UW OPENS SEASON AT NO. 1 NOTRE DAME

- ▶ The Wisconsin women's soccer team kicks off its 31st season with a trip to defending national champion and No. 1-ranked Notre Dame on Aug. 19. The Badgers are 19-7-4 all-time in season openers.
- ▶ Wisconsin faces the Fighting Irish for the first time since a 3-0 loss in 2009. The Badgers are looking to snap a 13-match winless streak in the series, though prior to 2009 the teams last met in 2004 and the streak dates back to 1992.
- ▶ UW is looking for its first win against a defending national champion. It will be the eighth time in its history that Wisconsin battles a team coming off an NCAA title win, but the first since 1997.

BADGERS PICKED THIRD IN BIG TEN

- ▶ The Wisconsin women's soccer team was picked third in the Big Ten preseason coaches' poll, marking the second season in a row that the Badgers have been selected third in the poll. Prior to that, the last time the team was chosen among the top three was in 2003.
- ▶ The Badgers return 10 of 11 starters from a squad that reached the second round of the NCAA tournament, its second-straight postseason appearance. In addition, 17 letterwinners return as head coach Paula Wilkins enters her fifth season.
- ▶ Seniors Michele Dalton and Laurie Nosbusch and junior Alev Kelter were also chosen as Wisconsin's Players to Watch for the upcoming season.

SECOND ROUND FINISH

- ▶ The Wisconsin women's soccer team (11-4-5, 7-1-2 Big Ten) qualified for the NCAA Division I Tournament for the 16th time in program history in 2010.
- ▶ Wisconsin fell in the second round of the tournament to Marquette in a penalty kick shootout, 5-4. The game resulted in a 2-2 draw after two overtime periods with sophomore Monica Lam-Feist notching both goals for Wisconsin.
- ▶ Wisconsin played Milwaukee for the second time of the season in the first round of the NCAA Tournament.
- ▶ Led by freshman Kodee Williams' game-winning goal, the Badgers defeated Milwaukee, 2-1, to advance to the second round. Wisconsin took the 1-0 lead heading into intermission with a goal from junior Laurie Nosbusch, but the second half kept the Badgers on their toes. Milwaukee tied the game, 1-1, at the 67:13 mark and Williams answered just 29 seconds later to seal the 2-1 victory.

BADGERS MAKE BACK-TO-BACK NCAA APPEARANCES

- \blacktriangleright The Badgers made their 16th appearance in the NCAA Tournament since 1985, the most in the Big Ten. The Badgers are now 13-15-2 in the NCAA tournament.
- ▶ Wisconsin's victory over Milwaukee in the first round marked the program's 11th first round victory since 1985.
- ▶ Head coach Paula Wilkins has taken the program to the NCAA Tournament two times in just four seasons at Wisconsin. In her six years as head coach at Penn State, her team made it to the tournament every year. The Nittany Lions' tournament record under Wilkins is an outstanding 18-5-1. Wilkins is now 20-6-3 all-time in the NCAA.

BADGER NOTES

- The Cardinal and White (7-1-2 Big Ten) placed third in the Big Ten Conference for the second year in a row, tying for the program's best league finish since 2000, when the team took second.
- Although the Badgers placed third in the Big Ten, they were the only team in the conference to finish with one or fewer losses. Penn State and Ohio State slated co-champion accolades: however each team finished with two losses (8-2-0). The Badgers' two ties only counted for a point each in the standings, while wins account for three points, which ultimately helped OSU and PSU earn a share of the title with one more win than Wisconsin.
- Including overtime periods, the 2010 Badgers did not give up a goal in nearly 930 minutes (Sept. 5-Oct. 15). This snapped the previous record set by the 1985 team for most minutes without allowing a goal.
- ▶ Wisconsin allowed just 11 goals in 2010 to lead the Big Ten and mark the fewest by the Badgers since women's soccer became a sport in the Big Ten Conference in 1994.
- The 2010 squad allowed just three goals in Big Ten play. It led the conference and was the fewest goals allowed in league play in program history (excluding Big Ten Tournament games).
- The Badgers put together a ninegame shutout streak (Sept. 10-Oct.10), and Wisconsin goalkeeper Michele Dalton (Mt. Prospect, Ill.) did not give up a goal in eight-straight contests (Sept. 12 - Oct.10). Wisconsin's nine-game shutout streak tied the 1985 squad for most consecutive shutouts in program history.
- The Badgers' ten-game unbeaten streak (Sept. 5-Oct. 10) tied the 1985 squad for third-best in program history. In 1990, the team put together a 16-game unbeaten streak and in 1996, the squad went 13 consecutive games without a loss.
- Prior to the NCAA tournament, the Badgers led the Big Ten with just eight goals allowed and a .42 goals against average. In addition, Wisconsin's 12 shutouts was the most in the conference.
- Seven Badgers earned conference awards including first team All-Big Ten award winners Meghan Flannery and Laurie Nosbusch [see box on page 1].
- The five first or second All-Big Ten team awards won by the Badgers mark the most in program history since the 1998 squad also produced five. Flannery and Nosbusch's first team accolade slates the first time two Badgers were named first team All-Big Ten since Marisa Brown and Kara Kabellis were named to the list in 2005.

- Along with seven All-Big Ten Freshman honorees, the conference has now crowned two Badgers on the first team and four on the second team in Wisconsin's four seasons under Wilkins.
- Laurie Nosbusch and Michele Dalton were each awarded three Big Ten Conference weekly laurels apiece this season. The duo is tied for the most conference weekly awards in a season in Wisconsin women's soccer history. Nosbusch currently has six weekly honors in her first three seasons for the most in program history.
- Forward Laurie Nosbusch tallied a career-best 10 goals in just 18 games in 2010 to tie for second in the conference. Her 0.56 goals per game ranked second while she was also third in the Big Ten with 1.17 points per game. Nosbuch's five game-winning goals tied for the conference lead.

- ▶ Six different Badgers scored in 2010 for Wisconsin including Laurie Nosbusch, Kodee Williams, Lauren Cochlin, Monica Lam-Feist, Alev Kelter and Catie Sessions.

- ▶ Laurie Nosbusch's 10 goals on the season tied for 12th best in program history.
- ▶ Wisconsin's only loss in Big Ten Conference play came to Ohio State, who dropped the semifinal match of the 2010 NCAA tournament to Notre Dame.
- ▶ Not only did the Badgers perform well on the field, Wisconsin was recognized for its classroom efforts, too. Paige Adams, Nicole Aiello, Lauren Cochlin, Meghan Flannery, Lindsey Hamann, Olivia Hoff, Erin Jacobsen, Alev Kelter, Laurie Nosbusch and Leigh Williams all earned Academic All-Big Ten honors.
