Golf, as a varsity sport at Notre Dame, dates back to 1930 when the first Irish golfers went through a five game schedule without defeat and also captured team honors in the Indiana Inter-Collegiate Tournament. The 1931 aggregation also boasted a spotless record, and the Irish rolled up 17 consecutive victories before bowing to Purdue in 1932.

In 1933 and 1934 the Notre Damers were once again unbeaten and untied, running up a victory string of 20 straight triumphs before losing to Northwestern. The all-time record at Notre Dame shows 116 wins, 24 losses, and four ties since competition opened in 1930. That is a winning average of .829 exclusive of ties.

Rev. George L. Holderith, C.S.C., was appointed as golf coach in 1933 at Notre Dame. Since that date through the 1946 season his charges had compiled 98 victories, suffered 22 setbacks, and tied four matches which adds up to a neat .817 percentage, exclusive of ties.

Among other outstanding achievements of Notre Dame golfers is their consistency in the Indiana Inter-Collegiate Tournament. From 1930 through 1941 the Irish sent 12 golf squads into this competition and returned with the team championship on ten occasions. Eight of their titles were consecutive, from 1933 through 1940. The individual honors in this tourney went to a Notre Dame man in ten of the twelve tournaments also.

In 1944 Notre Dame won their first National Collegiate Golf Championship at Toledo Inverness. The Irish have entered the nationals an even dozen times, winning once, finishing second once, winding up third on three occasions, and capturing the fourth position twice.

The all-time record at Notre Dame shows 121 wins, 28 losses, and five ties since competition opened. That is a winning average of .812 exclusive of ties.

Rev. George L. Holderith, C.S.C., was appointed as golf coach in 1933 at Notre Dame. Since that date through the 1947 season his charges have compiled 103 victories, suffered 26 losses, and tied five matches which adds up to a neat .798 winning percentage.

Among other outstanding achievements of Notre Dame's golfers under Fr. Holderith's coaching is their consistency in the Indiana Intercollegiates. From 1930 through 1941 the Irish sent 12 golf squads into this competition and returned with the team title on ten occasions. Eight of their wins were consecutive, from 1933 through 1940. The individual honors in this tournament went to a Notre Dame man in ten of the twelve tourneys also.

In 1944 Notre Dame won its first National Collegiate golf championship at Toledo Inverness. The Irish have entered the nationals 13 times, winning once, finishing second once, winding up third on three occasions, and capturing fourth position twice.

However, Rev. George Holderith, C.S.C., Irish golf coach, can count on four men who won their monograms last year. They are Capt. George Stuhr, Jack Quinn, Paul Hudak, and Art Arquilla. In addition, Ray Burian, sensational freshman star of the 1947 team, will be hitting them down the middle for Notre Dame again this season.

Among the prospects for the 1949 squad are Tom Veech and Preston Murphy, both sophomores, and Bill Breen, a senior who has never before tried for the team.

HISTORY OF NOTRE DAME GOLF

Golf, as a varsity sport at Notre Dame, dates back to 1930 when the first Irish golfers went through a five-match schedule without defeat and also captured team honors in the Indiana Intercollegiate tourney. The 1931 aggregation also boasted a spotless record, and the Irish rolled up 17 consecutive victories before bowing to Purdue in 1932.

The all-time record shows 126 wins, 32 losses and five ties. This is a winning percentage of .798, exclusive of ties. Rev. George Holderith, C.S.C., was appointed golf coach in 1933. Since that date his charges have won 108 matches, dropped 30 and tied five times. That is a .782 average.

In 1944 Notre Dame won its first National Collegiate golf title at Toledo Inverness. The Irish have entered the nationals 13 times, winning once, finishing second twice, winding up third on three occasions and capturing the fourth position twice.

- Arthur Arquilla-----Junior from Chicago, Ill., who won a monogram on the 1948 Irish squad. At Morgan Park Military Academy he won four letters in golf, two in basketball and one in tennis. He captained the golfers twice and won the Midwest Junior tourney in 1943.
- Raymond Burian-----Junior from Joliet, Ill., who won a monogram on the 1947 Irish squad. Ray was a freshman sensation on the 1947 team, but scholastic difficulties kept him idle last season. At Joliet Catholic high school he played football, basketball and golf. He won the Hearst Midwest golf title in 1947 with rounds of 67 and 69.
- Paul Hudak-----Junior from Joliet, Ill., who won a monogram with the 1948 Irish golfers. Paul is now in his third season with Notre Dame, and has been improving steadily. A high school teammate of Ray Burian at Joliet Catholic, Paul played basketball and golf there.
- John Quinn-----Senior from Orange, N.J., who won a monogram with the 1948 squad. Attended Seton Hall Prep School and won two letters and captained the golf team. Lists Byron Nelson as his athletic hero.
- Robert Rolfs-----Junior from West Bend, Wisc. At West Bend high school he was an all-around athlete, winning letters in football, basketball, golf and track. Now in his third season on the Irish squad.
- George Stuhr (Capt)-Senior from Garden City, L.I., who has won monograms on the 1946, 1947 and 1948 Notre Dame links teams. At Garden City high, George won four golf and two basketball letters, winning the Long Island Interscholastic golf title. In 1943 he captured the New York State junior championship at the age of 16.
- Thomas Veech-----Sophomore from Milwaukee, Wisc. In 1947 Tom won the Western Junior Amateur championship. Last summer he captured the Wisconsin State Open crown. At Washington high school in Milwaukee, he was captain of the golf team for three years, winning the city team and individual titles in 1946 and 1947.
