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

- The University of Notre Dame sits on 1,250 acres containing two lakes and has 137 buildings.
- The Basilica of the Sacred Heart, the 14-story Hesburgh Library with its 132-feet-high mural depicting Christ the Teacher, and the University's beautifully renovated 128-year-old Main Building with its famed 23.9 Karat Golden Dome are among the most widely known university landmarks in the world.
- Notre Dame has 8,332 undergraduate students and a total enrollment of 11,479 students.


STUDENTS

- Notre Dame's graduation rate of 95 percent is exceeded by only Harvard and Princeton.
- Notre Dame's 98 percent retention rate between the freshman and sophomore years is among the highest in the country, thanks in large part to the University's unique First Year of Studies Program.
- Notre Dame has one of the highest undergraduate residential concentrations of any national university, with 80 percent of its students living in 27 residence halls. Some 40 Holy Cross religious leaders continue to live and provide a pastoral presence in the halls.
- Graduate and undergraduate students at the University come from all 50 states and more than 100 countries worldwide.

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., took office as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2005. He was elected by the University's Board of Trustees to a five-year term April 30, 2004.

An associate professor of philosophy and member of Notre Dame's faculty since 1990, Father Jenkins had served from 2000-2005 as a vice president and associate provost at the University.

Prior to his service in the pro-

vost's office, Father Jenkins had been religious superior of the Holy Cross priests and brothers at Notre Dame for three years. As religious superior, he was a Fellow and Trustee of the University, but he relinquished those posts to assume his duties in the provost's office.

Father Jenkins earned degrees in philosophy from Oxford University in 1987 and 1989. He earned his master of divinity degree and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, Calif., in 1988.

Prior to entering the Congregation of Holy Cross, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively. Father Jenkins was ordained a priest in Notre Dame's Basilica of the Sacred Heart in 1983. He served as director of the Old College program for Notre Dame undergraduate candidates for the Congregation of Holy Cross from 1991 to 1993.

A native of Omaha, Neb., Father Jenkins was born Dec. 17, 1953.



John B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a Notre Dame graduate who has risen to national prominence as a lawyer, consultant and executive in the collegiate and Olympic sports industries, was appointed July 16, 2008 as the University's 12th director of athletics.

Raised in Yonkers, N.Y., and Bloomington, Ind., Swarbrick is a 1976 magna cum laude graduate of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in economics. Upon graduating from Stanford Law School in 1980, he returned to Indiana to accept a position as an associate in the Indianapolis law firm Baker & Daniels. He was made partner in 1987.

At the same time that Swarbrick began his career, the city of Indianapolis was beginning its effort to become a world-class center for amateur and professional athletics. An employment law specialist, Swarbrick soon shifted his focus to sports and quickly became active in the city's initiatives.

As a member of the Indiana Sports Corp., including the chairmanship from 1992 to 2001, Swarbrick led many of the city's successful proposals to a wide array of athletics organizations – from the NFL to the U.S. Olympic Committee to the Big Ten Conference. His leadership efforts have resulted in the city:

- Earning the bid to host the 2012 Super Bowl to Indianapolis
- Becoming the home of the NCAA national headquarters
- Hosting the 1987 Pan American Games
- Hosting the 1991 World Gymnastics Championships
- Hosting NCAA Final Fours and other college championship competitions and a wide array of national and world championships in the Olympic sports
- Securing rights to host the Big Ten Conference men's and women's basketball tournaments for five consecutive years beginning in 2008

Swarbrick's work has focused on the representation of owners of sports teams and organizations which sanction or conduct athletic competitions. He has served as general counsel for numerous national governing bodies of Olympic sports, including USA Gymnastics and USRowing, and as a consultant to the 1996 Olympic Games. He also served as president and chief executive officer of LMiV, an Internet-based network of radio stations.

- In his work as an advisor to the NCAA, Swarbrick has:
- Coordinated the men's College Basketball Partnership, an NCAA-led group that addresses the opportunities and challenges in the sport
- Worked with the NCAA's Corporate Partners and Champions Program
- Served as a member of the NCAA Division I women's Basketball Discussion Group
- Chaired the NCAA/USOC task force dedicated to developing proposals to expand sponsorship of Olympic sports among NCAA member institutions
- Developed the business plan for the new NBA/NCAA youth basketball enterprise
 Before accepting the offer to lead his alma mater's athletics department, Swarbrick
 had been a finalist for several high-profile positions in college athletics, including president of the NCAA and commissioner of the Big 12 Conference.

Swarbrick and his wife, Kimberly, are the parents of four children: Kate, a junior at St. Louis University; Connor, a sophomore at Wake Forest University; Cal, a junior in high school; and Christopher, a high school sophomore.



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EXCELLENCE





Notre Dame's Academic Services for Student-Athletes, housed in the Coleman-Morse Building, is designed to help Notre Dame fulfill its commitment to all student-athletes in their pursuit of a college degree and academic excellence.

In order to achieve these goals, Academic Services has several major objectives:

- 1. Maintain the academic integrity of the University
- 2. Help student-athletes maximize their academic potential

he University of Notre Dame ranks number one in the country in terms of graduating its student-athletes, according to statistics released recently by the NCAA.

- 3. Comply with University and NCAA rules and regulations
- 4. Assist every student-athlete as they work towards graduation in four years

Academic Services provides many services that begin when First Year students arrive on campus and continue through graduation. Services provided include but are not limited to:

- Consistent counseling and appropriate interventions regarding academic matters
- Refer student-athletes to campus offices where they can meet regularly with their professors and college advisors
- Monitoring the progress of student-athletes through regular communication with professors
- Provide tutorial assistance for the student-athletes

A new computer/study space was completed inside the Coleman-Morse Building for the start of the 2007-08 school year. This new 2,500 square-foot room can handle any combination of 80 student-athletes or tutors at once. There are also nine study rooms used for small group meetings or private sessions with tutors. The study space has approximately 20 desktop computers available for use and has wireless connections available for laptops.



Whether measured by the federal government in its Department of Education report or by the NCAA through its newer Graduation Success Rate (GSR) numbers, graduation rates for Notre Dame student-athletes rank among the national leaders in most categories among major football-playing colleges and universities.

FACILITIES







Eight years ago, the Notre Dame department of athletics and the University embarked on creating an ambitious athletics facility master plan so Irish student-athletes would have access to state-of-the-art venues for practice, training and competition.

That blueprint, which touched nearly every varsity sport, continues to come to life. By the time the plan in completed, the entire area just east of the Joyce Center and north of Edison Road will boast a comprehensive and impressive athletic quad.

NEW FACILITIES

ALUMNI SOCCER STADIUM

• The new \$5.7 million stadium had its groundbreaking April 26, 2008 and is expected to be completed in June 2009. The stadium will be a lighted facility that will feature a natural grass field, locker rooms, restrooms, concession areas and 2,000 seats.

Arlotta Family Lacrosse Stadium

 Groundbreaking for the \$5 million facility occurred April 17, 2008 and is expected to be completed in June 2009. Arlotta Stadium will feature 2,000 seats, lights, an artifical-turf field, locker rooms, restrooms and concession area.

Melissa Cook Stadium

• Located on the southeast corner of campus, the new softball stadium opened April 12, 2008 and can accommodate up to 1,500 fans.

TRACK STADIUM

 Ground was broken for construction of the \$3 million outdoor track in June 2008. The new nine-lane facility will meet IAAF guidelines and completion is expected in late October 2008.

LaBar Football Practice Fields

Three new practice fields adjacent to the Guglielmino Athletics Complex will be ready for the start of fall practice in August 2008. Two of the fields will be FieldTurf and the third will be natural grass.



RENOVATED FACILITIES

PURCELL PAVILION

 Home to the Irish men's and women's basketball teams as well as the volleyball squad, construction on the \$26.3 million Joyce Center Arena addition and renovation will begin in September 2008.

CHARLES W. "LEFTY" SMITH, JR. ICE RINK

 Tentative plans for a \$30 million facility will create a new home for the Irish hockey team within the Joyce Center fieldhouse. The project would increase capacity to 4,000 while improving locker rooms, concessions and restrooms.

PROSPECTIVE NEW FACILITIES

OUTDOOR TENNIS COMPLEX

 The \$4.9 million project will create a new outdoor playing and practice home with seating for 2,000 and will meet NCAA requirements to host national championships on the Notre Dame campus.

Rowing Boathouse

A new boathouse for the rowing team eventually will be constructed near the existing boathouse on the St. Joseph River.

early \$70 million of the Spirit of Notre Dame development campaign has been earmarked for strategic athletics facilities renovation and construction designs.













SPORTS MEDICINE

- Head athletic trainer and physical therapist Jim Russ oversees a staff of three associate and eight assistant athletic trainers, plus two physical therapist/athletic trainers, all of whom are certified and boast nearly 200 years of collective experience.
- Irish athletes have access to three state-of-the-art sports medicine facilities in the Joyce Center, Notre Dame Stadium and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex.
- The Guglielmino facility encompasses more than 8,500 squarefeet of cutting-edge sports medicine technology including the latest in physical therapy modalities and rehabilitation equipment, with two 3,500-gallon therapy pools, a full x-ray unit and an MRI machine.



STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

- Director of strength and conditioning Ruben Mendoza is in charge of a department that has eight full-time coaches, an intern and a nutritionist.
- The 25,000 square foot Haggar Fitness Complex is located between the Loftus Sports Center and Guglielmino Athletics Complex.
- The Haggar Fitness Complex features a three-lane development track, a 45x18 yard Prestige Turf plyometric agility area, a Gatorade hydration station, six giant plasma screen televisions and a state-of-the-art sound system with 28 speakers and four subwoofers.

DIRECTORS' CUP STANDINGS

For the 10th straight year in 2007-08, Notre Dame posted a top-25 finish (21st) in the United States Sports Academy Division I Directors' Cup all-sports competition sponsored by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (formerly known as Sears Directors' Cup).

Notre Dame is among 14 schools to earn a top-25 finish in each of the past 10 years (1999-2008), as Irish programs finished 25th in '99, 21st in 2000, 11th in '01, 13th in '02 and '03, 19th in '04, 16th in '05, sixth in '06, 22nd in '07 and 21st in '08.

Post-Graduate Scholarships

 Notre Dame has had 44 student-athletes receive a postgraduate scholarship from the NCAA since the program was founded in 1964. During the 2007-08 school year, John Carlson (football) and Brett Lilley (baseball) became the most recent recipients of the prestigious scholarship.

STUDENT WELFARE AND DEVELOPMENT

- The Student Welfare and Development Program implements events and activities that are designed to facilitate learning within five key areas: academic excellence, athletic success, career preparation, community involvement and personal development.
- The program has three components: elective services (community service, leadership, social events); complementary services (encourages administrators and coaches to request coordination of workshops, events and activities); and essential services (student-athletes participate in a series of required skill-building and developmental workshops and activities).
- The Student Welfare and Developmental Program, founded in 1996, continuously seeks to develop programs that educate student-athletes on current issues, so as to ensure that when they graduate from the University, they are prepared to successfully meet the challenges of life.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

- More than 92 percent of Notre Dame's student-athletes (from all 26 varsity teams) participated in community service activities during the 2007-08 school year.
- Irish student-athletes completed more than 5,000 hours of community service while assisting more than 50 non-profit organizations and schools.

SOUTH BEND

outh Bend and Mishawaka are the two largest cities in St. Joseph County and help boost the population of the area to 266,431.

- The College Football Hall of Fame is located in downtown South Bend.
- The Studebaker National Museum is located in South Bend and displays carriages of four U.S. Presidents, prototypes and industrial treasures.
- The community's version of "Willy Wonka" can be found at The South Bend Chocolate Company and Chocolate Museum.
- Adventurers can enjoy both rafting and kayaking on the East Race Waterway, the first artificial whitewater course in North America.
- During the summer, the South Bend Silver Hawks (the Class A minor league affiliate of the Arizona Diamondbacks) plays at Coveleski Stadium.
- On Friday's prior to an Irish home football game, downtown South Bend features a Football Friday Tent Party with live music, food and drink on the grounds of the College Football Hall of Fame.

• The Notre Dame Monogram Club is comprised of nearly 7,000 individuals who have earned the University's varsity athletic insignia for their




athletic or team-support endeavors or who have been honorary-monogram recipients.

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS - In the past 13 years, Notre Dame players have been voted CoSIDA Academic All-Americans more than any other Division I women's soccer team with 20 total selections (see p. 114). Jen Renola and Amy VanLaecke were secondteam selections in '95 and first-teamers in '96. Renola was named Academic All-American of the Year for the '96-'97 women's fall/winter atlarge team (covering eight sports). Jenny Streiffer was the only sophomore named to the first team in '97 and was second-team in '98. Vanessa Pruzinsky - who graduated with a 4.0 GPA as a chemical engineering major became the 14th ND sophomore in any sport to earn Academic All-America honors while joining Streiffer as two of only five Irish sophomores ever named first team (2000 senior Meotis Erikson was a third-team pick). Pruzinsky was the second Notre Dame studentathlete ever to be first team Academic All-America as a sophomore and junior ('01) while Monica Gonzalez (second team) joined Renola as the second Irish soccer player to couple All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season ('01). Pruzinsky in 2003 became the first D-I women's soccer player ever named first team Academic All-America three times (also Academic All-American of the Year), with second-teamers Erika Bohn and Mary Boland completing the first three D-I women's soccer teammates ever to be Academic All-Americans in the same year. Bohn then was a first-team honoree in 2004, with Annie Schefter named second team - and each was a first-teamer in their senior season (2005), giving Bohn the rare threeyear Academic All-America distinction while she and Schefter became just the third set of D-I women's soccer teammates ever to be first team Academic All-Americans in the same year. Most recently, 2008 graduate D/M Ashley Jones was a 2006 and 2007 first team Academic All-American. She was joined on the 2007 Academic All-America squad by current senior midfielder/forward Brittany Bock, a third-

team selection.

ALL-AMERICANS - Dating back to 1994, when Notre Dame reached its first NCAA championship game, the National Soccer Coaches Association of America has honored the Irish with 39 All-America selections (see pp. 121-125; only North Carolina has more in that 14-year span, with 41). Twelve Notre Dame players - including current senior forwards Kerri Hanks and Brittany Bock - have been first team All-Americans, led by three four-year All-Americans: midfielder Holly Manthei ('94-'97), defender Jen Grubb ('96-'99) and midfielder Anne Makinen ('97-'00). Notre Dame's 2005 team featured four All-Americans.

BIG CROWDS COAST-TO-COAST -Notre Dame has a tradition of drawing recordsetting crowds, including the largest in NCAA women's soccer history for the 1999 College Cup final (14,110), in San Jose, Calif. The Irish played in front of 14,006 two days earlier at Spartan Stadium, in the '99 semifinals. A Nebraska-record crowd of 3,702 watched the Irish and Huskers play to a four-overtime tie in the 1999 NCAA quarterfinals while a regularseason record 4,051 fans were in attendance when Notre Dame traveled to top-ranked Santa Clara earlier in 1999. A Maloney Field-record crowd of 2,629 saw Notre Dame play at topranked Stanford in the 2002 NCAA third round while the presence of the Irish for the 2005 NCAA quarterfinal at Portland produced a quick sellout (4,892), several days before the

CLASH (AND REMATCH) OF THE TITANS - Notre Dame and North Carolina are entrenched atop many statistical lists in the Division I women's soccer record book. The heavyweights met to decide the 2006 NCAA title, producing a matchup of teams tied for the top spot in the NSCAA coaches poll. That game also marked the first time that both teams have entered the NCAA final with 25-plus wins (ND 25-0-1; UNC 26-1-0). In 2007, the Irish and Tar Heels met once again in NCAA tournament play, as the Irish knocked out UNC in the third round, 3-2, at Fetzer Field.

CLASS ACTS - Notre Dame's class of 1998 - led by All-Americans Holly Manthei and Kate Sobrero - helped the Irish post a .921

COACHING EXCELLENCE - Notre Dame's Randy Waldrum - the first three-time BIG EAST women's soccer coach of the year (1999, 2000, and 2003, plus '04) - was a finalist for national coach-of-the-year honors in 2003, '04 and '06 after masterfully guiding the Irish to three of the most dominant seasons in the program's history. Waldrum's seven career regional coach-ofthe-year honors include three in the past five seasons, more than any other coach in the country (in either men's or women's Division I soccer).

Waldrum has taken three different Notre Dame teams to the NCAA title game ('99, '04, '06; also 2000 and 2007 semifinalists). Only six Division I women's soccer coaches have guided more teams to the NCAA semifinals while only two have taken more teams into the title game than Waldrum, who owns the fourth-best career win percentage in Division I women's soccer history (.772/292-79-20; third among active coaches). He has directed Notre Dame to the most wins (91-10-4; .886) of any women's soccer program over the past four seasons (2004-07). Waldrum's Notre Dame teams have combined to go 53-21-3 versus NSCAA top-25 opponents while producing 19 All-Americans and 14 Academic All-Americans.

Brazil

(summer 2004)

The Notre Dame women's soccer team's 2004 national title season was a four-month odyssey that saw the Irish go 30-1-2 overall – 25-1-1 in the college season, after a 5-0-1 mark on the preseason training trip in Campinas, Brazil

(featuring a 16-3 scoring edge versus top semi-pro teams from the Sao Paulo area). The games attracted many curious local spectators and included the traditional exchange of gifts and the taking of a group photo. The Irish enjoyed great camaraderie at the wonderful five-star Vitoria Hotel and soaked in the atmosphere at first-division Brazilian men's professional games held at Ponta Preta and Guarani. Meals included Brazil's many exotic and tasty forms of pizza and the unique Brazilian steakhouses that featured table-top carvings of a variety of entrees. Notre Dame also took a trip to Brazil prior to the 2000 season and went on to similar success when the 2000 NCAA schedule rolled around (23-1-1; NCAA semifinalist; ranked number one).











win percentage from 1994-97 (91-6-4), the best four-year record in the program's history. The 2006 seniors then compiled the most career wins (92-8-3) ever by a Notre Dame class, with their .908 career win pct. ranking second in the program's history. Two other classes have won more than 90 percent of their games, with the class of '97 winning 90.3% (87-8-3; '93-'96) and the class of '99 winning 90.1% (89-8-4; '95-'98). The current senior class enters the 2008 season with a 66-9-3 mark (.865) through three seasons of play.

CONFERENCE COMMAND – Notre Dame owns a 131-7-4 (.937) all-time record in 17 years of regular-season conference games ('91-'94 in Midwestern Collegiate Conference, since '95 in BIG EAST), plus 34-2-1 (.932) in all conference tournaments. The Irish are 112-8-4 (.919) in all BIG EAST regular-season games (29-2-1 in BIG EAST Tournament), including

cross-divisional and four versus UConn (2-1-1; '00-'03) that were not part of the league schedule. Prior to a 2000 tie with UConn (0-0), the Irish won 26 straight versus BIG EAST foes while a 2-1 loss at Rutgers in 2001 ended a 34game unbeaten streak against the BIG EAST. Since joining the league, the Irish are 148-11-5 (.918) in all games versus BIG EAST teams, including three NCAA games vs. UConn (2-0 win in '95 NCAA quarterfinals, 2-1 loss in '97 NCAA semifinals, 2-0 win in '04 third round). Notre Dame's 150 games against BIG EAST teams since '95 include a 635-75 scoring edge. Notre Dame enters 2008 riding a 13-year, 79game home unbeaten streak (78-0-1) versus BIG EAST teams, plus an active 38-game overall unbeaten streak against BIG EAST opposition (36-0-2).

COVER GIRL – Former Notre Dame All-American **Kate Sobrero** has won NCAA and World Cup titles, each time appearing on a national magazine cover. *Soccer America* featured Sobrero on a 1995 cover after she was named the

College Cup's defensive MVP, as the Irish shut out top-ranked North Carolina and undefeated Portland to win the title. After playing a key role as a starting defender on the U.S. team that won the 1999 World Cup, Sobrero (lower right) was part of a celebration photo on the cover of *Time*. Sobrero – who now goes by her married name Markgraf – returned to the spotlight in 2004, combining with former Notre Dame midfielder **Shannon Boxx**

as top starters for the Olympic gold-medal team. More recently, both started for the the U.S. at the '07 World Cup (third place) and '08 Olympics (TBD).

DYNAMIC DUOS - Current seniors Kerri Hanks (186 pts; 64G-58A, 17 GWG) and **Brittany Bock** (100 pts; 40G-20A, 13 GWG) already have combined for 104 goals, 78 assists, 286 points and 30 GWGs. The duo's 104 combined goals rank fifth all-time at ND. A pair of 2003 seniors - forwards Amanda Guertin (48) and Amy Warner (37) - combined for 85 career goals, the sixth-highest goalscoring classmates in Notre Dame history. Tops on that list are the 150 by 1999 seniors Jenny Heft (80) and Jenny Streiffer (70), followed by 124 from 2000 seniors Anne Makinen (65) and Meotis Erikson (59) and the 114 by 1996 seniors Michelle McCarthy (59) and Rosella Guerrero (55). Other top tandems have included 112 goals by 1998 seniors Monica Gerardo (73) and Shannon Boxx (39) and 95 from 1996 seniors Cindy Daws (61) and Amy VanLaecke (34). Heft (19) and Streiffer (15) combined for 34 game-winning goals to tie the Notre Dame classmates record set by McCarthy (18) and Guerrero (16), followed by Hanks and Bock with 30 and two others pairs with 29 GWGs: Makinen (16) and Erikson (13), and Guertin (18) and Warner (11).

FANTASTIC FOUR – Notre Dame featured one of the nation's top forward rotations in 2003, producing four double-digit goalscorers for the first time since 1999: seniors **Amy Warner** (10G-12A) and **Amanda Guertin** (11G-6A), junior **Mary Boland** (12G-4A) and sophomore **Katie Thorlakson** (10G-11A). The 2005 team

matched that feat as Thorlakson (18), freshmen Kerri Hanks (28) and Brittany Bock (12), and sophomore Amanda Cinalli (10) each had 10-plus. Notre Dame again was the nation's first team with four double-digit goalscorers in 2006: Hanks (22), freshman Michele Weissenhofer (18), Bock (12) and Cinalli (11). All but four of the past 18 Irish teams have featured three or more double-digit scorers (four in '94, '98, '99, '03, '05 and '06; six in '93, '96; seven in '97). Double-digit scorers in 1997 included: Anne Makinen (23), Meotis Erikson (22), Jenny Streiffer (20), Jenny Heft (20), Shannon Boxx (13), Monica Gerardo (10) and Monica Gonzalez (10).

FAR & WIDE – Notre Dame's 2008 roster includes players from 13 states while the program's all-time roster canvasses 32 states and three foreign countries.

50-50 PROPOSITION - Current senior forward Kerri Hanks became the 19th Division I women's soccer player to reach the 50-goals, 50assists plateau - joining former ND greats Jenny Streiffer (70G-71A, '96-'99), Cindy Daws (61G-67A, '93-'96), Katie Thorlakson (55G-73A; '02-'05) and Anne Makinen (65G-56A, '97-00). Hanks is the third to do so in only her third year of play. Hanks is just two assists shy of joing the 60-60 club, while Makinen ended four assists shy of becoming a 60-60 player - a group that includes Streiffer, Daws, Carin Jennings (102G-60A; UC Santa Barbara, '83-'86), Mia Hamm (103G-72A; UNC, '89-'93) and Mandy Clemens (67G-65A; Santa Clara, '96-'99). Streiffer and Hamm are the only members of the 70-70 club.

FIRST-TIME VISI-TORS - Since 1993, Notre Dame opponents making their first visit to Alumni Field have lost to the Irish 46 times, with only four wins for the opposition and one tie (46-4-1; .912). Notre Dame's record in all series openers - regardless of site is 82-26-2 (.750), including 49-6-0 since 1993 and 29-3-0 in the Randy Waldrum era (since '99). The Irish are 55-9-0 in all series openers



played at home (30-4-0 since '93). In the third round of the 2001 NCAAs, Harvard became the 14th straight team to drop a series opener to Notre Dame, with Penn State, Hartford and Eastern Illinois (NCAAs) losing series openers versus the Irish in '01, followed by Virginia Tech in 2002, five others (Arizona State, Indiana State, North Texas, Oklahoma and Western Kentucky) in 2003, Baylor and Texas Tech in 2004, six teams in 2005 (New Hampshire, Vermont, Florida, Gonzaga, DePaul, South Florida), five more in 2006 (Iowa State, USC, Oakland, Colorado, Florida State) and two in 2007 (Princeton and Illinois). The Irish are 9-1-0 in series openers in the NCAAs. Loyola Marymount makes its first trip to Alumni Field (and faces ND for the first time) in 2008.

FLIP-THROW – Current junior forward **Michele Weissenhofer** has brought a unique weapon to Notre Dame's offensive attack, as her "flip" throw-in style turns a typically boring part of the game into a fan-favorite activity. The spunky Weissenhofer – whose flip-throws typically feature keen accuracy and far-post, 40-yard distance – was a youth gymnast/soccer player who began practicing the flip-throw at the age of six, after watching a friend of her mother performing the throw.

4.O FOCUS Defender Vanessa Pruzinsky (pictured) dubbed by Irish head coach Randy Waldrum as his most focused and "on-task" player in 25 years of coaching became the third Notre Dame chemical engineering major ever to graduate with a 4.0 cumulative grade-point average (the previous two did so in '63 and '74). Pruzinsky also was the first female student ever to earn an "A" in the introduction to chemical engineering course.

Academic All-America forward **Mary Boland** concluded her studies at Notre Dame with her



third 4.0 semester in the spring of 2005 (yielding a 3.90 cumulative GPA, as a psychology major) while two freshmen on the '04 NCAA championship team – **Ashley Jones** (fall) and **Jannica Tjeder** (spring) – each posted 4.0 semesters in the 2004-05 academic year. It was only the beginning for Jones, who went on to log five more 4.0 semesters (including her entire junior and senior years) on the way to earning her bachelor's degree in accounting. The Westlake Village, Calif., native graduated from Notre Dame with a stellar 3.981 cumulative GPA that was comprised of a staggering 36 "A" grades and a pair of A-minuses.

FOUR-TIME ALL-AMERICANS, PART I -In 25 seasons, only 22 Division I women's soccer players have been named to the NSCAA All-America team four times, with Notre Dame players comprising three of the past 10. Notre Dame, UNC and Portland are the only programs to produce multiple players who have been fouryear NSCAA All-Americans. The Irish players include midfielder Holly Manthei ('94-'97), defender Jen Grubb ('96-'99) and midfielder Anne Makinen ('98-'01), with current senior forward Kerri Hanks ('05-'07) poised to join that crew this season. Meanwhile, UNC's are April Heinrichs ('83-'86), Kristine Lilly ('89-'92), Tisha Venturini ('91-'94) and Cindy Parlow ('95-'98), and Portland's include Shannon MacMillian ('92-'95), Christine Sinclair ('01; '03-'05) and Lindsey Huie ('02-'05).

The first four-time All-Americans included California's Leslie Gallimore ('82-'85), Heinrichs,



UCSB's Carin Jennings and George Mason's Lisa Gmitter (all '83-'86). Others from the 1980s were Betsy Ready (Boston College) and Kristen Bowsher of UMass (both '84-'87), Colorado College's Janine Szpara ('85-'88) and Linda Hamilton ('87-'90; N.C. State/UNC).

Six were four-time All-Americans in the 1990s: Manthei, Grubb, Venturini, Parlow, MacMillan, and William & Mary's Natalie Neaton ('92-'95). Santa Clara's Danielle Slaton and UConn/UCLA player Mary-Frances Monroe joined the list in '01, followed by Penn State's Christie Welsh in '02 and BYU's Aleisha Cramer-Rose in '03. Manthei, Makinen, Venturini, Monroe and Huie are the only midfielders while Grubb is one of five full-time defenders on the list. Heinrichs, Jennings, Venturini, Parlow and Makinen are the only four-year All-Americans who also are in the 50-goal/50-assist club, although Hanks (64G-58A) could add her name to that list in 2008.

FOUR-TIME ALL-AMERICANS, PART II -Anne Makinen in 2000 became the 16th Notre Dame student-athlete (now 26) to earn All-America honors in four years (for the same sport/event). Recent additions to that group include baseball pitcher Aaron Heilman ('01), distance runner Ryan Shay ('02) and men's fencers Ozren Debic and Jan Viviani ('03), plus men's fencer Michal Sobieraj and women's fencers Alicja Kryczalo and Andrea Ament (all in '04), and then three in 2007 (fencers Patrick Ghattas and Valerie Providenza and distance runner Molly Huddle). Makinen and Heilman are two of just five to do so in a team-oriented sport, as are soccer players Holly Manthei ('98) and Jen Grubb ('00) and basketball player Kevin O'Shea ('50). Others include cross country's Oliver Hunter ('43) and Mike McWilliams ('93), men's fencers Mike Sullivan ('79), Charles Higgs-Coulthard ('87), Yehuda Kovacs ('89), Leszek Nowosielski ('91), Jeremy Siek ('97) and Luke LaValle ('99), and women's fencers Molly Sullivan ('88), Myriah Brown ('99), Sarah Walsh ('99) and Magda Krol ('00).

FRESHMAN FIRSTS – Current senior forward Kerri Hanks had a record-setting debut season in 2005 that included tying the Notre Dame record for goals in a season (28, 4th-most ever by a Division I freshman). She was Notre Dame's first freshman since 1999 to be named an NSCAA All-American and was the first freshman since 1997 (from any school) to be in the final group of candidates (15, in 2005) for the Hermann/M.A.C. player-of-the-year awards.

FRONTRUNNERS – Prior to Michigan's goal in the final regular-season game of 2003, Notre Dame had not faced a deficit for nearly two months and 16-plus games (longest in ND history). The only previous time the 2003 team had trailed came in the third game, for 7:18 versus ASU (3-1 win). Notre Dame ended up trailing for less than one percent of the minutes in 2003 (187) while only two teams came back to tie the Irish that season. The 2006 NCAA runner-up team matched the 2003 team's record by playing 16 consecutive games without a deficit.



Anne Makinen is one of five all-time D-I players with 50-plus goals, 50-plus assists and four All-America seasons.

The Irish trailed early against West Virginia (Sept. 29, 2006) before nine straight weeks without a deficit ended in the title-game loss to UNC. Prior to 2003, the program's record streak for not facing a deficit was 14 games in 1997 (Sept. 21-Nov. 16). The top-ranked 2000 squad did not face a deficit for the first 13 games (BC then led for 28 minutes, in a 3-1 ND win). The 2000 team added six more games without trailing before falling behind UNC late in the NCAA semifinals (2-1 loss). The 2004 national champs also rarely trailed (in just four of 27 games) while the 2005 team trailed for a total of only 153 minutes.

GERTY'S GOALS – Former Notre Dame forward Amanda Guertin's 10-game goalscoring streak in 2001 ranked third-longest in D-I women's soccer history (now 6th), behind former U.S. National Team member Brandi Chastain (15, with Santa Clara in 1990) and former Hartford player Maria Kun (11, in '97). Guertin scored 10 of Notre Dame's final 16 goals in 2001 and had points in 15 of the final 17 games. She also scored in 2002 NCAA wins over Ohio State and Purdue, yielding an ND-record seven-game postseason goal streak – and her four career overtime goals (one each season) doubled the previous Irish record. Her 12 career postseason goals are seventh in the ND record book.

GOALS-A-PLENTY – The Irish scored in 55 consecutive games from Aug. 29, 1997, to Sept. 17, 1999, before a 1-0 loss to SMU (All-American Anne Makinen did not play due to commitments with Finland's national team). Notre Dame scored in 98 of 101 games in Makinen's career and injuries limited her play in the other shutout losses (2-0 vs. UNC in '99 NCAA final, 0-0 tie at UConn in 2000). Notre Dame's previous record was a 36-game scoring

Memorable Moments

The Notre Dame women's soccer team closed out the 1990s with the second-most wins in the country (196), capping a decade that saw the Irish rise from regional obscurity to NCAA champions. Here's a look at top moments from the 1990s – and beyond:

Oct. 28, 1990: Notre Dame posts the program's first win over a ranked opponent (4-0 vs. 24th-ranked Xavier).

Oct. 15, 1991: At 10-0-2, the Irish earn their first national ranking (16th).

Nov. 13, 1993: After a rise to third in the polls, Notre Dame makes its first NCAA Tournament appearance (a first-round loss).

Oct. 2, 1994: The Irish end UNC's NCAA-record 92-game win streak (0-0, in St. Louis).

Oct. 24, 1994: At 15-0-1, Notre Dame is voted number one for the first time and ends the regular season top-ranked.

Nov. 5, 1995: Amy VanLaecke scores to give the Irish the BIG EAST Conference title in their first year in the league, avenging a rare home loss to UConn in the regular season.

Dec. 1, 1995: The Irish blank nine-time defending champ and host UNC in the NCAA semi's (1-0) to reach their second NCAA final.

Dec. 3, 1995: Notre Dame wins the NCAA title by shutting out undefeated Portland, 1-0 in triple overtime on a Cindy Daws free kick.

Oct. 4, 1996: Freshman Jenny Streiffer scores twice in a 2-1 overtime victory as Notre Dame becomes the first team ever to defeat UNC in consecutive meetings.

Dec. 6, 1996: Three goals early in the second half produce a 3-2 comeback win over Portland, securing a third trip to the finals.

Nov. 9, 1997: Freshman Anne Makinen's hat trick versus Connecticut (6-1) gives the Irish their third straight BIG EAST title.

Nov. 8, 1998: Makinen again burns UConn in the BIG EAST final (82nd-minute goal; 1-0).

Nov. 19, 1999: Mia Sarkesian's third goal of the season, in the 81st minute, beats Stanford in the NCAA third round (1-0).

Nov. 28, 1999: Four OTs are not enough as the ND-Nebraska goes to PKs, with Kelly Lindsey's conversion (6th round) and LaKeysia Beene's save ending the marathon.

Dec. 3, 1999: The team's final win of the decade comes at the NCAA semifinals in San Jose, 1-0 over top-ranked and unbeaten Santa Clara (75th-minute goal by Ali Lovelace).

run from Oct. 19, 1995-Dec. 6, 1996 (ended in 1-0 OT loss to UNC in title game). Stretching from '92-'04, the Irish scored in 94.9% of their games (297 of 313). Since '94, the Irish have scored in 332 of 347 (.957; three title-game shutouts) – with goals in 245 of 255 regular-season games (.961) in that 13-year stretch. Notre Dame saw its 31-game scoring streak (then third-best in Irish history) end in 2002 while the second-longest scoring streak (50 games) ended in 2006.

GREAT GRADES - Notre Dame women's soccer consistently has performed at a high level on the field and in the classroom. That certainly was the case in 2004-05, with a 25-1-1 record and national title followed by a 3.38 team GPA in the 2004 fall semester and a 3.35 in the spring of 2005 (second-best among all ND varsity teams). More on-field success (22-3-0) and top semester GPAs (3.36 in '05 fall; 3.42 in '06 spring) followed in 2005-06. The Irish then turned in another 25-1-1 season in 2006 and returned to the title game, followed by a 3.20 team GPA in the 2006 fall term and a 3.30 in the '07 spring. The women's soccer players ended the 2007 spring term with a 3.32 cumulative team GPA (fourth-best of any ND team), and kept that pace in the '07-08 academic year with a 3.32 mark in the fall and a 3.34 GPA in the spring, with a 19-5-2 record on the field.

HERMANN TROPHY – Notre Dame is one of two schools to produce three-plus different recipients of the prestigious Hermann Trophy, presented to the national player of the year and now known as the Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Award. Midfielders Cindy Daws (1996) and Anne Makinen (2000) were the first Irish players to receive the Hermann (each also was awarded the former M.A.C. Award) while current senior forward Kerri Hanks in 2006 became the first sophomore (in men's or women's soccer) to receive the Hermann.

HOME SWEET HOME – The Irish enter their 19th season at Alumni Field in 2008 with a 204-16-4 (.920) record at the facility (164-12-4 in last 180) – highlighted by an active streak of 79 straight home games without a loss versus BIG EAST opposition (78-0-1). In 2007, Alumni Field drew the nation's fourth-highest average

attendance for the second consecutive year (1,938), highlighted by a season-opening crowd of 3,264 vs. Michigan and a record-setting crowd of 3,412 for an exhibition tie vs. North Carolina. Notre Dame previously compiled a 29-game home winning streak (6th NCAA history) from 1999-2001 and a 28-game home win streak from '92-'95, with both of those marks also representing the top home unbeaten streaks until Notre Dame's most recent unbeaten streak came to an end at 35 games (34-0-1) in 2007. Ten of the past 12 home losses have been by a single goal. Notre Dame's all-time record at Alumni Field versus teams not ranked in the NSCAA top 25 is 141-4-2 (64-12-1 vs. ranked teams), with 78 straight home wins over unranked teams from 1990-2001, before a 2-2 game with Wisconsin. The Irish played at Moose Krause Stadium from 1988-89.

LAST-MINUTE HEROES – The first 16 Notre Dame women's soccer seasons saw the Irish win in the final minute just twice - but it happened twice more in the 2004 national-title season (both at the end of regulation), as Jen Buczkowski scored with 0:44 left at Georgetown (2-1) and Jill Krivacek headed in a Katie Thorlakson corner kick to beat Wisconsin with 0:53 left in that NCAA secondround matchup (1-0). It had been 10 years since an Irish player won a game in the final minute, by Michelle McCarthy with 0:25 left in overtime (119:35) of a 4-3 comeback versus William & Mary (9/11/95). The only other to score a final-minute GWG was future All-American Ragen Coyne (89:24; vs. Wright State in '92).

MAGIC NUMBERS – Scoring three goals has been virtually an automatic win in Notre Dame women's soccer history, with a 262-3-1 record (.987) in those games (164-1-0 since Oct. 6, 1995). Notre Dame also is 357-9-15 (.957) when holding the opponent to 0-1 goals.

Most impressively, Notre Dame is 285-0-1 alltime when claiming a 2-0 lead and is unbeaten in its past 262 when going ahead 2-0 (dating back to a 3-3 tie with Vanderbilt on Sept. 15, 1991). The past 175 opponents to face a 2-0 deficit versus the Irish have failed to even force a tie, something achieved by just two opponents in Notre Dame history: Connecticut in the 1995

NCAA CHAMPIONS – The shootout victory over UCLA in the 2004 championship game made Notre Dame the second Division I women's soccer program ever to win multiple NCAA titles, with the Irish previously winning the title in 1995. Notre Dame also ranks second in all-time NCAA championship game appearances (6) while the program's nine trips to the College Cup semifinals (all from 1994-2006) trail only

UNC and Santa Clara (UNC is the only team with more College Cup semifinal trips since 1994).

Despite not making its first NCAA

Despite not making its first NCAA Tournament appearance until 1993, Notre Dame now ranks ninth in all-time NCAA trips (14) and is among a short list of four teams that have appeared in every NCAA

NATIONAL TEAMS - Three former Notre Dame players - defender Kate Sobrero, defensive midfielder Shannon Boxx and goalkeeper LaKeysia Beene - have been starters with the U.S. National Team in the current decade, with Sobrero and Boxx starting at the 2003 and 2007 World Cups as well as the 2004 and 2008 Olympics (see pp. 102-104). Six current Irish players - plus eight departed seniors from the 2004-06 teams - have been active with various national-team programs. Versatile player Candace Chapman (2001-05) and forward Katie Thorlakson ('06 grad.) were teammates on Canada's U-19 National Team and now are regulars with Canada's full national team. Midfielder Jen Buczkowski ('07) and goalkeeper Erika Bohn ('06) were members of the U.S. U-21 National Team that won the 2005 Nordic Cup while Buczkowski previously played with the Under-19s, as did current senior forward Kerri Hanks (now with U-23s), senior forward Brittany Bock and former midfielder Annie Schefter ('06). Bock also competed with the U.S. at the U-20 World Championship in Russia, alongside her classmate and central defender Carrie Dew (both were in the U-21 player pool). Senior midfielder Rebecca Mendoza is a member of Mexico's national team while former ND defender Monica Gonzalez was a founding member of Mexico's women's national team and captained its historic quarterfinal finish at the 2004 Olympics (former ND forward Monica Gerardo also was a founding member of the Mexican team). Three seniors from the 2004 NCAA champs - defenders Melissa Tancredi (Canada) and Gudrun Gunnarsdottir (Iceland) and forward Mary Boland (U.S. U-19s) - also have earned national-team duty, as did 2007 graduate Amanda Cinalli (U-21s; '06 and '07 Nordic Cup) and junior Michele Weissenhofer (U-20s/21s; '07 Nordic Cup

Sept. 16-17, 2000: Meotis Erikson opens the scoring vs. Washington (5-0) and host Portland (1-0), as ND rises to number one.

Nov. 24, 2000: Erikson's OT goal vs. Santa Clara sends ND back to the College Cup semi's.

Sept. 25, 2001: Mia Sarkesian completes an early four-player, free-kick combination as 4thranked Irish edge #3 Nebraska (1-0).

Sept. 15, 2002: The rally at #25 Maryland includes five ND goals in 25 minutes, after a 2-0 deficit (5-2). Candace Chapman's shift to the midfield sparks the comeback, as does Melissa Tancredi's pair of header goals.

Sept. 21, 2003: Katie Thorlakson and Mary Boland assist on each other's goals to help the Irish hand Santa Clara its first-ever loss at the SCU Classic (2-1).

Nov. 2, 2003: Amanda Guertin's goal beats Miami in the BIG EAST quarterfinals, as the Irish stay unbeaten in 16 straight OT games.

Sept. 5, 2004: Katie Thorlakson (3G-2A) factors into all of the goals in a 5-2 win over 4thranked Santa Clara.

Nov. 26, 2004: Amanda Cinalli (2G) and Thorlakson (1G-2A) pace the NCAA quarterfinal win over #6 Portland, sending the Irish to their seventh College Cup final weekend.

Dec. 3, 2004: Candace Chapman completes a memorable extended give-and-go with Thorlakson, as the Irish outlast Santa Clara (1-0) in the NCAA semifinals.

Dec. 5, 2004: Erika Bohn makes a PK save late in regulation and adds two saves in the shootout, as the Irish edge UCLA for the NCAA title (1-1; 4-3 in six penalty kicks).

Nov. 6, 2005: ND claims its eighth BIG EAST Tournament title with a 5-0 win over #15 Connecticut, one of the program's most convincing wins ever versus a top-15 foe.

Sept. 3, 2006: Amanda Cinalli (2G-1A) earns national player-of-the-week honors after leading the 3-1 comeback win over Santa Clara (ND and SCU were #1 in different polls).

Sept. 29, 2006: The Irish complete another 3-1 comeback (vs. #6 West Virginia), in front of a spirited crowd of 3,056.

Nov. 5, 2006: Two quick Kerri Hanks' goals help top Rutgers for the BIG EAST title (4-2).

Dec. 1, 2006: Michele Weissenhofer's hat trick and three assists from Hanks power Notre Dame past 8th-ranked Penn State (4-0) and on to the College Cup semifinals for the eighth

Dec. 3, 2006: Courtney Rosen and Jill Krivacek are the unlikely goalscorers as the Irish use a 2-1 win over #5 Florida State to advance to their sixth NCAA title game.

Pre-Season Notes

BIG EAST Conference title game (Irish led 2-0, later tied 2-2 and 3-3, ND won 4-3) and Duke late in 1993 (3-2 ND win, in Houston).

The program's 20-year history includes just 356 goals allowed in 471 games (0.76 GA per game), with the Irish holding the opponent to 0-1 goals in 82 percent of those all-time games (384) while allowing three-plus goals only 37 times (8%; 4-32-1). Notre Dame has surrendered four-plus goals just 14 times in the program's history (only five times since 1995).

MEDIA GUIDE AWARDS – The Notre Dame women's soccer media guide consistently has ranked among the best in the nation, as judged by the College Sports Information Directors of America. Most recently, the 2002 and 2003 guides both were rated second in the nation by CoSIDA judges while the 2006 media guide finish third in the ratings.

MILESTONES – The most recent milestone in Notre Dame women's soccer history came on Sept. 15, 2006, when Lizzie Reed scored the 1,500th goal:

NUMBER-ONE NOTES – Notre Dame has been ranked number one in the NSCAA coaches poll during six of the past 14 seasons: the final two months in 1994; the final month in '96; the final 11 weeks of 2000; six weeks in 2004; the first three weeks in '05; and 11 weeks in 2006. Notre Dame was the only team in the NSCAA top spot every season from 2004-06. The Irish own a 74-6-3 all-time record (50-2-3 in regular season) as the top-ranked team.

NUMBER-ONE SIGN RETURNS – A new look was brought to the night sky on the northeast corner of the Notre Dame campus on Oct. 12, 2000 – and again early in the 2004 season, plus during most of 2006 – as the traditional, lighted numeral one was placed atop Grace Hall, in honor of the women's soccer team's ascension to the number-one ranking (an unprecedented four ND teams were top-ranked in 2000–01, including women's basketball, men's fencing and baseball). The eight-foot sign had not appeared since the Irish won the 1995 NCAA women's soccer NCAA championship. The sign, built by Fr. Bob Malone and a group

of seminarians, originally went up at Moreau Seminary (at the north end of St. Joseph's Lake) in 1974, following Notre Dame's 1973 national championship football season. It later moved to Howard Hall before shifting to the roof of Grace Hall. The sign was displayed at the end of the 1988 national-title football season and returned in parts of the 1989, '90 and '93 football campaigns (and again from 2002-06, for the Irish fencing teams).

OSCARS SWEEP - The women's soccer team in 2006-07 became the first varsity program ever to produce recipients of Notre Dame's Byron Kanaley, Francis Patrick O'Connor and Chris Zorich awards in the same year. Kim Lorenzen was one of five seniors to receive the Kanaley (given to exemplary student-athlete leaders) while Amanda Cinalli was the female recipient of the O'Connor (recognizing team spirit/inspiration) and Claire Gallerano received the Zorich (for community service). The women's soccer team also received the Trophy Award (presented to a varsity team for its community service excellence). Three years earlier, women's soccer had became the first varsity program to produce recipients of all three honors (at any time), with the totals now including six Kanaley recipients, two O'Connor honorees and two who have received the Zorich Award (see p. 116).

POLL POSITION – Heading into the 2002 season, the Notre Dame women's soccer team had been ranked in the top seven of every NSCAA poll since Sept. 14, 1993 (ultimately 98 straight polls). The Irish now have been ranked 1st-3rd in 99 of 163 polls spanning the previous 14 seasons and have been among the top five in 124 of the past 163 polls.

Notre Dame's spots in the past 163 NSCAA polls include: 35 weeks at #1; 46 at #2; 18 at #3; and 13 at #4 – with the Irish cracking the top two spots in 13 of the past 18 seasons (in the top three spots during 13 of the past 14 years). Notre Dame earned the NSCAA preseason numberone ranking for the first time in 2005, after being second in five previous preseason polls (1995–98 and 2000; see chart below).

PRIMETIME PLAYERS – Notre Dame won nearly 80 percent of its "big games" in the first nine seasons of the **Randy Waldrum** era (1999-2007), posting a 74-22-4 record when facing an NSCAA top-25 or postseason opponent.

REGULAR-SEASON STREAK – Sparked by its 4-2 loss at top-ranked Santa Clara on Oct. 17, 1999, Notre Dame won 20 consecutive regular-season games (its final four in '99 and first 16 of 2000, followed by a 0-0 tie at UConn). That streak included a 78-10 scoring edge and bested the team record of 18 straight regularseason wins (Oct. 19, 1995-Oct. 11, 1996). Notre Dame pushed its regular-season unbeaten streak to 31 (29-0-2) in 2002 before a 2-1 loss at Rutgers, one shy of the team-record for regularseason unbeaten streak (30-0-2; 10/17/93-10/1/95). The Irish also logged 27 regular-season games without a loss (26-0-1) from 10/20/96-9/11/98 and pieced together another run of 27 regular-season games without a loss (25-0-2) from 2006-07.

SCORELESS TIES A RARITY – The Irish opened the 2007 season with a 0-0 tie with Michigan, marking the program's seventh 0-0 tie. Other 0-0 ties include a pair versus UConn, one on Oct. 21, 2000 (and a similar game in Storrs on Oct. 13, 2006), a 2003 game with Stanford (at SCU) and a 2004 game versus Rutgers are Notre Dame's only scoreless ties since 1994, with others against Dayton in 1991 and North Carolina in '94, in St. Louis (ending UNC's NCAA-record 92-game win streak).

70-70 (DYNAMIC DUO) – Notre Dame's Kerri Hanks (28G-15A) and Katie Thorlakson (18G-35A) both totaled 71 points in 2005, the second time in Division I women's soccer history that teammates have topped 70 points in the same season. SMU's 1995 duo of Danielle Garrett Fotopoulos (32G-19A, 83 pts) and Courtney Linex (31G-15A, 77 pts) are the only other pair with the 70-70 distinction. Hanks was part of another dynamic duo in 2006, as she and freshman **Michele Weissenhofer** (53 points; 18G-17A) turned in a rare 1-2 teammate finish atop the NCAA scoring list (Hanks had 66 points, on 22G-22A).



SEVEN STRAIGHT TITLES – Notre Dame's streak of seven straight BIG EAST women's soccer titles from 1995-2001 rates sixthlongest ever in a BIG EAST sport and second among nine "team-based" sports, behind UConn women's basketball (9; '94-'02) and matching Pittsburgh's volleyball streak from 1988-94. Pittsburgh won 10 straight in men's swimming and diving ('83-'92; also eight from '97-'04) and nine straight in women's swimming and diving ('83-'91) while Boston College won eight men's tennis titles from '81-'88. Notre Dame women's swimming and diving owns 12 straight BIG EAST titles ('97-'08).

SHUTOUT CITY – Notre Dame's 10-game shutout streak in 2003 (956 minutes) ranks fifth in NCAA history and blew away the Irish record (726, in '95). The only teams in Division I women's soccer history to post more consecutive shutouts are the 1998 Santa Clara team (16), two North Carolina squads (13 in '89, 12 in '87) and the 1984 N.C. State team (12). Notre Dame set a team record with a nation-leading 19 shutouts in 2006 (7th-most in NCAA history).

SISTER ACT – Forward Kelly Tulisiak ('02) and defender Kate Tulisiak ('05) were the first set of sisters to play for Notre Dame women's soccer and the 19th set of sisters to monogram in the same Notre Dame sport. There now have been 31 letter-winning (same-sport)

sister combinations at Notre Dame from 11 sports, also: tennis (7), swimming and diving (5), fencing (4), golf (3), lacrosse (3), basketball (2), volleyball (2), softball (2), field hockey and cross country.

STRONG STARTERS – Notre Dame's 2000 start (16-0-0) bested the Irish record for season-opening win streak (13-0-0, '96; the 2006 team went 14-0-0 before a tie). The 1996 team had a 66-6 scoring edge and five wins over ranked teams in the first 13 games, before losing 3-1 at Santa Clara. During its 16-0-0 start, the 2000 Irish beat four ranked teams (56-5 scoring edge). The 2006 team went deeper into its season without a loss (25-0-1) than any previous Notre Dame squad (the 1994, 1997 and 2000 teams all were 23-0-1 before losing while the '04 team opened 19-0-1 and the '03 team 18-0-1).

THREE-YEAR TEAR— Notre Dame's 2003 (20-3-1) and '04 (25-1-1) teams combined for a 45-4-2 record and .902 two-year win pct. that was fourth-best in ND history (surpassed by the .914 combined pct., 47-4-1, in 2004 and '05, with the same combined pct. for 2005 and '06). The program's best two-year record is 47-3-1 (.932, in 1996 and '97) – but the 2004-06 Irish squads combined for the top three-year tear in the program's history (.924; 72-5-2). Notre Dame's previous high-water mark for combined record over a three-year span was 68-5-3 (.915), from 1994-96 and also 1995-97.

UNBEATEN SEASONS – Notre Dame's quest for undefeated seasons in 2000, '04 and '06 had the Irish gunning for a rare feat. Only three of the past 14 NCAA champs – UNC in '97 (27-0-1) and '04 (27-0-0), Portland in '05 (23-0-1) – have claimed the title without a loss. Notre Dame has posted five undefeated regular seasons – 17-0-1 in 1994 (NCAA runner-up), 2000 (semifinalist), '04 (champion) and '06 (runner-up), plus 18-0-1 in '97 (semifinalist) – and earned the top NCAA seed in '94 and 2000.

VERSUS NO. 1 – Notre Dame has played the nation's number-one team 12 times and lost that matchup only seven times. The Irish are 3-7-2 against NCAA top-ranked teams, with eight of those games coming versus North Carolina.

Notre Dame's 2004 NCAA title team was honored at a White House ceremony on May 13, 2005 (see pp. 100-101). Senior captain **Mary**

WINNING TRADITIONS – Several recent Notre Dame players have led their clubs and state Olympic Development teams to elite status before (and after) becoming part of another winning tradition with the Irish women's soccer program. Five members of the 2006 senior class helped their teams post top national finishes in 2003. Jen Buczkowski, Jill Krivacek and Kim Lorenzen – plus current senior Brittany Bock (who earned the tournament's Golden Boot Award) – were members of the Illinois ODP squad that won the 2003 ODP national title (besting future ND classmate Lizzie Reed and her N.J. squad in the title game) while Claire Gallerano (and current senior Kerri Hanks) helped the Dallas Texans win the 2003 U.S. Youth Soccer (USYS) u-18 national title. Christie Shaner's Bucks Challenge squad also advanced to the four-team nationals in 2003 but narrowly missed the u-19 final. The 2007 seniors lived up to the standard of their predecessors. Ashley Jones completed the rare double of winning 2004 national titles with both her Cal-South ODP team (she and current senior Carrie Dew were captains of that team) and with her So-Cal United club while goalkeeper Lauren Karas earned the Golden Glove Award with North Texas at the 2004 ODP nationals (her team lost to Jones, Dew and Cal-South, 1-0). Another class of '07 grad, Susan Pinnick, led the Carmel Commotion to a '03 national runner-up finish (u-17s). Among current seniors, Dew played for the 2003 u-16 national champs (San Diego Surf) and Bock twice was a national runner-up – with Illinois ODP in 2005 and with the Windy City Pride in '04 (u-18).

The summer of 2005 saw Hanks collect her second career Golden Boot Award while helping the Texans nearly win the u-19 title (lost in PKs), with Pinnick and the Commotion also making a return to nationals. Current senior **Becca Mendoza** and her Dallas Sting squad also were in Orlando, as one of the four 2005 finalists in the u-18 division. Four Irish players – Shaner, her fellow 2007 graduate **Nikki Westfall**, Bock and current senior **Kerry Inglis** – were key members of the EC. Indiana team that won the 2005 Women's Professional Soccer League (WPSL) and Open Cup titles while 2006 graduate **Katie Thorlakson** helped the Vancouver Whitecaps win the 2004 W-League title. Current juniors **Amanda Clark** and **Michele Weissenhofer** played for the Eclipse Select team that won u-16 and u-17 national crowns (in 2004 and '05). The four teams at the 2006 u-18 nationals featured four members of the current junior class: Clark and Weissenhofer (Eclipse), **Kelsey Lysander** (San Diego Surf) and **Haley Ford**, who captained the Dallas Texans '88 team to the national title (their classmate **Rachel VanderGenutgen** then won the 2007 u-19 title with the Carmel Cyclones). Three current sophomores have played for youth national title teams: **Lauren Fowlkes** (K.C. Dynamos; 2001/u-14), **Erica Iantorno** (Eclipse; 2006/u-17), and **Stephanie Sohn** (Eastern N.Y. ODP; 2005).

Irish Offer Energy Plan As Part Of National Championship Campaign In 2008

Intriguing combination of experienced veterans and fresh young talent has Notre Dame poised for another title run

With the 2008 presidential election campaign heating up, one of the key issues on both candidates' agenda is energy. Each side believes they have the key to solving the country's ongoing desire for alternative energy. However, with apologies to Sens. Obama and McCain, one of the best energy plans in the country may be found on the Notre Dame campus in the form of the Irish women's soccer team.

When it comes to high-octane offense, few programs in the country can match Notre Dame, which employs a unique and attractive attacking style that has yielded an average of better than 2.5 goals per game in seven of first nine seasons of the **Randy Waldrum** era (including each of the past five years). The Irish also have proven to be one of the country's most unselfish squads on offense, with no fewer than 12 players scoring at least one goal and at

least 16 players logging at least one assist in every season since 2002.

Yet, when it comes to alternative energy, Notre Dame gets a charge out of its defense like very few other schools. The Irish have posted a goals-against average of less than 1.00 seven times in the Waldrum era, and in four of the past five years, they have held opponents to 15 goals or fewer for the entire season. Even with last year's uncharacteristic 1.05 GAA, it was defensive muscle that played a pivotal role in Notre Dame's 17-game unbeaten streak down the stretch, as the Irish allowed only 10 goals (0.58 GAA) and shut out nine opponents, while picking up wins over three ranked foes (#4 North Carolina, #13 Connecticut and #25 Louisville).

Some have suggested that coal may be the method to use in boosting the country's energy reserves. However, Notre Dame shouldn't have to dig deep into a mountainside to find success this season, but rather by mining the talent on its own roster. The Irish return 19 monogram winners, including nine starters, from last year's squad that compiled a 19-5-2 record and made the team's ninth NCAA College Cup semifinals appearance in the past 14 seasons. Notre Dame

also should harness some wind energy in the form of a highlyregarded nine-player freshman class that comes blowing into town full of promise and potential.

"This is going to be probably one of the deepest teams we've ever had," Waldrum said. "We're not that old of a team with what we have returning, and of the nine kids coming in as freshmen, there are probably five that will be in contention to start right away, which is pretty unheard of for an incoming class. So the competition for playing time this year will be fierce."

So the Irish head into the 2008 season on a campaign of their own with one aim in mind. Notre Dame's party platform is a hybrid, built on a combination of reliable fuels and fresh possibilities, and its goal is to create the ultimate clean and efficient energy source — championship gold shaped as the program's third NCAA title.

Here's a position-by-position look at the 2008 Irish:

FORWARDS

Although Notre Dame will have a great deal of power at all position on the field, the Irish front line is expected to be among the strongest of any crew in the nation. Notre Dame has 83.3 percent (55 of 66) of its goalscoring back from last season, and close to half (27) of that returning offensive punch comes from the forwards.

Entering her final season, senior Kerri Hanks (Allen, Texas) already has blazed trails seldom seen in the annals of NCAA Division I women's soccer, let alone at Notre Dame. A slick 5-foot-6 forward who thrives in the Irish attacking style, Hanks has 64 goals and 58 assists in her brilliant career, putting her on the verge of becoming just the third D-I player ever to amass 70 goals and 70 assists, joining former Notre Dame great Jenny Streiffer (70G-71A from 1996-99) and North Carolina legend Mia Hamm.

A three-time All-American (and two-time first-team selection). Hanks holds more than 60 records at Notre Dame, and is poised to move into the top 10 on the NCAA career assists chart, as well as the top 25 on the NCAA alltime points list (currently at 186). She has led the country in assists each of the past two seasons, dishing out 21 helpers last year to go along with 14 goals (second on the team).

"Kerri just finds ways to score goals," Waldrum said. "Even when you think she's out of the game, it just takes that one split-second and she'll break your back. A lot of people may not realize that her best attribute is what she does when she doesn't have the ball. She's also just so competitive and brings that fire every day."

Hanks will be ably complemented up front by junior Michele Weissenhofer (Naperville, Ill.), whose physical style and knack for scoring in big situations makes her a threat every time she touches the ball. Weissenhofer battled

through a nagging ankle injury last season to finish third on the team in goals (8) and points (19) while appearing in 24 games and starting 19 times. In her career, she has piled up 26 goals and 20 assists and she already owns the school record with six gamewinning goals in the NCAA Championship, including winning scores in last year's tournament against Illinois (second round) and #4 North Carolina (third round; 2nd of the game).

The 2006 Soccer America national freshman of the year, Weissenhofer also provides the Irish with an added weapon in the offensive third, thanks to her unique flip throw-in that has directly led to no less than a dozen goals in her first two seasons at Notre Dame. Now as an upperclassman, Weissenhofer will be expected to add leadership to her growing list of skills.

"Michele had a bit of a down year last year, but a lot of that was due to the ankle injury," Waldrum noted. "She started to come on in the NCAAs last year, and I think you'll see her come back to the same form she showed as a freshman. She just has that physical strength that's difficult for opponents to handle, and she's a Courtney Rosen

weapon on offense, between her ability to strike the ball with either foot and her flip throws."

Sophomore Rose Augustin (Silver Lake, Ohio) showed tremendous potential as a rookie last season, offering a solid spark off the bench while appearing in all 26 games. She wound up tied for fourth on the team in goals (5) and was one of eight players to chalk up double-digit points a year ago (11 pts, 5G-1A). A crafty playmaker with a nose for the goal, Augustin also could see some action in the midfield, having played on the outside during the spring of 2008.

"I thought Rose looked very solid in the midfield during the spring and we're going to take a look to see what position is going to work best for her to get the most playing time," Waldrum observed. "She's so composed with the ball and a real good finisher. With a little bit of work, she may also be able to help us on some set pieces because she has the ability to bend some balls, which not a lot of female players can do really well."

Taylor Sophomore Knaack (Arlington, Texas) missed all of last season while recovering from a torn ACL suffered in May 2007. However, she showed remarkable resilience during her rehabilitation and was able to quickly work her way back into playing form in the spring. Now back at 100 percent, Knaack will lend speed and creativity to an already-potent Irish offense during the coming season.



"Taylor gives us a completely different look than some of the other returning players with her quickness and ability to be all over the field." Waldrum commented. "People may have forgotten about her a little bit because she was injured last year, but I think she's going to come in and compete for some playing time this year."

One of the most decorated incoming players in program history, freshman Melissa (Garland, Texas) is the Henderson consummate goalscorer, having rolled up 66 goals and 45 assists in only 47 high school games (she did not play as a senior to focus on commitments with her club program and U.S. Under-20 National Team, which added her to its playing pool in 2007). She also made history in '07 by becoming the first junior women's soccer player ever chosen as the Gatorade National Player of the Year, adding to an overflowing trophy case that includes a pair of NSCAA youth All-America and Parade All-America citations.

A speedy and skilled technical player, Henderson also displays a humble attitude and an insatiable work ethic that will serve her well at the college level. She can switch the point of attack in an instant and should be able to seamlessly blend with the rest of the Notre Dame front line to give the Irish one of the nation's top attacking units.

"Melissa is going to remind a lot of our fans of (former All-American) Amy Warner," Waldrum said. "Her style will really play off the others up front in that she offers some added

skills that some of the others don't. She's going to come in, have an impact and move some people around, and we're looking forward to seeing how she fits in with the returning players."

MIDFIELDERS

As most soccer observers will attest, the key to any good team lies in its midfield. For Notre Dame, the offensive engine continues to be senior midfielder/forward and co-captain **Brittany Bock**. A 2007 NSCAA first-team All-American and BIG EAST Conference Co-Offensive Player of the Year, the Naperville, Ill. native, played primarily up front the past two seasons, leading the Irish last season in goals (16) and finishing second in points (36), while also squeezing off 81 shots, including a teamhigh 44 on goal.

One of 17 players in school history with 100 career points (40G-20A), Bock is Notre Dame's top all-around player with a wide array of skills that include a deadly long-range shot, precision dribbling and passing abilities, a rugged and

relentless style at ends, and dominating talent in the air, having produced numerous header goals during her time with the Irish. She also is an incredibly cerebral player, as evidenced by her third-team Academic A11_ America selection last year (the 51st Notre Dame student-athlete ever to earn All-America honors on the field in the classroom in the same season).

"Brittany does such a fantastic job up front, especially with her back to the goal, and we haven't had that type of player in the program since Meotis Erikson in 2000," Waldrum

pointed out. "She'll be the first to tell you she's a midfielder, but with the kind of success she's had up front the past two years, she's more receptive to the idea of being up there. We're pretty deep in both (the forward and midfield) areas, so where we play Brittany will depend a lot on what kind of personnel is out there at a given time."

One of the more unsung players on the Irish roster, junior midfielder Courtney Rosen (Brecksville, Ohio) was Notre Dame's strongest player throughout the spring 2008 season. Rosen tallied a goal and four assists last year, while appearing in 25 games and starting 17 times. She brings a flair to the attacking midfield, mixing creativity and superb field vision with excellent technical skills and a strong long-distance shot. What's more, she is a tremendous complementary player in the Irish offense, using playmaking ability to set up timely goals, including '07 postseason scores Hanks (BIG EAST Tournament final for early 1-0 lead) and Weissenhofer (NCAA

round-of-16 at #4 North Carolina after UNC pulled within a goal early in the second half).

"Courtney was a bit overlooked during her first two years just because she missed some time with injuries," Waldrum noted. "But she really came on in the spring, and she's going to continue to impress people in the fall with how much she's grown as a player."

Another of Notre Dame's "energy players" in the midfield is senior **Rebecca Mendoza**. A native of Garland, Texas, Mendoza split time between the starting lineup and a reserve role last season, playing in all 26 games (15 starts) and finishing with three goals and an assist. The versatile midfielder also has worked to sharpen her defensive skills and physicality, adding to a strong presence on the ball, where she is extremely valuable in Notre Dame's possession game.

"Rebecca has just gotten better and better every single year," Waldrum said. "She's going to be right in the thick of things for us in the midfield once again with her technical skills, and she works well in balance with some of our other players."

As is the case with many of the Irish players, sophomore **Lauren Fowlkes** (Lee's Summit, Mo.) saw time in both the midfield and on defense last season. She led the team in minutes played (2,324) and started all 26 games for Notre Dame, tallying two goals and an assist. A true team player and budding leader, Fowlkes moved out of her natural midfield position early in the season when injuries left the Irish thin on defense, and she wound up starting the final 20

contests at center back and helping spark Notre Dame to a 17-game unbeaten string.

At 5-foot-10, Fowlkes is a strong weapon in the air at both ends of the field. She's also a talented playmaker and showed her offensive flash during the spring of 2008, when she scored the gamewinning goal in an exhibition against the Mexican National Team, heading home a free kick from Hanks in the 72nd minute. Fowlkes should gain added benefit from an extensive summer stint with the U.S. Under-20 National Team, having helped the Americans to a runner-up finish at the CONCACAF U-20 Championships and earn a berth in the FIFA U-20 Women's World Cup in Chile later this year.

"Lauren is that tough physical presence on defense and she's also really good in the air," Waldrum said. "We're looking to move her back to the midfield this year and she's going to be among the ones playing a important role there during the course of the season."

Junior **Amanda Clark** (Naperville, Ill.) has quietly provided rock-solid play in the defensive midfield for Notre Dame. Clark played in all 26

games last season, starting 25 of them and settling nicely into her current role. She brings an overflowing level of toughness and intensity to the midfield and has risen to the challenge when drawing difficult marking assignments, displaying a fearless nature and working well in the shadows.

"I'm so pleased with the way Amanda plays because she's just so tenacious," Waldrum observed. "She's the one who does the dirty work for us. Her presence in the midfield is critical because of what she does in terms of locking down opponents and gaining possession for our attack."

Two Irish freshmen who could make an impact in the midfield this season are Courtney Barg (Plano, Texas) and Molly Campbell (Mission Hills, Kan.). Barg was a four-time NSCAA youth All-American and two-time Parade All-American and has been a regular in the U.S Youth National Team program in recent years, most recently with the 2006 U-17 squad. With solid all-around skills and versatility in either the midfield or up front, Barg has the ability to blend playmaking flair

with intelligence and savvy on the ball.

"Based on the kind of depth we have up front, we'll probably see her more in the midfield this year," Waldrum commented. "She's not a super athletic

person, but she'll catch your eye because she's just so clever and composed. I believe she'll be one of our most technically-sound players this season."

Campbell was a two-time NSCAA youth All-American, boasting sharp technical abilities and athleticism that will make her a threat in all areas of the field. While Barg is likely to play more in the central midfield, it's expected Campbell could see time on the outside, with both players competing early for playing time.

"Molly has really grown in the past couple of years and has some good size for us as an attacking midfielder," Waldrum added. "She's good on the ball, smart and a non-stop worker, and she'll make a push to get some time this year as well."

DEFENDERS

Injuries have played a significant role in the makeup of Notre Dame's back line in recent years. However, when healthy, the Irish defense has been on par with the best in the land. For convincing evidence of that fact, one need look no further than the 17-game unbeaten streak Notre Dame put together late last season, and the vise-like grip the Irish placed on their opponents (0.58 GAA, 9 ShO, 2.6 SOG per game allowed).

The cornerstone of Notre Dame's defense during the past three seasons has been senior defender and co-captain **Carrie Dew** (Encinitas, Calif.). A first-team all-region selection and the BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year in 2006, Dew spent the early part of last year completing her recovery from a torn ACL that she suffered at the end of the '06 regular season. After regaining her game-level fitness, Dew displayed the sharpness that has made her one of the nation's top central backs.

Her presence also lends stability to Notre Dame's defense and allows several players to return to their natural positions. A composed and fearless player, especially in the air, Dew is an exceptional student of the game and is rarely caught out of position. She also can provide a boost to the Irish attack, with 18 career points (7G-4A), including two goals and three assists last season. In fact, she scored in the 15th minute of the '07 NCAA College Cup semifinal against Florida State to fuel the first of two Notre Dame comebacks in that contest.

"Carrie is one of the best backs in the country, and by this past spring, she was back to that level after her ACL injury," Waldrum said. "She's so smart and understands the game so well. The whole back line is going to revolve around her, because she brings this level of calmness that rubs off on the others."

Senior left back **Elise Weber** (Elk Grove, Ill.) is another of the pillars of the Irish defense. Weber had played primarily in the midfield before coming to Notre Dame as a transfer from Wisconsin prior to last season. Yet, she blossomed into a top-flight stopper on the outside, starting all 26 games. She also was a perfect addition to the Irish offense, regularly venturing into the attacking third and ranking second on the team with seven assists (tied for fourth with 13 points).

A second-team all-Great Lakes Region and third-team all-BIG EAST selection last year, Weber was one of only 12 defenders on the '07 midseason Hermann Trophy ballot (national player of the year). She also spent time in camp with the U.S. Under-23 National Team during the summer of 2008 and remains in that team's player pool.

"By the end of last year, I thought Elise was the best left back in the country," Waldrum said. "Going into this year, she's going to be right at the top of the list again, especially offensively, because she gets forward so well. Having her and Carrie Dew on the back line as seniors really adds to your experience level."

Junior defender Haley Ford (Midland, Texas) was one of the primary victims of the injury bug last season, playing in only five games (starting four) before a hamstring malady sidelined her for the rest of the year. A tall (5-foot-9) and lanky presence, Ford should be completely healed for 2008, allowing her to rebuild a formidable central back combination with Dew. Her biggest assets remain her poise and control in pressure situations, and she also is strong on the ball and in the air.

"Haley had a good freshman year and just couldn't get through injuries last season," Waldrum pointed out. "We would really like to see her get stronger so she can stay healthy. She plays so hard, and reads the game so well, and if we can keep her injury-free, she can get back to that level she reached as a freshman and make some important contributions for us."

Sophomore right back Julie Scheidler (Indianapolis, Ind.) was arguably one of the more important players in the Notre Dame lineup last season. As a rookie, she played in all 26 games and became a regular in the Irish starting XI at the beginning of the team's 17-game unbeaten string, proving to be a quick study. She was particularly dependable, combining athleticism and strong field vision to evolve as a mainstay on the Irish back line. Like Weber, she also adapted well to Notre Dame's system with its attacking from the outside backs.

"Julie is the perfect example of being ready to play when your name is called," Waldrum noted. "We threw her into the fire early on in her freshman season and she rose to the challenge. She made some freshman mistakes, but she's so coachable and got better and better as the year went on. It's also going to be a tremendous benefit to have someone who already has that amount of experience in big situations."

Sophomore Stephanie Sohn (Ronkonkoma, N.Y.) will look to challenge Scheidler for playing time at that right back position. Sohn saw action in 17 games as a freshman last year, including 11 of the final 14 games. She is a very disciplined bluecollar player who is a superb complement to the rest of the Irish defensive unit.

Freshman Jessica Schuveiller (Plano, Texas) has caught the coaches' eye and may work her way into the mix on the back line this fall. Schuveiller is a former NSCAA prepall-region selection who possesses a bulldog mentality and comes from the highly-successful Sting Dallas club program that produced Henderson and Barg (the latter also was her teammate at Plano West High School for three years).

"Jessica reminds me a whole lot of (former two-time All-American) Melissa Tancredi," Waldrum said. "She's one of those players that no one is going to want to play against because of her physical style. I like the way she can bring an added level of toughness and intensity on the back line and really make opponents pay the price for coming into her area."

GOALKEEPERS

Perhaps the most pressing question facing Notre Dame in 2008 will be identifying a new starting goalkeeper. Lauren Karas turned in a yeoman effort during her final two seasons with the Irish, finishing second in school history with a .902 career winning percentage (54-5-2) and ranking 18th on the NCAA career goals-against average list (0.65).

Junior **Kelsey Lysander** (San Diego, Calif.) is the veteran in this season's goalkeeping competition, having appeared in 14 games during her first two years, making three starts. She has a 1.18 career GAA and has started both season openers in her tenure, pitching shutouts against Iowa State (9-0) as a freshman and Michigan (0-0; split) last year.

Sporting the prototypical goalkeeper frame (5-foot-10) and a tremendous work ethic, Lysander looked solid in the spring 2008 season, starting the exhibition win over the Mexican National Team and making four big saves (1 GA) to keep the Irish level and set the stage for the comeback victory.

"Kelsey really had a good spring and started to show that she could respond in high-pressure

situations like that Mexico game," Waldrum said. "She's gaining more and more confidence in her game, and going into the fall, I'd say she's got the inside track to be our No. 1 goalkeeper."

Sophomore **Nikki Weiss** (Redding, Conn.) appeared in seven games as a freshman last year, starting three times. She posted a 1.53 GAA and a 1-2-1 record, sharing three shutouts while saving seven of 13 shots in 352 minutes. Both of her losses last season came in overtime, with one (Stanford) ending on a penalty kick. At 5-foot-11, she has the physique and all-around skills to command the 18-yard box and evolve into a significant force on the college level.

Weiss played the second half in the spring 2008 exhibition win over Mexico, earning the victory with a clean sheet over the final 45 minutes. She also preserved the win with a pair of key stops in the closing moments, coming out to smother a breakaway opportunity and then corralling a wind-blown cross that flirted with the goalmouth.

"Nikki has all the potential to be a solid 'keeper for us," Waldrum noted. "If we can get her to be a bit more consistent in her play, both in training and game situations, she's going to push Kelsey for the starting spot."

Randy Waldrum Head Coach 10th Season Midwestern State '81

When Notre Dame went searching for a women's soccer coach in 1999, the University was looking for an experienced tactician and motivator to lead the NCAA's second-winningest program of the 1990s. Notre Dame found exactly what it was looking for in Randy Waldrum, a veteran of coaching at nearly every level who built Notre Dame into the 2004 national champions and has kept the Irish among the nation's elite year after year.

From his first coaching job at MacArthur High School in Irving, Texas, to leading Notre Dame to the NCAA title, Waldrum has been recognized by U.S. Soccer as one of the game's top soccer minds. He has held a position on the U.S. national team coaching staff since 1992 and currently serves as Vice President of Conventions and Awards for the 18,000-member National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Waldrum – who has directed Notre Dame to 91 victories over the past four seasons (2004-07) – is able to draw on the lessons learned from 26 combined seasons in the college coaching ranks (368-134-27 record/.721), providing the Irish program with the full package in its head coaching position. A respected student of the game, Waldrum has combined with his staff to consistently attract some of the nation's top talent. In the past six years alone, Notre Dame's incoming classes all have been rated among the top 10 in the nation – highlighted by several elite individuals who have quickly made the transition to the college game.

Waldrum's first nine Notre Dame teams (1999-2007) continued the program's tradition of excellence by combining for a 185-29-8 (.851) record while winning eight BIG EAST regular-season and five BIG EAST Tournament titles and advancing to the NCAAs each year – including College Cup semifinal trips in 2000 and 2007, runner-up finishes in 1999 and 2006, and the 2004 title. The Irish also posted a 53-21-3 (.708) record versus NSCAA Top 25 teams in the first nine years of the Waldrum era.

Waldrum coached the Irish to the College Cup weekend once again in 2007, as he helped the team overcome key injuries and a punishing earlyseason slate. The Irish went on a 17-game unbeaten streak (16-0-1) before falling in the College Cup semifinals, climbing all the way to No. 4 in the final national rankings. In addition, Hanks and Bock were named NSCAA first team All-Americans, marking the first time since 1995 that two forwards from the same team have received first team All-America honors. Bock led the BIG EAST with 10 goals during conference play, while her 16 total goals ranked 11th in the nation. Hanks became the 19th player in NCAA Division I history to reach the 50 goals and 50 assists plateau, with five of those 19 coming from Notre Dame (and four having played for Waldrum at some point in their careers).

Despite narrowly missing another chance to play for the national title last season, Waldrum further solidified his spot on the short list of elite coaches in the history of collegiate women's soccer. The 2007 College Cup final weekend marked the fifth time in Waldrum's nine-year tenure with the Irish that he has guided Notre Dame to a spot in the national semifinals.

Waldrum's .772 career winning percentage is fourth all-time among women's soccer coaches with 10-plus seasons on the Division I level (third among active coaches; see chart). During his years at Notre Dame, Waldrum has matched wits versus six other coaches who are ranked among the top 10 on that list and the Irish own an impressive 23-8-3 (.721) record in those games featuring matchups against top national coaches. In those games, Waldrum has guided the Irish to winning records versus Len Tsantiris and his UConn squad (10-2-2), Jerry Smith's Santa Clara team (7-4-0), and Becky Burleigh's Florida program (2-0-0) plus a win over a Texas A&M team led by G. Guerrieri, and a split of two games versus Portland when they were directed by the late Clive Charles. Notre Dame's 2004 NCAA title-game win over UCLA (coached by Jillian Ellis, yet another on the Top 10 list) was decided in penalty kicks, with the Irish officially awarded the victory for that game.

The Irish have totaled a +156 win-to-loss margin in the Waldrum era (185-29-8), also winning nearly 80 percent of their "big games" when facing an NSCAA Top 25 or postseason opponent (79-21-4, .779). Four of the top five goals-against averages (GAA) in Irish history have also been posted in the Waldrum era (0.39 in 2000, 0.40 in '06, 0.49 in '03 and 0.51 in 2004, with the record of 0.36 set in 1997).

In 2006, Waldrum again was named the NSCAA Great Lakes Region Coach of the Year, becoming the nation's only coach (in men's or women's soccer) to earn a regional coach-of-the-year award in three of the past five seasons (also 2003 and '04). The four-time BIG EAST Conference Coach of the Year ('99, '00, '03, '04; no other coach has won that award more than twice) and seven-time NSCAA regional coach of the year also attended nine-day training courses in Glasgow, Scotland, during the summers of 2003 and 2004. That prestigious clinic was sponsored by the Scottish Football Association and provided steps to receiving a UEFA advanced coaching certificate.

Waldrum continued his foray into international competition in 2008, spending much of the summer as head coach of the Trinidad & Tobago Under-17 Women's National Team. Having worked with the Trinidad & Tobago Football Federation since 2007, Waldrum helped organize a structure for the T&T women's national team program, wasting little time in successfully molding the U-17 squad into a competitive unit on the international scene. In fact, Waldrum's charges acquitted themselves well during the 2008 CONCACAF U-17 Championships, posting a 1-1-1 record and coming within one victory of a berth in the inaugural FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup. He continues to oversee the T&T Women's

National Team program, with particular emphasis on the next U-17 squad that will help host the 2010 FIFA U-17 Women's World Cup.

Waldrum's Notre Dame players have combined for 19 All-America honors - led by 2000 national player of the year Anne Makinen, high-scoring forward standout Katie Thorlakson (who received 2004 player-of-the-year honors) and a third player of the year in current senior forward Kerri Hanks (in 2006). Irish players in the Waldrum era also have combined for 14 Academic All-America awards, including rare double honors (All-America and Academic All-America) for 2001 defender and Monica Gonzalez current forward/midfielder Brittany Bock (in 2007). The 2003 squad became the first in Division I women's soccer history to produce three Academic All-Americans, as defender Vanessa Pruzinsky was named Academic All-American of the Year, while forward Mary Boland and goalkeeper Erika Bohn were second-team selections. Bohn was then tapped as a first-team choice in 2004 and 2005, joining Pruzinsky and former basketball standout Bob Arnzen as Notre Dame's only three-year Academic All-Americans.

In 2006, Waldrum and his staff coached an Irish squad that rates among the most dominant in Notre Dame history. The Irish held the nation's top ranking for most of the season and did not lose until the national title game, tying the team record for wins in a season (25-1-1) while becoming just the second women's soccer program ever to reach 25 wins in multiple seasons. Only five teams in the 26-year history of Division I women's soccer have totaled more than 25 wins in a season.

Waldrum's 2006 squad led the nation with a team-record 19 shutouts while the 0.40 goals-against average ranked third nationally and was just shy of the Notre Dame record (0.36). The Irish also compiled the nation's top scoring margin (+74; 85-11) and had 28 more goals than their opponents' combined shots on goal (57). Notre Dame allowed a per-game average of only 2.11 shots on goal – setting another team record – and

the Irish did not face a deficit for 16 straight games prior to the NCAA title game.

Hanks earned the prestigious Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy as 2006 national player of the year while joining former UNC great Mia

Hamm as the only Division I players ever to end a season as the national leader in both goals (22) and assists (22).

Waldrum's 2005 tean turned in another historic season, entering the year ranked No. 1 and leading the nation in scoring (4.40 goals per game) More impressively, the 2005 team's goal total (110, good for 10th in NCAA history) wa more than twice the number of shots on goal allowed by the Irish for the entire season (54, with only 15 opponent goals) The Irish rolled up a 60-3 scoring margin during a 13game winning streak late in the 2005 season. The streak which saw the Irish allow only two opponent shots on goal ended in an NCAA quarterfinal loss at eventual national champion Portland.

The 2005 season also featured four All-Americans – Thorlakson, Hanks, Candace Chapman and Jen Buczkowski – who were among the final-15 candidates for the Hermann Trophy as well. Those players each received top BIG EAST honors in 2005 (Thorlakson on offense, Chapman on defense, Buczkowski as best midfielder, Hanks as top rookie), marking the first time that one team had claimed four major BIG

EAST player awards. Thorlakson (18G-35A) and Hanks (28G-15A) also became the second pair of teammates in Division I history to eclipse 70 points in the same season.

The nation's only repeat honoree as his region's NSCAA coach of the year in 2003 and '04, Waldrum's clever use of personnel played a key role in the 2004 team's sustained success and post-season push, making efficient use of the roster in order to utilize the team's depth to keep the top players fresh for the postseason (19 different players started in 2004). He also used a variety of formations and made a key decision to install the veteran Chapman at forward, following a broken leg suffered by her classmate Boland. Chapman had not played forward since high school but she responded with an all-BIG EAST season as the team's second-leading scorer (12G-8A).

The 2004 squad posted the best winning percentage in program history (.944, 25-1-1), with only three previous Division I teams winning more games in a season. They also finished fourth in the nation with a 0.51 season goals-against average while totaling nearly as many goals (70) as opponent shots on goal (71) and trailing only 102 minutes all season. On the way to the title, Notre Dame beat three Top 25 teams twice (Santa Clara, Boston College and Connecticut), while adding noteworthy wins over Portland, Stanford, West Virginia, Villanova, Michigan and Arizona State. The 2003 and 2004 teams combined to win more than 90 percent of their games (45-4-2) - a twoyear mark that was bettered by the 2005 and 2006 Irish teams (47-4-1).

Head Coach

The Waldrum era began in 1999, with his first five years coinciding with the career of defensive enforcer Pruzinsky, the classic definition of student-athlete who graduated with a 4.00 cumulative GPA as a chemical engineering major while also competing for a spot on the final roster for the U.S. U-21 National Team. Pruzinsky returned for a fifth year of eligibility in 2003 and was named the CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year for women's soccer, also receiving a prestigious NCAA postgraduate scholarship.

Waldrum became the first coach in NCAA women's soccer history (3rd total) to lead his/her team to the championship game in his first season with a team, after guiding his 1999 squad to four straight wins in the NCAAs. Three previous first-year coaches had reached the semifinals (doing so in the days of 12- and 16-team NCAA fields), but perhaps none had led a team through a harder route than Waldrum did against the 48-team draw in 1999. The Irish defeated Atlantic-10 champion Dayton and eighth-ranked Stanford (the Pac-10 champ) before toppling fourth-ranked and Big 12 champion Nebraska in the quarterfinals via a nail-biting penalty kick shootout.

The rookie coach had the fifth-seeded Irish clicking in their first three rounds of the 1999 NCAA tournament – with that momentum continuing at the College Cup. Earlier in the 1999 regular season, Notre Dame had suffered a 4-2 loss at top-ranked Santa Clara. In the rematch at the NCAA semifinals, Waldrum motivated his team with surprise green jerseys. The Irish responded with an inspired performance in a 1-0

win over the Broncos, as an NCAA-record total of 14,000 fans looked on at San Jose's Spartan Stadium. Despite a loss in the title game two days later, Waldrum had taken Notre Dame further than any previous first-year head coach in Division I women's soccer history.

A new challenge awaited in 2000, as Notre Dame looked to replace five graduated starters – three of them All-Americans, and a fourth the team's all-time leading goal scorer. Under Waldrum's steady hand, the Irish overcame the loss of two injured starters for good chunks of the 2000 season and returned to the top of the rankings, led by a stingy defense that posted a national-best 0.39 goals-against average.

Makinen, the leader of the 2000 midfield unit, went on to earn national player-of-the-year honors while the 2000 Irish posted a 23-1-1 overall record, with the only blemishes being a scoreless battle at BIG EAST rival Connecticut and a 2-1 loss to North Carolina in the NCAA semifinals. The Irish trailed for just 35 minutes all season and captured another BIG EAST crown, with Waldrum repeating as BIG EAST Coach of the Year

The 2001 squad then claimed the program's seventh straight BIG EAST title (only UConn women's basketball had won more consecutive BIG EAST titles, among team-oriented sports) while posting noteworthy wins over Penn State and Nebraska. A series of injuries to key players slowed the 2002 squad but the Irish rallied down the stretch before losing on a late goal at top-ranked Stanford in the NCAA round of 16.

The 2003 squad (20-3-1) returned atop the national scene, owning the No. 2 national ranking for most of the season while emerging as one of the nation's most balanced teams on both sides of the ball – led by a pair of All-Americans in forward Amy Warner and defender Melissa Tancredi.

Waldrum – who served as an assistant coach with the U.S. Women's U-18 and U-20 national teams in the late 1990s – came to Notre Dame after beginning the Baylor women's soccer program from scratch in 1995, ultimately leading the Bears to a 9-0-1 Big 12 Conference record and their first Big 12 championship in any sport in 1998

In three seasons at Baylor, Waldrum guided the Bears to a 46-14-3 record after he spent 1995-96 starting up the program. He earned Big 12 Conference and NSCAA Central Region coach-of-the-year honors after finishing with a 15-5-1 record in '98. The Bears posted wins over three ranked teams to earn their first NCAA bid and were ranked as high as 12th during the season. He was named the 1996 national coach of the year for a first-year program and likewise, Baylor was chosen by Soccer Buzz as the nation's best first-year program in 1996 after posting a 17-3-1 season.

Prior to his tenure at Baylor, Waldrum spent six seasons (1989-94) as head coach of the men's and women's teams at the University of Tulsa, compiling a 66-33-6 record with the men and a 61-36-9 mark with the women (he remains the winningest all-time coach of both programs). He was voted Central Region coach of the year in 1990 after the Golden Hurricane finished 9-6-1. His Tulsa women's teams produced four all-region players, six Academic All-Americans and two Olympic Festival players.

Waldrum's 1993 Tulsa men's team finished second in the Missouri Valley Conference and fourth in the region with a 10-6-2 record, earning Waldrum MVC and Midwest Region coach-of-the-year honors. His 1991 team won the MVC championship, finishing with a 14-3-0 record and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. His men's teams produced seven All-Americans, two national team members, three U.S. Olympic Festival players and three Professional Indoor Soccer League draft selections. While at Tulsa, Waldrum also served as the state coach for the Olympic Development Program.

Waldrum started a first-year men's program at Texas Wesleyan in 1988 and earlier had his first collegiate head coaching position at Austin College in 1982. He served as director of coaching for the Texas Longhorns Soccer Club from 1987-89, coaching one of the seven teams in the club while overseeing the other teams. His team went 53-4-1 and finished third in the country, with Waldrum coaching and developing two Parade All-Americans, two national team players and one Youth World Cup player with the Longhorns.

Waldrum earned all-district honors all four years of his playing career at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas, graduating in 1981 as a physical education major and political science minor. He then played professionally for the Los Angeles Skyhawks and the Indianapolis Daredevils of the American Soccer League.

Born Sept. 25, 1956, the Irving, Texas, native and his wife Dianna have one son, 27-year-old Ben, who has competed in professional soccer with the El Paso Patriots of the A-League and with the MISL's Dallas Sidekicks. Ben also served as an assistant coach on his father's staff at Notre Dame from 2003-2007.

A Visit with Randy Waldrum

Q: How do you think the Notre Dame women's soccer program is perceived on a national level and how would you characterize the current state of the program?

A: "I'd like to think people view us as one of the premier programs in the country and I think that is the perception. And that's where we certainly want to keep it.

"What makes the sport of soccer tick is that all coaches and fans see the game a little bit differently. I would love for our team to be viewed as a program that plays a very attractive, attacking style. If I had my wish, I would want it to look like a mixture of the Dutch and the Brazilians, maybe some of Manchester United. Those are models that you'd like your team to look at.

"We've taken what was established and added to it. Previous Notre Dame teams played that attractive style and we've been able to continue that, with probably a little more athleticism — which you need to consistently win the big games. That's how the game has evolved.

"Maybe even a little bit to our downfall, we've always come out and tried to play. We've never just tried to sit back and defend and see if the best team can win from that. An attractive style is a crucial part of how this program will operate."

Q: What will it take to maintain the Notre Dame program at that elite level?

A: "Any coach will tell you it's about the players first. So we certainly have to continue to recruit the best, and our incoming class for 2006 is right up there among the best in the nation. A lot of our success has been due to the fact that we've added kids who are good fits for Notre Dame. That's a big reason why we were so successful in 2000 and again in 2004. The chemistry of those teams was so incredible, although at times we may not have been as talented as some earlier Notre Dame teams."

Q: What are some of the things that you have come to appreciate most at Notre Dame?

A: "On the outside, I always had an appreciation for the athletic tradition of Notre Dame and knew it was a great academic institution. Since I've been on campus, that certainly is very true and probably 10-fold once you realize the actual tradition. It's truly what a college campus should be all about.

"A couple things that really separate us is how committed the alums are to Notre Dame. We don't go anywhere around the country that somebody doesn't stop and talk to us about Notre Dame, and alumni clubs hold receptions for us all over the country. Those are things you don't find anywhere else.

"The biggest thing is what Notre Dame can do for student-athletes in their future. They get great benefits of playing four years on a top college team and receiving a great education. But in the long run, there are great employment opportunities that being an alum of Notre Dame can open for you. Those are the things that really have amazed me."

Q: Many of your top players have undergone position shifts over the years. What is your philosophy about position changes?

A: "It's fairly common, because so many top kids played in the more high-profile positions with their club teams. It's another intangible when we are evaluating players and one has that versatility to play other positions, because you never know where they might play. We have several players with the skills, maturity and mentality to play multiple positions and they are valuable members of this team.

"We have a trend of playing with several defenders who converted from the offense and they have that sense of what the opposing forwards are going to try to do. That may give them an added edge, because they've been on the other side of the ball."

Q: Your inverted pyramid 4-3-3 system has been used by the U.S. Women's National Team but is fairly unique in the college game. What attracts you to this formation?

A: "I like the system for two primary reasons. First, it gives you four in the back and it's a lot easier to cover the full width of the field. Secondly, it still allows you to keep an attacking presence with three up front. It is the perfect system for the players we've had.

"For the system to work, you need midfielders like we've had in recent years such as Jen Buczkowski, Brittany Bock and Courtney Rosen, who are technically-sound and comfortable handling the ball under pressure. The system also is a 'win-win' defensively, whether you're trying to match up with four or five midfielders from the opposition. You also need great outside backs — which we've had recently with the likes of Candace Chapman, Kim Lorenzen and Christie Shaner — who can cover a lot of ground on the flanks.

"You recruit to fit your system if you're happy with that system and want to stay in it; or you recruit the best players you can and then develop a system once that group gets there. We're to a point where we can recruit for the system. It doesn't mean that won't change if warranted, but we are very pleased and content with the way the system meshes with our current players."

Q: Your players have said that you have their respect and attention without using an overbearing style. How did that develop?

A: "I played for coaches who were not big yellers and screamers. My high school coach Simon Sanchez is still one of the best coaches I've ever been around. People respected him and loved to play for him, without him needing to ride us all the time – but we still had some intense practices and games.

"Today's athletes are very different. Many don't respond as well to a lot of yelling and screaming. I've always been fortunate to coach players who respond in a positive way and understand what we are asking them to do. We have a very intelligent group and they've been very receptive to our ways of doing things."

Assistant Coach Sixth Season Baylor '01

Former Baylor All-American and WUSA goal-keeper Dawn Greathouse enters her sixth season on the Notre Dame women's soccer staff as an assistant coach, reuniting with her former college coach Randy Waldrum, who departed Baylor for Notre Dame after the 1998 season. Greathouse currently holds an advanced national diploma from the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

Greathouse has provided valuable instruction and insight for two of Notre Dame's greatest goalkeepers of all-time in 2006 graduate Erika Bohn (who went on to be one of two goalkeepers on the U.S. U-21 National Team at the 2005 Nordic Cup) and 2008 graduate Lauren Karas. Bohn – a rare threetime Academic All-American – earned NSCAA allregion honors in 2003 and then was an all-BIG EAST Conference selection in 2005. She ranks fourth in the Notre Dame record book with a 0.69 career goals-against average (GAA) and is third in Irish women's soccer history with 6,788 career

minutes played. While under the tutelage of Greathouse, Karas posted the second highest career winning-percentage among Irish goalkeepers (.902) and the third-best GAA (0.65).

Greathouse made an immediate impact in her first two seasons at Notre Dame, the second of which saw the Irish win their second national championship. In 2003, the Irish finished fifth in the nation with a 0.49 season goals-against average in 2003 and were fourth with 15 shutouts - also compiling a 956-minute shutout streak that ranks fifth in NCAA history (longest since 1999). Notre Dame faced just one deficit in the first 19 games of the 2003 season, en route to a 20-3-1 record. The 2004 national championship season then saw the Irish lead the nation with 18 shutouts while nearly reclaiming the GAA title (4th, at 0.51). The 25-1-1 season featured just 108 minutes with the Irish playing from behind, limiting 24 of the 27 opponents to one goal or fewer, while the other three foes managed to score twice (two coming in the first four games, with only 10 goals allowed over the final 25).

Following the 2004 NCAA title-game win over UCLA, Bohn quickly credited Greathouse when asked about her clutch performances in that pressure-packed game. Bohn's six saves that day included three in penalty-kick situations, one coming late in regulation to preserve the 1-1 tie while her final save (in the shootout) clinched the title.

Most recently, Greathouse tutored current junior Kelsey Lysander and current sophomore Nikki Weiss, in addition to Karas, during the 2007 season. The trio of goalkeepers combined for 12 shutouts, including nine during Notre Dame's 17-game unbeaten stretch.

"Dawn has done a great job with our 'keepers and we expect that to continue on an even higher level this season," says Waldrum.

"Dawn is one of the best goalkeepers I've ever coached and her skills and knowledge are further legitimized by the fact that she played in the WUSA. She brings a great level of experience but also knows what the expectations are on the pro level. Dawn is able to expose our players to what the inner workings of elite-level soccer are all about and that supports what our staff as a whole is trying to teach the players."

Greathouse – who trained with the U.S. U-20 National Team in 1998 – played with the Washington Freedom in the first two seasons of the Women's United Soccer Association (2001 and 2002), also playing for the San Jose CyberRays in 2002 and '03. She made eight career starts in the WUSA while backing up U.S. National Team players Siri Mullinix (Washington) and former Notre Dame star LaKeysia Beene (San Jose).

Greathouse logged 7,121 minutes (sixth in NCAA history at the time) in her four-year Baylor career while posting a 1.20 goals-against average, an .802 save percentage and 28 shutouts. The three-time all-Big 12 Conference and three-time Big 12 all-academic team honoree posted her top season as a sophomore in 1998, earning NSCAA second team All-America honors after ranking 12th in the nation with a 0.69 GAA. She helped the 1998 team win Baylor's first Big-12 title in any sport – before an ACL knee injury sidelined her from Baylor's second straight trip to the NCAAs.

An NSCAA and Parade All-American at Allen (Texas) High School, Greathouse helped the Texas Longhorns club program place second nationally and trained with the U.S. Under-16 and U-17 national teams.

During her youth soccer days, Greathouse played goalkeeper for her club team but also was a high-scoring forward with the Allen High School squad. She set the Allen High School record for career goals and also held the single-season record that was broken by current Notre Dame senior Kerri Hanks.

Born Feb. 10, 1979, in Rochester, N.Y., Greathouse graduated from Baylor in 2001 with a degree in health fitness.

Ken Nuber, a 14-year coaching veteran, enters his first season as an assistant coach with the University of Notre Dame women's soccer program. Nuber spent the past 13 seasons as the head women's soccer coach at NAIA member University of Saint Francis in Fort Wayne, Ind.

"I've known Ken for nine years and I've seen firsthand his work with the Saint Francis program," Irish head coach Randy Waldrum said. "I believe he is an up-and-coming coach with a bright future in our profession. His teams at Saint Francis were well-disciplined, organized, and tried to play the game in

a way that fits our Notre Dame style. He is top class in his character and will bring a wealth of head coaching experience to our staff. I'm extremely excited to have him on board, and look to have continued success in every aspect of our program."

Nuber founded the Saint Francis women's soccer program in 1995 and amassed a 170-96-14 (.632) record with the Cougars, piloting them to six Mid-Central Conference (MCC) titles and eight NAIA regional tournament berths, including regional finals appearances in 2002 and 2007. He also coached four NAIA All-Americans and 27 NAIA honorable mention All-Americans, as well as five regional players of the year during his tenure. What's more, his 170 victories rank seventh on the NAIA all-time wins list.

A three-time MCC Coach of the Year and two-time regional coach of the year, Nuber worked hard to maintain a standard of excellence on and off the field at Saint Francis. His players won 34 NAIA Scholar-Athlete All-America honors in his 13 seasons, and the Cougars earned 10 consecutive National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) Team Academic Awards, with their 3.61 team grade-point average (GPA) in 2007 ranking fourth among collegiate programs at all levels of competition. In addition, Saint Francis was chosen to receive the 2007 NAIA Program of Character Award given for achievement in five categories: sportsmanship, respect, responsibility, servant leadership and integrity.

Nuber was one of the most respected coaches in the NAIA fraternity, having spent eight years on the NSCAA/NAIA Women's Coaches Association Executive Council, including a turn as the group's president from 2006-08. He also served seven years as chair of the NAIA All-America Committee, five years at the chair of the NAIA National Championship Selection Committee, four years as chair of the NAIA Scholar-Athlete All-America Selection Committee and three years as chair of the

NSCAA/NAIA Coach of the Year Selection Committee.

Nuber is not entirely unfamiliar with the Notre Dame women's soccer program, having worked as a staff coach for the Irish soccer camps since 2000. He also was an assistant coach with the Fort Wayne Fever of the United Soccer League's W-League in 2004, helping the Fever to an 11-3-1 record in their inaugural season and a second-place finish in the Midwest Division.

Nuber was involved with the University of Saint Francis athletics community for nearly two decades, beginning with his enrollment at the university and participation with the men's soccer program from 1989-92. He ranks second in school history for career goals (43) and points (100), and is among the school's all-time leaders in several other statistical categories.

In 1994, Nuber returned to his alma mater when he was tapped to lead the Cougar men's soccer program, compiling a 32-60-2 (.351) mark during five seasons at the helm. All told, he posted a combined record of 202-156-16 (.561) in 14 seasons coaching the men and women at Saint Francis.

Nuber also spent time as the head coach of the Saint Francis softball program from 2000-03, registering a 75-74 (.503) record and standing as the school's leader in career victories. One of the true legends in Cougar athletics history, he was inducted into the Saint Francis Athletics Hall of Fame in 2005.

Born Oct. 3, 1970, in Cincinnati, Ohio, Nuber graduated from Saint Francis in 1993 with a bachelor of arts degree in communications and an area of concentration in business. He also has received a pair of coaching certifications from the NSCAA, having earned his national diploma in 1997 and his advanced national diploma in 1999.

He and his wife, Gina, are the proud parents of two children — daughter Mya (3) and son Jayden

Volunteer Assistant Coach First Season Notre Dame '07

Amanda Cinalli, a 2006 NSCAA second team All-American, will serve as the 2008 team's volunteer assistant coach. She was a consummate team player who quietly fashioned a stellar career with the Irish that saw her register 100 points in 100 games played. Her leadership abilities were showcased throughout her career and further evidenced by the fact that she is one of only three players in program history to have served as a solo captain. As a player, she was a tremendous representative of Notre Dame on and off the field. She joined hockey captain T.J. Jindra as 2007 recipients of the athletic department's Francis Patrick O'Connor Award, which recognizes traits such as team spirit and inspiration. Cinalli will be able to bring knowledge of the Irish system both from a forward's and a midfielder's perspective, having been equally effective playing both positions over her four years with the Irish.

Over the course of her career Cinalli became known as a tremendous creator off the dribble and as a crafty and deceptive player with an assortment of moves while being tough to knock off the ball. In 2007, Cinalli was selected as a second-team regional All-American as well being named to the BIG EAST all-tournament team. She finished her career ranked 16th on the career scoring list with 100 points (32 goals, 34 assists). She was the 16th player to reach the

100-point milestone in program history. She also ranks fourth in ND history with 100 career games played and she was just the 12th player in program history with at least 30G-30A.

Cinalli is a proven competitor with a wealth of top-level youth experience, in addition to spending four summers in the W-League. She is one of seven Irish players ever to post five or more points in a game versus a top-25 opponent (5/2G-1A, in '06 vs. Santa Clara) and she ranks 11th on the Notre Dame list for career postseason points (27, in 33 GS). Additionally, Cinalli opened the scoring ("firstgoals") in postseason games more times than any previous Irish player (6), while her four career gamewinning goals in postseason play are one shy of the ND record. Her 20 career points in the NCAAs (8G-4A) are tied for the fourth best point total in ND history. She scored a pair of game-winning goals in the 2004 NCAAs (one shy of ND record). Cinalli also shares the Irish record for games played in a season (27, in '04 and '06) and is one of only four to play 27 in multiple seasons.

Cinalli has national team experience as well. She was a member of United States Under-21 National Team, joining former ND teammates Brittany Bock, Kerri Hanks and Michele Weissenhofer on the U.S. U-21 team that played over spring break in Manchester, England from March 13-15, 2007. Cinalli also joined Weissenhofer on the 18-player U.S. U-21s that won 2007 Nordic Cup in Finland, while facing European U-23 squads. Previously, she was a three-year veteran of the U.S. youth soccer teams (2002-04), playing alongside Notre Dame classmate Susan Pinnick on the U-17 National Team. She served as captain for the U-17 team in 2003 during their game versus Germany, registering pair of assists in that win.

In addition to the aforementioned accolades, as a senior Cinalli was named to the Final-15 watch list for the Herman Trophy, named a fourth team Soccer Buzz All-American, named a first-team Great Lakes Region All-American by Soccer Buzz as she finished the season with three goals and six assists for 12 points. Her deflected shot assisted on a rebound goal by Michele Weissenhofer to open the scoring in the NCAA second round vs. Illinois (2-0). She later showed her postseason poise with another gamewinning assist in the NCAA quarterfinals vs. Duke (3-2), winning the ball in the attacking third and leading Hanks into space on right side, who then sent home the far-post shot.

As a junior, Cinalli was named to the NSCAA all-Great Lakes Region second team while receiving all-BIG EAST honors for third time in her career. She

finished fourth on team in scoring with 26 points (11G-4A), while ranking seventh in points among BIG EAST players and fifth in goals. She was named offensive MVP of Notre Dame's Inn at Saint Mary's Classic - and also the Soccer America national player of the week - after scoring on a flying header to clinch 2-0 win over 19th-ranked USC (via Weissenhofer's flip-throw, in 83rd minute) before factoring into all three goals as the Irish came back to beat fellow number-one ranked Santa Clara (3-1). She capped the scoring in that #1-vs.#1 battle, after running down loose ball and striking leftfooted shot into upper right corner of the net. She also scored for 4-0 lead on Rutgers in BIG EAST title game (4-2) - with a leaping header over her defender to connect on a rightside cross.

As a sophomore, Cinalli was a repeat all-BIG EAST selection (third team) while combining with Thorlakson and Hanks to form potent forward trio that totaled 56 goals and 67 assists. Her 37 points (10G-17A) were third most on the Irish (and in BIG EAST). She appeared in all 25 games, starting 20 while playing mostly forward, scoring team's first goal three times, while adding four gamewinners. One of her most important first goals came as she ran onto Candace Chapman's lead pass for breakaway that opened the scoring in the BIG EAST final with #15 UConn (5-0). She continued strong post-season with 3G-2A in the NCAAs.

As a freshman, Cinalli earned Soccer America first team Freshman All-America honors while becoming the eighth Notre Dame freshman ever named a first team all-BIG EAST selection. She ranked fourth on the team with 27 points (10G-7A), third in goals and second in game-winning goals with four. She joined 10 teammates in setting ND record for games played (27), with 24 starts including the final 12 games of the national championship campaign. She combined with Thorlakson (1st team) and Chapman (3rd team) as the fourth trio of forwards from the same team to earn all-BIG EAST honors. Cinalli opened the scoring in the NCAA quarterfinals versus 4th-ranked Portland (3:42), at the time ND's quickest postseason goal since 2001 (3rd-quickest ever in NCAAs).

Cinalli was named a NSCAA and Parade All-American as senior at Laurel High School (37G-26A for district champs), repeating as state player of the year as a senior. She was a Parade All-American as a junior (40G-17A; 17-1-1 team) and a three-time MVP and senior captain as basketball point guard (league MVP as senior). She also served as softball centerfielder as a freshman, winning the coaches award. She was an honors student, involved with school government and volunteer work.

Irish Ride Midseason Wave of Success All the Way to Their Ninth NCAA College Cup Semifinal Berth

BACK ON THE BIGGEST STAGE (AGAIN)

– Despite a brutal schedule in the opening month and a rash of injuries, Notre Dame found its rhythm by midseason and fashioned a 17-game unbeaten streak (16-0-1) that was capped off by the program's ninth trip to the NCAA College Cup final weekend in 14 seasons (and third since 2004). The Irish faced six ranked opponents in the opening month of the season, including four in a row in early September (three of which were top-10 foes). A 2-0 win at No. 7 Florida was countered by four other losses to Top 25 teams, with three of those defeats coming by 2-1 scores (two in overtime).

Undaunted, Notre Dame pulled together and rebounded with staggering force, behind a sturdy defense that yielded less than three shots on goal per game, and a powerful offensive attack that averaged nearly three goals per game down the stretch. The Irish offense was just as potent in the postseason, when Notre Dame poured in 13 goals in five games, including two in a span of 14 seconds during an NCAA Tournament third-round win at No. 4 North Carolina, setting an NCAA postseason record in the process.

Although the season ended two wins shy of the ultimate prize, the lessons learned and the toughness shown by the Irish in the face of early adversity should prove valuable heading into the 2008 season.

ALL-AMERICA LEADERS - The National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) named junior forward Kerri Hanks and junior midfielder/forward Brittany Bock first-team All-Americans, marking Hanks' third All-America selection (second on the first team), and the first for Bock. Hanks was one of four players nationwide to receive NSCAA All-America honors for the third time in her career, after being a second-team selection in 2005 and a first teamer in '06. She joins the captains of Notre Dame's 1996 team - midfielder Cindy Daws ('93, '94, '96) and goalkeeper Jen Renola ('94, '96) - as the only Irish players ever to be NSCAA first-team All-Americans in multiple seasons. Notre Dame's total of 39 NSCAA All-Americans during the past 14 seasons (1994-2007) trailed only North Carolina's 44 among Division I teams, with Portland (28) a distant third on that list of All-Americans from '94-'07. In addition, Bock and Hanks, along with senior forward/midfielder Amanda Cinalli, were among the final 15 candidates for the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy Player of the Year award.

DYNAMIC DUO - The NSCAA named Hanks and Bock first-team All-Americans, marking the first time since 1995 that two forwards from the same team received the NSCAA first-team All-America designation. The first four seasons of NCAA Division I women's soccer (1982-85) - when the number of participating teams was well below 50 - each featured a pair of NSCAA first-team All-America forwards from the same team, but there were only four seasons from 1986-95 with two first-team forwards on the same squad. Those dynamic forward duos included North Carolina's Mia Hamm and Kristine Lilly (1990 and '92), the Portland pair of Shannon MacMillan and Tiffeny Milbrett ('94), and UNC's Cindy Parlow and Debbie Keller ('95) - an impressive group of players, most of whom went on to standout careers with the U.S. National Team. This marks the fourth time in Notre Dame's storied history (but first time since 1997) that multiple Irish players have been named NSCAA first-team All-Americans. In addition,

Bock (16) and Hanks (14) were one of only three duos in the nation to each total 14-plus goals during the 2007 season, joining Florida State's Mami Yamaguchi (24) and Sanna Talonen (18) and UCLA's Lauren Cheney (23) and Danesha Adams (15) in that grouping.

REGIONAL ROUNDUP – Bock, Hanks and Cinalli also were named NSCAA first-team all-Great Lakes Region selections, while junior defender Elise Weber garnered second-team all-region honors. Notre Dame now has fielded 72 all-Great Lakes Region designees since 1992, including 54 first-team picks. Hanks became a three-time first-team all-region choice in 2007, while Bock and Cinalli rose up to the first team in '07 after copping second-team status in '06. Hanks is the ninth Irish player to garner three first-team all-region citations, with Jen Grubb, Anne Makinen, Holly Manthei and Kate Sobrero the only four-time recipients in program history.

BOCK'S CAREER YEAR – Bock took her game to new heights in 2007, as the first-team All-American totaled all but two of her 36 points in 2007 (16G-4A) during Notre Dame's 17-game unbeaten streak, in 15 games played (15G-4A). Her 16 goals and 36 points were both career high totals, with her total goals ranking 11th in the nation and tops among BIG EAST Conference players. She also led the BIG EAST with 10 goals during conference play, and was named to the Soccer America



National Team of the Week in back-to-back weeks (Oct. 8-15) during a midseason stretch that saw Bock post matching nine-point weekends (4G-1A): first at Syracuse (3G) and St. John's (1G-1A) and then at home versus Georgetown (2G) and Villanova (2G-1A). Half of Bock's career goals with the Irish (20 of 40) have come on headers, including eight in the 2007 season (among them, the goal that opened the scoring in the 3-2 NCAA round-of-16 win at fourth-ranked North Carolina). She is one of 17 all-time Notre Dame players to reach 100 career points (40G-20A) and shares the Irish record for career goals in the NCAA Tournament (10).

A 50-50 PROPOSITION - Hanks became the 19th player in Division I women's soccer history to pile up 50 goals and 50 assists in her career, and the fifth player to do so wearing the blue and gold of Notre Dame (Daws, Jenny Streiffer, Makinen and Katie Thorlakson). In addition, Hanks is just the third Division I player to reach the milestone before the end of her junior season. She reached the 50-50 mark on Oct. 28 at Rutgers, potting a goal and two assists in a 3-1 Irish win that capped off a 10-game winning streak to finish out the regular season. Hanks finished fourth nationally in scoring with 49 points in the 2007 season (14G-21A) and was one of two players nationwide with at least 12 goals and 12 assists. She also led the nation in assists for the second straight season. Hanks now has 64 career goals to go along with 58 assists giving her 186 points with the Irish, tied for fifth best all-time. With two more assists, she would become the sixth D-I player ever to reach 60 goals and 60 assists (while only two players - Streiffer and Hamm - have reached the rarified air of 70 goals and 70 assists). Entering her senior season, Hanks already owns more than 60 Notre Dame records, including career points in postseason play (58; 18G-22A).

BIG EAST'S BEST – Notre Dame continued one of the most dominant runs by a BIG EAST team in any sport, finishing atop the National Division standings (11-

0-0) and going unbeaten in conference play for the eighth time in 13 seasons of membership. The Irish then advanced to the BIG EAST Championship final, playing host West Virginia to a 1-1 draw before the Mountaineers took the title in a penalty kick shootout (5-3). Nevertheless, Notre Dame has won 11 BIG EAST regular-season titles (all but 1998 and 2002) and owns both a 38-game unbeaten streak versus BIG EAST teams (36-0-2; the WVU game is recorded as a tie) and a 13year, 79-game home unbeaten streak against the BIG EAST (78-0-1), dating back to 1995. The 38-game conference unbeaten streak also is tied for the fourth longest streak in NCAA history. Individually, Bock was named BIG EAST Co-Offensive Player of the Year and joined Hanks in collecting first-team all-BIG EAST plaudits, while Weber was a third-team all-conference selection. Hanks (8G-9A-25) and Bock (10G-3A-23) ranked first and third in points scored during conference play, with Bock setting the pace in total goals.

EXCELLENCE ACADEMIC Senior defender/midfielder Ashley Jones was named to the 11player ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America First Team for the second consecutive year while Bock was a third-team honoree, with both awards voted upon by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA). Notre Dame joined North Carolina (two second-team selections) and Penn State (second- and third-team selections) as the only women's soccer teams with multiple players on the 2007 Academic All-America team. Jones, who graduated in May 2008 with a 3.98 cumulative grade-point average (GPA) and a bachelor's degree in accounting, follows former defender Vanessa Pruzinsky (2000, '01, '03) and goalkeeper Erika Bohn ('04, '05) as the third Notre Dame women's soccer player to be named a first-team Academic All-American in multiple seasons. Meanwhile, Bock owns a 3.25 cumulative GPA as a marketing major.

The Notre Dame women's soccer program's unmatched tradition of Academic All-America excellence now includes 20 selections during the past 13 seasons (the most honors from any D-I women's soccer team in that span). Seven Notre Dame women's soccer players now have combined for 11 first-team Academic All-America honors, with the Irish program producing at least one first-team selection in eight of the past 12 years.

Notre Dame also had a total of four players named to the 2007 ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District V team, as Jones and Bock were named to the first team while senior F/M Susan Pinnick and sophomore M/D Amanda Clark were second-team selections. Notre Dame's total of four players earning first- or second-team Academic All-District honors tied two other teams for second-most in the most in the country, spanning the eight CoSIDA districts and more than 300 Division I women's soccer programs. Pinnick graduated in May 2008 with a 3.86 cumulative GPA and an accounting degree, while Clark currently holds a 3.44 cumulative GPA as a business major.

DEFENSIVE DEBUTS – With an early-season injury to sophomore defender Haley Ford (who had stepped in brilliantly during the 2006 postseason when Carrie Dew was injured in the final regular-season contest), freshmen Lauren Fowlkes and Julie Scheidler proved to be invaluable components of the Irish back line. In addition to helping Notre Dame keep 12 clean sheets, both first year players appeared in all 26 games for the Irish. Fowlkes, who moved from her normal midfield position to team with Dew as a central defender, led the team with 2,324 minutes played (89.4 min./gm), while also scoring a pair of goals and adding one assist. Scheidler emerged as the primary choice at right back, starting 21 games (including the final 20 of the season) and helping Notre Dame post an 0.58 goals-against average and allow less than seven shots per game (2.6 on goal) during a 17-game unbeaten streak that propelled the Irish to the NCAA College Cup semifinals.

CLASSY SENIORS - Notre Dame's five-member senior class finished its career with a 91-10-4 record, the second-most wins ever by an ND class (the '06 crew posted a 92-8-3 mark). The 2007 seniors helped the Irish go 28-4-1 in the postseason, with one NCAA title ('04), a runner-up season ('06), a semifinal finish ('07) and another season that ended in the quarterfinals ('05), plus two BIG EAST Tournament titles ('05, '06; also BET runner-up in '04 and '07). Jones set the team record for career games played (105; second-most in NCAA history) and joined Cinalli (100 GP; tied-5th in NCAA history) for the most combined games played (205) by Notre Dame classmates. Cinalli also finished with 100 career points, the 17th player in Notre Dame history to reach the 100-point plateau. Goalkeeper Lauren Karas finished her career ranked second all-time in win percentage (.902/54-5-2), third in goals-against-average (0.65) and fourth in wins (54), while Pinnick finished with 14 career goals, including five game-winning tallies.

SEVENTEEN STRONG – With a 1-0 win at No. 25 Louisville on Sept. 28, the Irish embarked on a 17-game unbeaten streak (16-0-1), before falling to Florida State, 3-2 in the NCAA College Cup semifinals. Over that 17-game unbeaten span, Notre Dame outscored its opponents by a 50-10 margin and registered nine shutouts. The streak also saw Notre Dame rise steadily through the NSCAA poll, finishing fourth in the final coaches' poll of the season.

GAME #1 - Aug. 31 #2 Notre Dame 0, Michigan 0 (2 OT)

Notre Dame, Ind. – The second-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team and Michigan played to a scoreless tie in front of one of the largest crowds in Alumni Field history (3,264) in the season opener for both teams. A career-best 10 saves from Michigan goalkeeper Madison Gates prevented the Irish from cashing in on a 28-6 edge in total shots (10-2 in shots on goal) and a 10-1 corner kick margin.

Notre Dame's closest scoring chance came in the third minute of the second half, as junior forward Kerri Hanks delivered a leftside free kick to the top of the 18-yard box. Freshman midfielder Lauren Fowlkes then struck a sharp header that smacked off the center of the crossbar.

The Irish held the Wolverines without a shot for 92 straight minutes of game time, stretching into the second of the two 10-minute overtimes. Notre Dame extended its overtime unbeaten streak to 21 games (14-0-7), dating back to the 1999 season.

GAME #2 - Sept. 2 #2 Notre Dame 2, #7 Florida 0

Gainesville, Fla. – Newcomer Elise Weber assisted on Brittany Bock's early diving header and - following a long weather delay - scored the first goal of her young Irish career, as the second-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team survived a physical battle with seventh-ranked Florida at Pressly Stadium.

Fellow Chicago-area natives Bock and Weber showed good interplay by combining on a cross-field, give-and-go to open the scoring in the seventh minute. Bock initiated the sequence after chasing down a loose ball on the right side, in front of the Florida bench. She was able to maintain possession in the soggy sideline area and quickly reversed the field with a pass to Weber, who then sent a dipping cross into the penalty area. Bock was angling in from the right and dove low before connecting on the header from eight yards out, with the ball skipping inside the far-left post (6:28).

Weber - who started the game at left back - re-entered the game in the 60th minute, playing more in a flank midfielder role (as she did in the past two seasons at Wisconsin). Less than five minutes after checking back into the game, Weber found the back of the net for the key 2-0 cushion. Junior forward Kerri Hanks picked up the assist, after flaring a pass from the center of the field. Weber ran onto the ball near the right edge of the box before juking past a defender and surprising 'keeper Katie Fraine with a sharply-struck rightfooted shot that ripped into the far-left corner of the net (64:28).

Florida created plenty of havoc and offensive chances while displaying a good combination of athleticism and physical play. The Gators became only the second team in the past five seasons (spanning 105 games) to outshoot Notre Dame (11-4) but the Irish owned a 4-1 edge in shots on goal, with the only save credited to Lauren Karas coming on a harmless ball struck from 35 yards out. The hosts did not have a corner kick in the first 70 minutes of game time but went on to finish with a 6-2 edge in corners.

#3 Santa Clara 7, #2 Notre Dame 1

Santa Clara, Calif. – Santa Clara sophomore forward Kiki Bosio scored twice and helped set up two other goals, as the third-ranked Broncos topped second-ranked Notre Dame, 7-1, in the annual showdown between the women's soccer teams. Santa Clara led 2-0 midway through the first half and took a 3-1 lead into the intermission before scoring four more in the second

half, despite only outshooting the Irish 7-6 in the final 45 minutes.

Sophomore forward Michele Weissenhofer scored the lone goal for Notre Dame in the 24th minute, with junior forward Kerri Hanks setting up the score for her 39th career assist.

Bosio and senior midfielder Brittany Klein (2G-1A) led the SCU attack with five points each while senior forward Meagan Snell came off the bench to score a pair of goals. The Broncos finished with a 15-10 edge in total shots and 10-8 in shots on goal, with the Irish owning a 5-3 corner-kick margin.

Bosio opened the scoring in the 16th mimite, when her rightside flipthrow slipped through the hands of goalkeeper Lauren Karas for the nearpost goal (15:41). Six minutes later, Bosio was able to play a cross from the right side of the box. Tina Estrada was filling the middle but the Irish appeared to catch a break as the ball skipped past her - only to see midfielder Courtney Lewis slanting into the play for a 10-yard shot inside the near-left post (21:42). Notre Dame quickly answered with a score 99 seconds later. Hanks provided the lead pass into the left side of the box and the leftfooted Weissenhofer then deftly touched a shot off the outside of her right foot, with the shot glancing off the left hand of charging 'keeper Meagan McCray before settling into the far-right side of the goal for a 2-1 game (23:11).

Bosio did not have an official assist on the third SCU goal but her leftside flip-throw led to the score, with Lexi Orand reaching out to volley the ball on the far-right side of the box before Snell finished from the left side into the near side of the goal (35:07).

Klein set up the home team's fourth goal early in the second half, after picking off a clear attempt at the top of SCU's attacking third. Klein spun around on the dribble and flared a pass out to the right flank for Snell, who avoided a defender with a cut back to her left before rocketing a far-post shot that went over sophomore keeper Kelsey Lysander and into the far-left side of the net (53:35).

GAME #4 - Sept. 9 #5 Stanford 2, #2 Notre Dame 1 (OT)

Santa Clara, Calif. – Shari Summers converted a penalty kick in the 98th minute as fifth-ranked Stanford won a hard-fought battle with second-ranked Notre Dame, 2-1, in final-day action at the Santa Clara Classic. The Irish had taken the lead on a first-half goal by Lauren Fowlkes but Kelley O'Hara tied the game in the 52nd minute, with Notre Dame ultimately going on to suffer its first overtime loss since 1999.

Notre Dame opened Sunday's scoring at Buck Shaw Stadium in the 34th minute, on a sequence set up by sophomore forward Michele Weissenhofer as she angled past a group of Stanford players from the left side. Weissenhofer then played a short pass to the top of the penalty area for senior midfielder Susan Pinnick, who quickly sent the ball on to Kerri Hanks near the top of the six-yard box. Hanks then dropped the ball back to Fowlkes and the freshman buried a one-timer from 12 yards out into the left side of the net (33:37).

Freshman goalkeeper Nikki Weiss had a solid showing in her first start with the Irish, with aggressive play on crosses and a huge point-blank save moments before the game-ending PK.

The veteran Stanford squad tied the game early in the second half, after a short Notre Dame goal kick. Christen Press won the ball on the left side and played a pass into the center of the field for Lizzy George. O'Hara was angling into the play and headed the short pass from George. Weiss had come off her line and was able to get her right hand on the shot, but the ball had enough momentum to roll over the endline (51:19).

Stanford left back Marisa Abegg provided the lead pass down the left side, setting up the foul that produced the decisive penalty kick. O'Hara gained some separation as she chased the ball into the left side of the box, with a foul from behind sending the ball to the PK spot. Summers - a fifth-year senior midfielder - stepped forward and sent her try to the lower left corner, with Weiss diving too late as the game ended 2-1 (97:13).

Fowlkes and junior Brittany Bock (who dropped back to a defensive midfielder role in Sunday's game) were named to the SCU Classic alltournament team.

GAME #5 - Sept. 14 #9 Notre Dame 4, Princeton 2

Notre Dame, Ind. – Amanda Cinalli matched her career-high with a fivepoint game (2G-1A) to help the ninth-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team get back on the winning track with a 4-2 victory over Princeton on the opening night of the Inn at Saint Mary's Classic at Alumni Field. The win extended Notre Dame's four-year home unbeaten streak to 43 games (41-0-2). Princeton took the lead on the Irish in the 22nd minute, after a cornerkick scramble, but Cinalli then tied the game four minutes later, just 50 seconds after checking into the Irish midfield. Freshman Lauren Fowlkes set up the score on a cross from the left endline, with Cinalli then sending a shot from the top of the box into the right side of the net for her first goal of the season and 32nd of her four-year career.

Notre Dame finished with a 15-6 shot edge (9-2 in shots on goal) while attempting six of the game's eight corner kicks. The meeting was the first ever between Notre Dame and Princeton.

Notre Dame quickly gained the equalizer in the 26th minute. Fowlkes chased a ball down the left side and won possession away from a Princeton defender before gaining separation for her cross from the left endline. The ball skipped to the top of the 18-yard box and Cinalli showed her veteran poise by drilling a 15-yard shot into the right side of the goal (25:20). The Irish took the lead 15 minutes into the second half, with Cinalli playing a pass down the left side before Hanks struck a low cross from the endline. Weissenhofer was filling the middle and struck a standing header from the center of the six-yard box, with 'keeper Maren Dale leaning the other way as the Irish claimed the 2-1 lead (59:40).

Hanks pushed the lead to 3-1 on a leftside free kick from 35 yards out. The crafty frontrunner opted to send the direct kick straight for the goal, drilling a low shot into the left side for the two-goal cushion (71:21).

Princeton came back to score its own goal on a direct free kick, from a similar distance and also on the left flank. Jen Om lofted her kick into the heart of the penalty area and senior goalkeeper Lauren Karas (who had entered the game 10 minutes earlier) misjudged the ball as it skipped near the top of the six-yard box and carried into the far-right sidenetting (75:07).

The Irish again quickly answered their opponent's score, with the goal set up by Weissenhofer's flip-throw from the right side. Cinalli was on the doorstep and nudged the ball home for the fifth multiple-goal game of her career (76:37).

Notre Dame, Ind. – Sara Jackson's goal 79 seconds into overtime gave the 16th-ranked Oklahoma State women's soccer team a 2-1 win over 9th-ranked Notre Dame, in the final game at the Inn at Saint Mary's Classic. All-tournament selection Siera Strawser opened the scoring in the 22nd minute, after a Notre Dame turnover at the edge of its defensive third. The sophomore midfielder raced free into the left side of the box and launched a 16-yard shot over freshman goalkeeper Nikki Weiss into the far-right side of the net (21:25).

Kerri Hanks tied the game in the 69th minute, scoring directly on a free kick for the second straight game and the fifth time in her Notre Dame

career. The junior forward struck the kick from 25 yards out on the left side, arching the ball around the wall and into the upper right corner of the net for her second goal of the season and 52nd of her Notre Dame career (68:01).

The overtime quickly ended on a counter-attack sequence down the left side. Weiss was able to knock the ball down but the Irish defense again failed to clear the zone, with Jackson rushing in to poke home her fourth goal of the season (91:19).

Piscataway, N.J. – Kerri Hanks scored Notre Dame's first goal and assisted on two more, helping deliver the 10th straight victory for the 13th-ranked Irish (3-1 at Rutgers) while becoming the 19th player in Division-I women's soccer history ever to reach 50 career goals and 50 assists; and the third to do so as a junior. Susan Pinnick continued her strong play by scoring the eventual game-winning goal and Becca Mendoza scored for the third time in the past five games, as the Irish closed strong by holding the Scarlet Knights without a shot on goal over the final 66 minutes of game time.

The Irish limited the Scarlet Knights to a pair of shots on goal (none in the final 66 minutes) and three corner kicks during the game. Rutgers did become the first team to hold a lead on Notre Dame during its winning streak, after a score by Kristen Edmonds in the 20th minute. Jennifer Anzuvino assisted on the goal when she lofted an unusually high cross from the left flank. The cross eluded backpedaling 'keeper Lauren Karas near the far post, with Edmonds in position to score from close range (19:48).

The deficit lasted only 12 minutes, as Hanks was taken down by a slide tackle from behind to set up a penalty kick. Hanks then converted a well-struck shot to the corner of the net (31:15).

The second Irish goal featured more set-play skill from Hanks, who served a leftside free kick from 10 yards in front of the midfield line. The ball found junior center back Carrie Dew's head near the top of the 18-yard box and Dew sent a flick on to the far post. Pinnick ran onto the ball and – with the 'keeper Erin Guthrie charging out – placed her low shot into the center of the goal for the 2-1 lead and eventual gamewinner (37:02).

The third goal was began with Hanks, who broke free down the middle and touched a pass into the left side of the box, with Mendoza then chipping a shot over Guthrie to score inside the near post (70:02).

Morgantown, W. Va. – The ninth-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team pushed its winning streak to 12 games as the Irish struck for a pair of goals in a 38-second span of the first half to provide the only scoring in a 2-0 BIG EAST semifinal win over Georgetown at West Virginia's Dick Dlesk Stadium.

Notre Dame limited Georgetown to a single shot and only two corner kicks during the game. The Irish also did not allow a shot over the final 69 minutes of game time, allowing the 2-0 cushion to hold up for the final score.

The action was fairly even through the first 20 minutes heading into the mandatory break for the television timeout, but the Irish suddenly claimed a 2-0 lead after the hiatus. Brittany Bock completed a classic give-and-go sequence with Kerri Hanks to open the scoring. Bock carried the ball down the middle of the field before sending a lead pass into the left side of the box. Hanks ran onto the ball and returned a cross to the far post, with Bock in position for the routine header (24:16).

Moments after the goal by Bock, sophomore midfielder Courtney Rosen received the ball from junior left back Elise Weber on the left flank. The left-footed Rosen turned towards the top corner of the box and drove the ball with her right foot, sending a quick-moving cross to the far side of the penalty area. Freshman Rose Augustin was angling in from the right and struck the ball off her shoulder, redirecting the cross inside the near right post for her fifth goal of the season and a 2-0 lead. The scores by Bock and Augustin represented the fourth-quickest back-to-back postseason goals in school history.

Morgantown, W.Va. – Kerri Hanks extended her point streak to 12 games with a goal in the 14th minute, but host West Virginia tied the score late in the first half and the teams ultimately battled through 110 minutes for a 1-1 tie in the BIG EAST Conference championship game. WVU goalkeeper Kerri Butler then saved Notre Dame's first try in the penalty-kick shootout and the Mountaineers went on to earn the championship trophy, 5-3 on penalty kicks (although the game is recorded as a tie).

The Irish allowed two shots on goal by the Mountaineers in the game's first five minutes but Notre Dame yielded only one shot on goal over the final 105 minutes - with that shot on goal coming when WVU tied the game in the 39th minute.

Sophomore midfielder Courtney Rosen picked up an assist for the second time in as many games, after making a run down an open space in the center of the field before chipping the ball with her left foot (from 40 yards out). Hanks raced towards the ball into the right side of the box, with WVU senior outside back Greer Barnes tracking back while Butler was making a late charge off her line. Hanks made a high stab at the bouncing ball and toe-poked the ball with her right foot, sending a slow dribbler in the opposite direction and into the net as Barnes and Butler could only watch as the Irish took the early lead (13:25).

The game was a physical battle that featured several exciting runs up the field - and a few near-misses - from each team. West Virginia was able to get the equalizer six minutes before halftime. Kim Bonilla provided the 40-yard service on a right-flank free kick and Carolyn Blank elevated for a header on the left side of the six-yard box, as the cross narrowly avoided the attempted punch from goalkeeper Lauren Karas. Blank's sharp header went into the heart of the box and a trailing Kiley Harris deposited a diving header into the vacated net for the 1-1 score (38:25).

Both teams had chances to claim the lead in the second half, but the Irish then dominated the overtime, with five shots (three on goal) and two corner kicks in that 20-minute span (WVU had no shots or corners overtime). The biggest save of the day came with five minutes left in the second overtime, as Notre Dame's Amanda Cinalli chipped a 10-yard shot that was headed for the right-sidenetting – but Butler leaped to her left and made the tumbling save, helping send the game to the decisive shootout.

Notre Dame, Ind. – Brittany Bock scored twice and Kerri Hanks assisted on all three goals as the Irish posted a 3-0 win over Loyola-Chicago in the first round of the NCAA Championship at Alumni Field.

Notre Dame, Ind. – The Notre Dame women's soccer team extended its unbeaten streak to 15 games while advancing in the NCAA Tournament with a 2-0 victory over Illinois.

Senior Amanda Cinalli and sophomore Michele Weissenhofer stepped up to the occasion by combining on the first goal midway through the opening laff. Junior forward Kerri Hanks then forced an own-goal with her cross from the right side, giving the Irish a 2-0 lead shortly before the intermission.

The hosts played a strong first half and dominated possession while creating several strong scoring chances. The first goal came in the 27th minute, on a play set up by sophomore Amanda Clark (who had checked into the game moments earlier). Clark played a ball forward to Cinalli, who ripped a shot from outside the top right corner of the box. Chapel Hill, N.C. – Sophomore forward Michele Weissenhofer and senior goalkeeper Lauren Karas led the way with multiple clutch plays, as the 11th-ranked Notre Dame women's soccer team emerged with a hard-fought 3-2 victory in a classic NCAA round-of-16 game at fourth-ranked North Carolina.

Weissenhofer's rightside flip-throw assisted on Brittany Bock's 15th goal of the season in the 13th minute of play, but the score then quickly changed to 2-0 before the spirited contingent of Irish fans had settled back into their seats at Fetzer Field. North Carolina turned over possession on the ensuing kickoff and Kerri Hanks fired the ball back towards the UNC penalty area, with Weissenhofer alertly chasing the play and driving a low shot into the vacated net after the Tar Heels' goalkeeper mishandled the bouncing ball. The goals came only 14 seconds apart, representing the quickest back-to-back scores in NCAA Championship history.

North Carolina jumped right back in the game early in the second half when Allie Long sent home a penalty kick. The chance occurred when a pass was cut back into the top of the box for junior midfielder Yael Averbuch. With Averbuch preparing to crack one of her deadly shots, sophomore midfielder Courtney Rosen slanted over and appeared to deflect the bouncing ball off her shoulder. A hand-ball was called and UNC was awarded a penalty kick. Long placed the shot into the left side of the goal for a 2-1 game (46:05).

But Weissenhofer struck again on a breakaway in the 61st minute as UNC's three-player back line was pushed up high but Weissenhofer sprinted free on the left side, beating the offside trap and outracing Robin Gayle to Rosen's through-ball. The 'keeper Harris came off her line to challenge but Weissenhofer used her natural left foot to send a 15-yard shot into the right sidenetting, restoring the two-goal cushion (60:19).

UNC again battled back as fifth-year center back Jessica Maxwell struck the ball from 40 yards out on the left side. The service bounced in the center of the penalty area and Karas elected to stay back on her line, with UNC's Washington then rushing in and leaping for a header that looped over the keeper to make it 3-2 (69:18).

Karas twice saved dangerous second-half shots by Washington (in the 66th and 86th minutes), with the first coming when she went down to her right and pushed a low shot around the post. With the clock ticking under 30 seconds remaining, UNC had a quick counter-attack chance down the center of the field. Nogueira was racing free into the attacking third but the battle-tested Karas made the decision to charge out to the top of the box. With the 'keeper approaching, Nogueira tried a shot from just outside the top of the box. Karas was sliding forward but was able to reach up and deflect the ball, with the Irish defense then getting the clear before watching the final 24 seconds tick off the clock.

Notre Dame, Ind. – The nation's premier forward trio was on display at Alumni Field, as Kerri Hanks, Brittany Bock and Michele Weissenhofer dazzled a spirited and hearty crowd while combining for all of the Notre Dame women's soccer team's goals and a pair of assists, in a hard-fought 3-2 NCAA quarterfinal win over visiting Duke. The Irish claimed a 2-0 lead early in the second half only to see the determined visitors quickly tie the game with a pair of goals in a span of five minutes. But the decisive score came in the 78th minute, after Hanks took a pass from Amanda Cinalli and sent home the final goal on a shot from the right edge of the box.

Duke nearly became the first team to take the lead on Notre Dame during the 2007 postseason, after getting an early counter-attack chance down the right side of the field. CJ Ludemann had a good angle for her shot from the top right corner of the box, but Karas had come off her line and dove to her right to make the huge save in the game's fifth minute.

The Blue Devils would have only two shots on goal the rest of the night, but both of them found the net when the game quickly became tied. Notre Dame finished the game with a 15-8 edge in total shots, 8-3 in shots on goal and 7-2 in corner kicks.

Hanks registered her 19th assist of the season and 56th of her three-year career in the game's 20th minute, after playing the ball to Bock, who quickly urned and charged down the center of the field before threading a pass into the top of the penalty area. The leftfooted Weissenhofer received the ball with pressure but was able to squire free on the left side before driving a low, rightfooted shot past the charging 'keeper and into the right side of the net (19-30).

Several frustrating near-goals in the first half nearly came back to haunt the Irish, despite adding the goal by Bock shortly after halftime. Hanks provided the corner-kick service on an outswinger from the right flag and Bock leaped high with Lipsher just a couple feet off the goal line, and struck a header that carried squarely under the center of the crossbar (51:39).

Duke jumped back in the game by capitalizing on a corner-kick rebound sequence that included the initial service from Jane Alukonis before Ludemann worked the ball to Hathorn in the middle of the box. The resulting shot into the lower right corner of the goal (57:55) cut the deficit in half but the game would be tied just a few minutes later.

Short passes from Elisabeth Redmon and Alukonis set up Ludemann for her shot from outside the top right corner of the box. Ludemann had enough space to uncork a shot that bent into the far-left sidenetting for her fifth goal of the season (62:17).

Cinalli's 36th career assist proved to be a huge play, as she beat a pair of Duke defenders to the ball outside the top of the penalty area and played Hanks down the right side. Hanks took the pass in stride and made a couple quick touches before launching a slipping shot that was headed for the far post. Weissenhofer was being marked tightly as she made a near-post run and slid in at the top of the six-yard box. The ball then appeared to skip past Weissenhofer, the defender and Lipsher carried on into the net for the gamewinner (77:35).

#14 Florida State 3, #11 Notre Dame 2

College Station, Texas – Amanda DaCosta's goal in the 72nd minute proved to be the difference in a back-and-forth NCAA semifinal battle at the Aggie Soccer Complex, as 14th-ranked Florida State edged 11th-ranked Notre Dame in an exciting 3-2 rematch of the previous year's semifinal.

Notre Dame came one win shy of posting its fifth straight season with 20-plus wins, despite owning a 16-7 shot edge and a decisive 7-1 margin in corner kicks. One of those corner kicks led to the first Irish goal, when Carrie Dew volleyed in a leftside service from fellow junior Kerri Hanks. Elise Weber's rocket shot into the upper-left corner of the net later tied the game but DaCosta scored the gamewinner, on a thru-ball sequence that was similar to the first two FSU goals.

The Seminoles scored one of the quickest goals in NCAA Championship history, as DaCosta set up Mami Yamaguchi for a score just 15 seconds into the game. FSU cashed in a turnover right after the kickoff, with DaCosta cutting down the center of the field before sliding a pass into the top of the box. Yamaguchi ran onto the pass and swept the ball past charging 'keeper Lauren Karas for her 24th goal of the season and the early 1-0 lead.

Notre Dame gained the game's first equalizer in the 15th minute, after Hanks sent an inswinger from the left flag. Dew was stationed at the far side of the six-yard box and the talented center back smacked a sharp volley that deflected off a FSU defender and into the net for her second goal of the season and sixth of her career (30:44).

Notre Dame was controlling possession and quality scoring chances for the balance of the first half when the Seminoles retook the lead. FSU's first corner kick of the game helped set up the score, as the Irish failed to clear their zone and it proved costly. Yamaguchi had the thru-ball from the left side of the field and Finland native Sanna Talonen broke free into the box, with Dew anticipating an offside call. Karas again charged out but Talonen placed a shot that snuck inside the far-right post (32:22).

The Notre Dame offense came out firing in the first 10 minutes of the second half, most notably in the 48th minute when a partial breakaway saw junior Brittany Bock flare a perfect lead pass for Hanks into the right side of the box. Hanks ripped a shot but 'keeper Erin McNulty came up with the sliding save off her foot to maintain the 2-1 cushion.

Two strong chances followed on rightside corner kicks from Hanks, but Michele Weissenhofer and Dew both narrowly missed on header tries from close range.

Weber's first goal of the postseason tied the game in the 56th minute. The junior left back was holding the ball near the top left corner of the box before suddenly sliding to her right and uncorking a rightfooted shot that hooked into the upper-left corner of the net for the second tie of the game (55:32).

The final 20 minutes provided a tense battle for the deciding goal, with Talonen ultimately making the big play as she shook free of an Irish defender and tapped a thru-ball into the top of the box. DaCosta raced in and slipped her shot under the charging Karas, with the ball ending up in the left side of the net for her sixth goal of the season (71:30). Dew then had a chance to te the game with six minutes remaining, but her corner-kick header went over the crossbar.

2008 Notre Dame Schedule and Opponent Notes

- Notre Dame's 2008 schedule (including exhibitions) features nine teams with '07 NCAA Tournament experience, led by quarterfinalists Duke and Connecticut. Three other opponents reached the round-of-16 (North Carolina, Penn State and Virginia), while four more were first-round entrants (Memphis, Louisville, Santa Clara and Georgetown).
- The Irish enter their 19th season at Alumni Field with a 204-16-4 record (.920) at the facility, including 181-12-4 (.929) in the past 197 home games. Notre Dame's all-time home record versus teams not ranked in the NSCAA Top 25 is 140-4-1 (.969).
- · Notre Dame heads into the 2008 season riding a 79-game unbeaten streak (78-0-1) in home games versus BIG EAST Conference teams (dating back to a 5-4 loss to Connecticut in 1995), with a 340-22 scoring edge, 58 shutouts and 20 games with one goal allowed in that 79-game streak (only one opponent in the streak has managed multiple goals in a game versus the Irish).
- Dating back to the start of the 1993 season, Notre Dame is 46-4-0 (.920) versus first-time visitors to Alumni Field, with Loyola Marymount and South Florida slated to make their first visits in 2008. The Irish are 28-3-0 in all series openers (regardless of site) during the Randy Waldrum era, dating back to 1999. Loyola Marymount is the lone first-time opponent on Notre Dame's schedule this season.
- Notre Dame is 17-2-1 in season openers, including a seven-game unbeaten streak (6-0-1). The Irish have also posted a 13-1-1 mark to open the past 15 seasons.
- Notre Dame owns a 119-33-8 all-time record (.769) in tournament action, including 43-17-6 (.697) in regular-season tournaments (24-4-2 at home), 33-2-1 in conference tournaments and 43-14-1 in the NCAAs. Since 1994, the Irish are 31-10-3 in regular-season tournaments (with 22 of those wins coming against ranked teams).
- · Some of Notre Dame's top regular-season tournament wins have included: 2-0 vs. #3 Stanford ('95), 2-1 vs. #1 North Carolina ('96, at Duke), 5-0 vs. #5 Duke ('97), 6-1 vs. #2 Santa Clara ('00, 2-1 vs. #8 Penn State ('00), 5-2 vs. #4 SCU ('04), 4-1 vs. #11 Florida ('05) and 3-1 vs. #2 Santa Clara ('06).
- In 2008, Notre Dame will face Santa Clara, North Carolina and Duke in the same season for the fifth time in program history (1995, '96, '99, 2007). Last season Notre Dame suffered an early defeat at Santa Clara before knocking out both UNC and Duke in the NCAAs. This season will mark the first time the Irish will play all three of those teams in regular season action since 1999. It also represents the first time Notre Dame will play Santa Clara, UNC and Duke in succession since the 1995 season.
- Notre Dame will host the BIG EAST Tournament for the third time. In the previous two seasons the Irish have hosted (1996 & 2000), Notre Dame has defeated Connecticut in the title game. This year's conference semifinals and final are set for Nov. 7 &~9at Alumni Field

The BIG EAST Conference

The 2008-09 academic year will be the 30th for The BIG EAST Conference. While the league has gone through membership changes since its birth, it has never been stronger. This academic year will mark the conference's fourth year as the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The goals of the BIG EAST have never changed. The league aims and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship. The student-athletes of the member schools continue to maintain the league's proud tradition of success.

BIG EAST teams earned their share of recognition at the highest levels in 2007-08. Four women's teams advanced to their respective NCAA Final Fours: Connecticut field hockey and women's basketball, Notre Dame soccer and Syracuse lacrosse.

Individually in men's sports, Villanova's Bobby Curtis was the NCAA outdoor track champion in the 5,000 meters. Connecticut's O'Brian White won the M.A.C. Hermann Trophy, the highest individual honor in soccer. Two years ago, BIG EAST male and female student-athletes were Hermann Trophy winners.

In men's basketball, the BIG EAST tied its own record set in 2006 by earning eight NCAA Championship bids. BIG EAST women's teams have received eight NCAA invitations in each of the past two years. The combined 16 men's and women's berths in 2008 was an NCAA first.

The quality of BIG EAST football has never been more balanced. Six of the league's eight squads were nationally ranked in 2007. For the third straight year, the BIG EAST representative in the Bowl Championship Series won its BCS bowl game.

The BIG EAST continued to produce student-athletes who were at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. Nineteen BIG EAST players were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams, including eight firstteam selections.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A group in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 25 national championships in six different sports and 125 student-athletes have won individual national titles

The BIG EAST has always been able to boast that some of its best students are also some of its best athletes. More than 370 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors. Last year in football, Louisville quarterback Brian Brohm, who finished his career as the BIG EAST's career passing leader, was one of the league's eight first-team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America team picks.

Also, Connecticut's Rebecca Lobo, one of the most heralded women's basketball players in the history of the sport, was named to the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame in 2008. Lobo, a two-time BIG EAST Player of the Year, led the Huskies to the 1995 NCAA national championship.

The BIG EAST has enjoyed tremendous basketball success, especially in this decade. In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 10 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken five of the last nine NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In the spring of 2001, the BIG EAST added women's lacrosse and rowing to its growing list of sports. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003. In 2007, the league conducted its first women's lacrosse championship tournament. In 2009-10, the BIG EAST will begin sponsorship of men's lacrosse, its 24th sport

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse Universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based

programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization needs outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

For 2009-10, the BIG EAST will undergo one significant change. Transphese has announced that he will step down from his position on June 30, 2009.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant in soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last six summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes



BIG EAST Championship Notes

Notre Dame once again will serve as the host site for the BIG EAST women's soccer championship weekend, with the 2008 semifinals to be played at Alumni Field on Friday, Nov. 7, and the title game on Sunday, Nov. 9 (television coverage TBD). The quarterfinal matchups will be held on the home sites of the top four finishers in the regular-season standings, following a pair of first-round games between the fourth and fifth-place finishers from opposing division.

Alumni Field is one of seven venues used in the 16-year history of the BIG EAST women's soccer championship. The BIG EAST tournament was previously held at Notre Dame in 1996 and 2000, with the Irish winning the championship on both occasions. All-time results include:





The Notre Dame women's soccer teams have played at Alumni Field since 1990. Located in the southeast corner of campus, it is one of the finest collegiate soccer venues in the Midwest with a seating capacity of 2,500. A press box was added in 1996.

Located on the southeast corner of campus, Alumni Field sits in the heart of Notre Dame's impressive physical plant. It combines with Eck Stadium (baseball), Melissa Cook Stadium (softball), the Guglielmino Athletics Complex (football) and the Courtney Tennis Center/Eck Tennis Pavilion to give Notre Dame some of the finest Olympic sport venues in college athletics.

In 18 seasons at Alumni Field, the Notre Dame's women's soccer program has posted a 204-16-4 (.920) record and is 181-12-4 (.929) in its last 197 games at the facility - including previous home winning streaks of 28, 29 and 32 games (three of the longest in NCAA history). The Irish also had a 43game home unbeaten streak (41-0-2) from 2004-07, with that run also standing third in the NCAA record books. Notre Dame has lost more than one home game in a season just four times in 18 years at Alumni Field, with eight unbeaten seasons at home in the past 15.

The Irish have played host to NCAA championship games in each of the previous 14 seasons, compiling a 34-3-0 record and 122-21 scoring edge in those 37 games. Alumni Field also will host the BIG EAST Conference Championship for the third time in 2008. Notre Dame won the conference title in the tournament's first two visits (1996 and 2000).

Notre Dame also will play host to the 15th edition of the Inn at Saint Mary's Classic, which has been played almost annually at Alumni Field since 1992 (the exception being in 1994). Santa Clara, West Virginia and Loyola Marymount will join the Irish in this year's field, with tournament play getting underway on Friday, Aug. 29, when SCU and WVU tangle at 5 p.m. (ET), before Notre Dame meets LMU in the nightcap (7:30 p.m.). On Sunday, Aug. 31, WVU meets LMU at 11 a.m., followed by the Irish and SCU at 1:30 p.m.

New Soccer Stadium

A new era in Notre Dame soccer began on April 26, 2008, when groundbreaking ceremonies were held for the brand-new \$5.7 million home for Fighting Irish women's and men's soccer.

Actual construction work on the stadium began in the summer of 2008, with a tentative completion date of June 2009. The site for the soccer facility is southeast of the Joyce Center and directly south of new LaBar Football Practice Fields, which debuted in August 2008.

Plans for the stadium include a lighted facility that will feature a natural grass field, locker rooms,

restrooms and concession areas. The new soccer stadium will sit side-by-side Notre Dame's new lacrosse facility, Arlotta Stadium, for which ground was broken on April 18, 2008 (the soccer facility will be situated further west, the lacrosse stadium further east).

The soccer project is part of the University's long-term athletics facilities master plan that ultimately will add new stadiums for soccer, lacrosse, track and field, and tennis, all in the area east and southeast of the Joyce Center. Besides the LaBar Fields, the most recently completed venue is Melissa Cook Stadium, Notre Dame's new softball facility that was dedicated earlier in April 2008. Other future elements of the athletics facilities master plan include a new rowing boathouse on the St. Joseph River, as well as the construction of Purcell Pavilion (basketball/volleyball) and Lefty Smith Rink (hockey), the cornerstones of

an extensive Joyce Center renovation that will begin in September 2008.

Among those present at the groundbreaking ceremonies for the new Notre Dame soccer stadium were lead benefactors and former Fighting Irish men's soccer players Tom Crotty and Rob Snyder, along with Notre Dame deputy athletics director Missy Conboy, women's soccer coach Randy Waldrum, men's soccer coach Bobby Clark and players from both the Fighting Irish women's and men's soccer teams

Originally from Darien, Conn., Crotty starred for the Irish from 1977-79, playing midfield and fullback in 60 games, earning three monograms and finishing with 23 career points (eight goals, seven assists). He played in Notre Dame's first three seasons of varsity soccer (under coach Rich Hunter), serving as one of the team captains as a senior in '79. He was voted MVP of the '79 Notre Dame team and led the Irish to a combined 57-14-3 record in those three years.

A 1980 Notre Dame graduate with a degree in finance, Crotty is currently general partner with Battery Ventures LP in Wellesley, Mass. He and his wife Shari live in Southborough, Mass.

From Dallas, Texas, Snyder earned two monograms while playing forward, participating in 51 games in 1980-81-83 and accounting for 68 points (23 goals - and 22 assists that rank him seventh on Notre Dame's career chart). He tied for the team lead in goals in 1981 with 12. Snyder played on Hunter-coached teams that finished a combined 54-14-3 in his three seasons (including 35-3-1 at home).

Snyder is a 1984 Notre Dame graduate with a degree in government. He is the founder and CEO of Stream Energy in Dallas.

The gifts by Crotty and Snyder are components of the \$1.5 billion "Spirit of Notre Dame" capital campaign, the largest such endeavor in the history of Catholic higher education.

Irish Soccer History

The Notre Dame women's soccer team celebrated the program's 20th season as a varsity program in 2007, with the past two decades firmly establishing the Irish as one of the nation's elite programs:

- Notre Dame in 2004 became the second Division I women's soccer program ever to win multiple NCAA titles. The Irish also own the second-most appearances in the NCAA title game (six) and have advanced to the NCAA College Cup final weekend nine times since 1994 (second-most in the nation over that span).
- The Irish own a 44-13-1 overall record in NCAA Tournament play, the second-best NCAA winning percentage (.767) in Division I.
- Midfielders Cindy Daws (1996) and Anne Makinen (2000) combined to make Notre Dame the second women's team ever to produce multiple winners of the prestigious Hermann Trophy/Missouri Athletic Club Award. Forward Kerri Hanks then became the youngest player male or female ever to receive the M.A.C/Hermann awards (in 2006, as a sophomore), with Notre Dame again joining North Carolina as the only women's teams with three-plus different Hermann Trophy recipients.
- Notre Dame's total of 39 NSCAA All-Americans over the past 14 seasons ('94-'07) is second-most in the nation and includes three rare four-year All-Americans: midfielders Holly Manthei and Makinen and defender Ien Grubb.
- The program's excellence extends to the classroom, as Notre Dame women's soccer players have combined for official CoSIDA Academic All-America honors 20

Notre Dame Women's Soccer Compiles Two Decades of Wide-Reaching Success

times over the past 13 years (no other team has more than 14 Academic All-Americans in that span). Four Irish players - Jen Renola, Jenny Streiffer, Monica Gonzalez and current senior midfielder/forward Brittany Bock - have coupled All-America and Academic All-America honors during their careers while Vanessa Pruzinsky and Erika Bohn are two of only six Division I players ever to be three-year Academic All-Americans. Pruzinsky became just the third chemical engineering major at Notre Dame (first since the early 1970s) ever to graduate with a 4.0 cumulative grade-point average. The women's soccer program's widespread academic excellence also included some of the top semester GPAs in the entire Notre Dame athletics department during the 2007-08 school year (3.32 team GPA in the 2007 fall semester, 3.34 in the '08 spring term).

• Several Notre Dame players have filled leading roles with full national teams – including Kate (Sobrero) Markgraf, Shannon Boxx and LaKeysia Beene with the United States and three others with Team Canada (Candace Chapman, Katie Thorlakson and Melissa Tancredi), plus Gonzalez and Monica Gerardo as founding members of the Mexican National Team, current Mexico player Rebecca Mendoza and Scandinavian standouts Makinen (Finland) and Gudrun Gunnarsdottir (Iceland).

• The NCAA record book is populated by numerous Notre Dame players, most notably: Manthei (record total of 129 career assists), Streiffer (joins UNC alum Mia Hamm as only D-I players to reach 70 career goals and 70 assists), Thorlakson (23G-24A in 2004, only Hamm has totaled more goals and more assists in the same season), Hanks (joined Hamm as only players ever to lead the nation in goals and assists in the same season) and Renola (third with 8,111 career minutes played; member of 11-player NCAA 25-year anniversary team).

Here's a closer look at yearly highlights for Notre Dame women's soccer's first 20 seasons:

1988

Sept. 1 – Head coach **Dennis** Grace leads Notre Dame to a 5-1 victory over IU-South Bend in the Notre Dame women's soccer program's first game, with **Mimi Suba** scoring the first goal in the program's history at 32:01.

Sept. 6 – Susie Zilvitis notches the program's first hat trick, in the first half of an 8-1 victory over St. Joseph's

Sept. 18 – Notre Dame and goalkeeper Karma **Spencer** register the team's first shutout, 5-0 over Western Michigan.

1989

Oct. 10 – The Irish set a scoring record in a 17-0 win over Tri-State. Margaret Jarc – who later would serve as one of the team's assistant coaches – comes off the bench to net the hat trick as Notre Dame scores eight first-half goals.

1990

Sept. 2 – The Irish take the field for the first time under their second head coach, Chris Petrucelli. Notre Dame responds by registering a 5-1 win over Northeast Missouri, with Zilvitis and Marianne Giolitto each scoring twice

Sept. 19 – Sporting a 3-2 record, the Irish make the program's first appearance in the Midwest region rankings (in the 10th spot).

Oct. 28 – Notre Dame posts its first win over a ranked opponent, 4-0 versus 24th-ranked Xavier to conclude the season. The Irish finish 16-3-1, with losses to Duke, UNC-Greensboro and Creighton.

1991

Oct. 15 – The four-year-old Irish program earns its first national ranking (16th) thanks to a 10-0-2 start before finishing the season 15-2-3 with the national ranking of 16th in the ISAA coaches poll.

1992

Oct. 17 – Notre Dame loses to 6th-ranked SMU, 3-1, to fall to 8-5-1. All five Irish losses at that point had come versus top-20 teams.

Oct. 30 – Notre Dame clinches its second straight Midwestern Collegiate Conference title with a 2-1 win at Xavier.

1993

Sept. 19 – Notre Dame defeats 4th-ranked William & Mary 1-0 at Alumni Field, marking the highest-ranked opponent the Irish had beaten in the program's six-year history.

Sept. 29 – The Irish defeat Wright State to open the season 9-0 and win their 14th straight, dating back to 1992. Freshman standout **Daws** registers a point in her ninth straight game.

Nov. 6 – Notre Dame defeats Xavier 4-0 to win the inaugural MCC Tournament. The Irish finish the regular season ranked third nationally and make their first NCAA appearance.

Nov. 13 – Notre Dame drops a 2-1 decision to George Mason in Madison, Wis., in the first round of the NCAAs. The Patriots eventually advance to the national title game.

1994

Sept. 11 – Jodi Hartwig scores with four minutes remaining in regulation to force a tie with 10th-ranked William & Mary, 2-2. Notre Dame falls behind 3-2 in the first overtime but scores twice in the second OT, as

the 4-3 gamewinner is scored by Michelle McCarthy with 0:25 left.

Oct. 2 - The Irish end North Carolina's record-setting 92-game winning streak, 0-0 in St. Louis, as Renola faces 25 shots with a career-high 11 saves. The tie marks the third time that an Irish team had broken a long winning streak, joining the 1957 football team that ended Oklahoma's 44-game winning streak and the 1974 basketball team that stopped UCLA's 88game streak.

Oct. 24 - Following a pair of Irish wins over Ohio State and Detroit, coupled with a North Carolina loss to Duke, Notre Dame is voted the nation's No. 1 team by both the ISAA coaches poll and Soccer America, marking the first time in over three seasons that a team other than UNC was in the top spot. Notre Dame also goes on to finish the regular season as the nation's topranked team.

Nov. 6 - Notre Dame claims its final MCC tournament title with a 5-1 win over Butler.

Nov. 12 - Goals by Tiffany Thompson and Hartwig break a 1-1 tie in the program's first NCAA tournament win, 3-1 over George Mason.

Nov. 18 - A Sobrero score off a Manthei corner kick is the only goal of the game, as Notre Dame beats host Portland 1-0 and advances to the NCAA championship game for the first time in the program's history.

Nov. 20 - The much-anticipated rematch of the scoreless tie in St. Louis ends up a 5-0 North Carolina victory, as the Tar Heels win their 12th NCAA championship with a four-goal second half.

1995 (also see pp. 110 and 112-113)

Sept. 2 - The Irish open with the first BIG EAST Conference game for any Notre Dame team. McCarthy and Gerardo both score twice and Boxx has three assists in a 7-0 win over Providence.

Oct. 15 - A rematch with the nine-time defending NCAA champ ends with another Tar Heels shutout of the Irish, in Houston. UNC doubles the Irish in shots, 16-8, in a 2-0 win ... but the teams would have yet another rematch in the NCAAs seven weeks later.

Nov. 5 - Notre Dame claims the BIG EAST title with a 1-0 win over third-ranked Connecticut (at Rutgers). The Irish avenge an earlier 5-4 overtime loss to the Huskies on Oct. 6 (at Alumni Field), which had been Notre Dame's first home loss since October 4, 1992 (through the last season, that also remains the only home loss ever for the Irish versus a BIG EAST opponent). South Bend area native Amy VanLaecke scores the game's only goal, her second of the tournament, and is named tournament MVP.

Nov. 19 - The Irish begin their NCAA run with a 5-0 win over Wisconsin at Alumni Field, as Boxx scores the final three Notre Dame goals for a hat trick in her first NCAA

Nov. 26 - Notre Dame shuts out UConn for the second time in three weeks (2-0, at Alumni Field), with goals from Julie Vogel and VanLaecke helping send the Irish to the NCAA semifinals for the second consecutive year.

Dec. 1 - A Fetzer Field crowd of 7.212. then an NCAA record is stunned as Notre Dame shocks the home team North Carolina 1-0, to advance to the championship game. An own-goal scored by the Tar Heels is followed by 70 minutes of outstanding Irish defense, as UNC suffers its first NCAA loss since 1985 and only its second ever at home. Notre Dame's first win over North Carolina sends the Irish to the NCAA final for the sec-

Dec. 3 - Sister schools Notre Dame and Portland meet in the NCAAs for the second straight year, battling into a third overtime before Daws slips a direct kick past the goalkeeper at 125:31, for a 1-0 win that ends the first overtime game ever in an NCAA final. The Irish punctuate their earlier upset of the Tar Heels by becoming only the third team to win the NCAA women's soccer title. Renola finishes the weekend having saved all 10 shots she faced in the two games.

ond consecutive season.

Sept. 22 - Notre Dame's first trip to Storrs is a successful one as the Irish avenge one of their two 1995 defeats with a 2-1 win over 4th-ranked Connecticut.

Oct. 4 - Another highly-anticipated game with topranked UNC ends in a 2-1 overtime win for 2ndranked Notre Dame. Freshman sensation Streiffer becomes the first Notre Dame player to score against the Tar Heels after knocking in two goals, as the Irish become the only team to win in consecutive games against UNC while joining Connecticut as the only collegiate teams ever to defeat the Tar Heels twice (at any time).

Oct. 13 - Off to its best start in school history at 13-0-0 and riding a winning streak of 24 games, Notre Dame is brought back to earth as an inspired 9thranked Santa Clara team defeats the top-ranked Irish, 3-1. Despite the loss, Notre Dame remains atop the national polls.

Nov. 10 - Tournament MVP Daws leads the Irish to their second BIG EAST title to go along with the 1996 BIG EAST regular-season title, after a 4-3 title-game win over UConn at Alumni Field.

Dec. 6 - Three goals over a span of 14 minutes in the second half help Notre Dame rally from a 2-0 deficit for a 3-2 semifinal win over Portland, in Santa Clara, Calif. The Pilots stun the Irish with a goal 1:40 into the game and another at 29:42 - but Notre Dame strikes quickly in the second half with goals from Boxx, VanLaecke and Gerardo, against a team that had allowed just seven prior to the semifinals.

Dec. 8 - Making its third straight appearance in the NCAA final, Notre Dame faces North Carolina in another classic overtime battle. The Tar Heels outshoot the Irish 18-7 but Renola makes several remarkable saves. UNC's Debbie Keller ends Notre Dame's hopes for a second straight NCAA title, with her goal at

Daws is honored after the season with the prestigious Hermann Trophy and M.A.C. Player of the Year Award, plus the Honda Broderick Cup (honoring her as the nation's top female collegiate athlete).

Sept. 19 - Notre Dame welcomes North Carolina to Alumni Field for the first time and the teams play to a 2-2 tie, as the game is halted at 71:16 due to lightning. The evenly-played game sees each team take 11 shots. Makinen puts the Irish up early at 22:28 before the Tar Heels score at 52:15 and 62:38. Jenny Heft ties the game at 68:10, three minutes before lightning halted play.

Nov. 9 - The Irish take a 5-0 halftime lead and cruise to a 6-1 win over Connecticut to win their third BIG EAST title. Makinen's hat trick earns her most outstanding player honors.

Nov. 29 - Notre Dame caps the run to its fourth straight NCAA semifinal with an 8-0 home win over UCLA. The Irish outscore their first three NCAA opponents (Cincinnati, Nebraska and UCLA) by a score of 21-1.

Dec. 5 - The Irish outshoot UConn 28-6 but hit the post three times, the crossbar twice and have another shot saved off the line by a defender as the Huskies upset the Irish 2-1, at the NCAA semifinals in Greensboro, N.C. The first loss for Notre Dame in four NCAA semifinals sees Sarah Whalen score on UConn's first shot (41:01) and again at 64:37 before Streiffer's diving header from Manthei's cross caps the scoring in the 77th minute.

Sept. 13 - Second-ranked Notre Dame returns to Fetzer Field for the first time since winning the 1995 NCAA title and opens with a goal in the first minute against top-ranked North Carolina. The Tar Heels allow the Irish just two shots the rest of the game while winning 5-1 in front of 6,024, the largest crowd ever to watch a regular-season women's soccer game.

Oct. 18 - Two days after Connecticut snapped Notre Dame's NCAA-record 36-game conference win streak with a 1-1 tie in front of 2,508 fans at UConn's Morrone Stadium, another streak falls as unranked Seton Hall wins 3-2 in overtime - the first BIG EAST loss for the Irish since 1995 and their first loss to an unranked team in 183 games (dating back to a 2-0 defeat to Creighton on Oct. 6, 1990).

Nov. 8 - A triumphant return to Morrone Stadium sees the Irish blank the Huskies for their fourth BIG EAST title (1-0), in front of 2,333. Makinen scores in the 82nd minute to repeat as the championship's MVP.

Nov. 28 - The fifth-seeded Portland Pilots avenge five consecutive losses to the Irish, beating 4th-seeded and host Notre Dame 2-1 in the NCAA quarterfinals. Jenny Heft ties the game in the 73rd minute but the visitors advance, thanks to a goal in the 88th minute.

Feb. 3 - Waldrum becomes the program's third head coach, after leading Baylor's 1998 team to the NCAA second round in only the third year of the pro-

Sept. 3 - In the first game of the Waldrum era, the Irish lead top-ranked North Carolina 2-1 with under 3:00 remaining in the second half (thanks to a goal by Mia Sarkesian) - but the Tar Heels send the game to overtime on their way to a 3-2, double-OT win.

Nov. 7 - Streiffer is named the championship's most outstanding player as the Irish win their fifth BIG EAST title, 4-2, beating Connecticut in the final for the fifth

Irish Soccer History

Nov. 28 - The longest game in Notre Dame women's soccer history results in an NCAA quarterfinal shootout at 4th-ranked Nebraska, after four OTs and 150 total minutes yielded a 1-1 tie. Unlikely hero Kelly Lindsey hits Notre Dame's kick in the first extra round, following each team making 3-of-5. LaKeysia Beene follows with a save to send the Irish to the NCAA semifinals for the fifth straight year.

Dec. 3 - Wearing green jerseys for the first time since 1995, the Irish overcome a 17-3 shot deficit to shut out top-ranked and undefeated Santa Clara in the College Cup semifinals (1-0), after an earlier 4-2 loss to the Broncos in the 1999 regular season. Freshman Ali Lovelace scores in the 75th minute, as Notre Dame knocks off the Broncos in their own backyard (San Jose) and advances to its fourth NCAA final in six years. Beene is the clear player of the game, with seven saves and several other plays in which she snuffed out prime SCU scoring chances.

Dec. 5 - North Carolina ends 5th-seeded Notre Dame's run in the title game (2-0), with the Tar Heels becoming the first team to beat the Irish twice in one

Sept. 8 - The fourth-ranked Irish enjoy one of their widest victory margins ever against a high-ranked opponent, with coach Jerry Smith of 2nd-ranked Santa Clara praising midfield standout Makinen as "the best overall player in college soccer" (a status she later lives up to as the consensus 2000 national player of the year). Meotis Erikson and Amy Warner score for an early 2-1 lead and freshman Amanda Guertin adds a key breakaway in the 74th minute while Makinen finishes with a goal and a pair of assists.

Sept. 17 - The Irish reclaim the nation's top ranking after holding on for a 1-0 win at Portland, with Erikson's 50th career goal coming on a sharply-struck 18-yard shot, via a cross from her classmate Makinen. Erikson - who also scored two days earlier in the 4-0 win over Washington- is named offensive MVP of the Portland Invitational while Kerri Bakker is the tournament's defensive MVP, after helping limit Portland to four shots on goal. The game marks just the 12th time since 1990 that the Pilots had suffered a loss at Merlo Field and is the eighth one-goal game in the eightgame Notre Dame-Portland series history.

Nov. 5 - Homestanding Notre Dame collects its sixth consecutive BIG EAST tournament title, besting league rival Connecticut (1-0) after earlier wins over Miami and Boston College (both 3-0). An early own goal provides the winning margin, with Sarkesian named the tournament MVP after playing a leading role in the pivotal midfield battle (she also had a goal and assist in the BC game).

Nov. 24 - The Irish advance to the NCAA semifinals for the sixth time in seven years, thanks to a thrilling overtime win over growing rival Santa Clara in the quarterfinals (2-1). Lovelace - who scored in the 1-0 win over SCU in the 1999 semifinals - again is a thorn in the Broncos' side, scoring in the 17th minute, while freshmen Guertin and Randi Scheller assist on Erikson's game-ending goal five minutes into OT. The game features 19 fouls by each team, with Liz Wagner's eight saves (many game-savers) making up for the loss of midfielder Ashley Dryer, who was injured midway through the first half.

One week later, Warner's 20thminute goal gives the unbeaten Irish an early lead in the NCAA semifinals but 5th-ranked UNC ultimately advances with a 2-1 victory. The decisive goal in the 83rd minute means that the Irish trailed for a total of only 35 minutes all season, spanning parts of three games in the 25-game sched-

Makinen later is honored with the 2000 Hermann Trophy and Missouri Athletic Club Player of the Year Award, combining with Daws to make Notre Dame the second women's soccer program to produce multiple national players of the year.

Sept. 2 - Notre Dame wins its annual Key Bank Classic, topping 25th-ranked Hartford (2-0) after besting 8th-ranked Penn State two days earlier (2-1). Freshman Mary Boland's diving header yields a 1-0 lead in the seventh minute of the PSU game, with Guertin adding the second Irish goal early in the second half. Reserve forward Kelly Tulisiak who assisted on Guertin's goal - then opens the scoring in the 67th minute of the Hartford game, with Guertin's late goal providing the final margin.


Sept. 25 - Waldrum's 50th career win at Notre Dame qualifies as one of his most memorable, as the 4th-ranked Irish use precise execution to score in the 18th minute on a three-pass set play while limiting 3rdranked Nebraska to a pair of shots on goal. Sarkesian adds another big-game goal, started by Scheller's direct kick from 10 yards outside the box. The sequence sees Scheller send a pass into the box before Guertin flicks the ball into space on the right and Melissa Tancredi serves a low endline pass for Sarkesian's one-timer. Physical play yields 39 fouls (20 for the Irish) while the Huskers are caught offside 10 times.

Nov. 11 - Scheller's first career game-winning goal comes with 14 minutes left in the BIG EAST title game (at Rutgers), for a 2-1 win over West Virginia and the program's seventh consecutive BIG EAST crown. Tournament MVP Guertin - who scored in earlier BIG EAST tournament wins over St. John's (2-0) and Boston College (3-0) - sets up the gamewinner on one of her well-placed corner kicks, with headers from Tancredi and Sarkesian preceding Scheller's lunging

Notre Dame goes on to be upset by Cincinnati in the second round of the NCAAs (3-2), despite holding a 15-9 edge in shots and 4-0 in corner kicks. It marks just the second home loss ever for the Irish in NCAA Tournament play (spanning 20 games).

Sept. 15 - A furious rally sees Notre Dame score five times in the final 25 minutes, stunning 25th-ranked hosts at the Maryland Classic (5-2). It matches the fifthhighest goal total ever for the Irish versus a top-25 opponent. Tancredi – a forward who later in her career will become a two-time All-America defender with the Irish - shifts the momentum with her physical play and pair of header goals, en route to picking up the tournament's offensive MVP award.

Oct. 13 - The Irish begin their late push with a 3-1 victory over BIG EAST rival Connecticut at Alumni Field. Dryer's return from injury sparks the team while



Notre Dame's top-ranked team scored first in 22 of 25 games during the 2000 season while trailing for a total of only 35 minutes.

Guertin's pinpoint corner kicks lead to the final two Notre Dame goals.

Nov. 17 - Notre Dame avenges an earlier loss to Purdue (3-1), reversing the score in NCAA secondround action at Alumni Field. Guertin's calm presence produces the first goal and she assists on another while the defense limits the Boilermakers to four shots on goal. The win sends 19th-ranked Notre Dame to the round-of -16 for the eighth time in nine seasons - but top-ranked Stanford uses a Marcia Wallis goal in the 81st minute to survive the upset bid, 1-0.

Aug. 29 - Notre Dame opens the season minus six injured players but responds with its second-highest scoring game of the Waldrum era while dispatching of perennial power Hartford, 9-1. Just two previous Irish teams had delivered a more dominating season opener. Boland (3G-1A) joins a select group who have posted hat tricks in the first game of a season and she later goes on to set an Irish record for most goals in the first three games of a season (6).

Sept. 21 and 23 - The Irish hold Stanford (0-0) and Santa Clara (2-1) to three combined shots on goal and three corner kicks while handing the Broncos their first-ever loss at the SCU Classic. Thorlakson assists on Boland's early goal and then knocks in a deflected Boland shot for the late gamewinner.

Oct. 3 and 17 - Notre Dame posts a pair of 2-0 wins at Alumni Field over BIG EAST contenders West Virginia and Connecticut. Boland (1:24) notches the team's quickest goal of the season while the defense limits WVU to a single shot on goal. Two weeks later, playing without Boland, the Irish defense again delivers as UConn manages only two shots on goal (none in the final 60:00).

Oct. 26 - Notre Dame wins 2-0 at Seton Hall for a 10-game shutout streak that ranks fifth in NCAA history (as does Erika Bohn's personal streak that reaches 967 minutes). The Irish also extend their unbeaten start to 18-0-1, with the first 19 games including only one deficit spanning all of seven



Nov. 2 - Guertin extends her Notre Dame record with the fourth overtime goal of her career, as the Irish defeat Miami (2-1) in the BIG EAST quarterfinals for their 50th consecutive home win over a BIG EAST

After suffering its first loss ever in the BIG EAST Tournament during the next weekend (2-1 vs. Boston College, in the semifinals), the Irish endure more postseason heartache with a 1-0 loss to Michigan in the NCAA second round. The Wolverines convert their only shot on goal and earn only one corner kick in the 90 minutes while the Irish are unable to overcome injuries suffered by All-Americans Warner and Tancredi.

2004 (also see pp. 111 and 114-115)

Sept. 5 - Thorlakson racks up the most points (8; 3G-2A) ever by a Notre Dame player in a game versus a top-25 opponent, as the second-ranked Irish register a key early win over fourth-ranked Santa Clara (5-2). Thorlakson also becomes just the third Irish player to post a hat trick against a top-10 foe and ties her own Notre Dame record by scoring or assisting on each of the team's first five goals.

Sept. 17 - Reserve defender Kate Tulisiak picks a perfect time for the only point of her career, after intercepting a pass and providing the right endline cross on Amanda Cinalli's 84th-minute goal at Connecticut. That 1-0 win gives the Irish a 7-0 start that stretches to 15-0 before a scoreless tie with Rutgers on Oct. 22.

Oct. 31 - Thorlakson sets another Notre Dame record with 10 points in a game (4G-2A) while tying the Irish record for goals in a game, with each of them coming leftfooted. The 7-0 BIG EAST quarterfinal win over St. John's also sees Thorlakson top her own standard by factoring into each of her team's first six goals.

Nov. 7 - Notre Dame's perfect record in BIG EAST title games (7-0) ends at Connecticut, as the Huskies score twice in the final 17 minutes to snatch away the 2-1 win. But the Irish quickly turn the disappointment into motivation by outscoring their opponents 12-2 in the six ensuing NCAA Tournament wins (including a 2-0, third-round rematch with UConn).

Dec. 3 - Following four straight wins to start the NCAAs - versus Eastern Illinois (4-0), Wisconsin (1-0, on Jill Krivacek's 90th-minute header of a Thorlakson corner kick), UConn (2-0) and Portland (3-1, pair of goals from Cinalli) - the Irish head to Cary, N.C., for a semifinal matchup with familiar foe Santa Clara. The only scoring in the evenly-matched and tension-packed game comes in the 73rd minute, as Candace Chapman (a converted defender) and Thorlakson work a classic give-and-go that starts with Chapman's long run down the center of the field. She then knocks home Thorlakson's return pass from the right side, sending the Irish to the NCAA title game for the fifth time.

Dec. 5 - Notre Dame joins UNC as the only repeat NCAA champions in D-I women's soccer history, after surviving a penalty-kick shootout with emerging force UCLA. A fluke own-goal gives the Bruins the lead early in the second half but the Irish battle back behind tournament MVPs Thorlakson (tying goal, on 74th-minute PK) and Bohn, who dives high and to her left to deny Kendall Billingsley's penalty-kick try with 5:09 left in regulation. The shootout sees little-used reserve Sarah Halpenny convert on Notre Dame's second try while Jen Buczkowski and Annie Schefter also find the net but the teams still are tied after five kicks, sending the shootout to sudden-death. Krivacek then calmly deposits her low-right shot and Bohn guesses correctly to the same spot, stopping Lindsay Greco's try to give Notre Dame the national title in thrilling fashion.

Thorlakson completes one of the most dominant all-around seasons in women's soccer history (23G-24A) and is considered the favorite for the Hermann Trophy - but she stunningly is not even among the three finalists for the award. Soccer America does recognize Thorlakson as its 2004 national player of the year (an honor earned by Makinen in 1998 and 2000).


Sept. 2 - Notre Dame lives up to its number-one ranking with an impressive early win over 11th-ranked Florida (4-1). Thorlakson has a pair of goals and an assist while newcomer Hanks - who missed the 2004 season due to the Under-19 World Championship opens the scoring to keep up her torrid pace. One week earlier, Hanks had a seven-point game (3G-1A) in the opener versus New Hampshire and scored four goals against the home team at the Vermont Classic.

Oct. 14 - Thorlakson factors into three of the goals (1G-2A) as the Irish top 10th-ranked Connecticut, 4-0, for one of th program's most dominating wins ever versus a top-10 opponent.

Oct. 23 - Alexandra Hardy's goal in the 63rd minute cuts Notre Dame's lead to 2-1 and briefly gives upset-minded Georgetown hope, in the regular-season finale. But the game quickly gets out of hand minutes later, as Brittany Bock, Thorlakson and Schefter all score in a span of 51 seconds to suddenly give the Irish a 5-1 cushion. The flurry ranks as the quickest threegoal stretch in the history of Division I women's soccer.

Nov. 21 - Notre Dame returns to the BIG EAST title game and leaves no doubt this time around, running away from Connecticut to secure the program's eighth BIG EAST Tournament title. Five different Irish players find the net at Marquette's Valley Field, highlighted by the 24th score of the season from Hanks (breaking the ND record for goals by a freshman). Thorlakson - who totals 2G-5A in the three wins - is named the tournament's offensive MVP while midfield enforcer Krivacek takes home the defensive MVP

Nov. 25 - Notre Dame and Portland meet in a rematch of the 2004 NCAA quarterfinals and the home team again claims victory (by the same score, 3-1). The eventual national champion Pilots advance after the win over the fifth-ranked Irish, with top-ranked Portland

scoring twice in the first 20 minutes for an early cushion that thrills the overflow crowd of 4,892.

Sept. 3 - In a rare matchup of top-ranked teams by different polls, Notre Dame scores three times in less than nine minutes midway through the second half to defeat Santa Clara, 3-1 at Alumni Field. Cinalli was the catalyst for the Irish comeback, assisting on the tying goal by Krivacek before nodding home Michele Weissenhofer's cross to give the hosts the lead just 5:35 later. Cinalli then put the Broncos down for good with a breakaway strike in the 73rd minute. Lauren Karas added insurance between the pipes with nine saves, including a critical stop with 2:34 left as SCU tried to

Sept. 29 - One of the top games in Alumni Field goes the way of the No. 1-ranked Irish, as Notre Dame spots sixth-ranked West Virginia an early goal, but comes roaring back with three scores after the break for a 3-1 triumph. Weissenhofer potted the equalizer off a Bock assist less than four minutes into the second half and Hanks put the Irish on top with a header at the left post in the 74th minute. Cinalli sealed matters just over three minutes from time, flushing home a rebound off Weissenhofer's initial shot.

Oct. 24 - Notre Dame caps off the fifth undefeated regular season in program history (17-0-1) with a 3-0 win at Cincinnati in a game that had to be made up after the initial contest was called due to lightining.

Nov. 5 - Hanks scores twice in the first 10 minutes, including the fastest postseason goal in Notre Dame history (0:57) as the Irish put together a clinical 4-2 win over Rutgers in the BIG EAST final to win their ninth league crown. Buczkowski and reliable defensive midfielder Ashley Jones chip in two assists apiece as Notre Dame races out to a four-goal lead before the Scarlet Knights trimmed the margin late. The Irish also swept the tournament hardware, as Hanks was the offensive MVP and steady defender Kim Lorenzen was tapped as the defensive MVP.

Dec. 1 - Notre Dame returns to the NCAA College Cup final for the sixth time following a hardfought 2-1 victory over No. 5 Florida State in the national semifinals at Cary, N.C. The Irish had outscored their first four tournament opponents by a combined 15-1 (7-1 vs. Oakland with a Hanks hat trick: 1-0 vs. Wisconsin-Milwaukee: 3-0 vs. Colorado: 4-0 vs. Penn State with a Weissenhofer hat trick), and appeared to be poised for more of the same after defensive midfielder Courtney Rosen (35:32) and Krivacek (38:21) scored less than three minutes apart in the first half. FSU's India Trotter halved the deficit just after the break, but Karas stood tall the rest of the way with some big plays to preserve the win.

Dec. 3 - Bidding for a third NCAA title, Notre Dame came up just short against fellow No. 1 team, North Carolina, falling to its archrival, 2-1. The Irish and Tar Heels brought a stellar 51-1-1 combined record into the final (and marked the first time both title-game combatants had at least 25 wins), but Notre Dame found itself trailing by two goals less than 90 seconds into the second half. Bock scored in the 81st minute to get the Irish within a goal, and Hanks nearly tied the game in the closing seconds but her free kick from the top of the box just went wide of the far right post. Hanks finished the season as the national leader in goals (22) and assists (22), joining former UNC great Mia Hamm as the only player ever to pull off that feat.

Notre Dame's 1995 Dream Season **Ends With National Championship**

The 1995 Notre Dame women's soccer season was described by national coach of the year Chris Petrucelli as a season that "ended the way we all had dreamed about." With wins over perennial power North Carolina in the NCAA semifinals and Portland in the title game (both 1-0), Notre Dame had become just the third school ever to win an NCAA women's soccer title (dating back to 1982).

The season's dream began with Notre Dame putting the opposition to sleep, as the Irish outscored their opponents 36-0 on their way to an 8-0 record. The women's soccer squad participated in the first BIG EAST competition for any Notre Dame team, defeating Providence in the opener followed by a win over St. John's and three shutouts of Big Ten foes Indiana, No. 13 Wisconsin and No. 19 Michigan State.

Notre Dame moved to 6-0 with a 1-0 win over No. 3 Stanford (on a rare goal by sophomore midfielder Holly Manthei, who went on to become the NCAA all-time assist leader), followed by BIG EAST wins over Rutgers and Seton Hall that pushed the season shot advantage to 192-24.

Sophomore midfielder Julie's Maund's goal at the 88:17 mark averted a loss at Cincinnati (the game ended in a 2-2 tie) while an 82nd-minute goal from senior forward Rosella Guerrero set up an overtime gamewinner from junior midfielder Cindy Daws, in a 2-1 game with Ohio State.

A 2-2-2 stretch continued in the BIG EAST showdown with Connecticut, as freshman forward Monica Gerardo's goal in the 82nd minute forced overtime (3-3) - with the Huskies winning 5-4 under the old "non-sudden-death" format. The loss was Notre Dame's first at home since Oct. 4, 1992, and ended a 29-game conference winning streak for the Irish.

Another Gerardo goal produced a 1-0 win over No. 7 Santa Clara, with the grueling six-game stretch concluding in Houston against No. 11 Duke (2-2) and No. 1 North Carolina (0-2). Yet another late goal (by junior forward Amy VanLaecke, at 89:26) saved the day versus Duke.

"At that point, we had lost our focus on defending," said Petrucelli. "We got so carried away in trying to score goals that we forgot there was another part of the game. We needed to put a lot of work into our team defense."

After the loss to UNC, the Irish defense - led by junior goalkeeper Jen Renola - vielded just three goals in the final 11 games, including shutouts in all six postseason games.

The next big test for the refocused Irish was a rematch against Connecticut in the BIG EAST title game, with the newcomer Notre Dame blanking the reigning BIG EAST power 1-0 (on an early VanLaecke goal).

"The win over UConn helped our confidence and made us believe," said Petrucelli. "We were able to refocus and commit to everything needed to win. We had talked about winning, but we were not doing everything that it took."

The Irish defense continued its postseason shutout streak, led by Renola and the starting defender formation of sophomore Kate Sobrero, junior Kate Fisher and senior Ashley Scharff.

The Irish were seeded No. 4 in the NCAA tournament, using four first-half goals and a hat trick from freshman midfielder Shannon Boxx for a 5-0 win over Wisconsin in the second round. Notre Dame then knocked off UConn in the third round (2-0), with goals from senior defender Julie Vogel and VanLaecke.

Playing on its home field in the semifinals, UNC carried a 10-year, 31-game NCAA tournament win streak into its game vs. Notre Dame.

The Irish came out sharp and loose, pressuring from the start. That pressure led to the only goal, in the 20th minute, when UNC's Cindy Parlow headed a cross out of the goal area. Daws then headed it back toward the goal and Parlow's attempt to redirect the ball sent it into her own net for the 1-0 score.

A stunned crowd of 7,212, at that time the largest ever to attend a collegiate women's soccer game, watched as the Irish defense shut down the potent Tar Heel offense.

Returning to the title game, Notre Dame encountered 125 scoreless minutes before Daws surprised Portland goalkeeper Erin Fahey, after senior forward Michelle McCarthy had been fouled outside the top of the box. Daws quickly sent the direct kick into the back of the net - ending the exhausting game and completing Notre Dame's dreamlike run to the 1995 national title.


"The thing that came out of this season was that we found out how much character our team really had," said Petrucelli. "Instead of packing it in, we fought back."

Notre Dame Caps Dominating 2004 Season By Capturing Program's Second NCAA Title

A four-month quest for the 2004 national title saw the Notre Dame women's soccer team navigate its way through the season with a nearly perfect record. The odyssey began Aug. 10, with an eight-day training trip in the soccer-crazed nation of Brazil. On the final night of the team's stay, head coach Randy Waldrum reflected on the trip.

"I don't think they want to leave," said Waldrum on that final night at the Vitoria Hotel, a dorm-like atmosphere for the Irish players.

"I already can tell this is a group who truly enjoys being together," predicted the veteran of 22 previous seasons as a college coach. "They want to achieve great success for one another. That's a great starting point for any team."

Fast forward to Cary, N.C - 117 days after the departure for Brazil - as Notre Dame faced UCLA in the NCAA final. It marked the end of a season filled with individual feats and team domination, as the Irish made a strong case for being the nation's top all-around program.

Notre Dame, the second D-I women's soccer team to win multiple titles, spent six weeks as the No. 1-ranked team and finished with a team-record victory total (25-1-1) that had been bested by just three teams in NCAA history.

Three All-Americans – fifth-year central defender Melissa Tancredi, junior forward Katie Thorlakson and sophomore midfielder Jen Buczkowski – led a talented starting 11 that included another first team all-BIG EAST player (Freshman All-America forward Amanda Cinalli) and three named third team all-BIG EAST: senior forward Candace Chapman, sophomore midfielder Jill Krivacek and sophomore left back Christie Shaner.

Junior midfielder Annie Schefter helped in dominating the possession while the stout back line also included senior central defender Gudrun Gunnarsdottir and sophomore right back Kim Lorenzen. Junior goalkeeper Erika Bohn – who joined Schefter as 2004 Academic All-Americans – rarely was tested but she stopped three total PKs in the title game.

The eventual national champs rose above injuries to Randi Scheller, Mary Boland and Susan Pinnick

(among others) that totaled 109 games – plus the absence of another top offensive player, Kerri Hanks (Under-19 World Championship). Boland was lost early with a broken leg but Thorlakson responded with an historic season (23 goals-24 assists) while Chapman (12G) also picked up the slack after shifting from right back to forward. Cinalli added 10 goals, as the first Irish freshman with double-digit goals since 2000.

Notre Dame's pressing style led to the Irish totaling nearly as many goals (70) as opponent shots on goal (71) while allowing just 1.8 corner kicks/gm. The Irish led the nation in shutouts (16) and ranked fifth in goalsagainst avg. (0.51).

Thorlakson and Tancredi were among the final- 15 candidates for the Hermann Trophy and stood out as the nation's most dominant players at their positions. Thorlakson earned several player-of-the year honors in a season that included: 3G-2A in the first half of the opener vs. Baylor; 3G-2A in the second half of the 5-2 win over #4 Santa Clara (ND record for points vs. top-25 team); an 11-game point streak to end the season; ND records for points in a game (4G-2A, vs. St. John's) and in one postseason (27); 70 total points (two shy of the ND record); and scoring/assisting on 24 of the final 28 goals. Former UNC great Mia Hamm remains the only player ever to total more goals and more assists in a season than Thorlakson.

Early highlights included Schefter's 82nd-minute PK to beat Stanford (1-0) and a 2-1 win at Arizona State, as the Irish overcame an early deficit and 100-degree heat. Cinalli's 84th-minute goal later produced a 1-0 win at UConn and the Irish pulled away at West Virginia (3-1) – before Buczkowski scored in the final minute at Georgetown (2-1) and volleyed in a cross from Ashley Jones to beat Boston College (1-0).

Krivacek headed in a Thorlakson corner kick to defeat Wisconsin in the final regulation minute of that NCAA second-round game (1-0), followed by a 2-0 win over UConn and the 3-1 quarterfinal with Portland (two goals by Cinalli, one by Thorlakson). Thorlakson and Chapman then worked a classic give-and-go in the 73rd minute, as the Irish edged Santa Clara in the semifinals (1-0).


Bohn needed to make just five saves in the first five NCAA games but she stopped six shots in the title game, with the only UCLA score coming on an owngoal early in the second half. Thorlakson tied the game on a 73rd-minute PK and Bohn then saved a PK late in regulation. The first five shootout rounds saw UCLA miss twice (one saved by Bohn) while little-used senior Sarah Halpenny preceded Buczkowski and Schefter in making their shots. Krivacek then converted in suddendeath PKs, Bohn dove to her left for yet another save – and the Irish were the 2004 national champions.

Notre Dame Players Shine on World Cup Teams

The success and impact of the Notre Dame women's soccer program has not been limited to the collegiate level. Notre Dame had a presence at the past three FIFA Women's World Cups, particularly in the 1999 World Cup won by the homestanding United States. Former three-time All-American Kate Sobrero played a key role in helping the U.S. claim its second World Cup in 1999, as a starting defender and one of the youngest players on the roster. Sobrero started five of the six games that the Americans played, missing only the Korea game when she rested a sore ankle after the U.S. already had clinched the top spot in its pool.

Former high-scoring Notre Dame forward Monica Gerardo and 2002 graduate Monica Gonzalez (a former forward who converted to a defender role) represented Mexico in that country's first appearance in the World Cup in '99. The Irish pair both started Mexico's first World Cup game against Brazil, while Gerardo - who wrapped up her career at Notre Dame following the 1998 season - also started against Italy. Four-time All-America midfielder Holly Manthei's earlier appearance with the U.S. national team in the 1995 World Cup in Stockholm, Sweden, marked the first World Cup duty for a Notre Dame women's soccer player. The second-youngest player on the team following her freshman season at Notre Dame in 1995, Manthei played in two games for the third-place Americans, including a reserve stint in a 3-3 tie with China and a start in the 4-1 win over Australia. Sobrero and former Notre Dame defensive midfielder Shannon Boxx played for the U.S. third-place team at the 2003 World Cup (also played in the U.S.), with Boxx selected to the prestigious All-World Cup team. Recent Notre Dame standout Candace Chapman was set to start for Canada at flank midfielder but had to miss the 2003 World Cup due to injury.

The Notre Dame women's soccer program once again was well-represented on multiple national teams at the 2007 World Cup in China. Boxx (recovering from an '06 knee injury) and Sobrero ('07 pregnancy) were not at 100 percent entering the tournament, but both started every match except the group-play win over Sweden (Boxx was a halftime substitute) and the third-place win over Norway (neither played), with Boxx scoring in a 3-0 quarterfinal win over England. Chapman and fellow former Notre Dame standouts Melissa Tancredi (2000-04) and Katie Thorlakson (2002-05) nearly helped Canada get out of group play, but an injury-time goal by Australia in the final group-play game gave the Matildas a 2-2 draw and a pass to the quarterfinals. Chapman scored Canada's first goal of the tournament (in a 2-1 loss to Norway), while Tancredi scored 37 seconds into the Australia contest, the second-fastest goal in tournament history.








Twelve former Notre Dame women's soccer players participated in the first three seasons of the Women's United Soccer Association (2001-03), including 10 who competed in the inaugural 2001 season (the third-most from any Division I program). Seven of the above players were in action during each of the WUSA seasons (the others are noted by their years of participation).

Former Irish players LaKeysia Beene and Kelly Lindsey helped lead the Bay Area/San Jose CyberRays to the 2001 WUSA title, with Beene also earning WUSA goalkeeper-of-the- year honors and saving the Atlanta Beat's first PK in the title-game shootout. Lindsey - a secondteam all-WUSA defender in '01 - assisted on the first goal in that title game. Former Notre Dame defender Kate Sobrero received the 2001 WUSA Humanitarian Award, in recognition of her charitable works as a member of the Boston Breakers.

Beene ranked second in the 2001 WUSA with an 0.97 goals-against average while former Irish defender Jen Grubb played all 1,890 regular-season minutes for the Washington Freedom in 2001, '02 and again in '03. Former Notre Dame midfielder Shannon Boxx was the fourth-leading scorer for the 2001 San Diego Spirit and was the New York Power's 2003 MVP, after finishing third in the WUSA with eight assists. Grubb and her Freedom teammates Anne Makinen and Monica Gerardo (game-winning goal in 1-0 semifinal) helped lead Washington to the 2002 WUSA title game - with Grubb and the Freedom beating Sobrero, another former Irish defender Monica Gonzalez and their Breakers teammates in the 2003 WUSA semifinals en route to the title. The 2003 WUSA all-star game featured four Notre Dame alums: Grubb (starter), Beene, Gonzalez and Boxx, who was considered one of the WUSA's top defensive midfielders.















National Players of the Year









Five different Notre Dame women's soccer players - midfielder Cindy Daws (1996), goalkeeper Jen Renola (1996), midfielder Anne Makinen (2000) and forwards Katie Thorlakson (2004) and Kerri Hanks (2006) each have received a major national player-of-the-year honor during the span of the past 11 seasons (1996-2006). Most notably, Notre Dame is one of only two women's soccer programs ever to produce three or more different recipients of the prestigious M.A.C./Hermann Trophy (Daws, Makinen and Hanks).

Hermann Trophy

The Hermann Trophy is named after Robert Hermann, founding Chairman of the North American Soccer League. First presented in 1967, the Hermann honors the best college soccer player as determined by a panel made up of more than 500 coaches and journalists. The Hermann Trophy merged with the M.A.C. Award in

Missouri Athletic Club (M.A.C.) Player of the Year

The Today's Top VIII Award is presented annually by the NCAA to honor eight outstanding senior student-athletes (from all divisions). Selection criteria include: athletics ability and achievement; academic achievement; and character, leadership and extracurricular activities.

Honda-Broderick Cup

The Honda-Broderick Cup is presented annually to the nation's outstanding collegiate woman athlete. The winner reflects not only the individual athletic achievements, but also embodies the ideals of team contribution, scholastic endeavor, school and community involvement and those personal characteristics that are reflected in the philosophy of intercollegiate athletics.

offensive seasons in women's soccer history during the 2004 season, totaling 23 goals and 24 assists while leading the Irish to the program's second national title (former UNC great Mia Hamm in the only Division I player ever to total more goals and more assists - in the same season - than Thorlakson's 2004 output). Despite her historic season, Thorlakson surprisingly was not among the three finalists for the 2004 M.A.C./Hermann Trophy, but she was recognized by Soccer America as its 2004 national player of the year. ESPN similarly honored Thorlakson by selecting her as one of five finalists (and the only soccer player among the finalists) for the 2004-05 "ESPY" in the category of best female college athlete. Thorlakson went on to be a finalist for the 2005 M.A.C./Hermann player-of-the-year award.

The past 15 seasons of Notre Dame women's soccer (1992-2007) have produced a rich tradition of elite players, led by 19 who have combined for 42 All-America seasons:

- · Only 22 players in the 26-year history of Division I women's soccer who have been NSCAA four-year All-Americans and three are Notre Dame players: midfielders Holly Manthei (1994--97) and Anne Makinen (1997-2000) and defender Jen Grubb (1996-99). Current senior forward Kerri Hanks and the above three are the only ND players to be NSCAA All-Americans as freshmen and sophomores.
- Five others midfielder Cindy Daws ('93, '94, '96), goalkeeper Jen Renola ('94-'96), defender Kate Sobrero ('95-'97), midfielder Jen Buczkowski ('04-'06) and Hanks ('05-'07) - have been three-time All-Americans while four have been NSCAA All-Americans twice: midfielder/forward Jenny Streiffer ('96, '99), defenders Candace Chapman ('02, '05) and Melissa Tancredi ('03, '04), and forward Katie Thorlakson ('04,
- Renola ('96), defender Monica Gonzalez ('02) and current senior midfielder/forward Brittany Bock ('07) are part of an exclusive group of 51 student-athletes in ND history to earn All-America and Academic All-America honors in the same season (Streiffer received both honors but never in the same season; Academic All-American in '97, '98).
- Daws (3), Renola (2) and Hanks (2) are Notre Dame's only multiple first team NSCAA All-Americans, with Daws also remaining the only ND freshman ever to be a first team NSCAA All-American.
- Notre Dame players have been named NSCAA All-Americans every year since 1992, including 12 years with multiple All-Americans (two-plus every year since 2003, with a total of 13 from 2003-07). There have been seven Notre Dame seasons with three-plus NSCAA All-Americans (led by six in 1996).
- · The positions of forward, midfielder and defender each have produced at least five different Notre Dame NSCAA All-Americans (not counting Streiffer, who was an All-America midfielder and forward).





Marathon Moment

Notre Dame entered its 1999 NCAA quarterfinal at 4th-ranked Nebraska expecting a tight game. The Irish had trailed Nebraska in the second half of the 1998 NCAA third round at Alumni Field before scoring twice for the win – and their meeting in the 1997 second round was closer than the 6-0 final. But on Nov. 28, 1999, nobody expected a four-overtime game that lasted 150 minutes and ended in a 1-1 tie. Jenny Streiffer scored 90 seconds into the game but Karina LeBlanc kept the Irish out of the net for the next 148:30. Nebraska tied the game in the 18th minute and the marathon was set, as LeBlanc and LaKeysia Beene did not yield any more scoring to set up the shootout.

Streiffer converted into the lower left corner while Beene dove low and to her left to save Kelly Rheem's try in the first round of the penalty kicks. Both teams converted in round-2 (Jenny Heft upper left, Meghan Anderson lower right) while both round-3 kicks grazed the posts — as the shot by Notre Dame's Anne Makinen missed off the left post while Christine Latham's skimmed off the same post and went into the net.

The shootout was tied (2-2) entering round-4 when LeBlanc dove to her right and saved Monica Gonzalez's low shot. The Huskers had a chance to win by converting their final two attempts – but Sharlota Nonen's try sailed over the crossbar. Both teams found the net in

round-5 (Jen Grubb upper right, Jenny Benson lower right), forcing an extra round. Omaha native Kelly Lindsey - a defender with no points all season - gave the Irish a 4-3 lead (lower right) and Beene reached left to save Amy Walsh's attempt, extending the Notre Dame run that would reach all the way to the NCAA final.
