St. John's Concludes Road Trip At No. 2/2 Notre Dame

- ▶ St. John's travels to Notre Dame, Ind., for a conference game against No. 2/2 Notre Dame. The game is slated for Saturday, April 16 at 7 p.m. ET.
- ▶ The Red Storm enter the game on a three-game winning streak, including a 9-6 win over Providence on Saturday. Notre Dame escaped a close contest with Georgetown last weekend, prevailing 7-6 to preserve the squad's perfect record in 2011.
- ▶ Saturday's game is just the third meeting all-time between the Red Storm and Notre Dame. The Fighting Irish have won the past two meetings, including a 13-6 victory last season at DaSilva Memorial Field.
- ▶ This weekend will mark the second time that St. John's has played under the lights this season. The Red Storm lost to then-no. 8 Hofstra, 8-5, in a primetime game in

Last Time Out

- ▶ St. John's jumped out to a 4-0 lead and never trailed Providence en route to a 9-6 conference win, the third-straight victory for St. John's.
- Freshman Colin Keegan led St. John's with a hat trick and a career-best four points in just his second career start. Classmate Kieran McArdle scored four points on two goals and two assists. Goalkeeper Jeff Lowman tallied 14 saves and held the Friars to a season-low six goals, nothing a save percentage of .700.
- ▶ The win was the Red Storm's third straight victory and second consecutive season that the program started conference play at 2-1.

Jeff Lowman Tabbed For BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll

- ▶ A native of Millersville, Md., Lowman stopped 14 shots and allowed just six goals to lead St. John's to a 9-6 win over Providence on Saturday. The six goals were the fewest allowed by St. John's this season. Several of Lowman's saves came at point blank range during a Friar two-man up opportunity. The St. John's defense killed off all three Providence extra-man opportunities.
- ▶ This week's award is the third time that Lowman has been honored by the BIG EAST this season. He earned Defensive Player of the Week honors on Feb. 21, and was named to the Honor Roll on Feb. 28.

Cernuto, McArdle Move Up The Ranks

- Freshmen scoring machines Kevin Cernuto and Kieran McArdle have blown away several Red Storm records and have each placed highly in the conference and national rankings. The two attackers have teamed with junior Charlie Holenstein and freshman Colin Keegan to make up for the loss of injured junior Harry Kutner, last year's leading scorer.
- ▶ A native of Neshanic Station, N.J., Cernuto set a conference high in points in his first career outing, scoring four goals and collecting three assists. He was the fastest Red Storm player to 20 points since the reinstatement of the program in 2005, topping that mark in just six games. Cernuto is currently tied for third in the BIG EAST in points scored per game (3.00). Cernuto is fourth among NCAA freshmen in goals and points and was picked no. 16 in Terry Foy's Top 25 freshmen on March 23 on InsideLacrosse.com.
- ▶ Entering his college career as Long Island's leading goal scorer in 2010, Kieran McArdle has not disappointed Red Storm fans. He recently put together a sevenpoint week against Hofstra and Sacred Heart, earning the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll nod. McArdle's career-high five goals against Vermont ties for the most in one game in the conference this year. He has tallied 12 goals and 10 assists to lead the team through the last five games. He set a new career mark with four assists against Rutgers in the Big City Classic. McArdle is tied with Cernuto for third in the league in points per game (3.00) and eighth in goals scored average (1.80).

Lowman Making The Saves

- ▶ Sophomore goalkeeper Jeff Lowman has talled 124 saves (12.4 per game) in his first season as the Red Storm's full-time goalkeeper, currently ranking third in the country and tops in the BIG EAST. His save percentage of .579 puts him second in the BIG EAST and 10th in the NCAA.
- ▶ Lowman was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week for his 16-save, seven-goals-allowed effort in the team's win over Holy Cross (Feb. 19). He made the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll the next week for his 15-save performance against Yale (Feb. 26). Lowman broke through with a career-high 18 saves against Georgetown (March 5). He earned the BIG EAST Weekly Honor Roll nod after holding Providence to just six goals (April 9)

The Diaper Dandies

▶ This year's starting lineup is marked by a majority of underclassmen as four of the





team's top five scorers and all of the squad's specialty players are freshmen and sophomores.

▶ With a starting lineup of seven underclassmen, including five freshmen, St. John's ranks as one of the youngest teams in the country. Only two two teams routinely start more underclassmen, and only squad, Mercer, puts more freshmen in the starting lineup (10).

Doubling Up With The Long Sticks

- ▶ St. John's faced a very good problem early in the season with an overabundance of talent at the long-stick midfielder position. Sophomore Dillon Ayers returned as the team's leader in caused turnovers and won the position over phenomenal freshman Joe Addona. After two games, Coach Miller moved Addona to the close defense position to get his best defenders on the field together.
- ▶ The tandem of Ayers and Addona have made life tough for opposing offenses recently, holding then-no. 8 Hofstra to just eight goals and a .518 shots on goal percentage. Addona forced six turnovers, including four in the first quarter while Ayers picked up a career-high tying seven ground balls against the Pride.
- ▶ Ayers currently ranks sixth in the conference and 47th in the country in ground balls per game (4.0). Ayers is currently ranked ninth in the conference in caused turnovers with 1.3 per game.

Man-ning Up On Man-Down

- ▶ The St. John's man-down defense has been very effective over the team's recent three-game win streak. The Red Storm have allowed only two extra-man goals in 12 opportunities for a penalty killing percentage of .833. St. John's currently ranks 16th in the country with man-down killing percentage of .745 on the season.
- ► Senior close stick defenders Mike Sherry and Dan Cremens have combined for 41 ground balls and 24 caused turnovers this season to help the man-down team.

Scouting the No. 2/2 Notre Dame Fighting Irish

 Tuesday night.
- ▶ Notre Dame goalkeeper John Kemp was named the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Week after holding Georgetown to just six goals. He is currently second in the country in save percentage (.626) and third in goals-against average (6.13).
- ▶ Kemp and the Notre Dame defense have held opponents to just 6.13 goals per game, the second-lowest in the country. The Fighting Irish have limited their opponents to a shooting percentage of .206.
- ▶ Points leader Sean Rogers has been efficient scorer, leading the country in shot percentage (.520). He has tallied 19 points through eight games.

Scoring In Transition

► Faced with the depature of defensive midfielders Reggie Davis and Nick Messinger, the Red Storm coaching staff moved junior Matt Hurst and sophomore Brandon

Ayers from the offensive end to the defensive end of the midfield.

- ▶ The defensive midfield, with senior Dan Kalata also in the rotation, has accounted for eight points in the last six games. Ayers has scored five goals in those games, including a hat trick against Sacred Heart.
- ▶ St. John's recent stretch of high scores is the result of its effective play in unsettled situations and efficiency in the clearing game, converting clears at a clip of 87.7 percent in the last six games.



Cremens Named Lowe's Senior CLASS Award Semi-Finalist

- ▶ Red Storm co-captain Dan Cremens was selected as one of 20 semi-finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence classroom, character, community and competition.
- An accounting major, Cremens was one of 16 student-athletes selected to receive 2010-11 American Eagle Outfitter BIG EAST Institutional Male Scholar-Athlete Awards. Cremens is a member of the school's President's Society and the Chi Alpha Sigma National College Athlete Honor Society.
- ▶ A starter at close defense since his sophomore year, Cremens is one of the team's two captains and a presence of leadership in the middle of the Red Storm defense. This season he leads the close defense with 20 ground balls through ten games.

DaSilva Memorial Field

Originally opened as St. John's Stadium in 1978, DaSilva Memorial Field was rededicated in 1998 in memory of John DaSilva, a St. John's University hockey star who was killed tragically in an automobile accident. DaSilva Memorial Field is home to the men's lacrosse and women's track and field teams, and has a seating capacity of 1,200. The field was resurfaced in the summer of 2004 to incorporate the new FieldTurf sur-

face.In 2010, the Red Storm Lacrosse team posted a 3-3 record in front of its home-town crowd. The Red Storm wowed fans with a stunning overtime victory over Vermont while hosting eventual national runner-up Notre Dame and then-no. 2 Syracuse. St. John's broke its previous attendance record on Senior Day as 1,508 fans came to watch the Red Storm take on the Orange.





St. John's Faces Program's Toughest Schedule

- ▶ The 2011 season will offer many opportunities for St. John's to make an impact on the national stage. The Red Storm schedule includes a program-record eight games against teams ranked in the Nike/Inside Lacrosse Preseason Top 20 Poll, including four in the top 10. St. John's will also take part in the nationally televised Konica Minolta Big City Classic at the New Meadowlands Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. STJ will play Rutgers on April 3 at 1 p.m. on ESPN3.com.
- ▶ Along with the conference game against Rutgers, St. John's will play two other games on television marking the first time the Red Storm has been a part of three televised games in one season in head coach Jason Miller's tenure. The team's game against Hofstra on March 22 will air via tape delay on Verizon FiOS1. Also, the team's season finale at Syracuse on May 7 will be broadcast regionally on Time Warner Cable.

2010 U.S. Lacrosse High School All-Americans

Entering his fifth season at St. John's, head coach Jason Miller entered the year excited about the rising level of talent that chose to be a part of the Red Storm program in 2010. A record six incoming freshmen were named U.S. Lacrosse All-Americans in their respective regions in the spring of 2010. That group has accounted for 22 games started, 33 points and 29 ground balls through eight contests.

St. John's currently carries four goalies on its roster, all of whom are currently underclassmen. However, one of those players is not like the others. But, he wouldn't want you to think that about him.

Freshman Daniel McQuillan, a native of Bellmore, N.Y., and a U.S. Lacrosse All-American out of Kellenberg Memorial High School, is a Division I lacrosse player and junior seminarian in the Catholic Church.

Living at the Seminary of the Immaculate Conception in Douglaston, N.Y., just minutes away from campus, McQuillan balances the demands of a typical Division I student-athlete with the rigors and discipline of training to become a priest in the Catholic Church.

Although he understands the uniqueness of his situation, McQuillan is humble about his calling and feels that he is no different from any of his teammates.

"Ultimately, I'm just another guy in that locker room," McQuillan says. "I don't see the demands on me to be any different than on someone working to be an accountant or to go into any other life calling."

McQuillan's humility and friendly nature immediately endeared him to his new teammates when he transferred to St. John's from Belmont Abbey right before the season began.

Backing up sophomore Jeff Lowman, McQuillan has made one appearance this season, seeing time against Vermont.

- There will be no BIG EAST Men's Lacrosse Championship for the 2011 season the BIG EAST Champion will be determined by conference gamewinning percentage at the conclusion of the regular season.
- The BIG EAST regular-season format is a six-game, single round-robin schedule with each team playing each league opponent once.
- The BIG EAST is the largest and most diverse Division I conference in the country with 16 institutions seven sponsor the sport of men's lacrosse.
- The BIG EAST Conference has captured 30 national championships in six different sports.

Head Coach Jason Miller



5th Season Springfield '93

A new era of St. John's lacrosse began on Sept. 1, 2006 as Jason Miller was named the third head coach in St. John's lacrosse history. Now entering his fifth year coaching the Red Storm, Miller will lead his team against some of the nation's best talent in the team's second season in the BIG EAST lacrosse conference.

Miller's 5-8 overall record and 2-5 league record as a first-year head coach was a Red Storm lacrosse program-best thus far. Under his tutelage, the Red Storm was ranked as high as sixth in the country in man-down defense with at least seven athletes ranked among the NCAA top 100. With Miller at the helm, St. John's garnered its first ever all-conference honoree in then-junior Tom Michaelsen, an all-ECAC second-team selection.

In his second season at St. John's, Miller's squad once again posted a 2-5 league record, defeating Fairfield and Penn State. Senior Tim LaMare was selected to the ECAC's second team roster as a defenseman and eight players earned a place on the ECAC All-Academic Team, the most of any school in the conference. Once again, the Red Storm man-down defense was ranked as high as fourth nationally, and the Red Storm's face-off win-percentage was rated the sixth-best in the NCAA. The Red Storm experienced many milestones as Michaelsen was the first player in 18 years selected to play in the annual North-South Senior All-Star Game. He was also drafted by teams in both the National Lacrosse League and Major League Lacrosse, the only St. John's player to be drafted to either professional league.

Although St. John's finished with a 5-9 overall record in 2009, the team opened the season with four straight wins, including a 10-9 upset of the fifth-ranked Georgetown Hoyas. The win marked the first victory over Georgetown in the series history. Senior captain Dom DeNapoli was named All-ECAC First Team and the 2009 NCAA Division I Ground Balls Statistical Champion, as he finished the year with 119 ground balls. DeNapoli became the second St. John's player in as many seasons to be selected to play in the annual USILA North-South Senior All-Star Game.

Last season marked the Red Storm's first in the newly formed BIG EAST lacrosse conference. St. John's finished 5-9 overall against a schedule that featured four NCAA tournament teams and the national runner-up in Notre Dame. The Red Storm defeated Rutgers for the team's first BIG EAST victory and senior Tom Manes was named BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Week for his four-goal, one-assist performance. Senior Gavin Buckley was named one of 10 national finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award.

Miller came to St. John's after spending three seasons as the top assistant coach of the University of Massachusetts lacrosse program. While on the sidelines for the Minutemen, he worked with the defense and face-off units, helping lead the team to its first ever NCAA national title game in 2006. During the NCAA semifinal contest, the UMass defense held Maryland, one of the nation's strongest offensive teams, to just five goals. The Minutemen's road to the national championship game was arguably the toughest in the history of the tournament, as Massachusetts defeated No. 2 Hofstra, No. 3 Cornell and No. 4 Maryland before facing No. 1 Virginia in the final, as an unseeded contender.

Under the tutelage of Miller, two Minutemen earned All-America honors, including Jack Reid, who was a finalist for the Schmeisser Award as the nation's top defenseman. Reid was a first round pick in the Major League Lacrosse Draft in June 2006. He was also the first first team All-America defenseman in UMass history.

Prior to his time at Massachusetts, Miller coached at the United States Military Academy from 2000-03, where he helped lead the Black Knights to a 24-20 record in three seasons. During that stretch, Army won two Patriot League titles and earned a NCAA Tournament berth in 2003 for the first time since 1997. Miller learned under one of the best mentors in the collegiate game's history as he assisted National Lacrosse Hall of Famer, Jack Emmer, the NCAA's all-time win leader with 326 career victories.

Before Army, Miller spent one season as an assistant coach at the Rochester Institute of Technology, where the Tigers advanced to the quarterfinals of the 2000 NCAA Division III tournament.

From 1997-99, Miller served as a graduate assistant at Springfield College in Massachusetts while earning his masters degree in education with a concentration in athletic administration. In 1998, Springfield captured the ECAC Division III championship.

Miller spent the first two years of his coaching career at Franklin and Marshall College in Lancaster, Pa., from 1995-97.

A native of Rochester, N.Y., Miller played defense on the Springfield College lacrosse team and graduated in 1993 with a degree in sports management.

Miller and his entire family have made a commitment to education. His father, Richard, recently retired as the President of Hartwick College in Oneonta, N.Y., and his mother, Barbara, is a former English teacher. Miller's wife, Mary, is a school teacher on Long Island. The couple lives in Rockville Centre, N.Y. and has three children, son Liam (5), daughter Maggie (4), and daughter, Catherine Grace, whom the couple welcomed to their family in June of 2010.




