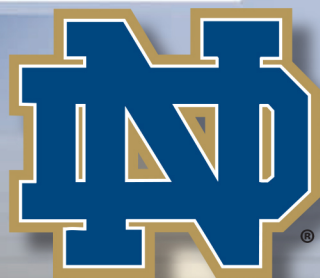

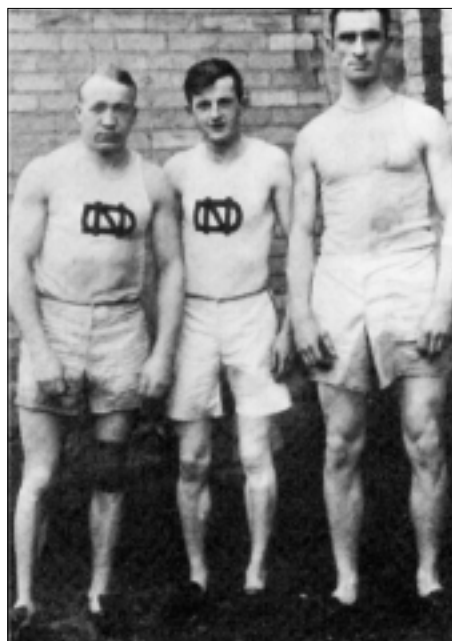
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Academic All-Americans – The 2006-07 season proved to be a banner one, both on the fields of competition and in the classroom, for the Notre Dame track & field/cross country program. The Irish had four student-athletes earn *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors, led by middle distance runner Thomas Chamney, who was a first-team selection in 2007 after picking up third-team plaudits in '06.

Chamney became the fifth Irish track and field athlete to be tabbed a two-time Academic All-American and the fourth to earn first-team honors. The three-time All-American on the track earned a Bachelor's Degree from the College of Arts and Letters in 2007, graduating with a 3.56 cumulative grade point average in English.

Joining Chamney as 2007 Academic All-Americans were sprinter Maryann Erigha and distance harriers Sunni Olding and Todd Ptacek. The honors were the first for each athlete. Erigha was also awarded an Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar Award (first team) along with fellow sprinter Okechi Ogbuokiri (fourth team), and was a recipient of Notre Dame's Byron V. Kanaley Award for exemplary scholarship and leadership among senior monogram winners.

Through the years, the Notre Dame track & field/cross country program has produced 20 student-athletes who have been awarded a place on the *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-America Team a total of 26 times. The program has been especially strong the past four seasons, as ten athletes have combined to garner 14 Academic All-America certificates, including four first-team berths.

All-America Streak – Irish runners have a proven record in national championship meets, as evidenced by their current line of All-America citations.

The Irish men's track & field team is on a streak of 17 years (1990-2007) with at least one competitor earning All-America honors (the Irish have amassed 166 All-America honors since 1921). The Notre Dame women's track & field team has enjoyed at least one All-America performance each season since 1997 (ten-year streak) and 38 overall since 1994.

All-American (Two Sports) – Former Irish great Raghib "Rocket" Ismail is part of an exclusive group of four student-athletes who have combined All-America honors in football and another sport during their Notre Dame careers. Ismail was a two-time consensus first-team All-American in football (1989, 1990) and also earned All-America honors on the track as a sprinter in 1991.

The other members of this elite club are: Edward "Moose" Krause (football 1932; basketball 1932-34), Dick Arrington (football 1965; wrestling 1966) and Bob Golic (football 1977-78; wrestling 1978-79).

Recently-departed high jumper Emily Loomis narrowly missed becoming the first female student-athlete in school history to join this group. She earned her first track All-America citation with a tie for eighth place in the outdoor high jump at the 2006 NCAA Championship, in addition to earning honorable mention All-America laurels in volleyball following the 2003 campaign. Technically, Notre Dame has not considered honorable mention selections in its final count of All-Americans.

Aragon – Former Irish track and cross country standout Dr. Chuck Aragon was presented with the Spirit of Notre Dame Award during the Notre Dame-Michigan game in the fall of 1992. The award, sponsored by Maxwell

House and General Foods, recognized Notre Dame athletes, past and present, who distinguished themselves in competition, demonstrated the "Spirit of Notre Dame" and exhibited the ideals of the University. Aragon captained both the Notre Dame cross country and track teams during his career (1977-81) and was the first Irish sub-four-minute miler. An All-American and bronze medalist in the 1,500 meters at the Pan Am Games, he placed fourth in the 1984 Olympic Trials. Aragon, who completed his residency in anesthesiology, donated many hours to the Logan Center while at Notre Dame.

Back to the Bend – Although the Irish won their only cross country national championship in 1957, the bus ride home from East Lansing, Mich., was anything but a celebration. In 26-degree weather, the Irish upset heavily-favored Michigan State, but when coach Alex Wilson added up the team's score of 121 points, he felt the score was extremely high to contend for the title. As a result, he and his team packed up and took the bus back to South Bend. About halfway home the stunning news came over the bus radio, Notre Dame had defeated Michigan State by six points.

Coaching Tree – Although one of Notre Dame's oldest varsity programs (dating back to 1890), the Irish track and field team didn't bring on its first coach until 1916, when Knute Rockne took the job. He held that position until 1927, starting a trend of stability among Irish track coaches.

Current Notre Dame track & field coach Joe Piane is perhaps the best example of this, as he is in his 33rd year at the helm of the Irish. Piane is the longest-tenured coach among

active mentors at Notre Dame, with men's swimming coach Tim Welsh next in line with his 22nd season on tap in 2007-08.

Deeter – JoAnna Deeter ended her career as one of the best women's cross country and track and field runners in Irish history. A native of Glen Ellyn, Ill., Deeter earned All-America status twice for cross country in 1996 and 1998 and three times in track & field, all in 1999. Included in her accomplishments were two then-school records - the indoor and outdoor 3,000 and the 10,000.

Fifth – One-fifth of a mile (approx. 320 meters) is the length of the Meyo Track, the largest collegiate indoor surface in the country and the home track for the Irish indoor teams. First opened in 1988, the track was named for Ray and Marie Meyo of Brecksville, Ohio, and is made of the Mondo track surface featuring six 42-inch lanes.

The Meyo Track has established itself as one of the fastest surfaces in the nation and welcomes a number of high-class athletes in a "last chance" meet (the Alex Wilson Invitational) who are attempting to qualify for the NCAA Indoor Championship. The Meyo Invitational, which features the "Meyo Mile" (a special race that features many of the top milers in the nation) and the Alex Wilson

Invitational are fixtures on the Notre Dame indoor track & field schedule each season.

Football Players – The Notre Dame football and track & field programs are two of the oldest varsity sports on the Irish campus. There have been a number of football stars who have crossed over to the track, or the field, and left an impression on the track and field program. Just a glance at the Notre Dame track and field record book shows the effect that football players have had on it. Raghib "Rocket" Ismail, who finished second in the Heisman Trophy balloting in 1990, holds the school record for the indoor 55 meters and finished as an All-American in 1991.

Former Irish defensive back Allen Rossum (now a standout return specialist with the NFL's Atlanta Falcons) currently holds the school record in the indoor 60 meters (6.68), former running back Randy Kinder set the indoor 200-meter record in 21.11, former receiver Ryan Postel owns the indoor 400-meter record (47.01) and former halfback

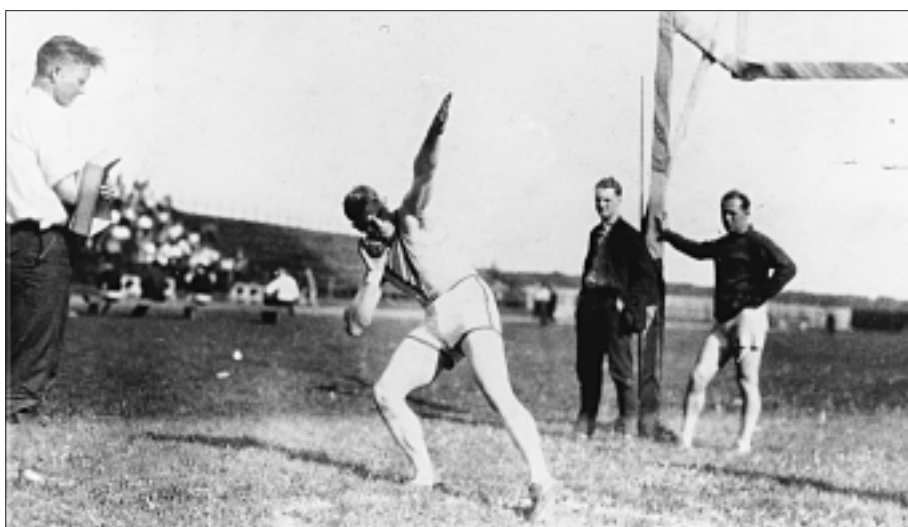
Aubrey Lewis holds the top mark in the 400-meter hurdles (50.2).

Some football players who also earned monograms on the track include 1987 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Brown, Jack Elder, Edward "Moose" Krause, Elmer Layden, Dean Lytle, Ryan Mihalko (the school-record holder in the javelin), Dwight Ellick, Terrail Lambert (still active in football), Creighton Miller and Knute Rockne.

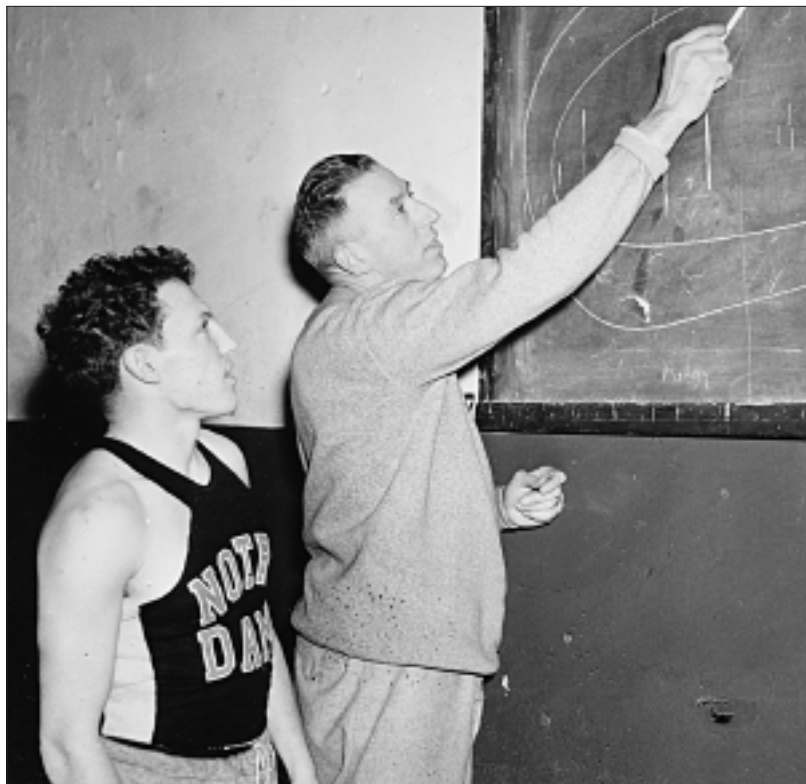
Ghana – The impact of Notre Dame track can be felt around the world as evidenced by William P. Mahoney, an Irish alumnus who served as the U.S. ambassador to Ghana under the Kennedy Administration. A sprinter for coach John Nicholson, Mahoney took over the coaching duties when Nicholson died in 1940. Mahoney guided the team to an unofficial victory in the Drake Relays before he entered the Navy in 1942.

Golden Anniversary – The 2006 season marked the 51st running of the Notre Dame Invitational cross country meet, one of the nation's oldest and largest intercollegiate races. The invitational was started by former Irish head coach Alex Wilson in 1956 as a four-mile race, extended to five miles in 1968 and a women's competition added in 1987. Notre Dame has won the men's event 15 times (most recently in 2003) and the women's race on six occasions (also last doing so in 2003).

Heisman – Achieving success on both the track and the football field was the trademark of former Irish runners Tim Brown and Raghib "Rocket" Ismail. Brown won the 1987 Heisman Trophy in addition to running with the track team during the offseason. Brown owned the school record in the 55 meters until 1990 when '90 Heisman runner-up Ismail ran 6.07 in the event, and eventually went on to earn track All-America honors by finishing second in the 1991 NCAA indoor 55 meters.

Hurd – Dr. Bill Hurd was honored in 2002 at the annual Notre Dame Monogram Club dinner with the Moose Krause Distinguished Service Award, the highest honor presented by the Monogram Club. A world-class sprinter and 1969 Notre Dame graduate with a degree in electrical engineering, Hurd now is a noted eye surgeon, with an ophthalmology practice in Memphis that specializes in cataract, glaucoma and diabetic treatment and keratorefractive surgery.

Hurd annually spends 2-3 weeks providing voluntary eye surgery to the poor in Africa, Mexico and Brazil. On the most recent trip to Madagascar, he and two other doctors saw 1,100 patients in 10 days and he performed 35 eye surgeries – with Hurd and his colleagues increasingly in demand as their reputation grows.

Hurd's days of distinction as a collegian included being named Notre Dame's "athlete of the year" for 1967-68 and establishing the American indoor record in the 300-yard dash (29.8). He set eight Notre Dame records and totaled five All-America finishes at the 1968 and '69 NCAA meets (only two Notre Dame student-athletes ever have totaled more All-America honors).

He also was a finalist (top eight) at the Olympic Trials in the 100 and 200 meters, finishing fifth in the 100 to just miss a spot on the Olympic squad (his competitors included the likes of Jim Hines, John Carlos, Tommy Smith and Mel Gray).

Hurd – who added graduate degrees from Massachusetts Institute of Technology (master's in management science) and Meaharry Medical School in Nashville – was a Rhodes Scholarship regional finalist and received Notre Dame's Harvey Foster Award in 1992 (recognizing alumni for distinguished civic activity) and the NCAA's prestigious Silver Anniversary Award in 1994 (recognizing career success and community service). He holds two U.S./foreign patents for optical devices, including a slit-lamp, mountable intraocular biometer.

Also an accomplished jazz musician, Hurd recently completed work on his fourth CD, in which he plays the saxophone and flute.

Hurd and his wife Rhynette, an attorney, have sent both of their sons to Notre Dame. One of his sons, Ryan, was a four-year monogram winner on the Irish track & field team from 2001-04.

Jinx – Although Irish great Greg Rice is widely regarded as one of the best distance runners of all time, his coach only saw him race once during his Notre Dame career. Coach John Nicholson superstitiously felt he jinxed Rice during races and therefore stayed in South Bend while Rice traveled to meets. The only race Nicholson saw was perhaps one of Rice's finest as he outdueled Taisto Maki and Don Lash to win a three-mile race in 13:52.2. Unfortunately, the race would also be Nicholson's last as the coach died two days later from complications of a heart attack that he suffered just hours before the competition.

Krause Stadium – The outdoor home of the Irish track team, the 5,000-seat Krause Stadium is located behind the Joyce Center. The Monogram Track features eight 48-inch lanes on the curves and nine lanes on the front stretch. Consisting of Mondo track material, the Monogram Track features the same surface used in the 1992 Summer Olympics in Barcelona, Spain.

Lieb – Tom Lieb, an Irish shot put thrower in the early 20's, is credited with introducing the spin-style delivery to the sport, a style which is still used today. Lieb won the NCAA title in the event during the 1923 and 1924 seasons.

Loftus Center/Guglielmino Athletics Complex – Notre Dame first utilized the Loftus Center in October of 1987 and is enjoying its 21st full season of use in 2007-08. The indoor facility is highlighted by Meyo Field, a Prestige Turf surface installed in 2003 that is shared with several Irish field sport teams, including the football and lacrosse programs. The Loftus Center is connected to the recently-completed Guglielmino Athletics Complex, which features the 25,000-square foot Haggard Fitness Center, a facility holding more than 250 pieces of weight training equipment, six plasma televisions and a state-of-the-art sound system. It also houses the 150-seat Isban Auditorium as well as plentiful meeting space.

Meyo Invitational – Four minutes, one mile. For years it was the unbreakable barrier and it remains among the most celebrated feats in all

of sport. Folks that know the sport of track and field will tell you that 3:40 in the 1,500 or 7:55 in the 3,000 are just as impressive, but to the casual fan there is something about the simplicity of it; four laps, four minutes, one mile.

In February 2008, the 21st annual Meyo Invitational will return to the Loftus Sports Center on Notre Dame's campus with the marquee event at the meet being the Meyo Mile. In the past five seasons, 13 runners have broken the magical four-minute mark, highlighted by two of the most exciting races at Notre Dame in recent memory.

In 2003, Notre Dame senior Luke Watson won the race in school record time (3:57.83), moving into the lead a mere 30 meters from the finish line. After the dust had settled, the top five in the race were each in under four minutes, each within a half second of the others and each owned one of the five fastest times in the world that year.

The 2005 race turned out to be just as thrilling, with four runners breaking the four-minute barrier, including a pair of Notre Dame athletes (Watson, running unattached, and sophomore Kurt Benninger). All four sub-four minute runners earned automatic qualification to the NCAA Indoor Championship and Benninger's time of 3:58.75 put him less than a second off Watson's school-record mark of two years earlier. Notably, Indiana's Sean and John Jefferson also became the first American brothers to run sub-four minute miles.

The Invitational, as well as the Meyo Mile, are the brainchild of Irish head track & field coach Joe Piane. When the Loftus Center was built, Notre Dame installed a track that was oversized (one-fifth of a mile, or approximately 320 meters) and topped with a Mondo surface, which produced a rare and very fast combination.

Piane recounted the invention of the Invitational, "We put the meet together because it was a huge track and it was attractive to just give it a try. The name comes from Ray Meyo, who donated everything, and we decided to highlight the mile because even the average person knows that a sub-four-minute mile is very good, so we put together a 'four minute challenge' knowing that if the race did go under four minutes, everyone was going to say, 'Wow! This is really something.'"

The Meyo Mile, however will not be the only great event on the weekend. The Meyo Invitational is always packed with outstanding performances from start to finish. In 2007 athletes registered 85 automatic or provisional qualifications for the NCAA Championship, and through the years, numerous track and school records have been shattered. In fact, six meet records and three track marks went by the boards during the 2007 meet alone.

National Champions – Fifteen Irish athletes have won 16 national track titles during the program's history, in addition to the two individual crowns and one team championship in cross

country. The most recent track champion was Ryan Shay, who ran away with the 10,000 meters at the 2001 NCAA Championships in Eugene, Ore.

Before Shay's triumphant victory, Notre Dame's last track & field champion was Tom McMannon who won the 55-meter high hurdles in 1972. Greg Rice (1938) and Oliver Hunter (1942) were individual cross country champions, while coach Alex Wilson's 1957 squad won the NCAA cross country national championship.

Pioneer – Harry M. Jewett was the first recognized Notre Dame track and field athlete, making his debut in 1890 at a relay invitational in Ann Arbor, Mich. The school was next represented in 1898 and the Irish have competed in every year since then with the exception of 1906.

Rockne – The name that has become synonymous with Notre Dame football also was involved in the Irish track scene. After a difficult freshman year as a reserve on the varsity football team, Knute Rockne turned his attention to track where he earned a monogram and, as legend has it, once broke the world record in the indoor pole vault with his best effort of 12-4, but held it for such a brief period that he never received official recognition for it. Rockne became the University's first track coach in 1916 and the first cross country mentor in 1920. During his tenure, Rockne guided five Olympians and two Olympic medalists. The coach resigned his track responsibilities in 1928 to devote his energy to football until his death in 1931.

Roof Top Coaching – Injured by a wild discus throw, John P. Nicholson (Irish track coach from 1927-40) sat on the roof of a car and shouted instructions to his runners through a megaphone during training. The method proved so effective that Nicholson made the car a regular part of his training regimen.

Scholarships – Beginning with the 2004-05 season, all 26 varsity programs at the University of Notre Dame received the full NCAA complement of scholarships.

"Fully scholarshiping all our programs will help us realize our goals over the next five or six years of pushing Notre Dame's athletic program toward a top finish in the annual NACDA Directors' Cup standings," Director of Athletics Kevin White says.

"This eventually will put all of our programs in position to compete for national championships."

Starting Blocks – John P. Nicholson bestowed upon the track world perhaps his greatest innovation, the starting block. His starting block caught on in the late 1920s and was well-received by the track community.

"You have a device which will materially make short distance, hurdle and relay racing more popular with both the public and athletes," wrote former Illinois coach Harry Gill in a 1929 letter. "It appears to be a real help to track athletics."

John Griffith, former chairman of the NCAA track & field rules committee and commissioner of the Big Ten Conference, was equally impressed in a letter written the same year.

"I have studied the pictures of your new starting device with a great deal of interest, and am of the opinion that you have made a distinct contribution to track athletics."

Sub-four – Jake Watson made history on June 2nd, 2007 at the Music City Distance Carnival. It was there that he ran 3:59.4 over one mile, breaking the elusive four-minute barrier, but even more notably, joined his older brother Luke as just the second pair of brothers in American history to run sub-four minute miles. Luke, an Irish distance running legend and current assistant coach, first broke the barrier indoors at the 2002 Meyo Invitational. Jake performed the feat after earning his first career All-American honors during the 2007 track and field season. The Watsons (Stillwater, Minn.) join twins Sean and John Jefferson who both broke four minutes in the 2005 Meyo Mile.

Varsity – While the men's track & field and cross country teams are two of the oldest teams at Notre Dame, dating back to the 19th century, the women's program is only in its infancy. The women's cross country team is in its 21st year and owns seven conference titles, including three BIG EAST crowns, all won in the past five seasons. The women's cross country team also has finished among the top 10 at the past four of the past five NCAA Championships, including a third-place outing in 2002 and a fourth-place showing in 2004.

The women's track & field squad enters its 17th season of varsity competition this year and has won seven league championships in that time (three in the BIG EAST) and advanced at least one runner to the NCAA Championship for the tenth consecutive year in 2007. Last season, the Irish won its first-ever Outdoor BIG EAST Championship, edging Louisville 120.5 to 106.5 in a total team effort.



J. Gregory Rice

**All-American
1937-39
Sullivan Award Winner**

Greg Rice, billed as the greatest distance runner the United States has ever produced, was presented with the 1940 Sullivan Trophy as the nation's top amateur athlete after he set a world three-mile record at the national championships. Named "the Little Man with a Big Finish," Rice smashed the world three-mile record with a time of 13:51. He earned All-America honors in the mile in 1937, and also received those honors in the two-mile as he won the event in 1937 and '39 and placed second in 1938.

Rice was undefeated in 65 major indoor and outdoor races in just over three years with 10 world records in six different events. Rice became the first-ever cross country national champion in 1938 when he ran the four-mile course in 20:12.9 to lead the Irish to a second-place team finish.

Born in 1916, Rice died in May of 1991.



Nicholas Sparks

**Monogram Winner
1987-88**

Best-selling author Nicholas Sparks graduated in 1988 and was a two-time monogram winner in track & field. At Notre Dame, Sparks was a member of the 4x800-meter relay team, which still holds the outdoor school record.

After pursuing a variety of jobs after graduation, he wrote his first published novel entitled "The Notebook," which was released in 1996. It became one of only five novels published in the past 35 years that spent more than a year on the *New York Times* hardcover best seller list, and was eventually made into a movie in 2004 starring Ryan Gosling and Rachel McAdams.

His second novel, "Message in a Bottle," was published in 1998 and remained a bestseller for 43 weeks. The film version, starring Kevin Costner, Paul Newman and Robin Wright Penn, opened at number one at the box office and grossed more than \$100 million.

His third novel, "A Walk to Remember," was published in October 1999 and turned into a movie in 2002 starring Mandy Moore.

In 2004, he was honored by Notre Dame with the first-ever Rev. Robert F. Griffin, C.S.C., Award, for establishing an initiative in the University's Creative Writing Program that includes fellowships, internships and an annual Sparks Prize to support a student writer-in-residence.

Nicholas Sparks has been married for 17 years and has five children. He lives in New Bern, N.C., and still runs nine miles a day.



Alex Wilson

**All-American 1930-32
Irish Track Coach 1950-72**

A middle-distance track star at Notre Dame, Alex Wilson is a perfect example of an outstanding athlete and legendary coach.

While at Notre Dame, Wilson was undefeated in the quarter- and half-mile events and set a national indoor record of 49.3 for the 440 in 1932. He set records in both the 440 and 880 races. Wilson also won the Amateur Athletic Union 600 and twice captured the Milrose 600.

In 1928 and 1932, he competed in the Olympics for his native Canada and won a silver in the 800-meter race and a bronze in the 400-meter run in 1932.

In 1950, after 18 years as a successful track and swimming coach at Loyola (Ill.), he returned to coach at Notre Dame. During his 23 years with the Irish, his teams finished in the national top 10 11 times. Wilson guided three track national champions, 28 track and eight cross country All-Americans and led the Irish to the cross country national championship in 1957. His teams appeared in the meet a total of 18 times.

He was voted into the Canadian Track Hall of Fame in 1954 and in 1967 he was elected to the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame for his contributions as a track coach in the United States.

Wilson was also honored as national coach of the year by the NCAA Cross Country Coaches Association in 1972, and an indoor track and field meet is held in his honor each year at Notre Dame.

Wilson died on Dec. 10, 1994, at the age of 87.



Rick Wohlhuter

**All-American 1969-70
U.S. Olympian
Sullivan Award Winner**

Rick Wohlhuter, a two-time Olympian and 1971 Notre Dame graduate, was selected to the Track and Field Hall of Fame in 1991. Winner of an Olympic bronze medal in the 800 meters in 1976, he holds the distinction of being the last man to qualify for the Games in both the 800- and 1,500-meter events. Wohlhuter won the IC4A 880-yard title in 1971 and qualified for the Olympics in 1972.

In addition to his appearance in the Games, Wohlhuter broke the U.S. 800-meter record twice and twice set world records for the 880-yard race. He also set the world record for the 1,000 meters in 1974 and won the event the next three indoor seasons. Wohlhuter also won national outdoor titles in 1973 and '74. In 1974 he earned the Sullivan Award as the nation's top amateur athlete.

A 1970 NCAA champion in the 600-yard event, the two-time All-American was also a member of Notre Dame's two-mile relay team which placed second in the nation in 1969.

Wohlhuter joined John Beatty, the first man to break the four-minute mile indoors, high jumper Charles Dumas, a 1956 gold medalist and first jumper to clear seven feet, and Doris Brown-Heritage, winner of 14 U.S. distance titles and five world cross country championships, as the 1991 Track and Field Hall of Fame inductees.



Tameisha King

*Four-time All-American
Four-time BIG EAST
Champion*

Tameisha King graduated from Notre Dame in 2003, and left the University as its top female long jumper.

King owns both the indoor and outdoor school records for the long jump, in addition to running in the school record 4x100-meter relay.

She was a four-time All-American, with three of those honors coming during the outdoor season, and one during the indoor season. Each of her All-America honors came in the long jump.

King had five top-10 finishes in the NCAA Championship as well as four BIG EAST Championships to her credit.

King also has a very impressive résumé outside of the collegiate spectrum. In 2001, as a sophomore, she placed second in the long jump at National Junior Track & Field Championship, and went on to finish among the top 10 at the World Junior Championship in Santiago, Chile.

More recently, King won the 2004 USA Track & Field Indoor long jump title after finishing fourth in '03. She also ended up sixth at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials and was the top finisher from the United States at the 2003 Pan American Games.



Ryan Shay

*Nine-time All-American
2001 NCAA Champion
2003 USA Marathon
Champion*

A 2001 graduate, Ryan Shay became the USA Marathon Champion in 2003, continuing the championship ways of his collegiate years. Shay is the most decorated athlete in the history of Notre Dame track & field. A 2001 NCAA champion in the 10,000 meters, Shay was a nine-time All-American including two honors for cross country, two for indoor track and five for outdoor track. His nine honors are the second-most in school history.

In 2002, a fifth year of eligibility, Shay was named an Academic All-American, and had a second-place finish in the 10,000 meters at the NCAA Championship.

Shay was a nine-time BIG EAST champion in his years at Notre Dame, with one of those victories coming in cross country. He also had seven top-10 finishes at the NCAA Championships in various distance events including the 3,000, 5,000 and 10,000 meters.

In 2000, he competed for the right to represent the USA Track & Field Team at the Olympic Games, finishing 10th in the Olympic Trials.

Upon graduation, he held school records in the indoor 5,000 meters, the outdoor 5,000 meters and the 10,000 meters.

Shay's 2001 national championship was the first outdoor championship by a Notre Dame athlete since 1954.



Luke Watson

*Eight-time All-American
Six-time BIG EAST
Champion
Sub-Four Minute Mile*

Enjoying one of the best careers in the history of Notre Dame track and field, Luke Watson competed in one of the most exciting moments in the history of the track and field program.

In January of 2003, Watson broke one of the great barriers in sports, the four-minute mile, in front of one of the largest crowds to ever see a track meet at Notre Dame. Watson's mile of 3:57.83 was the fastest collegiate indoor mile in the country in '03 and was only the second sub-four-minute mile in school history.

In the '03 season, Watson's last with the Irish, he was honored as an All-American for the eighth time, including two for cross country, four for indoor track and two for outdoor track. He was also named an Academic All-American in both the '02 and '03 seasons.

Upon graduating, Watson had five top-10 finishes in the NCAA Track & Field Championship, and two top-10 finishes at the NCAA Championship for cross country. Additionally, Watson held six school records upon graduation – the indoor and outdoor mile, the 3,000-meter steeplechase, the indoor 3,000 meters, outdoor 5,000 meters and the distance medley relay.

Watson was also a force to be reckoned with in the BIG EAST. During his career he was a six-time BIG EAST champion. He also led the 2003 Irish to BIG EAST Championships in both the indoor and outdoor seasons, the first time a Notre Dame team accomplished that feat.



Molly Huddle

*Ten-time All-American
Seven-time BIG EAST
Champion*

Molly Huddle graduated from Notre Dame in 2007 as one of the most decorated athletes in Irish sports history. Huddle concluded her career at the 2007 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships, finishing third in the 5,000-meter run to earn her tenth All-America selection, a record for the most All-America selections by a Notre Dame athlete in any sport.

Huddle's other accolades include six BIG EAST track titles, the most by any Irish woman, and four NCAA Mid-east Regional 5,000-meter titles.

She set records across the boards by being the first woman in BIG EAST history to win both the outdoor 5,000-meter and 10,000-meter race in back-to-back years as well as be named the BIG EAST Outstanding Outdoor Track Performer for two consecutive seasons. Former sprinter Liz Grow is the only other Irish athlete to win the award, receiving the honor in 2002.

Huddle posted top-four finishes in each of her four NCAA 5,000m appearances, taking the runner-up spot in 2006. She currently holds four Irish school records (indoor 3,000m & 5,000m/outdoor 5,000m & 10,000m) as well as the BIG EAST meet record in the 10,000m.

Huddle's success was not limited to the track. In her freshman season of cross country she was named the 2003 NCAA Great Lakes Regional Runner of the Year after her first-place performance. She earned All-America honors in 2002, 2003 and 2005 with 6th-, 41st- and 15th-place finishes, respectively.

Huddle has competed at several USA Track and Field Championships, placing seventh at the 2004 Olympic Trials and winning the 2003 U.S. Junior National 3,000-meter title.

Hard Work and Determination Keys to Success for 2008 Irish

The Notre Dame men's track team looks to continue off strong 2007 season to make higher advances in the 2008 campaign

There is no denying the strength of the Notre Dame men's track and field team. For over a decade they have consistently led throughout BIG EAST competition and continue to send high caliber athletes onto the NCAA championship meet. Last season's BIG EAST Indoor Championship and third-place finish at the outdoor championship serve as testaments to the hard work and dedication put in by **Joe Piane**, his staff and most importantly, the athletes.

Now serving in his 33rd year as the head coach, Piane and his crew look ahead to the 2008 season as another opportunity to lead both in the conference and in the nation. With strong returnees and fresh new talent, the men's track and field team is set for the 2008 campaign.

Returning for a fifth-year is senior **Kurt Benninger**, a five-time All-American (four track and field, one cross country), earning his most recent citation in 2007 after a fifth-place finish in the 1,500 meters at the NCAA Track and Field Championships. A long list of accomplishments follow the Chepstow, Ontario native's name, including three-time BIG EAST champion and being the only athlete in Irish history to clock two sub-four minute miles in his career.

Benninger's 2006 BIG EAST 1,500-meter title was the third in his career and first outdoors, adding to the mile and 3,000-meter crowns he captured at the 2005 indoor meet. Overall, Benninger has eight all-BIG EAST citations on his record and he will undoubtedly go for more during both the indoor and outdoor track and field seasons.

Benninger will not be the only top distance runner back for the Irish, much to Piane's liking. A crew of talent returns to the distance squad, including junior **Patrick Smyth** and senior **Jake Watson**.

Smyth returns to the track this season after earning all-BIG EAST honors both outdoors and indoors, as well as after a strong sophomore campaign in cross country. Smyth was not only a conference honoree, but also the number one runner for the Irish at the NCAA Championships, taking 36th and earning his first All-America citation.

Watson will be back for the Irish in his final season on the oval. After his success in 2007, Piane knows there will be great things in store for the senior from Stillwater, Minn. Watson picked up his first All-America certificate last season indoors in the mile, a race he dominated throughout the season with the highlight coming at the Mayo Invitational in the famed Mayo Mile. Watson nearly clocked a sub-four minute time, finishing with a time of 4:00.71, the fifth-best in Notre Dame history.

Watson went on to the outdoor season and broke four minutes in the mile at the Music City Distance Carnival in Nashville, Tenn. He joined

his older brother Luke Watson as members of that exclusive group, the two becoming just the 15th pair of brothers in history to run sub-fours and the second duo in American history (the first to achieve the feat were twins John and Sean Jefferson of Indiana University, who both broke four in the 2005 Mayo Mile at Notre Dame).

Newcomers for the Irish that Piane expects to make an impact on the track includes freshman **Paul Springer** of Kennett Square, Pa., who is ranked one of the best two-milers in the country. Springer has a best time of 8:52, while fellow newcomer freshman **Dan Jackson** of Ann Arbor, Mich., will be on his heels as he comes in with a best time of 8:55 in the event.

On the short side of the track, the Notre Dame sprinting crew will step out with both returning and new faces turning heads during the 2008 indoor and outdoor campaigns. One of the top returns that sprints coach **John Millar** sees returning for the Irish is sophomore **Balazs Molnar**, who as only a freshman in 2007 was the BIG EAST 400-meter hurdles champion, earned four all-BIG EAST certificates and posted 13 performances (between the 500 meters, 400-meter hurdles, and 4x400-meter relay) that rank among the top-10 in Notre Dame history. Molnar sat out the end of the 2007 season due to injury, but Millar expects him to be healthy and stronger than ever for the 2008 season.

Senior **Austin Wechter** also returns for the Irish in the sprints and hurdles and will look to advance on to the NCAA championships this season. Wechter has made the regional meet twice, only to have mediocre performances on the track. Millar said he hopes to see Wechter really find his rhythm throughout his final season.

Senior **Bob Kueny** returns in the 400-meter action, as well as the 4x400-meter relay. With three of the four members of the 2007 relay team returning, expectations are high, especially when you look at incoming freshman **Miklos Szebeny** joining the relay. Szebeny comes to the Irish with a wealth of international experience, as he currently sits as a Hungary national record holder in the 4x400-meter relay.

"We're solid in most events and we for once have some depth in most events," Millar said. "We should be able to be competitive both indoor and outdoor throughout the conference and we have several individuals who should qualify for the NCAA national meet in the spring. We definitely need to stay away from injuries that have plagued us in the past."

The Irish jumpers returned to the field in 2007 after an injury plagued 2006 season. The goal was to overcome the health problems of the past and put in a hard fought season, and that is exactly what happened. Now coming into 2008, the jumpers look to advance of the gains made in 2007 and have a standout 2008 campaign.

Leading the group will be the vaulters who made great strides in 2007 and proved to be crucial to the team as they raked in 18 points at the indoors BIG EAST Championship, leading to a men's team victory. Sophomore **Matt Schipper** led the meet with a second-place finish and all-BIG EAST honors with a height of 4.80 meters (15-9), while teammates sophomore **Jim Merchun** and junior **Tray Morgan** came in behind in their respective fourth and eighth-place finishes. Add newcomer vaulter **Michael Yassay** of Northville, Mich., into the mix and the group should be as strong as ever.

"All of them had really good summers working out and in the weight room so they're pretty fit and looking for really good things to happen," Irish jumps coach Scott Winsor said. "They work very hard and I think they're all excited to build off of what they did last year."

Junior **Blair Majcina** also makes a healthy return for Notre Dame in the high jump. The Mokena, Ill., native qualified for the NCAA outdoor championship in 2007, but only after having surgery on both legs and working to recover. The key to the 2008 season will be keeping Majcina healthy, something that Winsor believes can be done, and if it is, expects big results from him.

While the Irish throwers have been consistently improving the past two seasons, this season will mark some changes as **Adam Beltran** joined the Notre Dame coaching staff as the throws coach. Beltran comes to South Bend after serving as the throws coach at Saint Francis (Pa.) University. During his tenure, 20 St. Francis student-athletes won Northeast Conference titles in the men's and women's weight throw, javelin, hammer throw, discus and women's shot put.

"We are very excited to have a young and energetic coach like Adam," Piane said. "He has had very good success at Saint Francis and I think he could evolve into one of the best coaches in the nation here at Notre Dame."

Beltran comes in to lead **Mike Schubert** in his senior campaign at Notre Dame as the top shot-putter for the Irish. Schubert scored for Notre Dame at the indoor BIG EAST championship with a fifth-place finish, leading to the eventual team championship. Coming in as newcomers in the throws squad includes **Denes Veres** of Ellwood City, Pa., and **John Belcher** of Cheyenne, Wyo.

With much of the 2007 team returning, the potential for the Notre Dame men's track and field team is high, with expectations from the coaches even higher. Experience, depth and new talent will work together to balance out the team. The tradition of a strong track and field team runs deep and strong, thus a big year both at the conference level and nationally would be no big surprise for followers of the Irish.

Irish Will Look Towards Returnees and Newcomers to Add Depth

After the loss of top runners to graduation, Notre Dame will look towards younger talent to fill in the holes left behind

The women's track and field team made great strides in the 2007 season, taking second at the indoor BIG EAST Championship and winning its first outdoor BIG EAST Championship. The team's stand at the conference level was strong, but new faces will need to work with returnees during the 2008 season to stay at the top of the conference ladder.

Coming into the season, it is hard for women's distance coach **Tim Connelly** to not tab senior **Sunni Olding** as one of the top returnees to the Notre Dame women's track team, and she is undoubtedly the top returnee for the Irish distance. After sitting out the 2007 track and field season due to injury, Olding will return healthy for the 2008 season and work to fill the hole left from ten-time All-American Molly Huddle who graduated after the 2007 season.

Olding, a two-time All-American in cross country, will look to extend her success in both the BIG EAST and the nation. The Minster, Ohio, native already has two all-BIG EAST citations in track and field and in her senior campaign she will pursue more to add to her list of achievements.

Sophomore **Lindsey Ferguson** is another distance runner that Connelly expects to have a strong track and field season in 2008. After a slow start in cross country during her freshman campaign, Ferguson focused heavily on the 3,000-meter steeplechase, establishing her best time of the season and a new school record at the BIG EAST outdoor meet. The Greenfield Center, N.Y., native ran 10:41.33 to finish third and earn all-BIG EAST honors.

Coming in for the Irish is prep standout **Marissa Treece** from Maple City, Mich. Treece was a top recruit across the nation having twice won national track titles during her senior season, winning both the National Scholastic Indoor and Nike Outdoor Nationals 5,000-meter championships.

The women's sprinters will have to face the 2008 season without the standout sprinting duo of Maryann Erigha and Okechi Ogbuokiri, but Irish sprints coach **John Millar** will look for returnees and incoming freshman to quickly fill the holes left behind.



Junior Mary Saxer, a two-time all-BIG EAST honoree in the pole vault, will lead the Irish in the event during the 2008 season.

"We've got some returning seniors, but we're going to be counting heavily on freshman to fill some voids that we have from athletes graduating," Millar said. "We lost two very good athletes, Erigha and Obuokiri, and trying to replace them is going to be difficult, but we've got a pretty good nucleus coming back."

Millar looks for sophomore **Joanna Schultz** and senior **Chrysta Swayzer** to each be leaders for the Irish sprinting group throughout the 2008 campaign. Not only does he expect them to perform well in the 200 and 400 meters, but also to be the backbones for the 4x200 and 4x400-meter relays. **Brienne Davis** is another senior that will be looked towards to help fill in the holes left by graduating seniors, especially in the short sprint events.

"Both Joanna and Crysta performed well last year and were able to contribute at the conference meet and qualify for the regional meet and that's what we're looking to do again this year," Millar said. "Brienne will need to step up this year and fill the void in the short sprints. We're really looking for her to contribute in those events. She showed last year that she can perform at that level, she just needs to find more consistency this season in

her performances."

Some of the newcomers that Millar expects to make immediate impacts on the team includes **Natalie Johnson** of Englewood, Ariz., and **Kali Watkins** of Newport News, Va. Watkins also brings talent in the hurdles as she was 2006 Nike Indoor National All-American in the 60-meter hurdles during her prep years.

In the jumps area, Irish jumps coach **Scott Winsor** is looking towards more success from his athletes during the 2008 season. With only the loss of Cassie Gullickson, Winsor has high hopes from his young talent. Junior **Mary Saxer** returns as the top vaulter for the Irish. She is currently the school record holder in the vault with a height of 4.05m (13-3 1/2) and she is a two-time all-BIG EAST honoree in the event.

Irish junior **Anna Weber** will lead the throws group under new head coach **Adam Beltran** during the 2008 season. Beltran comes to South Bend after serving as the throws coach at Saint Francis (Pa.) University. During his tenure, 20 St. Francis student-athletes won Northeast

Conference titles in the men's and women's weight throw, javelin, hammer throw, discus and women's shot put.

Weber returns as the number one thrower for Notre Dame after having a standout sophomore campaign. Weber finished out the 2007 season with two big performances, one at the indoor BIG EAST Championship and the other at the outdoor conference competition. Indoors, the Indianapolis, Ind., native smashed the previous school record of 17.08m (56 1/2) held by Dore DeBartolo in the weight throw. Outdoors, Weber again set a new school record, this time in the hammer throw with her mark of 56.09m (183-11) once again unseating Dore DeBartolo (old mark: 55.74m).

The returnees to the Irish women's track and field team will need to work closely with newcomers to keep the tradition of success alive in the 2008 season. They will pursue their goals of a consecutive outdoor conference championship and look to regain the indoor conference title. With hard work and dedication, there is no doubt the Notre Dame track and field coaches believe their athletes will once again find success in 2008.

Hungry for Another Season, Another Chance

Coming off a disappointing NCAA Championship performance, the 2007 men's cross country squad returns ready to end the season with more success than in 2006

The 2006 men's cross country team had six top-four team finishes including their third-place finish at the BIG EAST conference and second-place finish at the Great Lakes regional to catapult them into another NCAA Championship. Both of the final two performances were solid and a trip back to the NCAA Championship was a grand accomplishment, but it was the disappointing finish at the end of the season that has left the Fighting Irish runners hungry for more and ready for another season.

"We did not run well at the NCAA Championships and I think that those people who have returned from that team have a terribly bitter taste in their mouth," Piane said reflecting on 2006. "I believe they've learned from their mistake. They all went on to have good track seasons, so I think they were really motivated by not performing to the level that they should have."

With the 2007 season in near sight, the Irish men will get a second chance to prove themselves. Three of the five-member 19th-place NCAA Championships team return to the course this season and will be joined with other standout runners, both returning

veterans and incoming freshmen. Dealing with the loss of number one runner Kurt Benninger, Piane expects junior Patrick Smyth to lead team throughout the season.

"There's no doubt our lead returnee will be Patrick Smyth," Piane said. "He is the highest returnee we have back from the NCAA championship and he is an All-American in outdoor track. I'd be naïve to think he isn't tabbed the number one guy, but right behind him we have Jake Watson and Jake Walker to step up as well."

Earning All-America honors after placing 35th at the 2006 NCAA Cross Country Championship, Smyth one of the leaders in 2006 will continue his role into the 2007 campaign. Other accomplishments from the 2006 season are proof of Smyth's already evident success after only two seasons with the Irish. In 2006 Smyth also garnered his second all-BIG EAST Conference plaque and second all-Great Lakes Region certificate and posted four top-12 finishes in five races. Now coming into his third season, Smyth will look to individually improve on his current success.

Filling the Benninger hole will be a large one, but with Smyth up for the challenge. He already posted himself as the number one runner for Notre Dame at the NCAA Championship last season and was always close behind his teammate.

By Smyth's side this season will be veteran teammates Jake Watson and Jake Walker. The three experienced athletes competing together gives Piane a chance in his 33rd season to watch experienced runners return and lead fresh, young talent. Both Watson and Walker come off strong track and field seasons, with Watson returning with All-America honors after placing 10th in the mile at the indoor NCAA Championships with a time of 4:03.97.

Others Piane would like to see improve on the season include seniors Mike Popejoy and Brett Adams. Both return as top runners for the team, but with the big loss of Benninger, Piane knows without a doubt they will each have to become significant members of the team to help fill that void. With the fourth and fifth positions on the team just as important as the first three, their performances will be key in notching

top team finishes throughout the 2007 campaign.

"We need the solid four, five and six runners because they are just as important as the one, two and three runners," Piane commented. "It's what we do collectively that ensures success and I think that gets forgotten sometimes. Every person on the team plays a significant part in how we finish as a team and that's important to realize and remember."

While it seems as though Piane has his team set, he has still brought in what looks to be another impressive freshman class, ready to hit the course and work with the veterans throughout the season.

"We've got the depth of our returnees mixed with the talent of our young incoming freshman," Piane commented. "Together with returnees improving and freshman learning, we should have a good team, just like we have been for decades, ever since Knute Rockne started the program."

The goals Piane has set for the 2007 season are short and to the point.

"Finish high in the BIG EAST and get back to the NCAA Championships and do well there," Piane stated. "That's always the goal. We'd always like to be in the top ten if we can. It doesn't always happen, but that's what we strive for. We fell short last year and I am confident we can overcome that and have a more successful finish to this season."

Returning Faces with New Heights Set for 2007

The women's cross country squad will take experiences from 2006 into the 2007 season



The 2007 women's cross country team will go into the season with experience gained from the 2006 campaign. they will look to regain a top spot in the BIG EAST conference.

The Notre Dame women's cross country team heads into the 2007 season with an abundance of experience. With no holes to fill from the 2006 roster, they will look to use that experience to have a strong and successful campaign this season.

The Irish squad returns the top nine runners from the 2006, including senior Sunni Olding who was the number one runner throughout the entire season. The beginning of the season has a much different feel for the team as the all return with experience, compared to last season where out of all the returnees, only one had NCAA Regional experience.

Now with the women's team stacked, head coach Tim Connelly will make the transition from reloading a team to returning the team to success. With goals in mind, Connelly has no doubt that his team cannot accomplish these.

"This year we have to get back in the mindset of winning the BIG EAST, winning the regional meet and getting back the NCAA meet," Connelly said. "Last year we were learning and this year we should be ready to go."

In 2006 the Irish team three top-three team finishes, one of which was at the BIG EAST

Championships towards the end of the season where they took home third-place honors out of 16 teams. The season fell short for the Irish when they finished fifth at the Great Lakes Regional two weeks later. Being on the border of receiving a bid to the NCAA Championships, Notre Dame was not selected.

There is no doubt that Connelly and his team felt disappointment not returning to the NCAA Championships after having a fifth-place finish there the year prior in 2005, and now they have prepared themselves to be in a position to get back to the NCAA Championships and once again make a strong showing. The goals are simple and Connelly feels he has the right components to get them accomplished.

With two-time All-American Olding embarking on her senior year, Connelly will look to her to lead the veteran group of women. She was the only runner to represent the Irish at the 2006 NCAA Women's Cross Country Championship and she will no doubt rely on that experience as a learning one as she prepares for the 2007 season. After redshirting the track season to recuperate from injuries, Olding looks to start the season healthy and ready to go.

Also back for the Irish are seniors Amy Kohlmeier and Ann Mazur. Both came on late in the season, earning all-BIG EAST honors, coming in third and second, respectively, for Notre Dame at the BIG EAST Championship. Connelly is looking for that kind of success once again from the two veterans, but more consistently throughout the entire season. Their late season efforts, proved to Connelly that the 2007 campaign could be their time to shine.

Also a top returnee for the Irish is Heidi Rocha, who was consistently a top five runner during the 2006 season. She ended the season with a strong BIG EAST performance, scoring for the Irish in the third-place team finish. Alongside her is teammate Julie Opet, another top runner throughout 2006. Connelly looks for both of their efforts last season to carry through to 2007, using that to catapult them into an even more successful season not only for the team, but also for each of them individually.

Sophomore Lindsey Ferguson will also return for the Irish in 2007. After struggling through her first cross country campaign, Ferguson showed that she had skill during the track and field season. Connelly expects a new look from Ferguson on the cross country course this year, having learned a few things from last season. A break-out season would be no surprise to Connelly, taking the lesson learned from 2006 and turning it into success in 2007.

"Lindsey (Ferguson) struggled as a freshman, but I would expect her to really step up this season," Connelly said. "She learned a bit from last year and I think she can find success this year."

After working hard and making noticeable improvements during 2006, the end of the season made it clear that the Irish were overcoming their obstacles and stepping-up their performances. Even though a third-place finish at the Great Lakes Regional was not enough to earn a bid to the 2006 NCAA championship, it is evident that they will be ready in 2007.

"We've got a really good blend," Connelly said. "Last year we were in a situation where we really had no experience. Sunni (Olding) was the only one who really had any experience and it took the whole season to really grow, but now they return this season having made those improvements, to now having a lot of experience."

Adding to the blend of experience are incoming freshmen Marissa Treece of Maple City, Mich. and Theresa Cattuna of Cherry Hill, N.J., both of which Connelly thinks could have immediate success with the Irish. While never having run with the Irish, Connelly looks forward to seeing the newcomers work with the returnees and watching them lead throughout the season, something that the Irish women lacked in 2006. Treece was a four-time cross country state champion in Michigan and was also the Nike outdoor national 5,000-meter champion in 2007. Fellow incoming freshman Cattuna was honored as the 2006 South Jersey Runner of the Year.

"She (Treece) is a really talented kid who can come in right away and make an impact," Connelly projected. "Theresa Cattuna is another girl who I think can really come in and make an impact as well. They've both got the potential to contribute immediately in their freshmen seasons."

On the brink of the 2007 season, Connelly is optimistic and confident in the crew he has set to run. Looking to bring the Irish back up to a higher level of success, he will help restore tradition in a program that is deep with talent and experience.

"Last year we were in a situation where we really had no experience," Connelly said. Sunni was the only one who really had any experience and it took the whole season to really grow, but now they return this season having made those improvements and now having a lot of experience. I expect big things."

In 1889, track and field became the second varsity sport in school history. One hundred and 18 seasons later, student-athletes continue to represent the Fighting Irish across the nation on the track, in the field and on the cross country course.

For the past 32 campaigns, Joe Piane has been leading the program – and shows no signs of stopping any time soon. The longest active tenured coach at Notre Dame, Piane begins his 33rd season under the Golden Dome in the fall of 2007, having recently inked a multi-year contract extension that will keep him with the Irish through at least the end of the decade.

The 2007-08 season will be a landmark for Piane as he is third in Notre Dame athletic history for longest tenure, no longer tied with former Irish tennis and wrestling coach Tim Fallon (32 seasons from 1955-87). Only legendary baseball skipper Jake Kline (42 seasons from 1934-75) and fencing mentor Mike DeCicco (34 seasons from 1962-95) spent more time with their programs than Piane.

"I'm thrilled to know that I'll be here at Notre Dame for the next several years and hopefully well beyond that until my retirement," Piane says. "My family and I truly enjoy living in South Bend and being a part of the community here. I also value and appreciate the opportunity I have had to work at a place like Notre Dame because of the quality of the people I've been fortunate enough to work with. I have coached many very special student-athletes during my time here and seeing their development has been one of the most rewarding aspects of my job — one that I'm eager to continue well into the foreseeable future."

"Joe's record here at Notre Dame speaks for itself," director of athletics Kevin White notes. "The Irish cross country and track & field teams are annually among the nation's elite and that's a testament to the leadership and expertise Joe has brought to the table. He is universally respected, not only in the athletics family here at Notre Dame, but also in

national and global coaching circles. We are pleased to know that Joe will remain with us to further build upon the foundation of success he has worked so hard to create."

When White says Piane's record "speaks for itself," it's no exaggeration. Just consider the accomplishments Notre Dame athletes have made under Piane's watchful eye:

- Men's cross country runners have earned All-American status 24 times, with Patrick Smyth taking home the honor in 2006.

- A Notre Dame cross country runner has appeared at the NCAA Championship meet in each of the past 17 years, while the team has made the trip 16 out of the past 20 years.

- The Notre Dame men's cross country team has finished in the top 10 at the NCAA meet in 11 of the past 20 seasons, highlighted by third-place finishes in 1990 and 2005 (matching the program's best showing since winning the 1957 NCAA title).

- The Irish men's cross country team has won five BIG EAST Conference titles since joining the league in 1995, including two crowns in 2004 and 2005. What's more, Notre Dame men's harriers have earned all-BIG EAST honors 36 times, with a school-record five runners receiving that distinction in '05.

- The Irish men's track & field team has earned 66 All-America citations since 1974 (including Jake Watson and Thomas Chamney in the indoor season and Kurt Benninger, Patrick Smyth and Todd Ptacek in the outdoor season), while the women's team has received 38 such accolades since 1994 (most recently Molly Huddle in the 5,000m in 2007). Combined, Piane has helped mentor 104 track & field All-Americans (and 128 overall when including cross country honorees) during his tenure.

- Both the Notre Dame men's and women's track & field teams were champions in 2007 with the Irish men taking the indoor title and the Irish women claiming their first outdoor team championship. Overall the men's team has won seven BIG EAST titles (three indoor/four outdoor), while the women's squad has hoisted the hardware three times (two indoor/one outdoor).



- In the school's 11-year BIG EAST membership (1995-96 to present), Notre Dame athletes have won 102 conference individual or relay titles in track & field and cross country, with eight student-athletes going on to be named the conference's outstanding track or field performer award at its indoor or outdoor championship meets.

A distance-coaching specialist, Piane is recognized across the nation as one of the best in the business. He has been named NCAA Division I National Cross Country Coach of the Year on two different occasions (1987 and 2001) while garnering five district/regional coach-of-the-year honors and nine league cross country coach-of-the-year plaques (most recently as part of the '05 BIG EAST Men's Coaching Staff of the Year). In total, Piane has earned or shared 26 league coach of the year awards (indoor track, outdoor track or cross country), including 13 BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year accolades in the past nine years (1999-2007). In 2007 alone they earned two of those BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year honors, one for men's indoor track & field and one for women's outdoor track & field.

As the Irish track & field program continues to assert itself on the national stage, Piane has led from the front every step of the way. In 2007, the Notre Dame men won the BIG EAST indoor title, marking the sixth time in eight seasons that the Irish took home either the conference indoor or outdoor trophy. The Irish women's indoor performance earned them the second-place trophy, just ten points shy of the championship title. Persistence paid off for the women as they came back in the outdoor season and won their first BIG EAST outdoor championship.

Piane and his assistants were once again recognized for their guidance on the Notre Dame men's and women's track teams. They were honored as the BIG EAST Men's Indoor Track Coaching Staff of the Year as well as the Women's Outdoor Track Coaching Staff of the Year. Piane and his staff now have earned 13 BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year awards.

Individually, Piane and his assistants at Notre Dame produced six All-Americans on the track in 2007 with two during the indoor season and four during the outdoor season. Molly Huddle led the team, earning her tenth All-America honors with her third-place performance in the 5,000m. Other All-America performances came from Kurt Benninger (1,500m), Patrick Smyth (5,000m) and Todd Ptacek (3,000m steeplechase) at the NCAA outdoor championships and from Jack Watson (mile run) and Thomas Chamney (800m) at the NCAA indoor championships.

Huddle finished her career under Piane with her tenth All-America certificate, a record for the most All-America selections by a Notre Dame athlete in any sport. The Elmira, N.Y., native had seven career BIG EAST championship, including back-to-back double victories in the 5,000m and the 10,000m in her last two seasons. Her seven championships are the most by any Irish woman and she joins former athlete Liz Grow to be named the BIG EAST Outstanding Outdoor Track Performer in two consecutive years (2006/2007). She currently holds four Irish school records (indoor 3,000m & 5,000m/outdoor 5,000m & 10,000m).

Piane's success has not just been in the present with ten-time All-American Huddle and five-time All-American Kurt Benninger. Two of the more successful Piane pupils in recent years have been nine-time All-American Ryan Shay and eight-time All-American Luke Watson.

In 2001, Piane helped distance specialist Shay compile one of the greatest track seasons in Notre Dame history. The Central Lake, Mich., resident won the BIG EAST indoor 5,000 meters, the conference outdoor 5,000 and 10,000 meters and finished off the season in legendary style by becoming Notre Dame's first individual NCAA champion since 1972 by taking first place in the 10,000 meters (29:05.44) at the NCAA Outdoor Championship in Eugene, Ore. Shay has since moved on to become one of the best marathon runners in the country, winning five U.S. titles as well as USA Running Circuit (USARC) titles in 2003 and 2004.

Shortly after helping steer Shay to the top of the college running mountain, Piane had similar success with Watson. Both men had set their sights on breaking the four-minute mile barrier at the Meyo Invitational in 2002, hoping that Watson would become just the second runner to crack the mark. Piane helped assemble an outstanding field for the race and it ended up as arguably the highlight of the collegiate indoor season. Watson did his part, scorching past the field in the final straight away to win in 3:58.83, easily a school-record time and briefly the fastest mile run in the world during the indoor season. Watson eventually moved on to garner All-America honors in the indoor mile, indoor 3,000 meters and outdoor 5,000 meters – as well as taking home BIG EAST Championships in the mile, 3,000-meter steeplechase and outdoor 5,000 meters. In the summer of '06, Watson returned to his alma mater as a member of the Irish men's distance/cross country coaching staff.

With Piane at the helm, the Notre Dame men's cross country team has enjoyed five of its most successful seasons in the program's history during the past seven years. In 2000, Piane helped the Irish recover from the loss of Shay due to injury and earn a ninth-place finish at the NCAA Championship meet.

With Shay back on the team in '01, Notre Dame achieved its highest-ever national ranking (fourth), won the BIG EAST Championship (Piane and his staff earned the league's Coaching Staff of the Year award) and ended up sixth at the national meet to give the Irish (at the time) their highest team finish since 1993.

In 2004, Notre Dame threatened to eclipse its best-ever ranking, as Piane deftly guided his charges from an unranked start all the way to a BIG EAST title and a No. 5 national ranking before placing 11th at the NCAA Championship. For his efforts, Piane and his aides garnered a second BIG EAST Men's Cross Country Coaching Staff of the Year plaque. That set the stage for last year's successful run that culminated in Notre Dame's return to the NCAA awards podium for the first time since 1990.

In 1985, Piane was named a member of the United States National Track staff. As such, he was one of 40 collegiate coaches given the opportunity to coach a United States squad in international competition. During the summer of 1987 he did just that, guiding a team of American all-stars in meets held in England and Ireland. Upon the conclusion of the 1991 Notre Dame track season, Piane once again faced international competition as he was appointed coach of the U.S. Pan American juniors team for the games in Kingston, Jamaica.

Piane became Midwest regional chairman for United States Olympic Development in the area of track and field in 1984. Piane's other Olympic preparation experience came in '85 when he coached the North team in the National Sports Festival. He also coached the U.S. team against England in Birmingham, England.

Piane has produced a winning record in all but one season with the Irish men's cross country team and is also the creator of Notre Dame's National Catholic Championship, an annual meet held on campus since 1980. The Irish running program continues to be a rapidly-growing entity thanks to Piane's achievements. Continually searching for greater challenges, he also founded the Meyo Invitational and the Alex Wilson Invitational, both traditional indoor Notre Dame track & field meets. The Meyo Invitational has turned into a prime breeding ground for record-setting performances, with the 2007 meet resulting in 85 NCAA provisional or automatic qualifying marks, six meet records and three Meyo Track standards broken. The 2006 meet had similar results with 76 NCAA provisional or automatic qualifying marks hit and seven meet records and three Meyo Track records falling. At the same time, the Alex Wilson Invitational has developed into one of the top indoor "last chance" meets in the nation, hosting the nation's best performers just prior to the NCAA Championship.

A 1969 graduate of Loras College, Piane ran both track and cross country for four years at the Dubuque, Iowa, institution. He captained Loras' undefeated cross country squad as a senior, while excelling in middle distance events during the track season. He was inducted into the Loras College Athletics Hall of Fame in the fall of '02.

Piane began his impressive coaching career in 1970. Working for the Peace Corps, he coached track & field and cross country at both the regional and national levels in the North African country of Morocco. Piane guided a top-ranked junior cross country team, sending three runners to Cambridge, England, for the International Cross Country Championship (now known as the IAAF World Championship) in 1972, where Morocco finished third. Several of those Moroccan runners went on to compete at the '72 Summer Games in Munich, Germany, and one advanced to the 1976 Summer Games in Montreal, Canada.

After returning to the United States in July 1972, Piane assisted the track and cross country programs at Western Illinois. During that time he earned a master's degree in physical education.

Born Aug. 6, 1946, in Westchester, Ill., Piane joined the Notre Dame staff in 1974 as an assistant track coach and physical education instructor with plans to stay on for just one year. He was named head track and cross country coach the following season.

Piane and his wife, Mimi, reside in South Bend, with their son, Nick.

As the Notre Dame women's cross country team continues to establish itself as one of the best in the nation, the man standing at the forefront of that emergence has been Tim Connelly.

Now in his 20th season at Notre Dame, Connelly not only serves as the head coach of the Irish women's cross country team, but also tutors the middle distance and distance runners during the indoor and outdoor track seasons. As one of the longest tenured active assistants at the University, he is closely involved with all aspects of the Notre Dame track & field/cross country program and is known as one of the best recruiters in the Midwest.

Since taking over the Irish women's cross country program during its infancy in 1988, Connelly has helped Notre Dame reach unprecedented heights, finishing among the top 10 at the NCAA Championship the four of the past five seasons. Notre Dame also has garnered a trip to the awards podium twice, finishing in a program-best third place in 2002, followed by a fourth-place showing in 2004.

However, that hardly begins to scratch the surface of Connelly's accomplishments during his nearly two-decade run at Notre Dame. The Irish women also have won three BIG EAST Conference titles (all in the past five seasons) and placed either first or second at five of the past six NCAA Great Lakes Regional meets. What's more, Notre Dame harriers have collected 14 All-America honors and 24 all-BIG EAST cross country citations since the Irish joined the conference in 1995-96.

On the track, the Notre Dame women's distance program has grown exponentially in recent years. Irish runners have earned no fewer than 19 All-America certificates, including 14 in the past six years alone, while Connelly's athletes have advanced to NCAA Championship competition 34 times (14 indoors/20 outdoors).



In addition, Notre Dame women's distance runners have garnered all-conference status 62 times and won 10 BIG EAST individual titles (as well as the 2003 distance medley relay crown) during the past 12 seasons. The Irish thinclads also have played a critical role in a pair of team titles at the BIG EAST Indoor Championship ('02, 2006) and one BIG EAST Outdoor Championship (2007), as well as nine runner-up finishes at conference meets (five indoor, four outdoor).

For his efforts, Connelly has been richly rewarded with numerous coaching honors. He has been chosen for the BIG EAST Women's Cross Country Coaching Staff of the Year award three times ('02, 2003, 2005) and has been part of the BIG EAST Women's Indoor Track & Field Coaching Staff of the Year twice ('02, '06) and the BIG EAST Women's Outdoor Track & Field Coaching Staff of the Year once (2007).

Under Connelly's tutelage, the Notre Dame's distance program was able to excel in 2007, playing a large role in helping the Irish win their first BIG EAST outdoor championship since joining the league in 1995-96. Connelly produced six top eight finishers, bringing in points for the Irish. The women's cross country team season ended with a third-place finish at the BIG EAST Cross Country Championships and a fifth-place finish at the Great Lakes Regional meet, just shy of a bid to the national meet. The conference finish was the fifth consecutive top-three BIG EAST finish by the Irish women.

Senior Molly Huddle led the women's distance with a runner-up performance in the 5,000m at the BIG EAST indoor championships and a double crown at the BIG EAST outdoor championships in the 5,000m and the 10,000m only the third multiple winner of the honor since its inception in 1993, and the first back-to-back recipient since former Irish All-American Liz Grow took the hardware in 2001 and 2002. Yolanda McCray of Miami (Fla.) was the other two-time honoree in 1997 and 1999. Her outdoor performance earned her BIG EAST Outstanding Outdoor Track Performer honors. She went on to the NCAA Mideast Regional meet to win her fourth consecutive 5,000m title to pave her way to the national meet where she became a ten-time All-American after taking third in the 5,000m.

Connelly's charges were at the forefront of a nearly historic run in 2005-06, as Notre Dame came within 10 points at the conference's outdoor meet of becoming the first school in 18 seasons to win the BIG EAST women's "triple crown" (cross country, indoor track, outdoor track). It all started with an impressive 25-point win at the BIG EAST Cross Country Championship, with the 34-point Irish performance the best scoring outing by any league school since 1994. Notre Dame had four of the top eight runners in the field, giving the Irish their largest-ever crop of all-conference honorees.

That outing preceded a runner-up showing at the NCAA Great Lakes Regional, where Notre Dame once again was dominant up front with four of the top 10 runners in the meet (including a 2-3 finish by Stephanie Madia and Molly Huddle). The Irish then capped the 2005 season with a seventh-place finish at the NCAA Championship, highlighted by a program-best three All-America performances (Madia, Huddle and Sunni Olding). In fact, Madia's third-place finish and time of 19:48.4 were the best-ever by a Notre Dame woman, while Huddle joined

Lauren King as the second three-time women's cross country All-American in school history.

Moving indoors on the track, Connelly skillfully guided the Irish distance corps to a solid '06 campaign. Jacqueline Carter and Brianne Schmidt made excellent strides in the middle distances, notching school records in the 800- and 1,000-meter runs, respectively. Madia was strong at the longer distances, peaking well late in the year with two of the top-four 5,000-meter times in school history before earning her second All-America honor with a fourth-place finish at the NCAA Championship.

Huddle then took center stage during the '06 outdoor season, posting the nation's fastest times at both 5,000 and 10,000 meters, and becoming only the second woman in BIG EAST history to win both races at the conference meet. She went on to be named the BIG EAST Outstanding Outdoor Track Performer, as well as the USTFCCCA Great Lakes District Outdoor Track Athlete of the Year and won her third NCAA Mideast Regional 5,000-meter title in as many tries. Huddle's season ended just short of the brass ring, as she finished second in the 5,000 meters at the NCAA Championships, still the best placement ever by an Irish women's track athlete in any event. She also garnered her ninth All-America citation, tying former men's distance runner Ryan Shay for the most ever by a Notre Dame athlete in any sport.

In '04, Huddle had one of the most prolific seasons in Irish track and field history. She was an All-American in the indoor 3,000 and 5,000-meter runs as well as the outdoor 5,000-meters. In all three of these events she also recorded a Notre Dame school record. After the collegiate season ended Connelly accompanied Huddle as she competed in the United States Olympic Trials, eventually finishing seventh in the 5,000 meters as the top non-professional/collegian in the race. A year earlier, Connelly guided Huddle (who finished sixth overall at the NCAA cross country meet) to All-America honors in the indoor 3,000 meters and outdoor 5,000 meters. Huddle capped that season by running away with the U.S. Junior 3,000-Meter Championship at the national meet in Palo Alto, Calif.

A 1983 Notre Dame graduate, Connelly ran both cross country and track for the Irish. Following his graduation, Connelly served as a graduate assistant coach under Joe Piane while working toward his master's degree in business.

In 1986, Connelly moved on to Syracuse as an assistant cross country and track coach. During his time in central New York, he coached the men's and women's middle distance and distance runners and managed recruiting duties for both programs.

A native of Pittsburgh, Pa., Connelly and his wife, the former Donna Southerly, are the parents of two children — daughter, Alexandra, and son, Brendon.

One of the top sprint and hurdle coaches in the world, John Millar enters his 17th season at Notre Dame and has developed the Irish sprint groups into a force in the BIG EAST Conference. Millar's tenure at Notre Dame, which included serving as the speed coach for all Notre Dame athletic teams for several years, is the third longest of any current Irish assistant coach in any sport.

A dedicated coach, recruiter and organizer, Millar also has played a key role in Notre Dame's management of four home indoor meets, which are widely regarded as being among the top events in the country each season.

Millar's sprinters and hurdlers have continued to have success for the Irish on both the men's and women's side of the field. While many of Millar's top athlete's completed their final seasons in 2007, he still has a strong crop of young athletes who in only their first and second years have proven to be competitive at the conference level.

Freshman Balazs Molnar (Dunaujvaros, Hungary/Szechenyi Istvan School) took the BIG EAST outdoor 400-meter hurdle race by storm with his time of 51.62. The freshman's all-BIG EAST performance was the first time an Irish sprinter (male or female) won an all-BIG EAST 400-meter hurdle title in school history.

Millar's women sprinters undoubtedly found success on the track and were a key play in helping secure the team's first BIG EAST Outdoor Track & Field Championship. Both the women's 4x100 and 4x400-meter relays took titles at the 2007 BIG EAST Outdoor Track & Field Championships, spurring the Irish women's first BIG EAST outdoor championship since joining the league in 1995.

In 2007 seniors Maryann Erigha (Stone Mountain, Ga./Chamblee) and Okechi Ogbuokiri (Willingboro, N.J./Willingboro), and freshman Joanna Schultz (Holmen, Wis./Holmen) ran on



both victorious relay units, with junior Brienne Davis (Grand Prairie, Texas/Grand Prairie) completing the 4x100 quartet. Another junior Texan, Crysta Swayzer (Houston, Texas/Westbury Senior) took the final spot on the 4x400 squad.

Millar set up dominance in the women's individual 400m with relay members Ogbuokiri, Schultz and Davis taking second, third and fourth in the event respectively while the other relay standout, Erigha, went on to earn additional all-BIG EAST honors with her second-place finish in the 100m.

Both Erigha and Ogbuokiri have had previous success under Millar's tutelage. Erigha was a two-time BIG EAST champion in the outdoor 100m and indoor 200m while Ogbuokiri was a conference titlist in the indoor 400m. Both sprinters went on to qualify for the NCAA Championship for the first time in their respective careers in 2005.

In addition, Millar has had a hand in the growth of Ryan Postel, who won the BIG EAST outdoor 400-meter crown in 2004 and went on to earn his first All-America citation with the Irish distance medley relay unit in 2006. Furthermore, Postel holds the school record indoors at 400 meters, as well as four of the top 10 indoor 400-meter times and five of the top 10 outdoor 400-meter marks in school history.

Millar recently completed a successful relationship with hurdler Selim Nurudeen, who was a two-time All-American, seven-time BIG EAST Champion and 15-time all-BIG EAST selection during his career at Notre Dame from 2001-05. Nurudeen also was named the '05 BIG EAST Indoor Championship Outstanding Track Performer after helping the Irish win the team title.

Prior to his current proteges, Millar helped cultivate '02 graduate Liz Grow into Notre Dame's first women's All-American sprinter, as Grow was a fixture at the NCAA indoor and outdoor meets during her four years on the team.

Millar's sprint group made a huge splash on the national scene in '02. The women's 4x400 relay unit consisting of Ayesha Boyd, Kristen Dodd, Grow and Kymia Love qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships, becoming the first Irish women's sprint relay to achieve that distinction. In the outdoor season, the same group took a step further, earning All-America honors after placing fifth in the nation at the NCAA Championship in Baton Rouge, La. Millar's 4x100, 4x400 (outdoor)

and 4x400 (indoor) all have set school records in the past six seasons and the 4x100 group won BIG EAST Championships in 2003 and 2004.

The development of the women's sprint corps allowed Notre Dame to capture its first-ever BIG EAST team title in '02 at the league indoor meet. Millar and his fellow Irish coaches were named the BIG EAST Indoor Coaching Staff of the Year. They repeated that performance in 2006, nearly winning the league's "triple crown" for the first time in 18 years before a runner-up finish in the BIG EAST outdoor meet. Nevertheless, Millar was again part of the BIG EAST Indoor Staff of the Year.

Even after losing Grow to graduation in '02, Millar helped the women's 4x400 team return to both the NCAA indoor and outdoor meets in '03. The squad of Tiffany Gunn, Kristen Dodd, Ayesha Boyd and Kymia Love just missed out on a repeat All-America effort at the outdoor meet, finishing ninth. Boyd, Dodd and Love joined Tameisha King in the 4x100 relay at the outdoor meet as well.

In his first year with the Irish, Millar began the process of enhancing the Notre Dame sprint corps, which culminated in three school records in the 55 and 200 meters along with the 4x100 relay. He guided Raghib Ismail to a second-place finish in the 1991 NCAA indoor championships and the fastest collegiate 55-meter time in the world. Millar also coached two-time All-American Allen Rossum to seventh-place finishes in the 55-meter dash at the 1995 and 1997 NCAA Indoor Championship, and hurdler Errol Williams was an All-American in both indoor (55-meter hurdles) and outdoor track (110-meter hurdles) in 1998.

The native of Toronto, Canada, took a break from his coaching duties at Notre Dame in early March of 1999 to serve as the head coach of the USA women's track squad, which earned eight medals at the '99 World Indoor Championships in Maebashi, Japan.

Millar is a seasoned veteran of coaching athletes both on the national and international levels. During a six-year stint at Texas, he coached 96 NCAA All-Americans, including 10 national champions, and helped guide the Lady Longhorns to four national titles. He has followed up by guiding Notre Dame athletes to 16 different All-America finishes since 1990.

Prior to his position at Texas, Millar was an assistant at Tennessee for two years where he worked with 1984 Olympic gold-medal hurdler Benita Fitzgerald-Brown. In addition, he served as an assistant coach on the Canadian Olympic track staff and assisted in training world-class hurdler Mark McCoy. He also served as USA Track and Field's national women's hurdle coordinator, coach of the North team at the 1992 U.S. Olympic Festival and assistant coach of the USA Junior National Team at the 1993 Pan-Am Junior Championships.

Millar was head coach at York University in Toronto from 1981 to 1983 where he served as chief director for both the men's and women's programs in track & field. He led the school to a Canadian national championship in 1981.

He also traveled to the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, as a member of the Canadian track & field coaching staff.

Millar, a graduate of Western Ontario and master's degree recipient from Arizona State, and his wife, the former Lynn Haan, have a son, James, who is a senior cross country and distance runner at Notre Dame.



Scott Winsor

**Assistant Track & Field Coach
(Jumps)

A veteran with over two decades of coaching experience under his belt, Scott Winsor is now in his 20th year as an assistant coach with the Notre Dame track & field program, working directly with the Irish jumpers. Widely recognized as one of the top jumps coaches in the country, Winsor focuses his efforts on grooming Notre Dame's participants in the high jump, long jump, triple jump and pole vault, as well as the multi-event specialists.

Winsor's record of success is an impressive one. During his tenure, he has helped guide Irish competitors to 14 All-America certificates, 21 BIG EAST championships and 107 all-conference honors. In addition, Winsor's pupils have qualified for the NCAA Championships 20 times, finishing among the top 10 in the country on 11 occasions.

What's more, the Notre Dame record book is covered with marks set by Irish athletes working under Winsor's watchful eye. In fact, 27 school records have been set by athletes he has coached,

including 18 of the 19 current record holders in the jumps and multi-events at Notre Dame.

There is no doubt that Winsor's athletes were strong attributes to the Irish's 2007 season. Bringing in six top three finishes at the 2007 BIG EAST Indoor Championship (3 men/3 women) and three at the 2007 BIG EAST Outdoor Championship (1 men/2 women), the Notre Dame jumpers helped bring home the hardware. Along with winning the 2007 BIG EAST men's indoor championship and the 2007 BIG EAST women's outdoor championship, Winsor earned 2007 BIG EAST Men's Indoor Coaching Staff of the Year as well as the 2007 BIG EAST Women's Outdoor Coaching Staff of the Year awards.

The 2006 season proved to be a banner year for Winsor's jumpers, led by Emily Loomis, who earned All-America honors with an eighth-place finish in the high jump at the NCAA Outdoor Championship. Loomis also garnered all-BIG EAST honors in both the indoor and outdoor season, tying teammate Stacey Cowan for the runner-up spot during the league's indoor meet.

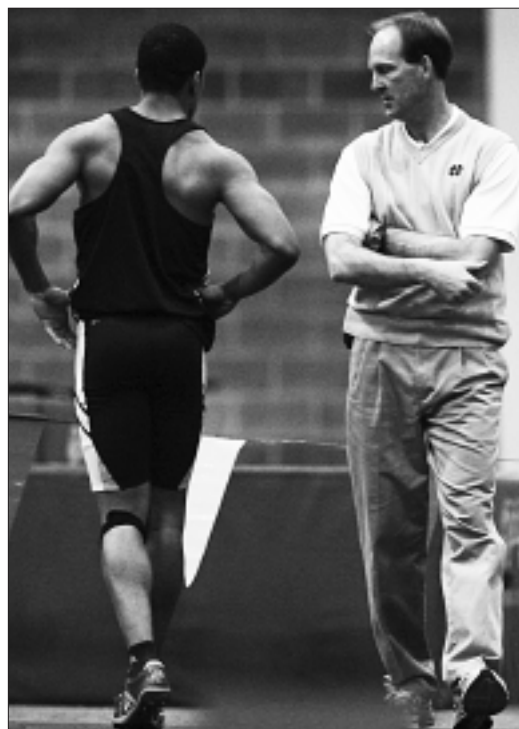
The Irish pole vault crew reached new heights in '06, led by Mary Saxer, who made a sizeable dent in the Notre Dame record books in her first season under the Golden Dome. The Lancaster, N.Y., product set an indoor school record with her 4.05m (13-3 1/2) clearance at the Notre Dame Invitational, and matched Jaime Volkmer's outdoor school standard with a 3.90m (12-9 1/2) best at the Mount SAC Relays. On top of that, Saxer notched five of the top 10 indoor marks and three of the top 10 outdoor bests in school history, not to mention earning indoor all-conference accolades with a runner-up finish at the BIG EAST Indoor Championship.

Some of Winsor's other notable proteges on the men's side have been two-time long jump All-American Marshaun West, as well as 1999 indoor pole vault All-American Mike Brown, 1993 NCAA indoor high jump qualifier Todd Herman, and Godwin Mbagwu, the Outstanding Field Performer at the 2004 BIG EAST Outdoor Championship, which was won by Notre Dame.

As for the women, Winsor helped 2003 graduate Tameisha King to long jump All-America honors four times, including top-eight finishes in both the indoor and outdoor NCAA events in '03. King is now considered one of the top long jumpers in the United States and is in prime position for a berth on the 2008 U.S. Olympic Team.

Winsor's guidance also helped Volkmer evolve as the pioneer in women's pole vault at Notre Dame, winning seven all-BIG EAST citations and becoming the first Irish female vaulter to clear the 13-foot barrier.

Thanks to Winsor, Notre Dame broke new ground in 1997 as Jennifer Engelhardt became the first member of the Irish women's



track & field team to qualify for the NCAA Championships in a field event. Engelhardt placed ninth in the indoor high jump en route to the first of her three All-America honors (also in 1999 and 2000), making her the first Notre Dame woman to accomplish that feat. In addition, Engelhardt was the first Irish female high jumper to clear six feet and she went on to compete at the 2000 U.S. Olympic Trials, where she finished tied for seventh.

Following in Engelhardt's footsteps, Cowan qualified for the NCAA Championship three times in her career, earning All-America honors in 2004 with a 10th-place finish in the indoor high jump. Additionally, Cowan still holds the school records in the indoor high jump (1.82m, 5-11 1/2) and heptathlon (4,576 points) and she earned seven all-BIG EAST plaques in her career.

Winsor's achievements have not gone unnoticed. He and the Notre Dame staff have earned ten BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year awards, while helping lead the Irish to ten conference championships.

In addition to his coaching responsibilities, Winsor designed the new Outdoor Throwing Facility at the University. He also is actively involved with all aspects of recruiting for the Irish track & field program, and he plays an integral role in the event management for all home track and cross country meets at Notre Dame.

Prior to his arrival in South Bend in 1988, Winsor spent two years (1983-84) as the varsity track coach at Fulton High School in Middleton, Mich., as well as one season (1987) as an assistant at his alma mater, Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa.

A 1987 graduate of Loras with a bachelor's degree in physical education (K-12), Winsor was a standout performer on the track squad, specializing in the jumping events. He was the team's captain for his final two seasons, helping Loras win the 1987 Iowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference title. For nearly two decades, he also held the school record in the outdoor high jump (7-0) until the mark was topped in 2005.

Winsor went on to earn his master's of science in administration degree from Notre Dame in 1995.

One of the greatest distance runners in Notre Dame track & field history, Luke Watson returned to his alma mater in 2006 as an assistant to the Irish coaching staff. Now in his third season of coaching, Watson will again focus his efforts on aiding head coach Joe Piane with Notre Dame's men's cross country and distance units.

Watson is probably best known for his scintillating performance at the 2003 Meyo Invitational, when he broke one of the greatest barriers in sports, the four-minute mile. Before one of the largest crowds ever to witness a Notre Dame track meet, Watson's mile of 3:57.83 was the fastest indoor collegiate mile in the country that year and only the second sub-four-minute mile in school history.

An eight-time All-America selection in both cross country and track & field for the Irish, Watson registered five top-10 finishes at the NCAA Track & Field Championship, as well as two top-10 outings at the NCAA Cross Country Championship. In addition, at the time of his graduation, he held six school records — he still is the standard bearer in the indoor mile and outdoor 3,000-meter steeplechase, owning seven of the top eight times in Irish history in the latter event.

On the cross country course, Watson's fifth-place finish at the 2001 NCAA Championship remains the best by a Notre Dame runner at the national meet since 1964. He also was a valuable contributor to Notre Dame's three consecutive NCAA top-10 team finishes from 1999-2001.

Adam Beltran has joined the Notre Dame men's and women's track and field program as an assistant coach for throws, prepping for his first season working with the Irish, taking over for B.J. Linnenbrink, the former Notre Dame throws coach.

Prior to joining the Notre Dame staff, Beltran was on the track and field staff at Saint Francis (Pa.) University where he worked with the Red Flash throwers and oversaw the program's recruiting efforts. Under his tutelage, 20 St. Francis student-athletes won Northeast Conference (NEC) titles in the men's and women's weight throw, javelin, hammer throw, discus and women's shot put.

During his tenure Beltran watched 17 Red Flash throwing records fall in the men's and women's indoor shot put, discus, javelin, women's outdoor shot put and the men's hammer and weight throw. In 2007, junior Lisa Morse earned the Outstanding Field Performer award at the outdoor conference championships, while Diane Gmitter went on to

At the BIG EAST level, Watson was dominant in both track & field and cross country, winning a total of six individual conference titles. He also led the Irish to a sweep of the '03 BIG EAST indoor & outdoor titles, the first time ever that Notre Dame pulled off that feat. He also piled up an amazing 15 all-conference honors during his track and cross country careers, a mark that ties for the second-most in school history.

Upon graduating from Notre Dame, Watson has continued to race on the national and international level. He has finished third in the 3,000 meters at the USATF Indoor National Championship each of the past three years (2004-06) and was a finalist in the 3,000 meters at the 2004 U.S. Olympic Trials.

Besides maintaining his career on the track, Watson has recently entered the coaching ranks as well. He comes to Notre Dame after spending two years (2004-06) as an assistant coach at Edina (Minn.) High School, while simultaneously serving one season (2004-05) as recruiting coordinator at Augsburg College in Minneapolis, Minn., and he is a USA Track & Field Level 1 certified coach.

Watson was a standout in the classroom at Notre Dame, twice earning Academic All-America honors on the way to completing work on his bachelor's degree in accounting from the Mendoza College of Business in 2002. Subsequently, he has passed the Certified Public Accountant exam.

Born Aug. 20, 1980 in Minneapolis, Watson now resides in South Bend.

win the same award at the indoor conference championships.

Before his stint at Saint Francis, Beltran served as an assistant coach at the University of Missouri-Kansas City. He again worked with throwers and coached the athletes to Mid-Continent Conference titles in the shot put and the javelin. Nine of his athletes went on to break UMKC track and field records under his tutelage.

"We are very excited to have a young and energetic coach like Adam (Beltran)," track and field head coach Joe Piane said leading up to Beltran's start at Notre Dame. "He has had very good success at Saint Francis and I think he could evolve into one of the best coaches in the nation here at Notre Dame."

A 1999 graduate of UMKC, the Austin, Texas native earned his bachelor of liberal arts degree with an emphasis in American Studies and a minor in Black Studies/Cultural Anthropology. He has earned USA Track and Field Level I and Level II certification.

Notre Dame's founding can perhaps best be characterized as an outburst of missionary zeal. How else can one describe the action of Father Edward Sorin, the 28-year-old French priest of the Congregation of Holy Cross who — with \$310 cash and three log buildings in various stages of disrepair in the middle of the northern Indiana frontier — had the temerity to christen his enterprise the University of Notre Dame du Lac?

Notre Dame at its founding was a name in search of, or perhaps in anticipation of, a university. The wonder is not so much what the University has become more than a century and a half later, but that it survived at all in those early years of beginning almost literally from nothing.

In his book, *The University of Notre Dame: A Portrait of Its History and Campus*, historian Thomas Schlereth of the American studies department has described the odds the University was up against: "Only nine other Catholic colleges existed when Notre Dame was founded, but that number had grown to 51 by 1861. Presently only seven of these antebellum institutions still exist. One historian estimates a mortality rate of approximately 80 percent among Notre Dame's contemporary secular institutions. Yet Notre Dame survived ..."

The University's survival of those early years is a tribute not only to the faith of Father Sorin, but also to his pragmatism and wit. In the beginning, his institution's only admissions requirement was the ability to pay — some payment, at least, and not necessarily in currency or coin; livestock or the services of a tradesman or some other "in-kind" payment also were cheerfully accepted. Nor were admissions limited by religious preference. Father Sorin's mission and inspiration were thoroughly and indisputably Catholic, but from the beginning he made it clear that would-be students of any religious persuasion were welcome; indeed, the fact that Notre Dame's student body eventually would become overwhelmingly Catholic was more a reflection of American culture than of parochialism on the University's part.

Sorin was equally flexible when it came to his University's academic offerings. While a classical collegiate curriculum was established early on, so too were elementary and preparatory programs as well as a manual-labor school, and for several decades the collegiate program never attracted more than a dozen students in any year. As Notre Dame's chronicler, Father Arthur Hope, C.S.C., has written, "If (Sorin) was to begin at all, the head of this new college had to be mightily concerned about frostbite and

empty stomachs. The more elusive problems of intellectual development would have to wait."

If Notre Dame in its infancy was the child of Sorin's vision and will, its subsequent growth and development were the products of large and powerful social and historical forces. Just as the University was being established, the first waves of European immigrants, overwhelmingly Catholic, were reaching America's shores, and Notre Dame's location — though seemingly remote — in fact put it within easy reach of cities like Chicago, Detroit and St. Louis, all of which soon would have large immigrant Catholic populations. The immigrant experience and the growth of the University of Notre Dame would be inextricably linked.

A number of forces were at work in this relationship. The "American Dream" was coming into being, and with it the hope and expectation that, through hard work and education, children would enjoy greater opportunities than their parents. At the same time, anti-immigrant and anti-Catholic sentiments were open and pervasive in American society, creating barriers to immigrant Catholic students. Equally strong sentiments among many Catholics regarded public schools at any level as dangerous places where young people might lose their faith. For all these reasons, education — primary, secondary and higher education — became a centerpiece of American Catholicism.

Though it may not have seemed so at the time, this great historical movement of peoples and the creation of the American melting pot dramatically enhanced the odds of Notre Dame's survival. What still had to be decided, however, was precisely the type of institution Notre Dame would become. How could this small Midwestern school without endowment and without ranks of well-to-do alumni hope to compete with firmly-established private universities and public-supported state institutions? As in Sorin's day, the fact that the University pursued this lofty and ambitious vision of its future was testimony to the faith of its leaders — men such as Father John Zahm, C.S.C.



As Schlereth describes it: "Zahm ... envisioned Notre Dame as potentially 'the intellectual center of the American West,' an institution with large undergraduate, graduate, and professional schools equipped with laboratories, libraries, and research facilities. Notre Dame should strive to become the University that its charter claimed it was."

Zahm was not without evidence to support his faith in Notre Dame's potential. On this campus in 1899, a young Notre Dame scientist by the name of Jerome Green became the first American to transmit a wireless message. At about the same time, Albert Zahm, Father John's younger brother, was designing the first successful helicopter and first wind tunnel while also launching the first man-carrying glider from the roof of a campus building. The University also had established the nation's first architecture, law and engineering schools under Catholic auspices.

The debate over Notre Dame's future effectively was ended in the two decades following the First World War. In 1919, the University installed its first president to have earned a Ph.D., Father James Burns, C.S.C., and the changes he initiated were as dra-

matic as they were far-reaching. The elementary, preparatory and manual-labor programs were scrapped; the University's first board of lay advisors was established with the goal of creating a \$1-million endowment, with a national campaign conducted to achieve that goal; and the first annual giving program for alumni was launched. With this impetus established, the period between 1919 and 1933 would see the University of Notre Dame erect 15 new buildings and triple the numbers of both its students and its faculty.

A new and utterly unanticipated element was added to the ethos of Notre Dame during this period, and the University forever after would be a national institution. That new element was, of course, the game of football. But for Notre Dame and for its legions of ethnic American loyalists — most, but not all, Catholic — the cliché was true: football was more than a game. Through its academic program, Notre Dame already was part of the striving of ethnic Americans to earn a place in the American mainstream. But in this golden era, even for those who had never and would never attend Notre Dame, the University became a symbol, so much so that its attraction persists literally to this day.

The national recognition that football brought to Notre Dame was a mixed blessing at those times when it tended to overshadow the University's growing academic distinction, but overall it has been an almost incalculable boon to public awareness of, interest in, and support of Notre Dame. It may be amusing to speculate how the University's history might have been different without the phenomenon of football, but the University is happy to accept this legacy as is.

If the post-World War I era saw Notre Dame's first flowering as a true University, the six decades since the Second World War have seen the vision of John Zahm reach full fruition. Father John Cavanaugh, C.S.C., began the process after the war by toughening Notre Dame's entrance requirements, increasing faculty hiring, and establishing the Notre Dame Foundation to expand the University's development capabilities.

Then, during the 35-year tenure of Father Theodore Hesburgh, C.S.C., Notre Dame's enrollment, faculty and degrees awarded all doubled; library volumes increased five-fold; the endowment catapulted from less than \$10 million to more than \$400 million; campus physical facilities grew from 48 to 88 buildings; faculty compensation increased ten-fold; and research funding grew more than twenty-fold. In addition, two defining moments occurred during this period: the transference of University governance in 1967 from the Congregation of Holy Cross to a predominantly lay board of trustees and

the admission of women to undergraduate studies in 1972.

During the 18-year presidency of Father Edward Malloy, C.S.C., the University continued to grow in stature. Endowed faculty positions rose to more than 190, the student body became — and remains — one of the most selective in the nation (with one-third of entering freshmen ranking among the top five students in their high school graduating classes), and the graduation rate annually in the top five in the nation. The University is endowment of some \$5 billion is among the top 20 in American higher education, and campus additions during the Malloy years included new research laboratories, a graduate student housing complex, residence halls for undergraduate women (who now compose 47 percent of the student body), the 84-classroom DeBartolo Hall, the Mendoza College of Business, the DeBartolo Center for the Performing Arts, and the Jordan Hall of Science.

Father John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., who became Notre Dame's 17th president in July of 2005, has challenged his administration and the faculty, students, alumni and friends of the University to, in words from his inaugural speech, "build a Notre Dame that is bigger and better than ever — a great Catholic university for the 21st century, one of the pre-eminent research institutions in the world, a center for learning whose intellectual and religious traditions converge to make it a healing, unifying, enlightening force for a world deeply in need. This is our goal. Let no one ever again say that we dreamed too small."

Some goals are self-evident. The University must strive at all times to bring new vigor to its teaching and to enhance both the breadth and the depth of the education it offers students. At the same time, it must strengthen significantly its graduate programs and faculty research to make ever-greater contributions in the quest for new knowledge.

But the institutional mission of Notre Dame reaches beyond these goals.

The higher aspiration of the University of Notre Dame is to seek out and assume leadership roles through which students and alumni, faculty, interdisciplinary institutes, and professional programs can bring their accomplishments to bear on the most basic and pressing needs of humanity — for peace and social justice, for human rights and dignity, for ethical conduct in business, science and the professions, for a renewal of values in interpersonal and societal relationships, and for a more-enlightened stewardship of the environment, to name but a few of the challenges.

This aspiration is incumbent upon Notre Dame as a Catholic university. Today, as throughout its history, Notre Dame's posi-

tion in American culture mirrors that of the Catholic Church. The world is very different from the one encountered by Father Sorin on his arrival in this country. The tangible barriers faced then by Catholic students and scholars have largely been removed, and today one may find such students and scholars at Harvard, Stanford and Duke, as well as at Notre Dame. American Catholics are firmly implanted in the American mainstream.

At the same time, the secularization of contemporary American society is an undisputed fact, and with that transformation has come a weakening of common values, an antipathy to belief, and a resistance to the very notion of underlying truths. One expression of this viewpoint is the contention that a Catholic university is a contradiction in terms, that reason and belief are somehow mutually exclusive. The Catholic intellectual tradition and the Western university tradition itself stand in opposition to this contention, as does Notre Dame.

It is a telling act that throughout Notre Dame's history, and increasingly in recent years, many eminent scholars of various faith traditions have made the University their home simply because they have preferred to work in a community of learning where belief is not merely tolerated, but in fact is celebrated.

Father Sorin's dream was predicated on his conviction that a university would be a powerful force for good in this land that he embraced as his own. For the University of Notre Dame, Sorin's conviction remains the inspiration, the mission and the driving force.

Director of Athletics

Kevin White, one of the most progressive and talented administrators in the intercollegiate athletics ranks, quickly attached his signature as director of athletics at the University of Notre Dame. His initial seven years in that position qualify as the most successful across-the-board years in the history of athletics at Notre Dame.

In addition, he has been cast in a handful of prominent national roles within collegiate athletics – including his ongoing representation with the Bowl Championship Series, his service in 2006-07 as president of NACDA (the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) and in 2005-06 as president of the Division I-A Athletic Directors Association. He also is part of the steering committee for Chicago's bid for the 2016 Summer Olympic Games.

White and his Notre Dame athletics program are coming off a 2006-07 season that included three national players of the year (Kerri Hanks and Joe Lapira as Hermann Trophy winners in women's and men's soccer – and Brady Quinn as Maxwell Award winner in football), a national coach of the year in Jeff Jackson (hockey), plus three NCAA post-graduate scholarship winners (most since 1975) in Ted Brown (swimming), Stephanie Brown (softball) and Maryann Erigha (track and field).

A record-setting '06-'07 hockey season that included 32 wins, seven weeks ranked number one, a first-ever Central Collegiate Hockey Association regular-season title and a first-ever CCHA Tournament title headlined an athletic year that also featured an NCAA runner-up finish (and number-one ranking most of the year) in women's soccer, 15 teams ranked in the final top 25 (nine in the top 10), 32 All-Americans, 10 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans and nine conference coach-of-the-year selections.

Sports Illustrated On Campus (the online subset of *Sports Illustrated's* SI.com) ranked Notre Dame's overall athletic program seventh best in the country for 2006-07 – with extra credit for success in football and basketball.

White was named the 2006 GeneralSports TURF Systems Division I-A Central Region Athletic Director of the Year – thanks to Notre Dame's best-ever sixth-place finish in the NACDA Cup competition, its 44 All-Americans, 14 Academic All-Americans, five combination All-American/Academic All-Americans and 13 BIG EAST Conference titles, all Irish records.

Twenty-four (of 26) Notre Dame programs qualified teams or individuals for postseason play in 2005-06, 16 teams finished in national top-25 rankings, nine finished in the top 10, six ended up in the top 10 in NCAA competition and four achieved top-four NCAA finishes (men's and women's fencing, women's lacrosse and men's cross country). Three Notre Dame head coaches received national coach-of-the-year recognition in 2005-06 – Charlie Weis in football, Jay Louderback in women's tennis and Tracy Coyne in women's lacrosse.

A career educator and one of the most respected athletic administrators in the nation, White previously had been athletics director at Arizona State University, Tulane University, the University of Maine, and Loras College. He brought a combined 18 years (1982-83 to 1999-2000) of experience in those positions with him to his assignment at Notre Dame.

Appointed on March 13, 2000, White became the first Notre Dame athletic director to report directly to the University's president. After agreeing to an original five-year contract as well as a five-year extension, White in December 2002 saw his commitment extended an additional two years to 2012.

White's first seven years at Notre Dame from 2000-01 through 2006-07 saw unprecedented achievement on Irish fields of play:

- Notre Dame finished 11th, 13th, 13th, 19th, 16th, a program-best sixth, then 22nd, respectively, in the NACDA Directors' Cup (formerly sponsored by Sears) all-sports ratings in those seven years, accounting for its best-ever seven-year run in that competition.
- Irish teams have achieved number-one national rankings 13 times during his years at Notre Dame – women's basketball in 2000-01; baseball in '01; men's fencing in '00, '02 and '03; women's fencing in '04, '05 and '06; women's soccer in '00, '04, '05 and '06, and hockey in 2007.
- The Irish claimed the '01 national championship in women's basketball; the '03 and '05 NCAA titles in fencing (a men's and women's combined championship); the '04 crown in women's soccer; a runner-up finish in '06 in women's soccer, third-place finishes in fencing in '01, '02 and '04, in women's cross country in '03, and in men's cross country in '05; national semifinal appearances in women's soccer in '00 and men's lacrosse in '01, and a College World Series appearance in baseball in 2002.
- Notre Dame has seen its number of athletes earning All-America honors improve regularly – to a record 44 in 2005-06.
- Notre Dame's record-setting 2005-06 season saw 24 of 26 programs send teams or individuals to postseason play. Sixteen of a possible 22 teams earned national rankings in 2000-01, including 10 that achieved the highest rating in the history of the program. In 2001-02, 20 of 26 teams qualified for NCAA competition. In 2002-03, 13 sports managed top 25 national finishes – and 17 advanced to postseason competition. In 2003-04 an unprecedented 22 teams qualified for NCAA competition, including two (hockey and women's golf) that accomplished that for the first time and a third (men's golf) that made the field for the first time in 38 years. Twenty Irish squads in 2004-05 advanced teams or individuals to NCAA play.
- Notre Dame in 2002 was the only school in the country to qualify all six of its teams – men's and women's soccer, men's and women's cross country, volleyball and football – for fall NCAA tournament competition (or, in the case of football, a bowl game). Notre Dame and Texas were the only schools in 2002-03 to play in football bowl games and have both their men's and women's basketball squads advance to the NCAA Sweet 16 round. In 2005, Notre Dame was the only school to win at least twice in both NCAA soccer tournaments and in the NCAA volleyball championship (men's soccer and volleyball won twice, women's soccer had three NCAA wins). Notre Dame, Penn State and California were the only schools to win at least once in those three 2005 NCAA tournaments and also play in a Division I football bowl game.



- Notre Dame won the BIG EAST Conference Commissioner's Trophy for overall athletic success in league play in 2001, '02 and '03 for both men and women (the trophy was no longer awarded after 2003) – and the Irish annually lead the league in conference titles, including a record 13 in 2005-06.

His initial seven years on the job at Notre Dame featured a handful of other noteworthy accomplishments:

- He helped the Irish athletics program toward its goal of becoming a top five program in the NACDA Directors' Cup competition by championing the University's plan to add 64 grants-in-aid over a four-year span (that goal was announced in December 2000), in order to give all 26 varsity sports the full NCAA complement of scholarships.
- He emphasized the need to remain competitive on the facilities front by commissioning a facilities master plan that now provides a long-term plan for upgrading Notre Dame's athletic physical plant. The first facility from that plan opened in 2005, with the addition of the Guglielmino Athletics Complex that provides a day-to-day home for the Irish football program as well as enhanced space for training, sports medicine, equipment, and strength and conditioning for all Notre Dame student-athletes. Opened in fall 2006 was the 10,500-square foot Robert and Marilyn Rolfs Family All-Season Varsity Golf Facility that serves as the home of the Notre Dame men's and women's golf teams. Plans have been announced for a refurbished Joyce Center arena, ground has been broken for a new softball stadium and a major gift has been received for a new lacrosse stadium.
- On the academic front, Irish student-athletes enjoyed their most productive year ever in the classroom in 2005-06 – as for the first time in the 2005 fall semester and the 2006 spring semester, every Notre Dame program achieved at least a 3.0 grade-point average. A Notre Dame record 14 individuals claimed Academic All-America notice in 2005-06 – followed by 10 in 2006-07.

- The American Football Coaches Association awarded its Academic Achievement Award for 2001 to Notre Dame based on its 100 percent graduation for entering freshmen from 1995 – then again for 2007 based on a 95 percent rate from the class that entered in 2001. The University received a 2002 *USA Today*/NCAA Academic Achievement Award for graduating 90 percent of its student-athletes who enrolled in 1995 – and it also received the 2003 award for highest overall student-athlete graduation rate (92 percent of those who enrolled in 1996).
 - When the NCAA first issued its Academic Performance Rate graduation numbers in 2005, Irish teams excelled, with 13 of them earning a perfect 1,000 score. In the three-year combined numbers issued in 2007, Notre Dame's nine perfect scores ranked second (to Boston College's 10) in the I-A football-playing subset. Notre Dame in '07 had 11 programs honored for multi-year APR achievement.
 - Seventeen of 22 athletics programs at Notre Dame compiled graduation rates of 100 percent, according to the Graduation Success Rate figures announced in 2006-07 by the NCAA (no other Division I-A football school had as many as 17). Among 119 I-A football schools, Notre Dame's GSR numbers ranked second (98 percent) for all student-athletes, second (97) for male student-athletes, tied for fourth (99) for female student-athletes, fourth (91) for black student-athletes and third (95) for football student-athletes. When the final 2005 *USA Today* football poll of coaches was re-ranked by football GSR score, Notre Dame (11th in the actual poll) finished first in that tabulation at 96, just ahead of Clemson at 94 (21st in actual poll).
 - The NCAA Division I-A Athletic Directors' Association gave one of its four 2000 awards of excellence to Notre Dame's CHAMPS/Life Skills Program
 - He assured long-term consistency in the Irish coaching ranks by signing Notre Dame head coaches to multi-year contracts – with all assistant coaches and administrators signing contracts for the first time starting in 2001-02.
 - He renewed in 2003 Notre Dame's NBC Sports contract for televising of home football games for five more years (2006-10 for that renewal, extending the relationship to 20 years) and its Westwood One contract for football radio broadcasts for five more years (2003-07). He also created the new football radio network relationship with ISP Sports that begins in 2008 and extends to 2017.
 - He oversaw the University's NCAA re-certification process in 2004 as Notre Dame went through that self-study and peer review process for the first time since 1997. The University's athletics program was recertified without conditions, with the committee noting that Notre Dame is "committed to academic success of its student-athletes and demonstrates this by requiring three more core courses than what is required by the NCAA," that Notre Dame "student-athletes are quite satisfied with quantity and quality of academic support and attribute much of the success around graduation rates to this service," and that Notre Dame has "affirmed and demonstrated its commitment to fair and equitable treatment" of male, female and minority student-athletes.
- In addition to the varsity athletic component, White's assignment at Notre Dame also includes administration of a comprehensive intramural, club sport and campus recreation program, with 95 percent of the student body participating. *Sports Illustrated On Campus* rated the Irish intramural program tops in the nation in 2004.

With a Ph.D. in education, White has taught graduate-level classes beginning in 1982-83 with his tenure at Loras, including currently as a concurrent associate professor in the management department of the Mendoza College of Business as part of Notre Dame's MBA program during spring semesters (he teaches a sports business course).

White has served on numerous NCAA committees, including the NCAA Council, formerly the association's highest governing body. In addition to his current role with the BCS, he previously was a member of the Rose Bowl Management Committee while at Arizona State, was an ex-officio member of the Sugar Bowl Committee during his tenure at Tulane and also worked closely with the Fiesta Bowl during his stay in Tempe.

In August 2003, SI.com (the *Sports Illustrated* web site) listed White third in its rankings of the most powerful people in college football. In its Jan. 12, 2004, issue, *Sporting News* listed him in its Power 100 as third among five names in the "front office" category (and the lone college athletics director among the 100). In December 2004, White was named the 15th most influential individual in collegiate sports by *Street & Smith's SportsBusiness Journal*. He has been a member of the NCAA Coalition on Intercollegiate Athletics (COIA) that deals with academics, fiscal reform and student-athlete well-being. He also was an ex-officio member of the NCAA Committee on Academic Performance and a member of its Penalty and Rewards subcommittee.

White has served as mentor for an impressive list of senior level athletics administrators who have worked for him, then gone on to become directors of athletics – including Jim Sterk of Washington State, Tom Boeh of Ohio University and currently Fresno State, Ian McCaw of Northeastern, Massachusetts and currently Baylor, Bruce Van De Velde previously of Iowa State, Herman Frazier of Hawaii, Rudy Keeling formerly of Emerson and now ECAC commissioner, Scott Devine of St. Mary's College (Md.), Tim Van Alstine of Western Illinois, Mark Wilson of Tennessee Tech, Bubba Cunningham of Ball State and currently Tulsa, Sandy Barbour (who followed him at Tulane) of California-Berkeley, Jim Phillips of Northern Illinois, Bernard Muir of Georgetown, Sandy Hatfield Clubb of Drake, Vic Cegles of Long Beach State and Norwood Teague of Virginia Commonwealth.

White has his own weekly, hour-long radio show on WLS-AM 890 in Chicago – and he has a pre-game segment on Westwood One's radio broadcasts of Notre Dame football games.

During his coaching career, White served as head track and field coach at Southeast Missouri State (1981-82) and assistant cross country and track and field coach at Central Michigan (1976-80). He began his coaching career at Gulf High School in New Port Richey, Fla., coaching cross country and track and assisting in football and wrestling. White also spent a year (1980-81) as district administrator for athletics and special projects for the Mt. Morris Consolidated School District in Mt. Morris, Mich. During his tenure at Loras, he originated the National Catholic Basketball Tournament.

Born Sept. 25, 1950, in Amityville, N.Y., White earned his Ph.D. from Southern Illinois University in 1983 with an emphasis on higher education administration (his dissertation title was *An Appraisal of the Women's Intercollegiate Athletic Programs, and the Relationship to Men's Athletics at the Big Ten Conference Institutions Before and After Title IX Implementation*). In 1985 he completed postdoctoral work at Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management. He earned his master's degree in athletics administration from Central Michigan University in 1976 and his bachelor's degree in business administration in 1972 from St. Joseph's

College in Rensselaer, Ind., where he also competed as a sprinter in track and field. He was awarded St. Joseph's Alumni Achievement Award in 1997, and he's currently a member of the Loras College Board of Regents. He was a 2006 inductee into the Suffolk County (Long Island, N.Y.) Sports Hall of Fame

White also attended the University of South Florida and St. Leo College in Tampa, Fla., between 1972 and '76 – and he took 60 hours of advanced graduate courses in higher education administration at Michigan State University between 1977 and '80. He received an honorary doctorate in 2007 from the United States Sports Academy.

White's wife, Jane, earned a bachelor's degree from St. Joseph's in 1973 and a master's in physical education from Central Michigan in 1977. She also served as head track and field coach at Central Michigan and currently is an instructor with Notre Dame's physical education department. White and his wife both received honorary degrees from St. Joseph's in 2001.

The couple have five children – Maureen, who completed a master of fine arts degree at Arizona State in 2000 and currently teaches at Notre Dame Prep School in Scottsdale, Ariz.; Michael, a University of Mississippi graduate and four-year starter at point guard for the Ole Miss basketball team and now an assistant basketball coach at his alma mater (after a stint at Jacksonville State University in Alabama); Daniel, a University of Notre Dame graduate and member of the 2000-01 Irish basketball squad, who was an assistant basketball coach at Ohio University while earning his MBA in sports administration there, and now is associate athletics director for development at Fresno State University; Brian, a 2006 graduate of the University of Notre Dame and now an MBA student in the Ohio University sports administration program (he served as an intern in the Arizona State athletics department in 2006-07); and Mariah, a high school junior who is a standout in swimming.



Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.
University President

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., took office as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2005. He was elected by the University's Board of Trustees to a five-year term April 30, 2004.

An associate professor of philosophy and member of Notre Dame's faculty since 1990, Father Jenkins had served from 2000-2005 as a vice president and associate provost at the University.

Prior to his service in the provost's office, Father Jenkins had been religious superior of the Holy Cross priests and brothers at Notre Dame for three years. As religious superior, he was a Fellow and Trustee of the University, but he relinquished those posts to assume his duties in the provost's office.

Father Jenkins specializes in the areas of ancient philosophy, medieval philosophy and the philosophy of religion. He is the author of *Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aquinas*, published by Cambridge University Press in 1997.

Father Jenkins earned degrees in philosophy from Oxford University in 1987 and 1989. He earned his master of divinity degree and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, Calif., in 1988.

Prior to entering the Congregation of Holy Cross, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively. Father Jenkins was ordained a priest in Notre Dame's Basilica of the Sacred Heart in 1983. He served as director of the Old College program for Notre Dame undergraduate candidates for the Congregation of Holy Cross from 1991 to 1993.

A native of Omaha, Neb., Father Jenkins was born Dec. 17, 1953.

Thomas G. Burish, formerly president at Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va., and a 1972 Notre Dame alumnus, was elected provost on July 21, 2005. As provost and second-ranking officer of the University, he exercises responsibility for all academic matters. He is the fourth person to hold the office since it was established in 1970. Burish succeeded Nathan O. Hatch, who became president of Wake Forest University. In addition, Burish serves as a professor of psychology at Notre Dame.

Burish had been president of one of the nation's top liberal-arts colleges since July 2002. Prior to joining Washington and Lee and prior to being named president, he was the longest-serving provost in the history of Vanderbilt University. He served as provost at the nationally-renowned research university from 1993 to 2002.

Known as a ground-breaking researcher, award-winning teacher and gifted leader, Burish exemplifies the excellence and humanity to which Notre Dame is dedicated. Through his work, he has helped "tens of thousands of cancer patients better cope with the emotional and physical pain of this disease," according to John R. Seffrin, chief executive officer of the American Cancer Society. Burish currently serves as chair of the American Cancer Society's national board of directors.

A native of Peshtigo, Wis., Burish was graduated from Notre Dame, summa cum laude, with a bachelor's degree in psychology in 1972. He earned his master's degree in psychology from the University of Kansas in 1975 and a doctorate in clinical psychology from Kansas a year later.

While at Kansas, Burish received the David Shulman Memorial Award of Excellence in Clinical Psychology. He moved in 1976 to Vanderbilt, becoming a full professor in 1986. He won Vanderbilt's prestigious Madison Sarratt Prize for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching in 1980 and served as chair of the department of psychology from 1984 to 1986. Burish became Vanderbilt's provost in 1993. He is the co-author or co-editor of four books, and has contributed to more than 16 other books while writing more than 60 journal articles.



Dr. John Affleck-Graves
Executive Vice President

John Affleck-Graves was elected the first lay executive vice president of Notre Dame in April 2004. A vice president and associate provost the previous three years, he also holds the Notre Dame Chair in Finance in the Mendoza College of Business.

Dr. Affleck-Graves, the fifth person to serve as executive vice president, administers Notre Dame's annual operating budget of more than \$700 million and an endowment of approximately \$4 billion. He oversees human resource activities for a work force of more than 4,000 employees – the largest in St. Joseph County – and directs the University's construction program.

A native of South Africa and a naturalized U.S. citizen, Dr. Affleck-Graves specializes in the study of initial public offerings, valuation and asset pricing models, and shareholder value-added methodology. He is the author of more than 50 refereed publications and the recipient of numerous teaching awards.

Dr. Affleck-Graves joined the Notre Dame faculty in 1986 after teaching and conducting research for 11 years at the University of Cape Town, where he earned bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees.

Richard C. Notebaert, chairman and chief executive officer of Qwest Communications International, was elected the sixth chair of Notre Dame's Board of Trustees in February 2007 and began service July 1.

A member of the Notre Dame Board since 1997, Notebaert has served as chair of its University Relations and Public Affairs and Communication Committee. He also has served as a Fellow of the University, and continues to serve in that capacity.

Notebaert has directed Qwest since 2002. A renowned leader in broadband, data, voice and image communications, the company is based in Denver. Notebaert previously served as chief executive officer of Tellabs Inc., and as chairman and chief executive officer of Ameritech Communications.

A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Notebaert is a member of the board of directors of Aon Corp., Cardinal Health Inc., the Denver Center for the Performing Arts and the Denver Art Museum. His professional activities include memberships in the Business Council and the International Advisory Council of the Executives' Club of Chicago. In April 2003 he was appointed by President Bush to the National Security Telecommunications Advisory Committee.

Don Pope-Davis, dean of Notre Dame's Graduate School and professor of psychology at the University of Notre Dame, was elected vice president and associate provost by the University's Board of Trustees, on July 19, 2007.

In his new position, Pope-Davis will be responsible for leading and managing the Provost's Office's involvement in the faculty recruitment and hiring process, tenure and promotions procedures, mentoring programs for faculty, and the creation and administration of new programs to help prepare faculty leaders to carry out administrative tasks.

In 2006, Pope-Davis was appointed chair of Notre Dame's Faculty Board on Athletics and its NCAA faculty athletics representative. He is a member of the NCAA Committee on Athletic Certification and was chair of Notre Dame's NCAA certification subcommittee for equity, gender and sportsmanship. He also serves on campus on the Provost's Advisory Committee and the Diversity Committee.

A member of the Notre Dame faculty since 2000, Pope-Davis studies in the areas of multicultural psychology, counseling and education. He is the co-author of three books, "Multicultural Counseling Competencies: Assessment, Education, and Supervision," "The Intersections of Race, Class, and Gender in Multicultural Counseling," and, most recently, "Handbook of Multicultural Competencies in Counseling and Psychology." Pope-Davis has published more than 50 journal articles and book chapters in his fields of study and currently is a research fellow of the American Psychological Association.

Pope-Davis earned his doctorate in counseling psychology from Stanford and his bachelor's degree in psychology and theology from Benedictine University in Lisle, Ill.

Academic Services

The Academic Services for Student-Athletes Office is designed to help Notre Dame fulfill its commitment to all student-athletes in their pursuit of a college degree and academic excellence. In order to achieve these goals, Academic Services has several major aims:

- To maintain the academic integrity of the University
- To help student-athletes maximize their academic potential
- To comply with University and NCAA rules and regulations
- And to assist all student-athletes as they work towards graduation in four years

These objectives work together and are aimed at teaching student-athletes to be responsible for their academic careers.

To this end, Academic Services provides student-athletes many services that begin when First Year students arrive on campus and continue through graduation. The office provides consistent counseling and appropriate interventions regarding academic matters, in addition to referring student-athletes to campus offices where they can meet regularly with their professors and engage in services provided by the various colleges and departments.

As soon as student-athletes begin classes, Academic Services monitors their progress through regular communication with professors that includes feedback regarding each student's level of work, attendance and any need for additional support. If professors or student-athletes feel there is need for additional help, Academic Services can provide tutorial assistance.

In addition to this interaction with the faculty, the counselors in Academic Services meet regularly with student-athletes. During these meetings, counselors assist the students as they develop both semester-long and career academic goals. Discussions also may include topics such as time management, decision-making and appropriate interactions with faculty.

The Academic Services department received a new home in 2001, through a generous donation by football alumnus Jim Morse ('57) and his wife, Leah Rae, when the Coleman-Morse Center was completed. A \$14 million building, the James and Leah Rae Morse Center for Academic Services

houses Notre Dame's First Year of Studies program and Academic Services for Student Athletes. It also contains the University Writing Center and a satellite office for the Center for Social Concerns, plus classrooms, staff offices, a tutoring center, computer cluster, work rooms and a lounge.

Working in conjunction with several other offices on the Notre Dame campus, Academic Services assists student-athletes with postgraduate planning and transition into professional careers. Although the primary focus of Academic Services is to support and challenge student-athletes during their time at Notre Dame, assisting them as they prepare for life after college remains part of their mission.

Who is a Representative of Notre Dame's Athletics Interests?

(The following lists of examples are not all-inclusive. As always, **ask before you act!**)

You are if:

- you are an enrolled student or graduate of the University.
- you ever have participated in or are a member of any organization promoting Notre Dame's athletics program (the former Quarterback Club, the 3-Point Club, the Fast-Break Club, etc.).
- you ever have made financial contributions to the University of Notre Dame athletics department.
- you ever have helped to arrange employment of or provided any benefits to prospective or enrolled student-athletes.
- you ever have been a season ticket holder in any sport.
- you ever have promoted the athletics programs at the University of Notre Dame.

According to NCAA rules, once an individual has been identified as an institutional "representative of athletics interests" the individual retains that title for life. The University of Notre Dame ultimately is responsible for the behavior of all its athletics representatives in relation to NCAA rules and regulations. Violations of NCAA regulations by an athletics representative could result in the loss of eligibility for involved student-athletes (e.g. no participation in competitions) and/or severe sanctions against the University (e.g. loss of scholarships, television and post-season bans).

Current Student-Athlete

A student-athlete is any Notre Dame student who is a member of a varsity athletics team.

NCAA regulations apply to all student-athletes, not just those student-athletes who were recruited or who receive an athletics scholarship.

*Note: NCAA regulations concerning enrolled student-athletes remain in effect throughout the entire year (including summer break). If a student-athlete has completed his/her final season of eligibility, all NCAA regulations must be adhered to until he/she graduates or leaves school.

Do's and Don'ts for representatives in regards to a current student-athlete:

(The following lists of examples are not all-inclusive. As always, **ask before you act!**)

Do's

You may:

- contact a current student-athlete regarding employment opportunities. However, no contact may be made without approval from the Compliance Office.
- provide a student-athlete, not his/her family and friends, an occasional (once a semester) meal at your home.

Don'ts

You may not:

- provide a currently-enrolled student-athlete, his/her parents or friends any benefit or special arrangement without prior approval from the Compliance Office.
- pay for or arrange for payment of room, board or any type of transportation for a student-athlete or his/her family or friends.
- entertain student-athletes or their family and friends. (Exception: NCAA rules do permit institutional staff members and athletics representatives to provide student-athletes [not including their family and friends] with an occasional meal [defined as once a semester] provided the meal is at the staff member's or athletic representative's home and not at a restaurant.)
- use the name, picture or appearance of an enrolled student-athlete to advertise, recommend or promote sales or use of a commercial product or service of any kind; any use of a student-athlete's name, picture or appearance must receive authorization from the Compliance Office.
- provide any payment of expense or loan of an automobile for a student-athlete to return home or to travel to any other location.
- provide awards or gifts to a student-athlete for any reason; all awards provided to student-athletes must first be approved by the Compliance Office and meet all NCAA regulations.
- provide an honorarium to a student-athlete for a speaking engagement; all speaking engagements must be approved in advance by the Compliance Office.
- allow a student-athlete or his/her relatives or friends to use your telephone to make free calls.
- provide free or reduced-cost lodging in your home to a student-athlete or a student-athlete's family or friends.

Prospective Student-Athlete

A prospective student-athlete is any student who has started classes for ninth grade. Any student younger who receives any benefits from an institution or athletics representative would become a prospect. In addition, student-athletes enrolled in preparatory school or two-year colleges are considered prospective student-athletes.

* Note: An individual is considered a prospect (whether or not they have signed a National Letter of Intent) until the first day of initial collegiate enrollment or the first day they report for practice, whichever is earliest. Therefore, all NCAA regulations concerning contact with a prospective student-athlete are applicable until that time.

Do's and Don'ts for representatives in regards to a prospective student-athlete:

(The following lists of examples are not all-inclusive. As always, **ask before you act!**)

Do's

You may:

- forward information about prospective student-athletes to the appropriate coaching staff.
- have telephone contact with a prospect regarding permissible pre-enrollment activities such as summer employment, provided the prospect has graduated from high school and signed a National Letter of Intent; you must contact the Compliance Office to make them aware that you are making these employment arrangements.
- have a telephone conversation with a prospect only if the prospect initiates the call; such a call may not be prearranged by an institutional staff member, and you are not permitted to have a recruiting conversation, but may exhibit normal civility; you must refer any questions about our athletics programs to an athletics-department staff member/coach.
- view a prospect's athletic contest at your own initiative provided you do not contact the prospect or his/her parents; you may not contact a coach, principal, or counselor in an attempt to evaluate the prospect.
- continue established family relationships with friends and neighbors; contact with sons and daughters of these families is permitted so long as it is not made for recruiting purposes or encouraged by Notre Dame coaches.

Don'ts

You may not:

- write, e-mail or telephone a prospective student-athlete or his/her parents in an effort to recruit them to Notre Dame.
- become involved in making arrangements to provide money, financial aid or a benefit of any kind to a prospect or the prospect's family and friends.
- make contact with a prospective student-athlete or his/her parents when the prospect is on-campus for an official or unofficial recruiting visit.
- contact a prospect to congratulate him/her on signing a National Letter of Intent to attend the University.
- transport, pay or arrange for payment of transportation costs for a prospect or his/her relatives or friends to visit campus (or elsewhere).
- pay or arrange for payment of summer-camp registration fees for a prospect.
- provide ANYTHING to a prospect, the prospect's family or friends without prior approval from the Compliance Office.

Support of alumni and friends is welcomed and appreciated. We ask, however, that you help to keep Notre Dame's tradition of athletics integrity intact by following NCAA regulations. Your assistance will help ensure that the eligibility of prospective and currently-enrolled student-athletes is protected and preserved. Your efforts to know and follow the NCAA legislation are greatly appreciated because violations could affect the eligibility of involved prospects or student-athletes and/or result in NCAA penalties being imposed on the University.

To that end, it should be our goal, as the best alumni and fans in the country, to preserve and protect each and every student-athlete's eligibility. All NCAA legislation cannot be covered in a limited space such as this page. Therefore, any additional questions should be forwarded to the Compliance Office in the department of athletics. Please remember to **ask before you act!**

Student Development

Notre Dame's Student Welfare and Development Program is committed to the total development of student-athletes, by fostering the cultivation of skills that encourage student-athletes to reach their full potential. Designed to work in conjunction with existing on-campus student services, the program acknowledges the unique needs and demands of student-athletes. The program continues to receive national recognition for its student-athlete participation and has been named to the NCAS Outreach and Community Service Honor Roll four times in the past five years.

The Student Welfare and Development Program implements events and activities that are designed to facilitate learning within five key areas: academic excellence, athletic success, career preparation, community involvement and personal development.

The program has three components: elective services (community service, leadership, social events); complementary services (encourages administrators and coaches to request coordination of workshops, events and activities); and essential services (student-athletes participate in required skill-building and developmental workshops).

The many services offered by the Student Development Program include the following:

- Academic support by working in coordination with the Office of Academic Services for Student-Athletes.
- Athletic success support with discussion topics on performance enhancement, leadership, nutrition, agents and amateurism, and sports conduct.
- Preparing for postgraduate life by offering monthly career development workshops that educate student-athletes on resume composition, interviewing, business etiquette, and networking. Student Welfare and Development also works closely with the Notre Dame Career Center to ensure that student-athletes are prepared for life after college.
- Bringing Notre Dame and the community together through specific relationships with local area hospitals, community centers and outreach agencies to provide ongoing and reliable volunteer opportunities.
- An orientation program for freshman student-athletes to familiarize and identify the challenges and opportunities that are unique to them as both

students and athletes. These seminars also educate student-athletes on contemporary issues affecting college students.

For the second straight year, 92 percent of Notre Dame's student-athletes (from all 26 varsity teams) participated in community service activities during the 2006-07 academic year, with the student-athletes completing more than 4,000 hours of community service (nearly doubling the hours from 2005-06) while assisting more than 50 non-profit organizations and schools.

Student Development also is responsible for: managing the scholarship textbook process; designing and producing the annual Student-Athlete Handbook/Planner; facilitating "An Evening at Shamrock Hills" team dinners; serving as the primary advisors to the Student Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC); coordinating the Student-Athlete Leadership Institute; and facilitating the athletic department's annual year-end celebration, the O.S.C.A.R.S. – Outstanding Students Celebrating Achievements & Recognition Showcase.

The Positive Transition Seminar (PTS) remains the cornerstone of the Student Welfare and Development Personal Development component. Issues that headline the annual half-day symposium include dining etiquette, public speaking/media relations, healthy nutrition, financial and career planning, life after sports, as well as a panel discussion on transition and leadership, led by Notre Dame faculty, staff and administrators. In addition to attending the PTS, all juniors were required to meet with a career counselor to learn how to access career planning resources, schedule interviews, update resumes, and apply for internships and jobs. All told, Student Welfare and Development provided student-athletes with more than 50 educational seminars and programs throughout the 2006-07 academic year.

Professors at Practice continues to be an excellent opportunity for professors and their families to interact with student-athletes on the

playing field during practice, in addition to engaging in intellectual conversation at a dinner provided after practice. In the fall of 2005, more than 500 professors and their family members enjoyed an afternoon with the Irish football and baseball teams.

The Student-Athlete Advisory Council (SAAC), which helped bring about noteworthy enhancements within the athletics department in 2006-07, including:

- The establishment of a program that involved all student-athletes in a pledge for Sportsmanship Across All Circumstances; the program involved producing a sportsmanship commercial and community outreach that promoted sportsmanship, with the student-athletes pledging to build character and respect for self/others while upholding the values embodied by the Notre Dame spirit (in addition staying focused on leading, inspiring and making moral, sound decisions).

- Continued assisting with Freshman and Parent Orientation.

- Organization of a five-day community service trip to New Orleans during fall break to assist in the Hurricane Katrina relief efforts (work consisted of "mudding" and gutting homes that were damaged in the hurricane).

- Discussion of challenging topics pertaining to the student-athlete experience, such as: off-campus housing, career development, hazing, leadership development, venue and facility concerns, the need for an athletics department massage therapist and alcohol abuse.

- Participation as guest speakers at various Joyce Grants-in-Aid events during the fall.

SAAC's monthly meetings also include discussions on important issues such as NCAA legislation, career opportunities, eating disorders, alcohol and supplement use, and technological issues involving websites such as Facebook and Myspace.

The annual Student-Athlete Leadership Institute in 2007 was attended by a record total of nearly 100 student-athletes (97). This full-day leadership program challenges student-athletes to critically examine their role as leaders. Participants engage in intense team activities that require focus, teamwork, communication and determination for a successful outcome.

The Student Welfare and Development Program, in existence since 1996, continuously seeks to develop programs that educate student-athletes on current issues – so as to ensure that when they graduate from the University, they are prepared to successfully meet the challenges of life.

Statement of Principles

Throughout its long and proud history, the University of Notre Dame has embraced the philosophy that a well-rounded athletics program — including club, intramural and intercollegiate competition — comprises an integral part of Notre Dame's educational mission.

This philosophy reflects the importance of operating an intercollegiate athletics program that fully comports with the University's aspirations as a Catholic institution. Notre Dame therefore dedicates itself to the pursuit of excellence in intercollegiate athletics within the framework of an academic community committed to the University's educational and religious objectives.

Notre Dame also commits itself to the unquestioned integrity of its athletics programs. All individuals involved, directly or indirectly, in the athletics enterprise must maintain and foster the values and goals associated with the University's mission as a Catholic institution of higher education.

As a Catholic university, Notre Dame espouses Christian values and principles. These include the development of the human person — spirit as well as body — in addition to the pursuit of excellence in all endeavors, the nurturing of Christian character, and the call to personal integrity and responsibility. By providing a general description of the structures that support these endeavors, this document articulates the central values and expectations that guide the University of Notre Dame's participation in intercollegiate athletics.

PRESIDENTIAL CONTROL

Notre Dame adheres to the principle of presidential control over intercollegiate athletics. The director of athletics reports to the president, who exercises ultimate responsibility for the conduct of the University's intercollegiate athletics program. The Faculty Board on Athletics serves as the principal advisory group to the president on educational issues related to intercollegiate athletics. The chair of the Faculty Board on Athletics also serves as the NCAA-mandated faculty athletics representative.

Basic Principles

1. The Faculty Board on Athletics nurtures Notre Dame's commitment to academic integrity within the athletics program, strives to ensure that the University's athletics program operates in consonance with Notre Dame's educational mission, and actively promotes the welfare and educational success of the University's student-athletes. The Board also functions as a formal liaison between the faculty and the athletics department.

In carrying out its charge, the Board reviews policies, procedures and practices that affect the educational experience of student-athletes and advises the president of its findings and deliberations. The Board systematically ascertains the views and concerns of student-athletes. The Board reviews data on admissions of student-athletes and on their academic performance, progress towards degrees, and graduation rates. The Board assesses the effectiveness of institutional support for student-athletes. In addition, the Board sets guidelines for the approval of all student petitions for a fifth year of eligibility

for athletics and votes on each such petition. The Board establishes guidelines for all intercollegiate athletics schedules and qualifications for captaincy of all University teams, and it votes on all proposed schedules and captaincy nominations. The Board also assesses and revises procedures for resolving prospective conflicts between final examinations and post-season championship events.

In its role as a liaison to the broader faculty, the Faculty Board disseminates appropriate, non-confidential information and initiates discussions on educational issues regarding intercollegiate athletics and the related concerns of the faculty and administration.

2. The faculty athletics representative champions academic integrity, promotes the welfare of student-athletes, and helps ensure institutional control of intercollegiate athletics. More specifically, the faculty athletics representative works with the president and the director of athletics to maintain appropriate University oversight of intercollegiate athletics; assists the president and director of athletics in determining institutional positions on proposed NCAA and conference legislation; serves on search committees for senior athletics administrators and head coaches; oversees decisions regarding eligibility of student-athletes; remains visible and available to student-athletes; and actively participates in all investigations and reports of possible NCAA violations.

ACADEMICS

Notre Dame dedicates itself to providing to all of its students an outstanding education. The University commits itself to developing in its students those disciplined habits of mind, body and spirit that characterize educated, skilled and free human beings. Notre Dame calls its students to pursue the wisdom of our culture and religious heritage and to experience the human family's diversity and interdependence. To accomplish these objectives, the University provides to its students, on an equitable basis, ongoing opportunities to cultivate their moral, intellectual and physical well-being.

Basic Principles

1. Any student hoping to succeed at the University needs a significant level of ability and preparation. Therefore, the Office of Undergraduate Admissions will accept into the University only those student-athletes who demonstrate, on the basis of the best available academic and character-based information, the capacity to complete a degree at Notre Dame.

2. Even for individuals manifestly well suited for Notre Dame, the adjustments to the rigors of



academic and athletic life in a highly-competitive university present difficulties. The University recognizes its responsibility to provide appropriate assistance to enable student-athletes to meet the demands of both academic and athletic competition. To this end, the University affords its student-athletes suitable academic counsel and support, primarily under the auspices of the provost's office. Other sources of support, both academic and personal, include the faculty, academic advisors, the residence-hall staff, coaches, athletics administrators and the Student Development Program.

3. The University strives to schedule practices and competitions so as to minimize conflicts with class periods and other academic assignments of student-athletes. In this regard, the rhythm of the academic year and the particular importance of final examinations warrant special attention. All playing schedules remain subject to the approval of the Faculty Board on Athletics.

4. Notre Dame expects its student-athletes to maintain the appropriate sequence and number of courses and the grade-point-average necessary to complete a degree within the usual time (normally four years), including summer classes when appropriate. Any exception to this policy remains subject to the approval of the Faculty Board on Athletics.

STUDENT LIFE

Like other students, student-athletes should have the opportunity to pursue fully the University's academic, cultural and spiritual resources. The University holds student-athletes not only to the same standard of conduct that applies to other students, but also to that higher level of behavior appropriate to their visibility.

Basic Principles

1. Student-athletes must comply with all University rules and guidelines, including those set out in both the student handbook, du Lac, and in the Student-Athlete Handbook. The Office of Residence Life and Housing enforces the University-wide rules according to procedures applicable to all student disciplinary matters.

2. The University strives to integrate student-athletes into the student body so that all students may take full advantage of the educational and other opportunities afforded by campus and hall life. Given the centrality of residential life to the University's mission, student-athletes normally live in residence halls; exceptions to this policy remain subject to the approval of the Faculty Board on Athletics. Moreover, Notre Dame provides no separate residence halls or sections of residence halls for student-athletes.

3. The University lists among its primary concerns the physical and mental health of all members of the Notre Dame community. Because of the dangers inherent in athletic competition, the prevention of injuries and the provision of medical care for student-athletes demand particular concern and deserve constant attention. The appropriate sports-medicine and athletics-training personnel alone determine whether injury or illness precludes a student-athlete from practicing or competing.

4. Because of the harm that illicit drug use causes and the pressure on student-athletes to use performance-enhancing drugs, drug-related education and counseling require particular emphasis. As a preventive measure, all student-athletes remain subject to regular, random, and unannounced drug testing according to the University's established drug-testing protocol. University Health Services decides the timing of drug tests, determines whom to test and administers the tests. The drug-testing protocol prescribes the treatment of test results and the consequences of a positive test.

5. Notre Dame regularly provides chaplains for athletics teams. Chaplains' duties include pastoral care and liturgical services for student-athletes, coaches and staff.

COACHING STAFFS

The University strives to maintain a staff of coaches who represent the best in athletic instruction, who possess the ability to motivate and inspire, and who take responsibility for the full development of the student-athletes within their charge as students, athletes and persons. Coaches, who after all are primarily teachers, share with members of the faculty and other University

personnel the obligation to educate, train and otherwise assist in the formation of students entrusted to them. Furthermore, Notre Dame recognizes the important role each coach plays in the University's overall educational mission and makes this aspect an important part of both the coach's position description and periodic evaluation. Because of the public nature of their work, coaches represent Notre Dame in a highly-visible manner. Their words and actions should therefore reflect the University's values and principles.

Basic Principles

1. Notre Dame expects the personal and professional lives of its coaches to reflect highest standards of behavior. Coaches' actions must demonstrate that athletic success may not jeopardize institutional or personal integrity or student-athlete welfare.

2. Notre Dame expects its coaches to appreciate the primacy of academic life at Notre Dame and to emphasize that primacy during the recruitment and education of student-athletes and their participation in intercollegiate athletics.

3. Notre Dame requires its coaches to adhere to the policies and procedures of the University, its conferences and the NCAA. To that end, Notre Dame provides a comprehensive orientation to new coaches and suitable continuing education to other coaches. The University treats seriously all violations of University, conference or NCAA standards and reports such violations according to the applicable conference or NCAA procedures.

ADMINISTRATION OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ATHLETICS

The Director of Athletics and the other administrators in the department of athletics supervise all activities of the athletics program at the University. All aspects of the program must accord with the principles of justice and fairness. In addition, Notre Dame expects the personal and professional lives of its athletics administrators to reflect the highest standards of behavior. Athletics administrators also must adhere to the policies and procedures of the University, its conferences and the NCAA. The University treats all violations of such policies and procedures seriously.

Basic Principles

1. The University maintains full and direct control of the financial operations of the athletics department, including all revenues. The operating budget and the ongoing financial activities of the athletics department remain subject to the same approval process as all other units of the University.

2. Historically, Notre Dame's athletics program has generated funds sufficient to cover its expenses, as well as to provide funds for the University's general operating budget. The generation of revenue must always take into consideration Notre Dame's integrity and priorities.

3. The University commits itself to the principle of racial, ethnic and gender diversity in the composition of its coaching and administrative staffs. Notre Dame will make every reasonable effort to promote this commitment as positions are created or vacated.

4. Consistent with its overall academic mission and program, its financial resources and the athletic interests of its student body, the University will provide a full and stable athletics program for both sexes. Notre Dame embraces the principle of gender equity and will continue to monitor its

intercollegiate programs in accord with this principle.

5. In considering conference affiliations, the University will assess the extent to which the other institutions involved share Notre Dame's educational philosophies and goals, as well as its commitment to integrity in intercollegiate athletics.

CONCLUSION

Notre Dame endeavors to maintain a highly-competitive athletics program consistent with its tradition, heritage and overall mission as a Catholic university. It will attempt to excel in intercollegiate athletics, but always in conformity with its primary role as an educator and moral guide. Notre Dame will conduct its intercollegiate athletics program so as to support the University's commitment to education, as well as the letter and spirit of the policies and procedures of the University, its conferences and the NCAA.

Many observers often are surprised to discover that Notre Dame's total enrollment encompasses fewer than 12,000 students per year (roughly 8,300 of them undergrads). That surprise is due in part to the University's national appeal, but it also is due to the many noteworthy Notre Dame alumni who have gone on to distinguish themselves in a wide variety of fields.

Alumni Organizations

The Notre Dame Alumni Association was established in 1868, some 26 years after the University's founding. Father Neal Gillespie, C.S.C., was elected the first president of the Notre Dame Alumni Association, then comprised of just a few hundred graduates — while the current membership reaches nearly 110,000.

Leadership — Several Alumni Association staff are former Notre Dame student-athletes, led by executive director Chuck Lennon (a catcher with the Irish baseball team in the early 1960s) and another former Irish baseball player, Scott Siler ('82), who serves as the Association's director of information technology.

Membership — Any person who holds a Notre Dame undergraduate or graduate degree and any who

has matriculated at the University and is approved for membership by the Alumni Board shall be a regular member of the Alumni Association.

Alumni Clubs — An alumni club is one of the most viable channels through which the University is perceived by local communities. The Alumni Association helps coordinate activities of 217 domestic alumni clubs and 63 international chapters.

Reunion Weekend — Traditionally held the first weekend in June, the Alumni Reunion is the largest campus program sponsored by the Alumni Association. Each five-year class is invited to participate. The program offers exciting and rewarding events for some 3,000 alumni and their spouses.

Notre Dame Magazine — This quarterly publication is sent to all alumni as well as to parents of current Notre Dame students. News items that are contributed by class officers are featured in the section entitled, "The Classes."

The Alumni Newsletter — This publication is distributed three times a year and highlights people, programs and events that are related to the Alumni Association, including local alumni activities.

Visitors Center — The Eck Visitors Center, located on the south end of campus (next to the Hammes Bookstore), offers a meeting and resting place for visitors to Notre Dame, in addition to providing a summary of the University's history. Display cases line the walls, featuring University information and artifacts. A lighted aerial map gives a visual overview of campus and interactive kiosks allow visitors to take a virtual tour of the campus.

A number of sculptures are on display at the Visitors Center, including the work of the late world-renowned artist and Notre Dame professor Ivan Mestrovic. An auditorium offers a DVD movie that chronicles Notre Dame's tradition and excellence in academics and athletics and its commitment to spirituality.

Notre Dame Monogram Club: "Bridging the Gap Between Legend and Legacy"

The Notre Dame Monogram Club is comprised of nearly 7,000 individuals who have earned the University's varsity athletic insignia for their athletic or team-support endeavors or who have been honorary-monogram recipients. The club supports the primary goal of the University: the spiritual, intellectual and physical development of its students and alumni. By providing its members the opportunity to foster and maintain relationships across different sports, generations and geographical locations, the Monogram Club aspires to contribute — through the common bond of sport — to the social and professional enrichment of its members while providing a means for ongoing association with the University. As an integral part of the Notre Dame family, the Monogram Club endeavors to uphold and enrich the great tradition of Notre Dame athletics.

One of the organization's primary functions continues to be providing need-based aid to children of Monogram Club members to attend Notre Dame, through the Brennan-Boland-Riehle ("BBR") Scholarship Fund. The fund is named in honor of Joe Boland, Rev. Thomas Brennan, C.S.C., and Rev. James Riehle, C.S.C. Monogram Club members donate to the fund, and the University handles the principal funds, with interest providing scholarship money. The fund has grown to approximately \$5.8 million, making it one of Notre Dame's largest endowments.

Since the fund's inception in 1980, there have been 209 BBR Scholarship recipients — including 63 sons and daughters of Monogram Club members who attended Notre Dame in 2006-07 — whose combined scholarship allocations are more than \$2 million (\$215,000 in '06-'07 alone).

In 1976, at a meeting called by 1949 Heisman Trophy winner Leon Hart, the Monogram Club developed its bylaws, recommending that its purpose was to foster all the principles of the University in its academic, athletic, religious and social endeavors along with promoting camaraderie between former athletes and alumni.

During the Monogram Club presidency of Harvey Foster in 1981, he recommended that an endowment fund be started for the express purpose of aiding the University in continuing non-revenue sports. During the next 15 months, nearly \$8 million was pledged and paid into the endowment fund. Endowment contributions still are accepted but more recently the Monogram Club's efforts have been directed to increasing the Brennan-Boland-Riehle Fund.

In 1984, during the presidency of Jim Lynch, the club received permission to construct a Sports Heritage Hall in the concourse of the Joyce Center. The first phase was to provide a ring of gold which names each monogram winner, alphabetically by decade, with those plans reaching fruition in 1987 when some 4,300 names were placed in gold letters on the oak panels. Nearly 1,700 names later were added in 2001, honoring monogram winners from the 1990s.

The second phase of the Heritage Hall involved building display cases showing various pieces of memorabilia, pictures of individuals and teams, trophies of various awards and other interesting objects detailing the history of Notre Dame athletics.

The Monogram Club's ever-growing list of events and projects included the following activities during 2006-07:

- A second \$1 million allocation that will help support the *Spirit of Notre Dame* capital campaign (the Monogram Club donation will be used to support the athletics priorities of the campaign); a previous \$1 million donation has been used towards the ongoing Notre Dame Stadium enhancement project — which features an elaborate series of banners and displays that commemorate Notre Dame's rich tradition in college football

- Continuation of the Catastrophic Relief Fund to help former Notre Dame monogram winners faced with catastrophic problems of health and/or financial hardship; as part of the Monogram Club's "Athletes Helping Athletes" pledge, nearly \$575,000 had been raised for this special fund

- Pledged support and spearheaded the organizational efforts for the 35th anniversary of women's athletics at Notre Dame, which was celebrated throughout 2006-07 and included a weekend celebration attended by more than 100 former Notre Dame female student-athletes

- Continued sponsorship of student-athletes who participate in various domestic and international summer-service projects, as coordinated by Notre Dame's Center for Social Concerns; former Irish hockey player and recent Monogram Club board member Dave Bossy has made a 10-year commitment (\$10,000 per year) to help fund sponsorship of student-athletes who participate in the Summer Service Program

- Funding aid for the Notre Dame women's lacrosse team's foreign playing tour of England and Ireland

- Continuing financial assistance (\$110,000 in '06-'07) to programs benefiting current student-athletes, via the student welfare initiative (in conjunction with the athletic department's student welfare/life skills programs)

- An ever-expanding student-athlete outreach and education program that includes continued sponsorship of the "OSCARS" all-sports banquet (with specific funding for the popular all-sports highlight video), an informative brochure targeted to student-athletes and continued sponsorship of the varsity monogram awards program (letter jackets, blazers, blankets, rings, and watches)

- The continuing program of providing laptop computers to the Academic Services for Student-Athletes, with student-athletes able to check out these computers during official team travel.

- Ongoing funding and presentation of BIG EAST-championship rings and NCAA-participation awards for Notre Dame teams and individuals

- The second year of the Sports Liaison Program, which pairs board members with current Irish teams to foster a beneficial two-way relationship

Other recent Monogram Club projects have included:

- A joint effort with the network of local Notre Dame alumni clubs, providing various team hosting events (such as receptions and cultural events) for Notre Dame teams as they travel throughout the country

- A series of football-weekend receptions for Monogram Club members and their guests, typically held in the Joyce Center prior to each home football game (the final home game also traditionally includes a unique thrill for all former mono-

gram winners in attendance, who form the pregame tunnel as the Irish team takes the field)

- Continuing an expanded sponsorship of the annual Blue-Gold Football Alumni Weekend that includes the alumni flag-football game and an interactive Friday-night dinner (attended by nearly 750) with the program's current players and coaches

- The organization of several popular events, including the fifth annual Football Fantasy Camp (which has raised a five-year total of more than \$200,000 for the BBR Scholarship Fund), the annual Monogram Club golf outing (held during reunion weekend) and V.I.P. football weekend auctions

- Expanded offerings and unique website content at www.ndmonogramclub.com (also linked via und.com), as part of an ever-increasing list of member benefits

- And the traditional awarding of honorary monograms — presented to those who have demonstrated exceptional service to Notre Dame — in conjunction with the announcement of the Moose Krause Distinguished Service Award

The Monogram Club of today is comprised of some 4,300 dues-paying members who are awarded the block ND. Yearly dues entitle members to a variety of benefits: annual golf outing and dinner; membership card; the Inside Irish publication, with first-class mailing (plus e-mail and web options); members' children eligible for Brennan-Boland-Riehle scholarship at Notre Dame; and ticket applications for home football games. The Club's annual golf outing, mass for deceased members, dinner and meeting is held in early June prior to the Notre Dame Alumni Reunion Weekend.

Assistant athletics director Jim Fraleigh has served as the Monogram Club's executive director since the fall of 2004 while the current president is former basketball player Marc Kelly. The first vice-president is former Academic All-America football player Joe Restic, with former baseball player Dick Nussbaum recently joining the officer rotation as second vice-president. Former volleyball player Julie Pierson Doyle served as the Monogram Club's first female president from 2005-07.

From the days of Knute Rockne, when Eugene “Scrap Iron” Young first began providing care to student-athletes, the Notre Dame athletic training department has evolved into a fully-staffed sports medicine team with three state-of-the-art facilities. The 2006-07 academic year was a time of key growth and expansion for Notre Dame’s athletic training operation, in keeping up with the changing demands of college athletics. The sports medicine department added two new full-time staff positions while moving into its new primary locale at the Guglielmino Sports Complex.

Head athletic trainer and physical therapist Jim Russ now oversees a staff of three associate and eight assistant athletic trainers, plus two physical therapist/athletic trainers. The staff of 14 is responsible for the care and treatment of more than 750 Notre Dame student-athletes. The entire sports medicine staff is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association and boasts nearly 200 years of collective experience.

Each staff member is responsible for the health care of at least two of Notre Dame’s varsity athletic teams. Duties in that role include evaluating and assessing athletic injuries, administering first-aid, making medical referrals, establishing treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries and educating student-athletes on nutrition and injury prevention.

The foundation of the Notre Dame Sports Medicine Department falls under the direct supervision of several sports medicine physicians. This group now includes three university primary-care doctors – Notre Dame directors of sports medicine Dr. Jim Moriarity, Dr. Rich Jacobs and Dr. Becky Moskwinski – along with six orthopaedic surgeons: Dr. Willard Yergler, Dr. David Bankoff, Dr. Fred Ferlic, Dr. Robert Clemency, Dr. Michael Yergler and Dr. Chris Balint. A variety of medical consultants are available for specific needs, ranging from cardiology to dermatology, while the sports medicine department also is supplemented by 17 undergraduate student athletic trainers.

Notre Dame student-athletes have access to three state-of-the-art sports medicine facilities, in addition to the 24-hour University Health Center. The original athletic training room is located in the Joyce Center and Notre Dame Stadium is home to the 3,300 square-foot athletic training room – while the newest sports area is located in the new Guglielmino Athletics Center. This sports medicine area opened in the fall of 2005 and encompasses more than 8,500 square-feet of cutting-edge sports medicine technology.

Through these facilities, all student-athletes have access to the most modern sports medicine, providing the latest in diagnostic procedures, treatment and rehabilitation of athletic injuries. The various athletic training facilities include the latest in physical therapy modalities and rehabilitation equipment, with two 3,500-gallon therapy pools, a full x-ray unit and an MRI machine making up the majority of the department’s diagnostic equipment.

The sports medicine team of athletic trainers and team physicians is committed to providing the most comprehensive and safest health care possible. Evaluations, treatments and rehabilitation are established for each individual, with the goal of returning the student-athletes to competitive status in the safest and quickest manner possible.

The Notre Dame strength and conditioning program is designed to provide each student-athlete with the most productive, effective and efficient means of sport-specific physical training. Led by director of strength and conditioning Ruben Mendoza, the Irish strength and conditioning staff has a simple philosophy that combines a “no nonsense” approach with an “old school” attitude.

The staff offers a well-balanced, well-rounded program by incorporating a variety of training methods from conjugate training to Olympic style movements. Everything the staff does is geared toward developing speed, power and strength.

The staff wants to teach Notre Dame student-athletes work ethic, discipline and pride with a relentless attitude to strive for, and win, championships.

When entering the 25,000-square foot Haggar Fitness Complex (shared by the Loftus Sports Center and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex), student-athletes are quickly reminded of the “roll up your sleeves” and “get to work” mentality that Mendoza and his staff inspires.

The Haggar Fitness Complex features 25,000 square feet of workout space with a three-lane speed development track (40 yards in length), a state-of-the-art sound system with 28 speakers and four sub woofers, six giant plasma screen televisions, a 45 x 18 yard Prestige Turf plyometric agility area and a Gatorade hydration station.

The Notre Dame strength and conditioning staff – eight full-time coaches and an intern coach – includes: director of strength and conditioning Ruben Mendoza, associate director Tony Rolinski, assistants Mike Joseph, Rick Perry, Elise Angeles and James Seacord, speed/skill development coach Shaun Gaunt, and a nutritionist. The staff provides a large enough group to meet the student-athlete needs while developing an environment where student-athletes want to come in order to get better and achieve athletic success.



One of the eye-catching features of the Haggar Fitness Complex, a 25,000 square-foot facility shared by the Guglielmino Athletics Complex and the Loftus Center, is the inclusion of two variable weight sleds that were installed in the summer of 2005.

NACDA Directors' Cup

DIRECTORS' CUP STANDINGS

For the ninth straight year in 2006-07, Notre Dame posted a top-25 finish (22nd) in the 2005-06 United States Sports Academy Division I Directors' Cup all-sports competition sponsored by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (formerly known as Sears Directors' Cup).

Notre Dame is among 16 schools to earn a top-25 finish in each of the past nine years (1999-2007), as Irish programs finished 25th in '99, 21st in 2000, 11th in '01, 13th in '02 and '03, 19th in '04, 16th in '05 and 6th in '06. The other schools with that distinction include six from the Pacific-10 Conference (Stanford, UCLA, California, Arizona State, Arizona and USC), four from the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Minnesota and Penn State) and three from the Southeastern Conference (Florida, Georgia and LSU), plus Texas (Big-12) and North Carolina (Atlantic Coast Conference).

The 2006 fall NCAA Competition earned the Irish 279 points in the 2006-07 Directors' Cup standings, based on an NCAA runner-up finish in women's soccer (90 points), a best-ever quarter-finalist appearances in men's soccer (73), a 19th-place finish in men's cross country (36), a first-round appearance in volleyball (25) and a final ranking of 19th in the *USA Today* football poll (55). Notre Dame finished the fall season in 10th place of the Directors' Cup standings.

WINTER

In winter sports, Notre Dame netted 267 points – more than doubling its points total from the 2005-06 winter season (125.5), led by a fourth-place finish in the NCAA men's and women's combined fencing championship (80 points). Six other Notre Dame winter sports teams scored points in the 2006-07 Directors' Cup standings, including 60 for Notre Dame's

appearance as an NCAA regional finalist (final eight) in men's ice hockey, 50 for a second-round appearance in women's basketball (final 32) and 47 for a 27th-place finish in women's swimming and diving, plus 25 for a first-round appearance in men's basketball, and five for a 65th-place finish in men's indoor track and field.

SPRING

The 2007 spring sports season saw Notre Dame earn 243.5 points, led by a second straight NCAA quarterfinalist finish in women's tennis (73 points) and a trip to the round-of-16 in men's tennis (64), with other points coming a 41st-place finish in women's outdoor track and field (31), a first-round appearance/final-16 in men's lacrosse (25), a regional appearance in softball (final-48; 25 pts), 55th place in men's outdoor track and field (15.5) and a 12th-place finish in women's rowing (10).

HISTORICAL PERFORMANCE

In previous years in which the Directors' Cup competition has been held, Notre Dame has finished 11th in 1993-94, 30th in '95, 12th in '96, 14th in '97, 31st in '98, 25th in '99, 21st in 2000, 11th in '01, 13th in '02 and again in '03, 19th in '04, 16th in '05 and most recently sixth for 2005-06.

All but one of Notre Dame's 26 varsity sports have scored points for the Irish in the NACDA Cup. Teams leading the way have included the men's and women's fencing programs, which have used 13 consecutive top-four finishes at the NAAs to contribute 886 points since fencing was added to the NACDA Cup in 1995-96. Women's soccer has contributed 914.5 points, highlighted by eight national semifinal appearances and a pair of titles ('95, '04). It also stands as one of two teams – along with women's volleyball – to have scored points in the NACDA Cup all 14 years. Eleven of Notre Dame's sports have contributed points on 10 or more occasions while 16 have scored in at least half (7) of the NACDA Cup competitions.

The Directors' Cup competition honors institutions for maintaining athletic programs that seek to achieve success in many sports, both men's and women's. Begun in 1993-94 for Division I by NACDA and *USA Today*, the program was expanded in 1995-96 to include Divisions II, III, and the NAIA. The scoring format – which has undergone yearly minor adjustments – awards the overall champion to institutions that records the highest number of points in their division's Directors' Cup standings.



Notre Dame placed 22nd in the 2006-07 NACDA Directors' Cup competition, marking its ninth straight top-25 finish in the annual all-sports rankings.

The Notre Dame hockey team won its first-ever CCHA regular-season and postseason tournament titles during 2006-07. The Irish (32-7-3) were ranked number one in the country for seven straight weeks from Feb. 5 through March 23.

BEST OF BOTH WORLDS – The Notre Dame athletics department continues to emerge as one of the highest-rated in the nation ... a 2006 report by the National Collegiate Scouting Association listed Notre Dame third (behind Duke and Stanford) in Division I-A rankings for schools with the top combination of academics and athletics, based on student-athlete graduation rates, the *U.S. News and World Report* rankings (academic) and the annual Directors' Cup all-sports standings.

A SPORT-MINDED CAMPUS – A *Sports Illustrated* feature on "America's Top Jock Schools" crowned UCLA No. 1, with Notre Dame a close runner-up ... the profile cited the Bengal Bouts campus-wide boxing tournament that benefits the Holy Cross Mission, Bookstore Basketball (the world's largest five-on-five basketball tournament) and intramural football in full pads (with the title game in Notre Dame Stadium) – plus the fact that 75 percent of Notre Dame undergrads lettered in high-school sports.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE – The success of Notre Dame athletics extends to the classroom:

- All 26 athletics programs at Notre Dame in 2004-05, '05-'06 and '06-'07 exceeded the NCAA's academic performance standard that was introduced in 2005, with nine Irish teams in 2006-07 scoring a perfect 1,000 (second-most from any Division I-A school) ... the Academic Progress Rate (APR) uses a series of formulas related to student-athlete retention and eligibility.

- In the traditional federal-mandated format of the NCAA graduation-rate report, Notre Dame ranked second nationally in the survey covering student-athletes who enrolled between '96-'99, based on the raw percentage of those who entered and graduated within six years (those who left or transferred were considered non-graduates) ... similarly, Notre Dame's 89% graduation rate in that study ranked second among all of Division I-A schools (also first with 87% graduation rate for male student-athletes and second with 94% for female student-athletes).

- Among student-athletes who completed all four years of athletic eligibility at Notre Dame from among those entering over a 10-year period from 1989-90 through 1999-2000, virtually 100 percent (623 of 627; 99.4%) earned their degrees.

- Another new graduation-rate survey – the GSR (Graduation Success Rate) – ranks Notre Dame second among Division I-A schools with a 98% GSR score (Navy is first on that list). The GSR was created to more accurately reflect graduation rates by factoring in transfer data. Notre Dame also was second in the latest male GSR rankings (97%, behind Navy) and fourth for female student-athletes (99%, behind Vanderbilt, Northwestern and Navy).

- Notre Dame student-athletes combined to post a 4.0 semester GPA 23 times in the 2006 spring and fall semesters ... those of note who posted 4.0s in 2006 included: baseball shortstop Brett Lilley, high jumper Stacey Cowan, soccer player Ashley Jones, sprinter Maryann Erigha, lacrosse players Mary Carpenter (both semesters) and Meghan Murphy, distance runner Sunni Olding (both terms), softball outfielder Beth Northway, rower Shannon Cassel and football receiver Rob Woods.

SPANNING THE GLOBE – Similar to the composition of the Notre Dame student body, the 26 current varsity teams include student-athletes from nearly every state ... a recent sampling of Notre Dame's 2004-05 varsity rosters included some 700 student-athletes who hailed from 44 states (all but Hawaii, Maine, Mississippi, Utah, West Virginia and Wyoming), plus six Canadian provinces and 19 other foreign countries: Austria, Cayman Islands, Colombia, Czech Republic, El Salvador, England, Finland, Germany, Guatemala, Hong Kong, Iceland, Ireland, Jamaica, Korea, Luxembourg, Mexico, Poland, Singapore and South Africa.

in '94, '03, '05), two in women's soccer ('95, '04) and men's tennis ('44, '59), and one each in men's golf ('44), men's cross country ('57) and women's basketball ('01) ... the 2004-05 academic year saw Notre Dame win two NCAA titles (women's soccer and combined fencing) for the third time in the athletics department's history (also men's golf and men's tennis in 1943-44, plus football and men's fencing in 1977-78).

- Notre Dame's 12-year domination as a member of the BIG EAST Conference includes winning an unprecedented 13 official BIG EAST championships (based on tournament finish or regular-season standings) in 2005-06, besting the 10 titles won by the Irish in 2004-05 as the most ever by one school in a single academic year ... Notre Dame's BIG EAST titles in '05-'06 included five men's sports (cross country, swimming and diving, golf, outdoor track and field, and baseball) plus women's soccer, vol-

leyball, cross country, swimming and diving, indoor track and field, softball, rowing and tennis. A total of 16 Notre Dame teams (out of 21) finished first or second in 2004-05 BIG EAST play – with men's tennis, women's lacrosse and women's outdoor track and field nearly winning BIG EAST titles before finishing in second place.

- Notre Dame's total of nearly 1,000 All-Americans includes 26 who have been four-year All-Americans and 50 who have coupled All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season. The 2005-06 year saw an all-time high of five different Notre Dame student-athletes earn both All-America and Academic All-America honors while three Notre Dame student-athletes received prestigious NCAA postgraduate scholarships in 2006-07. It was just the third time – and first since the mid-1970s – that Notre Dame has produced three NCAA postgraduate scholarship recipients in the same academic year.

BIG EAST Conference

The BIG EAST Conference in 2006-07 enters its third academic year as a 16-member conference. While many outside the league were curious and sometimes skeptical of the long-term prospects of the largest Division I-A conference, the student-athletes concentrated on their tasks at hand and continued the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned plenty of recognition at the highest levels in 2006-07. In basketball, the Georgetown men's team and the Rutgers women's team each advanced to their respective Final Fours, with Rutgers playing in the national championship game.

The 2006 football season was the best in BIG EAST history. Louisville, West Virginia and Rutgers all finished in the top 12 in the final national polls. The BIG EAST posted a 5-0 bowl record and won the ESPN Bowl Challenge Cup.

On the diamond, the Louisville baseball team played its way to the College World Series while the DePaul softball team also participated in the College World Series. The Notre Dame women's soccer team advanced to the NCAA title game and the Connecticut field hockey team made it to the NCAA semifinals.

The BIG EAST swept the men's and women's M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the top individual award in soccer. The winners were Joseph Lapira and Kerri Hanks, both of Notre Dame (the first school ever to receive both Hermann awards in the same season).

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed – as the league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06, when five new members began competing. The new schools were Cincinnati, DePaul, Louisville, Marquette and South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 35 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the United States.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league's teams have won 25 national championships in six different sports and 124 BIG EAST student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST always has been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 350 BIG EAST student-athletes have

earned Academic All-America honors. Rutgers football player Brian Leonard received the 2006 Draddy Award, known as the academic Heisman, while Rhema Fuller of Connecticut and Jay Henry of West Virginia were named national scholar-athlete award winners by the National Football Foundation.

Louisville field hockey standout Jessica Javelet, the 2006 BIG EAST offensive player of the year, was named first team Academic All-America. The Louisville team, which earned a berth in the NCAA Championship, was recognized by the National Field Hockey Coaches Association for owning the highest team GPA in the nation for a second straight year.



The BIG EAST has continued its basketball success in the 21st century. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In 2002-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women took home the NCAA crowns. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the past nine NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the past eight NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletics directors from Providence, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranchese – the league's first full-time employee and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt – became commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of the BIG EAST Football Conference.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed longstanding relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc., and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas (including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden), attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won NCAA individual national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented on U.S. and foreign national/Olympic teams. Several athletes with BIG EAST ties earned gold medals in each of the past five summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence, where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes in 23 sports.
