Students also participate in cutting edge research and diverse study abroad opportunities, enabling Notre Dame to offer one of the top academic experiences in the world.

First Year of Studies

The First Year of Studies program provides all first-year students with the opportunity to gain a wide-ranging liberal arts background before choosing a specific major within Notre Dame's five undergraduate colleges. A progressive advising program for all student-athletes enables the University to follow the academic progress of all student-athletes on a regular basis. Key to the program is the fact that it is not run by the athletics department but by the University administration.

Notre Dame expects the best out of its student-athletes just as it does of every other student on campus. Notre Dame has had unprecedented academic success among its athletes, consistently ranking among the top NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision schools in graduation rates and academic progress. With more Academic All-Americans than any other school since 2000, Irish athletes have shown themselves capable of performing in the classroom while competing on the field at an elite level.

Programs honored by the NCAA for Academic Progress Rate scores in 2010, more than any other of the 120 Football Bowl Subdivision universities. The APR measures multi-year academic success by team members.

Irish teams which recorded a perfect score of 1,000 in the NCAA's 2010 Academic Progress Rate report, more than any other Football Bowl Subdivision institution. Notre Dame also had 13 additional programs with scores of 990 or better and all 26 varsity teams placed above NCAA standards.

Programs which achieved a perfect 100 percent graduation rate according to the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate, second most among Football Bowl Subdivision institutions.

Federal graduation rate percent achieved by nine Irish teams, according to the latest NCAA figures. Notre Dame had 11 teams ranked first in their respective sport.

Percentage of Irish varsity sports (19 of 22) to achieve a perfect 100 percent graduation rate according to the NCAA's Graduation Success Rate. Notre Dame was one of only 10 institutions with more than half its programs achieving a 100 percent graduation rate and no other school saw more than 80 percent of its programs achieve a perfect score.

According to 2009 NCAA Graduation Success Rate results, Notre Dame ranked first in the nation in graduation rates among all student-athletes (99 percent), male student-athletes (98 percent), female student athletes (100 percent), black student-athletes (97 percent) and football student-athletes (96 percent).

Sports Medicine

While no athlete plans on an injury, Notre Dame is prepared with one of the top sports medicine teams in the country to help keep its athletes fit and ready to compete. With training facilities in the Joyce Center, Notre Dame Stadium and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex, the training staff is always there to care for athletes. With approximately 225 years combined experience on the full-time staff, Notre Dame also boasts a partnership with the renowned South Bend Orthopaedics to provide first-class care.

Sports Nutrition

Notre Dame has incorporated Erika Whitman, a full-time sports dietician, as a part of its Strength and Conditioning staff. Whitman continually provides accurate and up-to-date nutrition education to studentathletes and coaches. Including nutrition as an integral component of all training programs enables Irish athletes to achieve optimal health and maximize performance.

The University of Notre Dame

When Father Edward F. Sorin started his school in the northern Indiana wilderness, he had only \$300, three log buildings badly in need of repair and a far-sighted vision of establishing a liberal arts school to meet the growing educational needs of the frontier. He dreamed of building a great university, and in 1842, he founded the University of Notre Dame du Lac.

Over the years, the University of Notre Dame du Lac would evolve into a preeminent place for Catholic thought. While becoming one of the top undergraduate institutions in the country, Notre Dame has also been at the cutting edge of research, including such innovations as the transmission of wireless messages and the development of synthetic rubber. The University also has stressed residential life, with four of five students living on campus. Students come to Notre Dame not only to learn how to think, but to learn how to live, keeping faith with the vision of Father Sorin.



Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.

President

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C, took office as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2005. He was elected by the University's Board of Trustees to a five-year term April 30, 2004.

An associate professor of philosophy and member of Notre Dame's faculty since 1990, Father Jenkins had served as a vice president and associate provost at the University from July 2000 until becoming president.

Prior to his service in the provost's office, Father Jenkins had been religious superior of the Holy Cross priests and brothers at Notre Dame for three years. As religious superior, he was a Fellow and Trustee of the University.

Father Jenkins specializes in the areas of ancient philosophy, medieval philosophy and the philosophy of religion. He

is the author of Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aguinas, published by Cambridge University Press in 1997.

Father Jenkins earned degrees in philosophy from Oxford University in 1987 and 1989. He earned his master of divinity degree and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, Calif., in 1988. Prior to entering the Congregation of Holy Cross, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively.

Father Jenkins was ordained a priest in Notre Dame's Basilica of the Sacred Heart in 1983. He served as director of the Old College program for Notre Dame undergraduate candidates for the Congregation of Holy Cross from 1991 to 1993.

A native of Omaha, Neb., Father Jenkins was born Dec. 17, 1953.

Jack Swarbrick Director of Athletics

John B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a University of Notre Dame graduate who rose to national prominence as a lawyer, consultant and executive in the collegiate and Olympic sports industries, is in his third year in 2010-11 as director of athletics at his alma mater.

Among Swarbrick's athletics initiatives are meeting the performance needs of Notre Dame student-athletes through establishment of a new sports performance division, reaching out to more former Irish student-athletes via the Notre Dame Monogram Club and other programs, utilizing emerging digital technologies to deliver better information on and access to Notre Dame athletic programs via expanded production and distribution of programming, and restructuring Notre Dame's approach to sport administration through assignment of a unique administrator to each of the

26 Irish sports.

The past two years combined in Notre Dame athletics have featured 68 All-Americans, 14 Academic All-America selections and four NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners; record involvement in community service hours by Irish studentathletes; NCAA runner-up team finishes in 2010 men's lacrosse,

2009 fencing and 2008 women's soccer; NCAA semifinal appearances in 2009 and 2010 women's tennis and 2009 women's soccer, plus a 2010 third-place fencing finish; the hiring of new Irish head football coach Brian Kelly to start the 2010 season; the decision to build a new, freestanding ice hockey arena, scheduled to open for the 2011-12 season, plus the 2009-10 dedications of new facilities for soccer and lacrosse – as well as opening of the new Purcell Pavilion within the south dome of the Joyce Center, and 15 BIG EAST Conference titles along with four other league crowns in hockey, men's lacrosse and fencing.

Notre Dame ranked number one in the country (among Football Bowl Subdivision schools) in the two most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) surveys -- in 2009 with a 99 (including a 97 score in football that also ranked number one).

Born in Yonkers, N.Y., and raised in Yonkers and Bloomington, Ind., Swarbrick is a 1976 magna cum laude graduate of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in economics. Upon graduating from Stanford University Law School in 1980, he returned to Indiana to accept a position as an associate in the Indianapolis law firm Baker & Daniels. He made partner in 1987 and spent 28 years overall with the firm.

As a member of the Indiana Sports Corporation, including the chairmanship from 1992 to 2001, Swarbrick led most of the city's successful proposals to a wide array of athletics organizations – from the National Football League to the United States Olympic Committee to the Big Ten Conference. His leadership efforts resulted in the city earning the right to play host to the 2012 Super Bowl in Indianapolis at Lucas Oil Stadium; becoming the home of the National Collegiate Athletic Association national headquarters in 1999; hosting the 1987 Pan American Games, 1991 World Gymnastics Championships, NCAA Men's Basketball Final Fours and other college championship

competitions and an array of national and world championships in Olympic sports.

Swarbrick's practice at Baker & Daniels focused on the representation of owners of sports teams and organizations that sanction or conduct athletic competitions. He served as general counsel for numerous national governing bodies of Olympic sports, including USA Gymnastics and USRowing, and as a consultant to the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

In his work as an advisor to the NCAA, Swarbrick coordinated the men's College Basketball Partnership, an NCAA-led group that addresses the opportunities and challenges in the sport, and developed the business plan for the new NBA/NCAA youth basketball enterprise, iHoops. In 2000 Swarbrick received one of the NCAA's highest honors, The Flying Wedge Award, for his work in establishing Indianapolis as the new home of the NCAA. In 2001 the State of Indiana presented him with the Sagamore of the Wabash Award.

Born March 19, 1954, Swarbrick was named Notre Dame's 12th athletics director on July 16, 2008. He and his wife, Kimberly, are the parents of four children: Kate, a 2010 graduate of St. Louis University; Connor, a senior at Wake Forest University; Cal, a freshman at TCU; and Christopher, a high school senior. In the midst of a master plan that will touch nearly every varsity team, Notre Dame has shown its commitment to providing athletes with the best possible facilities to help them compete on a national level. From new facilities to the extensive renovation of existing ones, Notre Dame is committed to giving Irish athletes every edge imaginable. The plan will result in a drastically altered footprint on the southeast corner of campus, creating an athletics quad that will give every Irish athlete a place they will be proud to call home.



With more consensus national championships in football than any other school, other programs have begun to emerge on the national scene in the 15 years since Notre Dame joined the BIG EAST Conference.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS - Current | senior defender/midfielder Lauren Fowlkes (second team) continued an unmatched tradition of successful student-athletes in the Irish women's soccer program as she was named to the 2009 ESPN The Magazine/CoSIDA Academic All-America Team. Fowlkes has helped extend an Academic All-America heritage that now includes 23 selections (see p. 138) during the past 15 seasons. What's more, eight Notre Dame women's soccer players have combined for 12 first-team Academic All-America honors, with the Irish program producing at least one firstteamer in eight of the past 10 years. At least one Notre Dame women's soccer player also has been chosen as an Academic All-American in 13 of the past 15 seasons (all but `99 and `02).

Some highlights from that stretch include **Jen** Renola being named Academic All-American of the Year for the '96-'97 women's fall/winter atlarge team (covering eight sports). Jenny Streiffer was the only sophomore named to the first team in '97 and was a second-team selection in '98. Vanessa Pruzinsky (who graduated with a 4.0 GPA as a chemical engineering major) earned first team honors in '00, '01 and '03, becoming the second Notre Dame student-athlete ever to be first-team Academic All-America as a sophomore and junior. In 2003 Pruzinsky became the first D-I women's soccer player ever named first-team Academic All-America three times (also Academic All-American of the Year) Monica Gonzalez (second team in 2001) joined Renola as the second Irish soccer player to couple All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season ('01 - joined by Brittany Bock in '07 & '08). Joining Pruzinsky on the 2003 squad were second-teamers Erika Bohn and Mary Boland, completing the first three D-I women's soccer teammates ever to be Academic All-Americans in the same year. Bohn was a firstteam honoree in 2004, with Annie Schefter named to the second team - and each was a first-teamer in their senior season (2005), giving Bohn the rare three-year Academic All-America distinction while she and Schefter became just the third set of D-I women's soccer teammates

ever to be first team Academic All-Americans in the same year.

ALL-AMERICANS – Notre Dame now has fielded 47 All-America selections since 1992. while its total of 44 NSCAA All-Americans during the past 16 seasons (1994-2009) trails only North Carolina's 50 among Division I teams. All told, the Irish have had at least one NSCAA All-America selection every season since 1992 (see pp. 132-138), including 14 seasons with multiple NSCAA All-Americans (two-plus every year since 2003), and eight seasons with at least three NSCAA All-Americans. In addition, Notre Dame has produced at least six different NSCAA All-Americans each at the positions of forward, midfielder and defender during the program's storied history. Fourteen Notre Dame players - including current junior Courtney Barg - have been first team All-Americans, led by four four-year All-Americans: midfielder Holly Manthei (*94-*97), defender Jen Grubb ('96-'99), midfielder Anne Makinen ('97-'00) and forward Kerri Hanks ('05-'08). The 2008 season also marked the fifth time in school history that the Irish have had at least two first-team All-Americans.

BIG CROWDS COAST-TO-COAST - Notre Dame has a tradition of drawing record-setting crowds, including the largest in NCAA women's soccer history for the 1999 College Cup final (14,110), in San Jose, Calif. The Irish played in front of 14,006 two days earlier at Spartan Stadium, in the '99 semifinals. A Nebraska-record crowd of 3,702 watched the Irish and Huskers play to a four-overtime tie in the 1999 NCAA quarterfinals while a regular-season-record 4,051 fans were in attendance when Notre Dame traveled to topranked Santa Clara earlier in 1999. A Maloney Field-record crowd of 2,629 saw Notre Dame play at top-ranked Stanford in the 2002 NCAA third round while the presence of the Irish for the 2005 NCAA quarterfinal at Portland produced a sellout (4,892). In the 2008 College Cup semifinal match, 8,926 fans packed the WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, N.C. to see the Irish down Stanford, 1-0.

CLASH OF THE TITANS – Notre Dame and North Carolina are entrenched atop many statistical lists in the Division I women's soccer record

COACHING EXCELLENCE – Notre Dame's **Randy Waldrum** – the first five-time BIG EAST women's soccer coach of the year (1999, 2000, 2003, 2004 and 2008) – has earned national coach-of-the-year honors in each of the past two seasons ('08 by NSCAA, '09 by *Soccer America*) while leading the Fighting Irish on an active run of four consecutive NCAA College Cups (and five in the past six years). Waldrum's eight career regional coach-of-the-year honors include four in the past seven seasons, more than any other coach in the country (in either men's or women's Division I soccer).

Waldrum has taken four different Notre Dame teams to the NCAA title game ('99, '04, '06 and '08; also 2000, '07 and '09 semifinalists). Waldrum owns the fourth-best career win percentage in Division I women's soccer history (.787/339-84-21; third among active coaches) and he ranks fifth among active coaches in career wins. His Notre Dame teams have combined to go 100-25-4 (.791) in "big games" (versus NSCAA top-25/postseason opponents) while producing 24 All-Americans and 17 Academic All-Americans.

The Notre Dame women's soccer team's 2004 national title season was a four-month odyssey that saw the Irish go 30-1-2 overall – 25-1-1 in the college season, after a 5-0-1 mark on the preseason training

trip in Campinas, Brazil (featuring a 16-3 scoring edge versus top semi-pro teams from the Sao Paulo area). The games attracted many curious local spectators and included the traditional exchange of gifts and the taking of a group photo. The Irish enjoyed great camaraderie at the wonderful five-star Vitoria Hotel and soaked in the atmosphere at first-division Brazilian men's professional games held at Ponta Preta and Guarani. Meals included Brazil's many exotic and tasty forms of pizza and the unique Brazilian steakhouses that featured table-top carvings of a variety of entrees. Notre Dame also took a trip to Brazil prior to the 2000 season and went on to similar success when the 2000 NCAA schedule rolled around (23-1-1; NCAA semifinalist; ranked number one).













book. In 2008, the heavyweights met once again to decide the title, marking the fifth time (previously met in 1994, 1996, 1999 & 2006) the storied rivals played for the NCAA Championship and the sixth of seven times they met in NCAA postseason play. The 2008 title was decided by a UNC goal scored in the game's 88th minute, while the 2006 tilt featured a matchup of teams tied for the top spot in the NSCAA coaches poll. That game also marked the first time that both teams have entered the NCAA final with 25-plus wins (ND 25-0-1; UNC 26-1-0).

CLASS ACTS - Notre Dame's class of 1998 helped the Irish post a .921 win percentage from 1994-97 (91-6-4), the best four-year record (based on win percentage) in the program's history. The class of 2006 compiled the most career wins (92-8-3) ever by a Notre Dame class, with their .908 career win pct. ranking second in program history. Two other classes have won more than 90 percent of their games, with the class of '97 winning 90.3% (87-8-3; '93-'96) and the class of '99 winning 90.1% (89-8-4; '95-'98). The class of 2008 then equaled the '06 class with 92 wins, while last year's class posted a 91-11-4 (.877) mark while making four trips to the NCAA College Cup and two appearances in the national title game.

A CLUB FOR ONE - All-America forward and two-time Hermann Trophy winner Kerri Hanks delivered two assists in Notre Dame's win over Florida State in the 2008 NCAA Championship quarterfinals to become the first D-I player to amass 73 goals and 73 assists in her career. Only two others have even qualified for the 70G-70A club: North Carolina's Mia Hamm and Notre Dame's Jenny Streiffer. Hanks currently stands in eighth place on the Division I career points list with 241 points (84G-73A), and 13th on the NCAA career goals chart. As a junior, Hanks was the fifth Irish player to reach the 50G-50A club, joining former ND greats Streiffer (70G-71A, '96-'99), Cindy Daws (61G-67A, '93-'96), Katie Thorlakson (55G-73A; '02-'05) and Anne Makinen (65G-56A, **′**97-00).

CONFERENCE COMMAND - Notre Dame owns a 152-7-5 (.942) all-time record in 19 years

of regular-season conference games (*91-*94 in Midwestern Collegiate Conference, since '95 in BIG EAST), plus 40-2-1 (.942) in all conference tournaments. The Irish are 134-8-5 (.928) in all BIG EAST regular-season games (35-2-1 in BIG EAST Championship), including four versus cross-divisional UConn (2-1-1; '00-'03) that were not part of the league schedule. Entering the 2010 season, Notre Dame owns an NCAA Division 1-record 66-game unbeaten streak (63-0-3) against

BIG EAST opposition (easily breaking North Carolina's old record of 55 in ACC play from 1994-200) dating back to a 4-1 loss at #15 Marguette on Sept. 30, 2005. In that time, the only ties were 0-0 draws at Connecticut (Oct. 13, 2006) and Pittsburgh (Oct. 4, 2009), and a 1-1 deadlock at #12 West Virginia in the 2007 BIG EAST final (WVU won 5-3 on PKs, but the game is recorded as a tie). Since joining the league, the Irish are 171-11-6 (.926) in all games versus BIG EAST teams, including three NCAA games vs. UConn (2-0 win in '95 NCAA quarterfinals, 2-1 loss in '97 NCAA semifinals, 2-0 win in '04 third round). Notre Dame's 188 games against BIG EAST teams since '95 include a 713-85 scoring edge. Notre Dame

> also enters 2010 riding a 15-year, 94-game home unbeaten streak (93-0-1) versus BIG EAST teams.

> **COVER GIRL** - Former Notre Dame All-American Kate Sobrero has won NCAA and World Cup titles, each time appearing on a national magazine cover. Soccer America featured Sobrero on a 1995 cover after she was named the College Cup's defensive MVP, as the Irish shut out top-ranked North Carolina and undefeated Portland to win the title. After playing a key role as a starting defender on the U.S. team that

won the 1999 World Cup, Sobrero (lower right) was part of a celebration photo on the cover of *Time*. Sobrero – who now goes by her married name Markgraf – returned to the spotlight in 2004, combining with former Notre Dame midfielder **Shannon Boxx** as top starters for the Olympic gold-medal team. More recently, both started for the the U.S. at the '07 World Cup (third place) and '08 Olympics (gold medal).

DYNAMIC DUOS – 2008 graduates **Kerri** Hanks (241 pts; 84G-73A, 23 GWG) and Brittany **Bock** (121 pts; 46G-29A, 15 GWG) combined for 130 goals (plus 102 assists for 362 points). The duo's 130 combined goals rank second all-time at ND. A pair of 2003 seniors – forwards **Amanda Guertin** (48) and **Amy Warner** (37) – combined for 85 career goals, the seventh-highest goalscoring classmates in Notre Dame history. Tops on that list are the 150 by 1999 seniors **Jenny Heft** (80) and **Jenny Streiffer** (70), followed by 124 from 2000 seniors Anne Makinen (65) and Meotis Erikson (59) and the 114 by 1996 seniors Michelle McCarthy (59) and Rosella Guerrero (55). Other top tandems have included 112 goals by 1998 seniors Monica Gerardo (73) and **Shannon Boxx** (39) and 95 from 1996 seniors Cindy Daws (61) and Amy VanLaecke (34). Hanks and Bock combined for 84 GWG's, tops in program history.

FANTASTIC FOUR – Notre Dame featured one of the nation's top forward rotations in 2003, producing four double-digit goalscorers for the first time since 1999: seniors Amy Warner (10G-12A) and Amanda Guertin (11G-6A), junior Mary Boland (12G-4A) and sophomore Katie Thorlakson (10G-11A). The 2005 team matched that feat as Thorlakson (18), freshmen Kerri Hanks (28) and Brittany Bock (12), and sophomore Amanda Cinalli (10) each had 10-plus. Notre Dame again was the nation's first team with four double-digit goalscorers in 2006: Hanks (22), freshman Michele Weissenhofer (18), Bock (12) and Cinalli (11). All but six of the past 20 Irish teams have featured three or more double-digit scorers (four in '94, '98, '99, '03, '05 and '06; six in '93, '96; seven in '97). Double-digit scorers in 1997 included: Anne Makinen (23), Meotis Erikson (22), Jenny Streiffer (20), Jenny Heft (20), Shannon Boxx (13), Monica Gerardo (10) and Monica Gonzalez (10).

FAR & WIDE – Notre Dame's 2010 roster includes players from 12 states as well as one player from Canada. The program's all-time roster canvasses 32 states and three foreign countries.

FIRST-TIME VISITORS – Since 1993, opponents making their first visit to Notre Dame have lost to the Irish 53 times, with only four wins for the opposition and one tie (53-4-1; .922). During the 2009 season, the Irish added wins against first-time visitors IUPUI, Central Michigan and Oregon State, all in the first three rounds of the NCAA Championship.

FLIP-THROW - From 2006-09, Michele

Weissenhofer brought a unique weapon to Notre Dame's offensive attack, as her "flip" throwin style turned a typically boring part of the game into a fan-favorite activity. The spunky Weissenhofer – whose flip-throws typically featured keen accuracy and far-post, 40-yard distance – was a youth gymnast/soccer player who began practicing the flip-throw at the age of six, after watching a friend of her mother performing the throw. During the course of her career at Notre Dame, Weissenhofer recorded seven assists directly from flip-throws, while numerous other scoring Irish chances resulted from her unorthodox deliveries.

4.0 FOCUS – Defender **Vanessa Pruzinsky** – dubbed by Irish head coach **Randy Waldrum** as his most focused and "on-task" player in more than 25 years of coaching – became the third Notre Dame chemical engineering major ever to graduate with a 4.0 cumulative grade-point average (the previous two did so in '63 and '74). Pruzinsky also was the first female student ever to earn an "A" in the introduction to chemical engineering course.

Academic All-America forward **Mary Boland** concluded her studies at Notre Dame with her third 4.0 semester in the spring of 2005 (yielding a 3.90 cumulative GPA as a psychology major) while two freshmen on the '04 NCAA champion-ship team — **Ashley Jones** (fall) and **Jannica Tjeder** (spring) — each posted 4.0 semesters in the 2004-05 academic year. It was only the beginning for Jones, who went on to log five more 4.0 semesters (including her entire junior and senior years) on the way to earning her bachelor's degree in accounting. Jones graduated from Notre Dame with a stellar 3.981 cumulative GPA that was comprised of a staggering 36 "A" grades and a pair of A-minuses.

FOUR-TIME ALL-AMERICANS, PART I – In 27 seasons, only 23 Division I women's soccer players have been named to the NSCAA All-America team four times, with Notre Dame players comprising four of the past 11. Notre Dame, UNC and Portland are the only programs to produce multiple players who have been four-year NSCAA All-Americans. The Irish players include midfielder **Holly Manthei** (*94-*97), defender **Jen Grubb** (*96-*99), midfielder **Anne Makinen** (*98-*01) and forward **Kerri Hanks** (*05-*08). Manthei and Makinen are two of only four midfielders in the club, while Grubb is one of five full-time defenders on the list.

FOUR-TIME ALL-AMERICANS, PART II – In 2008, Kerri Hanks became the 27th Notre Dame student-athlete (now 28) to earn All-America honors in four years (for the same sport/event). Hanks was joined in the 2008-09 academic year by Irish women's fencer Adrienne Nott. Other recent additions to the group include baseball pitcher Aaron Heilman ('01), distance runner Ryan Shay ('02), men's fencers Ozren Debic and Jan Viviani ('03), plus men's fencer Michal

Sobieraj and women's fencers Alicja Kryczalo and Andrea Ament (all in '04), and then three in 2007 (fencers Patrick Ghattas and Valerie Providenza and distance runner Molly Huddle).

Hanks and Heilman are two of just six to do so in a team-oriented sport, as are soccer players **Holly Manthei** (*98), **Jen Grubb** (*00), **Anne Makinen** (*00) and basketball player **Kevin O'Shea** (*50).

Other four-year honorees include cross country's Oliver Hunter ('43) and Mike McWilliams ('93), men's fencers Mike Sullivan ('79), Charles Higgs-Coulthard ('87), Yehuda Kovacs ('89), Leszek Nowosielski ('91), Jeremy Siek ('97) and Luke LaValle ('99), and women's fencers Molly Sullivan ('88), Myriah Brown ('99), Sarah Walsh ('99) and Magda Krol ('00).

FRONTRUNNERS – During the 2008 season, the Irish trailed for a grand total of 4:05 (59:06-61:05 vs. Marquette, 87:54-90:00 vs. UNC) and led for 1,615:28 of 2,450:52 minutes (65.9% of the elapsed game time). Before trailing versus Marquette, the Irish opened the season with 11 consecutive games without trailing.

Notre Dame's longest run without trailing first came in the 2003 season (16 games). The Irish ended up trailing for less than one percent of the minutes in 2003 (187) while only two teams came back to tie the Irish that season. The 2006 NCAA runner-up team matched the 2003 team's record by playing 16 consecutive games without a deficit. The Irish trailed early against West Virginia (Sept. 29, 2006) before nine straight weeks without a deficit ended in the title-game loss to UNC. The 2004 national champs also rarely trailed (in just four of 27 games) while the 2005 team trailed for a total of only 153 minutes.

GOALS-A-PLENTY – From 2007-09, Notre Dame had a goal-scoring streak of 54 games, beginning with a scoreless draw with Michigan to open the 2007 season and ending with a 6-0 loss to North Carolina on Sept. 4, 2009. Since '94, the Irish have scored in 380 of 400 (.950) – with goals in 277 of 291 regular-season games (.951) in that 15-year stretch.

Last year's 54-game goal streak was the second-longest in school history, trailing only a 55-game run from Aug. 29, 1997-Sept. 17, 1999. That streak was ended with a 1-0 loss to SMU (All-American **Anne Makinen** did not play due to commitments with Finland's national team). Stretching from '92-'04, the Irish scored in 94.9% of their games (297 of 313).

GREAT GRADES – The women's soccer team consistently has performed at a high level on the field and in the classroom, a fact that has never been more prominent then over the past five seasons. In 2004-05 the Irish posted a 25-1-1 record and won the national title all while posting

a 3.38 team GPA in the 2004 fall semester and a 3.35 in the spring of 2005 (second-best among all ND varsity teams). More on-field success (22-3-0) and top semester GPAs (3.36 in '05 fall; 3.42 in '06 spring) followed in 2005-06. The Irish then turned in another 25-1-1 season in 2006 and returned to the title game, followed by a 3.20 team GPA in the 2006 fall term and a 3.30 in the '07 spring. The women's soccer players ended the 2007 spring term with a 3.32 cumulative team GPA (fourthbest of any ND team), and kept that pace in the 707-08 academic year with a 3.32 mark in the fall and a 3.34 GPA in the spring, complementing a 19-5-2 record on the field. 2008 marked a return to the title game and a program-best 26-game unbeaten streak and 3.378 (third-best of any ND team) cumulative GPA for the year.

HERMANN TROPHY - Notre Dame is one of two schools to produce three-plus different recipients of the prestigious Hermann Trophy, presented to the national player of the year and now known as the Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Award. Midfielders Cindy Daws (1996) and Anne Makinen (2000) were the first Irish players to receive the Hermann (each also was awarded the former M.A.C. Award). In 2006, forward **Kerri Hanks** became the first sophomore (in men's or women's soccer) to receive the Hermann. Hanks then won the award for a second time after a stellar senior campaign in 2008, becoming just the fourth woman ever to earn the award twice and the first to do so in non-consecutive seasons.

HOME SWEET HOME – The Irish enter their second season at the newly-constructed Alumni

Memorable Moments

The Notre Dame women's soccer team closed out the 1990s with the second-most wins in the country (196), capping a decade that saw the Irish rise from regional obscurity to NCAA champions. Here's a look at top moments from the 1990s - and bevond:

Oct. 28, 1990: Notre Dame posts the program's first win over a ranked opponent (4-0 vs. 24thranked Xavier).

Oct. 15, 1991: At 10-0-2, the Irish earn their first national ranking (16th).

Nov. 13, 1993: After a rise to third in the polls, Notre Dame makes its first NCAA Tournament appearance (a first-round loss).

Oct. 2, 1994: The Irish end UNC's NCAA-record 92-game win streak (0-0, in St. Louis).

Oct. 24, 1994: At 15-0-1. Notre Dame is voted number one for the first time and ends the regular season top-ranked.

Nov. 5, 1995: Amy VanLaecke scores to give the Irish the BIG EAST Conference title in their first year in the league, avenging a rare home loss to UConn in the regular season.

Dec. 1, 1995: The Irish blank defending champ and host UNC in the NCAA semifinals (1-0) to reach their second NCAA final.

Dec. 3, 1995: Notre Dame wins the NCAA title by shutting out undefeated Portland, 1-0 in triple overtime on a **Cindy Daws** free kick.

Oct. 4, 1996: Freshman Jenny Streiffer scores twice in a 2-1 overtime victory as Notre Dame becomes the first team ever to defeat UNC in consecutive meetings.

Dec. 6, 1996: Three goals early in the second half produce a 3-2 comeback win over Portland, securing a third trip to the finals.

Nov. 9, 1997: Freshman Anne Makinen's hat trick versus Connecticut (6-1) gives the Irish their third straight BIG EAST title.

Nov. 8, 1998: Makinen again burns UConn in the BIG EAST final (82nd-minute goal; 1-0).

Nov. 19, 1999: Mia Sarkesian's third goal of the season, in the 81st minute, beats Stanford in the NCAA third round (1-0).

Nov. 28, 1999: Four OTs are not enough as the ND-Nebraska goes to PKs, with **Kelly Lindsey's** conversion (6th round) and LaKeysia Beene's save ending the marathon.

Dec. 3, 1999: The team's final win of the decade comes at the NCAA semifinals in San Jose, 1-0 over top-ranked and unbeaten Santa Clara (75th-minute goal by Ali Lovelace).

Notre Dame posted a 222-16-4 (.926) record at Alumni Field (182-12-4 in last 198) - highlighted by an active streak of 94 straight home games without a loss versus BIG EAST opposition (93-0-1). Notre Dame's all-time record at Alumni Field versus teams not ranked in the NSCAA top 25 stood at 155-4-2 (68-12-1 vs. ranked teams), with 78 straight home wins over unranked teams from 1990-2001, before a 2-2 game with Wisconsin. The Irish played at Moose Krause Stadium from 1988-89.

Notre Dame carries a 14-game unbeaten streak (14-0-0) into its second season in the new Alumni Stadium. The program-best 43-game home unbeaten streak (41-0-2) came to an end in 2007, with the Irish also previously compiling home unbeaten streaks of 29 games (1999-2001), 28 games (1992-95) and 27 games (2007-09).

LAST-MINUTE HEROES – Excluding overtime wins, the first 16 Notre Dame women's soccer seasons saw the Irish win in the final minute just twice – but it happened twice more in the 2004 national-title season (both at the end of regulation), as Jen Buczkowski scored with 0:44 left at Georgetown (2-1) and Jill Krivacek headed in a Katie Thorlakson corner kick to beat Wisconsin with 0:53 left in that NCAA second-round matchup (1-0). It had been 10 years since an Irish player won a game in the final minute, by Michelle McCarthy with 0:25 left in overtime (119:35) of a 4-3 comeback versus William & Mary (9/11/95). The only other to score a final-minute GWG was future All-American Ragen Coyne (89:24; vs. Wright State in '92).

MAGIC NUMBERS - Scoring three goals has been virtually an automatic win in Notre Dame women's soccer history, with a 286-3-1 record (.988) in those games (188-1-0 since Oct. 6, 1995). Notre Dame also is 390-10-15 (.958) when holding the opponent to 0-1 goals.

Most impressively, Notre Dame is 316-0-1 alltime when claiming a 2-0 lead and is unbeaten in its past 293 contests when going ahead 2-0 (dating back to a 3-3 tie with Vanderbilt on Sept. 15, 1991, in Cincinnati). In fact, just two of the past 199 Irish opponents to face a 2-0 deficit have forced a tie, something achieved by four opponents in Notre Dame history: Duke on Oct. 17, 1993, in Houston (Irish won 3-2), Connecticut on Nov. 10, 1996, in the BIG EAST final at Alumni Field (ND led 2-0, later tied 2-2 and 3-3, ND won 4-3), Duke on Nov. 30, 2007, in the NCAA quarterfinals at Alumni Field (Irish won 3-2), and most recently, Villanova on Oct. 12, 2008 in Villanova, Pa. (Irish won 3-2 in OT).

The program's 22-year history includes just 386 goals allowed in 521 games (0.74 GA per game), with the Irish holding the opponent to 0-1 goals in nearly 80 percent of those all-time games (415) while allowing three-plus goals only 38 times (7.3%; 4-33-1). Notre Dame has surrendered fourplus goals just 15 times in the program's history (only six times since 1995).

MILESTONES – The most recent milestone in Notre Dame women's soccer history came on Sept. 15, 2006, when Lizzie Reed scored the 1,500th goal:

NUMBER-ONE NOTES – Notre Dame has been ranked number one in the NSCAA coaches poll during seven of the past 16 seasons (and four of the past six): the final two months in 1994; the final month in '96; the final 11 weeks of 2000; six

NCAA CHAMPIONS – The shootout victory over UCLA in the 2004 championship game made Notre Dame the second Division I women's soccer program ever to win multiple NCAA titles, with the Irish previously winning the title in 1995. Notre Dame also ranks second in both all-time NCAA championship game appearances (7) and College Cup semifinals berths (11, all

from 1994-2009), including four consecutive College Cup trips from 1994-97 and the current run that started in 2006. Despite not making its first NCAA

Tournament appearance until 1993, Notre Dame now is tied for seventh in all-time NCAA trips (16) and (along with UNC) is one of two teams that have appeared in every NCAA 1995 NCAA Champions Tournament since 1993. The Irish also own the




second-best NCAA Championship winning percentage in Division I women's soccer history (.775; 53-15-1). See pages 118-123 for recaps and photo collages from Notre Dame's NCAA title seasons.

NATIONAL TEAMS - Three former Irish players - defender Kate Sobrero (Markgraf), defensive midfielder Shannon Boxx and goalkeeper LaKeysia Beene - have been starters with the U.S. National Team in the past decade, with Sobrero and Boxx starting at the 2003 and 2007 World Cups as well as the 2004 and 2008 Olympics (see pp. 124-126). Most recently in July 2010, current senior defender Lauren Fowlkes, junior forward Melissa Henderson and junior defender Jessica Schuveiller suited up for the U.S. Under-23 National Team at the Four Nations Tournament in England (won by the USA)

Midfielder Jen Buczkowski ('07) and goalkeeper Erika Bohn ('06) were members of the U.S. U-21 National Team that won the 2005 Nordic Cup while Buczkowski previously played with the Under-19s, as did forward Kerri Hanks ('09 - later played with U-23s), forward/midfielder Brittany Bock ('09) and former midfielder Annie Schefter ('06). Bock also competed with the U.S. at the U-20 World Championship in Russia, alongside her classmate and central defender Carrie Dew ('09). Versatile player Candace Chapman (2001-05) and forward Katie Thorlakson ('06 grad.) were teammates on Canada's U-19 National Team and now are regulars with Canada's full national team. Midfielder Rebecca Mendoza ('09) is a member of Mexico's national team while former ND defender Monica Gonzalez was a founding member of the Mexican national team and captained its historic quarterfinal finish at the 2004 Olympics (former ND forward Monica Gerardo also was a founding member). Three seniors from the 2004 NCAA champs defenders Melissa Tancredi (Canada) and Gudrun Gunnarsdottir (Iceland) and forward Mary Boland (U.S. U-19s) - also have earned national-team duty, as did 2007 graduate Amanda Cinalli (U-21s; '06 and '07 Nordic Cup) and 2010 graduate Michele Weissenhofer (U-20s/21s/23s; '07 Nordic Cup champs, with Cinalli). Fowlkes and Henderson have been mainstays on the U-20/U-23 teams since '07, with Fowlkes earning gold as a starting USA center back at the '08 FIFA U-20 World Cup.

Memorable Moments

Sept. 16-17, 2000: Meotis Erikson opens the scoring vs. Washington (5-0) and host Portland (1-0), as ND rises to number one.

Nov. 24, 2000: Erikson's OT goal vs. Santa Clara sends ND back to the College Cup semifinals.

Sept. 25, 2001: Mia Sarkesian completes an early four-player, free-kick combination as 4th-ranked Irish edge #3 Nebraska (1-0).

Sept. 15, 2002: The rally at #25 Maryland includes five ND goals in 25 minutes, after a 2-0 deficit (5-2). Candace Chapman's shift to the midfield sparks the comeback, as does **Melissa Tancredi's** pair of header

Sept. 21, 2003: Katie Thorlakson and Mary **Boland** assist on each other's goals to help ND hand Santa Clara its first-ever loss at the SCU Classic (2-1).

Nov. 26, 2004: Amanda Cinalli (2G) and Thorlakson (1G-2A) pace the NCAA quarterfinal win over #6 Portland, sending the Irish to their seventh College Cup final weekend.

Dec. 3, 2004: Candace Chapman completes a memorable extended give-and-go with Thorlakson, as the Irish outlast Santa Clara (1-0) in the NCAA semifi-

Dec. 5, 2004: Erika Bohn makes a PK save late in regulation and adds two saves in the shootout, as the Irish edge UCLA for the NCAA title (1-1; 4-3 in six penalty kicks).

Nov. 6, 2005: ND claims its eighth BIG EAST Tournament title with a 5-0 win over #15 Connecticut, one of the program's most convincing wins ever versus a top-15 foe.

Sept. 3, 2006: Cinalli (2G-1A) earns national playerof-the-week honors after leading the 3-1 comeback win over Santa Clara (ND and SCU were #1 in different

Nov. 5, 2006: Two quick Kerri Hanks goals help top Rutgers for the BIG EAST title (4-2).

Dec. 1, 2006: Michele Weissenhofer's hat trick and three assists from Hanks power Notre Dame past 8th-ranked Penn State (4-0) and on to the College Cup semifinals for the eighth time.

Dec. 3, 2006: Courtney Rosen and Jill Krivacek are the unlikely goalscorers as the Irish use a 2-1 win over #5 Florida State to advance to their sixth NCAA title game.

Dec. 5, 2008: Courtney Barg finishes off a Melissa Henderson cross to propel the Irish past Stanford, 1-0, and book ND's place in the NCAA championship game for the seventh time.

Nov. 27, 2009: Henderson and Haley Ford score 51 seconds apart in the first half to give the Irish a 2-0 NCAA guarterfinal victory at #6 Florida State, the first time in a decade that ND wins on the road in the NCAA guarters (since the memorable '99 penalty kick shootout at Nebraska).



weeks in 2004; the first three weeks in '05; 11 weeks in 2006 and for nine weeks during the record-setting 2008 season. Notre Dame was the only team in the NSCAA top spot every season from 2004-06. The Irish own a 94-7-3 all-time record (62-2-3 in regular season) as the country's top-ranked team.

NUMBER-ONE SIGN RETURNS – A new look was brought to the night sky on the northeast corner of the Notre Dame campus to honor the women's soccer team on Oct. 12, 2000 - and again early in the 2004 season, plus during most of 2006 and 2008 seasons - as the traditional, lighted numeral one was placed atop Grace Hall, in honor of it's ascension to the number-one ranking. Prior to 2000, the eight-foot sign had not appeared since the Irish the 1995 NCAA title. The sign, built by Fr. Bob Malone and a group of seminarians, originally went up at Moreau Seminary (at the north end of St. Joseph's Lake) in 1974, following Notre Dame's 1973 national championship football season. It later moved to Howard Hall before shifting to the roof of Grace Hall. The sign was displayed at the end of the 1988 national-title football season and returned in parts of the 1989, '90 and '93 football campaigns and again from 2002-06 and 2008 for both Irish fencing teams. The hockey team also had the sign lighted in its honor for several weeks during the 2008-09 season, giving the Irish four topranked teams for the first time since 2000-01 (when women's basketball, men's fencing and baseball joined women's soccer as No. 1's).

OSCARS SWEEP – For the 2006-07 academic year, the women's soccer team became the first varsity program to produce recipients of Notre Dame's Byron Kanaley, Francis Patrick O'Connor and Chris Zorich awards in the same year (the feat was equaled in 2008-09 by the men's hockey team). Kim Lorenzen was one of five seniors to receive the Kanaley (given to exemplary studentathlete leaders) while Amanda Cinalli was the female recipient of the O'Connor (recognizing team spirit/inspiration) and Claire Gallerano received the Zorich (for community service). The women's soccer team also received the Trophy Award (presented to a varsity team for its community service excellence). Three years earlier, women's soccer had became the first varsity program to produce recipients of all three honors (at any time), with the totals now including six Kanaley recipients, two O'Connor honorees and three who have received the Zorich Award (see p.

POLL POSITION – The Irish now have been ranked 1st-3rd in 113 of 191 polls spanning the past 16 seasons and have been among the top five in 146 of the past 191 polls.

Notre Dame's spots in the past 191 NSCAA polls include: 44 weeks at #1; 50 at #2; 19 at #3; and 16 at #4 – with the Irish cracking the top two spots in 15 of the past 20 seasons (in the top



three spots during 15 of the past 16 years). Notre Dame earned the NSCAA preseason number-one ranking for the first time in 2005, after being second in five previous preseason polls (1995-98 and 2000; see chart below). All told, the Irish have been ranked for 211 weeks.

PRIMETIME PLAYERS – Notre Dame won nearly 80 percent of its "big games" in the first 11 seasons of the **Randy Waldrum** era (1999-2009), posting a 100-25-4 record when facing an NSCAA top-25 or postseason opponent.

REGULAR-SEASON STREAK – With its 2-0 win at home over Loyola (III.) on Aug. 28, 2009, Notre Dame capped its school-record 30-game regular-season winning streak that dated back to 2007. The team record for consecutive regular-season unbeaten games (32 games/30-0-2) was achieved from Oct. 17, 1993-Nov. 1, 1995. The second-best regular-season unbeaten streak was achieved in 2002 and included 31 games (29-0-2).

REUNION OF CHAMPIONS – The 1995 NCAA championship women's soccer team held an oncampus reunion in April of 2005, corresponding with the banquet celebrating the 2004 NCAA title season. Then on the weekend of October 3-5 2008, the women's soccer team celebrated the

20th anniversary of the program with a series of events that included a reception that involved more than 40 former Irish greats. At halftime of Notre Dame's 3-0 win versus South Florida, the Irish welcomed those in attendance to be honored on Alumni Field, including Olympians **Kate** (Sobrero) Markgraf ('98), Melissa Tancredi ('04) and Candace Chapman ('06) (pictured above).

REUNION, PART TWO – On the weekend of April 17-18, 2009, close to 100 current and former Notre Dame women's soccer players gathered in the Monogram Room at the Joyce Center to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the Irish women's soccer program. Among the featured speakers were program pioneers **Mimi (Suba) Bender** and **Bernie (Holland) Mount**, who played on the first ND squad in 1988, 1995-97 All-American and U.S. National Team mainstay **Kate (Sobrero) Markgraf**, and 2003-04 All-America defender **Melissa Tancredi**.

scoreless ties a rarity – The Irish battled to a 0-0 tie at Pittsburgh on Oct. 4, 2009, marking the program's eighth 0-0 tie. Other scoreless draws include a pair versus UConn, one on Oct. 21, 2000 (and a similar game in Storrs on Oct. 13, 2006), a 2003 game with Stanford (at SCU), a 2004 game versus Rutgers and the 2007 season opener against Michigan are Notre Dame's only scoreless ties since 1994, with others against Dayton in 1991 and North Carolina in '94 (in St. Louis ending UNC's NCAA-record 92-game win streak).

70-70 (DYNAMIC DUO) – Notre Dame's **Kerri Hanks** (28G-15A) and **Katie Thorlakson** (18G-35A) both totaled 71 points in 2005, the second time in Division I women's soccer history that teammates have topped 70 points in the same season. SMU's 1995 duo of Danielle Garrett Fotopoulos (32G-19A, 83 pts) and Courtney Linex (31G-15A, 77 pts) are the only other pair with the 70-70 distinction. Hanks was part of another dynamic duo in 2006, as she and freshman **Michele Weissenhofer** (53 points; 18G-17A) turned in a rare 1-2 teammate finish atop the NCAA scoring list (Hanks had 66 points, on 22G-22A)

SERIES OPENERS – Notre Dame's record in all series openers (regardless of site) is 87-26-2 (.765),



including 54-6-0 since 1993 and 34-3-0 in the Randy Waldrum era (since '99). The Irish are 60-9-0 in all series openers played at home (35-4-0 since '93). In 2009 Notre Dame defeated firsttime foes IUPUI, Central Michigan and Oregon State in the first three rounds of the NCAA Championship. Those wins pushed Notre Dame's record to 13-1-0 in series openers that come in NCAA play.

SHUTOUT CITY – Notre Dame's 10-game shutout streak in 2003 (956 minutes) ranks fifth in NCAA history and blew away the Irish record (726, in '95). Then Notre Dame set a team record with a nation-leading 19 shutouts in 2006 (seventh-most in NCAA history). In 2008, the Irish opened the season with four consecutive shutouts for the first time since 1995 on their way to notching 18 shutouts.

STRONG STARTERS – In 2008, Notre Dame got off to the best start in program history (26-0-0) on the way to completing the first unbeaten and untied regular season in school history (18-0-0). That debut also eclipsed the 16-0-0 start by the 2000 Irish squad during the second season for head coach Randy Waldrum at Notre Dame.


THREE-YEAR TEAR - Notre Dame's 2003 (20-3-1) and '04 (25-1-1) teams combined for a 45-4-2 record and .902 two-year win pct. that was fourth-best in ND history (surpassed by the .914 combined pct., 47-4-1, in 2004 and '05, with the same combined pct. for 2005 and '06). The program's best two-year record is 47-3-1 (.932, in 1996 and '97) – but the 2004-06 Irish squads combined for the top three-year tear in the program's history (.924; 72-5-2). Notre Dame's previous highwater mark for combined record over a threeyear span was 68-5-3 (.915), from 1994-96 and also 1995-97.

UNBEATEN SEASONS – Notre Dame's guest for undefeated seasons in 2000, '04, '06 and '08 had the Irish gunning for a rare feat. Only three of the past 16 NCAA champs – UNC in '97 (27-0-1) and '04 (27-0-0) and Portland in '05 (23-0-1) have claimed the title without a loss. Notre Dame has posted six undefeated regular seasons – starting in 1994 (NCAA runner-up), '97 (semifinalist), 2000 (semifinalist), '04 (champion), '06 (runner-

up) and '08 (runner-up) – earning the top seed in the NCAA Championship in '94, 2000 and '08.

VERSUS NO. 1 – Notre Dame has played the nation's number-one team 13 times and lost that matchup only eight times. The Irish are 3-8-2 against NSCAA top-ranked teams, with nine of those games coming against North Carolina.

WHITE HOUSE - Notre Dame's 2004 NCAA title team was honored at a White House ceremony on May 13, 2005. Senior captain Mary **Boland** presented President George W. Bush with a replica ND jersey as part of the festivities. The Irish also received a special tour of the Capitol, as guests of Congressional members with Notre Dame ties.



WINNING TRADITIONS – Several recent Notre Dame players have led their clubs and state Olympic Development teams to elite status before (and after) becoming part of another winning tradition with the Irish women's soccer program. Five members of the 2006 senior class helped their teams post top national finishes in 2003. Jen Buczkowski, Jill Krivacek and Kim Lorenzen - plus 2009 graduate Brittany Bock (who earned the tournament's Golden Boot Award) - were members of the Illinois ODP squad that won the 2003 ODP national title (besting future ND classmate Lizzie Reed and her N.J. squad in the title game), while Claire Gallerano (and 2009 graduate Kerri Hanks) helped the Dallas Texans win the 2003 U.S. Youth Soccer (USYS) u-18 national title. Christie Shaner's Bucks Challenge squad also advanced to the four-team nationals in 2003 but narrowly missed the u-19 final. The 2007 seniors lived up to the standard of their predecessors. Ashley Jones completed the rare double of winning 2004 national titles with both her Cal-South ODP team (she and 2009 graduate Carrie Dew were captains of that team) and with her So-Cal United club, while goalkeeper Lauren Karas earned the Golden Glove Award with North Texas at the 2004 ODP nationals (her team lost to Jones, Dew and Cal-South, 1-0). Another class of '07 grad, Susan Pinnick, led the Carmel Commotion to a '03 national runner-up finish (u-17s).

Among 2009 graduates, Dew played for the 2003 u-16 national champs (San Diego Surf) and Bock twice was a national runner-up - with Illinois ODP in 2005 and with the Windy City Pride in '04 (u-18). The summer of 2005 saw Hanks collect her second career Golden Boot Award while helping the Texans nearly win the u-19 title (lost in PKs), with Pinnick and the Commotion also making a return to nationals. Rebecca Mendoza and her Dallas Sting squad also were in Orlando, as one of the four 2005 finalists in the u-18 division.

Four Irish players - Shaner, her fellow 2007 graduate Nikki Westfall, Bock and 2009 graduate Kerry Inglis - were key members of the F.C. Indiana team that won the 2005 Women's Professional Soccer League (WPSL) and Open Cup titles while 2006 graduate Katie Thorlakson helped the Vancouver Whitecaps win the 2004 W-League title.

Class of 2010 members Amanda Clark and Michele Weissenhofer played for the Eclipse Select team that won u-16 and u-17 national crowns (in 2004 and '05). The four teams at the 2006 u-18 nationals featured four members of the 2010 class: Clark and Weissenhofer (Eclipse), Kelsey Lysander (San Diego Surf) and Haley Ford, who captained the Dallas Texans '88 team to the national title (their classmate Rachel VanderGenutgen then won the 2007 u-19 title with the Carmel Cyclones).

Two current seniors have played for youth national title teams; Lauren Fowlkes (K.C. Dynamos; 2001/u-14) and Erica lantorno (Eclipse; 2006/u-17), while sophomore Jazmin Hall played her club soccer with the 2008 u-17 champion Dallas Texans and freshman **Kecia Morway** did likewise with the 2009 u-17 victors Eclipse.



Fighting Irish Using Veteran Experience and Depth To Follow Familiar Path To Success in 2010

Notre Dame returns better than 85 percent of its offense, nine of 11 starters from last year's College Cup qualifier

For every college soccer team, the four-month journey between the starting of training camp and the final whistle at the NCAA Women's College Cup is a demanding one. It's a daily test of each player's strength, endurance, commitment and discipline that ultimately separates the championshipcaliber teams from those whose title hopes are pure fiction.

This rugged journey is one that Notre Dame knows well, having made 11 trips to the College Cup, including December runs in each of the past four seasons (and five of the past six). The Fighting Irish also understand what it means to find the pot of gold at the end of that long rainbow, having won a pair of national championships as part of seven visits to the NCAA title match.


Few coaches are as intimately familiar with the challenges needed to navigate the college soccer season as Notre Dame's **Randy Waldrum**. The 12th-year skipper has been at the helm for seven of those Fighting Irish College Cup berths, as well as four trips to the NCAA title contest and the 2004 national championship. Along the way, he's also skillfully piloted Notre Dame to 10 BIG EAST Conference regular-season titles (not to mention the past seven) and seven BIG EAST tournament crowns, including four in the past five years (a string interrupted only by a penalty-kick shootout loss in 2007).

Since Waldrum arrived in South Bend in 1999, his Fighting Irish teams have experienced just about every possible challenge on their annual quest for championship hardware. Yet, they have rarely wavered along this road, often navigating through the roadblocks, detours and hairpin turns that have been thrown in their path. It's that resolve, that fortitude, and that determination in the face of adversity that have consistently made Notre Dame one of the nation's elite programs.

The 2009 season was a prime example of how the Fighting Irish persevered and succeeded when the odds seemed long. During the preseason, Notre Dame was faced with injuries to several critical contributors, most notably senior tri-captains Courtney Rosen, an '08 all-region selection who missed the entire season with a broken foot, and Michele Weissenhofer, the '06 Soccer America National Freshman of the Year who played in barely half (14) of her team's matches last season and averaged fewer than 40 minutes per night due to a myriad of recurring leg injuries. Between them, the duo had accounted for 104 starts, 36 goals and 112 points in their first three seasons.

Couple those injuries (as well as chronic maladies for veteran center back **Haley Ford** and a slow

recovery from off-season leg surgery by highscoring forward and '08 first-team freshman All-American **Melissa Henderson**) with an arduous non-conference schedule that included matches with fellow

national powers North Carolina, Stanford and Santa Clara (the latter two on the road), and it left Notre Dame with a 3-3-0 record through the season's first six contests, and standing at a crossroads in its campaign.

However, with Waldrum's GPS-like knowledge of the college soccer landscape, the Fighting Irish were able to get their annual caravan to the College Cup back on course, thanks to a clever use of personnel, most notably moving **Lauren Fowlkes** from her traditional center back and holding midfield position to a forward spot, where she enjoyed the finest season of her career. The complementing shift of **Courtney Barg** to the role of holding midfielder also seemed to put a tiger in Notre Dame's tank, as the Fighting Irish went on a 19-match unbeaten streak (18-0-1) during the season's final two months, outscoring the opposition, 50-7 and posting 13 shutouts in that span.

"With the slow start you always worry that the season is going to go south really fast, so I give credit to the kids and even to the staff," Waldrum said. "They did a good job of holding things together early. It

took us a couple of weeks to recover, but we got it turned around and made some changes along the way. I think moving Lauren Fowlkes up front, (and) solidifying what we needed up there a little bit,

especially with Melissa (Henderson) coming off the surgeries in the summer, she wasn't quite ready early on in the year. I thought that move really was a big move for us. Looking at the season in general, that's probably one of the more rewarding years I have had in the 11 years here because it was such a bad start and then to come back and make it to the College Cup."

As the 2010 season unfolds, Notre Dame appears to have many of the tools necessary to handle any challenges that come its way. The Fighting Irish bring back 16 monogram winners, including nine of 11 starters from last year's squad, while sprinkling in a talented group of eight newcomers that ranks among the nation's top incoming classes. What's more, Notre Dame returns better than 85 percent of its offensive production, as well as three-fourths of a starting backline (and the starting goalkeeper) that was critical to the team's late-season defensive success.

"I don't think you say enough about having veteran players on your team," Waldrum commented. "This group that we have now, most have gone through the '08 year that was smooth sailing and everything fell into place and it was just an 'enjoy-the-ride' year. Then,

they went through last year where they had to fight and scratch for everything. There were a lot of those games that could have gone the other way and made that a completely different season. I think you need players to go through some of those times to be good.

"I like the experience that's coming back," he continued. "Coaches always like to talk about experience, but you've got to do something with it, too. It's going to be key with the chemistry and how that all fits together. It's always interesting when you have freshmen and displace a couple of the older players that have been there. But, it seems like a group that is pretty together and that excites me and reminds me more of 2008."

While no one can accurately predict what direction each season will take, it's evident the Fighting Irish understand the road map to success like few other programs in the country.



five goalscoring duos last season, as the "thunder and lightning" combination of Fowlkes (thunder) and Henderson (lightning) collectively found the back of the net 28 times a year ago. Both halves of that potent tandem return this season, along with senior Taylor Knaack, who led the BIG EAST in goals during conference play, giving Notre Dame a strong front-line crew that can match up with the some of the nation's premier offensive units.

Fowlkes, who has achieved great success at all three field positions (forward, midfielder, defender) during her career, was a National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) third-team All-America selection last season after ranking among the BIG EAST leaders with career highs for goals (10), points (24), gamewinning goals (3), shots (teamhigh 79) and shots on goal (33). The BIG EAST Co-Offensive Player of the Year and BIG EAST Championship Most Outstanding Offensive Player, Fowlkes also boasts extensive international experience as a starter on the United States U-20 Team that earned the gold medal at the 2008 FIFA U-20 World Cup, and currently with the USA U-23 squad.

As if that weren't enough, Fowlkes has proven to be a standout in the classroom, collecting ESPN The Magazine second-team Academic All-America honors last year to become the 52nd Notre Dame student-athlete (and the fourth women's soccer player) to pair athletic and academic All-America accolades in the same season. Were she to pull off that double again this season, she would become only the 13th Fighting Irish student-athlete to do so twice in her career, joining the likes of Notre Dame women's soccer greats Jen Renola (1995-96) and Brittany Bock (2007-08) in that illustrious company.

One of the nation's most versatile players and a top candidate for the Hermann Trophy and Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in 2010, Fowlkes also could revert to her former role as a center back. depending on how position other battles pan out. Noted for her physical prowess. both in the air and with her back to goal, the 5-foot-10 senior from Lee's Summit. Mo., combines size with poise, solid playmaking and

excellent leadership skills, the latter of which undoubtedly

led to her selection as a team co-captain via a preseason vote of her teammates.

"Everyone (around the country) knows about Lauren, so I don't think she will be a surprise to anyone," Waldrum said. "It's just a matter of what we are going to do with her. No matter where she's played, she has just been such a steady player for us ever since she got here. She has got everything, the size, the strength, she is good with the ball, I think she reads the game well and she is committed. The good thing though is that she reads the game so well and she doesn't get caught. She is kind of like (2008 All-American and now WPS veteran) Carrie Dew in that regard. Carrie wasn't the fastest player but you rarely saw her get outrun. She reads the game and she is a good position all the time and Lauren reminds me of that."

Henderson got off to a slow start last year while recovering from her preseason leg surgery, but by the end of the 2009 campaign, there were few forwards in the country who could match her production. A Soccer America first-team MVP selection (equivalent to All-America honors), as well as a first-team all-region and second-team all-BIG EAST choice. Henderson led the conference and set new career highs for goals (18), points (41) and gamewinning goals (school-record 9). She also enjoyed one of the finest individual postseason runs in program history, setting school records for goals (10), gamewinning goals (4), gamewinning points (10) and hat tricks (2), highlighted by a school record-tying four goals against Central Michigan in the second round of the NCAA Championship.

Like Fowlkes, Henderson is a current member of the U.S. U-23 National Team player pool and was named to the 2010 Hermann Trophy watch list. A skilled technical player whose creativity on the ball



"I don't think she realizes how good she really is." Waldrum noted. "She is quick to deflect things to everyone else and sometimes you just want to say 'get a little bit selfish here and do it.' If she has the kind of year that we know she is capable of having. I think this could be a breakout year for her. That

is hard to say because she scores 17 to 18 goals a year for you in

the first two years and most people around the country would die for those kinds of stats. I really think she is one of those that can be like (two-time Hermann Trophy recipient Kerri) Hanks and get you 20 to 25 goals in a season. I don't think it is that difficult to do so I am looking forward to seeing how she is going to be this year."

Knaack was arguably one of the most improved players on the Notre Dame roster last season. posting career highs with six goals (including three gamewinners), five assists, 17 points and 43 shots (20 on goal), all of which ranked among the top four on the team. In addition, she experienced great success during the BIG EAST regular season, leading the conference with all six of her goals and three of her five assists against league foes.

A speedy forward who also could be called upon to fill in as an attacking midfielder on occasion, Knaack is a tenacious competitor who can wear down the opposition with her on-ball pressure. Likewise, she is effective in the open field and stretches defenses with her quickness and flair in the offensive third, giving Notre Dame another reliable scoring presence to fill out the Fighting Irish starting

"What I am seeing with her is a change in everything about her, not just her playing, but she is maturing a little bit," Waldrum stated. "She is always that player that can live on the edge a little and you always worried about. In the last year I have really seen her grow a lot in that regard and I think she is finally getting it. She is getting that taste that she doesn't have many more chances to do this. It was the first time we saw her spending time before and after practice working on her game and that is what we saw on the field last year, which was her best year ever. She has the speed, she is fit, she is mobile, she can score enough goals for you, she can create, and


she is not an easy player to defend against because she is all over the place. So I hope she comes in ready do to that again."

Another veteran who could offer significant contributions up top for Notre Dame this season is senior **Erica lantorno**. A versatile forward who also may see time in the midfield, lantorno has been one of the top Fighting Irish reserves throughout her career, appearing in 72 of 79 contests during her first three seasons, including all but one in the past two years. The Hinsdale, Ill., native turned in a career year in 2008 (five goals, seven assists, 17 points) before adding three goals and an assist last season despite playing the entire year with a bulky cast on her broken right wrist.

A hard-working player whose has proven to be a solid complementary piece in the Notre Dame offensive puzzle, lantorno will be counted on to add veteran depth and leadership to the Fighting Irish roster this season.

"She had a really good year coming off the bench two years ago," Waldrum observed. "Last year, it was very inconsistent. If she can get the consistency back, she has got an opportunity to step in and start for us. She is good enough to do it but I think she is going to be in a battle. The good thing about Erica is there is not much of a change in the level of effort or intensity when you put her in — it doesn't drop much at all."

Other players with the potential to be offensive threats for Notre Dame this year include sophomore

Lindsay Brown and freshman Adriana Leon.

Brown appeared in 14 games for the Fighting Irish as a rookie, playing primarily in the midfield (a role she may also reprise at times this season). The

Newport Beach, Calif., native is a cagey attacker with strength on either foot, in addition to being a solid distributor during the run of play and on set pieces.

Meanwhile, a member of the Canadian Under-20 National Team, **Leon** was Canada's top scorer during round-robin play at the 2010 CONCACAF U-20 World Cup Qualifying Tournament. Also a talented youth hockey player, she blends hard-nosed intensity with athleticism and a scorer's mentality that should give the Fighting Irish further punch on the front line.

MIDFIELDERS


As many coaches point out, the success of any soccer team is based on strong play in the midfield, and Notre Dame has two of the best midfielders in the country in senior **Rose Augustin** and junior **Courtney Barg**. Add in the possibility of Fowlkes seeing time on the mid-line, as well as a handful of other talented veterans who will look to battle their way into the starting XI and you have the makings of a strong power plant to fuel the Fighting Irish system.

Augustin is, without question, one of the most underrated players in college soccer, despite earning second-team all-region and all-BIG EAST recognition a year ago. The Silver Lake, Ohio, native started all but one match last season, turning in career highs with seven goals, a team-best 10 assists, 24 points and 76 shots. She also has proven to be a dependable threat in the postseason, scoring five career goals in the NCAA Championship (including the gamewinner in last year's third-round win over Oregon State) and also assisting on Ford's clinching score at Florida State in the '09 NCAA quarterfinals.

Boasting one of the strongest shots on the team with great effectiveness off either foot, Augustin's biggest contributions have come on set pieces, where she has shown an uncanny ability to deliver pinpoint services from either free kicks or the corner flag. She also is a very cerebral player with a firm grasp of strategy and tactics.

"Rose was one of those who had a great year for us last year," Waldrum said. "It was a little disappointing that she did not get a little more recognition than she did. She is such a good player and she has taken on some leadership on the field, especially in the Carolina (regularseason) game when she was the one that was still going strong the full 90 minutes. That kind of showed us what she was going to be like the rest of year. She has all the tools to be someone that could be really special for us, too. When

you have a program like ours and you start going down the list, you have Barg, you've got Fowlkes, you've got Henderson, you've got (Jessica) Schuveiller, and you've got Rose. Sometimes, good players can get lost in the mix because there are so many other good players. I really think she will be a key for us this year."

Barg is one of the nation's elite rising stars after her full-time move to the holding midfield position. A first-team NSCAA All-American last season, the Plano, Texas, resident started all 26 matches for Notre Dame, logging a goal and two assists. Yet, it was her composure on the ball, superb technical skills, exceptional vision and creativity that made her not only a Hermann Trophy semifinalist, but the BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year and a member of the NCAA College Cup and BIG EAST all-tournament teams.

The potential exists for Barg to achieve even greater things this season, as she not only is a prime candidate for the Hermann Trophy, but also is on the radar for Academic All-America honors through her work as an accounting major in Notre Dame's Mendoza College of Business.

"To me, Courtney is one of the best players in the country," Waldrum said. "She's probably been one of the better players we have ever had in this program and it was nice to finally see her get appreciated last year because, in her freshmen year (2008), I thought she was very good for us, but you are overshadowed when you have Dew, Hanks and Bock and all those players that had two or three years of gaining that reputation. It was nice to see Courtney get rewarded for that last year.

"I would be shocked if she didn't have another year like that," he added. "I will be disappointed if she isn't in the picture for the Hermann at the end of the year. Getting her back, she is kind of the key to how we play. She runs the show in midfield for us. I don't see that changing for her at all. I would have like to have had her at summer school at a different time because I think she would have been with the (United States) U-23s when they went to England in July for the Four Nations Tournament. I know they




wanted her in camp, but unfortunately she was studying abroad. But, I think she will get her time because she is one that has that kind of future. It will be hard to not see her on our senior women's national team in the years to come — she is that good."

Versatility is a key to Notre Dame's success through the years, and the midfield could see the greatest infusion of that multi-faceted talent for the Fighting Irish this season. In addition to Fowlkes, Knaack, lantorno and Brown potentially fitting into the midfield at various times, junior Molly Campbell could migrate up from the left back spot, where she started all 26 matches last season, collecting a goal and career-high three assists on 25 shots.

One of the team's fittest players, Campbell has good technical ability on the ball and is very mobile, which allows her to fit well into the Fighting Irish system at either end. In addition, she shows great intelligence on the pitch, giving her the knowledge base to play multiple positions, and is an accomplished student-athlete off the pitch, garnering ESPN The Magazine first-team Academic All-District V honors last year during her work as a political science major in Notre Dame' College of Arts and Letters.

Juniors Ellen Jantsch and Brynn Gerstle, as well as freshmen Mandy Laddish and Elizabeth Tucker also could compete for playing time in the midfield this season.

Jantsch played in 16 matches last season, scoring a pair of goals, and has shown promise as both a holding midfielder and a center back. She also is a physical presence in the center of the pitch who has utilized her 5-foot-9 frame to excel in the air.

"You are going to need someone like an Ellen Jantsch to kind of do the kind of things that Amanda Clark did for us last vear." Waldrum commented. "There are going to be the games where you need somebody to bang those bodies and just be disruptive and be good defensively and that is what she does well. It is going to be a key year for her."

Gerstle was one of the team's most improved players during the spring 2010 season, playing primarily in the defensive third. The lanky, athletic midfielder offers size (also 5-foot-9) and mobility, along with a strong leg, all of which could make her a contributor on set pieces.

"She is going to be like Ellen," Waldrum noted. "She's got a chance now. She proved to us in the spring she probably deserves a little more time than I have given her in the past and her confidence has started to come around a little bit. She is going to be in that mix. With us playing three in the midfield, you usually need five or six midfield players to play in those three spots to keep it going. She will be in the hunt to get some time there."

Laddish was a consensus high school All-America selection as a prep senior in 2009, having piled up double-digit goals and assists (total of 36 goals and 40 assists) in her final two seasons at Lee's Summit (Mo.) High School. She also has blossomed into a key figure in the U.S. Soccer youth national team player pools, first as a starter for the 2008 USA U-17 National Team that earned the silver medal at the inaugural FIFA U-17 World Cup in New Zealand, and more recently with the United States U-18 and U-20 teams.

A well-conditioned, feisty attacking player, **Tucker** was a three-sport standout at Bishop Kenny High School in Jacksonville, Fla., and also achieved success on the soccer pitch as a Region III ODP player along with her time playing for the Jacksonville Fury club program.

DEFENDERS

One of the critical reasons for Notre Dame's unbeaten streak and turnaround during the final two months of last season was the stability that developed on the Fighting Irish back line. Two of the key components on that line — junior center back/ co-captain Jessica Schuveiller and senior right back Julie Scheidler — are penciled in to hold down those same spots again this season, while Fowlkes ideally would be moved into the other center back spot with Ford's graduation.

Schuveiller is a second-year captain after being voted as the first non-senior captain for the Fighting Irish since 2002 (Amy Warner). A tough, tenacious leader with an excellent understanding of defensive positioning and strategy, the Plano, Texas, native has started all 53 games in her first two seasons at Notre Dame, helping post 34 shutouts in that span while learning from such talented greats as Ford and All-American Carrie Dew (now with FC Gold Pride in Women's Professional Soccer).

An up-and-coming contributor on the U.S. Under-23 National Team player pool, Schuveiller was a second-team all-region and first-team all-BIG EAST selection last season, in addition to earning the BIG EAST Championship Most Outstanding Defensive Player award while leading Notre Dame to the

conference title. She also continued her incredible knack for scoring clutch goals, netting the gamewinning tallies at Cincinnati (2-1) in the regular season and against St. John's (2-1) in overtime in the BIG EAST Championship semifinals, after potting her first career goal to open the Fighting Irish account in the 2008 NCAA guarterfinal at home against Florida State (won by Notre Dame, 2-0).

"Jess is another one that really just starting to get a little bit of the national accolades," Waldrum said. "She is one of the best backs in the country. She does all the dirty work and yet she is good with the ball. What we would like to see her do is to control the ball offensively more than she does. She has two years now of just worrying about making sure the defensive part is right and now we will see her take off a little bit more on the attacking end. Hopefully, the experience with the U23s this summer is only going to help her confidence. She is a great player and to me, she is an All-American as well. I hope that she gets some of that notice this year and people will start to take a little more notice of her this year once we start the season. She is one that you have to keep an eve on."

Scheidler similarly has proven to be a dependable defensive starter for the Fighting Irish throughout her career, appearing in all 79 matches and starting 69 times in her first three seasons under the Golden Dome. With a blend of athleticism and quickness. the Indianapolis resident also has proven to be a dangerous offensive threat on the wings, leading all

Notre Dame backs with nine assists in the past two years combined, and even scoring her first career goal last season against Northwestern.

"When Julie got here as a freshman, you thought she would be a good utility player," Waldrum commented. "She will be someone that will get some time, but I had no expectation of her having the kind of career she has had. The good thing about her is that she has gotten better every year and just keeps doing what she does best. She is confident and she doesn't have any doubts. She also has improved the attacking side of her game year after year."

Fowlkes and Campbell will have the inside track on the other center back position alongside Schuveiller, However, one dark-horse candidate for that starting spot could be junior Ellen Bartindale, who last season turned out to be the textbook example of a player being prepared and ready to compete when her number called. When Ford and Jazmin Hall went down with injuries in consecutive matches in mid-October, Bartindale (who had played in only four contests as a freshman) was thrust into the starting lineup and showed great poise and maturity, helping Notre Dame to four consecutive shutouts at the end of the regular season and on into the BIG EAST Championship. She also played every minute in four of five matches during that stretch, including all 99 minutes in the BIG EAST semifinal win in extra time over St. John's.

"In a lot of way, Ellen probably was a key to a really good run for us through the BIG EAST," Waldrum stated. "She did a really good job for us until we could get some players back. Not only did it built her confidence in her ability to step in and compete, but it also built our confidence (as coaches) in her to see that she can go in and she can handle most of the situations that she was thrown in to. So that is really going to bode well for her this year."

With Campbell moving primarily to either a midfield or center back role, Hall and freshman **Kecia Morway** will compete for the starting spot at the left back position.

Hall was Notre Dame's top rookie last season, appearing in 20 matches and starting eight times despite missing the latter half of the regular season with a leg injury. Yet another member of the Fighting Irish contingent from Texas, Hall plays much bigger than her 5-foot-3 size would indicate, thanks to her physical play and acute awareness of defensive positioning. What's more, she also blended seamlessly into the Notre Dame system with her timely runs in to the offensive third and strong service game from the flanks.

Meanwhile, **Morway** was a 2009 NSCAA Youth All-America selection and a two-time NSCAA youth all-region honoree during her time playing for the high-powered Eclipse Select club program that has produced such recent Fighting Irish greats as Bock, Weissenhofer and 2009 graduate (and second-year WPS player) Elise Weber. Morway is a scrappy outside back with a bulldog mer

is a scrappy outside back with a bulldog mentality and a championship pedigree, having helped Eclipse to three consecutive national finals appearances at the U.S. Youth Soccer (USYS) Championships, including a U-17 title in 2009.




If the stability on the Notre Dame back line was one component of the team's late-season surge in 2009, then another contributor to that streak was the emergence of goalkeeper **Nikki Weiss**.

The Redding, Conn., senior had played in only 16 matches (starting three times) in her first two seasons for the Fighting Irish, but she superbly tended goal 19 times last year, making 17 starts and posting a 14-2-1 record with a 0.51 goals-against average (GAA) and 12 shutouts (seven solo, five combined). She also set a new BIG EAST record with a 0.15 GAA in regular-season play, allowing just one goal in 597 minutes of action while notching five shutouts and eventually earned a place on the BIG EAST All-Tournament Team.

Standing 5-foot-11, Weiss has worked hard to use her physique and become a commanding presence in the penalty area. That was never more evident than in last year's NCAA quarterfinal at Florida State, when she made five saves and expertly locked down every Seminoles' offensive threat, and in the College Cup semifinal loss to North Carolina, when she kept the Tar Heels off the board until the final eight minutes while logging a career-high six saves. All told, she posted a 0.38 GAA and .913 save percentage with two solo shutouts and a shared clean sheet in the 2009 NCAA Championship.

"With Nikki, her problem in the first couple of years was she had very little consistency and her confidence was really low," Waldrum said. "Last year, she put a little more time into her fitness over the summer and came in a little more fit and when she got her shot, she took advantage





of it. Now, she is confident and she gets it, so hopefully she'll be able to carry that over this year."

Sophomore **Maddie Fox** will push Weiss for playing time in the Notre Dame goal this season. The San Jose, Calif., resident saw limited action last year, appearing in five matches for a total of 73:14, making two saves and closing out three shutouts for the Fighting Irish. A superb technical netminder with quick reflexes and good instincts, Fox also possesses a strong leg and is fearless in traffic, both in the air and through scrambles in the goal mouth.

"The thing Maddie has that is a little different (than Nikki) is she is probably a little better at shot stopping," Waldrum noted. "She is a little quicker, her reactions are a little bit better, so shots that are a little lower, she is more athletic and quicker to get to.

"You almost wish you had the best of both (goalkeepers) to put into one," he added. "They both are completely different in that regard and unfortunately, in the college game, more things happen off of crosses and services into the box. Particularly with the defense that we have, it is not often they get a ton of shots that are just reaction and short-range shots. They are both pretty good on breakaway situations, so the key is going to be who best dominates in the air. It is not that Maddie can't do it, but Nikki has some size on her and if Nikki is consistent, then she is going to be hard to beat."



Two-time national coach of the year Randy Waldrum has led Notre Dame to a 232-34-9 (.860) record, including seven BIG EAST titles, seven NCAA College Cup berths, four NCAA final appearances and the 2004 national championship in his 11 seasons under the Golden Dome.

When Notre Dame went searching for a women's soccer coach in 1999, the University was looking for an experienced tactician and motivator to lead the NCAA's second-winningest program of the 1990s. Notre Dame found exactly what it was looking for in Randy Waldrum, a veteran of coaching at nearly every level who built Notre Dame into the 2004 national champions and has kept the Irish among the nation's elite year after year.

From his first coaching job at MacArthur High School in Irving, Texas, to leading Notre Dame to the NCAA title, Waldrum has been recognized by U.S. Soccer as one of the game's top soccer minds. He has held a position on the U.S. national team coaching staff since 1992 and recently completed a successful stint as president for the 28,000-member National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Waldrum - who has directed Notre Dame to 138 victories, five NCAA College Cups, three national championship games and an NCAA title during the past six seasons (2004-09) - is able to draw on the lessons learned from 27 combined seasons in the college coaching ranks (415-139-28 record/.737), providing the Irish program with the full package in its head coaching position. A respected student of the game, Waldrum has combined with his staff to consistently attract some of the nation's top talent. In the past eight years alone, Notre Dame's incoming classes all have been rated among the top 10 in the nation - highlighted by several elite individuals who have quickly made the transition to the college game.

Waldrum's first 11 Notre Dame teams (1999-2009) continued the program's tradition of excellence by combining for a 232-34-9 (.860) record while winning 10 BIG EAST regular-season and seven BIG EAST Tournament titles, and advancing to the NCAAs each year - including College Cup semifinal trips in 2000, 2007 and 2009, runner-up finishes in 1999, 2006 and 2008, and the 2004 title. The Irish also have posted a 64-25-3 (.712) record against NSCAA Top 25 teams in the first 11 seasons of the Waldrum era.

Waldrum's coaching savvy was on full display in 2009, as he calmly steered Notre Dame back from am injury-ravaged 3-3-0 start with a 19-game unbeaten streak (18-0-1) that included 13 consecutive wins during the final two months of the season. The Irish also rolled up 13 shutouts in that

19-game run and charged all the way to their I fourth consecutive College Cup appearance, collecting their 11th BIG EAST Tournament crown along the way.

Waldrum's steady and focused leadership last season did not go unnoticed around the country, as Soccer America chose him as its 2009 National Coach of the Year, marking the second consecutive year that Waldrum garnered a national coaching accolade (he was the '08 NSCAA award recipient).

Waldrum's .787 career winning percentage (339-84-21) is fourth all-time among women's soccer coaches with 10-plus seasons on the Division I level (third among active coaches; see chart). During his years at Notre Dame, Waldrum has matched wits versus seven other coaches who are ranked among the top 10 on that list and the Irish own an impressive 30-16-2 (.646) record in those games featuring matchups against top national coaches. In those games, Waldrum has guided the Irish to winning records versus Len Tsantiris and his UConn squad (13-2-2), Jerry Smith's Santa Clara team (8-5-0), Mark Krikorian's Florida State crew (3-1-0) and Becky Burleigh's Florida program (2-0-0) – plus a split of two games versus Portland when they were directed by the late Clive Charles. Notre Dame's 2004 NCAA title-game win over UCLA (coached by Jillian Ellis, yet another on the Top 10 list) was decided in penalty kicks, with the Irish officially awarded the victory for that game.

The Irish have totaled a +198 win-to-loss margin in the Waldrum era (232-34-9), also winning nearly 80 percent of their "big games" when facing an NSCAA Top 25 or postseason opponent (100-25-4, .791). Five of the top six goals-against averages (GAA) in Irish history have also been posted in the Waldrum era (0.39 in 2000, 0.40 in '06, 0.44 in '08, 0.49 in '03 and 0.51 in 2004, with the record of 0.36 set in 1997).

Waldrum's Notre Dame players have combined for 24 All-America honors – led by 2000 national player of the year Anne Makinen, high-scoring forward standout Katie Thorlakson (who received 2004 player-of-the-year honors) and the program's first two-time Hermann Trophy recipient (and fourth in Division I history) in Kerri Hanks (2006 and 2008). Irish players in the Waldrum era also have combined for 17 Academic All-America awards, including rare double honors (All-America and Academic All-America) for 2001 defender Monica Gonzalez and versatile forward/midfielder Brittany Bock (in 2007 and 2008, only the 12th Notre Dame student-athlete to pull off this double twice). The 2003 squad also became the first in Division I women's soccer history to produce three Academic All-Americans, as defender Vanessa Pruzinsky was named Academic All-American of the Year, while forward Mary Boland and goalkeeper Erika Bohn were second-team selections. Bohn was then tapped as a first-team choice in 2004 and 2005, joining Pruzinsky as two of the 10 three-time Academic All-Americans in Notre Dame athletics

The 2008 season was arguably one of the best in Waldrum's storied coaching career, as he piloted Notre Dame to a school-record 26 victories (all to start the season) and a fourth NCAA College Cup berth in five seasons, as well as a third trip to the national championship game in that span. The Irish also collected their 10th BIG EAST title with a dramatic 1-0 overtime win over Connecticut and trailed for only 4:05 all season, with Notre Dame fielding three All-Americans (Hanks, Bock, Carrie Dew) and the Hermann Trophy winner, as well as four major BIG EAST award winners, including Waldrum's fifth coach of the year honor. He later was chosen as the NSCAA National Coach of the Year, the first time he had ever received that award during his distinguished career

Waldrum coached the Irish to the College Cup weekend once again in 2007, as he helped the team overcome key injuries and a punishing earlyseason slate. The Irish went on a 17-game unbeaten streak (16-0-1) before falling in the College Cup semifinals, climbing all the way to No. 4 in the final national rankings. In addition, Hanks and Bock were named NSCAA first team All-Americans, marking the first time since 1995 that two forwards from the same team have received first team All-America honors. Bock led the BIG EAST with 10 goals during conference play, while her 16 total goals ranked 11th in the nation. Hanks became the 19th player in NCAA Division I history to reach the 50 goals and 50 assists plateau, with five of those 19 coming from Notre Dame (and four having played for Waldrum at some point in their careers).

In 2006, Waldrum and his staff coached an Irish squad that rates among the most dominant in Notre Dame history. The Irish held the nation's top ranking for most of the season and did not lose until the national title game, tying the (then) team record for wins in a season (25-1-1) while becoming just the second women's soccer program ever to reach 25 wins in multiple seasons. Only five teams in the 27-year history of Division I women's soccer have totaled more than 25 wins in a season.

Waldrum's 2006 squad led the nation with a team-record 19 shutouts while the 0.40 goalsagainst average ranked third nationally and was just shy of the Notre Dame record (0.36). The Irish also compiled the nation's top scoring margin (+74; 85-11) and had 28 more goals than their opponents' combined shots on goal (57). Notre Dame allowed a per-game average of only 2.11 shots on goal – setting another team record – and the Irish did not face a deficit for 16 straight games prior to the NCAA title game. Hanks collected the first of her two Hermann Trophies that year while joining former UNC great Mia Hamm as the only Division I players ever to end a season as the national leader in both goals (22) and assists (22).

Waldrum's 2005 team turned in another historic season, entering the year ranked No. 1 and leading the nation in scoring (4.40 goals per game). More impressively, the 2005 team's goal total (110, good for 10th in NCAA history) was more than twice the number of shots on goal allowed by the Irish for the entire season (54, with only 15 opponent goals). The Irish rolled up a 60-3 scoring margin during a 13-game winning streak late in the 2005 season. The streak – which saw the Irish allow only two opponent shots on goal – ended in an NCAA

quarterfinal loss at eventual national champion Portland.

The 2005 season also featured four All-Americans -Thorlakson, Hanks, Candace Chapman and Jen Buczkowski - who were among the final-15 candidates for the Hermann Trophy as well. Those players each received top BIG EAST honors in 2005 (Thorlakson on offense, Chapman on defense, Buczkowski as best midfielder, Hanks as top rookie), marking the first time that one team had claimed four major BIG EAST player awards. Thorlakson (18G-35A) and Hanks (28G-15A) also became the second pair of teammates in Division I history to eclipse 70 points in the same season.

The nation's only repeat honoree as his region's NSCAA coach of the year in 2003 and '04, Waldrum's clever use of personnel played a key role in the 2004 team's sustained success and postseason push, making efficient use of the roster in order to utilize the team's depth to keep the top players fresh for the postseason (19 different players started in 2004). He also used a variety of formations and made a key decision to install the veteran Chapman at forward, following a broken leg suffered by her classmate Boland. Chapman had not played forward since high school but she responded with an all-BIG EAST season as the team's second-leading scorer (12G-8A).

The 2004 squad posted (at the time) the best winning percentage in program history (.944, 25-1-1), with only three previous Division I teams winning more games in a season. They also finished fourth in the nation with a 0.51 season goalsagainst average while totaling nearly as many goals (70) as opponent shots on goal (71) and trailing only 102 minutes all season. On the way to the title, Notre Dame beat three Top 25 teams twice (Santa Clara, Boston College Connecticut), while adding noteworthy wins over Portland, Stanford,

West Virginia, Villanova, Michigan and Arizona State. The 2003 and 2004 teams combined to win more than 90 percent of their games (45-4-2) - a two-year mark that was bettered by the 2005 and 2006 Irish teams (47-4-1).

The Waldrum era began in 1999, with his first five years coinciding with the career of defensive enforcer Pruzinsky, the classic definition of student-

athlete who graduated with a 4.00 cumulative GPA as a chemical engineering major while also competing for a spot on the final roster for the U.S. U-21 National Team. Pruzinsky returned for a fifth year of eligibility in 2003 and was named the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year for women's soccer, also receiving a prestigious NCAA postgraduate scholarship.

Waldrum became the first coach in NCAA women's soccer history (third total) to lead his/her team to the championship game in his first season with a team, after guiding his 1999 squad to four straight wins in the NCAAs. Three previous first-year coaches had reached the semifinals (doing so in the days of 12- and 16-team NCAA fields), but perhaps none had led a team through a harder route than Waldrum did against the 48-team draw in 1999. The Irish defeated Atlantic-10 champion Dayton and eighth-ranked Stanford (the Pac-10 champ) before toppling fourth-ranked and Big 12 champion Nebraska in the quarterfinals via a nail-biting penalty kick shootout.

The rookie coach had the fifth-seeded Irish clicking in their first three rounds of the 1999 NCAA tournament – with that momentum continuing at the College Cup. Earlier in the 1999 regular season, Notre Dame had suffered a 4-2 loss at top-ranked Santa Clara. In the rematch at the NCAA semifinals, Waldrum motivated his team with surprise green jerseys. The Irish responded with an inspired performance in a 1-0 win over the Broncos, as an NCAA-record total of 14,000 fans looked on at San Jose's Spartan Stadium. Despite a loss in the title game two days later, Waldrum had taken Notre Dame further than any previous first-year head coach in Division I women's soccer history.

A new challenge awaited in 2000, as Notre Dame looked to replace five graduated starters – three of them All-Americans, and a fourth the team's all-time leading goal scorer. Under Waldrum's steady hand, the Irish overcame the loss of two injured starters for good chunks of the 2000 season and returned to the top of the rankings, led by a stingy defense that posted a national-best 0.39 goals-against average.

Makinen, the leader of the 2000 midfield unit, went on to earn national player-of-the-year honors while the 2000 Irish posted a 23-1-1 overall record, with the only blemishes being a scoreless battle at BIG EAST rival Connecticut and a 2-1 loss to North Carolina in the NCAA semifinals. The Irish trailed for just 35 minutes all season and captured another BIG EAST crown, with Waldrum repeating as BIG EAST Coach of the Year.

The 2001 squad then claimed the program's seventh straight BIG EAST title (only UConn women's basketball had won more consecutive BIG EAST titles, among team-oriented sports) while posting noteworthy wins over Penn State and Nebraska. A series of injuries to key players slowed the 2002 squad but the Irish rallied down the stretch before losing on a late goal at top-ranked Stanford in the NCAA round of 16.

The 2003 squad (20-3-1) returned atop the national scene, owning the No. 2 national ranking for most of the season while emerging as one of the nation's most balanced teams on both sides of the ball – led by a pair of All-Americans in forward Amy Warner and defender Melissa Tancredi.

Waldrum – who served as an assistant coach with the U.S. Women's U-18 and U-20 national teams in the late 1990s – came to Notre Dame

after beginning the Baylor women's soccer program from scratch in 1995, ultimately leading the Bears to a 9-0-1 Big 12 Conference record and their first Big 12 championship in any sport in 1998.

In three seasons at Baylor, Waldrum guided the Bears to a 46-14-3 record after he spent 1995-96 starting up the program. He earned Big 12 Conference and NSCAA Central Region coach-of-the-year honors after finishing with a 15-5-1 record in '98. The Bears posted wins over three ranked teams to earn their first NCAA bid and were ranked as high as 12th during the season. He was named the 1996 national coach of the year for a first-year program and likewise, Baylor was chosen by Soccer Buzz as the nation's best first-year program in 1996 after posting a 17-3-1 season.

Prior to his tenure at Baylor, Waldrum spent six seasons (1989-94) as head coach of the men's and women's teams at the University of Tulsa, compiling a 66-33-6 record with the men and a 61-36-9 mark with the women (he remains the winningest all-time coach of both programs). He was voted Central Region coach of the year in 1990 after the Golden Hurricane finished 9-6-1. His Tulsa women's teams produced four all-region players, six Academic All-Americans and two Olympic Festival players.

Waldrum's 1993 Tulsa men's team finished second in the Missouri Valley Conference and fourth in the region with a 10-6-2 record, earning Waldrum MVC and Midwest Region coach-of- the-year honors. His 1991 team won the MVC championship, finishing with a 14-3-0 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. His men's teams produced seven All-Americans, two national team members, three U.S. Olympic Festival players and three Professional Indoor Soccer League draft selections. While at Tulsa, Waldrum also served as the state coach for the Olympic Development Program.

Waldrum started a first-year men's program at Texas Wesleyan in 1988 and earlier had his first collegiate head coaching position at Austin College in 1982. He served as director of coaching for the Texas Longhorns Soccer Club from 1987-89, coaching one of the seven teams in the club while overseeing the other teams. His team went 53-4-1 and finished third in the country, with Waldrum coaching and developing two Parade All-Americans, two national team players and one Youth World Cup player with the Longhorns.

Waldrum earned all-district honors all four years of his playing career at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, graduating in 1981 as a physical education major and political science minor. He then played professionally for the Los Angeles Skyhawks and the Indianapolis Daredevils of the American Soccer League.

Born Sept. 25, 1956, the Irving, Texas, native and his wife Dianna have one son, Ben, who competed in professional soccer with the A-League's El Paso Patriots and the MISL's Dallas Sidekicks. Ben also served as an assistant coach on his father's staff at Notre Dame from 2003-07.

A Visit with Randy Waldrum

Q: How do you think the Notre Dame women's soccer program is perceived on a national level and how would you characterize the current state of the program?

A: "I'd like to think people view us as one of the premier programs in the country and I think that is the perception. And that's where we certainly want to keep it.

"What makes the sport of soccer tick is that all coaches and fans see the game a little bit differently. I would love for our team to be viewed as a program that plays a very attractive, attacking style. If I had my wish, I would want it to look like a mixture of the Dutch and the Brazilians, maybe some of Manchester United. Those are models that you'd like your team to look at.

"We've taken what was established and added to it. Previous Notre Dame teams played that attractive style and we've been able to continue that, with probably a little more athleticism – which you need to consistently win the big games. That's how the game has evolved.

"Maybe even a little bit to our downfall, we've always come out and tried to play. We've never just tried to sit back and defend and see if the best team can win from that. An attractive style is a crucial part of how this program will operate."

Q: What will it take to maintain the Notre Dame program at that elite level?

A: "Any coach will tell you it's about the players first. So we certainly have to continue to recruit the best, and our incoming class for 2010 is right up there among the best in the nation. A lot of our success has been due to the fact that we've added kids who are good fits for Notre Dame. That's a big reason why we have been so successful this past decade, especially in 2000, 2004 and 2008. The chemistry of those teams was so incredible, although at times we may not have been as talented as some earlier Notre Dame teams."

Q: What are some of the things that you have come to appreciate most at Notre Dame?

A: "On the outside, I always had an appreciation for the athletic tradition of Notre Dame and knew it was a great academic institution. Since I've been on campus, that certainly is very true and probably 10-fold once you realize the actual tradition. It's truly what a college campus should be all about.

"A couple things that really separate us is how committed the alums are to Notre Dame. We don't go anywhere around the country that somebody doesn't stop and talk to us about Notre Dame, and alumni clubs hold receptions for us all over the country. Those are things you don't find anywhere else.

"The biggest thing is what Notre Dame can do for student-athletes in their future. They get great benefits of playing four years on a top college team and receiving a great education. But in the long run, there are great employment opportunities that being an alum of Notre Dame can open for you. Those are the things that really have amazed me."

Q: Many of your top players have undergone position shifts over the years. What is your philosophy about position changes?

A: "It's fairly common, because so many top kids played in the more high-profile positions with their club teams. It's another intangible when we are evaluating players and one has that versatility to play other positions, because you never know where they might play. We have several players with the skills, maturity and mentality to play multiple positions and they are valuable members of this team.

"We have a trend of playing with several defenders who converted from the offense and they have that sense of what the opposing forwards are going to try to do. That may give them an added edge, because they've been on the other side of the ball."

Q: Your inverted pyramid 4-3-3 system has been used by the U.S. Women's National Team but is fairly unique in the college game. What attracts you to this formation?

A: "I like the system for two primary reasons. First, it gives you four in the back and it's a lot easier to cover the full width of the field. Secondly, it still allows you to keep an attacking presence with three up front. It is the perfect system for the players we've had.

"For the system to work, you need midfielders like we've had in recent years such as Jen Buczkowski, Brittany Bock, Courtney Rosen and now Courtney Barg, who are technically-sound and comfortable handling the ball under pressure. The system also is a 'win-win' defensively, whether you're trying to match up with four or five midfielders from the opposition. You also need great outside backs – which we've had recently with the likes of Candace Chapman, Kim Lorenzen, Christie Shaner and Elise Weber – who can cover a lot of ground on the flanks.

"You recruit to fit your system if you're happy with that system and want to stay in it; or you recruit the best players you can and then develop a system once that group gets there. We're to a point where we can recruit for the system. It doesn't mean that won't change if warranted, but we are very pleased and content with the way the system meshes with our current players."

Q: Your players have said that you have their respect and attention without using an overbearing style. How did that develop?

A: "I played for coaches who were not big yellers and screamers. My high school coach Simon Sanchez is still one of the best coaches I've ever been around. People respected him and loved to play for him, without him needing to ride us all the time – but we still had some intense practices and games.

"Today's athletes are very different. Many don't respond as well to a lot of yelling and screaming. I've always been fortunate to coach players who respond in a positive way and understand what we are asking them to do. We have a very intelligent group and they've been very receptive to our ways of doing things."

Former Baylor All-American and WUSA goalkeeper Dawn Greathouse enters her eighth season as an assistant coach on the Notre Dame women's soccer staff, reuniting with her former college coach Randy Waldrum, who departed Baylor for Notre Dame after the 1998 season. Greathouse currently holds an advanced national diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Greathouse has provided valuable instruction and insight for some of the greatest goalkeepers in program history in 2006 graduate Erika Bohn (who went on to be one of two goalkeepers on the U.S. U-21 National Team at the 2005 Nordic Cup) and 2008 graduate Lauren Karas. Bohn – a rare three-time Academic All-American – earned NSCAA all-region honors in 2003 and then was an all-BIG EAST Conference selection in 2005. She ranks fourth in the Notre Dame record book with a 0.69 career goalsagainst average (GAA) and is third in Irish women's soccer history with 6,788 career minutes played. While under the tutelage of Greathouse, Karas posted the second highest career winning-percentage among Irish goalkeepers (.902) and the thirdbest GAA (0.65).

Greathouse made an immediate impact in her first two seasons at Notre Dame, the second of which saw the Irish win their second national championship. In | 2003, the Irish finished fifth in the nation with a 0.49 season goals-against average in 2003 and were fourth with 15 shutouts – also compiling a 956-minute shutout streak that ranks fifth in NCAA history (longest since 1999). Notre Dame faced just one deficit in the first 19 games of the 2003 season, en route to a 20-3-1 record. The 2004 national championship season then saw the Irish lead the nation with 18 shutouts while nearly reclaiming the GAA title (4th, at 0.51). The 25-1-1 season featured just 108 minutes with the Irish playing from behind, limiting 24 of the 27 opponents to one goal or fewer, while the other three foes managed to score twice (two coming in the first four games, with only 10 goals allowed over the final 25).

Following the 2004 NCAA title-game win over UCLA, Bohn quickly credited Greathouse when asked about her clutch performances in that pressure-packed game. Bohn's six saves that day included three in penalty-kick situations, one coming late in regulation to preserve the 1-1 tie while her final save (in the shootout) clinched the title.

Most recently, Greathouse tutored 2010 graduate Kelsey Lysander and current senior Nikki Weiss to consecutive standout seasons. During the 2008 campaign, the Irish netminding duo combined for 18 shutouts (second-most in school history) with an 0.44 GAA (fourth-lowest in program annals). Individually, Lysander set or tied school records for wins (26), winning percentage (.963, 26-1-0) and total shutouts (18) while ranking sixth in the nation in GAA (0.44) and being named to the NCAA College Cup All-Tournament Team.

Last season, it was Weiss' turn, as she stepped in as the starter at midseason and wound up posting a 14-2-1 record and seven solo shutouts (part of the team's 16 clean sheets), helping spark Notre Dame's 19-game unbeaten streak during the final two months of the season. Weiss also set a new BIG EAST record with a 0.15 goals-against average in regular-season league play, allowing just one goal in 597 minutes.

"Dawn has done a great job with our 'keepers and we expect that to continue on an even higher level this season," says Waldrum.

"Dawn is one of the best goalkeepers I've ever coached and her skills and knowledge are further legitimized by the fact that she played in the WUSA. She brings a great level of experience but also knows what the expectations are on the pro level. Dawn is able to expose our players to what the inner workings of elite-level soccer are all about and that supports what our staff as a whole is trying to teach the players."

Greathouse – who trained with the U.S. U-20 National Team in 1998 – played with the Washington Freedom in the first two seasons of the Women's United Soccer Association (2001 and 2002), also playing for the San Jose CyberRays in 2002 and '03. She made eight career starts in the WUSA while backing up U.S. National Team players Siri Mullinix (Washington) and former Notre Dame All-American LaKeysia Beene (San Jose).

Greathouse logged 7,121 minutes (sixth in NCAA history at the time) in her four-year Baylor career while posting a 1.20 goals-against average, an .802 save percentage and 28 shutouts. The three-time all-Big 12 Conference and three-time Big 12 all-academic team honoree posted her top season as a sophomore in 1998, earning NSCAA second team All-America honors after ranking 12th in the nation with a 0.69 GAA. She helped the 1998 team win Baylor's first Big-12 title in any sport – before an ACL knee injury sidelined her from Baylor's second straight trip to the NCAAs.

An NSCAA and Parade All-American at Allen (Texas) High School, Greathouse helped the Texas Longhorns club program place second nationally and trained with the U.S. U-16 and U-17 national teams.

During her youth soccer days, Greathouse played goalkeeper for her club team but also was a skilled forward with the Allen High School squad. She set the school record for career goals and also held the single-season goals record that later was broken by former Notre Dame All-American Kerri Hanks.

Born Feb. 10, 1979, in Rochester, N.Y., Greathouse graduated from Baylor in 2001 with a degree in health fitness.





Ken Nuber

Assistant Coach
Third Season
Saint Francis (Ind.) '93



Following a storied career at the NAIA level, Ken Nuber is embarking on the next chapter in his coaching development, starting his third season as an assistant coach at Notre Dame. Nuber came to South Bend in 2008 following 13 highly-successful seasons as the head women's soccer coach at NAIA member University of Saint Francis in Fort Wayne, Ind.

"I've known Ken for over a decade and I saw first-hand his work with the Saint Francis program," Irish head coach Randy Waldrum said. "I believe he is an up-and-coming coach with a bright future in our profession. His teams at Saint Francis were well-disciplined, organized, and tried to play the game in a way that fits our Notre Dame style. He is top class in his character and brings a wealth of head coaching experience to our staff. I'm extremely excited to have him on board, and look to have contribute to our continued success in every aspect of our program."

An exceptionally-gifted game tactician and scout, Nuber has wasted little time in providing a positive impact on Notre Dame's fortunes. In 2008, he helped the Irish to a spot in the NCAA title game and school-record 26 wins, including nine over NSCAATop 25 teams, highlighted by a regular-season sweep of Santa Clara, North Carolina and Duke.

Last season, Nuber's creativity and ingenuity played an important role in guiding Notre Dame back from an injury-ravaged 3-3-0 start with a 19-game unbeaten streak and the program's fourth consecutive College Cup appearance.

Nuber founded the Saint Francis women's soccer program in 1995 and amassed a 170-96-14 (.632) record with the Cougars, piloting them to six Mid-Central Conference (MCC) titles and eight NAIA

regional tournament berths, including regional finals appearances in 2002 and 2007. He also coached four NAIA All-Americans and 27 NAIA honorable mention All-Americans, as well as five regional players of the year during his tenure. What's more, his 170 victories rank seventh on the NAIA all-time wins list.

A three-time MCC Coach of the Year and two-time regional coach of the year, Nuber worked hard to maintain a standard of excellence on and off the field at Saint Francis. His players won 34 NAIA Scholar-Athlete All-America honors in his 13 seasons, and the Cougars earned 10 consecutive National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Team Academic Awards, with their 3.61 team grade-point average (GPA) in 2007 ranking fourth among collegiate programs at all levels of competition. In addition, Saint Francis was chosen to receive the 2007 NAIA Program of Character Award given for achievement in five categories: sportsmanship, respect, responsibility, servant leadership and integrity.

Nuber was one of the most respected coaches in the NAIA fraternity, having spent eight years on the NSCAA/NAIA Women's Coaches Association Executive Council, including a turn as the group's president from 2006-08. He also served seven years as chair of the NAIA All-America Committee, five years at the chair of the NAIA National Championship Selection Committee, four years as chair

of the NAIA Scholar-Athlete All-America Selection Committee and three years as chair of the NSCAA/ NAIA Coach of the Year Selection Committee.

Nuber also was an assistant coach with the Fort Wayne Fever of the United Soccer League's W-League in 2004, helping the Fever to an 11-3-1 record in their inaugural season and a second-place finish in the Midwest Division.

Nuber was involved with the Saint Francis athletics community for nearly two decades, beginning with his enrollment at the university and participation with the men's soccer program from 1989-92. He ranks second in school history for career goals (43) and points (100), and is among the school's all-time leaders in several other statistical categories.

In 1994, Nuber returned to his alma mater when he was tapped to lead the Cougar men's soccer program, compiling a 32-60-2 (.351) mark during five seasons at



the helm. All told, he posted a combined record of 202-156-16 (.561) in 14 seasons coaching the men and women at Saint Francis.

Nuber also spent time as the head coach of the Saint Francis softball program from 2000-03, registering a 75-74 (.503) record and standing as the school's leader in career victories. One of the true legends in Cougar athletics history, he was inducted into the Saint Francis Athletics Hall of Fame in 2005.

Born Oct. 3, 1970, in Cincinnati, Ohio, Nuber graduated from Saint Francis in 1993 with a bachelor of arts degree in communications and an area of concentration in business. He also has received a pair of coaching certifications from the NSCAA, having earned his national diploma in 1997 and his advanced national diploma in 1999.

He and his wife, Gina, are the proud parents of two children — daughter Mya (6) and son Jayden (4).

Jeannette Boudway is in her third season with the Notre Dame women's soccer program and her second as the team's volunteer assistant coach after helping coordinate program operations in 2008. In her current role, her responsibilities include team travel, equipment, budgeting and on-campus recruiting, as well as assisting with oversight of the Notre Dame summer soccer camps.

Boudway came to Notre Dame from the University of Alabama at Birmingham, where she spent three seasons (2005-07) as an assistant coach for the Blazers. During her time at UAB, Boudway helped the Blazers to a 25-30-4 record, the 2006 Conference USA Tournament championship and a bid in the '06 NCAA

Tournament. She worked with 10 all-conference performers and five all-region selections during her three-year tenure in Birmingham, and also oversaw the program's equipment, travel, digital match analysis, budgeting and recruiting, in addition to off-season work with community service, alumni affairs and camp administration.

Boudway began her coaching career in 2002 as an assistant coach at Grand Vallev State University, helping the Lakers to a 13-4-1 record (at the time the most wins in school history) and a runner-up finish in the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. She then moved on to Barry University in Miami Shores, Fla., where she spent one year as a volunteer assistant coach in 2004, contributing to the Buccaneers' 12-3-2 record (7-0-1 in the Sunshine State

Conference), as well as an NCAA Division II Tournament

Boudway also has experience as a coach at the club level, having previously worked with the Plantation (Fla.) Eagles FC. Birmingham (Ala.) United, and most recently with the Junior Irish Soccer Club in Mishawaka, Ind.

Currently, she has started a soccer program with Invaders and Echo for children ages 4-8 called Mini Select Soccer. The program includes skills sessions on Monday nights and games on Friday nights. Invaders and Echo are working together to provide this opportunity to youth in the Michiana community. She also is coaching a U11 team at Invaders



after working with the same players on the U10 team at Invaders last sea-

A native of Naperville, III., the former Jeannette Croce enjoyed a stellar playing career at DePaul University from 1997-2000, collecting third-team all-C-USA honors in 1997 and serving as team captain during her final two seasons (1999 and 2000). She remains among the top 10 in school history for career goals (4th, 14), points (6th, 35), assists (8th, 7) and games started (9th, 70), and she was a four-time


selection to the C-USA Commissioner's Academic Honor Roll.

Boudway graduated from DePaul in 2001 with a bachelor's degree in accounting. She went on to earn her master's degree in sports management and business administration from Barry in 2005. From 3-3 To The College Cup: Notre Dame Rides Impressive Turnaround To Fourth Consecutive NCAA Semifinal Berth

THE TRADITION CONTINUES – For the fourth consecutive season, the fifth time in six years and the 11th time in school history, Notre Dame earned a place in the NCAA Women's College Cup in 2009, finishing with a 21-4-1 record following a late-game 1-0 loss to North Carolina in the national semifinals in College Station, Texas.

Three weeks into the 2009 season, a College Cup berth may not have seemed to be in the cards for the Fighting Irish, who were 3-3-0 following a rare two-game losing streak, something Notre Dame had experienced just one other time since 2003.

However, the Fighting Irish bounced back in a big way, going on a 19-game unbeaten streak (18-0-1) that included 13 consecutive wins down the stretch from Oct. 9-Nov. 27, to assure Notre Dame its customary place on college soccer's grandest stage.

The '09 College Cup appearance was especially notable for the Fighting Irish women's soccer program, as it marked the second time in school history that Notre Dame strung together four consecutive trips to the NCAA semifinals, also having participated in two national championship games (2006, 2008) during that time. The 1994-97 Fighting Irish teams were the first to fashion such a four-year run of excellence.

SENIOR LEADERSHIP – The Notre Dame senior class - which consisted of Micaela Alvarez, Amanda Clark, Haley Ford, Kelsey Lysander, Courtney Rosen, Rachel VanderGenugten and Michele Weissenhofer - ranked among the most successful in the country, with a four-year record of 91-11-4 (877) that includes the aforementioned four NCAA Women's College Cup trips and two appearances in the national title game. Notre Dame's Class of 2009 also won three BIG EAST Championship titles, never lost to a conference opponent with a 53-0-3 (.973) record against BIG EAST teams, and was ranked either first or second in the nation in each of their four years (including No. 1 rankings in 2006 and 2008).

REVERSAL OF FORTUNE – Notre Dame's 19-game unbeaten streak during the final two months of the season was not only the result of exceptional

cohesiveness between the team's offensive and defensive units, but also thanks to incredible versatility and depth within its ranks.

Preseason injuries to senior starters **Courtney Rosen** and **Michele Weissenhofer** - with Rosen missing the entire season and Weissenhofer's production severely limited - led head coach **Randy Waldrum** to move junior defender/midfielder **Lauren Fowlkes** up to the forward line, and the '08 FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup gold medalist responded with the finest season of her career, winding up second on the team with 10 goals and 24 points (she had three goals and seven points in her first two seasons combined).

In addition, when senior center back **Haley Ford** was sidelined with an injury for the final month of the regular season, Waldrum called on sophomore center back **Ellen Bartindale**, who started six times and more than capably filled the void despite playing just four games as a rookie in 2008.

These moves paid off handsomely for the Fighting Irish, who outscored their opponents 50-8 and posted 13 shutouts during this late-season surge. What's more, Notre Dame led or was tied for nearly 99 percent of the total minutes played in the 19-game unbeaten streak, trailing for only 16:38 of a possible 1,738:56 (1:18 at Cincinnati on Sept. 25; 15:20 at West Virginia on Oct. 2).

ALL-AMERICA PAIR – Once again, Notre Dame was well represented on the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) All-America Teams with two Fighting Irish players selected for top honors, each for the first time in their careers.

Sophomore midfielder **Courtney Barg** was a first-team All-America selection, marking the sixth consecutive season in which a Notre Dame midfielder copped All-America status, and the second in three years to be a first-team honoree (following Brittany Bock in 2007).

Meanwhile, junior **Lauren Fowlkes**, who was penciled in as a defender/midfielder when the season began but did most of her damage as a forward, earned third-team All-America accolades to extend the Fighting Irish run of All-America forwards to seven consecutive seasons.



Notre Dame now has fielded 47 All-America selections since 1992, while its total of 44 NSCAA All-Americans during the past 16 seasons (1994-2009) trails only North Carolina's 50 among Division I teams, with Portland (33) a distant third on that list.

All told, the Fighting Irish have had at least one NSCAA All-America selection every season since 1992, including 14 seasons with multiple NSCAA All-Americans (two-plus every year since 2003), and eight seasons with at least three NSCAA All-Americans. In addition, Notre Dame has produced at least six different NSCAA All-Americans each at the positions of forward, midfielder and defender during the program's storied history.

In addition to her NSCAA All-America teammates, sophomore forward Melissa Henderson also received top honors last season, garnering the Soccer America First Team MVP designation (equivalent to All-America status)

HARDWARE FOR THE COACH – Thanks in part to his expert guidance during Notre Dame's late-season resurgence last year, Fighting Irish head coach Randy Waldrum was selected as the 2009 Soccer America National Coach of the Year. It was the first national coaching award for the veteran Notre Dame skipper, who is an eight-time NSCAA Region Coach of the Year (four times at ND) and Conference Coach of the Year (five times in the BIG EAST Conference while piloting the Fighting Irish).

CONFERENCE DOMINANCE – For the 12th time in its 15-year BIG EAST membership, Notre Dame claimed the conference regular-season title (divisional or overall), finished atop the National Division standings (10-0-1) and going unbeaten in conference play for the 10th time.

Then, with a win over #rv/10 Marquette in the BIG EAST championship game on Nov. 8 (2-1), Notre Dame pushed its NCAA Division I-record unbeaten streak against BIG EAST opposition to 66 games (63-0-3), dating back to a 4-1 loss at #15 Marquette on Sept. 30, 2005. In that 66-game span, the only ties were a 0-0 draw at Connecticut (Oct. 13, 2006), a 1-1 deadlock at #12 West Virginia in the 2007 BIG EAST title game (WVU won 5-3 on PKs) and a 0-0 draw at Pittsburgh (Oct. 4, 2009).

Since joining the BIG EAST, the Fighting Irish are 134-8-5 (.928) all-time in regular-season conference games, 35-2-1 (.934) in the BIG EAST Championship, and hold a 713-85 scoring edge dating back to that first league season in '95.

What's more, Notre Dame maintains a 14-year, 94-game home-unbeaten streak (93-0-1) versus BIG EAST teams, with Connecticut the lone conference team ever to defeat the Fighting Irish at Alumni Field (5-4 in OT on Oct. 6, 1995).

Notre Dame also fielded two of the six major individual awards and placed five players on the All-BIG EAST Conference Team. Junior Lauren Fowlkes was a co-recipient (along with Georgetown's Sara Jordan) of the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year award, and also a first-team all-conference choice by the BIG EAST coaches. Fowlkes was the latest in a long and distinguished tradition of Notre Dame players who captured the BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year trophy, becoming the sixth consecutive Fighting Irish recipient of the award following in the footsteps of Katie Thorlakson (2004-05), Kerri Hanks (2006, 2008) and Brittany Bock (2007).

Making her own bit of history was sophomore Courtney Barg, who was named the 2009 BIG EAST Midfielder of the Year. Barg, who also joined Fowlkes as a first-team all-BIG EAST selection last year, was just the third Notre Dame player to take home the honor (first since Jen Buczkowski in 2005), and she was the first sophomore tabbed for the conference's top midfielder award since 2001, when Boston College's Sarah Rahko won it.

Sophomore defender/tri-captain Jessica Schuveiller was the third Fighting Irish player to garner first-team all-BIG EAST laurels in 2009, and like Fowlkes and Barg, it was the first time in her career that she was chosen for

The 2009 season marked the second consecutive year, and the 13th time in Notre Dame's 15-year BIG EAST affiliation, that the Fighting Irish had at least three players receive first-team all-conference citations.

Rounding out Notre Dame's all-BIG EAST contingent in 2009 were a pair of second-team selections - junior midfielder Rose Augustin and sophomore forward Melissa Henderson. It was the first all-league certificate for Augustin, while Henderson collected her second all-BIG EAST plaque in as many seasons.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE – Junior forward Lauren Fowlkes was named to the 11-player ESPN/CoSIDA Academic All-America Second Team, becoming the 52nd student-athlete in Notre Dame's storied athletics history (and fourth Fighting Irish women's soccer player) to pair All-America honors on the pitch and in the classroom in the same season, a feat most recently pulled off by Brittany Bock in 2007 and 2008.

Fowlkes is enrolled in Notre Dame's College of Science, where she maintains a 3.657 cumulative grade-point average (GPA) as a science-business major. She also was a dean's list selection in the fall of 2007 after compiling a 3.804 semester GPA.

The Notre Dame women's soccer program's unmatched tradition of Academic All-America excellence now includes 23 selections during the past 15 seasons (the most honors from any D-I women's soccer team in that span). In addition, at least one Fighting Irish women's soccer player has been chosen as an Academic All-American in 13 of the past 15 seasons (all but '99 and '02).

POSTSEASON TRAIL BLAZER - After a slow start to the 2009 season while she recovered from off-season leg surgery, sophomore forward Melissa Henderson exploded with a vengeance late in the campaign, particularly once postseason action got underway.

In eight postseason contests (three in the BIG EAST Championship, five in the NCAA Championship), Henderson potted a school-record 10 goals (including four gamewinning tallies, also a record), while her 23 points ranked third on Notre Dame's postseason charts.

The Garland, Texas, native served notice of her impending eruption in the BIG EAST quarterfinals against South Florida, chalking up a natural hat trick (three consecutive goals) in the opening 28:03 of a 5-0 Fighting Irish win at Alumni Stadium. She then dished out assists on both Notre Dame goals in the BIG EAST title game victory over #rv/10 Marquette in Storrs, Conn.

That set the stage for Henderson's opening-weekend performance in the NCAA Championship at Alumni Stadium. In a 5-0 first-round win over IUPUI, Henderson scored twice, including the game's first goal just 7:23 into the contest. In round two, she singlehandedly dismissed Central Michigan (6-1), tying the Notre Dame singlegame record with four goals, including another natural hat trick in the opening 33:04 of the game. She capped the NCAA run by assisting on Rose Augustin's gamewinning goal in the third round against Oregon State (1-0) and then buried her seventh goal of the NCAA tourney (and school-record ninth gamewinning goal of the season) as part of a two-score, 51-second outburst in the 2-0 quarterfinal win at sixth-ranked Florida State.

Henderson's hat tricks against South Florida and Central Michigan marked the first time in school history that a player posted multiple three-goal games in a single postseason. She also broke new ground as the first Fighting Irish player with both a four-goal game and a first-half hat trick in NCAA Championship play.



Game Recaps 🗓

GAME #1 — Aug. 21, 2009 #3/5 Notre Dame 3, Wisconsin 0 Alumni Field (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Melissa Henderson and Rose Augustin scored a little more than two minutes apart in the opening stages of the second half, and Augustin later assisted on the clinching tally by **Lauren Fowlkes**, as the third-ranked Fighting Irish kicked off their 2009 season with a 3-0 victory over Wisconsin on a rainy night at old Alumni Field. With the win, Notre Dame moves to 19-2-1 all-time in season openers, including a 12-1-1 mark at home and a 9–1–1 ledger in the 11-year tenure of head coach **Randy Waldrum**.

Kelsey Lysander and **Nikki Weiss** shared the shutout in the Fighting Irish goal, with Lysander going the first 72:40 and making one critical save, while Weiss was not tested during the final 17:20.

As a team, Notre Dame (1-0-0) outshot Wisconsin, 20-8, including a 10-1 edge in shots on goal. UW netminder Michelle Dalton came up with six saves in the Badgers' net, including three impressive stops in the first half on point-blank Notre Dame shots.

In 2008, the Fighting Irish were known for their ability to reel off goals in the blink of an eye, and with a fresh set of storm clouds on the horizon, Notre Dame delivered a pair of lightning strikes in the first five minutes of the second half to take control. Henderson got the home side on the board 2:49 into the period, tracking down a chip by **Taylor Knaack** on the left side of the box, shaking free from a UW defender, and drilling a low left-footed shot that snuck inside the right post.

At 49:58, the Fighting Irish struck again, this time on a brilliant individual effort by Augustin. The veteran midfielder settled a Wisconsin clearing attempt 30 yards from goal in the left channel, turned and unleashed an wicked thunderbolt that settled perfectly in the upper left 90 over a leaping Dalton.

Fowlkes closed out any hopes of a Wisconsin comeback at the 68:31 mark, rising above the fray in the penalty area to meet Augustin's pinpoint corner kick with a driving header into the right sidenetting.

GAME #2 — Aug. 28, 2009 #2/4 Notre Dame 2, Loyola (III.) 0 Alumni Field (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Melissa Henderson collected a goal and an assist and Molly **Campbell** added an important insurance goal early in the second half as No. 2 Notre Dame picked up its second victory in as many tries this season with a 2-0 win over Loyola (III.) at a waterlogged Alumni Field. It was a fitting farewell for the "grand old palace" of Fighting Irish soccer, which saw Notre Dame post a 222-16-4 all-time record from 1990-2009, including 27 consecutive victories to close the facility.

The Fighting Irish (2-0-0) outshot the Ramblers, 21-6 in the contest, including a 13-3 margin in shots on goal and a 7-3 edge in corner kicks. **Kelsey Lysander** went the distance for Notre Dame, earning her first solo shutout of the season. The veteran netminder made three saves in recording her 11th career solo shutout and 29th career combined whitewash. Lysander's opposite number, Loyola's Katie Groesch, was stellar between the pipes, finishing with 11 saves.

After several early probing runs up the middle, the Fighting Irish turned to the flanks for their opening score. **Tereza Stastny** settled a ball at the edge of the offensive third and quickly sprang Julie Scheidler on an overlapping run down the right side. Scheidler angled towards the area, then cut a sharp low service back to Henderson, who was parked 10 yards out in the goal mouth. The Hermann Trophy candidate swiftly turned on her right shoulder and hammered a rising left-footed shot that beat a diving Groesch to the upper middle netting at the 13:24 mark.

Halftime adjustments have long been a staple of Notre Dame's success, and on this night, it would be no different. Less than three minutes into the second half, **Courtney Barg** sent Henderson on a run down the left flank, before the Texan pivoted at the end line and snapped a left-footed service across the face of goal. Somehow, the ball found its way through traffic and ended up on Campbell's foot at the top right corner of the area, and the sophomore back cranked up a laser that sizzled past Groesch into the left sidenetting at 47:56.

GAME #3 — Sept. 4, 2009 Inn at Saint Mary's Soccer Classic #1/1 North Carolina 6, #2/4 Notre Dame 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

The second-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team saw three impressive streaks come to an end, as the Fighting Irish had their 30-game regular-season winning streak, 27-game home winning streak and 54-game goalscoring streak all snapped with a 6-0 loss to No. 1 North Carolina on the first day of the 17th annual Inn at Saint Mary's Classic before a boisterous overflow crowd of 3,007 fans in the first women's soccer match played at the brand-new, state-of-the-art Alumni Stadium.

It was the first time Notre Dame was blanked since the 2007 season opener (a 0-0 tie vs. Michigan at old Alumni Field), and the first regularseason loss for the Fighting Irish since Sept. 30, 2007, when they dropped a 2-1 decision to 14th-ranked Penn State, also at Alumni Field (the most recent home defeat for Notre Dame before the UNC setback).

Jessica McDonald had two goals and an assist, while Casey Nogueira added a goal and an assist for North Carolina (4-0-0). UNC finished with a 19-15 shot advantage in the game, although Notre Dame outshot the Tar Heels, 13-7 in the second half. UNC also earned an 11-4 spread in shots on goal, a 6-3 edge in corner kicks and a 16-9 margin in fouls.

Kelsey Lysander made four saves in the first half for Notre Dame, while Nikki Weiss did not record a save in the final 45 minutes. Ashlyn Harris got the victory in the North Carolina goal, working the first 70:42 and making four saves, before giving way to Hannah Daly, who did not make a save in the last 19:18 of the contest.

Courtney Jones opened the Carolina scoring 23 seconds into the match, heading home a left-wing cross from Tobin Heath. The Tar Heels made it 2-0 exactly six minutes later, when Noqueira picked off an errant clearing attempt in the left channel and swung a cross into the area that McDonald finished with a hard low shot inside the right post.

Notre Dame (2-1-0) got its first good opportunity at the 32:15 mark when Rose Augustin hit Michele Weissenhofer over the top, but Weissenhofer's first touch from just outside the area was a bit heavy and Harris was able to gobble up the loose ball.

After the Fighting Irish defense held steady on a three-shot Carolina flurry in the six-yard box just past the quarter-hour, the Tar Heels added their third tally at 19:18 of the first half, when Nikki Washington raced down the right flank on an overlapping run before serving a pass though the box that Meghan Klingenberg ran on to and converted from short range.

North Carolina capped the first half scoring in the 37th minute, when substitute Brittani Bartok outran the Notre Dame defense to corral a lofted ball 20 yards out, then chipped the ball over a charging Lysander.

Nogueira and McDonald closed out the match scoring with second-half tallies, the first coming at 49:02 when Nogueira gathered a loose ball at the top left of the box, turned and drilled a low left-footed shot inside the right post. McDonald's second goal of the night came less than six minutes later, as a North Carolina corner kick pinballed around the area and a subsequent shot from the top of the box was blocked, but caromed to an unmarked McDonald in the goal mouth, who scored from 10 yards away.

GAME #4 — Sept. 6, 2009 Inn at Saint Mary's Soccer Classic #2/4 Notre Dame 3, Wisconsin-Milwaukee 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Melissa Henderson scored twice in the first 14 minutes, and Lauren **Fowlkes** added a goal midway through the first half, as No. 2/4 Notre Dame rebounded from its first loss of the season with a 3-0 victory over visiting Wisconsin-Milwaukee at Alumni Stadium in the final match of the 17th annual Inn at Saint Mary's Soccer Classic.

Tereza Stastny set up both of Henderson's early goals, earning the rookie the first points of her college career. Rose Augustin was credited with the helper on Fowlkes' goal, thanks to a pinpoint corner kick, marking the second time in four matches that the pair connected on a service from the corner flag.

Notre Dame (3-1-0) finished with a 14-8 shot advantage in the contest, including a 5-4 edge in shots on goal. The Panthers (2-2-2) earned four of the five corner kicks on the afternoon, but as it turned out, the Fighting Irish only needed their one try to find pay dirt.

Nikki Weiss made the most of her fourth career start — and first since the 2007 season — working the first 75-plus minutes and registering one save. Maddie Fox made her college debut in the final guarter-hour and was tested in her brief appearance, but answered the call with a pair of big saves to preserve Notre Dame's third shutout in four matches.

After seeing its 54-game goalscoring streak (one shy of the school record) end with its loss to UNC less than 48 hours earlier, Notre Dame wasted little time in starting a new string, as Henderson found the back of the net 4:30 into the game. Michelle Weissenhofer started the sequence with a through-ball to Stastny in the left channel. The rookie drew a defender towards her at the top of the penalty area, then slid a ball to the far side of the box, where Henderson was unmarked and needed just one dribble before beating Milwaukee's charging goalkeeper Jamie Forbes from 10 yards out.

The two Fighting Irish frontliners connected again a little more than nine minutes later. This time, it was a superb piece of footwork by Stastny, who outran a UWM defender to the ball on the left side and toe-poked a pass to Henderson, who was making an angled run back towards the point of attack. Henderson settled the ball near the penalty spot, then turned over her right shoulder and drilled a low left-footed shot past a diving Forbes and inside the right post at the 13:41 mark.

Fowlkes capped Notre Dame's first-half uprising less than 10 minutes later, going airborne at the edge of the six-yard box to beat Forbes with a header off Augustin's corner kick.

GAME #5 — **Sept. 11, 2009** Santa Clara/adidas Classic Santa Clara 2, #5/7 Notre Dame 0 **Buck Shaw Stadium (Santa Clara, Calif.)**

No. 5/7 Notre Dame saw its school-record 15-game road unbeaten streak come to an end with a 2-0 loss at Santa Clara on the first night of the SCU/ adidas Classic at Buck Shaw Stadium. It was the first time the Irish lost on an opponent's home pitch since Sept. 7, 2007, when the same Santa Clara squad defeated Notre Dame, 7-1, in the same tournament at the same facility.



The Broncos ended up with a 10-8 shot advantage on the Irish, including a slim 5-4 edge in shots on goal. SCU's biggest margin of the night came from the corner flag, where the hosts rang up a staggering 10-2 spread on corner kicks.

Nikki Weiss and **Kelsey Lysander** each played a half in the Notre Dame net, with Weiss making one save in the opening 45 minutes and Lysander turning aside two shots in the second stanza.

Bianca Henninger earned the shutout in the Santa Clara goal, recording three saves, including a pair of big first-half stops early in a then-scoreless contest.

The Broncos broke the ice just past the midway point of the first half. After earning a free kick at the edge of the offensive third, Kiki Bosio took a quick restart and found Jordan Angeli unmarked in the right channel 25 yards from goal. The sixth-year senior then uncorked a rising blast that eluded Weiss and tucked under the cross bar to give SCU the lead at 23:52.

The Broncos then scored the critical second goal at 62:06 with an efficient counterattack after Notre Dame earned a free kick deep in its offensive third. SCU's Kendra Perry took the ball down the left channel, then sent a ball back across the face of goal. Lauren Matheson was parked on the back porch, where she settled the cross and drilled a low 12-yard shot that beat Lysander inside the left post.

The Irish had one of their best chances of the night just 35 seconds after the second Santa Clara goal, as **Melissa Henderson** fed a perfect throughball to **Tereza Stastny**, who broke into the area for a 1-v-1. However, Henninger charged off her line and was able to get a piece of Stastny's right toe poke to keep Notre Dame off the board.

GAME #6 — Sept. 13, 2009 Santa Clara/adidas Classic #3/2 Stanford 2, #5/7 Notre Dame 0 Buck Shaw Stadium (Santa Clara, Calif.)

Despite several good scoring opportunities for Notre Dame in both halves, a pair of Stanford goals less than three minutes apart early in the second half proved to be enough, as the No. 5/7 Fighting Irish fell to the No. 3/2-ranked Cardinal, 2-0, in second-day action at the Santa Clara/adidas Classic.

In a rematch of the 2008 NCAA national semifinal contest (won by Notre Dame, 1-0 in Cary, N.C.), the Fighting Irish battled emotionally-charged Stanford toe-to-toe during the first 45 minutes and even had the better end of play in the opening stages of the second half. However, the Cardinal's Mariah Nogueira nodded in a free kick (55:13), and Christen Press converted a deflected shot with a goal from close range at 57:58 to send Notre Dame to a rare second consecutive loss.

Stanford (7–0–0) finished with a 16–7 edge in total shots, including a 6–2 margin in shots on goal. The teams also each earned three corner kicks in the match.

Kelsey Lysander went the distance between the pipes for Notre Dame, making four saves, all in the second half. Kira Maker recorded the shutout in goal for Stanford, turning aside two shots.

Following a back-and-forth first half that ended scoreless, the Cardinal stepped up their attack, first testing Lysander with a pair of probing shots from distance by Press and Kelley O'Hara. Stanford then got on the board at the 55:13 mark, as Lindsay Taylor was fouled when she tried to split two Fighting Irish defenders outside the right edge of the box. Teresa Noyola teed up the ensuing free kick, with Nogueira slicing between defenders and rising for a crisply-struck header from eight yards out into the right sidenetting.

The second Stanford goal was especially frustrating, as it appeared Notre Dame had successfully defended O'Hara's left flank attack. However, the Cardinal forward's well-covered shot from distance deflected off a Fighting Irish defender and ricocheted directly to the waiting feet of a crashing Press (the only Stanford player still in the play), who beat Lysander low from point-blank range at 57:58. Taylor was credited with a secondary assist on the play, thanks to a free kick from the midfield stripe that started O'Hara's initial run.

GAME #7 — Sept. 18, 2009 #14/13 Notre Dame 4, DePaul 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Rose Augustin scored a pair of goals and **Taylor Knaack** dished out two assists, as No. 14/13 Notre Dame rolled to a 4-0 victory over DePaul in the BIG EAST Conference opener for both teams before a crowd of 1,605 fans at Alumni Stadium.

Lauren Fowlkes got the Fighting Irish on the board in the 17th minute, while **Melissa Henderson** capped the scoring with her team-leading fifth goal of the season with two minutes to play. With the win, Notre Dame extended its unbeaten streak against BIG EAST opponents to 53 consecutive games (51–0–2), dating back to September 2005.

Kelsey Lysander got the start in the Fighting Irish net and went the first 77 minutes, making three saves. **Maddie Fox** came off the bench in the final quarter-hour and was not called upon to make a save, as Notre Dame collected its fourth shutout of the season. DePaul rookie netminder Claire Hanold went the distance in goal, making four saves.

After a rare two-game scoreless streak, Notre Dame wasted little time in cranking up the offensive muscle in its BIG EAST lidlifter, winning three corners in the opening 15 minutes. Although all three tries were cleared away by DePaul, the Blue Demons' backline was clearly taking heavy fire and eventually it led to the first goal of the night.

Molly Campbell started the sequence by knocking down an attempted DePaul clearance and cracking a shot from the top of the penalty area that rang hard off the crossbar. The ball caromed right to Knaack about 10 yards out on the right side of the box, and her flick header back into the goal mouth landed right at Fowlkes' feet, and the versatile frontliner made no mistake, flushing home her third goal of the season from point blank range at 16:40.

The turning point in the contest came inside the final 90 seconds of the first half. **Jessica Schuveiller** latched on to a ball near the midfield stripe and quickly went over the top, finding a gap between the DePaul backline and a late-charging Hanold. Augustin won the footrace with the Blue Demons' goalkeeper and used a sharp right-footed poke to chip the helpless netminder for a 2-0 Notre Dame lead with 1:20 left in the half.

Notre Dame put the game on ice in the final quarter-hour, starting with a brilliant individual effort from Knaack. The scrappy forward won a ball in front of the DePaul bench in her own end on the left sideline, then raced 40 yards downfield before squaring off a pass to a trailing Augustin. The Fighting Irish midfielder took one angled touch towards the center of the field and then let loose with a dipping shot that curled back into the far left corner for her second goal of the night.

The final score of the evening featured superb teamwork, as Henderson pried loose a ball in the left channel and served a strong through-ball to **Rachel VanderGenugten**, who charged to the edge of the penalty area and cut back on her defender to open up space. VanderGenugten then unleashed a wicked rising ball that was destined for the far upper right corner of the net, only to be denied by the woodwork. However, the ball caromed directly to Henderson, who had smartly crashed the goal mouth and fired the rebound into an empty net with exactly two minutes left.

GAME #8 — Sept. 20, 2009 #14/13 Notre Dame 2, Northwestern 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Courtney Barg and **Julie Scheidler** each scored their first goal of the season — Scheidler's being the first of her college career — as No. 14/13 Notre Dame registered its second consecutive shutout with a 2-0 victory over Northwestern in the regular season non-conference finale for the Fighting Irish at Alumni Stadium.

Barg found the back of the net with an unassisted tally just 6:24 into the contest, and Scheidler nearly duplicated her teammate's feat in the second half, striking pay dirt a mere 4:38 after halftime. **Lauren Fowlkes** earned the assist on Scheidler's goal, giving her at least one point in four of Notre Dame's six home matches to date in 2009.

Kelsey Lysander paired with a stout Fighting Irish back line to pitch her second solo shutout of the season, and the team's fifth clean sheet in eight matches. Lysander made two saves on the afternoon, in addition to one team save for Notre Dame. Northwestern netminder Carolyn Edwards collected five saves in the match

Barg's early goal was the result of strong pressure off the opening kickoff by the Fighting Irish, who earned a corner kick less than a minute into the match. The scoring sequence actually began as Northwestern attempted to clear its defensive zone, but Fowlkes kept the play alive in the left channel with a toe-poke to Barg 35 yards from goal. The second-year Notre Dame midfielder pushed towards the center of the pitch, and seeing no defender stepping up to challenge her, kept driving ahead before ripping a rising 25-yard strike that beat a leaping Edwards and caught the underside of the crossbar before settling in the net.

Northwestern nearly tied the score in the opening minute of the second half, as Jennifer Baumann's header beat Lysander and was ticketed for the upper right corner. However, **Jessica Schuveiller** saved the day, heading the ball off the goal line and keeping the Fighting Irish in front.

The importance of Schuveiller's play was magnified moments later on the Notre Dame counterattack. Scheidler and Fowlkes worked a pretty-give-and-go sequence, with Fowlkes receiving the initial pass in the right channel and shooting a return to Scheidler on an overlapping run down the flank. The Indianapolis native angled her run toward the edge of the penalty area, then noticed Edwards hugging the near post and lofted a perfectly-placed shot that looped over the Northwestern `keeper's hands and settled into the far left side netting (49:38).

GAME #9 — Sept. 25, 2009 #14/12 Notre Dame 2, Cincinnati 1 Gettler Stadium (Cincinnati, Ohio)

Jessica Schuveiller scored her first goal of the season, and the second of her career, with 8:08 remaining to propel No. 14/12 Notre Dame past Cincinnati, 2-1, in BIG EAST play on a damp night at Gettler Stadium in Cincinnati.

It was the 400th combined win for Notre Dame head coach **Randy Waldrum** (counting his stints with both men's and women's college teams covering 28 seasons), and what's more, it was a welcome gift for the Fighting Irish mentor, who was celebrating his 53rd birthday.

After Cincinnati took the lead in the 76th minute, **Lauren Fowlkes** scored her fourth goal of the season just 78 seconds later, converting a **Rose Augustin** free kick. Augustin also had an (uncredited) assist on the gamewinning goal four minutes later, as her left-side blast was saved by Bearcat goalkeeper Andrea Kaminski, but the rebound squirted out to Schuveiller at the top of the box, and the second-year Notre Dame back made no mistake

The Fighting Irish (6-3, 2-0 BIG EAST) held huge advantages in all offensive statistical categories, outshooting Cincinnati, 24-4 on the night, including a sizeable 15-2 spread in shots on goal. Notre Dame also earned six of the seven corner kicks awarded in the match, while the Bearcats were whistled for 20 of the 28 fouls called, but the Fighting Irish were assessed two of the three yellow cards issued.



Kelsey Lysander made one save on the way to her fifth victory of the season. Kaminski almost singlehandedly kept UC in the contest, registering a Notre Dame opponent season-high 13 saves, including several point-blank

UC's first substitution came with 16:15 to play, and it turned out to be a timely insertion, as Emily Hebbeler came off the Bearcat bench. Just two minutes after entering, Hebbeler ran on to a left-side chip at the top of the box and quickly lofted a shot past a charging Lysander at the 75:56 mark. It was Cincinnati's first shot of the second half and its first shot on goal all night.

With the crowd still buzzing over the Bearcat goal, Notre Dame went to work, pressing down the right flank before earning a free kick 40 yards out. Augustin played a perfectly-weighted ball that landed precisely at the feet of Fowlkes, who was unmarked in the six-yard box. The Fighting Irish attacker wasted no time in hammering a low shot past Kaminski into the left-side netting at 77:14.

That set the stage for Schuveiller's heroics and Notre Dame's first comefrom-behind win of the season.

GAME #10 — Sept. 27, 2009 #14/12 Notre Dame 1, Louisville 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

A pair of former high school teammates at St. Teresa's Academy in Kansas City helped No. 14/12 Notre Dame earn a place in the NCAA record book, as **Lauren Fowlkes** nodded home a cross from **Molly Campbell** less than five minutes into the second half, lifting the Fighting Irish to a 1-0 BIG EAST victory over Louisville before 2,002 fans at Alumni Stadium. The win stretched Notre Dame's unbeaten streak against conference opponents to 55 consecutive matches (53-0-2), tying the Division I record first set by North Carolina during Atlantic Coast Conference play from 1994-2000.

Fowlkes' goal — her fifth of the season and third in four matches was the breakthrough Notre Dame needed on a day where the Fighting Irish created numerous scoring opportunities, only to see those chances dissolve on the doorstep. Notre Dame outshot the Cardinals, 18-6, on the afternoon, owning a 6-1 edge in shots on goal. The Fighting Irish also held a 7-5 advantage in corner kicks, while fouls were virtually even in the contest (Louisville 8-7).

Kelsey Lysander earned the shutout in the Notre Dame net, going the distance and making one critical second-half save for her third solo clean sheet of the season (to go along with two shared shutouts). Meanwhile, for the second consecutive match, the Fighting Irish ran up against a red-hot goalkeeper, as Louisville freshman netminder Taylor Vancil made five saves, including three exceptional point-blank stops in the first half.

The Fighting Irish (7-3, 3-0 BIG EAST) wasted little time in turning up the heat on the Cardinals, as **Taylor Knaack** got loose on the right flank in the third minute, before delivering a crisp lead pass to **Melissa Henderson** in the channel. Henderson cut back at the edge of the six-yard box and played a ball across the goalmouth for Rose Augustin, but Augustin's left-footed shot was turned aside by a diving Vancil.

After taking that scare to the locker room, Notre Dame returned for the second half with renewed intensity and it paid off. Knaack started the scoring sequence with a run into the left corner before lofting a ball that carried all the way across the face of goal to the opposite edge of the penalty area, where Henderson tracked it down and kept the play going with a nifty rightfooted toe-poke on the touch line. Trailing the play, Campbell ran on to Henderson's pass just inside the top of the box, then curled a right-footed cross into the slot, where Fowlkes was waiting with a clinical finish, heading the ball into the right sidenetting (49:37).

Taylor Knaack scored her first goal of the season on a goalmouth scramble 41 seconds into overtime, giving No. 10/8 Notre Dame a thrilling and historic 3-2 BIG EAST win at West Virginia before a crowd of 1,382 fans on a rainy night at Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium in Morgantown, W.Va.

The victory extends the Fighting Irish unbeaten streak against BIG EAST opponents to 56 consecutive games (54-0-2), breaking North Carolina's Division I record set during Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC) play from 1994-2000. Notre Dame began the streak exactly four years earlier on Oct. 2, 2005, with a 4-0 victory at South Florida.

Melissa Henderson and Haley Ford also scored for Notre Dame, while Rose Augustin collected her team-high fourth assist of the season on Henderson's tally, and had uncredited assists to set up her team's other two goals.

Kelsey Lysander picked up the victory in the Fighting Irish net, tying her season high with four saves, while Kerri Butler turned aside three shots in goal for the Mountaineers. Notre Dame ended up outshooting West Virginia. 13-11, while shots on goal were even at six apiece. There were only three corner kicks in the contest, with the host Mountaineers earning two

It didn't take long for the visitors to get on the scoreboard (and for the wet conditions to come into play), as Lauren Fowlkes played a ball from her half of the field over the top for Henderson in the middle of the offensive third. Henderson settled the ball and ran a textbook give-and-go with Augustin in the left channel, with Henderson firing a wobbly 12-yard shot that handcuffed Butler, squirting through her hands and into the left-side netting iust 4:24 into the contest

WVU's Carolyn Blank began the sequence that tied the score late in the first half, firing a wicked 35-yard left-footed shot that kept rising and rang hard off the crossbar. The ball caromed to the left side of the penalty area, where Chelsey Corroto guickly headed it back through the six-yard box. Megan Mischler was crashing the play and just beat Lysander to the ball with a sliding right-footed shot inside the right post.

Capitalizing on the momentum from its late first-half score, West Virginia cashed in with a second goal early in the second stanza. The play began innocently enough, as Blake Miller started a run down the right flank. She then cut back into the channel and drilled a low left-footed shot from 25 yards out towards the right post. Lysander appeared to be tracking the shot all the way, but as she moved over to make the save, her right foot slipped out from under her on the wet turf and the ball skipped past her and just inside the post at 48:51.

With the WVU fans working into a frenzy, Notre Dame never wavered and methodically built its way back up towards the tying goal. That score came at 64:11, and it started with Augustin's free kick from just inside the center circle on the offensive side of the field. Her long service pulled Butler into the gathering crowd just outside the six-yard box, but the Mountaineer netminder's clearing punch popped almost straight up in the air. Ford was in the right place at the right time and rose high to head the ball inside the untended far left post, knotting the score at 2-2.

As it turned out, the extra session barely lasted long enough for fans to return from the concession stands and restrooms. The Fighting Irish took the opening kickoff and worked the ball down into the left corner for a throw-in. Augustin took a short throw to Molly Campbell, who teed up a bending ball into the area. Fowlkes cut across the face of goal, possibly distracting Butler, who came diving out to play the ball, but only managed to redirect it towards the far right post. Knaack and her defender went stride for stride for the ball at the right edge of the six-yard box, with Knaack just winning the race as the ball caromed off the inside of the post. She needed two pokes with her right foot, but Knaack was able to muscle the ball over the goal line for what is believed to be the quickest OT score in program history, securing the second consecutive comeback victory on the road for the Fighting Irish.

Despite a season-high 25 shots, including eight on goal, and with a stout defense that allowed just three total shots after halftime (none on frame), No. 10/8 Notre Dame wound up finishing in a 0-0 double-overtime tie at Pittsburgh in BIG EAST action on an overcast afternoon at a muddy Founders Field in Indianola Pa

The scoreless draw was just the eighth in the 22-year history of the Fighting Irish women's soccer program, and the first since Aug. 31, 2007, when Notre Dame posted similar shot totals (and ultimately a similar result) against Michigan in its season opener at old Alumni Field. Nevertheless, the Fighting Irish moved their NCAA-record unbeaten streak against conference opponents to 57 games (54-0-3).

Nikki Weiss got the starting nod in the Notre Dame net, making a career-high four saves to record her first career solo shutout, while her opposite number, Pittsburgh's Allison Finch stopped eight shots for the hosts, who settled into a defensive posture for much of the afternoon.

The Fighting Irish outshot the Panthers, 25-7 in the contest (15-2 after halftime), including the 8-4 edge in shots on goal (6-0 after halftime). Pittsburgh earned a slim 5-4 advantage in corner kicks, while Notre Dame was whistled for 15 fouls to nine for the Panthers.

After an early acclimation period for both teams, Notre Dame (8-3-1, 4-0-1 BIG EAST) got the first good look of the day at 12:41, as Lauren Fowlkes worked down the left flank, then served a ball across the box, where **Amanda Clark** tried a lunging right toe poke toward the back post that was tipped away with a diving full-extension save by Finch.

Pittsburgh (6-2-4, 1-0-4) got its best look of the first half with 15:29 to go in the period after being fouled 22 yards out on the left flank. Laura Berbert took the ensuing free kick, but it sailed directly into the waiting arms of Weiss.

Play remained in the middle third of the field for the early portion of the second half. Notre Dame broke the stalemate with a pair of good chances, the first with 25 minutes left coming when Rose Augustin sprang Melissa **Henderson** down the right channel. Henderson knifed back against the grain at the edge of the box and slipped a cross to the far left side, where Molly Campbell cracked a 12-yard blast that Finch did extremely well to parry over the crossbar.

Moments later, Campbell herself dodged traffic down the right flank and cut back inside, but her left-footed shot from 20 yards away drifted high and wide of the left post

Henderson created two more chances, first with 17 minutes left when she hit an overlapping Fowlkes on the right side, and she in turn crossed to Augustin on the left side of the penalty area, but Augustin didn't get all of her 15-yard shot and Finch gobbled up the loose ball.

The game's most disputed play came at the 75-minute mark, when Henderson got free behind the Pittsburgh defense and raced into the right side of the box, only to have her legs taken out by the trailing Panther defender for an apparent penalty kick. However, the foul was not called and the teams would eventually settle for the scoreless draw.

Notre Dame's best early chances came in the final five minutes of the first half, beginning with **Rose Augustin** unleashing one of her trademark long-range torpedoes from outside of the top of the box that Guthrie snared. The Fighting Irish kept up the pressure in the 41st minute, as Fowlkes fed **Melissa Henderson**, who dribbled through three Rutgers defenders and took a low shot, but Guthrie was equal to the task. Moments later, Henderson had another attempt from in close saved by Guthrie.

Following a tense second half that saw both sides play to a near stalemate in the midfield, RU's Julie Lancos almost ended the deadlock in the 82nd minute when she sent a free kick swerving in on Weiss, who did well to deflect the shot around the near post. Weiss then made a save after the ensuing corner kick to keep the game scoreless — but not for long.

After Weiss' goal kick, the Fighting Irish were able to push forward with possession, eventually working the ball to **Jazmin Hall** on an overlapping run down the left flank. Hall then deftly served a chip into the Rutgers box, with Fowlkes running under the ball and delivering a flying volley into the top corner of the net for the decisive strike at 83:55. The assist marked Hall's first career point at Notre Dame.

No. 8/9 Notre Dame rode goals from **Melissa Henderson** and **Taylor Knaack** to complete a weekend sweep in the Garden State, defeating Seton Hall, 2-0 at Owen T. Carroll Field in South Orange, N.J. The Fighting Irish dominated possession and also got a third consecutive shutout from **Nikki Weiss** on the way to recording their 10th win of the season.

With the victory, Notre Dame improved to 10-3-1 (6-0-1 BIG EAST) and moved their NCAA-record unbeaten streak against conference opponents to 59 games (56-0-3). Notre Dame also extended its conference road unbeaten streak to 26 games (23-0-3). Seton Hall fell to 4-9-1 (0-6-1 BIG EAST) on the year.

The Fighting Irish finished the game with a 19-2 advantage in shots, including a 10-0 advantage in shots on goal. Notre Dame also earned seven corner kicks to Seton Hall's two. SHU goalkeeper Jennifer Pettigrew finished with eight saves, while Weiss pushed her scoreless streak to an impressive 311:08, dating back to Notre Dame's game at Santa Clara on September 11.

The Fighting Irish got off to a fast start and generated the game's first scoring chance in the fifth minute when **Lauren Fowlkes** directed a **Rose Augustin** corner kick toward the Seton Hall net, but the Pirate defense blocked the shot.

However, Notre Dame's pressure was rewarded just past the midpoint of the first half, as **Jessica Schuveiller** blasted a shot from 20 yards out that Pettigrew stopped but couldn't contain. A lurking Henderson was on the doorstep and deposited the rebound into the vacant net for her team-best seventh goal of the season and a 1-0 lead at 22:51. Schuveiller earned her second assist of the season on the play.

Tereza Stastny almost scored the key insurance goal that the Fighting Irish were searching for in the 74th minute when she sent a drive from the right side that curled just wide of the far post.

Then, at 85:13, Notre Dame found the two-goal lead it was searching for.

Fowlkes received a pass in the box and one-touched it to Henderson, who nudged it to a streaking Knaack on the far side of the box. Knaack received the pass in stride and slid her shot past Pettigrew, just inside the near post for her second goal of the season.

Taylor Knaack turned in a career-high five-point night with two goals and an assist, while her junior classmates **Rose Augustin** and **Erica lantorno** also scored two goals apiece, as No. 7/8 Notre Dame rang up its biggest win of season, toppling BIG EAST rival Connecticut, 6-1, on a crisp Friday evening before a crowd of 1,343 fans at Alumni Stadium.

With the victory, the Fighting Irish extended their active unbeaten streak to nine games (8-0-1), while also stretching their NCAA Division I-record unbeaten streak against conference opponents to 60 games (57-0-3) over the course of more than four seasons.

Knaack actually had a hand in the first four goals of the evening for Notre Dame, as she was fouled midway through the first half to set up the first of Augustin's two free kick scores on the night. Knaack also came within an eyelash of a hat trick, as the speedy Texan saw her second-half blast from distance carom off the crossbar and the back of UConn goalkeeper Jessica Dulski, but the ball was ruled not to have crossed the goal line before it was swept away by the Huskies' defense.

Nikki Weiss made her fourth consecutive start for Notre Dame, recording three saves in 82 minutes of action. **Maddie Fox** then came on to work the final eight minutes for the Fighting Irish, and was not tested in that time. Dulski had two saves in 58 minutes for Connecticut, while Ally Mancino had three stops in the closing 32 minutes for the Huskies — both UConn goalkeepers allowed three goals.

It didn't take long for Notre Dame to heat up, even with the game-time temperatures hovering around the 40-degree mark. Knaack did the honors, settling a chip at the top of the penalty area, and turning for a quick shot that was blocked. However, the rebound caromed right back to Knaack's feet, and the third-year Fighting Irish frontliner reloaded the gun with a rising right-footed shot that may have just scraped some paint off the underside of the crossbar as it settled into the roof of the net at 10:34.

Knaack was the in thick of things again just past the midpoint of the opening half, getting loose on a run down the right channel before she was hauled down 23 yards from goal. Augustin then stepped up and calmly drilled a right-footed free kick that cleanly eluded the Connecticut defensive wall and also caught a piece of the crossbar before ricocheting into the goal at 23:51 for a 2-0 Notre Dame lead.

After creating the opportunity for the second Fighting Irish score, Knaack was "Jenny on the spot" for the third goal less than eight minutes later. **Courtney Barg** started the sequence by cutting into the offensive third and driving a dipping cross from the left flank that handcuffed Dulski. The loose ball skittered to the right edge of the six-yard box, where Knaack was waiting to emphatically slam home her second goal of the night at 31:20, once again going high into the attic for the score.

Knaack then delivered a helping hand — or foot — on the fourth Fighting Irish goal, slipping a perfectly-timed through-ball down the right side to lantorno, who made a nifty play of her own to track down the pass near the end line at the edge of the penalty area. She then cut back on her defender to create a better shooting angle and cracked a bending left-footed shot that curled into the far left side netting (65:18), out of the reach of Mancino, who had come into the game just seven minutes earlier.

The Huskies avoided the shutout 59 seconds after Notre Dame went ahead, 4-0, as Linda Ruutu collected a loose ball near the top right corner of the box, angled towards the center of the field and then uncorked a hard low shot that beat Weiss to the far left post.

The Fighting Irish then closed the door on any Connecticut comeback with two goals in a span of 1:09 inside the final quarter-hour. Augustin

netted her second free kick goal at 79:17, as her shot bounced through traffic at the edge of the six-yard box and skipped past Mancino, who was distracted on the play by a brilliant dummy run from **Michele Weissenhofer**.

Then, at 80:26, Weissenhofer broke loose down the right flank, pivoted at the end line and sent a pass back to lantorno, who was camped at the top of the 18'. lantorno then went short side to beat Mancino, ripping her right-footed shot high into the upper right corner of the net.

Taylor Knaack continued her offensive explosion with an early first-half goal and **Amanda Clark** added her first score of the year less than 10 minutes later, as No. 7/8 Notre Dame posted an efficient 2-0 BIG EAST win over Providence on a sunny afternoon in front of 1,526 fans at Alumni Stadium.

With the victory, the Fighting Irish stayed unbeaten in their last 10 outings (9-0-1) and lengthened their NCAA-record unbeaten streak against conference opponents to 61 games (58-0-3).

One player who was especially dialed-in during this late-season run was Knaack, who scored her fifth goal of the year and capped off a seven-point weekend (three goals, one assist) with the gamewinning score against Providence. The goal came at 16:56 of the first half, starting with a left-side flip throw by **Michele Weissenhofer** which was headed around by several players at the top of the penlty area. The ball eventually caromed out to the right edge of the box, where Knaack made a cheeky 1-v-1 move to wriggle free of her defender and then uncorked a blistering right-footed drive into the far left-side netting past Providence goalkeeper Jill Schott.

Notre Dame (12–3–1, 8-0–1 BIG EAST) wasn't satisfied with a one-goal lead and doubled the margin at 26:25. After a failed Friars' defensive clearance, **Courtney Barg** tracked down the ball in the middle of the offensive third and smartly chipped the PC backline. Clark timed her run perfectly and settled the pass before drilling a low right-footed shot inside the right post as Schott charged off her line in vain.

That proved to be all the Fighting Irish would need, as they outshot Providence, 22-8, including a 9-3 edge in shots on frame. **Nikki Weiss** went the distance in the Notre Dame goal and picked up the shutout on the back of three saves, while Schott was credited with seven saves while tending the Friars' net.

Melissa Henderson returned from a two-game injury hiatus with a second-half goal and **Erica lantorno** added an insurance tally with less than 20 minutes to play, lifting No. 6/7 Notre Dame to a 2-0 BIG EAST win over Villanova before a crowd of 1,103 fans at a rainy and wind-swept Alumni Stadium.

The win clinched Notre Dame's fifth consecutive BIG EAST National Division title, as well as its 12th BIG EAST regular-season crown in 15 seasons as a conference member (eight of the 12 are divisional championships, while the other four were overall regular-season titles).

Rose Augustin registered her team-leading fifth assist of the season on Henderson's goal, while **Julie Scheidler** earned her second assist of the campaign, setting up lantorno's marker.

Nikki Weiss continued her solid play between the pipes down the stretch, making five saves to collect her fifth solo shutout of the season. Weiss also got some support from her back line, which cleared a pair of Villanova shots off the goal line in the second half to help Notre Dame notch its 11th clean sheet of the year, and eighth in 11 games.

Henderson came off the bench midway through the first half and wound up making her presence felt in the final five minutes of the period. Her best look came on an overlapping run down the right flank, when she pivoted just before the end line and sent a cross through the goal mouth, where **Lauren Fowlkes** found herself unmarked at the back post. However, her left-footed shot from eight yards away was denied on a brilliant reflex save by VU netminder Molly Williams.

After a stalemate in the first half, Augustin started the sequence that got Notre Dame on the board by settling a ball at the edge of the offensive third, then slipping a through-ball to Henderson racing into the penalty area. The second-year Fighting Irish striker took one touch and blasted a left-footed shot from 10 yards out past Williams and into the far right side-netting at 53:20 for her team-leading eighth goal of the year.

Not content with a one-goal lead, Notre Dame kept Villanova on its heels, squeezing off five more shots in the ensuing 10 minutes, including a pair on frame that Williams did well to stop. The Wildcats did manage a blocked shot and corner kick to alleviate some of the stress on their goalkeeper, but ultimately it wasn't enough to prevent another score.

Michele Weissenhofer sent a service from the left side that Fowlkes rang hard off the crossbar before collecting the rebound and shoveling it out to Scheidler steaming down the right side. The Fighting Irish defender cut smartly towards the edge of the box, then delivered a sharp cross of her own that homed in on lantorno at the near post, and she made no mistake with a snap header low into the right corner of the net (70:40).

On a night dedicated to celebrating the accomplishments of Notre Dame's senior class, it was the Fighting Irish juniors who delivered the best present of all, as **Taylor Knaack** and **Lauren Fowlkes** scored in the first 15 minutes of each half to help No. 6/7 Notre Dame power past No. RV/22 Georgetown, 2-0 in the BIG EAST regular season finale for both teams before a crowd of 1,789 fans at Alumni Stadium and a Fox Soccer Channel national television audience.

The result helped Notre Dame extend its winning streak to a season-high six games, while also lengthening its current unbeaten streak to 12 games (11-0-1) and its NCAA Division I-record unbeaten string vs. conference opponents to 63 games (60-0-3). What's more, the Fighting Irish put the cap on their seventh consecutive BIG EAST regular season divisional title and 12th overall, dating back to the program's move into the BIG EAST in 1995.

Two other juniors — **Julie Scheidler** and **Rose Augustin** each carded their second assist of the weekend with helpers on the goals against Georgetown. Not to be outdone, **Amanda Clark** represented the departing veterans in the points column, earning the primary assist on Knaack's gamewinner early in the first half.

Yet another junior sparked the Fighting Irish defense, as **Nikki Weiss** started and did not record a save during the opening 45 minutes while earning the victory in the nets. Senior **Kelsey Lysander** came on to begin the second half and make one save to help preserve Notre Dame's 12th shutout of the season and sixth in seven games.

It took a few minutes for both teams to get going, but the Fighting Irish were the first to find their footing. Scheidler started the opening goal sequence with a solid run down the right flank before curling a cross into the box. Clark cut smartly in front of her defender at the penalty spot and flicked a header toward the back post, where Knaack found herself unmarked and was able to slot the ball past GU's charging goalkeeper Elizabeth Hanna into the low right corner of the net for her sixth goal of the year, all in the past eight games (10:38).

Perhaps the play of the game (and maybe the season) came with 9:58 left in the first half, as **Melissa Henderson** ran down a lead pass in the far left corner. Seemingly penned in by her defender at the end line, Henderson cut back away from her mark towards the top of the 18', split two more defenders at the corner of the box, then dribbled by a fourth Georgetown sentry in the area before being hauled down and earning Notre Dame's first (and only) penalty kick of the season. Yet, after all that work, Henderson came up empty on the PK attempt, leaving the margin at 1-0 heading to the locker room.

Then, in lightning-quick fashion, Notre Dame got the all-important second goal with a brilliant counterattack. Augustin tracked down a ball on the right flank and drove to the end line before cracking a pinpoint service through the area. Fowlkes was unmarked at the edge of the six-yard box and, with Hanna out of position trying in vain to snare the cross, Fowlkes simply snapped a header into the vacant net for her seventh goal of the season (58:56).

Henderson did all her damage in the first 28:03 of the game, converting all three of her shots on goal in the contest while carving up a Bulls' defense that had allowed three goals in a game once all season.

It also was just the 10th postseason hat trick in program history, and the first since Nov. 24, 2006, when **Michele Weissenhofer** had three goals in a 4-0 NCAA quarterfinal win over eighth-ranked Penn State at old Alumni Field

Ellen Jantsch netted her first goal of the season, and second of her career, in the 39th minute, as the Fighting Irish blitzed USF for all five of their scores in the opening 38:59 of play. In addition to Fowlkes' assist, **Julie Scheidler**, **Jazmin Hall** and **Rose Augustin** also picked up assists, while **Erica lantorno** had two uncredited assists, setting up Henderson's third goal and Jantsch's score.

All three Notre Dame goalkeepers saw action in the win, with neither **Nikki Weiss**, **Kelsey Lysander** nor **Maddie Fox** asked to make a save as the Fighting Irish recorded their 13th shutout of the season, and seventh in eight games.

USF starting netminder Mallori Lofton-Malachi went the first 33:43 in goal, making one save and allowing four goals before giving way to Gaby

Garton, who had four saves and one goal allowed during the remainder of the contest (the Bulls also were had a team save in the second half).

For the fourth time in five games, the Fighting Irish got on the scoreboard inside the first 20 minutes of action. Scheidler started the sequence by tracking down an errant USF clearing attempt in the right channel, then serving a bending ball into the area, where Henderson was camped out at the penalty spot. The preseason BIG EAST Offensive Player of the Year quickly settled the ball, turned and drilled a low shot past Lofton–Malachi at 10:12 of the first half.

With the crowd still buzzing from the early score, Notre Dame doubled its lead just five minutes later. This time, it was Fowlkes who set the table, gathering a loose ball at the top right corner of the box, and after contemplating a shot on goal, she curled a cross over the USF back line and found Henderson making an angled run from the left side of the area. Henderson swiftly raced onto the dipping ball and volleyed it past a perplexed Lofton-Malachi at 15:28.

Notre Dame continued to keep the ball in the offensive third and it paid dividends again in the 29th minute, as lantorno sent a cross from the right flank that Lofton-Malachi tried to gather on a short hop in the six-yard box. However, the USF goalkeeper bobbled the ball and Henderson was camped on the doorstep, gathering the garbage near at the left post and coolly dribbling past a prone Lofton-Malachi before dumping the ball into the empty net at 28:03 for her team-high 11th goal of the year.

As was the case on the first two Fighting Irish goals, the next two also came five minutes apart. After Henderson completed her hat trick, it was Fowlkes' turn to get into the scoring column with a little help from a rookie teammate. Hall had missed the previous four games (and all but 54 seconds of the fifth) with an injury, but just 36 seconds after making her return to action, she created a spark, knocking down a clearing pass in front of the Notre Dame bench and pushing forward down the left side before lofting a pretty left-footed cross into the area. Fowlkes went high over her defender to deliver a sharp header that eluded Lofton-Malachi and clanged off the underside of the crossbar before dropping just over the goal line at 33:43.

That would be all for the main actors in this BIG EAST quarterfinal, as Henderson and Lofton-Malachi headed to the bench. But Notre Dame still had one more card left to play, and it was again fueled by lantorno, who started the final scoring run with another right-side cross that just missed connecting with **Lindsay Brown** near the penalty spot. However, the ball squirted all the way through the box to the left end line, where Augustin tracked it down, nutmegged her defender with a brilliant 1-v-1 move and chipped a cross back into the goal mouth. This time, Jantsch got away from her mark and converted the pass with a crisp header from three yards out with 6:01 left in the first half

Schuveiller knifed through the center of the Red Storm penalty area and rose above the St. John's defense to head home a **Rose Augustin** corner kick at 98:42, propelling the Fighting Irish into the BIG EAST title match for the sixth consecutive season and 13th time in the program's 15-year conference membership.

Lauren Fowlkes scored early in the first half (8:34) to give Notre Dame a 1-0 lead, with the assist also going to Augustin, but the Red Storm answered with a second-half goal to send the game into overtime.

Nikki Weiss earned the win in the Fighting Irish goal, her eighth victory of the year between the pipes. Notre Dame dominated statistically all night, ending with a 26-5 advantage in shots, a 9-1 advantage in shots on net and a 4-2 advantage in corner kicks, but were stymied in part due to the play of Red Storm goalkeeper Kristin Russell, who finished with seven saves.

After taking a 1-0 lead to halftime, Notre Dame came close to adding to its lead on two occasions early in the second half. First, in the 55th minute, **Julie Scheidler** found space on the near side and hit a swerving drive that Russell saved. Then, off an Augustin corner kick in the 57th minute, Fowlkes sent her header just wide of the far post.

St. John's earned a its first corner kick of the match in the 69th minute and tied the game at 1–1 when Nicole Doran's header was deflected past Weiss for St. John's first goal in 12 series matches against the Fighting Irish. Courtney Lane, who took the corner, was credited with an assist on the play.

For the fourth time in five seasons and the 11th time in program history, No. 4/7 Notre Dame earned the right to call itself BIG EAST champions, claiming a defiant 2-1 victory over No. RV/10 Marquette in a physical BIG EAST title match at Morrone Stadium in Storrs, Conn.

Although not historically known for her goalscoring ability, **Amanda Clark** picked the perfect time for the biggest tally of her career, slotting home a cross from **Erica lantorno** at 70:13 to break a 1-1 tie and bring the conference hardware back to South Bend once again.

A pair of Notre Dame players claimed the tournament's top individual honors, as **Lauren Fowlkes** was the Most Outstanding Offensive Player and **Jessica Schuveiller** was the Most Outstanding Defensive Player. Clark, **Courtney Barg** and **Nikki Weiss** joined Fowlkes and Schuveiller in representing the Fighting Irish on the BIG EAST All-Tournament Team.

Weiss made six saves in goal for Notre Dame, which faced rare deficits in terms of total shots (MU 21-14) and shots on goal (MU 8-7). Marquette also earned five of the six comer kicks in the match and was whistled for 13 fouls, compared to nine infractions by the Fighting Irish. Natalie Kulla turned aside five shots in the Golden Eagles' net.

Schuveiller made the first big play of the BIG EAST final, clearing a loose ball off the goal line for a MU corner kick in the 11th minute. The Notre Dame defense made a quick clear and moved forward on the counterattack. **Molly Campbell** floated a ball from the midfield into the Marquette box where **Melissa Henderson** settled it for an onrushing Fowlkes, who fired a low drive into the far right corner of the net past a diving Kulla at 12:09. The goal

was Fowlkes' career-high 10th of the year and her third of the BIG EAST Championship.

The Golden Eagles answered with a goal of their own barely 10 minutes later. Julia Victor lofted a bounding ball into the box that eluded the Fighting Irish defense and Rachel Sloan nodded it into the net for her seventh goal of the year (22:12).

After withstanding some pressure early in the second half, Notre Dame was able to capitalize with just under 20 minutes remaining for what proved to be the decisive strike. Jazmin Hall started the sequence with a left-side service to Henderson near the end line to the left of the MU goal. She turned and slid a pass to lantorno near the top of the 18', and in turn, lantorno one-touched a cross into the goalmouth. Clark made an angled run towards the six-yard box and got enough on her one-timer to redirect it past Kulla for her first career postseason tally.

GAME #22 — Nov. 13, 2009 NCAA Championship - First Round #5/5 Notre Dame 5, IUPUI 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Melissa Henderson scored twice, including her 30th career goal, while Haley Ford added a goal and an assist, as fifth-ranked Notre Dame kicked off the 2009 NCAA Championship with a 5-0 first-round win over Summit League champion IUPUI at Alumni Stadium.

The Fighting Irish (18-3-1) extended their active winning streak to 10 games and their unbeaten string to 16 in a row (15-0-1) with a workmanlike effort that saw the hosts get on the board early, then steadily build up the lead to the point where they could rest some of their regulars. By game's end, 21 different Notre Dame players had taken the pitch, all for at least 13 minutes of action, with three of the Fighting Irish reserves notching career milestones.

Rachel VanderGenugten scored the pivotal third goal of the night for Notre Dame with less than two minutes to go in the first half, registering her first career score in the process. Lindsay Brown then assisted on Henderson's second goal of the night to pick up her first career point, before Brynn Gerstle did the same when she set up an 86th-minute goal from Ellen Jantsch

Nikki Weiss went the first 65 minutes between the pipes for Notre Dame, making three saves before giving way to **Kelsey Lysander**, who stopped two shots to preserve the 14th Fighting Irish shutout of the season, and eighth in 11 games.

Playing host to first- and second-round games in the NCAA Championship for the 16th consecutive season, Notre Dame held a decided experience advantage over IUPUI, which was making its first-ever appearance in the NCAA tourney. That edge paid off less than eight minutes into the game, as **Courtney Barg** gathered the ball on her side of the midfield circle and swung a pass out to Henderson on the right flank near the center line. The speedy second-year Fighting Irish attacker then zig-zagged through the Jaguar defense all the way into the penalty area before finally beating IUPUI goalkeeper Jamie Farrell from eight yards out with a low left-footed shot (7:23).

Notre Dame had several chances to add to its lead during the next half-hour, but Farrell did well to keep her club in the game, picking up three of her eight saves in that span. However, a pair of Fighting Irish set pieces late in the first half would be her undoing — the first coming at the 39:22 mark, when **Molly Campbell** served a corner kick from the left flag across the face of goal, that Brown headed back into the fray from the right side of the six-yard box. Ford snapped a quick header at the left post that was cleared off the line, but came right back to the veteran defender, who capitalized on the second opportunity by toe-poking a shot through the maze of IUPUI protectors into the near-side netting.

Campbell also started the sequence that led to VanderGenugten's score less than four minutes later, sending in a free kick from 35 yards out in the right channel. Ford once again got her head on the ball, this time flicking a pass to the left post, where VanderGenugten beat Farrell and another Jaguar defender to the punch with a timely finish from close range (43:08).

Henderson added her second goal of the night in the 54th minute, as Brown delivered a precise lead pass from the left side that connected with Henderson in the box. She quickly beat her mark with one touch and then chipped the charging Farrell inside the right post (53:57).

Jantsch closed out the Notre Dame scoring at the 85:08 mark, potting her second goal of the season (both coming in a four-game span) by running on to a well-placed pass from Gerstle at the right edge of the six-yard box and beating Farrell with a sliding short-side shot.

GAME #23 — Nov. 15, 2009 NCAA Championship - Second Round #5/5 Notre Dame 6, Central Michigan 1 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Melissa Henderson turned in arguably the greatest individual postseason performance by a Notre Dame player in school history, tying the school record with four goals (including a natural hat trick in the opening 34 minutes), as the fifth-ranked Fighting Irish shredded Central Michigan, 6-1, in NCAA Championship second-round play at Alumni Stadium.

A native Texan, Henderson became the first Notre Dame player in more than four years — since Kerri Hanks' rookie debut at New Hampshire on Aug. 26, 2005 — to net four goals in a game (also known as the "Texas hat trick") and the first to chalk up a three-goal night in the NCAA Championship since **Michele Weissenhofer** against Penn State in the 2006 quarterfinals at old Alumni Field.

The Fighting Irish held a commanding 26-5 shot advantage over the Chippewas, including a 13-4 edge in shots on frame. **Nikki Weiss** went the first 72:30 in goal for Notre Dame, making three saves before giving way to **Maddie Fox**, who wasn't tested in her NCAA tourney debut.

The Fighting Irish set the tone early, as they netted their quickest goal of the season at 2:29. **Taylor Knaack** fired a shot from distance that hit the crossbar and dropped to Henderson's feet inside the six-yard box. The 2009 second team all-BIG EAST selection calmly tucked the rebound inside the near post and Notre Dame had a 1-0 lead.

The Fighting doubled their margin at 20:59 and again, it was Henderson who inflicted the damage. **Lauren Fowlkes** worked a give-and-go at the top of the box with Henderson to send the sophomore in with one defender to beat. Henderson worked her way around the last sentry and fired a low shot inside the far post.

Notre Dame's third goal was set up when Weissenhofer blasted a shot in on the Chippewa goal that CMU goalkeeper Shay Mannino blocked but couldn't corral. The rebound fell to a lurking Henderson who nudged home her third of the half at 33:04. With the goal, she became the first Notre Dame player to net a first-half hat trick in NCAA play.

The Chippewas got on the board 10 minutes into the second half when Molly Gerst received a pass from Amanda Waugh 10 yards out and deposited a low drive past Weiss.

However, the Fighting Irish quickly responded and put the game out of reach with two goals in a four-minute span. At 61:06, **Rose Augustin** drilled a low free kick from 22 yards out that eluded the Central Michigan defensive wall and a screened Mannino for her sixth goal of the season. Then, at 65:19, Henderson put Notre Dame up 5-1 when she took a pass in the Chippewa box, beat two defenders and chipped a ball over Mannino for her record-tying fourth goal of the game.



Rachel VanderGenugten closed the scoring ledger for the Fighting Irish in the 89th minute with a wicked 35-yard blast from the left channel that curled perfectly into the upper right corner of the net. It was the second career goal for the Notre Dame veteran, with both of her tallies coming in her first two NCAA tourney appearances and two of her final three home games with the Fighting Irish.

GAME #24 — Nov. 20, 2009 NCAA Championship - Third Round #5/5 Notre Dame 1, Oregon State 0 Alumni Stadium (Notre Dame, Ind.)

Rose Augustin scored her seventh goal of the season in the 62nd minute, as fifth-ranked (and second-seeded) Notre Dame advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship for the sixth consecutive year with a hard-fought 1-0 win over upset-minded Oregon State before a boisterous crowd of 1,500 fans at Alumni Stadium.

Augustin's goal was her third career gamewinner in NCAA tournament play, and it was made possible by a brilliant individual effort from Melissa **Henderson**, who picked up a point for the fourth consecutive game, giving her 21 points (9G-2A) in the postseason, including 13 points (6G-1A) in NCAA action.

In what turned out to be as much a defensive struggle as anything, both goalkeepers played admirably to keep their teams' chances alive. Nikki Weiss made four saves in the Notre Dame net, while Colleen Boyd did likewise in the Beavers' goal.

OSU, which was making its first-ever trip to the NCAA round-of-16, certainly didn't appear fazed by its unfamiliar surroundings. The first half was played largely in the middle third of the field, but the Beavers seemed to do a better job of capitalizing on their opportunities in the first half, outshooting Notre Dame, 5-1, and gaining all three of their corner kicks in the opening 45

Oregon State's best threat in the first half came in the 41st minute, when Rachel Axon hit a dipping shot from outside the penalty area that shorthopped Weiss in the goalmouth, but before OSU's Jessica Velazquez could latch on to the loose ball, **Jessica Schuveiller** backed up her netminder and swept the ball out of trouble and keep the game scoreless at the half.

Notre Dame evened out the run of play after the intermission, but didn't get its first good look on frame until the hour mark, when Henderson burst down the right side, cut back at the top right corner of the box and unleashed a wicked left-footed blast that just twisted wide of the far post.

That shot appeared to awaken not only the Fighting Irish players, but the crowd as well, and it paid off a little more than a minute later. In a near mirror image to her previous run, Henderson got past one defender on the right flank, then weaved by another mark at the edge of the penalty area. Then, just as she appeared to be losing control of the ball, she alertly toe-poked a pass across the face of goal, where Augustin nearly overran the play, but put on the brakes and muscled a right-footed shot into the lower left corner of the net past Boyd (61:35)

Not 25 seconds after the Notre Dame goal, Oregon State almost got the equalizer, as Red Nixon (who returned as a substitute following the Augustin score) cracked a shot from the top of the box that just glanced off the outside of the right post. Boyd then had to be alert, as Augustin bid for a second tally in the 65th minute, collecting a rebound of her blocked free kick and whistling a drive through traffic to the right post that the Beaver goalkeeper did well to save with a dive to her left.

Boyd would make three more saves in the final quarter-hour, while Oregon State pressed for the tying goal by sending three, and eventually four forwards into the offensive third. However, the Fighting Irish defense stood fast, blocking two of the Beavers' four shots, a third went wide, and the last

GAME #25 — Nov. 27, 2009 NCAA Championship - Quarterfinal #5/5 Notre Dame 2, #6/6 Florida State 0 Seminole Soccer Complex (Tallahassee, Fla.)

Second-seeded Notre Dame scored two goals in a 51-second span late in the first half to topple top-seeded Florida State, 2-0, in front of a capacity crowd at the Seminole Soccer Complex in Tallahassee, Fla.

With the win, the Fighting Irish advanced to the NCAA Women's College Cup for the fourth consecutive year and the fifth time in six seasons. It also marked the 11th time in program history that Notre Dame punched its ticket for the NCAA Championship semifinals.

Nikki Weiss turned in an impressive performance in the Fighting Irish net, tallying five saves for her seventh solo shutout of the season.

Notre Dame, which improved to 3-1 all-time against Florida State and earned a victory in its first-ever visit to Tallahassee, withstood some early pressure by the Seminoles as Tiffany McNulty forced Weiss into her first save at 7:22, and Jessica Price directed a header just wide from eight yards out at

The Fighting Irish then took a 1-0 lead when **Erica lantorno** chipped a dangerous ball into the top of the Seminole box less than three minutes after substituting into the game. FSU's defenders had trouble dealing with the threat, and Henderson picked up the loose ball, depositing it into the lower left corner for her 18th goal of the season at 38:35.

Just 51 seconds later, **Rose Augustin** sent a corner kick to the far post where Ford went high above the crowd for her second goal of the NCAA Championship, and third of the season at 39:26.

From there, Notre Dame rode a total team effort to preserve its lead, controlling the run of play for long stretches. What's more, the Fighting Irish defense limited Florida State to two shots on goal as Notre Dame held on for its 15th shutout of the season.

GAME #26 — Dec. 4, 2009 NCAA Women's College Cup - Semifinal #4/4 North Carolina 1, #5/5 Notre Dame 0 Aggie Soccer Complex (College Station, Texas)

Behind a sturdy defensive effort, No. 5 Notre Dame gave fourth-ranked North Carolina all it could handle in their NCAA Women's College Cup national semifinal contest, but in the end it wasn't enough as the Tar Heels handed the Fighting Irish a 1-0 loss in front of 8,026 fans at Aggie Soccer Stadium in College Station, Texas.

In the latest chapter of women's college soccer's biggest rivalry, a careerhigh six saves by **Nikki Weiss** were not enough to negate a North Carolina offense that earned the game's only breakthrough with just under eight minutes remaining. It marked the sixth one-goal decision in the past seven matchups between the clubs, not to mention sixth time Notre Dame and UNC

delivered a one-goal thriller at the College Cup.

The Fighting Irish had one of their best scoring chances of the night in the sixth minute when Melissa Henderson beat two Tar Heel defenders and sent a through-ball to the far side of the box, where Rose Augustin met it with a low drive that skittered just wide of the far post as UNC goalkeeper Ashlyn Harris sprinted off her line to apply pressure.

Notre Dame then had a good spell of possession midway into the second half that culminated in a shot off the crossbar by Augustin, who volleyed the shot off the outside right of her foot from the left side of the box, 12 yards out from the North Carolina net in the 67th minute.

With less than a half-hour to go, the game began to open up, creating more chances for both sides. Weiss was forced to make one of her best saves of the contest in the 68th minute, when she dove to her left to snag a low drive by Alyssa Rich. Moments later, Notre Dame had another chance, as **Michele Weissenhofer** reached a Henderson through-ball at the top of the box, cut back against the grain and let fly a shot that flashed just wide of

Weissenhofer was part of a Fighting Irish senior class that posted a 91-11-4 career record, while making four College Cup appearances and two trips to the NCAA national championship match.

Casey Noqueira finally broke the ice with the game's decisive strike at 82:02, scored from nearly point-blank range off a through-ball from Lucy Bronze. Notre Dame had one final chance to tie in the dying seconds, as Henderson played a ball up for a streaking Weissenhofer, but a last-ditch sliding effort by UNC's Rachel Givan negated the opportunity.

2010 Notre Dame Schedule and Opponent Notes

- Notre Dame's 2010 schedule (including exhibitions) features eight teams with '09 NCAA Championship experience, highlighted by a first-ever visit to perennial College Cup participant UCLA, the first time the Fighting Irish and Bruins will meet since the 2004 NCAA national championship match in Cary, N.C., when Notre Dame defeated UCLA, 4-3 on penalty kicks to win its second title. Seven other opponents are coming off NCAA tournament appearances, with Santa Clara and exhibition foe Virginia making the third round, while Connecticut and Rutgers advanced to the second round, and St. John's, Villanova and Wisconsin-Milwaukee were ousted in the first round.
- The Fighting Irish will play host to the 18th annual Inn at Saint Mary's Classic on Sept. 3 & 5 at Alumni Stadium, with Ole Miss, Santa Clara and Texas Tech joining Notre Dame in this year's field. SCU is a regular participant in the tournament, having appeared in the event every other season since 2000. Meanwhile, Ole Miss and Texas Tech are making their firstever trips to South Bend, let alone to compete in the Inn at Saint Mary's Classic.
- Notre Dame heads into the 2010 season riding a 94-game unbeaten streak (93-0-1) in home games versus BIG EAST Conference teams (dating back to a 5-4 loss to Connecticut in 1995), with a 389-26 scoring edge, 69 shutouts and another 24 games with just one goal allowed in that 94-game streak (only one opponent in the streak has managed multiple goals in a game versus the Fighting Irish - Notre Dame downed Connecticut, 4-3 in the 1996 BIG EAST final).
- The Fighting Irish also carry a 66-game unbeaten streak (63-0-3) at all sites against BIG EAST teams, representing the longest streak of its kind in NCAA Division I history, easily wiping away North Carolina's 55-game ACC run from 1994-2000. The last BIG EAST opponent to defeat Notre Dame was Marquette, which downed the Fighting Irish, 4-1 on Sept. 30, 2005, in Milwaukee.
- Notre Dame is 19-2-1 in season openers, including a ninegame unbeaten streak (8-0-1). The Fighting Irish also have posted a 15-1-1 mark to open the past 17 seasons, including a 3-0 victory over Wisconsin last year.
- Notre Dame owns a 140-37-8 (.778) all-time record in tournament action, including 48-20-6 (.689) in regularseason tournaments (27-5-2 at home), 39-2-1 in conference tournaments and 53-15-1 in the NCAAs. Since 1994, the Fighting Irish are 36-13-3 in regular-season tournaments (with 25 wins coming against ranked teams).
- Some of Notre Dame's top regular-season tournament wins have included: 2-0 vs. #3 Stanford ('95), 2-1 vs. #1 North Carolina ('96, at Duke), 5-0 vs. #5 Duke ('97), 6-1 vs. #2 Santa Clara ('00), 2-1 vs. #8 Penn State ('00), 5-2 vs. #4 SCU ('04), 4-1 vs. #11 Florida ('05), 3-1 vs. #2 Santa Clara ('06), 1-0 at #3 North Carolina ('08) and 3-1 vs. #12 Duke ('08, at UNC).

The BIG EAST Conference

The 2010-11 academic year will be the 32nd in the history of The BIG EAST Conference as the unique consortium marches on competing at the highest level with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth, but the 2010-11 year will mark the conference's sixth straight with the same 16-member group, the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The BIG EAST Conference's goals have always been the same. The outstanding performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are evidence of the league's proud tradition of success. The league has always been able to boast that many of its best students are also its best athletes. The 2009-10 year was no different.

Seven BIG EAST student-athletes were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners. Maya Moore, Connecticut's women's basketball standout, won the NCAA Honda-Broderick Award as the nation's top female student-athlete. She also was named the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American of the Year for women's basketball. Moore was the fifth BIG EAST women's student-athlete to win the Honda-Broderick Award.

In the athletic arena, BIG EAST student-athletes again enjoyed success on the national stage. The Connecticut women's basketball team won its second straight national championship and its seventh overall crown. The Villanova women's cross country team also won the NCAA title. The Notre Dame women's soccer team reached the NCAA College Cup for the second straight year. The Syracuse women's lacrosse squad reached the Final Four.

On the men's side, West Virginia's basketball team became the BIG EAST's 16th team to reach the NCAA Final Four and won the conference's academic achievement award. The Notre Dame men's lacrosse team advanced to the NCAA championship game.

Individually, three BIG EAST student-athletes won NCAA titles. Cincinnati's Josh Schneider won the 50 freestyle in men's swimming. In track, Louisville's D'Ana McCarty repeated as the NCAA indoor winner in the weight throw. Louisville's Matt Hughes won the 3,000 steeplechase. Another Cardinal, Austen Childs, was the national runner-up in men's tennis singles.

BIG EAST football maintained its national profile as a competitively balanced group. Cincinnati won its second straight league championship in 2009 and compiled an undefeated regular season. The Bearcats finished third in the final Bowl Championship Series standings. Six of the league's eight squads went to bowl games and helped the BIG EAST post a 4-2 bowl record. Rutgers, one of the bowl winners, also was recognized for having the nation's highest NCAA APR rating, which measures academic success.

The BIG EAST has continued to produce studentathletes who are at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. In 2009-10, 22 BIG EAST players from 10 schools were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams. Over 400 student-athletes have earned academic all-Amer-

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 35 largest media markets, including New York,

Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Cincinnati and Milwaukee. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 28 national championships in six different sports and 128 student-athletes have won individual national titles

In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 12 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken seven of the last 11 NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST added men's lacrosse to its growing list of sports, which increased its total to 24 sport championships.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement 5,500 student-athletes.

notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has had the good fortune to have outstanding leadership. The BIG EAST primarily was the brainchild of Dave Gavitt, who was the conference's first Commissioner. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST had one significant change. Tranghese stepped down from his position on June 30, 2009. John Marinatto, who had served as senior associate commissioner, moved into the Commissioner's chair and continued to steer the conference on its path of success.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed longstanding relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past seven years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

More than 575 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well-represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than



The quarterfinal matchups will be held at the home of the top four finishers in the regular-season standings, following first-round games between the fourth and fifth-place finishers from opposite divisions.







💴 Alumni Stadium

A new era in Notre Dame soccer began in 2009, when the Fighting Irish women's and men's soccer teams took the pitch for the first time at the brand-new \$5.7 million Alumni Stadium.

Located just east of Purcell Pavilion at the Joyce Center and approximately 500 yards west of its predecessor, the new stadium sits side-byside with Notre Dame's new lacrosse facility, Arlotta Stadium, which made its debut in the spring of 2010 (the soccer facility is situated further west, the lacrosse stadium further east).

Alumni Stadium opened its doors for women's soccer action on Sept. 4, 2009, to an overflow crowd of 3,007 for its debut match against topranked North Carolina (the Notre Dame men played three nights earlier, blanking Michigan, 5-0).

A state-of-the-art facility that arguably is the finest on-campus soccer-specific stadium in the country, Alumni Stadium has a permanent seating capacity of approximately 2,500 in the west grandstand, including VIP boxes flanking the main team entrance, as well as grass berm seating on the east end of the grounds.

The stadium also offers upgraded and expanded restroom and concession areas, elevator access and handicapped reserved seating on the main concourse level, as well as numerous amenities for both Fighting Irish soccer programs (expansive locker rooms with custommade wood lockers, spacious team lounges with flat-screen plasma TVs and high-speed Internet access, and a fully-equipped athletic training center).

What's more, Alumni Stadium features an LED

scoreboard (installed by industry leader Daktronics), enhanced lighting structures and top-of-the-line sod for the pitch cultivated in Fort Morgan, Colo., at Graff's Turf Farms (which also provided the turf for some of the nation's finest sports facilities including Notre Dame Stadium, Wrigley Field, Busch Stadium and two of the newest MLS grounds — Dick's Sporting Goods Park in Commerce City, Colo., outside Denver, and Rio Tinto Stadium in Sandy, Utah, a suburb of Salt Lake City).

controlled press box, which includes power and high-speed Internet portals at every seat (along with wireless Internet capability), three individually-wired broadcast booths and an expansive, unblocked and elevated midfield vantage point, all of which make Alumni Stadium unlike any other on-campus facility in college soccer.

"I feel like this is really the last piece of the puzzle," Notre Dame head women's soccer coach **Randy Waldrum** said. "We're certainly at the greatest institution in the country, there's no doubt about that. We have the academic standards we all strive for here, our program is at a level on the field where we're annually competing for national championships, and now we have a facility that is second to none and truly exemplifies that excellence we seek here at Notre Dame."

The construction of Alumni Stadium was made possible because of numerous generous donations, including those by lead benefactors **Tom Crotty** and **Rob Snyder**, both former Fighting Irish men's soccer players.

Originally from Darien, Conn., Crotty starred for the Irish from 1977-79, playing midfield and full-back in 60 games, earning three monograms and finishing with 23 career points (eight goals, seven assists). He played in Notre Dame's first three seasons of varsity soccer (under coach Rich Hunter), serving as one of the team captains as a senior in '79. He was voted MVP of the '79 Notre Dame team and led the Irish to a combined 57-14-3 record in those three years.

A 1980 Notre Dame graduate with a degree in finance, Crotty is currently a general partner with Battery Ventures LP in Wellesley, Mass. He and his wife Shari live in Southborough, Mass.

Hailing from Dallas, Texas, Snyder earned two monograms while playing forward, participating in 51 games in 1980-81-83 and accounting for 68 points (23 goals and 22 assists that rank him seventh on Notre Dame's career chart). He tied for the team lead in goals in 1981 with 12. Snyder played on Huntercoached teams that finished a combined 54-14-3 in his three seasons (including 35-3-1 at home).

Snyder is a 1984 Notre Dame graduate with a degree in government. He is the founder and CEO of Stream Energy in Dallas.

The gifts by Crotty and Snyder are components of the \$1.5 billion "Spirit of Notre Dame" capital campaign, the largest such endeavor in the history of Catholic higher education.

Alumni Stadium officially was dedicated on April 24, 2010, almost exactly two years to the day after ground was broken on the facility. Among those present were lead benefactors Crotty and Snyder and their families, along with members of the Notre Dame administration including University President Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., University Executive Vice-President John Affleck-Graves and director of athletics Jack Swarbrick, as well as Waldrum, men's soccer coach Bobby Clark and players from both the Fighting Irish women's and men's soccer teams.

Prior to its 2009 debut at Alumni Stadium, the Notre Dame women's soccer team competed at similarly-named Alumni Field for 19-plus seasons from 1990-2009, registering a superb 222-16-4 (.926) record at the "grand old palace" of Notre Dame soccer.

The Fighting Irish also compiled a record of 199-12-4 (.935) in their final 215 games at the facility – including home winning streaks of 27, 28, 29 and 32 games (four of the longest in NCAA history). The Irish also had a 43-game home unbeaten streak (41-0-2) from 2004-07, with that run standing third in the NCAA record book. Notre Dame lost more than one home game in a season just four times in 19 full seasons at Alumni Field, with nine unbeaten seasons in its final 16 campaigns at its east campus home.

The Fighting Irish have played host to NCAA Championship games in each of the previous 16 seasons (the first 15 at old Alumni Field before hosting their first NCAA tourney action at Alumni Stadium in 2009). Notre Dame has compiled a 42-3-0 record in NCAA play on its home pitch with a 147-23 scoring edge in those 45 games.

Old Alumni Field also played host to the BIG EAST Conference Championship three times in its history, with Notre Dame winning the conference title each time (1996, 2000 and 2008).





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The 1995 women's soccer season included Notre Dame's first BIG EAST title (in any sport) and the first NCAA championship for the Irish women's soccer team – while the 2004 championship made Notre Dame the second Division I women's soccer program with multiple NCAA titles.

Notre Dame Celebrates Nearly A Quarter Century of Wide-Reaching Success

The Notre Dame women's soccer team completed its 22nd season as a varsity program in 2009, with the past two decades firmly establishing the Irish as one of the nation's elite programs:

- Notre Dame in 2004 became the second Division I women's soccer program ever to win multiple NCAA titles. The Irish also own the second-most appearances in the NCAA title game (seven) and have advanced to the NCAA College Cup final weekend 11 times since 1994 (second-most in the nation over that span).
- The Irish own a 53-15-1 overall record in NCAA Tournament play, the second-best postseason winning percentage (.775) in Division I history.
- · Notre Dame is one of only two women's soccer programs ever to produce four recipients of the prestigious Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy. Midfielders Cindy Daws (1996) and Anne Makinen (2000), and forward Kerri Hanks (2006 and 2008) all have taken home the award, with Hanks achieving two milestones that no other player (male or female) has ever duplicated. As a sophomore in 2006, she was the youngest player ever to receive the Hermann Trophy. Hanks then became the only player ever to earn the award in non-consecutive seasons when she received the crystal ball trophy in '08, joining UNC's Mia Hamm and Cindy Parlow, and Portland's Christine Sinclair, as the only two-time Hermann Trophy recipients.
- Notre Dame's total of 44 NSCAA All-Americans over the past 16 seasons (1994-2009) is second-most in the nation and includes four rare four-year All-Americans: forward Hanks (2005-08), midfielders Holly Manthei (1994-97) and Makinen (1997-2000) and defender Jen Grubb (1996-99).

as Notre Dame women's soccer players have combined for CoSIDA Academic All-America honors 23 times over the past 15 years. Five Irish players - Jen Renola, Jenny Streiffer, Monica Gonzalez, Brittany Bock and current senior Lauren Fowlkes – have coupled All-America and Academic All-America honors during their careers while Vanessa Pruzinsky and Erika Bohn are two of only six Division I players ever to be three-year Academic All-Americans. Pruzinsky became just the third chemical engineering major at Notre Dame (first since the early 1970s) ever to graduate with a 4.0 cumulative gradepoint average. The women's soccer program's widespread academic excellence also included one of the top combined team GPAs (3.378) in the entire Notre Dame athletics department during the 2008-09 school

- Several Notre Dame players have filled leading roles with full national teams - including Kate (Sobrero) Markgraf, Shannon Boxx and LaKeysia Beene with the United States and three others with Team Canada (Candace Chapman, Katie Thorlakson and Melissa Tancredi), plus Mexican National Team members Gonzalez, Monica Gerardo and Rebecca Mendoza, and Scandinavian standouts Makinen (Finland) and Gudrun Gunnarsdottir (Iceland).
- The NCAA record book is populated by numerous Notre Dame players, most notably: Manthei (record total of 129 career assists), Thorlakson (23G-24A in 2004, only UNC alum Mia Hamm has totaled more goals and more assists in the same season), Hanks (joined Hamm and Streiffer as only Division I players ever to amass 70 goals and 70 assists in their career; Hanks and Hamm also are only ones to lead the nation in goals and assists in the same season) and Renola (fourth with 8,111 career minutes played; member of 11-player NCAA 25-year anniversary team).

Here's a closer look at yearly highlights for Notre Dame women's soccer's first 22 seasons:

Sept. 1 - Head coach Dennis Grace leads Notre Dame to a 5-1 victory over IU-South Bend in the Notre Dame women's soccer program's first game, with Mimi Suba scoring the first goal in the program's history at 32:01.

Sept. 6 – Susie Zilvitis notches the program's first hat trick, in the first half of an 8-1 victory over St. Joseph's (Ind.).

Sept. 18 - Notre Dame and goalkeeper Karma Spencer register the team's first shutout, 5-0 over Western Michigan.

Oct. 10 - The Irish set a scoring record in a 17-0 win over Tri-State. Margaret Jarc – who later would serve as one of the team's assistant coaches - comes off the bench to net the hat trick as Notre Dame scores eight first-half goals.

Sept. 2 - The Irish take the field for the first time under their second head coach, Chris Petrucelli. Notre Dame responds by registering a 5-1 win over Northeast Missouri, with Zilvitis and Marianne Giolitto each scoring twice.

Sept. 19 - Sporting a 3-2 record, the Irish make the program's first appearance in the Midwest region rankings (in the 10th spot).

Oct. 28 - Notre Dame posts its first win over a ranked opponent, 4-0, versus 24th-ranked Xavier to conclude the season. The Irish finish 16-3-1, with losses to Duke, UNC-Greensboro and Creighton.

Oct. 15 - The four-year-old Irish program earns its first national ranking (16th), thanks to a 10-0-2 start before finishing the season 15-2-3 with the national ranking of 16th in the ISAA coaches poll.

Oct. 17 - Notre Dame loses to sixth-ranked SMU, 3-1, to fall to 8-5-1. All five Irish losses at that point had come versus top-20 teams

Oct. 30 - Notre Dame clinches its second straight Midwestern Collegiate Conference title with a 2-1 win at

1993

Sept. 19 - Notre Dame defeats fourth-ranked William & Mary 1-0 at Alumni Field, marking the highest-ranked opponent the Irish had beaten in the program's six-year

Sept. 29 - The Irish defeat Wright State to open the season 9-0 and win their 14th straight, dating back to 1992. Freshman standout Daws registers a point in her ninth straight game.

Nov. 6 - Notre Dame defeats Xavier 4-0 to win the inaugural MCC tournament. The Irish finish the regular season ranked third nationally and make their first NCAA appearance.

Nov. 13 - Notre Dame drops a 2-1 decision to George Mason in Madison, Wis., in the first round of the NCAAs. The Patriots eventually advance to the national title game.

Sept. 11 - Jodi Hartwig scores with four minutes remaining in regulation to force a tie with 10th-ranked William & Mary, 2-2. Notre Dame falls behind 3-2 in the first overtime but scores twice in the second OT, as the 4-3 gamewinner is scored by Michelle McCarthy with 0:25 left.

Oct. 2 - The Irish end North Carolina's record-setting 92-game winning streak, 0-0 in St. Louis, as Renola faces 25 shots with a career-high 11 saves. The tie marks the third time that an Irish team had broken a long winning streak, joining the 1957 football team that ended Oklahoma's 41-game winning streak and the 1974 basketball team that stopped UCLA's 88-game streak.

Oct. 24 - Following a pair of Irish wins over Ohio State and Detroit, coupled with a North Carolina loss to Duke, Notre Dame is voted the nation's No. 1 team by both the ISAA coaches poll and Soccer America, marking the first time in over three seasons that a team other than UNC was in the top spot. Notre Dame also goes on to finish the regular season as the nation's top-ranked team.

Nov. 6 - Notre Dame claims its final MCC tournament title with a 5-1 win over Butler

Nov. 12 - Goals by Tiffany Thompson and Hartwig break a 1-1 tie in the program's first NCAA tournament win, 3-1 over George Mason.

Nov. 18 - A Sobrero score off a Manthei corner kick is the only goal of the game, as Notre Dame beats host Portland 1-0 and advances to the NCAA championship game for the first time in the program's history.

Nov. 20 - The much-anticipated rematch of the scoreless tie in St. Louis ends up a 5-0 North Carolina victory, as the Tar Heels win their 12th NCAA championship with a four-goal second half.

1995 (also see pp. 118 and 120-121)

Sept. 2 - The Irish open with the first BIG EAST Conference game for any Notre Dame team. McCarthy and Gerardo both score twice and Boxx has three assists in a 7-0 win over Providence.

Oct. 15 - A rematch with defending NCAA champ North Carolina ends with a Tar Heel shutout of the Irish in Houston in a 2-0 win ... but the teams would have yet another rematch in the NCAAs seven weeks later.

Nov. 5 - Notre Dame claims the BIG EAST title with a 1-0 win over third-ranked Connecticut (at Rutgers). The Irish avenge an earlier 5-4 overtime loss to the Huskies on Oct. 6 (at Alumni Field), which had been Notre Dame's first home loss since Oct. 4, 1992 (through the '08 season, that remains the only home loss ever for the Irish versus a BIG EAST opponent). South Bend-area native Amy VanLaecke scores the game's only goal, her second of the tournament, and is named its MVP.

Nov. 19 – The Irish begin their NCAA run with a 5-0 win over Wisconsin at Alumni Field, as Boxx scores the final three Notre Dame goals for a hat trick in her first NCAA

Nov. 26 - Notre Dame shuts out UConn for the second time in three weeks (2-0, at Alumni Field), with goals from Julie Vogel and VanLaecke helping send the Irish to the NCAA semifinals for the second consecutive year.

Dec. 1 - A Fetzer Field crowd of 7,212, then an NCAA record, is stunned as Notre Dame shocks the home team North Carolina, 1-0, to advance to the national championship game. A Tar Heel own-goal is followed by 70 minutes of outstanding Irish defense, as UNC suffers its first NCAA loss since 1985 and only its second at home. Notre Dame's first win over North Carolina sends the Irish to the NCAA final for the second consecutive season.

Dec. 3 – Sister schools Notre Dame and Portland meet in the NCAAs for the second straight year, battling into a third overtime before Daws slips a direct kick past the goalkeeper at 125:31, for a 1-0 win that ends the first overtime game in an NCAA final. The Irish punctuate their earlier upset of the Tar Heels by becoming only the third team to win the NCAA women's soccer title. Renola finishes the finals weekend having saved all 10 shots she faced in the two-game set.

Sept. 22 - Notre Dame's first trip to Storrs is a successful one as the Irish avenge one of their two 1995 defeats with a 2-1 win over fourth-ranked Connecticut.

Oct. 4 - Another highly-anticipated game with topranked UNC ends in a 2-1 overtime win for second-ranked Notre Dame. Freshman sensation Streiffer becomes the first Notre Dame player to score against the Tar Heels after knocking in two goals, as the Irish become the first team to win consecutive games against UNC.

Oct. 13 – Off to its best start in school history at 13-0-0 and riding a winning streak of 24 games, Notre Dame is brought back to earth as an inspired ninth-ranked Santa Clara team defeats the top-ranked Irish, 3-1. Despite the loss. Notre Dame remains atop the national polls

Nov. 10 - Tournament MVP Daws leads the Irish to their second BIG EAST title to go along with the BIG EAST regular-season crown, after a 4-3 title-game win over UConn at Alumni Field

Dec. 6 – Three goals over a span of 14 minutes in the second half help Notre Dame rally from a 2-0 deficit for a 3-2 semifinal win over Portland in Santa Clara, Calif. The Pilots stun the Irish with a goal 1:40 into the game and another at 29:42 - but Notre Dame strikes quickly in the second half with goals from Boxx, VanLaecke and Gerardo, against a team that had allowed just seven prior to the

Dec. 8 - Making its third straight appearance in the NCAA final, Notre Dame faces North Carolina in another classic overtime battle. The Tar Heels outshoot the Irish 18-7 but Renola makes several remarkable saves. UNC's Debbie Keller ends Notre Dame's hopes for a second straight NCAA title with her goal at 110:56.

Daws is honored after the season with the prestigious Hermann Trophy and M.A.C. Player of the Year Award (then separate honors), plus the Honda Broderick Cup, recognizing her as the nation's top female collegiate athlete.

Sept. 19 - Notre Dame welcomes North Carolina to Alumni Field for the first time and the teams play to a 2-2 tie, as the game is halted at 71:16 due to lightning. The evenly-played game sees each team take 11 shots. Makinen puts the Irish up early at 22:28 before the Tar Heels score at 52:15 and 62:38. Jenny Heft ties the game at 68:10, three minutes before lightning halted play.

Nov. 9 - The Irish take a 5-0 halftime lead and cruise to a 6-1 win over Connecticut to win their third BIG EAST title. Makinen's hat trick earns her MVP honors.

Nov. 29 - Notre Dame caps a run to its fourth straight NCAA semifinal with a dominating 8-0 home win over 16th-ranked UCLA. The Irish outscore their first three NCAA opponents (Cincinnati, Nebraska and UCLA) by a score of 21-1.

Dec. 5 - The Irish outshoot UConn, 28-6, but hit the post three times, the crossbar twice and have another shot saved off the line by a defender as the Huskies upset the Irish 2-1, at the NCAA semifinals in Greensboro, N.C. The first loss for Notre Dame in four NCAA semifinals sees Sara Whalen score on UConn's first shot (41:01) and again at 64:37 before Streiffer's diving header from Manthei's cross caps the scoring in the 77th minute.

Sept. 13 - Second-ranked Notre Dame returns to Fetzer Field for the first time since winning the 1995 NCAA title and opens with a goal in the first minute against topranked North Carolina. The Tar Heels allow the Irish just two shots the rest of the game while winning 5-1.

Oct. 18 - Two days after Connecticut snapped Notre Dame's NCAA-record 36-game conference win streak with a 1-1 tie at UConn's Morrone Stadium, another streak falls as unranked Seton Hall wins 3-2 in overtime – the first BIG EAST loss for the Irish since 1995 and their first loss to an unranked team in 183 games (dating back to a 2-0 defeat to Creighton on Oct. 6, 1990).

Nov. 8 - A triumphant return to Morrone Stadium sees the Irish blank the Huskies for their fourth BIG EAST title (1-0). Makinen scores in the 82nd minute to repeat as the championship's MVP.

Nov. 28 - Fifth-seeded Portland avenges five consecutive losses to the Irish, beating fourth-seeded and host Notre Dame, 2-1, in the NCAA quarterfinals. Heft ties the game in the 73rd minute but the visitors advance, thanks to a goal in the 88th minute.

1999

Feb. 3 - Randy Waldrum becomes the program's third head coach, after leading Baylor's 1998 team to the NCAA second round in only the third year of the program.

Sept. 3 – In the first game of the Waldrum era, the Irish lead top-ranked North Carolina 2-1 with under 3:00 remaining in the second half (thanks to a goal by Mia Sarkesian) – but the Tar Heels send the game to overtime on their way to a 3-2 victory in the second extra period.

Nov. 7 – Streiffer is named the BIG EAST Championship MVP as the Irish win their fifth tournament title, 4-2, beating Connecticut in the BIG EAST final for the fifth straight

Nov. 28 - The longest game in Notre Dame women's soccer history results in an NCAA quarterfinal shootout at fourth-ranked Nebraska, after four OTs and 150 total minutes yield a 1-1 tie. After each side made 3-of-5 penalty kicks, unlikely hero Kelly Lindsey hits Notre Dame's try in the first extra round, and Beene follows with a save to send the Irish to the NCAA semifinals for the fifth time.

Dec. 3 – Wearing green jerseys for the first time since 1995, the Irish overcome a 17-3 shot deficit to blank topranked and undefeated Santa Clara in the College Cup semifinals (1-0), after an earlier 4-2 loss to the Broncos in the 1999 regular season. Freshman Ali Lovelace scores in the 75th minute, as Notre Dame knocks off the Broncos in their own backyard (San Jose) and advances to its fourth NCAA final in six years. Beene is the clear player of the game, with seven saves and several other plays in which she snuffed out prime SCU scoring chances.

Dec. 5 - North Carolina ends fifth-seeded Notre Dame's run in the title game (2-0), with the Tar Heels becoming the first team to beat the Irish twice in one season.

Sept. 8 - The fourth-ranked Irish enjoy one of their widest victory margins ever (6-1) against a high-ranked opponent, with coach Jerry Smith of second-ranked Santa Clara praising midfield standout Makinen as "the best overall player in college soccer" (a status she later lives up to as the consensus 2000 national player of the year). Meotis Erikson and Amy Warner score for an early 2-1 lead and freshman Amanda Guertin adds a key breakaway in the 74th minute, while Makinen finishes with a goal and a pair of assists.

Sept. 17 - The Irish reclaim the nation's No. 1 ranking after holding on for a 1-0 win at Portland, with Erikson's 50th career goal coming on a sharply-struck 18-yard shot, via a cross from her classmate Makinen. Erikson – who also scored two days earlier in the 4-0 win over Washington- is named offensive MVP of the Portland Invitational while Kerri Bakker is the tournament's defensive MVP, after helping limit Portland to four shots on goal. The game marks just the 12th time since 1990 that the Pilots had suffered a loss at Merlo Field and is the eighth one-goal game in the eight-game Notre Dame-Portland series history.

Nov. 5 - Homestanding Notre Dame collects its sixth consecutive BIG EAST tournament title, besting league rival Connecticut (1-0) after earlier wins over Miami and Boston College (both 3-0). An early own goal provides the winning margin, with Sarkesian named the tournament MVP after playing a leading role in the pivotal midfield battle (she also had a goal and assist in the BC game).

Nov. 24 - The Irish advance to the NCAA semifinals for the sixth time in seven years, thanks to a thrilling overtime win over growing rival Santa Clara in the guarterfinals (2-1). Lovelace – who scored in the 1-0 win over SCU in the 1999 semifinals – again is a thorn in the Broncos' side, scoring in the 17th minute, while freshmen Guertin and Randi Scheller assist on Erikson's game-ending goal five minutes into OT. The game features 19 fouls by each team, with Liz Wagner's eight saves (many game-savers) making up for the loss of midfielder Ashley Dryer, who was injured midway through the first half.



IV Irish Soccer History

One week later, Warner's 20th-minute goal gives the unbeaten Irish an early lead in the NCAA semifinals but fifth-ranked UNC ultimately advances with a 2-1 victory. The decisive goal in the 83rd minute means that the Irish trailed for a total of only 35 minutes all season, spanning parts of three games in the 25-game schedule (23-1-1).

Makinen later is honored with the 2000 Hermann Trophy and Missouri Athletic Club Player of the Year Award, combining with Daws to make Notre Dame the second women's soccer program to produce multiple national players of the year.

2001

Sept. 2 – Notre Dame wins its annual home tournament (the Key Bank Classic), topping 25th-ranked Hartford (2-0) after besting eighth-ranked Penn State two days earlier (2-1). Freshman Mary Boland's diving header yields a 1-0 lead in the seventh minute of the PSU game, with Guertin adding the second Irish goal early in the second half. Reserve forward Kelly Tulisiak – who assisted on Guertin's goal – then opens the scoring in the 67th minute of the Hartford game, with Guertin's late goal providing the final margin.

Sept. 25 – Waldrum's 50th career win (1-0) at Notre Dame qualifies as one of his most memorable, as the fourth-ranked Irish use precise execution to score in the 18th minute on a three-pass set play while limiting third-ranked Nebraska to a pair of shots on goal. Sarkesian adds another big-game goal, started by Scheller's direct kick from 10 yards outside the box. The sequence sees Scheller send a pass into the box before Guertin flicks the ball into space on the right and Melissa Tancredi serves a low endline pass for Sarkesian's one-timer. Physical play yields 39 fouls (20 for the Irish) while the Huskers are caught offside 10 times

Nov. 11 – Scheller's first career game-winning goal comes with 14 minutes left in the BIG EAST title game (at Rutgers), for a 2-1 win over West Virginia and the program's seventh consecutive BIG EAST crown. Tournament MVP Guertin – who scored in earlier BIG EAST tournament wins over St. John's (2-0) and Boston College (3-0) – sets up the gamewinner on one of her well-placed corner kicks, with headers from Tancredi and Sarkesian preceding Scheller's lunging volley.

Notre Dame goes on to be upset by Cincinnati in the second round of the NCAAs (3-2), despite holding a 15-9 edge in shots and 4-0 in corner kicks. It marks just the second home loss ever for the Irish in NCAA Tournament play (spanning 20 games).

2002

Sept. 15 – A furious rally sees Notre Dame score five times in the final 25 minutes, stunning 25th-ranked hosts at the Maryland Classic (5-2). It matches the fifth-highest goal total ever for the Irish versus a top-25 opponent. Tancredi – a forward who later in her career will become a two-time All-America defender with the Irish – shifts the momentum with her physical play and pair of header goals, en route to picking up the tournament's offensive MVP award.

Oct. 13 – The Irish begin their late push with a 3-1 victory over BIG EAST rival Connecticut at Alumni Field. Dryer's return from injury sparks the team while Guertin's pinpoint corner kicks lead to the final two Notre Dame goals.

Nov. 17 – Notre Dame avenges an earlier loss to Purdue (3-1), reversing the score in NCAA second-round action at Alumni Field. Guertin's calm presence produces the first goal and she assists on another while the Irish defense limits the Boilermakers to four shots on goal. The win sends 19th-ranked Notre Dame to the round-of-16 for the eighth time in nine seasons – but top-ranked host Stanford uses a Marcia Wallis goal in the 81st minute to survive the upset bid. 1-0.

2003

Aug. 29 - Notre Dame opens the season minus six

injured players but responds with its second-highest scoring game of the Waldrum era while dispatching of perennial power Hartford, 9-1. Boland (3G-1A) joins a select group who have posted hat tricks in the first game of a season.

Sept. 21 and 23 – The Irish hold Stanford (0-0) and Santa Clara (2-1) to three combined shots on goal and three corner kicks while handing the Broncos their first-ever loss at the SCU Classic. Thorlakson assists on Boland's early goal and then knocks in a deflected Boland shot for the late gamewinner.

Oct. 3 and 17 – Notre Dame posts a pair of 2-0 wins at Alumni Field over BIG EAST contenders West Virginia and Connecticut. Boland (1:24) notches the team's quickest goal of the season while the defense limits WVU to a single shot on goal. Two weeks later, playing without Boland, the Irish defense again delivers as UConn manages only two shots on goal (none in the final 60:00).

Oct. 26 – Notre Dame wins 2-0 at Seton Hall for a 10-game shutout streak that ranks fifth in NCAA history (as does Erika Bohn's personal streak that reaches 967 minutes). The Irish also extend their unbeaten start to 18-0-1, with the first 19 games including only one deficit spanning all of seven minutes.

Nov. 2 – Guertin extends her Notre Dame record with the fourth overtime goal of her career, as the Irish defeat Miami (2-1) in the BIG EAST quarterfinals for their 50th consecutive home win over a BIG EAST opponent.

After suffering its first loss ever in the BIG EAST Tournament during the next weekend (2-1 vs. Boston College, in the semifinals), the Irish endure more postseason heartache with a 1-0 loss to Michigan in the NCAA second round. The Wolverines convert their only shot on goal and earn only one corner kick in the 90 minutes while the Irish are unable to overcome injuries suffered by All-Americans Warner and Tancredi.


Sept. 5 – Thorlakson racks up the most points (8; 3G-2A) ever by a Notre Dame player in a game versus a top-25 opponent, as the second-ranked Irish register a key early win over fourth-ranked Santa Clara (5-2). Thorlakson also becomes just the third Irish player to post a hat trick against a top-10 foe and ties her own Notre Dame record by scoring or assisting on each of the team's first five goals.

Sept. 17 – Reserve defender Kate Tulisiak picks a perfect time for the only point of her career, after intercepting a pass and providing the right endline cross on Amanda Cinalli's 84th-minute goal at Connecticut. That 1-0 win gives the Irish a 7-0 start that stretches to 15-0 before a scoreless tie with Rutgers on Oct. 22.

Oct. 31 – Thorlakson sets another Notre Dame record with 10 points in a game (4G-2A) while tying the Irish record for goals in a game, with each of them coming leftfooted. The 7-0 BIG EAST quarterfinal win over St. John's also sees Thorlakson top her own standard by factoring into each of her team's first six goals.

Nov. 7 – Notre Dame's perfect record in BIG EAST title games (7-0) ends at Connecticut, as the Huskies score twice in the final 17 minutes to snatch away the 2-1 win. But the Irish quickly turn the disappointment into motivation by outscoring their opponents 12-2 in the six ensuing NCAA Tournament wins (including a 2-0 third-round rematch with UConn).

Dec. 3 – Following four straight wins to start the NCAAs - versus Eastern Illinois (4-0), Wisconsin (1-0, on Jill

Krivacek's 90th-minute header of a Thorlakson corner kick), UConn (2-0) and Portland (3-1, pair of goals from Cinalli) – the Irish head to Cary, N.C., for a semifinal matchup with familiar foe Santa Clara. The only scoring in the evenly-matched and tension-packed game comes in the 73rd minute, as Candace Chapman (a converted defender) and Thorlakson work a classic give-and-go that starts with Chapman's long run down the center of the field. She then knocks home Thorlakson's return pass from the right side, sending the Irish to the NCAA title game for the fifth time.

Dec. 5 – Notre Dame joins UNC as the only multi-time NCAA champions in D-I women's soccer history, after surviving a penalty-kick shootout with emerging force UCLA. A fluke own-goal gives the Bruins the lead early in the second half but the Irish battle back behind tournament MVPs Thorlakson (tying goal, on 74th-minute PK) and Bohn, who dives high and to her left to deny Kendall Billingsley's penalty-kick try with 5:09 left in regulation. The shootout sees little-used reserve Sarah Halpenny convert on Notre Dame's second try while Jen Buczkowski and Annie Schefter also find the net – but the teams still are tied after five kicks, sending the shootout to sudden-death. Krivacek then calmly deposits her low-right shot and Bohn guesses correctly to the same spot, stopping Lindsay Greco's try to give Notre Dame the national title in thrilling fashion.

Thorlakson completes one of the most dominant all-around seasons in women's soccer history (23G-24A) and is considered the favorite for the Hermann Trophy – but inexplicably, she is not even among the three finalists for the award. Soccer America does recognize Thorlakson as its 2004 national player of the year (an honor earned by Makinen in 1998 and 2000).

2005

Sept. 2 – Notre Dame lives up to its No. 1 ranking with an impressive early win over 11th-ranked Florida (4-1). Thorlakson has a pair of goals and an assist while newcomer Hanks – who missed the 2004 season due to the Under-19 World Championship – opens the scoring to keep up her torrid pace. One week earlier, Hanks had a seven-point game (3G-1A) in the opener versus New Hampshire and scored four goals against the home team at the Vermont Classic.



Oct. 14 - Thorlakson factors into three of the goals (1G-2A) as the Irish top 10th-ranked Connecticut, 4-0, for one of the program's most dominating wins ever versus a top-10 opponent.

Oct. 23 - Alexandra Hardy's goal in the 63rd minute cuts Notre Dame's lead to 2-1 and briefly gives upsetminded Georgetown hope, in the regular-season finale. But the game quickly gets out of hand minutes later, as Bock, Thorlakson and Schefter all score in a span of 51 seconds to suddenly give the Irish a 4-1 cushion. The flurry ranks as the quickest three-goal stretch in the history of Division I women's soccer.

Nov. 21 - Notre Dame returns to the BIG EAST title game and leaves no doubt this time around, running away from Connecticut to secure the program's eighth BIG EAST Tournament title. Five different Irish players find the net at Marquette's Valley Fields, highlighted by the 24th score of the season from Hanks (breaking the ND record for goals by a freshman). Thorlakson – who totals 2G-5A in the three wins - is named the tournament's offensive MVP while midfield enforcer Krivacek takes home the defensive MVP award

Nov. 25 - Notre Dame and Portland meet in a rematch of the 2004 NCAA quarterfinals and the home team again claims victory (by the same score, 3-1). The eventual national champion Pilots advance after scoring twice in the first 20 minutes for an early cushion that was enough to hold off the fifth-ranked Irish.

2006

Sept. 3 – In a rare matchup of top-ranked teams by different polls, Notre Dame scores three times in less than nine minutes midway through the second half to defeat Santa Clara, 3-1 at Alumni Field. Cinalli was the catalyst for the Irish comeback, assisting on the tying goal by Krivacek before nodding home Michele Weissenhofer's cross to give the hosts the lead just 5:35 later. Cinalli then put the Broncos down for good with a breakaway strike in the 73rd minute. Lauren Karas added nine saves between the pipes, including a critical stop with 2:34 left as SCU tried to rally.

Sept. 29 - One of the top games in Alumni Field goes the way of the No. 1-ranked Irish, as Notre Dame spots sixth-ranked West Virginia an early goal, but comes roaring back with three scores after the break for a 3-1 triumph. Weissenhofer potted the equalizer off a Bock assist less than four minutes into the second half and Hanks put the Irish on top with a header at the left post in the 74th minute. Cinalli sealed matters just over three minutes from time, flushing home a rebound off Weissenhofer's initial shot.

Oct. 24 - Notre Dame caps off the fifth undefeated regular season in program history (17-0-1) with a 3-0 win at Cincinnati in a game that had to be made up after the initial contest was called due to lighting.

Nov. 5 - Hanks scores twice in the opening 10 minutes, including the guickest BIG EAST tournament goal in program history (0:57) as the Irish put together a clinical 4-2 win over Rutgers in the BIG EAST final to win their ninth league crown. Buczkowski and reliable defensive midfielder Ashley Jones chip in two assists apiece as Notre Dame races out to a four-goal lead before the Scarlet Knights trimmed the margin late. The Irish also swept the tournament hardware, as Hanks was the offensive MVP and steady defender Kim Lorenzen was tapped as the defensive MVP.

Dec. 1 – Notre Dame returns to the NCAA College Cup final for the sixth time following a hard-fought 2-1 victory over No. 5 Florida State in the national semifinals at Cary, N.C. The Irish had outscored their first four tournament opponents by a combined 15-1 (7-1 vs. Oakland with a Hanks hat trick; 1-0 vs. Wisconsin-Milwaukee; 3-0 vs. Colorado; 4-0 vs. Penn State with a Weissenhofer hat trick), and appeared to be poised for more of the same after defensive midfielder Courtney Rosen (35:32) and Krivacek (38:21) scored less than three minutes apart in the first half. FSU's India Trotter halved the deficit just after the break, but Karas stood tall the rest of the way with some big plays to preserve the win.


Dec. 3 - Bidding for a third NCAA title, Notre Dame came up just short against fellow No. 1 team, North Carolina, falling to its archrival, 2-1. The Irish and Tar Heels brought a stellar 51-1-1 combined record into the final (and marked the first time both title-game combatants had at least 25 wins), but Notre Dame found itself trailing by two goals less than 90 seconds into the second half. Bock scored in the 81st minute to get the Irish within a goal, and Hanks nearly tied the game in the closing seconds but her free kick from the top of the box just went wide of the far right post. Hanks finished the season as the national leader in goals (22) and assists (22), joining former UNC great Mia Hamm as the only player ever to pull off that feat.

Sept. 28 - Sometimes the biggest moves start with a small step, and that was the case with Notre Dame's 1-0 win at Louisville on Cinalli's unassisted goal in the 24th minute. The Irish had battled through a rocky opening month of the season, going 3-4-1 in their first eight games (three losses by one goal, two in OT), but held the Cardinals to only one shot on frame (a harmless long-distance try in the 85th minute) to get back to the .500 mark.

Oct. 21 - In a matchup of BIG EAST divisional leaders, 15th-ranked Notre Dame continues its late-season resurgence with a 2-1 overtime win against No. 13 UConn at Alumni Field. Hanks erases a one-goal deficit by bending in a corner kick in the 86th minute, before Bock secures the win on a header goal off an Elise Weber free kick three minutes into OT.

Nov. 9 - Bock and Rose Augustin score 38 seconds apart midway through the first half as the Irish blank Georgetown, 2-0, in a BIG EAST tournament semifinal at Morgantown, W.Va. Two days later, Notre Dame and host WVU play to a 1-1 double-overtime tie in the BIG EAST final before the Mountaineers claim the title on penalty kicks,

Nov. 24 - Notre Dame adds another page to its NCAA tournament lore with a classic 3-2 round-of-16 win at fourth-ranked North Carolina. The Irish stun the Fetzer Field crowd with two goals in the first 13 minutes, as Bock scores off a Weissenhofer flip throw-in at 12:44 and Weissenhofer picks off a weak UNC backpass for an unas-

sisted score 14 seconds later (the quickest two-goal flurry in NCAA Championship history). The Tar Heels get one back on a penalty kick early in the second half, but Weissenhofer pots the eventual gamewinner at 60:19, and Karas comes up with numerous big stops in the closing moments to preserve the victory. A week later back at Alumni Field the Irish shade Duke 3-2 on Hanks' 78thminute goal to book their ninth College Cup appearance.

Sept. 5 – Notre Dame fires the first big shot of the season off the right foot of Bock, whose goal in the 51st minute proved to the difference in a 1-0 win at No. 3 North Carolina in the first round of the Carolina Classic. The victory made the Irish the first visiting team ever to post multiple shutouts over the Tar Heels at Fetzer Field, while also extending Notre Dame's season-opening shutout streak to four in a row, the second-longest run in school history behind the '95 championship squad's eight consecutive whitewashes.

Oct. 5 - For the one and only time in the '08 regular season, top-ranked Notre Dame has to play from behind, as visiting Marquette scores at the 59:06 mark. However, the deficit lasts just two minutes before Bock erupts for a pair of goals in an 86-second span on the way to a 3-1 Irish victory. Hanks capped the win with a penalty kick in the 88th minute, becoming Notre Dame's career points leader in the process.

Nov. 9 - No Hanks, no Bock, no problem for the Irish, as No. 1 Notre Dame wins its 10th BIG EAST tournament title with a 1-0 overtime win over Connecticut at Alumni Field. Freshman forward Melissa Henderson proves to be the hero, scoring 6:58 into the first extra session as the Irish overcame the loss of their two All-America offensive threats who were sidelined with injuries. Henderson is named the tournament's Most Outstanding Offensive Player, while Dew collects Most Outstanding Defensive Player honors.

Nov. 21 - On a bitterly cold night at Alumni Field, topranked Notre Dame outlasts a stern challenge from Minnesota to win its NCAA tournament third-round game, 1-0 in overtime. Hanks buries a penalty kick at 6:58 into the extra period, then disappears in a sideline snowbank under a pile of Irish players, providing one of the truly signature moments of the '08 campaign. A week later, Hanks makes women's soccer history with a pair of assists in the NCAA quarterfinal win over Florida State, becoming the first Division I player ever to record 73 goals and 73 assists

Dec. 5 - Henderson and fellow rookie Courtney Barg team up for a 15th-minute goal, the only score in No. 1 Notre Dame's 1-0 College Cup semifinal win over thirdranked Stanford. Junior goalkeeper Kelsey Lysander turns in the best performance of her career with seven saves, as the Irish earn their school-record 26th consecutive victory and seventh trip to the NCAA title match.

Dec. 7 - Hanks locks up her historic second Hermann Trophy and sets an NCAA finals record with her goal just 16 seconds into the national championship match against fourth-ranked North Carolina. However, Notre Dame's bid for its first 27-0-0 "perfect season" and a third national title are spoiled by two second-half UNC goals, the latter coming via a deflected cross with 2:06 remaining that gave the Tar Heels a 2-1 win.

Notre Dame's 1995 Dream Season Ends With National Championship

The 1995 Notre Dame women's soccer season was described by national coach of the year Chris Petrucelli as a season that "ended the way we all had dreamed about." With wins over perennial power North Carolina in the NCAA semifinals and Portland in the title game (both 1-0), Notre Dame had become just the third school ever to win an NCAA women's soccer title (dating back to 1982).

The season's dream began with Notre Dame putting the opposition to sleep, as the Irish outscored their opponents 36-0 on their way to an 8-0 record. The women's soccer squad participated in the first BIG EAST competition for any Notre Dame team, defeating Providence in the opener - followed by a win over St. John's and three shutouts of Big Ten foes Indiana, No. 13 Wisconsin and No. 19 Michigan State.

Notre Dame moved to 6-0 with a 1-0 win over No. 3 Stanford (on a rare goal by sophomore midfielder Holly Manthei, who went on to become the NCAA all-time assist leader), followed by BIG EAST wins over Rutgers and Seton Hall that pushed the season shot advantage

Sophomore midfielder Julie Maund's goal at the 88:17 mark averted a loss at Cincinnati (the game ended in a 2-2 tie) while an 82nd-minute goal from senior forward Rosella Guerrero set up an overtime gamewinner for junior midfielder Cindy Daws, in a 2-1 game with Ohio State

A 2-2-2 stretch continued in the BIG EAST showdown with Connecticut, as freshman forward Monica Gerardo's goal in the 82nd minute forced overtime (3-3) - with the Huskies winning 5-4 under the old "nonsudden-death" format. The loss was Notre Dame's first at home since Oct. 4, 1992, and ended a 29-game conference winning streak for the Irish.

Another Gerardo goal produced a 1-0 win over No. 7 Santa Clara, with the grueling six-game stretch concluding in Houston against No. 11 Duke (2-2) and No. 1 North Carolina (0-2). Yet another late goal (by junior forward Amy VanLaecke, at 89:26) saved the day versus

"At that point, we had lost our focus on defending," said Petrucelli. "We got so carried away in trying to score goals that we forgot there was another part of the game. We needed to put a lot of work into our team

After the loss to UNC, the Irish defense – led by junior goalkeeper Jen Renola – yielded just three goals in the final 11 games, including shutouts in all six postseason

The next big test for the refocused Irish was a rematch against Connecticut in the BIG EAST title game, with the newcomer Notre Dame blanking the reigning BIG EAST power 1-0 (on an early VanLaecke goal).

"The win over UConn helped our confidence and made us believe," said Petrucelli. "We were able to refocus and commit to everything needed to win. We had talked about winning, but we were not doing everything that it took."

The Irish defense continued its postseason shutout streak, led by Renola and the starting defender formation of sophomore Kate Sobrero, junior Kate Fisher and senior Ashley Scharff.

The Irish were seeded No. 4 in the NCAA tournament, using four first-half goals and a hat trick from freshman midfielder Shannon Boxx for a 5-0 win over Wisconsin in the second round. Notre Dame then knocked off UConn in the third round (2-0), with goals from senior defender Julie Vogel and VanLaecke.

Playing on its home field in the semifinals, UNC car-

ried a 10-year, 31-game NCAA tournament win streak into its game vs. Notre Dame.

The Irish came out sharp and loose, pressuring from the start. That pressure led to the only goal, in the 20th minute, when UNC's Cindy Parlow headed a cross out of the goal area. Daws then headed it back toward the goal and Parlow's attempt to redirect the ball sent it into her own net for the 1-0 score.

A stunned crowd of 7,212, at that time the largest ever to attend a collegiate women's soccer game, watched as the Irish defense shut down the potent Tar

Returning to the title game, Notre Dame encountered 125 scoreless minutes before Daws surprised Portland goalkeeper Erin Fahey, after senior forward Michelle McCarthy had been fouled outside the top of the box. Daws quickly sent the direct kick into the back of the net - ending the exhausting game and completing Notre Dame's dreamlike run to the 1995 national

"The thing that came out of this season was that we found out how much character our team really had," said Petrucelli. "Instead of packing it in, we fought back."

A four-month quest for the 2004 national title saw the Notre Dame women's soccer team navigate its way through the season with a nearly perfect record. The odyssey began Aug. 10, with an eight-day training trip in the soccer-crazed nation of Brazil. On the final night of the team's stay, head coach Randy Waldrum reflected on the trip.

"I don't think they want to leave," said Waldrum on that final night at the Vitoria Hotel, a dorm-like atmosphere for the Irish players.

"I already can tell this is a group who truly enjoys being together," predicted the veteran of 22 previous seasons as a college coach. "They want to achieve great success for one another. That's a great starting point for

Fast forward to Cary, N.C - 117 days after the departure for Brazil - as Notre Dame faced UCLA in the NCAA final. It marked the end of a season filled with individual feats and team domination, as the Irish made a strong case for being the nation's top all-around program.

Notre Dame, the second D-I women's soccer team to win multiple titles, spent six weeks as the No. 1-ranked team and finished with a team-record victory total (25-1-1) that had been bested by just three teams in NCAA

Three All-Americans – fifth-year central defender Melissa Tancredi, junior forward Katie Thorlakson and sophomore midfielder Jen Buczkowski – led a talented starting 11 that included another first team all-BIG EAST player (Freshman All-America forward Amanda Cinalli) and three named third team all-BIG EAST: senior forward Candace Chapman, sophomore midfielder Jill Krivacek and sophomore left back Christie Shaner.

Junior midfielder Annie Schefter helped in dominating the possession while the stout back line also included senior central defender Gudrun Gunnarsdottir and sophomore right back Kim Lorenzen. Junior goalkeeper Erika Bohn - who joined Schefter as 2004 Academic All-Americans - rarely was tested but she stopped three total PKs in the title game.

The eventual national champs rose above injuries to Randi Scheller, Mary Boland and Susan Pinnick (among others) that totaled 109 games - plus the absence of another top offensive player, Kerri Hanks (Under-19 World Championship). Boland was lost early with a

broken leg but Thorlakson responded with an historic season (23 goals-24 assists) while Chapman (12G) also picked up the slack after shifting from right back to forward. Cinalli added 10 goals, as the first Irish freshman with double-digit goals since 2000.

Notre Dame's pressing style led to the Irish totaling nearly as many goals (70) as opponent shots on goal (71) while allowing just 1.8 corner kicks/gm. The Irish led the nation in shutouts (16) and ranked fifth in goalsagainst avg. (0.51).

Thorlakson and Tancredi were among the final- 15 candidates for the Hermann Trophy and stood out as the nation's most dominant players at their positions. Thorlakson earned several player-of-the year honors in a season that included: 3G-2A in the first half of the opener vs. Baylor; 3G-2A in the second half of the 5-2 win over #4 Santa Clara (ND record for points vs. top-25 team); an 11-game point streak to end the season; ND records for points in a game (4G-2A, vs. St. John's) and in one postseason (27); 70 total points (two shy of the ND record); and scoring/assisting on 24 of the final 28 goals. Former UNC great Mia Hamm remains the only player ever to total more goals and more assists in a season

Early highlights included Schefter's 82nd-minute PK to beat Stanford (1-0) and a 2-1 win at Arizona State, as the Irish overcame an early deficit and 100-degree heat. Cinalli's 84th-minute goal later produced a 1-0 win at UConn and the Irish pulled away at West Virginia (3-1) - before Buczkowski scored in the final minute at Georgetown (2-1) and volleyed in a cross from Ashley Jones to beat Boston College (1-0).

Krivacek headed in a Thorlakson corner kick to defeat Wisconsin in the final regulation minute of that NCAA second-round game (1-0), followed by a 2-0 win over UConn and the 3-1 quarterfinal with Portland (two goals by Cinalli, one by Thorlakson). Thorlakson and Chapman then worked a classic give-and-go in the 73rd minute, as the Irish edged Santa Clara in the semifinals (1-0).

Bohn needed to make just five saves in the first five NCAA games but she stopped six shots in the title game, with the only UCLA score coming on an owngoal early in the second half. Thorlakson tied the game on a 73rd-minute PK and Bohn then saved a PK late in regulation. The first five shootout rounds saw UCLA miss


twice (one saved by Bohn) while little-used senior Sarah Halpenny preceded Buczkowski and Schefter in making their shots. Krivacek then converted in sudden-death PKs, Bohn dove to her left for yet another save – and the Irish were the 2004 national champions.


Notre Dame Women's Soccer – 2004 National Champions

SPORTS The Notre Dame women's soccer team won the 2004 NCAA title at SAS Stadium in Cary, N.C., besting Santa Clara in the semifinals (1-0) and UCLA in the 1-1 title game that extended to a penalty-kick shootout. Candace Chapman (#8) and Katie Thorlakson (#7) worked a textbook give-and-go play for the 73rd-minute goal vs. SCU (sequence depicted on the left). The key moments from the decisive PK shootout vs. UCLA are shown on the far right and include (from top to bottom) converted kicks by Sarah Halpenny, Jen Buczkowski, Annie Schefter and Jill Krivacek – plus a pair of saves by Erika Bohn (UCLA was National champs wide on an earlier try, as the Irish won 4-3 in six kicks). Forwards Candace Chapman (#8), Katie Thorlakson (#7) and Amanda Cinalli (#5) combined to score 45 goals in 2004. and Jen Buczkowski (#9) led Notre Dame's season-

The Irish held coach Randy Waldrum to his promise by shaving his head after the triumphant return to campus, with Mary Boland the first off the bus carrying the trophy (Melissa Tancredi also soaked in the glory, far right).

The stout back line of Kim Lorenzen (#4), Melissa Tancredi (#17), Gudrun Gunnarsdottir (#2) and Christie Shaner (#18) helped





hold the opposition to 14 goals in 27 games during the 2004 season.

Notre Dame Players Shine on World Cup Teams

The success and impact of the Notre Dame women's soccer program has not been limited to the collegiate level. Notre Dame had a presence at the past three FIFA Women's World Cups, particularly in the 1999 World Cup won by the homestanding United States. Former three-time All-American Kate (Sobrero) Markgraf played a key role in helping the U.S. claim its second World Cup in '99, as a starting defender and one of the youngest players on the roster. Sobrero started five of six games, missing only the North Korea game when she rested a sore ankle after the U.S. already had clinched the top spot in its pool.


Former high-scoring Notre Dame forward Monica Gerardo and 2002 graduate Monica Gonzalez (a former forward who converted to a defender role) represented Mexico in that country's first appearance in the World Cup in '99. The Irish pair both started Mexico's first World Cup game against Brazil, while Gerardo – who wrapped up her career at Notre Dame following the 1998 season – also started against Italy. Four-time All-America midfielder Holly Manthei's earlier appearance with the U.S. national team in the 1995 World Cup in Stockholm, Sweden, marked the first World Cup duty for a Notre Dame women's soccer player. The second-youngest player on the team following her freshman season at Notre Dame in 1995, Manthei played in two games for the third-place Americans, including a reserve stint in a 3-3 tie with China and a start in the 4-1 win over Australia. Sobrero and former Notre Dame defensive midfielder Shannon Boxx played for the U.S. third-place team at the 2003 World Cup (also played in the U.S.), with Boxx selected to the prestigious All-World Cup team. Recent Notre Dame standout Candace Chapman was set to start for Canada at flank midfielder but had to miss the 2003 World Cup due to injury.

The Notre Dame women's soccer program once again was well-represented on multiple national teams at the 2007 World Cup in China. Boxx (recovering from an '06 knee injury) and Sobrero ('07 pregnancy) were not at 100 percent entering the tournament, but both started every match except the group-play win over Sweden (Boxx was a halftime substitute) and the third-place win over Norway (neither played), with Boxx scoring in a 3-0 quarterfinal win over England. Chapman, along with fellow former Notre Dame standouts Melissa Tancredi (2000-04) and Katie Thorlakson (2002-05) nearly helped Canada get out of group play, but an injury-time goal by Australia in the final groupplay game gave it a 2-2 draw and a pass to the quarterfinals. Chapman scored Canada's first goal of the tournament (in a 2-1 loss to Norway), while Tancredi scored 37 seconds into the Australia contest, the second-fastest goal in tournament history.



Kate Sobrero (top left and middle) played a key role on defense to help the United States win the 1999 FIFA Women's World Cup and was joined by her former Notre Dame teammate Shannon Boxx (top right) as a starter on the 2003 U.S. World Cup team. Holly Manthei (bottom right) became the first Notre Dame women's soccer player to play in the World Cup after her appearance in the 1995 World Cup. Monica Gonzalez (bottom middle) and Monica Gerardo (bottom left) both played for Mexico in the 1999 World Cup while three other former Notre Dame standouts — Candace Chapman, Melissa Tancredi and Katie Thorlakson — competed in the 2007 World Cup with Canada. Boxx and Sobrero, who now plays under her married name of Kate Markgraf, likewise were among the top players for the U.S. as they finished third at the 2007 WWC.



Former Notre Dame All-American and Academic All-American Monica Gonzalez was a founding member of the Mexican Women's National Team and captained her squad to an historic win over Canada in Olympic qualifying (2-1), followed by a 1-1 tie vs. China at the 2004 Athens Olympics that helped Mexico reach the quarterfinals.

While Mexico did not qualify for the 2008 Beijing Games, Canada earned its first-ever Olympic bid and was led to its own quarterfinal berth by former Irish All-Americans Candace Chapman (who scored her country's first-ever Olympic goal pictured at left) and Melissa Tancredi.

Notre Dame Well-Represented on National Teams

While Notre Dame players clearly have established themselves among the best in the college game, they also have showcased their talents on both the national and international levels. In the past 17 years, the Irish have been represented by numerous players on the various national teams who have traveled around the world. Notre Dame head coach Randy Waldrum also has been active on the international level, first as an assistant with the U.S. national team program for seven years, and then in the summer of 2008 as the head coach of the Trinidad & Tobago U-17 national team that ended up one win shy of qualifying for the inaugural FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

The Notre Dame women's soccer program has become a fixture in Women's Professional Soccer (WPS), with no fewer than 12 former Irish players — the second-most from any NCAA Division I school — earning a place on opening day rosters in the league's brief twoyear history. Leading the way are U.S. National Team veterans and WPS All-Stars Shannon Boxx and Kate Markgraf, with Boxx having led the Los Angeles Sol to the inaugural WPS regular season championship in 2009, playing alongside two other former Notre Dame players in Brittany Bock and Christie Shaner. The Sol also played host to the first WPS Championship Game, where they were upset 1-0 by Sky Blue FC, with former Irish standouts Jen Buczkowski and Kerri Hanks earning championship gold with the New Jersey-based club.

Bock and Hanks were among four Notre Dame players from the dominating 2008 NCAA national runner-up squad selected among the top 21 picks in the inaugural WPS Draft in January 2009. After Bock and Hanks went in the first round (fifth and seventh, respectively), Carrie Dew was taken early in the second round (12th overall) by FC Gold Pride, which is

Five different Notre Dame women's soccer players - midfielder Cindy Daws (1996), goalkeeper Jen Renola (1996), midfielder Anne Makinen (1998 and 2000) and forwards Katie Thorlakson (2004) and Kerri Hanks (2006 and 2008) – each have received a major national player-of-the-year honor during the past 14 seasons (1996-2009). Most notably, Notre Dame is one of only two women's soccer programs ever to produce four or more different recipients of the prestigious M.A.C./Hermann Trophy (Daws, Makinen and Hanks twice).

Hermann Trophy

The Hermann Trophy is named after Robert Hermann, founding Chairman of the North American Soccer League. First presented in 1967, the Hermann honors the best college soccer player as determined by a panel made up of more than 500 coaches and journalists. The Hermann Trophy merged with the M.A.C. Award in 2002.

Katie Thorlakson turned in one of the top all-around offensive seasons in women's soccer history during the 2004 season, totaling 23 goals and 24 assists while leading the Irish to the program's second national title (former UNC great Mia Hamm in the only Division I player ever to total more goals and more assists – in the same season – than Thorlakson's 2004 output). Despite her historic season, Thorlakson surprisingly was not among the three finalists for the 2004 M.A.C./Hermann Trophy, but she was recognized by Soccer America as its 2004 national player of the year. ESPN similarly honored Thorlakson by selecting her as one of five finalists (and the only soccer player among the finalists) for the 2004-05 "ESPY" in the category of best female college athlete. Thorlakson went on to be a finalist for the 2005 M.A.C./Hermann player-of-the-year award.

The past 18 seasons of Notre Dame women's soccer (1992-2009) have produced a rich tradition of elite players, led by 22 who have combined for 47 All-America seasons:

- · Only 23 players in the 28-year history of Division I women's soccer who have been NSCAA four-year All-Americans and four are Notre Dame players: midfielders Holly Manthei (1994-97) and Anne Makinen (1997-2000), defender Jen Grubb (1996-99) and forward Kerri Hanks (2005-08). This quartet also represents the only four ND players to be NSCAA All-Americans as freshmen and sophomores.
- Four others midfielder Cindy Daws ('93, '94, '96), goalkeeper Jen Renola ('94-'96), defender Kate Sobrero ('95-'97) and midfielder Jen Buczkowski ('04-'06) – have been three-time All-Americans while five have been NSCAA All-Americans twice: midfielder/forward Jenny Streiffer ('96, '99), defenders Candace Chapman ('02, '05) and Melissa Tancredi ('03-'04), forward Katie Thorlakson ('04-'05) and midfielder/forward Brittany Bock ('07-'08).
- Renola ('96), defender Monica Gonzalez ('02), Bock ('07) and Lauren Fowlkes ('09) are part of an exclusive group of 52 student-athletes in ND history to earn All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season -Renola and Bock also are two of just 12 ND student-athletes to do it twice (Streiffer received both honors but never in the same season, garnering Academic All-America status in '97 and '98).
- Daws (3), Hanks (3) and Renola (2) are Notre Dame's only multiple first-team NSCAA All-Americans, with Daws also remaining the only ND freshman ever to be a first team NSCAA All-American.
- · Notre Dame players have been named NSCAA All-Americans every year since 1992, including 14 years with multiple All-Americans (at least two every season since 2003, with a total of 18 from 2003-09). There have been eight Notre Dame seasons with three-plus NSCAA All-Americans (led by six in 1996).
- The positions of forward, midfielder and defender each have produced at least six different Irish NSCAA All-Americans (not counting Streiffer and Bock, who were All-Americans as midfielders and forwards).






2004 College Cup SAS Soccer Stadium (Cary, N.C.)



Marathon Moment

Notre Dame entered its 1999 NCAA quarterfinal at 4th-ranked Nebraska expecting a tight game. The Irish had trailed Nebraska in the second half of the 1998 NCAA third round at Alumni Field before scoring twice for the win - and their meeting in the 1997 second round was closer than the 6-0 final. But on Nov. 28, 1999, nobody expected a four-overtime game that lasted 150 minutes and ended in a 1-1 tie. Jenny Streiffer scored 90 seconds into the game but Karina LeBlanc kept the Irish out of the net for the next 148:30. Nebraska tied the game in the 18th minute and the marathon was set, as LeBlanc and LaKeysia Beene did not yield any more scoring to set up the shootout.

Streiffer converted into the lower left corner while Beene dove low and to her left to save Kelly Rheem's try in the first round of the penalty kicks. Both teams converted in round-2 (Jenny Heft upper left, Meghan Anderson lower right) while both round-3 kicks grazed the posts - as the shot by Notre Dame's Anne Makinen missed off the left post while Christine Latham's skimmed off the same post and went into the net.


The shootout was tied (2-2) entering round-4 when LeBlanc dove to her right and saved Monica Gonzalez's low shot. The Huskers had a chance to win by converting their final two attempts - but Sharlota Nonen's try sailed over the crossbar. Both teams found the net in round-5 (Jen Grubb upper right, Jenny Benson

lower right), forcing an extra round. Omaha native Kelly Lindsey – a defender with no points all season – gave the Irish a 4-3 lead (lower right) and Beene reached left to save Amy Walsh's attempt, extending the Notre Dame run that would reach all the way to the NCAA final.





Notre Dame's Hat Trick History

Notre Dame players have combined to score 64 hat tricks in 22 seasons, including at least one every year except 2001. Jenny Heft and Kerri Hanks share the school record with six career hat tricks, while Melissa Henderson is the only current Irish player with a three-goal game (three to date). Hanks kicked off her career in grand fashion with a hat trick in the 2005 opener against New Hampshire, setting a new Notre Dame record for the earliest hat trick in a season, based on date (Aug. 26) and joining Rosella Guerrero as the only Irish freshmen to register a hat trick in their debut games. 

Notre Dame would establish many firsts for Catholic institutions of higher learning, including the first Catholic law school, the first Catholic engineering school and the first student residence with private rooms, Sorin Hall.

Academics

- The University is organized into four colleges Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering and the Mendoza College of Business — the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, six major research institutes, more than 40 centers and special programs and the University library system.
- Notre Dame is rated among the nation's top-25 institutions of higher learning in surveys conducted by U.S. News and World Report, Princeton Review, Time, Kiplinger's and Kaplan/Newsweek.
- The Mendoza College of Business is ranked #1 among the nation's top undergraduate business schools by Bloomberg BusinessWeek.
- Notre Dame is among a select group of schools that ranks in the top 30 on the U.S. News & World Report survey of the nation's top colleges and in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors' Cup for overall success in athletics.

Students

- Graduate and undergraduate students at the University come from all 50 states 100 countries
- Notre Dame's graduation rate of 95 percent is exceeded by only Harvard and Princeton.
- Notre Dame's 98 percent retention rate between the freshman and sophomore years is among the highest in the country, thanks in large part to the University's unique First Year of Studies Program.
- Notre Dame has one of the highest undergraduate residential concentrations of any national university, with 80 percent of its students living in 29 residence halls.

Service

- Community service is a hallmark of Notre Dame. About 80 percent of Notre Dame students engage in some form of voluntary community service during their years at the University, and at least 10 percent devote a year or more after graduation to service in the United States and around the world.
- The University's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) annually sends 180 recent graduates to teach in some 100 understaffed Catholic schools in the southern, southeastern and southwestern United States and in South Bend. A national model, ACE has received the Higher Education Award from the Corporation for National Service for leadership in using national service resources through AmeriCorps.
