Storylines

- ♦ Notre Dame takes on its first ranked opponent of the 2005-06 season when No. 24/21 USC comes to town for a Sunday matinee at the Joyce Center (2 p.m. ET tipoff).
- The Irish also will be looking to venture into uncharted territory in the program's history. Notre Dame has never posted 4-0 starts in consecutive seasons during its 29-year history (the Irish went 7-0 to start last year).

o. 13/15 Notre Dame will put its 3-0 record and national ranking to the test when it welcomes No. 24/21 USC (2-1) to the Joyce Center Sunday for a 2 p.m. (ET) intersectional matchup. It's the opener of a brief two-game homestand for the Irish, who will then be away from the Joyce Center for most of the month of December.

Notre Dame earned its third consecutive victory to start this season by downing Indiana, 74-61 on Wednesday in Bloomington. The Irish led dodged foul trouble throughout the game, and used a 19-6 game-ending run to battle past the pesky Hoosiers. Senior guard Megan Duffy scored a career-high 26 points, including 13 in the final eight minutes, for Notre Dame.

- Notre Dame is 13th in the latest Associated Press poll and 15th in the latest ESPN/USA Today poll.
- USC is 24th in the latest Associated Press poll and 21st in the latest ESPN/USA Today poll.

Setting The Standard

Under the guidance of 19th-year head coach Muffet McGraw, Notre Dame has evolved into one of the country's leading women's basketball powers. The Irish have appeared in 12 NCAA Tournaments and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16 six times in the past nine years. Notre Dame also has reached the NCAA Women's Final Four twice, winning college basketball's ultimate prize with the 2001 national championship.

In its history, Notre Dame has developed eight All-Americans, eight WNBA players (including five draft picks in the past five years) and four USA Basketball veterans (eight medals won). Now in their 29th season in 2005-06, the Irish own an all-time record of 578-254 (.695).

A Quick Look At The Fighting Irish

Balance and chemistry will be the two main ingredients as Notre Dame looks to build upon last year's successful 27-6 season that saw the Irish win the Preseason WNIT, rise to No. 3 in the national polls and advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

With the graduation of 2004-05 BIG EAST Player of the Year and All-America forward Jacqueline Batteast, as well as rugged and dependable center Teresa Borton, Notre Dame will have a large infusion of youth on its roster, as eight of its 12 players are underclassmen (four freshmen, four sophomores). However, the team is in more than capable hands, as senior point guard and two-time captain Megan Duffy returns to run the Irish offense. Duffy spent the summer as a co-captain on the USA World University Games Team that won a gold medal and went unbeaten in Izmir, Turkey, and she hopes to use the lessons she learned on the international stage to help her take the Irish to grand heights in 2005-06.

After being ranked anywhere from 15th to 22nd in preseason polls released by various media outlets, Notre Dame has risen to No. 13 in this week's Associated Press poll, and was 15th in the current ESPN/USA Today coaches' poll.

The balance the Irish have sought this season has been evident at times during the team's first three victories this season vs. Michigan (55-45). Western Michigan (71-68) and Indiana (74-61). Notre Dame has had three double-figure scorers in each game and six of the nine players who have seen action have scored in double digits in

at least one of the three outings thus far. What's more, eight players are averaging at least 16 minutes of action per night.

Duffy has been a strong all-around contributor for Notre Dame during its first two games. The veteran floor general is averaging a teambest 16.0 points, 5.0 assists and 3.3 steals per game, while tying for fourth on the squad with 4.0 rebounds per contest. Although she was held to three points in the season opener vs. Michigan, Duffy found other ways to help her team win, coming up with eight assists, four steals and four rebounds in 39 minutes. She has regained her scoring touch in the past two games, averaging 22.5 ppg. in those two wins, including a careerhigh 26 points Wednesday at Indiana (13 of those coming in the final eight minutes.

Freshman guard Lindsay Schrader also has shown tremendous promise during the first week of the season. The former McDonald's All-American was tapped as the BIG EAST Freshman of the Week on Monday, after averaging 10.5 points and 9.5 rebounds per game in her first two college games, both starts. She turned in an impressive 10-point, 14-rebound effort in her debut outing against Michigan, becoming just the second player in school history (first since 1979) to record a double-double in her first game. Schrader leads the team in rebounding (7.7 rpg.) and is third in scoring (9.3 ppg.).

Sophomore guard Charel Allen, who is still working her way back to full strength after surgery to repair a torn ACL suffered in last spring's NCAA Tournament, showed little sign of her injury against Michigan, coming off the bench to drop in a game-high 16 points, including 12 in the second half. She is second on the team in scoring (10.3 ppg.) and third in rebounding (4.7 rpg). Meanwhile, junior guard Breona Gray (8.7 ppg.), also recovering from off-season knee surgery, played a pivotal role in Wednesday's win at Indiana with 14 points.

Potent Notables About The Fighting Irish

- Notre Dame's No. 13 ranking in the latest Associated Press poll represents the 21st consecutive appearance for the Irish in that survey, dating back to the start of the 2004-05 season. All told, Notre Dame has appeared in 130 Associated Press polls since the balloting debuted 30 years ago, with their first AP ranking (No. 25) coming on Dec. 31, 1990.
- The Irish have won 55 of their last 58 nonconference home games, dating back to the 1994-95 season. All three of the

losses in that span have come against Big Ten Conference opponents (Wisconsin in 1996, Purdue in 2003, Michigan State in 2004).

The Irish defense continues to be its calling card. In each of the past six sea-

On game days, no interviews will be granted with any Notre Dame player or coach prior to competition.

Credentials / Parking

which ranked as the third-lowest opponent scoring average in school history and second-best of the Muffet McGraw era (55.8 ppg. in 2000-01). Thus far in 2005-06, the Irish are allowing opponents to score just 58.0 ppg.

- The Irish have posted 37 wins over top 25 opponents in the past seven seasons (1998-99 to present), an average of more than five per year. In each of the past two years, Notre Dame has set a school record with seven regular-season wins over ranked opponents. Last year, the Irish were 7-5 against teams appearing in one of the two major national polls, including a 5-2 mark at the Joyce Center.
- Following last week's season opener vs. Michigan, the Irish have welcomed crowds of 5,000 or more fans to 66 of their last 68 home games. The only two blemishes on that mark came in the semifinals and finals of last year's Preseason WNIT, because tickets for those games could not be included in the Notre Dame season ticket package and had to be purchased separately.
- Senior guard Megan Duffy was named a preseason All-American by three sources, has been cited on the preseason watch lists for both the State Farm/WBCA Wade Trophy and the John R. Wooden Women's Award, and most recently was tabbed as one of the top five point guards in the nation by ESPN.com. Duffy also was a preseason all-BIG EAST Conference selection, following up her first-team all-league citation last year.
- With a 55-45 victory over Michigan on Nov. 18, Irish head coach Muffet McGraw became the 27th coach in NCAA Division I women's basketball history to reach the 500-win mark. She also is the 10th Division I coach to earn her 500th victory prior to age

A Quick Look At USC

After entering last season with a new head coach and unknown potential, USC certainly won't be sneaking up on anyone this time around. The Women of Troy went 20-11 last year, their first 20-win campaign since 1996-97, and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, where they dropped a last-second two-point loss to eventual national runner-up Michigan State.

The core of that groundbreaking team returns for USC this season, with 10 letterwinners and three starters back in the fold. Thus, it's no wonder the Women of Troy were ranked in nearly every national preseason poll (as high as 10th by *Sports Illustrated*), and why they're currently appearing in both the Associated Press (24th) and ESPN/USA Today (21st) rankings.

USC (2-1) opened its season by winning the Waikiki Beach Marriott Classic in Honolulu with wins over Hawaii (80-71) and Eastern Illinois (68-53). However, the Women of Troy come into South Bend with a bit of a chip on their shoulders, having been upset at Long Beach State, 51-46 on Wednesday night. Sunday's game at Notre Dame is the last of a season-open-

ing four-game road trip that covers three time zones and eight days. Following the matchup with the Irish, USC returns home for seven of its next eight contests, highlighted by a battle with fourth-ranked Ohio State on Dec. 11.

Junior guard **Eshaya (Shay) Murphy** has paced the Women of Troy in scoring so far this season, averaging 15.3 points per game, including a season-high 17 points in the win over Eastern Illinois. She also is second on the team in rebounding (7.0 rpg.) and steals (3.3 spg.), part of a USC defense that is forcing 23.3 turnovers per night with 15.3 of those coming on Trojan steals.

Speedy sophomore guard **Camille LeNoir** is second on the USC roster in scoring (13.0 ppg.) and tops in assists (4.3 apg.) and three-point percentage (.571, 4-7). Junior center **Chloe Kerr**, a Midwest native originally from Bolingbrook, Ill., is chipping in with nearly a double-double thus far (11.3 ppg., 9.3 rpg.).

One player currently missing from the Women of Troy stat sheet is sophomore guard **Brynn Cameron**. The sharpshooter who set a school record with 72 three-pointers last season and was ranked 25th nationally with a .409 three-point ratio, had off-season hip surgery and her road to recovery has been slow. She is not expected to play against Notre Dame.

Mark Trakh is in his second season as the head coach at USC, following a successful 11-year run at Pepperdine and a 13-year tenure at Brea (Calif.) Olinda High School. He has a college coaching record of 221-135 (.621), including a 22-12 (.647) mark at USC, and his teams have reached the postseason the past seven seasons (four NCAA, three WNIT).

Trakh is 0-1 all-time against Notre Dame, following last year's 60-56 Irish win in Los Angeles. Sunday will be the first time he has brought one of his teams to the Joyce Center.

The Notre Dame-USC Series

This weekend's game between Notre Dame and USC represents the eighth meeting in the series, with the Irish holding a 6-1 edge (3-0 at the Joyce Center). It's also the seventh consecutive season that Notre Dame has faced the Women of Troy, with the home-and-home series starting in 1999-2000.

The teams actually met for the first time back on Jan. 2, 1985 in Fullerton, Calif., with USC coming away on top, 69-53. However, although the schools are regular rivals in football, they wouldn't tangle on the hardwood for another 14 years.

Once the series resumed in 1999 (a 74-59 Notre Dame win in South Bend), the Irish have held the upper hand, winning in each of the past six seasons, although every game was closely-contested. Their most recent encounter on Nov. 26, 2004, in Los Angeles, was the closest since the series picked up again, with Notre Dame shading the Women of Troy, 60-56.

The Last Time Notre Dame And USC Met

Jacqueline Batteast scored a game-high 18 points as Notre Dame overcame a sluggish performance to down USC, 60-56 on Nov. 26, 2004 at the Los Angeles Sports Arena. Megan Duffy added 12 points for the Irish, while Crystal

Erwin, a native of Rancho Cucamonga, Calif., enjoyed a solid homecoming with nine points on 4-of-5 shooting.

USC had three players in double figures, led by Jamie Funn's 13 points. Kim Gipson chipped in with 12 points, as did Eshaya (Shay) Murphy off the bench.

Notre Dame's defense was the story in the first half, as the Irish held the Women of Troy to 29 percent shooting and opened up a 29-20 lead. However, that edge quickly evaporated in the early moments of the second half, as USC used an 18-5 run to take a four-point lead with 13:22 to play.

The Women of Troy nudged their advantage to 45-40 at the 8:04 mark before Notre Dame came back with a 10-0 run, with Batteast contributing two layups to help put her team back in front. USC got back within 54-51 on a layup by Funn with 36 seconds remaining, but Duffy and Charel Allen combined to go 6-for-6 at the free throw line in the final half minute to preserve the win. The final margin turned out to be slightly closer, thanks to USC's Camille LeNoir, who threw in a shot from mid-court at the horn.

The Last Time Notre Dame And USC Met **At The Joyce Center**

Jacqueline Batteast had a double-double with 20 points and 13 rebounds and Notre Dame used a sturdy defensive effort in the first half to post a 73-62 victory over USC on Dec. 22, 2003 at the Joyce Center.

The Irish forced the Women of Troy into 15 turnovers during the first 20 minutes and ended the period on a 15-2 run to open up a 36-18 halftime lead. USC came back in the second half and trimmed the deficit to 11 points by the final horn, shooting an even 50 percent in the frame.

Notre Dame wound up outscoring the Women of Troy in the paint by a 52-28 count and also tallied 30 points off USC turnovers. Meghan Gnekow led the visitors with a career-high 20 points, including 15 in the second half.

Other Notre Dame-USC Series Tidbits

- Notre Dame has two California residents - senior forward Courtney LaVere (Ventura, Calif./Buena HS) and junior forward Crystal Erwin (Rancho Cucamonga, Calif./St. Paul HS) - on its roster. LaVere and Erwin are only the fourth and fifth Notre Dame players ever to come from California, joining Christy Grady (Lodi, Calif.), Kristin Knapp (Santa Barbara, Calif.) and Mickey Skieresz (Westlake Village, Calif.). Grady actually spent much of her tenure at Notre Dame as a student manager, but was pressed into service late in the 1996-97 season when injuries decimated the Irish roster.
- Although Notre Dame sophomore guard Tulyah Gaines graduated from Cheyenne High School in North Las Vegas, Nev., she spent much of her formative years in southern California, spending her first three prep seasons at John Burroughs High School in

championships in women's volleyball. She is winding down her 14th season with the Irish, piloting them to a 28-3 record, a No. 7 national ranking, and their ninth BIG EAST Conference Tournament title in 11 years. Her team will make its 14th consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance next week. Brown also is a five-time BIG EAST Coach of the Year (1995, 2000, 2001, 2003, 2005) and she received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in January 2003.

Notre Dame is 19-13 (.594) all-time against California schools, including an 8-3 (.727) record at the Joyce Center.

Notre Dame vs. The Pac-10 Conference

The Irish are 16-15 (.516) all-time against Pac-10 Conference teams,

although their record is a bit better at home (8-3, .727). Notre Dame also has won 13 of its last 16 games against Pac-10 schools since a 93-72 loss to UCLA in the opening round of the 1992 NCAA Tournament.

Last season, Notre Dame went 2-1 against the Pac-10, defeating both of its regular-season opponents (USC 60-56; Washington 72-58).

With Notre Dame's 55-45 victory over Michigan on Nov. 18, head coach **Muffet McGraw** became the 27th women's basketball coach in NCAA Division I history to reach the 500-win mark. McGraw now has a career record of 502-196 (.719) in 24 years of coaching, including 19 seasons at Notre Dame (414-155, .728).

Lindsay Schrader Named BIG EAST Freshman Of The Week

Freshman guard **Lindsay Schrader** (Bartlett, III./Bartlett HS) was selected as the BIG EAST Conference Freshman of the Week, the league office announced Monday. Schrader is the 10th different Irish women's basketball player to earn the award since Notre Dame joined the BIG EAST for the 1995-96 season, and she is the first Notre Dame rookie honoree since current sophomore guard **Charel Allen** (Monessen, Pa./Monessen HS) was chosen on Feb. 7, 2005.

Schrader tipped off her college career in grand fashion this past weekend, averaging 10.5 points and 9.5 rebounds per game while starting twice as the Irish defeated Michigan (55-45) and Western Michigan (71-68). In the season opener against the Wolverines, the former McDonald's All-American collected 10 points and 14 rebounds, becoming just the second player in school history to register a double-double in her collegiate debut (and the first to do so since the program elevated to Division I status in 1980). Shari Matvey is the only other Irish cager to pull off that feat, amassing 21 points and 14 rebounds in a win over Marion College on Nov. 30, 1979 in the Taylor Invitational at Upland, Ind. Schrader's 14 rebounds vs. Michigan also were the most by a Notre Dame player in nearly three years, dating back to Jacqueline Batteast's 18-rebound day at Connecticut on Feb. 23, 2003.

Two days later at Western Michigan, Schrader logged 11 points and five rebounds as the Irish won their road opener for the seventh time in the past eight seasons. She also played a key role in her team's second half effort, scoring seven points in the final 20 minutes.

Game #3 Recap: Indiana

Notre Dame senior guard **Megan Duffy** had seen enough.

After watching the Irish struggle for nearly 30 minutes, Duffy decided to put away unranked Indiana by herself.

She scored 12 of her career-high 26 points in the final 10 minutes and teamed with sophomore guard **Charel Allen** during a decisive five-minute stretch midway through the second half to lead No. 13 Notre Dame to a 74-61 victory Wednesday night at Assembly Hall in Bloomington, Ind.

Notre Dame (3-0) won its third game in six days and its third straight in the series between the in-state rivals, who had not met since Dec. 11, 1996.

Foul trouble made it tough for the Irish right from the start. Sophomore center **Melissa D'Amico** played only nine minutes Wednesday, while junior forward **Crystal Erwin** managed only 21 minutes.

The Irish also lost sophomore guard **Tulyah Gaines** with a sprained right ankle 2:15 into the contest. Gaines did not return and coach **Muffet McGraw** said it was doubtful Gaines would play Sunday against USC.

So Duffy had to do more than usual. Besides setting up teammates **Breona Gray** and Allen for open shots, Duffy hit 8-of-15 shots including 3-of-6 from 3-point range and rallied the Irish from a 51-47 deficit with 10:42 left.

Gray, who replaced Gaines, finished with 14 points while Allen added 11, and the Irish shot 66.7 percent from the field in the second half to pull away.

Despite playing most of the first half without starters Cyndi Valentin and Angela Hawkins, Indiana (0-2) still was in position late to upset a ranked opponent for the first time since Jan. 12, 2003.

Jenny DeMuth, who has torn the ACL in her left knee twice in the last 13 months, finished with 20 points and 11 rebounds and kept Indiana close. Freshman Whitney Thomas added 14 points and 12 rebounds.

Notre Dame used a 15-4 run midway through the first half to build a 32-23 lead, but DeMuth led Indiana back.

The Hoosiers closed to 36-32 at the half, then went on a 15-4 spurt early in the second half to take a 51-47 lead.

Allen responded with a driving layup, set up by a nifty pass from Duffy, then pumped her fist. Allen's teammates took the cue, scoring two more baskets to reclaim the lead.

Then Duffy got started. She hit back-to-back three-pointers to break a 55-55 tie, and her solid shooting and decision-making never allowed Indiana to challenge again.

Noting The Indiana Win

- Notre Dame starts the season 3-0 for the second consecutive season and third time in the past four seasons.
- The Irish move to 6-3 all-time against Indiana, including a 3-1 record in Bloomington.
- Notre Dame has won its last three games at Assembly Hall and has a series-long threegame winning streak.
- The 13-point margin of victory represents the first time in the nine-game series between the Irish and Hoosiers that a game was decided by double figures.
- Notre Dame registers its second win in as many games against a Big Ten Conference opponent this season (also the second year in a row the Irish have earned two Big Ten wins); it's also the first win for Notre Dame on the campus of a Big Ten school since Nov. 22 and 24, 2001, when the Irish downed #19 Wisconsin (83-56) and #6 Georgia (75-73) at UW's Kohl Center to win the Coaches vs. Cancer Challenge.
- Notre Dame now is 9-5 (.643) all-time in its final game before Thanksgiving, including a 7-3 (.700) record since 1996, when the Irish regularly began opening their season prior to the holiday.
- Notre Dame's .549 field goal percentage is its best since Feb. 26, 2005, when the Irish connected at a .582 clip (32-of-55) in a Senior Day victory over West Virginia at the Joyce Center.
- Senior All-America guard Megan Duffy pumped in a career-high 26 points, one more than her previous best of 25, which she set in an 82-64 win over Wisconsin on Dec. 4.

- 2003 at the Joyce Center; it's also the most points for an Irish player since Jacqueline Batteast had 27 points at Marquette on Dec. 19, 2004.
- Almost lost in the shuffle, Duffy have five assists and no turnovers while playing all 40 minutes, her first turnover-free complete game since Jan. 9, 2005 at Villanova, when she had seven assists and no giveaways in a 59-54 upset loss to the Wildcats.
- With her five assists, Duffy eased past Jeannine Augustin into sixth place on Notre Dame's career assist list with 391 (Augustin had 387 from 1994-97).
- Junior guard Breona Gray came off the bench to score 14 points, her eighth career double-figure scoring game and highest point production since a career-best 17 points against Syracuse on Jan. 5, 2005 at the Joyce Center.
- Senior forward Courtney LaVere reached two personal milestones — her first basket (a jumper with 8:16 left in the first half) pushed her over the 900-point mark for her career (now at 905); LaVere also had two blocked shots, giving her an even 100 blocks for her career and making her the eighth player in school history to reach that landmark.

A Double Cheeseburger For Schrader

A 2005 McDonald's All-America selection who played in that elite all-star game back in March on her new home floor at the Joyce Center, freshman guard **Lindsay Schrader** felt right at home from the first moment she stepped into the historic venue, scoring nine points in that contest.

As if there was any doubt about her abilities, Schrader put them all to rest in Friday's season-opening win vs. Michigan, rolling up a double-double (10 points, 14 rebounds) in her first college game, which she started. Schrader is just the second Notre Dame player ever to record a double-double in her debut contest, and the first Irish player to do so since the program elevated to Division I status in 1980-81 (ND was a Division III program for its first three seasons). The only other career-opening double-double by a Notre Dame freshman came from Shari Matvey, who had 21 points and 14 rebounds in a 68-60 conquest of Marion on Nov. 30, 1979 at the Taylor Invitational in Upland, Ind.

Duffy Rakes In Preseason Honors

Senior guard **Megan Duffy** (Dayton, Ohio) already has found her name on preseason candidate lists for two of the top national player-of-the-year trophies this season. The 5-foot-7 floor general is among 25 early candidates for the State Farm/WBCA Wade Trophy, and she is on the 30-player watch list for the John R. Wooden Women's Award. It's the first time in Duffy's career she has been placed under consideration for either award, and it marks the third consecutive season a Notre Dame player has made both preseason candidate list (Jacqueline Batteast was chosen prior to the 2003-04 and 2004-05 campaigns).

Besides the Wade Trophy and Wooden Women's Award, Duffy is a prime candidate for

The University of Notre Dame ranks among the top three Division I-A institutions in five major student-athlete graduation rate categories - overall, football, men, women and African-American - according to statistics released in October 2004 by the NCAA.

The federally-mandated '04 NCAA Graduation Rates Report, the 14th-such survey issued by the Association, covers students who enrolled between '94 and '97 at Division I institutions, including 117 in Division I-A. The NCAA bases graduation rates on the raw percentage of student-athletes who entered an institution and graduated within six years. Students who leave or transfer, regardless of academic standing, are considered non-graduates.

Among student-athletes who completed all four years of academic eligibility at Notre Dame, 99 percent earned their degrees. The national average was 84 percent.

Using the NCAA formula, Notre Dame graduated a four-year average of 87 percent of its student-athletes, second only to Duke University at 90 percent, and tied with Stanford and Northwestern Universities. The national average for Division I-A schools was 61 percent.

In August 2003, the NCAA presented an Academic Achievement Award to Notre Dame for its best-in-thenation one-year graduation rate of 92 percent for all student-athletes who enrolled in 1996.

Notre Dame graduated 94 percent of its female student-athletes, which ranks third nationally behind only Northwestern and Duke.

Academic All-Americans

Entering the 2005-06 academic year, Notre Dame ranks second in the nation with 158 Academic All-America® selections, including six last year. The Academic All-America® Program is administered by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA), whose membership votes on the award winners, and the program is sponsored this year by ESPN The Magazine.

The Notre Dame women's basketball program has produced four Academic All-America® honorees in its 29-year history, with those four players winning a total of six citations. In addition, two-time first-team Academic All-America® pick Ruth Riley was tapped as the 2001 Academic All-America® Women's Basketball Team Member of the Year, as well as the Academic All-America® Team Member of the Year. The latter award encompasses all sports and placed Riley ahead of such notables as Shane Battier (Duke). Riley also is one of only 10 student-athletes in Notre Dame history to earn All-American and Academic All-America® honors twice in her career.

Current senior guard Megan Duffy is poised to become the latest Irish women's basketball player to earn Academic All-America® recognition. Duffy was a secondteam Academic All-District V selection in 2004-05 and currently holds a 3.508 grade-point average (GPA) as a double major in psychology and computer applications in Notre Dame's College of Arts and Letters. She also has garnered Dean's List honors the past three semesters (spring 2004, fall 2004, spring 2005), the most recent coming after she finished with a 3.917 GPA for the term.

In addition, Duffy has been tapped as a preseason All-American by three national media outlets - Women's Basketball News Service (first team), Street & Smith's ("Terrific 10") and Lindy's College Basketball Annual (third team) - and has been chosen as one of the top five point guards in the country in the ESPN.com 2005-06 season preview.

Duffy also was one of 12 players selected to the 2005-06 Preseason all-BIG EAST

Conference Team, as voted on by the league's coaches. Duffy is one of three returning first-team all-BIG EAST picks from a year ago, joining West Virginia's Meg Bulger and this year's Preseason Player of the Year, Cappie Pondexter of Rutgers. Duffy is tops among all returnees in assists (5.39 apg.

in 2004-05, second in the BIG EAST), steals (2.73 spg., first) and free throw percentage (.895, first), setting a school record and ranking fourth nationally in the latter category. She also ranks fourth among BIG EAST returnees in assist/turnover ratio (1.73) and is seventh among veterans in three-point field goals per game (1.52).

Last season. Duffy was an honorable mention All-America choice by the Associated Press and was a finalist for the Kodak/WBCA All-America Team. She also earned a spot on the all-tournament teams for the Preseason WNIT and the BIG EAST Championship.

Notre Dame Ranked Third In Preseason BIG EAST Poll

According to a preseason survey of the BIG EAST Conference coaches, Notre Dame is expected to finish third in the conference this season. Those were the results released at the league's annual

Media Day Oct. 27 at the ESPN Zone in New York's Times Square. The Irish earned 191 points, which placed them behind the defending BIG EAST regular-season champion Rutgers (221 points, 11 firstplace votes) and the reigning BIG EAST Championship tor, Connecticut (215 points, five first-place votes). Conference newcomer DePaul was fourth, followed by Villanova, Louisville,

West Virginia, St. John's, South Florida and Marquette. All 10 of those schools qualified for postseason play last season, with Notre Dame, Rutgers, Connecticut, DePaul and Louisville all advancing to the NCAA Tournament.

Notre Dame is beginning its 11th season as a member of the BIG EAST Conference in 2005-06. The Irish have gone 137-31 (.815) all-time in regular-season conference games, posting the best winning percentage in league history. Connecticut is second with a .779 success rate. Notre Dame also has finished among the top three in the final BIG EAST regular-season standings nine times in its first 10 seasons in the conference, including a share of the BIG EAST title in 2000-01.

Changes On The Sideline

There are three changes to the Notre Dame staff for the 2005-06 season. Coquese Washington, who is in her seventh season on the Irish bench, has been promoted to associate head coach. Washington, who also played for head coach Muffet McGraw from 1989-93, has been part of the Notre Dame women's basketball program for 11 of the 19 seasons of the McGraw era.

Angie Potthoff has been hired as an assistant coach, replacing longtime aide Carol Owens, who resigned in March to become head coach at her alma mater, Northern Illinois. Potthoff, a 1997 graduate of Penn State where she was a two-time All-American and three-time first-team all-Big Ten selection, focuses her efforts primarily on working with the Irish posts.

Stephanie Menio (pronounced MANY-o) is Notre Dame's new coordinator of basketball operations, assuming the marketing and promotional responsibilities for the program. She replaces Heather Maxwell, who departed in August to pursue doctoral studies at the University of Minnesota.

Late Additions To Irish Roster

Notre Dame has added two walk-on players to its roster for the 2005-06 season, with both joining the squad through preseason tryouts after the media guide went to press.

Brittney Bolden (5-7, Fr., G, South Bend, Ind./Adams HS) averaged 13.3 points and 6.1 rebounds per game last season while helping Adams to one of its best seasons of late in the Northern Indiana Conference (NIC). She is the fourth South Bend native ever to play for the Irish, with the most recent being former South Bend Washington High School standout Jacqueline Batteast (2001-05). Ironically, Bolden graduated from John Adams High School, making Adams the fourth different South Bend school to send a player to Notre Dame - the others are St. Joseph's (Molly Mahoney in 1986-87) and Clay (Mary Borkowski, 1983-84).

Bolden was a three-sport letterwinner at Adams, participating in basketball, soccer and track & field. She was a two-time all-Northern Indiana Conference selection in basketball and a two-time first-team all-conference pick in soccer, as well as a four-time state finalist on the track as a sprinter. In addition, she was an excellent student, graduating with a 3.7 gradepoint average and academic honors. She comes



from a family with a rich athletic heritage — two of her cousins are Shannon Bolden (currently a senior guard/forward at Minnesota) and Stephanie Bolden (a former standout at South Dakota State, where she helped the Jackrabbits to the NCAA Division II title in 2002-03).

Christine Trezza (6-0, Fr., F, Staten Island, N.Y./Notre Dame Academy HS) averaged 10.4 points and 12.0 rebounds per game during her high school career, earning second-team all-borough honors from the New York Daily News and all-conference laurels as a senior. Last year, she helped Notre Dame Academy to a regional title (had career highs of 25 points and 15 rebounds in one playoff game) and averaged 14.8 points and 13.0 rebounds per game along the way. Also, she was a three-time captain of the nationally-ranked Staten Island Rebels AAU squad that finished second at the USA Junior Nationals in 2003. Like Bolden, Trezza was a multi-sport athlete in high school, garnering four letters in volleyball and one in cross country.

Trezza was a member of the National Honor Society, in addition to serving as student government president, class valedictorian and captain of the math team. She is from the same borough as Irish men's basketball freshman Kyle McAlarney (Moore Catholic HS) and joins Notre Dame sophomore center Melissa D'Amico (Manorville, N.Y./William Floyd HS) as the New York natives on this year's Irish roster.

Half And Half

During the past six seasons, Notre Dame has been nearly unbeatable when it has the lead at halftime. The Irish are 100-8 (.926) since the start of the 2000-01 campaign when they go into the dressing room with the lead, including wins in 29 of their last 31 such contests. Notre Dame has opened this season by winning all three of its games after it led at the break.

The Best Offense Is A Good Defense...

During the past 11 seasons, Notre Dame has discovered that a solid defensive effort can almost certainly guarantee a victory. In fact, since the beginning of the 1995-96 season (Notre Dame's first in the BIG EAST Conference), the Irish have an amazing 151-9 (.944) record when they hold their opponents to less than 60 points in a game. Notre Dame added another tally to this ongoing defensive trend with a 55-45 conquest of Michigan on opening night at the Joyce Center.

...But Sometimes You Have To Score If **You Want To Win**

Not resting solely on its defensive laurels, Notre Dame also seemingly has found the magic mark when it comes to outscoring its opponents. During the past decade (1995-96 to present), the Irish are 91-3 (.968) when they score at least 80 points in a game. The only blemishes on that record are a pair of overtime losses to Texas A&M (88-84) and Michigan State (87-83) in 1995 and a 106-81 loss to Connecticut in 1998. Notre Dame tacked on three more wins to that tally in 2004-05.

Sweet Success

Notre Dame is one of only nine schools in the country to have appeared in the NCAA Sweet 16 six times in the past nine seasons (1997-2005). The others are Connecticut and Tennessee (nine times), Duke (eight times), Louisiana Tech (seven times), and Georgia, LSU, North Carolina and Texas Tech (six

The Gold Standard

The Irish are one of six teams nationwide to have an active streak of 12 consecutive 20-win seasons. The others in this club are Tennessee (29), Texas Tech (16), Louisiana Tech (14), Old Dominion (14) and Connecticut (12).

Now That's A Home Court Advantage

One of the hallmarks of Notre Dame's success has been its stellar play at home. In fact, the Irish have been virtually untouchable at home in recent years, winning 128 of their last 139 games (.921) at the 11,418-seat Joyce Center, including winning streaks of 51 and 25 games in that span. Notre Dame also has a 76-8 (.905) record in BIG EAST Conference play at the Joyce Center, sporting a 31-game league winning streak at home before it ended with a 48-45 loss to Villanova in the '02 home finale.

The Irish have been particularly strong when it comes to non-conference games at home, winning 55 of their last 58 non-BIG EAST contests (.948) at the Joyce Center, dating back to the 1994-95 season. The only three losses in that span all came at the hands of Big Ten Conference opponents - Wisconsin in 1996 (81-69), Purdue in 2003 (71-54) and Michigan State in 2004 (82-73 OT). The Purdue loss snapped a 33-game non-conference home winning streak which began after the

Since its inaugural season in 1977-78, Notre Dame has played all of its games at the Joyce Center, posting a 278-72 (.794) record at the venerable facility. In three of the previous six seasons (1999-2000, 2000-01 and 2003-04), the Irish were a perfect 15-0 at home, setting a school record for home wins in a season.

Jammin' The Jovce

Beginning with its national championship season of 2000-01, Notre Dame has ranked among the top 20 in the nation in attendance each of the past five years, including a No. 16 rating in 2004-05 (5,830 fans per game). Notre Dame opened this season with a crowd of 6.134 fans on hand to witness a 55-45 season-opening win over Michigan on Nov. 18.

What's more, each of the top 20 women's basketball crowds in Joyce Center history have occurred during the 19-year tenure of head coach Muffet McGraw (1987-present), with 19 of those 20 occurring in the past six seasons (2000-01 to present). Lastly, the Irish have attracted at least 5,000 fans to 66 of their last 68 home games, including 12 contests with at least 8.000 fans and the first two sellouts in the program's history (both in 2001).

Notre Dame head women's basketball coach Muffet McGraw announced Nov. 9 that four of the nation's top high school student-athletes have chosen to continue their academic and athletic careers with the Irish, signing national letters of intent to attend Notre Dame beginning in the fall of 2006. Ashley Barlow, a 5-9 guard from Indianapolis, Ind. (Pike High School), Danielle Ben-Tsvulun, a 6-3 forward from Fort Wayne, Ind. (Harding High School), Melissa Lechlitner, a 5-7 guard from Mishawaka, Ind. (South Bend St. Joseph's High School) and Erica Williamson, a 6-4 center from Charlotte, N.C. (South Mecklenburg High School) all made their official commitments to the Irish during the early signing period, which last from Nov. 9-16.

"We're very excited about the potential of this group," McGraw said. "It's an exceptionally-balanced class and addresses many of our needs for the future. Each of these individuals will be tremendous complements to the players already in our program. Without question, this new class is a highly-skilled group, but each player also brings with her several intangibles, including excellent leadership, a strong work ethic and a desire to get better every day. They all have experienced success at the high school and AAU level and we think they will be outstanding fits at Notre Dame when they get on campus next year."

The three Indiana players in one class are the most Notre Dame has ever had in a single incoming group. Some of the other notable Indiana natives to play for the Irish include All-Americans Beth Morgan (Bloomington; 1993-97), Ruth Riley (Macy; 1997-01) and Jacqueline Batteast (South Bend; 2001-05), as well as the school's leader in career three-pointers, Sheila McMillen (Rochester; 1995-99). Ironically, three of those players (Riley, Batteast and McMillen) and two of the newest Irish signees (Barlow and Lechlitner) grew up along the U.S. Route 31 corridor that runs from South Bend to In-

Oh Captain, My Captain

Notre Dame's two seniors — guard **Megan Duffy** and forward **Courtney LaVere** — will serve as team captains for the 2005-06 season. Duffy is in her second year as a captain (making her the 16th two-time captain in school history, and 12th in the Muffet McGraw era), while LaVere is a first-time captain. Both players received the captain's honor following a vote of their teammates prior to the season.

Notre Dame On The Small Screen

Notre Dame will have nine of its regular-season games televised during the 2005-06 season. Highlighting this year's television docket are six nationally-televised Irish women's basketball contests, including three consecutive games on the ESPN family of networks during a 12-day span in mid-February.

This year's TV slate continues a recent trend that has seen the Irish become a regular fixture on television. Beginning with the NCAA championship season of 2000-01, Notre Dame has played in 60 televised games, including 37 that were broadcast nationally. Last year, the Irish had 17 games televised, with 10 being national broadcasts.

Sunday's game, being broadcast on a regional basis by Comcast Local, is the second of two Irish women's basketball broadcasts for the Detroit-based network, following last Sunday's airing of Notre Dame's 71-68 victory at Western Michigan.

Six of the remaining seven televised games on the '05-06 Notre Dame schedule all are slated for national broadcasts. The first of three Irish appearances on College Sports Television (CSTV) comes on Dec. 31, when Notre Dame plays host to Tennessee at 2 p.m. (EST). Notre Dame returns to the CSTV airwaves for a pair of January contests that will be part of the BIG EAST/CSTV Tuesday Game of the Week package. The Irish will welcome DePaul to the Joyce Center on Jan. 17, before visiting Rutgers on Jan. 24, and both games will tip off at 7:30 p.m. (ET). CSTV has aired eight Notre Dame women's basketball games during the past three seasons, with the first being that network's inaugural broadcast of any sport (a Feb. 2003 game at Connecticut).

The Irish then make three consecutive appearances on the ESPN family of networks, beginning with a Feb. 7 home game against Villanova that will be broadcast live on ESPNU. That game now will tip off at 6 p.m. (ET), one hour earlier than previously listed on some schedules. The following Sunday (Feb. 12), Notre Dame will travel to DePaul for a 4 p.m. CST (5 p.m. ET) game that will air on ESPN2 as part of that network's "February Frenzy" splitnational coverage designed to preview a similar coverage pattern for the NCAA Tournament. The Irish are back on ESPN2 on Feb. 19, when they play host to Connecticut in a 7 p.m. (ET)

prime-time BIG EAST showdown at the Joyce Center. During the past five seasons, Notre Dame has appeared on the ESPN family of networks 24 times, averaging nearly five telecasts per year on "The Worldwide Leader in Sports".

Notre Dame will make its final regular-season television appearance on Feb. 25, when it travels to new conference member Cincinnati for a 2 p.m. (ET) game that will air as part of the BIG EAST-Regional Sports Network (RSN) package. Among the outlets scheduled to televise the game live are WHME-TV (Channel 46 in South Bend), Comcast Chicago, Comcast Local, Comcast Philadelphia and Madison Square Garden Network.

Notre Dame On The Airwaves

Once again this season, every Irish women's basketball game (home and away) will air on the flagship stations of the Artistic Media Partners (AMP) Network — WDND-AM (ESPN Radio 1580) and WNDV-AM (1490) in South Bend. Veteran broadcaster and AMP sports director **Sean Stires** is now in his sixth season handling the play-by-play for Notre Dame. The Irish also can be heard on the Internet at Notre Dame's official athletics web site (www.und. com) by subscribing to Fighting Irish All-Access, which gives listeners full multimedia access to a variety of Irish athletics events for only \$6.95 per month.

lona (2-0) has opened its 2005-06 season with wins over Bucknell and Wichita State. The latter contest on Saturday was a 73-71 Gaels win that was only sealed when the Shockers missed the first of two free throws with no time remaining.

NOTES: Notre Dame starts the season 3-0 for the second consecutive season and third time in the past four seasons. .. the lirish move to 6-3 all-time against Indiana, including a 3-1 record in Bloomington ... Notre Dame has won its last three games at Assembly Hall and has a series-long three-game winning streak ... the 13-point margin of victory represents the first time in the nine-game series between the Irish and Hoosiers that a game was decided by double figures ... Notre Dame registers its second win in as many games against a Big Ten Conference opponent this season (also the second year in a row the Irish have earned two Big Ten wins) ... It's also the first win for Notre Dame on the campus of a Big Ten school since Nov. 22 and 24, 2001, when the Irish downed #19 Wisconsin (83-56) and #6 Georgia (75-73) at UW's Kohl Center to win the Coaches vs. Cancer Challenge ... Notre Dame now is 9-5 (.643) all-time in its final game before Thanksgiving, including a 7-3 (.700) record since 1996, when the

Irish regularly began opening their season prior to the holiday ... the Irish have won 29 of their last 31 games when leading at the half and are 100-8 (926) in such contests during the past six seasons ... Notre Dame's .549 field goal percentage is its best since Feb. 26, 2005, when the Irish connected at a .582 clip (32-of-55) in a Senior Day victory over West Virginia at the Joyce Center ... senior All-America guard Megan Duffy pumped in a career-high 26 points, one more than her previous best of 25, which she set in an 82-64 win over Wisconsin on Dec. 4, 2003 at the Joyce Center — it's also the most points for an Irish player since Jacqueline Batteast had 27 points at Marquette on Dec. 19, 2004 ... almost lost in the shuffle, Duffy have five assists and no turnovers while playing all 40 minutes, her first turnover-free complete game since Jan. 9, 2005 at Villanova, when she had seven assists and no giveaways in a 59-54 upset loss to the Wildcats ... with her five assists, Duffy eased past Jeannine Augustin into sixth place on Notre Dame's career assist list with 391 (Augustin had 387 from 1994-97) ... junior guard Breona Gray came off the bench to score 14 points, her eighth career double-figure scoring game and highest point production since a career-best 17 points against Syracuse on Jan. 5, 2005 at the Joyce Center ... senior forward Courtney LaVere reached two milestones — her first basket (a jumper with 8:16 left in the first half) pushed her over the 900-point mark for her career (now at 905) ... LaVere also had two blocked shots, giving her an even 100 blocks for her career and making her the eighth player in school history to reach that landmark ... freshman forward Chandrica Smith made her college debut at Indiana, playing three minutes.
