PROSPECTS

With only three monogram winners returning from the Notre Dame squad which won six and lost three last year, Coach Walter Langford faces a tough rebuilding job with the Irish tennis squad this year. The Irish tennis coach longs for the days when he had 12 returning lettermen, but still expects his 1950 squad to equal, and with some luck, better the mark of his 1949 group.

Fortunately the Irish team retained the number one and two players from last year, Bob David, a senior from Chicago and one of last year's co-captains, and Captain Gene Blittner, a senior from Schenectady, N.Y. The third returning monogram winner, Jim Hennessy, a junior from Louisville, Ky., will be pressed for the number three spot by two sophomores, Matt Tuite of Chicago and Tom Overholser of South Bend.

Coach Langford believes the success of his 1950 season depends on these last three players. If these men, who form the middle of the Irish attack, can hold up and win in the matches which Langford expects to be close, the Irish could post a 7-3 and possibly an 8-2 mark for the season.

Behind Overholser and Tuite, should follow Herb Hoene, junior from Duluth, Minn., and Pat Tonti, junior from Columbus, Ohio. Langford also expects to get valuable points from Jean-Paul Massicotte, junior from Quebec, Canada, Bill O'Connor, junior from Pittsburgh, Pa., and Dick MacDonald, junior from Lafayette, Ind.

COACH WALTER LANGFORD

Professor Walter Langford in addition to being Notre Dame tennis coach is also head of the Modern Language Department of the College of Arts and Letters. He took over the tennis team in 1940. He was also fencing coach during the 1940-41-42 seasons.

This will be Langford's 11th season coaching the Irish tennis team and his record stands at 71 wins and 13 defeats. He has coached undefeated squads in 1942, 1944 and 1947, and his 1944 group tied for the National Championship.

Langford's 1949 tennis team won six and lost three matches and finished fourth in the Central Collegiate Conference tourney. In 27 seasons of competition, Notre Dame tennis teams have scored 125 victories, against 76 defeats and two ties for a percentage of .608.

1951 PROSPECTS

Despite the fact that the Notre Dame tennis team lost last year's number one and two men through graduation, Coach Walter Langford is looking forward to at least equaling the record of last year's inexperienced squad which won six matches while dropping four.

Langford bases his partial optimism in part on his four returning monogram winners from the 1950 group, who should be greatly improved with the experience gathered in last season's campaign. These men, senior Co-Captains Herb Hoene, Duluth, Minn., and Pat Tonti, from Columbus, Ohio, along with Jim Hennessy, a senior and two-time monogram winner from Louisville, Ky., and junior Tom Overholser of South Bend, are being counted on heavily to provide the strength in the middle of the Irish net team. The other bright spot in the season's plans is a pair of sophomores, Ken Angyal, Detroit, and Ray Smith, Chicago, who Langford intends to use in the number one and two singles positions. Both Angyal and Smith were outstanding in freshman competition last year.

The most promising performers in the remainder of the team are Jean-Paul MacLacotte, senior from Quebec, Canada, who saw some action last year in doubles competition; Dick MacDonald, another senior who played some in 1950; and Bill McMurray, a promising sophomore from Wilmette, Ill.

A tough schedule of 11 matches in 24 days, with four matches in as many days at one point, confronts the Irish bid for a successful season. The schedule includes an eastern trip for a morning and afternoon match with Duquesne and Pittsburgh respectively on May 12.

COACH WALTER LANGFORD

In addition to being the only Notre Dame coach to mentor two sports, tennis and fencing, Professor Walter Langford also heads the University's Department of Modern Languages. Langford joined the faculty in 1931, following his graduation from Notre Dame with an A.B. degree in 1930. He became tennis coach in 1940. He also coached fencing from 1940 to 1942, and resumed coaching that sport this year.

Beginning his 12th season as Irish tennis coach, Langford's record stands at 77 wins and 17 defeats. His teams have never had a losing season. Last year's squad posted a six won and four lost record, and finished second to Michigan State in the Central Collegiate Tourney. Langford coached undefeated teams in 1942, 1944 and 1947. His 1944 group tied with Texas and the University of Miami (Florida) for the National Championship.

In 28 seasons of competition, the all-time record shows Notre Dame tennis teams have 131 victories, 80 defeats and two ties for a .619 average.

1952 Prospects

Five monogram winners, paced by Capt. Tom Overholser and Ken Angyal, first singles man last year, return to the Notre Dame tennis courts this year to brighten Coach Walter Langford's view of the forthcoming season. With such a nucleus for a squad, Langford hopes to equal or better last year's mark of five wins against six losses.

Overholser, a senior from South Bend, and Angyal, a junior from Detroit, and the other veterans should have gained much valuable experience last season, a factor on which Langford bases much of his hope. Mat Tuite, a junior from Chicago, returns from the 1950 season, after serving in the navy. Ray Smith, also a Chicago junior, and Jaime Saenz from Cali, Colombia, round out the monogram men.

Several sophomores and freshmen will make an attempt to crack into the first seven positions. Sophomores Don Crowley (Middletown, O.), Chuck Gallagher (Lakewood, O.), and Dick Simons (South Bend, Ind.) up from last season's freshman team, and freshman Maurice Reidy (Denver, Colo.) are all promising performers.

Seven Big Ten opponents are included in the eleven match schedule, which must be completed in 27 days. So, there is much confronting Langford and the Irish in their bid for a successful season.

1953 PROSPECTS

Nine returning monogram winners and Walter Clarke, a sophomore, from San Francisco, Calif., who was the nation's seventh ranking junior tennis player in 1951, form the nucleus of this year's Notre Dame tennis team which Coach Walter Langford hopes will equal or better last season's record of seven wins and three losses. The 11 match schedule includes seven Big Ten opponents. Capt. Tom Overholser is the only regular lost to the Irish from the 1952 squad.

Co-Captains Ken Angyal and Ray Smith, along with Clarke are three main reasons why the Irish nourish fond dreams of posting their best season record since 1948 when Notre Dame won eight and lost only one. Both Angyal, from Detroit, and Smith, from Chicago, are seniors and two-time monogram winners. Matt Tuite, a navy veteran and Chicago senior, is another two-time letterman who gives substance to Langford's hopes for a successful season. Juniors Joe Crowley, Middletown, O., Chuck Gallagher, Lakewood, O., and Dick Simons, South Bend, Ind.; sophomores Maurice Reidy, Denver, Colo., and Bill Reale, Mansfield, O.; and senior Jaime Saenz, Cali, Colombia, who lettered in 1951, round out the list of monogram men.

Several juniors and sophomores will attempt to gain one of the first nine positions. 1954 PROSPECTS

With five monogram men returning to form the nucleus of the 1954 Notre Dame tennis team, Coach Charlie Samson's first Irish net squad has won three of its first five matches of the season with victories over Cincinnati, Northwestern and Chicago. Samson, whose eight-man outfit is one of the smallest in recent years, succeeds Prof. Walter Langford, who for 14 years directed Notre Dame's tennis teams to 95 victories, 30 losses, and one tie. Last year's squad posted six wins, four losses, and the one tie. Pessimistic about bettering last season's mark, Samson has four of the seven remaining matches with Big Ten foes.

Before the start of the regular season, Samson took his squad on an Easter vacation spring training trip to Chapel Hill, N.C., where the Irish faced North Carolina, North Carolina State and Duke in a series of exhibitions.

Picking up the slack of graduated co-captains Ken Angyal and Ray Smith, have been the five returning monogram winners led by first singles Wally Clarke, and second singles Maury Reidy. Both juniors, Clarke and Reidy are teamed up to form the no. 1 doubles combination. The three other monogram winners who have performed admirably for Samson are juniors Bill Reale, and Don Kennedy, and senior captain Chuck Gallagher. Other regular performers include senior Gerry Finney, junior Frank Lynch, and sophomore John Stuhldreher.

During the 1944 season, when the Fighting Irish tied Miami University of Florida for the intercollegiate tennis championship, Samson was runner-up in the singles division to Pancho Segura of Miami, who has since become one of the nations leading professional stars. Samson also claimed the South Bend and St. Joseph Valley tennis championships while performing for the Irish.

In addition to his present coaching duties, Samson is also an assistant professor in the Civil Engineering department at Notre Dame.

The all-time Notre Dame tennis record for 31 seasons of competition shows 149 victories, 93 defeats and three ties.

1958 PROSPECTS

With six returning monogram winners, Coach Tom Fallon feels fairly optimistic about the 1958 Notre Dame tennis team. However, the Irish did lose via graduation Harry Smith, number two singles man and a member of the number one doubles team.

Heading the veteran group is Max Brown, a junior, who is the nation's seventh-ranked collegiate singles player and the nation's 25th-ranked men's singles player. Brown last season reached the quarter-finals of the N.C.A.A. tennis championships.

The number two man for the Irish is Captain Ron Schoenberg, a junior from Los Angeles, Cal. Schoenberg, a lefthander, has had the distinction of placing sixth in the National Boys' singles tourney finals.

The other returning monogram winners include Hector Cabello, Sergio Garza, and Charles Stephens, all juniors and Charles Vanoncini, a senior. Top sophomore prospects are Dee Stevenson and Peter Heinbecker.

Despite his optimism, Coach Fallon points that this is one of the tougher schedules attempted by the Notre Dame tennis team. This year the Irish will meet seven Big Ten opponents plus meeting Kalamazoo, a strong independent, twice.

COACH TOM FALLON

Professor Tom Fallon begins his second year as Irish tennis coach this spring. In his first year at the helm, the Notre Dame netters posted a 9-4 record. Fallon, a 1942 graduate of Notre Dame, joined the university faculty in 1951 after receiving his master's and doctor's degrees at Columbia University.

A native of Flushing, N.Y., Fallon served as faculty advisor and coach for the Notre Dame wrestling club from 1951 through 1954. He was appointed wrestling coach in 1955 when the sport was elevated to varsity status, a post he still holds.

Fallon succeeded Charles Samson as Irish tennis coach. In three years, Samson's teams had a record of 24 wins, 21 losses and one tie. The all-time Notre Dame tennis record for 35 seasons of competition shows 182 victories, 118 defeats and four ties.

1959 PROSPECTS

With five monogram winners back from last year's team, which won 17 and lost only one, plus two outstanding sophomore prospects, Notre Dame tennis coach Tom Fallon has a fairly optimistic outlook on the 1959 campaign. The Irish, however, did lose a three-year monogram winner in Chuck Vanoncini, who was graduated.

The Irish will be paced by Co-captain Max Brown, a veteran of two campaigns and a member of the second team, N.C.A.A. All-American tennis squad last year. Brown played the number one singles position last season, but has found the position threatened this year by sophomore Don Ralph of Bethesda, Md.

The number three position will probably be held down by another sophomore, Bill Heinbecker, from St. Louis, Mo. Co-captain Ron Schoenberg, a senior from Los Angeles, Cal., will most likely be the number four man.

The last two positions will be taken from Sergio Garza, Hector Cabello, and Chuck Stephens, all seniors and Ray Bender, a junior. Garza and Cabello each hold two monograms and Stephens one. Co-captains Brown and Schoenberg have also earned two monograms.

In spite of the optimistic outlook, it must be pointed out that the Irish meet eight Big Ten opponents, including Iowa, who handed the Irish their only

defeat last year. Kalamazoo College, a strong tennis power, is a team that will be met twice.

The Irish are also meeting Ohio Wesleyan and Southern Illinois for the first time.
