

Playing Across the Country

Over the past two-plus decades, the Notre Dame men's lacrosse program has showcased itself all over the United States.

In 1990, Notre Dame and Air Force squared off in the first-ever NCAA Division I men's lacrosse game in the state of California. Notre Dame returned to the Golden State in 2005 to face North Carolina in the First Four Invitational in Carson. In the fall of 2010, the Fighting Irish played Johns Hopkins during the San Francisco Fall Lacrosse Classic.

Notre Dame and Army met in a 2008 fall ball contest in Minnesota.

The Fighting Irish headed to Atlanta, Ga. during the 2008 campaign to face Dartmouth and the Irish returned to the Peach State the following season and took on Loyola in Powder Springs. Both of those contests were part of the Southern Showdown.

The Fighting Irish played in Texas during the 2009 and 2010 seasons. In 2009, Notre Dame and Vermont clashed in the Patriot Cup in Dallas. Notre Dame met Fairfield during the 2010 campaign in Houston. That contest was part of the Beating Cancer With a Stick Lacrosse Classic. The Fighting Irish opened the 2011 season against Duke at the Sunshine Classic in Jacksonville, Florida.





Networking

A fall networking trip to New York City has become a tradition for the Fighting Irish program. During the University's fall break, head coach Kevin Corrigan and members of his staff have taken the team's upperclassmen to The Big Apple for a day of networking. During their trips, the group has met with Notre Dame alumni and others who work at key companies in the city. Stops along the way have included the New York Stock Exchange, BlackRock, MTV, NASDAQ and NBC.

When the Notre Dame squad traveled out West in the fall of 2010 to play Johns Hopkins in the San Francisco Fall Lacrosse Classic, the Irish juniors and seniors visited Google and EA Sports for additional networking opportunities

The coaching staff also has taken members of the team to Chicago to explore even more professional business opportunities.

Foreign Trips

In order to enhance the student-athlete experience, the Notre Dame men's lacrosse program has traveled four times internationally. The team journeyed to Ireland in 1995, England/Ireland/Wales in 2001, the Czech Republic in 2005 and Japan in 2010. The Fighting Irish squad has competed in games and conducted clinics during their time in the foreign lands.

Helping Humanity

The Notre Dame men's lacrosse program is heavily involved in helping the local and international communities.

In December of 2010, the Fighting Irish men's lacrosse and men's basketball teams worked together with Notre Dame student government and a host of departments across the campus to sponsor the Playing for Peace 3v3 Basketball Tournament (bottom right). The tournament's purpose was to raise awareness for peace in Sudan. The event also featured a Stand With Sudan peace rally.

Later that month, a delegation from the University of Notre Dame that included Kevin Dugan, a former Irish lacrosse player and the team's Operations Assistant at that time, and then junior defenseman Jake Brems spent time in Washington, D.C. (bottom left) and Baltimore, Md. to further the school's commitment to peace in Sudan by advocating for full implementation of the Comprehensive Peace Agreement in Sudan.

The group had meetings with key policymakers and non-governmental organizations. Among the stops on the trip were the White House, the State Department, Senator Richard Lugar's (Ind.) office, Congressman Joe Donnelly's (Ind.) office and Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Headquarters.

The Playing for Peace initiative seeks to use the platform of sport to transcend boundaries and bring people together in the pursuit of peace, justice and human understanding. Along with the work to help Sudan, the Irish program routinely does service work in the South Bend area to promote a more peaceful society.

The program has ventured to Chicago in each of the last two falls to conduct clinics and take part in service projects to help inner-city Catholic schools.



Arlotta Stadium

Arlotta Stadium is the home for the Notre Dame men's and women's lacrosse programs. Construction of the facility began in August of 2008 and it held its first event on October 16, 2009 as the Notre Dame men's team played the Iroquois National Team in an exhibition contest. The official stadium dedication was held on October 17. 2009.

The stadium features over 2,000 seats, lights, an artificial-turf field, locker rooms, player lounges, restrooms and concession areas.

The state-of-the-art facility is named after Notre Dame graduate John Arlotta, president and chief executive officer of Denver-based Coram Inc. He and his wife Bobbie pledged the lead gift toward the stadium, which was built to the east of the Joyce Center as part of the University's new athletics quadrangle. The Arlotta children - Mindy, Andy and Jon - also pledged an additional gift from The Arlotta Family Foundation toward the project. In addition to their generous donation, alumni and friends of the lacrosse programs donated over two million dollars.



The field is a top-notch artificial surface.



Arlotta Stadium opened its doors in October of 2009. The exterior displays banners of former Irish greats.



Arlotta Stadium features over 2,000 permanent seats. Additional seating is available on a grass berm opposite of the stands.

The men's lacrosse player lounge, which is adjacent to the locker room, has flat-screen televisions along with abundant seating for studying and relaxing.



The press box has over 20 seats for media and support staff along with three broadcast booths.

Loftus Sports Center

The Loftus Sports Center, combined with Arlotta Stadium, gives the University of Notre Dame some of the top lacrosse facilities in the country. Constructed in 1988, the Loftus Sports Center is one of just six indoor facilities in the country that plays host to Division I men's lacrosse games.

The Loftus Sports Center provides Notre Dame with one of the top multi-purpose indoor facilities in the nation. The Meyo Field is permanently marked for lacrosse competition and is used as a backup site for games and practice in the event of indement weather.

The building is named after John R. Loftus of St. Charles, Ill., a 1949 graduate of the University. Loftus is chief executive of JRL, a real estate, investment and construction firm. Loftus is also a member of the Notre Dame Monogram Club, having played on the varsity basketball team in 1944, 1948 and 1949.

The field and surrounding track are named for Ray and Marie Meyo of Brecksville, Ohio. Meyo, who graduated from Notre Dame in 1964, is president and chief executive officer of Telxon Corp. in Akron, Ohio.

In addition to the Meyo Track and Field in the Loftus Center, the Irish lacrosse squad also benefits from the Haggar Fitness Center located in the facility. Equipped with more than 40,000 pounds of free weights, it is considered by national strength coaches to be one of the largest, and finest, college training facilities in the nation.

Loftus Sports Center saw its first intercollegiate lacrosse action on April 27, 1988, when Notre Dame posted a 10-7 victory over Michigan State.



The Isban Auditorium within the Guglielmino Athletics Complex provides an ideal setting for team meetings. The auditorium can seat up to 150 people in large chairback seats.



The Haggar Fitness Center, which is shared by both the Loftus Center and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex, features 25,000 square feet of strength and conditioning space with state-of-the art weight equipment, a 50-yard Mondo track for speed training, a 45-yard by 18-yard Prestige Turf athletic surface for team workouts and an updated sound and lighting system that features six plasma television screens.

The Loftus Sports Center, one of the six indoor facilities in the country that plays host to Division I men's lacrosse games, is the site of Irish lacrosse games when inclement weather precludes them from being contested outdoors.

Midfielder • Three-time honorable mention All-American



SEASON PREVIEW

Notre Dame Looks To Maintain Successful Stretch In Another New League

Fighting Irish take program's unprecedented run to the ACC.

In the last six years the Notre Dame men's lacrosse team has gone from the West (Great Western Lacrosse League) to the East (BIG EAST) to the Atlantic Coast (ACC), but one thing that hasn't changed during that time is the continual success of the program.

Notre Dame is one of just two schools (Maryland) that have qualified for each of the last eight NCAA Championships and the Irish have made it to at least the quarterfinals of the last four tournaments, including two Championship Weekend appearances.

The move to the mighty ACC will pose challenges for the Fighting Irish, but the program isn't exactly entering unchartered territory. Notre Dame has defeated every other ACC member at least once in the last four seasons and the Irish have an 8-8 record against its ACC counterparts since the beginning of the 2010 campaign.

11-5 (4-2, 3rd in BIG EAST) NCAA Quarterfinalist (L, 11-12 to Duke) All six ACC squads are ranked in the top 10 of the Inside Lacrosse preseason poll, but it's not just the conference slate that will provide stiff competition for the fourth-ranked Irish. Three of Notre Dame's non-conference foes — Denver, Ohio State, Penn State — also appear in the top 10.

"The challenge this year is going to be handling playing a schedule that's almost inarguably the toughest in the country," Notre Dame head coach Kevin Corrigan says. "We're going to have to prepare ourselves well, recover well and focus on the next time out. That's going to be a challenge as we go through a year with a schedule as difficult as ours. But it's exciting too. We know that there are just no breaks and every week is going to be top-notch competition."

The Fighting Irish won't be attacking this daunting ledger empty handed. Notre Dame returns several key components from the squad that finished the 2013 regular season with the nation's top RPI and garnered a program-best No. 2 seed for the NCAA Championship before finishing with an 11-5 record.

Four of the top five goal scorers from last season are back, including attackman Matt Kavanagh, who established a Notre Dame freshman record with a team-high 32 goals en route to earning All-America honors. Kavanagh also led the Irish in assists with 16. Senior Jim Marlatt, a two-time All-American, was the top midfield scorer for the Irish as he tallied 20 goals and 12 assists. Marlatt and senior defenseman Stephen O'Hara will captain the Irish this season.

"We have an interesting team this year. We have a mix of significant returning guys, but we lost 11 seniors and nine of them played a lot for us," Corrigan says. "We're not really young, but we're not really old either. We're going to have to look for our identity early in the year. With that said, I think we might have more depth of talent than we've ever had. That can help us in terms of getting better on an everyday basis."

In addition to Kavanagh, the Irish welcome back a handful of experienced attackmen that have found the back of the net several times during their Fighting Irish careers. Junior Conor Doyle joins Kavanagh as a returning starter and he is coming off a season that saw him post 20 goals and 10 assists. Senior Westy Hopkins returns to the attack after spending some of last season in the midfield. Hopkins combined to score 36 goals from the attack during his freshman and sophomore campaigns.

Fellow seniors John Scioscia, who had a breakout junior year with 14 goals, and Ryan Mix also are more than capable of delivering when their numbers are called.

"We have a nice blend of young and old on the attack," Corrigan says. "Westy Hopkins is moving back to the attack and he's had a great preseason. Conor Doyle has been on the field a lot during his first two years and now is playing, without question, the best that we've seen him play. Matt Kavanagh is terrific. The fact that we're not going to be leaning on him as much is going to make him even more dangerous.

"We have great depth there. John Scioscia is playing lights out and Ryan Mix is playing really well. I don't want to single anyone out because there's a plethora of guys (in the attack) that can help us in whatever role during the course of the season. We're excited what we have there."

There might be a few more questions for the Irish in the midfield, but there potentially are a lot of answers. Marlatt and junior Will Corrigan are the two returnees from last season's first line and the Irish welcome back fifth-year senior Pat Cotter after he was sidelined for all of 2013 with an injury.

"The thing for us in the midfield is going to be finding groups that can play together and be effective," Corrigan says. "I like the fact we have more two-way middies there than we've had in the last few years. I like that because it fits our style better. It'll make us a better clearing team, riding team and a better transition team in both

directions. That's a pretty significant part of our game and if we can be better at all of those things I think our midfielders will be a huge part of that."

Exactly who will be the breakout offensive performers for the Irish in the midfield will be determined as the season goes along, but a more predictable situation might be Notre Dame's shortstick midfield group.

"I think our short-stick defensive middies are going to be a real strength for us," Corrigan says. "I think Jack Near could be the best short-stick defensive middie in the country. He's one of those guys who can do a little bit of everything. Ty Brenneman has been terrific there as well. He has shown great leadership and has really, really worked hard this year. It's been impressive to me how he's seized that position and is making a lot of plays at both ends of the field."

Defense has been the calling card for the Fighting Irish over the last several seasons and the team returns two starting close defensemen in seniors Brian Buglione and O'Hara. Sophomore Matt Landis figures to be the third starter down low after spending last season at the long-pole position.

"I think Steve O'Hara has kind of quietly become one of the best defensemen in the country," Corrigan says. "There's just not a weakness in his game. He brings a physical presence, but it's not like he's some big hitter. It's just that he's a very physical kid. He's very, very smart and knows our defense and communicates well and he takes a leadership role down there. There are very few guys who can do all the things as well as Steve can."

Handling the long-stick duties this year will be junior Henry Williams and senior Ryan Smith. Senior Chris Prevoznik gives the Irish valuable depth at both close defense and as a long-stick midfielder.

A good way to not let opponents score is by not allowing them to have the ball and that begins at the faceoff X. Notre Dame returns all three of its faceoff specialists — Liam O'Connor, Nick Ossello, Trevor Brosco – from last season. Freshman P.J. Finley also could help in that role.

O'Connor, a senior, has been a valuable faceoff guy for the Irish over the last three seasons. He missed some time last year with an injury, but will bring a .523 career winning percentage into his final campaign. O'Connor has compiled eight career points on six goals and two assists.

Ossello played on the team's second midfield line last season and tallied five goals and four assists. The junior has a career winning percentage of .509. Brosco, a sophomore, went 23-of-47 as a rookie.

"Liam O'Connor missed the whole fall and he was banged up last year and he kind of gutted it out to get through the year, but wasn't as healthy as we would have liked him to be," Corrigan says. "What he does at the faceoff X is part of it, but he's also a very good offensive player and he's a very smart defensive player who understands our game at that end of the field. He's a guy who's poised to have a really good year."

Possibly the biggest question facing the Fighting Irish in 2014 is how they will replace three-time All-American John Kemp in goal. Junior Conor Kelly, who has played a total of 12:35 during his career, will get the nod.

"We're not replacing John Kemp, we have a new team and a new goalie," Corrigan says. "You're not going to replace John Kemp, but I have great confidence in Conor Kelly, who has been in the program for three years. I also have great confidence in freshman Shane Doss, who has played very, very well. We don't have any huge concerns in goal at all. It's quite the opposite. We're very confident that we're qoing to get good goaltending."

That confidence is a reason why Notre Dame has been able to produce an unprecedented run for the program over the past eight seasons. Players come and go and now conferences do as well, but through it all the Fighting Irish have been able to maintain a high standard of success.

"I guess we're just a reflection of changes all over the country with the conferences shifting the way they are. We've been right in the midst of that as much as anybody in lacrosse," Corrigan says. "We've made big changes, but I feel each change that we've made has been one for the positive. Going from the GWLL to the BIG EAST was a big step for us and a good step for the sport. I think us and Syracuse joining the ACC is a good step for us and a great step for the sport. It's been very positive, but it has been part of the shifting landscape underneath us as we try to battle our way to the top."

LOUIS IN Fighting Irish



Head coach Kevin Corrigan and his staff have guided the Irish to eight straight NCAA Championship appearances, including trips to Championship Weekend twice in the last four seasons.



Kevin Corrigan is entering his 26th season on the Fighting Irish sideline in 2014. Since his arrival on campus in 1988, Corrigan has built Notre Dame into one of the premier men's lacrosse programs in the country. He boasts a 241-114 (.679) record during his impressive Notre Dame tenure, which currently is the second longest among active Division I men's lacrosse head coaches.

Inheriting a program that had never earned a berth in the NCAA Championship, Corrigan has made the Irish a staple in the postseason. He has led the Fighting Irish to Championship Weekend three times, including two appearances in the last four seasons. Notre Dame made the program's first-ever appearance in the national title game in 2010 and the Irish were national semifinalists in 2001 and 2012. Notre Dame has finished as NCAA quarterfinalists five times under Corrigan (1995, 2000, 2008, 2011, 2013).

Notre Dame has gamered 18 invitations to the NCAA Championship since 1990, including a current run of eight straight trips, which is a program-best streak. Notre Dame and Maryland are the only two schools to appear in the NCAA Championship in each of the last eight seasons. The Irish have made four straight quarterfinal appearances and have received a national seed and a first-round home game five times in the past six years.

Corrigan's Irish squads have won 16 conference titles, including the 2012 BIG EAST regular-season championship, and have finished in the top 20 of the national rankings in 20 of the last 21 campaigns. Notre Dame has been adept at winning big games under Corrigan, registering 83 victories over nationally-ranked opponents, including 28 vs. top-10 foes.

At least one Irish player has garnered All-America accolades in each of the last 21 years, with 33 individuals earning a total of 60 All-America honors. The Irish have had multiple All-America honorees in each

of the last nine seasons and a program record six players received All-America citations in 2011.

The Fighting Irish also have hauled in numerous amounts of all-conference hardware under Corrigan's direction. Notre Dame was a member of the Great Western Lacrosse League (GWLL) from 1994-2009 and during that time, six Irish players were named the GWLL player of the year. Notre Dame student-athletes gained all-GWLL accolades on 94 occasions, an average of nearly six per season. Corrigan was named the GWLL coach of the year fives times, including in 2009, which was the final season for the conference. Notre Dame also won the only two GWLL tournaments ever held (2008 & 2009).

In four seasons of BIG EAST Conference play Notre Dame garnered 23 all-league honors. David Earl became the first Irish player to capture a major post-season award from the conference as he was selected the midfielder of the year in 2011. Three such awards came Notre Damés way in 2012 as John Kemp was named the conference's goalkeeper of the year, Kevin Randall took home the defensive player of the year award and Corrigan was tapped as the BIG EAST coach of the year for the first time. That upped his conference coach-of-the-year award tally to six.

Moving to the BIG EAST was not the only significant change for the Fighting Irish in 2010 as the team

began play in its state of the art facility, Arlotta Stadium. Playing in a top-level league and in the multi-million dollar stadium will help Corrigan keep the Notre Dame program among the nation's best for years to come.

The last six seasons have witnessed the Fighting Irish achieve unprecedented success within the program and cement itself as one of the nation's top teams. Since the beginning of the 2008 campaign, the Irish rank fourth nationally in wins (74) and they are third in winning percentage (.771).

In 2008, Notre Dame played host to an NCAA tournament game for the first time. The 2009 campaign featured the Irish posting the first undefeated regular season (13-0) in program history before extending their record to a school-best 15-0 in the GWLL tournament. Notre Dame reached its first NCAA title game in `10 and followed that up by achieving the No. 1 national ranking during the `11 regular season.

The Fighting Irish returned to the top of the polls twice during the 2013 regular season before garnering the No. 2 seed for the NCAA Championship. That signified Notre Dame's highest seed ever for the tournament. The Irish earned the seed with an impressive resume that featured five wins over top-five teams and they boasted the nation's No. 1 RPI.

Notre Dame topped Detroit, 9-7, in the first round of the '13 tournament to advance to the NCAA quarterfinals for the fourth straight season and for the eighth time under Corrigan. The season came to an end with a 12-11 setback to Duke at Lucas Oil Stadium in Indianapolis.

Attackman Matt Kavanagh combined for seven goals and three assists in the two NCAA tournament games and finished the season with 32 goals, which established a program record for a freshman. He was one of four Fighting Irish players to earn All-America accolades from the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) in '13. Kemp copped All-America honors for the third straight season, while senior defenseman Matt Miller and junior midfielder Jim Marlatt both received their second citation.

Notre Dame checked off another program-first in 2012 by winning the BIG EAST regular-season title. The Irish posted a perfect 6-0 league mark and went 13-3 overall. The Fighting Irish had the nation's top defense by allowing just 6.31 goals per game. That signified the fourth consecutive season that Notre Dame finished first or second nationally in team defense. The Irish also had the nation's top mandown defense in `12 (.892).

Kemp and Randall were named to the 2012 USILA All-America First Team. Kemp's first-team nod earned him the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr. Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top goalie. He joined his older brother Joey, the 2008 recipient, as

the only other Notre Dame player to cop the award. They are the only brother duo to receive the award, which has been presented since 1949. The Kemp duo is among five Notre Dame goalies that have received All-America honors under Corrigan's tutelage.

Notre Dame garnered the No. 4 seed for the '12 NCAA Championship and captured a 13-7 home victory over Yale in the first round. The Irish knocked off fifth-seeded Virginia, 12-10, in the quarterfinals to advance to the national semifinals for the third time in school history. A 7-5 setback to Loyola, the eventual champion, ended Notre Dame's bid for its first national title.

Corrigan has taken the Fighting Irish program to a level where they are in serious contention for the NCAA crown year in and year out. He has changed the mindset of how Notre Dame is viewed on the national landscape of college lacrosse. Corrigan and his staff have helped grow the sport of lacrosse in the state of Indiana and all over the Midwest by conducting clinics and showcasing a top-10 team that fans in the region are able to come and watch. Those efforts helped Indianapolis land the 2013 NCAA quarterfinals.

The work that Corrigan has done in shaping Notre Dame into one of the top lacrosse programs in the country has not gone unnoticed. In 2009, he was honored with the Frenchy Julien Service Award from the USILA. The award is presented in honor of former Chief Referee, Joseph R. "Frenchy" Julien for outstanding and continuous service to the sport.

Corrigan has continued the tradition of academic success for the Notre Dame men's lacrosse program. Since first competing on the varsity level in 1981, every Irish lacrosse senior has graduated. Three players since 1997 have gained Academic All-America honors, while 15 Notre Dame student-athletes have been named Scholar All-Americans by the USILA.

In 2012, Randall was named a USILA Scholar All-American, a Senior CLASS Award finalist and he received the BIG EAST Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award. In addition, sophomore Tyler Brenneman became the first Irish player to earn with the highest grade-point average from all of the teams that advanced to the national semifinals. Miller was a finalist for the 2013 Senior CLASS Award along with being a USILA Scholar All-American.

Many of the best players in Notre Dame history have played under Corrigan, as his graduates include each of the top five point scorers in the program's history, six of the top seven goal scorers and each of the top six players on the career assist list.

Playing beyond the college level has been a reality for a number of Corrigan's student-athletes. Over 35 have been a member of a professional team in either Major League Lacrosse or the National Lacrosse League.

Six of his Irish players, including Kavanagh, have earned spots on United States national teams. Five of them have come away with gold medals, including defenseman D.J. Driscoll at the `10 Federation of

International Lacrosse (FIL) World Championship in Manchester, England. Kavanagh helped the U.S. capture the 2012 FIL Under-19 World Championship with a 10-8 victory over Canada, which featured fellow lish sophomore Kyle Trolley. Kavanagh was named tournament MVP and the most outstanding attackman of the event.

It certainly did not take Corrigan long to place Notre Dame on the national lacrosse map. After leading the Irish to a 7-6 record in his first season in 1989, Corrigan's 1990 squad made history by gaining the school's first-ever USILA national ranking (17th in the final poll) and earning Notre Dame's first invitation to the NCAA Championship.

Notre Dame appeared in the NCAA tournament eight times in nine seasons from 1992-2001. The 1993 campaign saw the Irish make their third trip to the NCAAs and finish with a then program-record of 11 victories (11-3). Defenseman Mike lorio became the first player in Irish history to be named an All-American, copping third-team honors. Corrigan wound up the season with an invitation to coach the North team in the North-South All-Star Game. His North squad took home a 28-16 victory.

In 1994, Corrigan guided the Irish to their third straight conference title - and the first for the newly-formed GWLL - Notre Dame posted a 10-2 overall mark and clinched an NCAA bid. He also was selected GWLL coach of the year for the second time in three seasons.

Corrigan helped Notre Dame reach new heights in 1995 by notching its first-ever NCAA tournament win in a come-from-behind 12-10 victory at Duke, which marked the first time a team from the West had won an NCAA game. Notre Dame's season cultimated with an appearance in the NCAA quarterfinals, where the Irish lost to eventual national runner-up Maryland, 14-11.

lorio and Randy Colley, the '95 GWLL player of the year, both earned All-America honors. lorio was a second-team honoree, as he became Notre Dame's first three-time All-American, while Colley earned honorable-mention accolades for the second consecutive year and finished his career as the school's all-time leading scorer. His 273 points (173 G, 100 A) were 87 better than the previous Irish record.

Notre Dame cracked the national top 10 for the first time ever in 1996, climbing to seventh in the USILA poll in mid-April. The 1997 campaign saw Notre Dame earn its first-ever victory over a top-five opponent as the Irish defeated #4 Hofstra, 10-9, at Moose Krause Stadium before earning the program's sixth straight NCAA Championship bid.

Corrigan and the Irish upset fifth-ranked Loyola, 15-13, in the first round of the 2000 NCAA tournament to advance to the quarterfinals for the second time where they fell to fourth-ranked Johns Hopkins, 15-11. Notre Dame finished the season 10-4 and undefeated in the GWLL (5-0).

In 2001, Notre Dame beat perennial powers Virginia (11-8) and Loyola (10-7) on the road as the Irish started the season 5-0. The only blemish on their regular-season schedule was an 11-10 overtime loss at Hofstra. After concluding the regular season with a 12-1 mark, Notre Dame was awarded the fifth seed in the 12-team championship field, marking the first NCAA seeding in Irish history.

A 12-7 first-round victory over Bucknell and a triumph against fourth-seeded Johns Hopkins (13-9) sent the Fighting Irish to Championship Weekend for the first time in program history. Notre Dame's journey ended with a 12-5 loss to Syracuse in the semifinals in Piscataway, N.J. The Irish concluded the campaign with a 14-2 record and ranked fourth nationally.

Five players earned USILA All-America honors in '01, with attackman Tom Glatzel becoming the school's first-ever first-team selection, as well as one of five finalists for leawaraton Trophy, given to the action's top player. Mike Adams also became the program's third CoSIDA Academic All-American, when he garnered first-team honors in the '01 men's spring at-large program.

The accomplishments of the '01 team were even more impressive considering they came when the Irish program lacked any grant-in-aid scholarships. Shortly thereafter, it was announced by then athletics director Kevin White that all Notre Dame programs would begin a process of offering the maximum number of grants-in-aid allowed by the NCAA, making future trips to the final four by the Irish lacrosse team a greater possibility.

Notre Dame's current run of eight straight NCAA Championship appearances began in 2006 when the Irish appeared in the field for the first time since their trek to the semifinals in '01. The Fighting Irish fell to top-ranked, and eventual national champion, Virginia, 14-10 in the first round of the '06 tournament. The four-point margin was the closest outcome for the Cavaliers during their four-game run to the title and the second-closest margin over the course of their undefeated campaign.

The 2007 season saw the Fighting Irish notch an 11-4 record, including a perfect 5-0 league mark to win their 10th GWLL title. Notre Dame made its second straight trip to the NCAA Championship and fell at eventual national champion Johns Hopkins, 11-10, in overtime.

Corrigan was tapped as the GWLL coach of the year for the fourth time, while Kemp was named the '07 GWLL player of the year and Will Yeatman was selected as the league's newcomer of the year. Following a 12-6 win at Ohio State that clinched the '07 GWLL title for the Irish, Corrigan was named the US Lacrosse national coach of the week.

A significant accomplishment for Corrigan and the Notre Dame program occurred in 2008 when the Irish earned the No. 6 seed for the NCAA Championship and were able to host an NCAA tournament game for the first time. The Fighting Irish made the most of their home-field advantage by topping Colgate 8-7 in overtime to advance to the quarterfinals for the fourth time. After falling to Syracuse, 11-9, Notre Dame concluded the season with a 14-3 mark and ranked fifth in the final USILA poll.

With Kevin Corrigan entering his 26th season as head coach of the Fighting Irish men's lacrosse program in 2014, he is the 12th coach in Notre Dame history to guide a team for at least 26 seasons. Here is a breakdown of the longest coaching tenures in Notre Dame history . . .

Attackman Ryan Hoff tallied 40 goals as a sophomore and 41 during his junior campaign to become the second player in program history to notch backto-back 40-goal seasons. Hoff concluded his career in '09 second on Notre Dame's all-time goals scored list with 134 tallies.

The '09 campaign was a record-setting one for Corrigan and the Fighting Irish. Along with establishing program records for wins (15) and winning percentage (.938), Notre Dame ranked first among all NCAA Division I teams in goals-against average (6.14) and winning percentage. Goalie Scott Rodgers, the '09 GWLL player of the year, was first nationally in goals-against average (6.14) and save percentage (.663).

After completing a 13-0 regular season, the Irish captured their second straight GWLL tournament title and received the No. 7 seed for the `09 NCAA Championship. The Irish hosted a postseason game for the second straight year, yet fell to Maryland, 7-3, in the first round.


The Fighting Irish knocked off three straight top-10 foes en route to the 2010 national title game. The journey began at sixth-ranked Princeton in the first round. After downing the Tigers, 8-5, Notre Dame defeated No. 3 Maryland, 7-5, to advance to the national semifinals at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md.

The sensational run continued as the Irish bested seventh-ranked Cornell, 12-7, to set up a clash with Duke in the final. Notre Dame opened the `10 season with an 11-7 win at #2 Duke, yet the Blue Devils prevailed in the second meeting by taking the back-and-forth contest 6-5 in overtime.

Rodgers was named the Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA Championship, becoming just the fifth player to earn that honor from a team that did not win the title. Rodgers and the Notre Dame defense allowed just 23 goals (5.75 per game) in four tournament contests. For the season, the Irish ranked second nationally in team defense by surrendering just 7.53 goals per game.

Notre Dame's 9-0 start in `11 helped the team earn the No. 1 national ranking in both the Nike/Inside Lacrosse media poll and the USILA coaches' poll on April 18. The Irish would improve to 10-0 before suffering their first loss of the campaign.

The Irish were seeded fourth for the '11 NCAA Championship and they knocked off Penn, 13-6, in the first round. The seven-goal margin of victory was the largest ever for the Irish in an NCAA tournament contest, while the 13 goals are tied for the most scored by Notre Dame in an NCAA game. The win over Penn propelled Corrigan and the Fighting Irish into the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship for the sixth time in program history. Unfortunately, it would be déjà vu as Duke avenged a 12-7 season-opening loss to the Irish by capturing a 7-5 quarterfinal victory. The Fighting Irish finished the season with an 11-3 mark and ranked second nationally in team defense with a 6.57 goals-against average.

Corrigan not only has seen his teams excel on the field and in the classroom but also in the community. Another piece of hardware that the '08 Irish squad received was the Trophy Award at Notre Dame's seventh annual O.S.C.A.R.S. (Outstanding Student-Athletes Celebrating Achievements and Recognition Showcase). Established by the Office of Student Welfare and Development at Notre Dame, The Trophy Award annually recognizes an athletic team that has demonstrated its commitment and dedication to the community through unparalleled community service to Notre Dame and South Bend. The Irish have been very active in the South Bend area, including mentorship programs at various local schools.

Corrigan has made the student-athlete experience special for the players that have competed for him at Notre Dame. The program has embarked on four foreign trips since '95. The treks have been to such countries as Ireland, England, Wales, Czech Republic and - most recently - Japan in the summer of 2010.

Another special experience for the student-athletes are networking trips to New York City. In the fall, Corrigan takes team members from the junior and senior classes to the Big Apple to explore networking opportunities with Notre Dame alumni. The group has visited such places as the New York Stock Exchange, BlackRock and NASDAQ. Corrigan also has taken similar trips to San Francisco and Chicago. The San Francisco trip occurred in the fall of 2010 as the Irish were on the West Coast to play Johns Hopkins.

Corrigan likes to provide to his players the opportunity to compete in different areas of the United States. In recent seasons Notre Dame has played in California, Georgia, Texas, Florida and Minnesota.

Corrigan was acknowledged for his contributions to the Irish lacrosse program when Notre Dame's Monogram Club awarded him an honorary monogram in 2000.

An assistant at Virginia for two years, Corrigan

became just the second head coach in Notre Dame's history on Aug. 23, 1988.

A graduate of the University of Virginia, Corrigan assisted the Cavaliers during both the 1987 and '88 seasons under head coach Jim "Ace" Adams.

During a three-year playing career at Virginia, Corrigan scored five goals and registered six assists. He played in 20 games as a midfielder. In his sophomore season in 1979, the Cavaliers reached the NCAA final before losing to Johns Hopkins in overtime.

This is Corrigan's second stint as a head coach. He directed Randolph-Macon College (Va.), a Division III program, for two seasons, compiling a 10-15 record in 1985 and 1986. He previously served as an assistant at Randolph-Macon during the 1984 campaign.

Corrigan also served as an assistant at Notre Dame during the 1983 season and at Western Albemarle (Va.) High School in 1982. He is the son of former Notre Dame athletic director Gene Corrigan, who retired in '97 as the commissioner of the Atlantic Coast Conference. The elder Corrigan played collegiate lacrosse at Duke and guided the Virginia and Washington & Lee lacrosse programs. He was inducted into the Lacrosse Hall of Fame in February of 1994

Kevin's brother Tim was a three-time monogram winner as a midfielder at Notre Dame from 1984-86. Two of Kevin's other brothers, David and Brian, also served as assistants under former Irish head lacrosse coach Rich O'Leary. Another brother, Eugene "Boo", was Notre Dame's associate athletics director for corporate relations and marketing from 2004-08. Boo now is the Director of Athletics at the United States Military Academy.

When not coaching, Corrigan still remains active by participating in various lacrosse clinics and camps. He and his wife, Lis, reside in South Bend with their three children - Will, Sidney and Natale. Will is a junior on the Fighting Irish men's lacrosse squad.



Gerry Byrne enters the eighth season of his second stint as an assistant coach for the Notre Dame men's lacrosse team in 2014. In 2007, Byrne returned to the Fighting Irish program, where he served as an assistant from 1989-91. Prior to his return to Notre Dame, he was the head coach at Saint Anselm College in Manchester, N.H. from 2003-06.

The Fighting Irish have enjoyed tremendous success since Byme rejoined the staff. Notre Dame has posted an 85-26 record (.766) and the Irish have earned an NCAA tournament berth all seven seasons. Notre Dame received one of the eight national seeds and a first-round home game five times in the last six seasons.

The Fighting Irish have advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals in each of the last four seasons, including two trips to Championship Weekend. Notre Dame made its first-ever appearance in the national title game in 2010 and finished as a semifinalist in 2012.

Byrne's work has not gone unnoticed as he was named the 2011 Intercollegiate Men's Lacrosse Coaches Association (IMICA) National Assistant Coach of the Year for NCAA Division I.

During Byrne's most recent stint on campus, Notre Dame captured three Great Western Lacrosse League (GWLL) regular-season titles and two GWLL tournament championships before the Fighting Irish moved to the BIG EAST in 2010 and won that league's regular-season crown in 2012.

Notre Dame head coach Kevin Corrigan along with Byrne and fellow assistant coach Brian Fisher received the GWLL coaching staff of the year award in 2007 and 2009 and the BIG EAST award in 2012.

Since 2007, Notre Dame has produced 33 All-America and 45 all-conference selections along with having 25 student-athletes drafted into Major League Lacrosse (MLL). Nine of those draft picks have been close defensemen or long-stick midfielders.

The Fighting Irish have reaped the benefits of Byrne's defensive knowledge. Over the last seven seasons under Byrne's direction, the Notre Dame defense has been one of the best in the nation. The Irish have finished in the top-five nationally in scoring defense six times in the last seven seasons.

Notre Dame produced the nation's top defense in 2009 by allowing a program-record 6.19 goals per game. In 2012, the Fighting Irish boasted the NCAA's top overall defense (6.31 gpg) and man-down defense (.892). The Irish were second in team defense in '11 (6.57) and '10 (7.53), fourth in '07 (6.66) and fifth in '08 (7.04).

Since the beginning of the `O7 season (a span of 111 games), the Irish have limited opponents to seven goals or fewer 71 times and they have limited foes to four goals or fewer on 17 occasions.

The last six seasons have witnessed the Fighting Irish achieve unprecedented success within the program and cement itself as one of the nation's top teams. Since the beginning of the '08 campaign, the Irish rank fourth nationally in wins (74) and they are third in winning percentage (771).

In '08, Notre Dame played host to an NCAA tournament game for the first time in program history. The '09 campaign featured the Irish posting the first undefeated regular season (13-0) in program history before extending their record to a school-best 15-0 in the GWLL tournament. Notre Dame reached the NCAA title game for the first time in school history in '10 and followed that up by achieving the No. 1 national ranking during the '11 regular season.

Notre Dame checked off another program-first in 2012 by winning the BIG EAST regular-season title for the first time. The Irish finished the season with a 13-3 overall record and a perfect 6-0 mark in league play.

The incredible run continued into the 2013 campaign as the Fighting Irish garnered the No. 2 seed, a program best,

for the NCAA Championship. The Irish opened the season with three straight wins over top-10 teams (Duke, Penn State, North Carolina) and took down five top-10 foes in all during the year. Those resume-building wins helped Notre Dame achieve the nation'S No. 1 ranking twice during the season. The Irish also boasted the nation'S top RPI heading into the NCAA tournament.

The second-seeded Fighting Irish bested Detroit, 9-7, in the opening round of the NCAAs to advance to the quarter-finals for the fourth consecutive year and the fifth time in Byrne's seven seasons back with the program. Notre Dame fell to eventual national champion Duke, 12-11, in the quarterfinals.

Attackman Matt Kavanagh combined for seven goals and three assists in the two NCAA tournament games and finished the season with 3.2 goals, which established a program record for a freshman. He was one of four Fighting Irish players to earn All-America accolades from the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) in '13. Senior goalie John Kemp copped All-America honors for the third straight season, while senior defenseman Matt Miller and junior midfielder Jim Marlatt both received their second

Notre Dame gamered the No. 4 seed for the 2012 NCAA Championship and the tournament run began with a 13-7 home victory over Yale and then the Irish knocked off fifthseeded Virginia, 12-10, in the quarterfinals to advance to the national semifinals for the third time in school history. A 7-5 setback to Loyola, the eventual champion, ended Notre Dame's bid for its first national title.

Kemp and senior defenseman Kevin Randall earned first team All-America honors from the USILA in `12. That duo also took home BIG EAST awards as Kemp was named the conference's goalkeeper of the year and Randall was tapped as the defensive player of the year. They were among six Irish student-athletes that copped all-BIG EAST accolades. Also in that group were Marlatt and Miller, who were honorable mention All-America honorees in 12.

Randall also was a finalist for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, a USILA Scholar All-American and received the BIG EAST Scholar-Athlete Sport Excellence Award.

Kemp's first team All-America citation earned him the Ensign C. Markland Kelly, Jr. Award, which is presented annually to the nation's top goalie. He joined his older brother Joey, the 2008 recipient, as the only other Notre Dame player to cop the award. They are the only brother duo to receive the award, which has been presented since 1949.

The No. 1 ranking was not the only program standard established during the '11 season. Notre Dame also produced a program-record six USILA All-America honorees. Midfielder David Earl and defenseman Kevin Ridgway both were first team selections, making it the first time Notre Dame ever had two first team All-Americans in the same season. Zach Brenneman (M), Sam Barnes (D), Andrew Irving (LSM) and John Kemp (G) rounded out the honorees. Earl, the leagues' middleder of the year, headlined a group of stall-BIG EAST performers for the Fighting Irish. Barnes, Brenneman, Earl, Irving and Ridgway also were selected in the '11 MLL Draft.

The Irish were seeded fourth for the '11 NCAA Championship and they played host to Penn in the first round. The Fighting Irish topped the Quakers, 13-6, and the seven-goal margin of victory was the largest ever for the program in an NCAA tournament contest. The win over Penn set up a quarterfinal showdown with Duke. The Blue Devils avenged a 12-7 season-opening loss to the Irish with a 7-5 victory. The Irish finished the '11 campaign with an 11-3 mark and ranked eighth in the final Nike/Inside Lacrosse noll

Stout defense was a key reason why the Fighting Irish had unprecedented success in the `10 NCAA Championship. Notre Dame took down five top-10 foes during the `10 campaign, including three straight during the run to the national title game. After a 7-6 regular season, the Fighting irish earned an at-large berth to the NCAAs and a trip to sixth-ranked Princeton in the first round. After downing the Tigers, 8-5, Notre Dame defeated No. 3 Maryland, 7-5, to advance to the national semifinals at M&T Bank Stadium in Baltimore, Md.

The sensational run continued as the Irish bested seventh-ranked Cornell 12-7 to set up a showdown with Duke in the final. Notre Dame opened the '10 season with an 11-7 win at then No. 2 Duke, yet the Blue Devils prevailed in the second meeting by taking the back-and-forth contest 6-5 in overtime.

Senior goalie Scott Rodgers was named the Most Outstanding Player of the `10 NCAA Championship, becoming just the fifth player to earn that honor from a team that did not win the title. Rodgers and the Notre Dame defense allowed just 23 goals (5.75 per game) during the four games of the tournament. For the season, Rodgers ranked first nationally in save percentage (.605) and was third in goalsagainst average (.7.56).

Ridgway and Brenneman joined Rodgers on the NCAA Championship all-tournament team and they were three of the five Fighting Irish players to earn both honorable mention All-America honors from the USILA and all-conference accolades during the first season of BIG EAST lacrosse. Earl and Grant Krebs (M) joined the trio by receiving both national and league recognition.



The '09 Irish squad posted the first undefeated regular season in program history and finished with an overall record of 15-1. The win total and winning percentage (938) from that campaign are program records. Notre Dame received the '09 GWLL coaching staff of the year award, making it the second time in three seasons that the Irish staff gamered the accolade.

The Fighting Irish had five players receive All-America honors in '09. Among the All-America selections were Rodgers, who also was named the GWLL Player of the Year, and defensemen Barnes and Regis McDermott. Those three were among a group of eight Irish players that copped all-GWLL accoldaes during the season. The Long Island Lizards selected McDermott in the third round of the '09 MLL Draft.

After completing a 13-0 regular season, the Irish captured their second consecutive GWLL tournament and received the No. 7 seed for the 2009 NCAA Championship, vet fell to Marvland. 7-3. in the first round.

In '08, Notre Dame compiled a 14-3 record, including a 4-1 GWLL mark to tie for first. The sixth-seeded Fighting Irish made the most of their first-ever NCAA tournament home game by defeating Colgate 8-7 in overtime to advance to the quarterfinals, where they were topped by eventual national champion Syracuse, 11-9. Notre Dame concluded the season ranked fifth in the final USILA poll.

The Irish defense came through when it counted most during the '08 campaign. In the title game of the inaugural GWLL tournament, Notre Dame, behind a stellar effort from senior goalie Joey Kemp, shut down #10 Ohio State in a 9-2 triumph to give the Irish the title. On the season, Notre Dame held its competition to six qoals or fewer eight times.

Four Irish players, including Kemp and defenseman Sean Dougherty, were tabbed as All-Americans in '08. Kemp became the first goalie in Irish history to be named a first-teamer and Dougherty was a third-team prick. Fellow defenseman Ross. Zimmerman received first team all-GWLL honors as he helped the Irish to a three-way tie for the league's regular-season title. In all, six Irish players garmered all-league accolades in '08. Following the season, Dougherty, Kemp and Zimmerman all were drafted into the MLL.

In his first season back with the Irish in `07, Byme helped guide a Notre Dame defensive unit that held opponents to a then program-record 6.66 goals per game, which ranked fourth nationally. The defense played a large role in he Irish posting an 11-4 record overall, including a perfect 5-0 conference mark to win its first outright GWLL title since 2001.

The '07 season saw five Fighting Irish players earn All-America honors. Juniors Dougherty and Kemp were two of those honorees that helped to bolster the stingy Notre Dame defense. Kemp also was named the GWLL Player of the Year and was selected to the all-league first team along with Dougherty, while Zimmerman was tabbed as a second-team all-GWLL performer. The Irish coaching staff also was recognized as the GWLL's staff of the year.

Byrne graduated cum laude from UMass Amherst in 1986 with a degree in economics. He was a two-year starter and a three-year letterman in addition to being an All-New England defenseman for the Minutemen in 1986. He was a starter in two NCAA tournament games, including the '86 quarterfinals versus Johns Hopkins.

He earned his MBA from Notre Dame, where he also worked as defensive coordinator for the Fighting Irish. Byrne helped Notre Dame earn its first NCAA tournament berth during the 1990 campaign as the Irish posted a 9-7 record, including a perfect 3-0 mark in the MLA's Great Lakes Conference, which gave them the league title.

Byrne was a four-time All-United States Club Lacrosse Association member with the Brine Lacrosse Club. He was also invited to tryout with the U.S. National Team on three occasions (1989, 1997, 2001), which placed him among the top-30 defensemen in the nation. Other playing accolades for Byrne include being named an All-Lake Placid Classic performer on 11 occasions and an All-Vail Shootout competitor nine times.

One of his signature years as a player came in '97. That season he was named a Vail Shootout All-Star in the Elite Division along with copping Vail Shootout MVP honors in the Masters Division. Byrne also was named the Lake Placid Tournament Defensive MVP in the Elite Division and was chosen as the Masters Division MVP. Finally, he was invited to the National Team Selection Camp and was the USCLA/Empire League Player of the Year for the Syracuse Lacrosse Club.

Byrne was inducted into the U.S. Lacrosse Hall of Fame - New England Chapter - in 1999 and was the 2001 New Hampshire High School Coach of the Year while at Souhegan High School. He was drafted by the New York Saints of the National Lacrosse League (NLL) in 1991 and played for them in 1992. Byrne also was drafted by the Rochester Knighthawks of the NLL as a defensive forward and went on to win a World Championship with them in 1997.

He continued his professional career following a threeyear retirement when the Boston Cannons of the MLL drafted him in 2000. Byrne played for the Cannons from 2000-02, while having the distinction of being the oldest active player in the league at that time. He played in the inaugural MLL Final Four in '01 and made another appearance there the following season.

In addition to his duties at Saint Anselm, Byrne stayed active in the sporting world in several other ways. He served as managing director at Kiltegan Marketing Group, which is an integrated sports marketing services company with clients such as Reebok and the MLL. Byrne also has spent time as the director of marketing for Cybex International and Brine, a major manufacturer of lacrosse equipment. He also owns the Premier Players Lacrosse Camps and is the founder of the Texas Ton-99.

Byrne is a native of Levittown, N.Y., where he was an All-Long Island Catholic League lacrosse player at Chaminade High School before his graduation in 1982. The Steelers captured the 2006 Bath Eights Tournament Championship. While in England, he also served as a men's lacrosse coach at Sheffield University, and taught lacrosse in the surrounding area for the English Lacrosse Association.

He returned to the United States and played two seasons for the Chicago Machine in Major League Larrosse

Karweck, a native of Penn Yan, N.Y., attended Penn Yan Academy. He led the team to the Section V Class C High School title all four seasons, as well as the state title in 2001. His wife, Dr. Andrea Karweck, is a 2005 graduate of Notre Dame.



During his first season back at Notre Dame, the Irish posted an 11-5 record, which included five wins over top-10 teams. That impressive resume helped the Fighting Irish garner the No. 1 national ranking twice during the regular season and ultimately get the No. 2 seed for the NCAA Championship, which marked the best seed in program history. The Irish topped Detroit, 9-7, in the first round before falling to eventual national champion Duke, 12-11, in the quarterfinals.

Notre Dame opened the 2013 campaign with a 13-5 win at No. 4 Duke and followed that up with a 10-9 overtime triumph at No. 8 Penn State and a 10-9 triple-overtime victory against No. 9 North Carolina. The Irish added two more top-10 wins — a 13-12 overtime result at fifth-ranked Denver and a 9-4 victory over eighth-ranked Ohio State — en route to reaching the top spot in the national polls for just the second time in school history.

Attackman Matt Kavanagh combined for seven goals and three assists in the two NCAA tournament games and finished the season with 32 goals, which established a program record for a freshman. He was one of four Fighting Irish players to earn All-America accolades from the United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) in 2013. Senior goalie John Kemp copped All-America honors for the third traight season, while senior defenseman Matt Miller and junior midfielder Jim Marlatt both received their second citation.

Karweck came to Notre Dame from Merrimack College, where he spent one season as an assistant coach/offensive coordinator at the NCAA Division II school located in North Andover, Mass. The Warriors posted a 13-3 record in `12 and reached the tilned game of the Northeast-10 Conference tournament. The Warriors, who were ranked fifth nationally during the season, produced three All-Americans, including the player of the year. Karweck also taught an exercise science lab during the fall semester at Merrimack.

Prior to his stint at Merrimack, Karweck was an assistant coach at the University of Detroit-Mercy for one season. He was the offensive coordinator for the





Kevin Anderson has been a member of the Notre Dame coaching staff since 1997. He spent 10 seasons as an assistant coach before transitioning to his current role of volunteer assistant in 2007.

Since his arrival at Notre Dame, the Fighting Irish have compiled a 169-75 record (.693) and have advanced to Championship Weekend three times, including a berth in the 2010 national title game. The

Irish have captured 12 conference titles during that span with the most recent being the 2012 regularseason BIG EAST championship.

Anderson has helped mentor 52 All-America selections and 98 all-conference honorees. He also has seen 35 Fighting Irish student-athletes go on to professional careers either in Major League Lacrosse (MLL) or the National Lacrosse League (NLL).

Notre Dame has qualified for the NCAA Tournament 12 times since 1997, including a current run of eight straight appearances. The Irish have advanced to at least the quarterfinal round in each of the last four tournaments.

A native of Baltimore, Md., Anderson was a twosport standout for Loyola in lacrosse and basketball. As a midfielder for the Greyhounds from 1990-93, he collected 35 goals and 10 assists. Anderson earned United States Intercollegiate Lacrosse Association (USILA) All-America honors his senior season after scoring 21 goals and dishing off six assists. He captained Loyola in his final collegiate campaign and played in the annual North-South All-Star Game. Anderson was a member of the 1990 Loyola squad that finished as the runner-up to Syracuse in the NCAA tournament. During his sophomore season (1991), he played five games in goal and registered a career-high 21 saves in an 11-9 NCAA quarterfinal loss to North Carolina.

Anderson was a starting forward for the Greyhound basketball team while lettering all four years (1989-92). He captained the squad as a senior and finished his career with 827 points and 257 rehounds.

A 1993 graduate of Loyola with a bachelor's degree in mathematics, he played for the Charlotte Cobras of the Major Indoor Lacrosse League (MILL) during the 1996 season.

Anderson resides in South Bend with his wife, the former Molly Lennon, a 1992 Notre Dame graduate and former Irish women's soccer player. The couple was married in 2001 and they have three children, KJ, Shea and Finnegan.



Jonathan Rodak joined the University of Notre Dame men's lacrosse operations staff in September of 2013. Rodak, who played collegiately at Cazenovia College, brought a wide-range of experiences in the lacrosse world to the Fighting Irish program.

In his new position, Rodak is in charge of the logistics surrounding the team's travel, film, equipment, scheduling, sponsorship, camps/clinics and also helps with improving the experience of the Notre Dame players.

Rodak spent three years (2010-13) in several roles with Trilogy Lacrosse, which is one of the fastest growing youth lacrosse programs in the United States.

He was club team manager, sales associate, business & logistics manager and business operations intern. He also spent several years in various roles with the Wall Lacrosse Club and was head coach of the Jersey Shore Select Lacrosse Club in 2011.

Last season Rodak was an assistant coach at Montclair High School in Montclair, N.J. He was the team's offensive coordinator and worked with the midfielders and faceoff specialists in addition to managing all operations of the offseason program.

Along with his duties at Montclair High School, Rodak also served as program director for the NJ Diesel (Essex County) Lacrosse Club. He served as a liaison between players and college coaches during the recruiting process in addition to scheduling competitive tournaments for high school and youth programs.

Rodak also has valuable experience at the collegiate level after spending two seasons (2011-12) as an assistant coach at Wagner College. He worked with the Seahawk defense and faceoff units.

"Jonathan has been very involved in lacrosse from an organizational and promotional standpoint with Trilogy Lacrosse, which is one of the companies in lacrosse that do a really professional job in developing their club system and their teaching mode," Notre Dame head coach Kevin Corrigan said. "He brings that

experience along with experience of coaching both at the high school and collegiate levels. All of that will help our players have the best experience that they can possibly have at Notre Dame. He's tremendously professional and very efficient and I know he'll do an awesome job."

Rodak was an attackman and midfielder for four seasons at Cazenovia College before graduating in 2009 with a bachelor of professional studies in sport management. He served as a team captain in addition to being the men's lacrosse representative on the Student Athlete Advisory Council. He also has a master of science degree in sport business management from Manhattanville College.

"I'm excited with the opportunity to join the University of Notre Dame and the men's lacrosse program," Rodak said. "I'm looking forward to working with the coaching staff and players, getting to know them as individuals and helping this program and University grow to reach new heights."

The New Jersey native is a 2004 graduate of Monsignor Donovan High School, where he was varsity captain and offensive player of the year as a senior. He currently resides in South Bend with his fiancé Sara Manello.

The Byron V. Kanaley Award is the most prestigious honor awarded to a Notre Dame student-athlete. It has been presented each year since 1927 at commencement exercises and honors senior monogram athletes who have been exemplary as students and leaders. The award is selected by the Faculty Board on Athletics and is named in honor of a 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the Irish baseball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and served the University in the Alumni Association and as a lay trustee from 1915 until his death in 1960. Notre Dame men's lacrosse boasts three recipients of the Kanaley Award (Robert Williamson 1993, Peter Christman 2009, Kevin Randall 2012).

The Christopher Zorich Award

This award recognizes the contributions of Notre Dame student-athletes to the University community and the community at-large. The award, which is presented annually each spring, bears the name of Christopher Zorich, two-time football All-American and 1991 graduate of the University of Notre Dame. Dan Scolaro became the first men's lacrosse recipient of the award when he garnered the honor in 2008. Scolaro was instrumental to the men's lacrosse team's mentorship program at middle schools in the South Bend area. The team's involvement with mentoring local youth and participating in other community service projects was recognized by the Notre Dame Athletic Department with the presentation of the 2008 Trophy Award (see below).



While the support of the South Bend/Michiana community has been a key ingredient to the success of the Fighting Irish at home over the years, the Notre Dame players have routinely given back to the local community. In 2008, the Fighting Irish men's lacrosse team was recognized with The Trophy Award at Notre Dame's seventh annual O.S.C.A.R.S. (Outstanding Student-Athletes Celebrating Achievements and Recognition Showcase). Established by the Office of Student Welfare and Development at Notre Dame, The Trophy Award annually recognizes an athletic team that has demonstrated its commitment and dedication to the community through unparalleled community service to Notre Dame and South Bend. A Remembrance Of Former Irish Coach Rich O'Leary



Names like Ara Parseghian, Digger Phelps, Dan Devine, and Lou Holtz dot the list of those who numbered as University of Notre Dame athletic department colleagues and associates of longtime athletics staffer Rich O'Leary.

While those more high-profile varsity coaches found their names in headlines, 0'Leary — who lost his battle with cancer July 17, 2009 — quietly went about impacting day-to-day athletic lives all over campus for 37 years.

Hired by Moose Krause and Dominic "Nappy" Napolitano back when the department was known as Non-Varsity Athletics, O'Leary served as director of intramurals and club sports for the Office of Recreational Sports (commonly known as RecSports).


For nearly four decades he played a major role in defining athletic opportunities for, literally, thousands of Notre Dame students, faculty and staff members.

Many of those who participated in the programs he helped shape probably never knew him. Those who did worked hand in hand with a self-effacing administrator who was more than comfortable in his behind-the-scenes role.

After Napolitano died in 1986, O'Leary became the key organizer for the famed Bengal Bouts, the signature event for Notre Dame's college boxing club. After a brief lull in popularity, the Bengals have drawn more participants in recent years than ever before — even leading to a women's version known as the Baraka Bouts.

Like Ara, Digger, Dan and Lou, Rich had his own seat in the varsity coaches' locker room in the bowels of the Athletic and Convocation Center. A standout lacrosse player in his college days, he first took over the Notre Dame men's club program then continued as head coach for eight more years (only one season losing more than they won) after the team achieved varsity status in 1981.

The new Arlotta Lacrosse Stadium that opened its doors in October '09 has the O'Leary name attached to the men's team room that sits adjacent to the locker area. That's because O'Leary's former players thought so much of their mentor that their financial contributions — unbeknownst to O'Leary — made that possible.



Current Irish lacrosse coach Kevin Corrigan, who took over O'Leary's position in 1989, took his predecessor on a golf-cart tour of that area just weeks before his death.

Even more telling are the e-mail tributes that came from O'Leary's former players, many from the far more casual and informal club sport days. Way back when in a different culture for club-level athletics, O'Leary wasn't too far removed from his charges to understand they shared adult beverages on occasion. Yet it's obvious more than a few of his players cast him as something of a father figure during their on-campus growing years

Their tributes make you laugh and cry at the same time:

From Jim Scarola '78 — "I learned from Rich that great leaders are not defined by titles or positions they have held, but rather by the impact they have had on the people around them."

From John McLachlan'87 — "Rich would tell us, 'If you play your best game and they play their worst game, you're still going to lose'!t wasn't an overly inspirational pep talk, but unfortunately it was accurate once or twice a year."

From Brian McKeon'85: "Rich was a decent and humble soul who rarely raised his voice in anger and quietly nudged his players to meet their full potential. That is the mark of a leader."

And, from Mike Lynch '82 "Rich is what my dad used to call a gentleman's gentleman. A guy you

look up to. A guy you want to have a beer with and tell a joke to. A guy with a huge heart, a pure sense of humor and a ton of class. Quite simply, I love the quy."

The O'Learys (including wife Linda) have been friends to dozens of athletic department staffers over the years — offering access to everything from the backyard pool of their Cedar Street home (facetiously known as the "Cedar Club"), to home-cooked meals for the young, old and in between, to large social extravaganzas such as the Home Olympics.

Rich lost a kidney some years ago, and he quietly reached out to others on campus and in the community fighting kidney disease — including former Notre Dame athletic director Mike Wadsworth — to share his experiences.

He possessed a dry, low-key wit. Yet, as unassuming as he could be, he'd also be the one to do cannonballs into the pool and drive his beloved little MG (with the top down) around South Bend.

When you left the O'Leary home, even when disease was getting the best of him, Rich always walked you to your car and thanked you for coming, as if it was his privilege to have spent time with you.

Little did we realize we were the lucky ones.





Lacrosse originally was started on the Notre Dame campus in 1896 by Father Andrew Sammson, but the modern team from which the varsity squad grew was established in 1963 by a small group of East Coast lacrosse players. The club went a surprising 5-6 during its inaugural season in 1964 and boasted a 111-91-1 record in its 17 years of play.

Having been run strictly by students in its early years, the lacrosse club gained a coach in 1971 when Rich O'Leary began donating his time to instruct the squad. He was officially named the University's first varsity lacrosse coach when the club achieved varsity status in May of 1980. The Fighting Irish went 6-6 in their first varsity season in 1981. O'Leary guided the team to a 64-42 record in its first eight seasons of varsity competition.

Kevin Corrigan took over the reins of the program in 1989 and has led Notre Dame to a 241-114 record over the last 25 seasons. The Corrigan era has been highlighted by three trips to Championship Weekend (2001, 2010, 2012) and a current run of eight straight NCAA Tournament appearances. In 2013, the Fighting Irish captured their 300th varsity victory.





hen Father Edward F. Sorin arrived in the northern Indiana wilderness, he had only \$310, three log buildings badly in need of repair and a far-sighted vision of establishing a liberal arts school to meet the growing educational needs of the frontier. He dreamed of building a great university, and in 1842, he founded the University of Notre Dame du Lac.

Over the years, Notre Dame would evolve into a preeminent place for Catholic thought. While becoming one of the top undergraduate institutions in the country, Notre Dame also has been at the cutting edge of research, including such innovations as the transmission of wireless messages and the development of synthetic rubber. Today researchers are achieving breakthroughs in astrophysics, radiation chemistry, environmental sciences, tropical disease transmission, cancer, robotics and nanoelectronics.

The University also has stressed residential life, with four-of-five students living on campus in 29 residence halls that serve as the focal point of social, spiritual and athletic activities. Notre Dame is one of a handful of universities with a truly international student body, coming from more than 100 nations and all 50 states. Students come to Notre Dame not only to learn how to live, keeping faith with the vision of Fr. Sorin.

Notre Dame is one of the few universities to regularly rank in the top 25 in the U.S. News & World Report survey of America's best colleges and the Learfield Sports Directors' Cup standings of the best overall athletics programs. The University is second only to KU

Leuven of Belgium among all Catholic universities worldwide, according to the 2012 *Times Higher Education* survey, and the Mendoza College of Business at Notre Dame boasts the No. 1 undergraduate business program in the nation according to Bloomberg *BusinessWeek*.

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.

President

ev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., is in his second five-year term as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame. His vision is for Notre Dame to be the Catholic research university for our time - an institution that unifies, enlightens and heals by engaging in scholarship of the first rank while maintaining its distinctive Catholic character and long-time excellence in undergraduate education.

During his tenure, Notre Dame has made significant progress toward its research goal, including selection as the lead partner in the Midwest Institute for

Nanoelectronics Discovery and the Center for Low Energy Systems Technology, the creation of the Innovation Park research facility, and the construction of Stinson

Remick Hall of Engineering.

His commitment to undergraduate education has been marked by the Notre Dame Forums, yearlong initiatives that have examined



important issues such as religion and world conflict, global health, immigration, education and energy.

The University's Catholic identity has been strengthened during Father Jenkins' tenure multiple ways, including the appointment of a coordinator for University life initiatives and the construction of multimillion-dollar facilities for the Institute for Church Life, including the Center for Social Concerns, and the Institute for Educational Initiatives, which includes the Alliance for Catholic Education.

Father Jenkins earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre

Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively, and was ordained a priest of the Congregation of Holy Cross in 1983. He holds advanced degrees from Oxford and the Jesuit School of Theology. He is a professor of philosophy and the author of Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aquinas.

Father Jenkins is a native of Omaha, Neb.

ohn B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a University of Notre Dame graduate now in his sixth year in 2013-14 as vice president and director of athletics at his alma mater, has attached his signature to a variety of new initiatives during his tenure:

*Launching of Fighting Irish Digital Media—a major enterprise that delivers better information about and access to Notre Dame and its athletic programs via expanded production and distribution of programming.

* Developing a plan for expanding Notre Dame Stadium in order to make it a year-round asset for the University while also improving the game day experience for student-athletes and fans.

* Creation of new community outreach and youth programming activities.

* Building of student-athlete programs and services that expand recognition of high academic achievement—and mentor and facilitate career development.

* Meeting the performance needs of Notre Dame student-athletes through establishment of a new sports performance division.

* Reaching out to more former Irish student-athletes, via the Notre Dame Monogram Club and other programs.

In 2012-13 alone, Swarbrick played a major role in three significant announcements that positively impacted Notre Dame on the national collegiate scene:

 -- Creation by the Bowl Championship Series of the four-team College Football Playoff to begin with the 2014 season, with Notre Dame maintaining viable access into that system.

-- Membership for Notre Dame's athletic teams (other than football and hockey) in the Atlantic Coast Conference beginning with the 2013-14 athletic seasons. In football, Notre Dame will play five games per year against ACC opponents beginning in

2014 and also have full access to the league's list of postseason bowl options. Notre Dame hockey now plays in Hockey East.

 An extension of the University's relationship with NBC Sports through the 2025 football season.

Swarbrick's first five years combined featured a variety of on-and off-the-field Notre Dame athletics successes:

* Number-one rankings for Notre Dame (among Football Bowl Subdivision schools) in the six most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) surveys—in 2012 at 99 for all-student-athletes (including football number one at 97, in the fourth consecutive year Notre Dame stood atop that chart).

* Record involvement in community service hours by Irish student-athletes.

* An appearance in the Bowl Championship Series football title game following the 2012 season—in an unprecedented year in which the Irish finished the regular season 12-0 to rank number one in the final BCS poll while also ranking number one in the GSR standings.

* NCAA championships in 2011 in fencing (a men's and women's combined championship) and 2010 in women's soccer.

* NCAA runner-up team finishes in 2013 in fencing, 2012 and 2011 in women's basketball, 2010 in men's lacrosse, 2009 in fencing and 2008 in women's soccer.

* NCAA semifinal appearances in women's basketball in 2013, men's lacrosse in 2012, hockey in 2011, women's tennis in both 2009 and 2010 and women's soccer in 2009, plus 2010 and 2012 third-place fencing finishes.

* Construction of the 5,022-seat Compton Family Ice Arena that opened for the 2011-12 season and features two sheets of ice (one Olympic sized). The 2009-10 school year also featured dedications of new facilities for soccer and lacrosse—as well as opening of the new Purcell Pavilion within the south dome of the Joyce Center.

Before coming back to Notre Dame, Swarbrick rose to national prominence as a lawyer, consultant and executive in the collegiate and Olympic sports industries

Born in Yonkers, N.Y., and raised in Yonkers and Bloomington, Ind., he is a 1976 magna cum laude graduate of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in economics. Upon graduating from Stanford University Law School in 1980, he returned to Indiana to accept a position as an associate in the Indianapolis law firm Baker & Daniels, one of the largest in the state. He was made partner in 1987 and spent 28 years with the firm.

As a member of the Indiana Sports Corporation, including the chairmanship from 1992 to 2001, Swarbrick led many of Indianapolis' successful proposals to a wide array of athletics organizations—from the National Football League (NFL) to the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) to the Big Inconference. His leadership efforts resulted in the city:

* Earning the right to play host to the 2012 Super Bowl in Indianapolis at Lucas Oil Stadium

* Becoming the home of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) national headquarters in 1999.

* Hosting the 1987 Pan American Games, where Swarbrick served as the director of competition.

* Hosting the 1991 World Gymnastics Championships.

* Hosting NCAA Men's Basketball Final Fours and other college championship competitions and a wide array of national and world championships in the Olympic sports.

* Securing rights to host the Big Ten Conference men's and women's basketball

tournaments at Conseco Fieldhouse for five consecutive years beginning in 2008.

At Baker & Daniels Swarbrick served as general counsel for numerous national governing bodies of Olympic sports, including USA Gymnastics, and as a consultant to various bid cities and host committees for Olympic Games and world championships.

In his work as an advisor to the NCAA, Swarbrick coordinated the men's College Basketball Partnership, an NCAA-led group that addresses the opportunities and challenges in the sport; developed the business plan for the new NBA/NCAA youth basketball enterprise, ifloops;

served as a member of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Discussion Group, and chaired the NCAA/USOC task force dedicated to developing proposals to expand sponsorship of Olympic sports among NCAA member institutions.

In 2000 Swarbrick received one of the NCAA's highest honors, The Flying Wedge Award, for his work in establishing Indianapolis as the new home of the NCAA. In 2001 he was honored by the State of Indiana with the Sagamore of the Wabash Award. In 2002 he received the Pathfinder Award from Youthlinks Indiana for his service to youth in the state of Indiana.

He received an honorary monogram from the Notre Dame Monogram Club in 2013. Born March 19, 1954, Swarbrick was named Notre Dame's 12th athletics director on July 16, 2008.

He and his wife, Kimberly, are the parents of four children: Kate, a 2010 graduate of St. Louis University; Connor, a 2011 graduate of Wake Forest University; Cal, a senior at TCU; and Christopher, a University of Notre Dame junior.





Notre Dame Wins National Championship in Graduation Based on 2013 NCAA Graduation Success Rate Numbers

Notre Dame graduates 99 percent of its student-athletes between 2003 and 2006.

The University of Notre Dame can once again claim the 2013 national championship for graduating its student-athletes in all sports—in the process posting the top NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figure (99) for its student-athletes for the seventh straight year.

The GSR number for all Notre Dame student-athletes rated the Irish first among the football-playing institutions in the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I-A). The 2013 NCAA figures are based on entering classes from 2003 through 2006.

Whether measured by the federal government in its Department of Education report or by the NCAA through its GSR numbers, graduation rates for Notre Dame student-athletes once again rank either number one or among the handful of national leaders in four major categories among all major football-playing colleges and universities.

Notre Dame's institutional research found that Irish student-athletes in 2013 rank number one in four of 10 major categories--ranking second in one other and third in two more. That's based on the NCAA-issued GSR and federal figures.

For the fifth year in a row Notre Dame leads the nation in four GSR categories--for all student-athletes (at 99), male student-athletes (98), female student-athletes (100) and black student-athletes (96).

In calculations that include all student-athletes in all sports, Notre Dame ranks first among the FBS schools in the GSR figures, which were initiated in 2005 by the NCAA. The University's 99 percent GSR for all its student-athletes ranks just ahead of the 98 figure for Duke. Using the federal formula, Notre Dame graduated a four-year average of 88 percent of its student-athletes, just behind Stanford at 93 and Northwestern at 89.

In the GSR standings, the Irish led the way in four categories. In addition to its number-one ranking for all student-athletes (99), Notre Dame finished first among female student athletes at 100, first among male student-athletes at 98 percent (ahead of Duke at 97) and first among black student-athletes at 96 percent (ahead of Duke and Rice at 95).

Notre Dame graduated 93 percent of all women competing in varsity athletics, to rank second among its peer institutions based on the federal calculations (behind Stanford at 96). Among men, Notre Dame's 84 percent federal rate was third (behind Stanford at 90 and Northwestern at 88). Notre Dame graduated 79 percent of its black student-athletes, ranking fifth based on the federal rate, and Irish football players graduated at a 75 percent rate, to rank ninth.

21 Irish athletic programs post toprated GSR rates according to NCAA

Twenty-one of the University of Notre Dame's men's and women's athletic programs posted Graduation Success Rate numbers that ranked them best in the nation within their sports (including 20 perfect 100 scores)—and 10 produced federal graduation rates that led all NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision (formerly Division I–A) institutions (including nine perfect 100 scores), according to Notre Dame's institutional research based on 2013 graduation-rate figures released last week by the NCAA.

All statistics are based on the combined entering classes from 2003 through 2006.

GSR statistics for Irish women's sports featured all 11 perfect 100 scores—in basketball, cross country/track, crew/rowing, fencing, golf, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball.

ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

GSR statistics for Irish men's sports featured nine perfect 100 scores—in baseball, basketball, cross country/track, fencing, golf, hockey, soccer, swimming and tennis—plus 96 in lacrosse that ranked number one and 94 in football that ranked number three.

All 11 Irish women's programs had GSR rates ranking them first within their sports among the NCAA FBS subset of schools. Ten Irish men's programs had GSR rates ranking them first within their sports:

- Women's basketball at 100 tied for first with 33 other schools.
- Women's cross country/track and field at 100 tied for first with 11 other schools.
- Women's crew/rowing at 100 tied for first with 10 other schools.
- Women's fencing at 100 tied for first with Duke, North Carolina, Northwestern, Ohio State and Stanford.
- Women's golf at 100 tied for first with 51 other schools.
- Women's lacrosse at 100 tied for first with 11 other schools.
- Women's soccer at 100 tied for first with 23 other schools.
- Women's softball at 100 tied for first with 24 other schools.
- Women's swimming at 100 tied for first with 18 other schools.
- Women's tennis at 100 finished tied for first with 68 other schools.
- Women's volleyball at 100 ranked tied for first with 43 other schools.
- Baseball at 100 tied for first with Duke, Memphis, Miami (Fla.) and Stanford.
- Men's basketball at 100 tied for first with 10 other schools.
- Men's cross country/track and field at 100 tied for first — with Duke, Memphis, Michigan, New Mexico State, Stanford, Tulane, Vanderbilt and Wake Forest.
- Men's fencing at 100 tied for first with Boston College, Duke, North Carolina, Ohio State and Stanford.

- Men's golf at 100 tied for first with 32 other schools.
- Men's hockey at 100 ranked first (tied with Bowling Green, Michigan, U.S. Air Force Academy).
- Men's soccer at 100 tied for first with Duke and Northwestern.
- Men's swimming at 100 tied for first with eight other schools.
- Men's tennis at 100 tied for first with 31 other schools.
- Men's lacrosse at 96 finished first (tied with the U.S. Naval Academy).
- Football at 94 finished third (behind Northwestern at 97 and Rice at 96).

Five Irish women's programs had perfect 100 federal rates ranking them first within their sports among the NCAA FBS subset, while one program finished tied for second. Five Irish men's programs had federal rates ranking them first within their sports (four with perfect 100 scores) among the NCAA FBS subset, while one program finished second, one in third and one finished in fourth place.

The federal figures showed thatamong Notre Dame's women's sportscrew/rowing, golf, lacrosse, tennis and volleyball achieved 100 percent scores. Women's cross country/track and women's soccer scored 94 and women's swimming 93 among other Irish raw federal scores. Among Notre Dame's men's sports--fencing, golf, hockey and tennis achieved 100 percent federal scores. Swimming scored 95, cross country/track 94 and lacrosse 93 (ranking first) among other Irish men's raw federal scores:

- Women's crew/rowing at 100 finished first (tied with Syracuse).
- Women's golf at 100 tied for first with 16 other schools.
- Women's lacrosse at 100 tied for first with Penn State and Stanford.

- Women's tennis at 100 tied for first with 22 other schools.
- Women's volleyball at 100 tied for first with six other schools.
- Men's fencing at 100 tied for first with Stanford.
- Men's golf at 100 ranked tied for first with 11 other schools.
- Men's hockey at 100 ranked first-followed by Miami (Ohio) at 74.
- Men's lacrosse finished first at 93 followed by Duke (91) and Ohio State (88).
- Men's tennis at 100 tied for first with 12 other schools.
- Men's basketball at 83 ranked second behind Ohio University (86).
- Women's cross country/track and field at 94 ranked tied for second (with Ohio State) behind Northwestern (100).
- Men's soccer at 88 ranked third, behind Duke (100) and Northwestern (89).
- Men's swimming at 95 stood tied for fourth (with Purdue) behind Miami (Fla.). UNLV and Stanford at 100.
- Women's soccer at 94 ranked tied for sixth (with Stanford), behind Boston College, Connecticut and Rice (all at 100), Michigan State and Wake Forest (both at 95).
- Men's cross country/track and field at 94 ranked tied for sixth—with Michigan and Wake Forest—behind Duke, New Mexico State, Stanford, Tulane (all at 100) and Ohio State (95).
- Football at 75 ranked ninth, behind Northwestern (92), Stanford and Rice (89), Boston College (86), Duke (81), TCU (80), Wake Forest (77) and Fresno State (76).
- Women's swimming at 93 tied for ninth (with Michigan State and Virginia Tech) behind Buffalo, Fresno State, Michigan, Missouri and Stanford (at 100), North Carolina (96) and Rice and Georgia Tech (both at 95).
