaineers' momentum.

St. John's, which led 61-53 with 6:48 in regulation, used an 8-2 run to open up its largest lead of the game, 69-55, with 2:58 remaining.

After shooting 50.0 percent (12-for-24) in the opening stanza, St. John's fired at a 76.5 percent clip (13-for-17) in the second frame. The Mountaineers also had a hard time stopping St. John's in transition, as the Red Storm scored 10 points off fast breaks and dominated in the paint, outscoring the Mountaineers 40-6.

West Virginia hoisted up 22 3-pointers in the first half and made seven treys, while the Red Storm used a balanced attack to take a 34-28 advantage at half-time.

Brownlee finished with 17 points for St. John's, while Justin Burrell was also in double figures with 13 points.

Kevin Jones led the way for West Virginia, scoring 17 points. Truck Bryant added 14 and Casey Mitchell and Jonnie West had 12 apiece.

PROVIDENCE, R.I. - Pretty wins some nights, gritty wins others - it's all added up to a four-game win streak, two-straight road victories, a 2-0 BIG EAST mark and a share of first place in the league standings after two contests for the first time since the 1999-2000 season for first-year coach Steve Lavin and St. John's.

The Red Storm certainly had to pull a victory out of "Column B" on Saturday night in Providence, as Dwight Hardy scored 21 points, Justin Brownlee contributed 14 with a game-high nine boards and Justin Burrell added 13 as St. John's posted a 67-65 victory over the Friars at Dunkin' Donuts Center.

However, in two crucial late moments, a different hero emerged for the Red Storm. Senior sparkplug Paris Horne first hit a wide-open corner 3-pointer with the score tied and 28 seconds left, and then drew an offensive foul.

St. John's (9-3, 2-0) kept Providence (11-4, 0-2) off the board until the game's fifth minute, but the Friars then put together a 10-0 run capped by an alley-oop pass launched three-quarters of the court from Vincent Council to Brooks.

St. John's responded with a 16-2 run and made 14 of its 28 attempts from the field in the first half, shooting 50 percent to Providence's 32.1 percent (9-of-28). The Red Storm entered halftime with a 28-24 advantage, Providence's worst first-half total of the season.

St. John's continued its sharp shooting in the second half, and 11 points in three minutes from Hardy put the Red Storm up by as many 12.

Red Storm turnovers then resulted in 10 straight Friar points in less than two minutes, giving Providence a one-point lead with four minutes to play.

The Red Storm outshot the Friars 52.7 percent (29-of-55) to 43.9 percent (25-of-57) for the game and held a narrow rebounding advantage, 31-29. St. John's also ruled the paint for the second-straight game, this time for a 48-32 scoring advantage.

The Red Storm snapped a long losing streak at West Virginia to open the BIG EAST season and it became the first conference team to reach 3-0 this season when it beat No. 13 Georgetown, 61-58, on Monday night at Madison Square Garden.

That win, St. John's fifth-straight overall, ended a 14-game losing streak to ranked teams. The Red Storm's last win over a ranked team was two years ago to the day over Notre Dame.

Dwight Hardy had 20 points — his sixth 20-point performance in STJ's last seven games — to lead the Red Storm (10-3, 3-0), which is off to its best BIG EAST start since 1999-2000 when it opened 4-0. St. John's came into this game off two conference road wins and came up with another solid effort, especially on the defensive end.

The Red Storm's constantly changing defenses, with a tendency toward zones most of the time, were so effective that Georgetown's three guards and leading scorers — Austin Freeman, Chris Wright and Jason Clark — were a combined 7-of-25 from the field — 2-of-13 on 3-pointers — and had a total of 20 points, 26.1 below their combined averages coming in.

It was Georgetown's second-lowest point total of the season. The Hoyas had 55 points in losing the BIG EAST opener last week to Notre Dame.

Hollis Thompson had 16 points for the Hoyas (12-3, 1-2), who had won four of their last five and came into this game as the BIG EAST's best 3-point shooting team (40.3 percent) but were just 4-of-17 against St. John's, including missing seven of eight in the second half.
