The Tickets: They're all sold -- with this being the 168th consecutive sellout at Notre Dame Stadium (the first 130 coming at the old 59,075 capacity). The Washington State game marks the 216th home sellout in the last 217 games (dating back to 1964) and the 151st sellout in the last 174 games involving Notre Dame, including the first 10 games of 1998, the first 11 in '99, the first five in '00, the first nine in '01 and all 13 in '02.

The Radio Plans: For the 36th consecutive season, all Notre Dame football games are broadcast on more than 200 stations in all 50 states nationwide by Westwood One with Tony Roberts (play-by-play), former Irish running back Allen Pinkett (analysis) and former Irish quarterback and 1956 Heisman Trophy winner Paul Hornung (pregame/halftime analysis). A live broadcast from the Notre Dame student station, WVFI, also is available through the Notre Dame athletic department web site at www.und.com. All Notre Dame football games are heard on WDND-AM (1620) and WNDV-FM (92.9) in South Bend with pre- and post-game analysis featuring Sean Stires, Andy Budzinski, Shawn Lewallen, Jack Nolan and Larry Williams. IRISH KICK OFF 2003 SEASON SATURDAY AGAINST WASHINGTON STATE

The 115th season of Notre Dame football is set to begin Saturday at 1:38 p.m. (EST) when the Irish play host to Washington State at Notre Dame Stadium. The game will be televised nationally by NBC and it will mark the 168th consecutive sellout at Notre Dame Stadium, a streak that dates back to Thanksgiving Day of 1973.

The Irish are beginning their second season under head coach **Tyrone Willingham** following a remarkable 10-3 record last year that included a trip to the Toyota Gator Bowl on New Year's Day. Notre Dame has 38 monogram winners back from that squad, including 14 starters and currently is ranked in both of the major national polls (20th by Associated Press, 16th by ESPN/*USA Today*).

Among the returning players on this year's Irish roster are a pair of preseason first-team All-Americans in senior linebacker **Courtney Watson** and senior cornerback/kick returner **Vontez Duff**. Watson, who also was a Butkus Award finalist in 2002 and is a candidate for the honor again this season, led Notre Dame with 90 tackles last year despite missing three games due to injury. Meanwhile, Duff is widely regarded as one of the most explosive all-around players in college football after becoming the first player in school history to return a punt, kickoff and interception for a touchdown last season. Like Watson, Duff is a candidate for postseason honors, having been named to the '03 Jim Thorpe Award Watch List.

Washington State (1-0) kicked off its 2003 campaign last Saturday with a 25-0 shutout of Idaho in a game played at Seahawks Stadium in Seattle. WSU running back **Jonathan Smith** carried 16 times for 160 yards and two touchdowns, and kicker **Drew Dunning** booted four field goals as the Cougars won the debut game for new head coach **Bill Doba**. In the victory, Washington State rolled up 339 yards rushing, their highest output on the ground in 10 years, and finished the game with 466 yards of total offense.

The Cougars are one of three teams on this year's Irish schedule that reached the '02 Bowl Champion-ship Series. WSU posted a 10-3 record last year and advanced to the Rose Bowl, where it lost to Oklahoma, 34-14. Saturday's game will be the Cougars' first-ever meeting with Notre Dame.

THE WILLINGHAM CONFERENCES

Tyrone Willingham's weekly teleconferencestyle press conferences will take place on Tuesday mornings prior to each Notre Dame game, with the next scheduled for Sept. 9. They are held at the WNDU-TV studios (on US 933/Business 31, west edge of campus) in South Bend. A light meal is served beginning at 10:30 a.m. (EST), and Coach Willingham will address the media from 11-11:30 a.m. (EST). At least one Irish player generally is available for interviews following Willingham's remarks. NOTRE DAME-WASHINGTON STATE SERIES NOTES

- Notre Dame and Washington State will be playing one another for the first time ever Saturday afternoon at Notre Dame Stadium. WSU will be the 134th different opponent in 115 seasons of Irish football.
- For the second consecutive season, the Irish are opening up against a first-time opponent. Last year, Notre Dame blanked Maryland, 22-0 in East Rutherford, N.J., to win Kickoff Classic XX.
- The Cougars are the only Pac-10 Conference team the Irish have never faced. Notre Dame is 68-35-6 (.651) all-time against Pac-10 schools, including a 38-12-1 (.755) mark at Notre Dame Stadium. The Irish also have won their last six home games against Pac-10 teams, dating back to 1998.
- Washington State is one of three teams on this year's Irish schedule that played in Bowl Championship Series games last year the Cougars fell to Oklahoma, 34-14 in the Rose Bowl. USC and Florida State are the other two '02 BCS qualifiers Notre Dame will face this season.
- The Irish are 4-0 all-time against teams from the state of Washington, with all four victories coming against WSU's archrival, the University of Washington. Notre Dame and UW last met in 1996 (a 54-20 Irish win at Notre Dame Stadium) and the teams are slated to resume their series next year in Seattle.

- Although this is the first-ever meeting between Notre Dame and Washington State, Irish head coach **Tyrone Willingham** has faced the Cougars seven times before (all during his tenure at Stanford), posting a 5-2 (.714) career mark against WSU.
- Washington State assistant coaches **Leon Burtnett** and **Ken Greene** both have experience matching up against Notre Dame, having done so during their respective careers at Purdue. Burtnett was the Boilermakers' defensive coordinator from 1977-81 and their head coach from 1982-86, logging an overall 4-6 (.400) record against the Irish. In fact, Burtnett's final game as head coach against Notre Dame in '86 (a 41-9 Irish win) also served as the first victory for **Lou Holtz** in South Bend. Meanwhile, Greene was the defensive secondary coach at Purdue from 2000-02, going 0-3 vs. Notre Dame.

IF NOTRE DAME WINS ...

- Notre Dame would register its 15th season-opening victory in the last 17 seasons.
- The Irish would lift their all-time record against the Pac-10 to 69-35-6 (.655) and move to 5-0 all-time against the Pac-10 in season openers.
- Notre Dame would win its home opener for the seventh time in the last eight years and the 13th time in the past 17 seasons.
- The Irish would pick up their seventh consecutive home victory over a Pac-10 opponent, a streak that dates back to 1998 (began with a 35-17 win over Stanford).
- Notre Dame head coach **Tyrone Willingham** would earn his fourth consecutive season-opening win (second with the Irish) and improve to 6-3 (.667) all-time in season openers as a collegiate head coach.
- Willingham would raise his career record against Washington State to 6-2 (.750).

IF WASHINGTON STATE WINS ...

- Notre Dame would lose its season opener for just the third time in the last 17 years. The Irish also would drop their home lidlifter for only the second time in the past nine seasons.
- The Cougars would be the first new regular-season opponent to defeat Notre Dame since Florida State handed the Irish a 19-13 loss on Oct. 10, 1981.
- Notre Dame would see its six-game home winning streak against Pac-10 teams come to an end, while WSU would be the first Pac-10 team to win at Notre Dame Stadium since USC claimed a 20-17 victory on Oct. 18, 1997.
- The Irish would lose consecutive regular-season games for the first time since Oct. 27-Nov. 3, 2001 (defeats by Boston College and Tennessee).

NOTRE DAME-WASHINGTON STATE CONNECTIONS

- Notre Dame offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach **Bill Diedrick** held a similar post at Washington State for two seasons (1989-90), coaching the top pick in the 1990 NFL Draft, QB Drew Bledsoe (selected by the New England Patriots, now with the Buffalo Bills).
- Irish offensive line coach **John McDonell** spent 12 seasons at Washington State (1989-2000), working with the Cougars' offensive line throughout his tenure and adding offensive coordinator duties from 1994-2000
- Notre Dame running backs/special teams coach **Buzz Preston** mentored the running backs at WSU from 1994-97.
- Diedrick, McDonell and Preston all served on the same coaching staff with first-year Washington State head coach **Bill Doba**, who has been with the Cougars since 1989.
- Saturday's game marks a homecoming for Doba, who grew up in South Bend. He was the head coach at three area high schools (Goshen, Angola and Mishawaka) from 1962-76 before entering the college ranks. Doba was inducted into the Mishawaka Hall of Fame in 1986 and the Indiana Football Hall of Fame in 2001.
- Longtime Washington State play-by-play voice **Bob Robertson** worked on the Irish football broadcasts for two years (1955-56).
- Notre Dame athletics director **Kevin White** and Washington State AD **Jim Sterk** have a history together. Sterk worked in three different roles under White at Maine (1987-90) and later served as associate AD and senior associate AD under White at Tulane (1991-95). While at Tulane, Sterk worked alongside another member of White's current administrative staff at Notre Dame, deputy athletics director **Sandy Barbour**.
- Notre Dame sophomore walk-on WR **Mike O'Hara** is a native of Bellevue, Wash., and graduated from Newport High School.

Outside of the regular Tuesday teleconferences, the best time for interviews with head coach **Tyrone Willingham**, Irish players or other members of the coaching staff is after practice Tuesday-Thursday or by special appointment.

Interview requests must be made prior to the end of the daily 20-minute open practice period. All player and coach interviews will take place after practice in the media interview room, located at the tunnel entrance (north end) of Notre Dame Stadium.

NOTRE DAME VS. THE PAC-10 CONFERENCE

- Notre Dame has won more than 65 percent of its games versus Pac-10 Conference opponents, with a winning series record versus each of the Pac-10 teams that the Irish have played and an overall mark of 68-35-6 (.651) in 109 games against Pac-10 schools including the 1998, 2000 and 2002 wins over Stanford, the '98 and '99 wins over Arizona State and the '99, '00 and '01 wins over USC. Nearly 70 percent of those games (75) have come versus USC (42-27-5) while another 15 percent have come against Stanford (11-6-0).
- Notre Dame has played a handful of games vs. California (4-0), Washington (4-0), Arizona (2-1), Oregon (1-0-1) and UCLA (2-0). Notre Dame and Arizona State met for the first time in 1998, while the Irish met Oregon State for the first time in the 2001 Tostitos Fiesta Bowl. Notre Dame has never played Washington State on the gridiron, although they are scheduled to meet for the first time on Saturday.
- The Irish won at Washington in '95 (29-21) and beat the Huskies at Notre Dame Stadium in '96 (54-20), with the only other previous games in that series coming in '48 and '49. The most recent games vs. other Pac-10 teams are: a 16-13 home loss to Arizona in '82, a 41-8 home win over California in '67, a 13-13 tie at Oregon in '82 and a 24-0 home win over UCLA in '64.
- Notre Dame is 13-8-1 (.614) in its last 22 games vs. Pac-10 schools (4-4-1 vs. USC, 5-3 vs. Stanford, 2-0 vs. Washington, 2-0 vs. Arizona State, 0-1 vs. Oregon State), starting with a '92 victory over USC. The Irish also are 10-1 (.909) in their last 11 home games against Pac-10 squads, dating back to 1993.

BRAND-NEW OPPONENT ON THE SCHEDULE

Notre Dame and Washington State will be meeting for the first time ever when they square off Saturday at Notre Dame Stadium. The Cougars represent the 134th different opponent in Irish history, and the third in the last two seasons (following last year's premieres against ACC members Maryland and North Carolina State). During its 115-year history, Notre Dame has faced 63 of the other 117 teams currently competing at the NCAA Division I-A level.

FOR OPENERS

Notre Dame has compiled a record of 96-13-5 (.864) historically in its season-opening games, including winning 14 of their last 16 games (only losses coming to Northwestern in 1995 and at Nebraska in 2001). Last year, the Irish opened the **Tyrone Willingham** era in grand style, shutting out Maryland, 22-0 in Kickoff Classic XX at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. It was the first season-opening whitewash for Notre Dame since Sept. 22, 1973, when **Ara Parseghian**'s charges blanked Northwestern, 44-0, before a capacity crowd at Notre Dame Stadium. Willingham also became the first Irish head coach in nearly half a century to begin his tenure at Notre Dame with a shutout win — **Terry Brennan** was the last to pull off such a feat, engineering a 21-0 win over fourth-ranked Texas in 1954.

One additional note: Notre Dame is 4-0 all-time when opening against a Pac-10 school, including a 41-8 victory over California in 1967, the last time the Irish debuted against a Pac-10 club.

THE SKINNY ON HOME OPENERS

Notre Dame has had tremendous success in home openers during its 115-year history, going 91-17-5 (.827) in its inital on-campus contest of the season (there were no home games in 1929 due to the construction of Notre Dame Stadium). Among Irish head coaches, **Jesse Harper** (1913-17) and **Terry Brennan** (1954-58) both won all five of their home openers, while **Knute Rockne** (1918-30) went 11-0-1 in his first home game of the season (only a 7-7 tie with Great Lakes in 1918 sullied his record). More recently, Notre Dame has won six of its last seven and 12 of its last 16 home openers, including a 24-17 conquest of Purdue to open the 2002 home slate.

FORMER IRISH FOOTBALL CAPTAINS TO BE HONORED AT WASHINGTON STATE GAME

At halftime of Notre Dame's season opener vs. Washington State on Saturday, a contingent of former Irish football captains will be honored for their leadership and service to the program. In presentations earlier on Saturday, the captains will receive pins specially designed at the end of last season (the first recipients were last year's captains — **Arnaz Battle, Sean Mahan, Gerome Sapp** and **Shane Walton** — as well as the 2002 football banquet speaker, former Irish defensive end and 1984 captain **Mike Golic**). Continuing a tradition which began last season, Notre Dame will select its captains on a game-by-game basis in 2003.

FORMER IRISH BASEBALL GREAT JIM GILLIS TO RECEIVE ALUMNI AWARD AT WSU GAME

Jim Gillis, a past president of the Notre Dame National Monogram Club and a three-year monogram winner in baseball for the Irish, will receive the Harvey G. Foster Award from the Notre Dame Alumni Association at Saturday's season-opening football game vs. Washington State. The Foster Award is presented each year to a Notre Dame graduate distinguished for athletic endeavors and community service.

Gillis, who went on to play Major League Baseball with the Philadelphia Phillies, has teamed with his wife, Jane, for the last 40 years to assist in fund raising for Providence St. Joseph Hospital in Burbank, Calif. They also established the Jim and Jane Gillis Grant-in-Aid Scholarship for Notre Dame baseball last January. In addition, Gillis is an active member of the Notre Dame Club of Los Angeles, received the club's Award of the Year in 1997, and was named a University Exemplar that same year.

SHUTOUTS A RARITY AGAINST NOTRE DAME

Beginning with the 1988 Cotton Bowl, Notre Dame has been shut out just once in its last 183 games (a 10-0 loss at USC in the '98 regular-season finale), including a current streak of 49 consecutive games without being blanked. During that time, the Irish defense has pitched 11 shutouts of its own, with eight of those whitewashes coming at Notre Dame Stadium (including a 42-0 win over Rutgers in the 2002 home finale).

RETURN TO SENDER

One of the hallmarks of Notre Dame's success last season was its ability to capitalize on an opponent's mistakes. In fact, the Irish wound up with nine returns (punts, kickoffs, fumbles, interceptions) for touchdowns in 2002, which tied North Carolina State for second-most in the nation behind Kansas State's 12 returns for touchdowns.

Upon closer inspection, the return game has been a source of strength for Notre Dame over the past four seasons. The Irish have logged 23 returns for touchdowns in that time, a figure that ranks eighth in the country. Here's a look at the national leaders in touchdown returns since 1999 (research courtesy of the University of Colorado athletic media relations office — bowl games counted separately):

SETTA PULLING DOUBLE DUTY

Senior **Nicholas Setta** will begin the season as the starting placekicker and punter for the Irish, marking the first time a Notre Dame player regularly has filled both roles since Craig Hentrich turned the trick from 1989-92. Hentrich is now an all-pro punter with the NFL's Tennessee Titans.

Setta is starting his fourth season as the Irish placekicker, having twice been named to the Lou Groza Award Watch List. He also was selected as a preseason honorable mention All-American by Street & Smith's each of the last two seasons. This year, he has the opportunity to break several Notre

Dame records, including career field goal attempts (Setta has 56, while John Carney holds the record of 69 from 1984-86), career field goal made (Setta has 37, while Carney is first with 51), and career points by kicking (Setta has 210, while Hentrich owns the top mark of 294). In addition, Setta has made 87 consecutive PAT kicks, the second-longest streak in school history behind Hentrich's run of 136 straight PAT conversions from 1989-92. Setta's last missed PAT kick came on Oct. 7, 2000 vs. Stanford.

While he has a wealth of experience as a placekicker, Setta comes into this season having only served as a backup punter behind two-time Ray Guy Award semifinalist Joey Hildbold. However, while filling in for the injured Hildbold against Boston College in 2000, Setta did punt four times for 160 yards (a 40-yard average), including a career-long 47-yard boot in a 28-16 Irish victory. Setta was one of 32 candidates named to the '03 Ray Guy Award preseason watch list.

SIX IRISH PLAYERS EARN PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

Senior inside linebacker **Courtney Watson** was a preseason first-team All-America selection by *Street & Smith*'s and *The Sporting News*. Meanwhile, senior cornerback/kick returner **Vontez Duff** was a preseason first-team All-American according to *Street & Smith*'s and a second-team choice by *Athlon*. The latter publication also named senior nose guard **Cedric Hilliard** to its preseason All-America third team. Senior free safety **Glenn Earl**, junior running back **Ryan Grant** and senior kicker/punter **Nicholas Setta** all were awarded preseason honorable mention All-America status by *Street & Smith*'s.

THREE NOTRE DAME POSITION UNITS LAUDED BY NATIONAL PUBLICATIONS

Athlon named the Irish linebacking corps the fourth-best unit in the country, while *The Sporting News* labelled them the ninth-best group in the land. In addition, *Athlon* selected the Notre Dame defensive line as the fifth-best unit in the nation.

WATSON NAMED TO WALTER CAMP PLAYER OF THE YEAR PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Senior inside linebacker **Courtney Watson** has been named to the preseason watch list for the Walter Camp Football Foundation Player of the Year, the nation's fourth-oldest individual accolade which is given annually by the Walter Camp Football Foundation. Through a vote of the 117 Division I-A head coach and sports information directors, the list will be cut to 10 semifinalists in early November, with the winner to be announced Dec. 11 at the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show. The official award presentation is slated for Feb. 14, 2004, at the Walter Camp Football Foundation national awards banquet, which will be held in New Haven, Conn., at the Yale University Commons.

WATSON, GOOLSBY NAMED TO BUTKUS AWARD PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Senior inside linebackers **Courtney Watson** and **Mike Goolsby** have been named to the preseason watch list for the Butkus Award, which is presented each year to the nation's top linebacker by the Downtown Athletic Club of Orlando. The list of 90 candidates will be pared down to 10 semifinalists on Oct. 16, with the three finalists chosen on Nov. 13. The winner will be unveiled Dec. 12 at a banquet in Orlando.

DUFF, EARL PICKED FOR THORPE AWARD PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Senior cornerback **Vontez Duff** and senior free safety **Glenn Earl** have been named to the preseason watch list for the Jim Thorpe Award, which is awarded annually to the nation's top defensive back by the Jim Thorpe Association, based in Oklahoma City. Ten semifinalists for the award will be announced Nov. 3, with the three finalists selected on Nov. 24. The winner will be announced Dec. 11 at the ESPN/ Home Depot College Football Awards Show with the official award presentation slated for Feb. 9, 2004, in Oklahoma City.

HOLIDAY TAPPED FOR O'BRIEN AWARD PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Senior quarterback **Carlyle Holiday** has earned a spot on the preseason watch list for the Davey O'Brien Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top quarterback by the Fort Worth Club in Fort Worth, Texas. In November, the semifinalists will be announced and the three finalists will be selected later in the month. The winner will be announced Dec. 11 at the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show with the official award presentation slated for February 2004 in Fort Worth.

TUCK EARNS PLACE ON HENDRICKS AWARD PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Junior defensive end **Justin Tuck** has been selected to the preseason watch list for the Ted Hendricks Award, which is given annually to the nation's top defensive end by the Ted Hendricks Foundation in

Chicago. In November, the semifinalists will be announced and the three finalists will be selected later in the month. The winner will be announced Dec. 11 at the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show with the official award presentation set for February 2004 in Chicago.

SETTA APPEARS ON RAY GUY AWARD PRESEASON WATCH LIST

Senior punter/placekicker **Nicholas Setta** has been named to the preseason watch list for the Ray Guy Award, which is presented each year to the nation's top punter by the Greater Augusta (Ga.) Sports Council. Ten semifinalists will be announced in early November and the three finalists will be chosen later that month. The winner will be announced Dec. 11 at the ESPN/Home Depot College Football Awards Show and will receive his award live during the broadcast.

FOUR PLAYERS NAMED TO 2003 STREET & SMITH'S AWARD WATCH LISTS

Street & Smith's tapped senior inside linebacker Courtney Watson for spots on its Butkus Award and Bednarik/Nagurski Award watch lists (as did Lindy's). The former honor recognizes the country's top linebacker, while the latter awards spotlight the nation's best overall defensive player. In addition, Street & Smith's placed senior cornerback Vontez Duff and senior free safety Glenn Earl on its watch list for the Thorpe Award (which goes to the top defensive back in the country), and the publication named senior kicker Nicholas Setta to its watch list for the Lou Groza Award (presented to the nation's top kicker).

IRISH PLAYERS RANK HIGH IN LINDY'S AND THE SPORTING NEWS IN 2003

Senior **Courtney Watson** was tabbed the fourth-best inside linebacker in the country by *Lindy's* and *The Sporting News*, while senior **Vontez Duff** was rated the seventh-best cornerback and ninth-best all-purpose player by *Lindy's*, and the nation's 10th best as both a cornerback and kick returner by *The Sporting News*. Senior nose guard **Cedric Hilliard** was ranked the sixth-best defensive tackle in the nation by *The Sporting News*, while senior free safety **Glenn Earl** placed 14th among free safeties by *The Sporting News* and 19th by *Lindy's*. Senior **Mike Goolsby** was rated 12th among the nation's inside linebackers by *Lindy's*, while junior **Ryan Grant** was 18th among running backs and senior **Darrell Campbell** was charted 19th among defensive linemen by the same publication.

IRISH HEAD COACH TYRONE WILLINGHAM

A veteran with 26 seasons of coaching experience at the collegiate and professional levels, **Tyrone Willingham** is now in his second season as head football coach at the University of Notre Dame after serving as the leader at Stanford University for seven seasons. Willingham used his years of service in the coaching business to reverse the tides of the Irish program in '02, leading Notre Dame to a 10-2 regular-season record and a trip to the 2003 Toyota Gator Bowl. He became the first Irish head coach ever to win 10 games in his first season, and he was named the ESPN/Home Depot College Coach of the Year, the Scripps College Coach of the Year, the Black Coaches Association Male Coach of the Year and the George Munger Award College Coach of the Year by the Maxwell Football Club of Philadelphia. In addition, he made history in 2002 as the first college football coach ever to earn *The Sporting News* Sportsman of the Year award. In eight years as a college head coach, Willingham has compiled a solid 54-39-1 (.580) record and guided his charges to bowl games on five occasions.

Willingham was introduced as the new Irish mentor on Jan. 1, 2002, following seven seasons as the head coach at Stanford. He compiled a 44-36-1 (.549) record during his tenure at Stanford, guiding the Cardinal to four bowl games, including the Rose Bowl following the 1999 season. Willingham was a two-time Pacific-10 Conference Coach of the Year (1995 and 1999), the only Stanford coach to earn that award more than once, and he was a finalist for national coach-of-the-year honors in '95 and '99. All told, Willingham spent 10 years at Stanford, initially serving as running backs coach from 1989-91. Between his stints with the Cardinal, Willingham coached in the professional ranks for three seasons (1992-94) with the Minnesota Vikings, helping his team win a pair of NFC Central Division championships and reach the playoffs all three years. Willingham began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, Michigan State, in 1977, before moving to Central Michigan as the defensive secondary coach for two years (1978-79). He returned to MSU from 1980-82, working with the secondary and special teams units, and also served at North Carolina State (1983-85) and Rice (1986-88).

SCOUTING THE IRISH OFFENSE

Line -- The offensive line will be largely retooled for the Irish this season. Four of the five starters from

Butkus Award Watch List Lindy's, ranked 12th nationally among inside linebackers last year were selected in the NFL Draft, taking with them more than 80 combined starts and nine combined seasons of starting experience. Senior **Sean Milligan** is the lone holdover on the offensive line and he is being called upon to anchor the rebuilt 2003 crew. Milligan is a three-year monogram winner who played in all 13 games last season, playing a total of 266:27. He has made 17 career starts, which more than quadruples the total number of starts (four) by the rest of the offensive line.

Junior **Mark LeVoir** has earned the starting nod at left guard after spending the past two seasons as a backup at both tackle positions. One of the largest linemen on the Irish roster this year (6-7, 320), LeVoir played in four games last season for a total of 10:09. Juniors **Jeff Thompson** and **Darin Mitchell** will serve as the primary understudies at the guard spot for Notre Dame.

While Milligan is the only regular starter back this season, both of this year's tackles saw significant playing time last year. Senior left tackle **Jim Molinaro** appeared in all 13 games last year (124:37) and started the final three games of the season, two at left tackle and one at right tackle. On the other side of the line, junior right tackle **Dan Stevenson** was thrust in the starting lineup for last year's Gator Bowl and played extremely well, cementing his position at that position in 2003. Stevenson played a total of 82:23 in 11 games last season, seeing time as both a reserve guard and tackle. A pair of sophomores, **Brian Mattes** and **Jamie Ryan**, are penciled in to be the backup tackles this year.

The battle to replace All-America center Jeff Faine has been a tight one throughout preseason camp, with sophomore **Bob Morton** and junior **Zachary Giles** both competing for the starting spot. Morton was a second-team high school All-American in 2001, but did not see action for the Irish last season. Giles served as a backup to Faine and Ryan Scarola last year, playing in one game.

<u>Backs</u> -- Senior Carlyle Holiday has been the starting quarterback for Notre Dame since the third week of the 2001 season and he shows no signs of turning over the reins in the near future. Last year was Holiday's first in the new West Coast offense employed by head coach **Tyrone Willingham** and offensive coordinator **Bill Diedrick**, and the veteran signal-caller thrived, setting a school record with 126 consecutive pass attempts without an interception. Last season, he completed 129-of-257 passes for 1,788 yards and 10 TD with only five interceptions, ranking ninth in school history for passes completed and sixth for pass attempts. In addition, he tied a school record last year with four touchdown passes in Notre Dame's 42-0 win over Rutgers. A 2003 Davey O'Brien Award candidate, Holiday has the third-lowest interception percentage in school history (.0194), having thrown just five picks in 401 career pass attempts.

For the second consecutive season, junior **Pat Dillingham** will serve as Holiday's primary backup. Dillingham appeared in seven games last season, completing 41-of-81 passes for 434 yards and one touchdown. He carved a place in Irish history last season at Michigan State, throwing the game-winning 60-yard TD pass to Arnaz Battle with 1:15 to play. Dillingham also made his first career start vs. Stanford, throwing for 129 yards in a 31-7 victory. Freshman **Brady Quinn** also could see significant playing time as the year progresses.

Junior **Ryan Grant** leads a veteran group of Irish running backs who were the main beneficiaries of Notre Dame's new offensive style last year. Grant became the seventh player in school history to rush for 1,000 yards in a single season, finishing with 1,085 yards and a team-high nine touchdowns. He posted four 100-yard games last year and three other 90-yard efforts, and rang up a career-high 190 yards on 30 carries in a win at Air Force. Junior **Marcus Wilson** (39-110 in 2002) and senior **Julius Jones** also will see plenty of action out of the backfield this season. Jones led the Irish in rushing in 2000 (657 yards) and added 718 yards on the ground in 2001 before sitting out last season.

Junior **Rashon Powers-Neal** will step into the starting lineup at fullback after serving as Grant's primary understudy at tailback last season. A bruising back who deftly complements the fluid styles of Grant, Wilson and Jones, Powers-Neal carried 77 times for 344 yards and two touchdowns last season. He also posted his first career 100-yard game with 108 yards on 13 carries against Stanford. Junior walk-on **Josh Schmidt** has been the surprise of this year's preseason camp, working his way into a position for playing time, along with sophomore **Nate Schiccatano**, who opened some eyes with 24 yards rushing and a touchdown in the '03 Blue-Gold Game.

Receivers -- Despite the loss of leading receiver Arnaz Battle (58-786, 5 TD), the Irish receiving corps should be well-stocked in 2003. Junior **Omar Jenkins** takes over as the leader of the unit after pulling in 37 balls for 633 yards and three touchdowns last season. Rangy sophomore **Maurice Stovall** will hold the other starting wideout position after snaring 18 passes for 312 yards and three touchdowns in his rookie campaign last year. Senior **Ronnie Rodamer** (2-14 in '02), junior **Matt Shelton** (1-18) and sophomore **Rhema McKnight** (9-91) all can stretch defenses vertically and will see significant time in Notre

Dame's balanced offensive scheme. Freshmen receivers **Chinedum Ndukwe** and **Jeff Samardzija** also turned in strong preseason showings and could be heard from this season.

Senior **Billy Palmer** will begin the season as the starting tight end while senior **Gary Godsey** is out indefinitely with a knee injury suffered in preseason. A sturdy blocker, Palmer was Godsey's main backup last season, appearing in all 13 games and making his first career start in a two-tight end formation at USC. Senior **Jared Clark**, a converted quarterback, adjusted well to his new position last season, catching seven passes for 104 yards, including a career-high four receptions vs. North Carolina State in the Gator Bowl. Sophomores **Anthony Fasano** and **Marcus Freeman** also will contend for playing time this season — Fasano sparkled in the '03 Blue-Gold Game, catching three passes for 63 yards.

SCOUTING THE IRISH DEFENSE

Line -- One of the strengths of this year's Irish squad will be its defensive line, where three starters are back in the fold. Senior defensive tackle **Darrell Campbell** (33 tackles, eight for loss, six sacks in '02) and senior nose guard **Cedric Hilliard** (21 tackles, five for loss two sacks in '02) were key factors in Notre Dame's 10th-ranked rushing defense last year. Both players weigh better than 290 pounds and provide a formidable obstacle for opponents in the middle of the line. Senior **Greg Pauly** will share time in the middle of the line this season, after showing tremendous improvement last year (11 tackles, three for loss). Junior **Brian Beidatsch** saw action in all 13 games last year (two tackles) and will be called upon even more in '03. Senior right end **Kyle Budinscak** is the other veteran returning on the Irish defensive line, beginning his second season as a starter. A two-time Academic All-District selection, Budinscak registered 20 tackles, including six for loss and three sacks last year. Junior end **Justin Tuck** (44 tackles, 10 for loss, five sacksin '02), a pass-rushing specialist with exceptional quickness, will move into the starting lineup this season in place of the departed Ryan Roberts, with highly-touted freshman **Victor Abiamiri** and sophomore **Travis Leitko** serving as the top understudies at the defensive end positions.

<u>Linebackers</u> -- All three starting linebackers return for the Irish this season, led by senior inside linebackers and Butkus Award candidates **Courtney Watson** and **Mike Goolsby**. Watson, a 2002 Butkus Award finalist, led the team with 90 tackles last year despite missing three games due to injury. Goolsby was third on the squad with 75 tackles last season, but currently is sidelined with a shoulder injury. Junior **Brandon Hoyte** will step in for Goolsby, after replacing Watson three times last year and leading the Irish in tackles in all three contests (including a career-high 10 tackles vs. North Carolina State in the Gator Bowl). Senior **Derek Curry** will man the outside linebacker post after rolling up 34 tackles (seven for loss, four sacks) last year. Junior **Corey Mays** (four tackles in '02) and senior **Jerome Collins** (one tackle in '02) are the main linebacker reserves.

Backs -- Even with the loss of unanimous All-America cornerback Shane Walton and strong safety Gerome Sapp to the NFL, the Irish secondary should be particularly sturdy in 2003. Senior cornerback Vontez Duff was a third-team All-American last year and started every game (36 tackles, 7 PBU, 1 INT) for the Irish, while hard-hitting senior free safety Glenn Earl tied for second on the team with 81 tackles last year. Both Duff and Earl are preseason candidates for the Jim Thorpe Award. Senior Garron Bible (32 tackles in '02) is expected to fill Sapp's role at strong safety, while the competition to replace Walton at the other cornerback position is up for grabs between senior Jason Beckstrom and junior Dwight Ellick. Beckstrom missed all of last season with a torn biceps, while Ellick, a former all-BIG EAST track standout, has played in 23 career games, mostly on special teams. The reserve secondary unit is headed by senior Preston Jackson at cornerback, and juniors Quentin Burrell and Lionel Bolen at safety.

SCOUTING THE IRISH KICKING GAME

Senior **Nicholas Setta** takes on the dual role of placekicker and punter in 2003, becoming the first person to hold down both positions for the Irish since Craig Hentrich from 1989-92. A two-time Lou Groza Award candidate, Setta begins his fourth season as Notre Dame's kicker this year, setting his sights on several school records. He has made 37 career field goals (14 shy of John Carney's mark) and is fourth on the Irish career points-by-kicking chart (210, record is 294 by Hentrich). In addition, Setta has made 87 consecutive PAT kicks, the second-longest streak in school history (136 by Hentrich from 1989-92). This season will mark Setta's first as the everyday punter following the departure of two-time Ray Guy Award semifinalist Joey Hildbold. Setta has four career punts to his credit, all against Boston College in 2000, with a 40-yard average.

Junior walk-on offensive lineman **Csey Dunn** will begin the season as the Irish long snapper, taking over for the departed John Crowther. Meanwhile, senior walk-on quarterback Matt Krueger and junior reserve kicker D.J. Fitzpatrick are battling to nail down the holder spot.

Seniors **Vontez Duff** and **Julius Jones** will make up a formidable kick return crew for Notre Dame. Duff ranked eighth in the nation in kickoff return yardage last year (27.68) and became the first player in school history to return a punt, kickoff and interception for a touchdown last season. Jones ranks second in school history in three career return categories — kick return yardage (1,857), kickoff returns (59) and kickoff returns yardage (1,435) and is closing in on 1987 Heisman Trophy winner (and school record holder) Tim Brown in all three departments.

NUMBER CHANGE

The Irish made one number change from the 2003 media guide rosters as junior fullback **Josh Schmidt** has changed from No. 26 to No. 12.

NOTRE DAME FEATURED PROMINENTLY ON TELEVISION THIS YEAR

In addition to continuing its streak of consecutive games played on one of the four major television networks (NBC, ABC, CBS or ESPN), Notre Dame will be spotlighted on the small screen in several other ways during the 2003 season. Here's a thumbnail look at each of the individual TV projects which are featuring the Irish this year:

- ESPN is filming "The Season: Notre Dame Football" in South Bend throughout the '03 campaign. Crews from the network are attending practice sessions, team meals and other team-related activities, as well as conducting regular interviews with Irish players and coaches. "The Season: Notre Dame Football" will air for 10 weeks, beginning Tuesday, Sept. 9 at 7 p.m. (EST).
- ESPN College GameDay is celebrating its 10th season of live remotes from college football's top games. In recognition of its first-ever road trip (a Nov. 13, 1993 journey to South Bend for the game between No. 1 Florida State and No. 2 Notre Dame) is airing weekly all-access features on the Irish which are adapted from its feature presentation, "The Season: Notre Dame Football." Former Irish flanker and two-time All-American Raghib "Rocket" Ismail will lend even more of a Notre Dame flavor to the College GameDay broadcasts this year as he joins their crew for regular contributions.
- College Sports Television (CSTV), the nation's new 24-hour cable channel devoted exclusively
 to college sports, highlights Irish athletics during a two-hour block on Sunday nights called
 "Notre Dame Primetime." The show, which will be co-hosted by former Irish split end **Derrick**Mayes, focuses on all 26 Notre Dame sports and the continuing growth of Irish athletics.
- Besides these features, Notre Dame is now in the 13th season of its unique relationship with NBC. All Irish home football games since 1991 have been televised on the network, with the current agreement slated to continue through 2005. Tom Hammond (play-by-play) and Pat Haden (analysis) are beginning their third full season broadcasting the action for NBC in '03.

THE 2003 SCHEDULE

Last year, Notre Dame's rugged regular-season schedule featured eight teams that advanced to bowl games and indications are that the '03 Irish docket should be just as tough. Notre Dame opens the campaign with a home game against Bowl Championship Series qualifier Washington State on Saturday, followed by road games at Top 25 squads Michigan and Purdue (with a home date vs. Michigan State sandwiched in between). The Purdue contest kicks off a stretch of five consecutive games against bowl qualifiers for the Irish, highlighted by visits from BCS teams USC (Oct. 18) and Florida State (Nov. 1). This season, Notre Dame also will travel to three BIG EAST Conference schools — Pittsburgh, Boston College and Syracuse — as well as Pac-10 stalwart Stanford. Mid-November visits from Navy and BYU round out the arduous 2003 Irish schedule.

Last year's Notre Dame ledger was ranked 28th in the nation according to the final NCAA statistical reports, marking the 21st time in 26 seasons that the Irish have had their schedule ranked in the top 30 in the country. Notre Dame brilliantly navigated through its imposing 2002 schedule, defeating four ranked teams to tie Miami (Fla.) for top honors in that category.

NOTRE DAME ON THE SMALL SCREEN

With the Washington State game slated to be televised nationally by NBC, the Irish will extend their streak of appearances on one of four major networks (NBC, ABC, CBS or ESPN) to 125 straight games. That's a streak that spans 10 full seasons (1993-2002), and it will continue at least through the Michigan State game (Michigan on ABC, Michigan State on NBC). The last time the Irish didn't appear on one of those four networks was more than a decade ago (Oct. 31, 1992), when Notre Dame downed Navy, 38-7, at Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, N.J. That game was shown locally in the South Bend area on WNDU-TV. Here's a breakdown of the networks on which the Irish have played during this impressive streak:

BIG CROWDS

Notre Dame has played in front of sellout crowds in 150 of its previous 173 games, including all 13 games last season. In addition, the Irish attracted stadium record crowds three times in 2002 — the Air Force contest brought in a Falcon Stadium-record crowd of 56,409 (nearly 4,000 more than its listed capacity), while the Florida State game resulted in a Doak Campbell Stadium-record gathering of 84,106 (more than 2,000 above its listed capacity). Then, with the addition of 140 field seats against Boston College, the Irish and Eagles set a Notre Dame Stadium attendance record of 80,935. All told, Notre Dame has helped set a new stadium attendance record at an opponents' facility five times in the last two seasons (also Nebraska and Texas A&M in '01).

TICKET UPDATE

Demand for tickets to two of Notre Dame's six home games in 2003 ranks among the top five in the history of Notre Dame Stadium. The Notre Dame ticket office received 54,244 ticket requests for the Oct. 18 game vs. USC, making it the fourth-highest requested Irish home game in history. In addition, the Nov. 1 Notre Dame-Florida State game garnered 51,051 requests, placing it fifth on the all-time list. In fact, Notre Dame set a record by refunding \$5.1 million to lottery losers in the University's ticket distribution for contributing alumni. That total easily exceeded last year's mark of \$2.1 million and out-distanced the old refund record of \$3.8 million in 2001.

The Notre Dame Stadium record of 59,368 ticket requests was set in '01 when the Irish took on West

"Inside Notre Dame Football," featuring head coach **Tyrone Willingham**, is a half-hour, weekly television show syndicated nationally by Notre Dame Sports Properties and hosted by **Jeff Jeffers**. The show is carried by WNDU-TV in South Bend on Saturdays (normally one hour before kickoff, although this week's broadcast will air 90 minutes before game time) and on Fox Sports Chicago (3:30 p.m. Central on Tuesdays). The show also will be archived on the official Notre Dame athletics web site (www.und.com).

THE OFFICIAL NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL COACHES RADIO SHOW

"The Official Notre Dame Football Coaches Radio Show," presented by Boling Laser Center, is a half-hour, weekly radio program which is broadcast Tuesdays at 8 p.m. (EST) on U93 (92.9 FM) in South Bend. The show, which is hosted by U93 sports director **Sean Stires** and former Irish football captain and NFL standout **Larry Williams**, originates from Logan's Roadhouse in Mishawaka (4225 N. Main Street) and will feature a live or taped segment with Irish head coach **Tyrone Willingham**, a live appearance by a Notre Dame player, plus other features involving the Irish staff and program.

This program is a cooperative venture of Notre Dame Sports Properties, the Notre Dame athletics department, plus U93 and its parent company, Artistic Media Partners. The show is slated to air for 10 weeks during the football season (Sept. 2, 9, 16 and 23; Oct. 14, 21 and 28; Nov. 4 and 18; and Dec. 2), and it will be broadcast live on the official Notre Dame athletics web site (www.und.com).

THE OFFICIAL NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL POST-GAME RADIO SHOW

"The Official Notre Dame Football Postgame Radio Show," presented by Taco Bell, airs on U93 (92.9 FM) in South Bend and the official Notre Dame athletics web site (www.und.com).immediately following the conclusion of Westwood One's broadcasts of Notre Dame football games. The 90-minute show is co-hosted by U93 sports director Sean Stires, Jack Nolan and former Irish football captain and NFL standout Larry Williams. After home games, the show originates outside Gate 3 of the Joyce Center (directly across Juniper Road from Notre Dame Stadium). Following road games, the show comes from the Sports Page in Granger (50827 Princess Way). The home broadcasts feature live feeds from the Notre Dame postgame interview room, as well as on-site visit from an Irish assistant coach.

This program is a cooperative venture of Notre Dame Sports Properties, the Notre Dame athletics department, plus U93 and its parent company, Artistic Media Partners.

Virginia. Demand for that game was based on parents of current Notre Dame students being guaranteed four tickets for that contest — plus contributing alumni having the opportunity to apply for four tickets instead of the usual two, based on its designation as an alumni family game.

THE 2003 NFL DRAFT

Seven former Irish players were selected in the 2003 NFL Draft, the most of any school in the country with the exception of Florida and Ohio State (eight each). Leading the way was center **Jeff Faine**, who was chosen in the first round (21st overall) by the Cleveland Browns. Notre Dame now has had 58 opening-round selections, which ranks second only to USC (62) in the 67-year history of the NFL Draft.

Joining Faine in Notre Dame's '03 draft class were: OT **Jordan Black** (fifth round by the Kansas City Chiefs), OG **Sean Mahan** (fifth round by the Tampa Buccaneers), CB **Shane Walton** (fifth round by the St. Louis Rams), SS **Gerome Sapp** (sixth round by the Baltimore Ravens), WR **Arnaz Battle** (sixth round by the San Francisco 49ers) and OT **Brennan Curtin** (sixth round by the Green Bay Packers).

JOE THEISMANN NAMED TO 2003 COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME CLASS

Former Notre Dame All-America quarterback **Joe Theismann** is one of 11 former college players and two coaches named March 24 to the National Football Foundation's 2003 College Football Hall of Fame Division I-A class by Jon F. Hanson, chairman of the National Football Foundation.

The 2003 College Football Hall of Fame class will be inducted at the 46th Annual Awards Dinner on Dec. 9, 2003, at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel in New York City. The players and coaches will be officially enshrined at the Hall of Fame in South Bend in August 2004.

Theismann launched an attack on the Irish passing record books, setting 19 school marks while leading the team to its first bowl appearance in 45 years in 1969 and a 10-1 record capped by a Cotton Bowl victory in 1970 over top-rated and unbeaten Texas.

A first-team All-America selection as a senior by Associated Press, Theismann was the runner-up in the Heisman Trophy voting in 1970. A participant in the 1970 Hula Bowl, Theismann set school records for passing yards in a game (526), yards in a season (2,429) and touchdowns in a season (16) among others. He ranked second in the nation in total offense as a senior at 291.3 yards per game — and that year he helped the Irish as a team average 510.5 total yards per game and 252.7 passing yards per game, two marks that remain all-time Notre Dame bests.

In three seasons, Theismann led the Fighting Irish to a 20-3-2 record while completing 290 passes on 509 attempts for 4,411 yards, a mark that still ranks fifth in school history. Honored for his classroom prowess, he earned Academic All-America® honors in 1970 and was later named to the GTE Academic All-America® Hall of Fame.

Following graduation, Theismann embarked on a 15-year professional career, his final 12 years in the NFL as a member of the Washington Redskins. Upon retirement, he became a highly successful businessman as well as a prominent television sports analyst for ESPN. Theismann continues to support such charitable interests as the United Way, March of Dimes, American Heart Association, Cystic Fibrosis, Special Olympics, Boy Scouts of America and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Originally from South River, N.J., Theismann becomes the 40th Notre Dame player to be chosen for the Hall of Fame since inductions began in 1951. Five former Irish coaches also have been selected. No other school has produced more than those 45 enshrinees, the most recent being Ralph Guglielmi in 2001. Theismann also becomes the eighth Notre Dame quarterback selected to the Hall of Fame, joining Frank Carideo in 1954, Harry Stuhldreher in 1958, John Lujack in 1960, Angelo Bertelli in 1972, Paul Hornung in 1985, Bob Williams in 1988 and Guglielmi in 2001.

PAUL HORNUNG TO BE SUBJECT OF CELEBRITY ROAST

Former Notre Dame and NFL star **Paul Hornung** will be the focus of the annual Life Treatment Centers celebrity roast on Sept. 18 at the Joyce Center. Numerous members of the Notre Dame and NFL communities will offer a night of humor and entertainment at the expense of the 1956 Heisman Trophy winner, who was nicknamed "The Golden Boy." The festivities begin at 5:30 p.m. (EST) with a reception, followed by dinner and the roast at 6:30 p.m. (EST). All proceeds from this event will benefit Life Treatment Centers, a non-profit substance abuse treatment agency which treats hundreds of persons in the Michiana area who suffer from alcohol and drug addiction problems.

IRISH FOOTBALL NAMED ONE OF NATION'S TOP 10 MOST POWERFUL PROGRAMS

As part of its 2003 college football preview, *Sl.com* developed its list of the top 10 most powerful programs in the nation and Notre Dame was listed second behind only Miami (Fla.). According to the website, "college football's most recognizable program saw a return to glory under **Lou Holtz**, which included landing its own TV deal with NBC, and after a few down years appears to be headed in the right direction under **Tyrone Willingham**."

MAKING THE GRADE

The Notre Dame football squad recently has had four of the most successful semesters in the class-room in the history of the program, based on final grades from the past four semesters (2001-03). In the fall of 2001, the Irish team finished (at the time) with its second-highest combined grade-point average on record (2.685) since statistics were kept beginning in 1992. A total of 12 players earned Dean's List recognition and 38 players posted a "B" average or higher last fall. Then, in the spring of 2002, the Irish topped that mark with a record-setting 2.911 combined team GPA, with 13 players making the Dean's List and another 47 averaging a "B" or better. In the fall of '02, the Irish logged a 2.835 team GPA, followed by a 2.79 average in the spring of '03. Eight players made the Dean's List in both of the last two semesters, while 43 players had a "B" or better during the fall of 2002, and 50 more reached that mark in the spring of 2003.

NOTRE DAME EXCELS IN THE CLASSROOM AS WELL AS ON THE FIELD

The Notre Dame football team has earned American Football Coaches Association Academic Achievement Award special mention honors announced in August. To earn the award, a team must have a graduation rate of over 70 percent. Duke won the 2003 overall award with a perfect 100 percent graduation rate.

Notre Dame has been recognized 22 of 23 years the award has been presented, the most of any school in the nation. Notre Dame has won the overall award six times with the most recent coming in 2001 as the Irish posted a perfect 100 percent graduation rate, becoming (at the time) the eighth school in history to graduate everyone in the class during the reporting period. Notre Dame also won the overall award in 1982, 1983, 1984, 1988 and 1991. In 1988, Notre Dame became the only school to win the Academic Achievement Award and the National Championship in the same year.

FORMER IRISH GREAT DAVE DUERSON HEADS UP NATIONAL MONOGRAM CLUB

Former Notre Dame football All-American **Dave Duerson** is still extremely involved with the University in a number of capacities. A former team captain, Duerson was named to the Notre Dame Board of Trustees in 2001, and was the winner of the 2001 Rev. Edward F. Sorin, C.S.C., Award from the Notre Dame Alumni Association. The Sorin Award is presented annually to a graduate who has embodied "the values of Our Lady's University" in his service to the community. In 2002, Duerson founded his own company, Duerson Foods, after serving as president of Fair Oaks Farms, Inc., a Wisconsin-based international meat supplier that in 1999 was ranked 64th among Black Enterprise 100 companies. In addition, Duerson was a member of the advisory council for the University's Mendoza College of Business and currently is president of the Notre Dame National Monogram Club, a post he will hold through June 2005. He also is a member of the athletic department's student development mentoring program.

"THE SHIRT" NOW AVAILABLE FOR 2003 SEASON

For the 14th consecutive year, Notre Dame Student Activities and Government are sponsoring a T-shirt that benefits scholarship funds, student groups and service projects. Already, the initial run of 50,000 shirts has sold out, easily topping last year's early sellout of 44,000. In 2002, a record-setting total of

GRADUATION RATES

The University of Notre Dame compiled the nation's highest overall graduation rate for Division I-A student-athletes to take top honors in the 2003 *USA Today*/NCAA Academic Achievement Awards announced Sept. 2.

Ninety-two percent of the Fighting Irish student-athletes who enrolled in 1996 earned a degree from the University, three percentage points higher than second-place Tulsa University. Duke and Wisconsin finished third at 88 percent, followed by Northwestern, 87; Boston College, 86; Stanford, 84; Western Michigan, 83; Michigan, 82; and Syracuse, Rice and Utah State, 81.

In addition to the overall rate, Academic Achievement Awards are presented to the institutions with the best student-athlete graduation rates in comparison to the overall student body and to those that show the most improvement from the previous year.

Now in their third year, the awards include a \$20,000 prize for the top institutions in each category. They are based on federally compiled figures submitted by NCAA member institutions.

The NCAA bases graduation rates on the raw percentage of student-athletes who entered an institution and graduated within six years. Students who leave or transfer, regardless of academic standing, are considered non-graduates. Notre Dame's graduation rate for student-athletes who complete all four years of athletic eligibility is 99 percent.

IN OTHER IRISH SPORTS ACTION THIS WEEKEND ...

The fifth-ranked Irish women's soccer team is opening its home schedule this weekend with the Notre Dame Classic, playing host to Oklahoma Sunday at 1 p.m. (EST) at Alumni Field in the tournament finale. Meanwhile, the No. 4 Notre Dame men's soccer team will play its home opener Saturday at 7:30 p.m. (EST) against 13th-ranked St. John's, also at Alumni Field. The Irish volleyball team is on the road in Austin Texas, this weekend, taking on Texas Saturday at 7 p.m. (CDT) in the Longhorn Classic.

130,000 shirts were sold, with that initial run of 44,000 selling out within six weeks of its debut (at the time, it was one of the earliest sellouts in the history of the project). As a result, Irish head coach **Tyrone Willingham** began labelling the Shirt-clad crowd as the "sea of green."

Over the past 13 years, the venture has more than \$2 million in net profit for worthy causes and serves the dual purpose of promoting spirit and raising funds. Some of the proceeds supported students and employees who have incurred catastrophic accidents, while others benefitted endowment funds and additional monies were given to support service projects for student organizations on campus.

In a rare break from tradition, "The Shirt 2003" once again is green and features this year's motto, "Here Come The Irish." The short-sleeve shirt is traditionally worn by Notre Dame students and fans at the first home game of each football season. The cost of this year's shirt is \$15 and it is available on campus to the University community and the general public at the Hammes Bookstore, Irish Express, the information desk at the LaFortune Student Center, the Varsity Shop at the Joyce Center and the Alumni Association at the Eck Center.
