

Students also participate in cutting edge research and diverse study abroad opportunities, enabling Notre Dame to offer one of the top academic experiences in the world.

First Year of Studies

The First Year of Studies program provides all first-year students with the opportunity to gain a wide-ranging liberal arts background before choosing a specific major within Notre Dame's five undergraduate colleges. A progressive advising program for all student-athletes enables the University to follow the academic progress of all student-athletes on a regular basis. Key to the program is the fact that it is not run by the athletics department but by the University administration.

Student-Athlete Success

Notre Dame expects the best out of its student-athletes just as it does of every other student on campus. Notre Dame has had unprecedented academic success among its athletes, consistently ranking among the top NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision schools in graduation rates and academic progress. With more Academic All-Americans than any other school since 2000, Irish athletes have shown themselves capable of performing in the classroom while competing on the field at an elite level.

While no athlete plans on an injury, Notre Dame is prepared with one of the top sports medicine teams in the country to help keep its athletes fit and ready to compete. With training facilities in the Joyce Center, Notre Dame Stadium and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex, the training staff is always there to care for athletes. With approximately 200 years combined experience on the full-time staff, Notre Dame also boasts a partnership with the renowned South Bend Orthopaedics to provide first-class care.

Strength and Conditioning




The University of Notre Dame

When Father Edward F. Sorin started his school in the northern Indiana wilderness, he had only \$300, three log buildings badly in need of repair and a far-sighted vision of establishing a liberal arts school to meet the growing educational needs of the frontier. He dreamed of building a great university, and in 1842, he founded the University of Notre Dame du Lac.

Over the years, the University of Notre Dame du Lac would evolve into a preeminent place for Catholic thought. While becoming one of the top undergraduate institutions in the country, Notre Dame has also been at the cutting edge of research, including such innovations as the transmission of wireless messages and the development of synthetic rubber. The University also has stressed residential life, with four of five students living on campus. Students come to Notre Dame not only to learn how to think, but to learn how to live, keeping faith with the vision of Father Sorin.



Student Body

Notre Dame is one of a handful of universities with a truly international student body, coming from more than 100 nations and all 50 states. The most recent freshman class featured 88 percent of students in the top 10 percent of their high school class. In addition, there are no fraternities or sororities at Notre Dame, with the school's 28 residence halls housing more than 80 percent of the student body, serving as the focal point of social, religious and athletic activities.

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.

President

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., took office as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2005. He was elected by the University's Board of Trustees to a five-year term April 30, 2004.

An associate professor of philosophy and member of Notre Dame's faculty since 1990, Father Jenkins had served as a vice president and associate provost at the University from July 2000 until becoming president.

Prior to his service in the provost's office, Father Jenkins had been religious superior of the Holy Cross priests and brothers at Notre Dame for three years. As religious superior, he was a Fellow and Trustee of the University.

Father Jenkins specializes in the areas of ancient philosophy, medieval philosophy and the philosophy of religion. He is the author of *Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aquinas*, published by Cambridge University Press in 1997.

Father Jenkins earned degrees in philosophy from Oxford University in 1987 and 1989. He earned his master of divinity degree and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, Calif., in 1988. Prior to entering the Congregation of Holy Cross, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively.

Father Jenkins was ordained a priest in Notre Dame's Basilica of the Sacred Heart in 1983. He served as director of the Old College program for Notre Dame undergraduate candidates for the Congregation of Holy Cross from 1991 to 1993.

A native of Omaha, Neb., Father Jenkins was born Dec. 17, 1953.

Director of Athletics

John B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a University of Notre Dame graduate who has risen to national prominence as a lawyer, consultant, and executive in the collegiate and Olympic sports industries, is in his second year as director of athletics at his alma mater.

His first year on campus in 2008-09 featured the announcement of plans for a new, free-standing ice hockey arena; creation of an athletic administrative division to enhance athletic performance — plus 35 All-Americans, eight Academic All-Americans and four NCAA post-graduate Scholarship winners.

Notre Dame teams in 2008-09 finished as the NCAA runner-up in both women's soccer (26-1, led by Hermann Trophy winner Kerri Hanks) and fencing (men 33-0, women 32-2), while the women's tennis squad advanced to the NCAA semifinals. The Irish men's soccer squad was seeded 14th in the NCAA bracket, while the hockey team ranked fourth in the final poll after winning CCHA regular-season and postseason crowns. Men's lacrosse finished unbeaten in the regular season (and second in the final poll) -- and women's lacrosse won its first BIG EAST title.

Notre Dame also ranked number one in the country (among Football Bowl Subdivision schools) in the most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) numbers with a 98 for all student-athletes. The 2009 Academic Progress Rate (APR) statistics included more perfect 1,000 scores by Irish teams (nine) than by any other FBS institution.

Raised in Yonkers, N.Y., and Bloomington, Ind., Swarbrick is a 1976 *magna cum laude* graduate of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in economics. Upon graduating from Stanford University Law School in 1980, he returned to Indiana to accept a position as an associate in the Indianapolis law firm Baker & Daniels. He was made partner in 1987 and spent 28 years overall with the firm.

As a member of the Indiana Sports Corporation, including the chairmanship from 1992 to 2001, Swarbrick's leadership efforts resulted in the city earning the bid to host the 2012 Super Bowl; becoming the home of the NCAA headquarters; and hosting the 1987 Pan American Games, the 1991 World Gymnastics Championships, NCAA Men's Basketball Final Fours, and other college championship competitions plus a wide array of national and world championships in the Olympic sports.

He served as sports commissioner of the 1982 U.S. Olympic Festival in Indianapolis, competition director of the '87 Pan American Games, and chairman of the '91 World Gymnastics Championships. Swarbrick has served as general counsel for numerous national governing bodies of Olympic sports, including USA Gymnastics and USRowing.






Homes of the Fighting Irish

In the midst of a master plan that will touch nearly every varsity team, Notre Dame has shown its commitment to providing athletes with the best possible facilities to help them compete on a national level. From new facilities to the extensive renovation of existing ones, Notre Dame is committed to giving Irish athletes every edge imaginable. The plan will result in a drastically altered footprint on the south-east corner of campus, creating an athletics quad that will give every Irish athlete a place they will be proud to call home.

3	New athletics facilities which will open on campus during the 2009-10 year. Alumni Stadium will be the new home for men's and women's soccer; Purcell Pavilion renovation and expansion of the Joyce Center arena will be completed; and Arlotta Family Stadium will open as the new home for the men's and women's lacrosse teams.
3	New facilities which have opened their doors in the past five years, including the Guglielmino Athletics Complex (housing football offices and locker room, a new weight room and new sports medicine facilities), the LaBar Practice Complex (featuring two Field Turf fields and one natural grass field) and Melissa Cook Stadium (home of the Irish softball team).
26.3	Million dollars being spent on Purcell Pavilion for additions and renovations to the Joyce Center arena. Purcell Pavilion at the Joyce Center will feature a three-story addition with club seating, a hospitality area, additional area for restrooms and concessions, as well as new space for the Varsity Shop and the Notre Dame ticket office.
4	Facilities which are still on the master plan to create a comprehensive athletic quad. The track and field teams, the hockey program, the tennis squads and the rowing team all will receive new facilities in the near future.







Championship Teams

Notre Dame prides itself on competing with the best in every sport it fields. Eight different programs have won national championships since Notre Dame began its first varsity team, football in 1887. With more consensus national championships in football than any other school, other programs have begun to emerge on the national scene in the 14 years since Notre Dame joined the BIG EAST Conference.

Team and individual projects have allowed Irish athletes to see the positive impact they have in the lives of others and learn how to use their talents to benefit those in their communities.

The Notre Dame Monogram Club was founded by athletics director Jesse Harper in 1916 to bring together varsity letterwinners to promote spirit, unity, leadership and sportsmanship. Today's active members help keep past athletes connected to Notre Dame and the current student-athletes. In addition to helping contribute to scholarships, the Monogram Club has helped contribute to new facilities, especially the renovation of Heritage Hall and the Monogram Room, located in the Joyce Center.







Notre Dame's Neighbor

This is Irish Softball



Nearly 130 women have taken the field for the Notre Dame softball program since its inception in 1989. The Irish have posted 21 winning seasons in as many years with 11 consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament. In addition, Notre Dame has earned 93 individual all-BIG EAST accolades since joining the league in 1996.

All About The Irish

ACADEMIC ALL-AMERICANS

Notre Dame's softball team has been well represented on the CoSIDA Academic All-America teams since 1993, when Casey McMurray became the first Irish honoree. Since that season, a Notre Dame player has earned Academic All-America honors on 15 occasions, including four first-team selections. In 2002, Jarrah Myers was named college softball's Academic All-American of the Year.

Most recently, Stephanie Brown earned second team ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America honors following the 2006 and 2007 seasons. She graduated from the Mendoza College of Business with a 3.44 cumulative GPA as a marketing major. Heading into the 2009-10 season, Notre Dame was second among Division I schools with 210 Academic All-Americans.



Heather Booth held five career pitching records after wrapping up her four years with Notre Dame in 2007.

ALKIRE, MELANIE

One of the greatest Notre Dame sluggers set the previous single-season home run mark in 2000. That mark of 13 was later tied by Jarrah Myers during the 2002 campaign. Alkire also has the single-season mark for RBI (64) and slugging percentage (.665). The former shortstop still sits among the top-10 in virtually all of Notre Dame's career batting categories including hits (260), runs (129), batting average (.340), doubles (49), home runs (30), RBI (167) and walks (61).

ALL-AMERICANS

Notre Dame has seen 11 different players earn All-America honors from the National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) since 1994: Christine Lux (2009), Stephanie Brown (2006), Melanie Alkire (2000), Megan Ciolli (2004, 2005), Terri Kobata (1994, 1995), Jenny Kriech (2001), Andrea Loman (2002, 2003), Katie Marten (1995, 1996), Jarrah Myers (2001, 2002), Kristin Schmidt (2001) and Jennifer Sharron (2000, 2001).

ALL-TIME RECORD

Entering the 2010 season, Notre Dame softball has posted 844 wins in 21 seasons – just over 40 wins per year – and has never finished a campaign with a win total less than 30. The Irish have won over two-thirds of their games and have never had a losing record as the team enters its 22nd season of competitive softball. The program boasts an overall record of 844-399-3 (.679).

BIG EAST CONFERENCE

In Notre Dame's first season of BIG EAST Conference competition (1996) Liz Miller guided her team to the league's South Division title with a 19-1 record. When the Irish first joined the conference, they faced each divisional team in a pair of double-headers over the course of a two-day weekend. The formula changed in 1998, as the games were dropped to just a single doubleheader followed by a solo contest the next day. The conference adopted its current format in 1999, which pits each team in a single-day doubleheader.

Notre Dame is currently 225-43 (.840) in BIG EAST Conference regular-season competition. They finished the 1999 (16-0) and 2001 (20-0) conference

mark in 1996. In 2009, both Notre Dame (19-4) and Louisville (19-5) reached the 19-win mark.

Notre Dame has seen a team member earn the BIG EAST Conference's top player award on eight occasions. Melanie Alkire won the award in 1999 and 2000, followed by Lizzy Lemire (2001), Jarrah Myers (2002), Andrea Loman (2003) and Megan Ciolli (2004). Meghan Murray also was a two-time honoree, winning the league's top award in 1996 and 1997.

Six players have earned the league's Pitcher of the Year award, five have garnered Rookie of the Year nods, and the coaching staff has been named the top in the conference on five occasions. All-BIG EAST accolades have been passed out to Irish players on 93 occasions since 1996.

BOOTH, HEATHER

One of the most durable pitchers to ever play at Notre Dame, Booth averaged 225.0 innings/season including a school-record 261.1 during the 2006 campaign. Booth finished her career ranked among the top-three pitchers on the all-time record list in six single-season categories (appearances, games started, wins, complete games, innings pitched and strikeouts) and topped the Notre Dame career record books in appearances, games started, wins, complete games and innings pitched.

CAPTAINS

In the 21-year history of Irish softball, a total of 42 different student-athletes have served as team captains. Among that group, six have served as multi-year captains. The two-time captains are Ruth Kmak (1990, 1992), Jennifer Sharron (2000-01), Danielle Klayman (2000-01), Katie Laing (2007-08), Brittney Bargar (2008-09) and Linda Kohan (2008-09).

CIOLLI, MEGAN

One of the top players in program history, she concluded her career in 2005 with an NFCA All-America honor. She also was an ESPN The Magazine Academic All-District member in her final season. Ciolli was a four-time first-team all-BIG EAST selection – making her one of only four Irish softball players to gain the honor as many times – and was named the BIG EAST Player of the Year in 2004. A two-time NFCA third-team All-American and 2005 captain, Ciolli finds her name atop the all-time leaders in both career hits (284) and stolen bases (76).

DRAMATIC HOME RUNS

Notre Dame has had its fair share of dramatic home runs in its 21-year history – shots late in contests that have tied the game or put the Irish ahead on the scoreboard.

Liz Hartmann has been at the plate for many of those moments, as she hit come-from-behind home runs at Nebraska (2002) and Louisiana-Lafayette (2003) and against Nebraska (2004) in the UNLV Classic.

Also noteworthy is Andrea Loman's ninth-inning blast against Villanova in the 2003 BIG EAST Tournament finale to clinch the championship title. In 2004, Stephanie Brown hit the game-tying moon shot to send the 2004 BIG EAST Tournament title game into extra innings. Then two years later, she delivered again with a two-run blast in the bottom of the seventh inning that enabled the Irish to shock No. 10 Arizona State, 3-2, during the Judi Garman Classic.

Carissa Jaquish joined the group with a two-run home run at Syracuse in the 10th inning to give the Irish a 7-5 come-from-behind victory during the 2006 campaign.

Even pitcher Brittney Bargar got in the action when her first career hit – a walk-off homer in the bottom of the seventh – proved to be the game winner during a 2007 matchup with Toledo.



In 2008, Linda Kohan and Christine Lux joined rookie Katie Fleury in the home run department during an Irish win over Kent State to open NCAA Regional action in Ann Arbor, Mich. Moreover, the three home runs came in the same inning. It was the second time in school history that the Irish hit three home runs in the same inning – a feat last accomplished exactly one month prior against Wisconsin by the same trio.

Earlier in the 2008 season, Kohan sent a two-run homer out of Louisville's Ulmer Stadium in the eighth inning of a BIG EAST matchup to complete a come-from-behind victory over the Cardinals. The contest was televised live to a national audience.

During a 2009 twinbill with DePaul at Melissa Cook Stadium, Christine Lux had five hits across the two games with a pair of home runs – including a game-one shot that cleared the right field fence and landed on Twyckenham Drive. The 334-foot shot would have cleared the right field fence at Frank Eck Stadium, the home of Notre Dame's baseball team.

FIFTY FOUR

The 2001 Irish softball team posted a stellar 54-7 record, easily setting the mark for the most wins during one season in Notre Dame softball history. Liz Miller's last team posted a national-best 33-game win streak during the season and knocked off nine ranked teams along the way. The Irish stubbed their toe in the BIG EAST Tournament that year, but were awarded a No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament for the first time in the program's history. During the year, Notre Dame achieved its highest-ever ranking, peaking at seventh in the USA Today/NFCA Top 25 poll.

FIGHTING IRISH

Exactly where and how Notre Dame's athletic nickname, "Fighting Irish," came to origination has never been perfectly explained. One story suggests the moniker was born in 1899 when with Notre Dame leading Northwestern 5-0 at halftime of a football game in Evanston, Ill., the Wildcat fans supposedly began to chant, "Kill the Fighting Irish, kill the Fighting Irish," as the second half opened. Another tale has the nickname originating at halftime of the Notre Dame-Michigan football game in 1909. With his team trailing, one Notre Dame player yelled to his teammates – who happened to have names like Dolan, Kelly, Glynn, Duffy, and Ryan – "What's the matter with you guys? You're all Irish and you're not fighting worth a lick." Notre Dame came back to win the game and the press, after overhearing the remark, reported the game as a victory for the "Fighting Irish." The most generally-accepted explanation is that the press coined the nickname as a characterization of Notre Dame athletic teams, their never-say-die fighting spirit and the Irish qualities of grit, determination, and tenacity. The term likely began as an abusive expression tauntingly directed toward the athletes from the small, private, Catholic institution. Notre Dame alumnus Francis Wallace popularized it in his New York Daily News columns in the 1920s. The Notre Dame Scholastic, in a 1929 edition, printed its own version of the story: "The term 'Fighting Irish' has been applied to Notre

Dame teams for years. It first attached itself years ago when the school, comparatively unknown, sent its athletic teams away to play in another city ... At that time the title 'Fighting Irish' held no glory or prestige ... The years passed swiftly and the school began to take a place in the sports world ... 'Fighting Irish' took on a new meaning. The unknown of a few years past has boldly taken a place among the leaders. The unkind appellation became symbolic of the struggle for supremacy of the field ... the term, while given in irony, has become our heritage ... So truly does it represent us that we are unwilling to part with it." Notre Dame competed under the nickname "Catholics" during the 1800s and became more widely known as the "Ramblers" during the early 1920s in the days of the Four Horsemen. University president Rev. Matthew Walsh, C.S.C., officially adopted "Fighting Irish" as the Notre Dame nickname in 1927.

GAMES PLAYED

Notre Dame set the school record for games played in a single season during the 2004 campaign, taking the field 69 times and compiling a 49-20 record to set

2005 – at one time comprised the entire University infrastructure, and in 1879 was rebuilt in five months after a devastating fire. The twelve Columbus murals in the main corridor were painted by Luigi Gregori, an Italian artist who spent 17 years at Notre Dame in the latter part of the 1800s. The building now contains the primary administrative offices, including that of Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., who took over in June of 2005 as Notre Dame's 17th president. The exterior of the building was renovated and cleaned in 1996 and the interior of the building was renovated and reopened in August of 1999, after being closed the previous two academic years.

GUMPF, DEANNA

The third head coach in Notre Dame softball history, Deanna Gumpf served as the Irish pitching coach under Liz Miller for four seasons before taking over the program in the summer of 2001 after Miller's retirement. In her first season, Gumpf and her staff landed the BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year and the NFCA Mid-east Region Coaching Staff of the Year awards while helping the Irish win the BIG EAST Tournament and advance to the final day of competition in their respective NCAA Tournament regional bracket.

Through eight seasons at the helm of the program, Gumpf has led the team to four BIG EAST regular season championships, four BIG EAST Tournament titles and 332 wins.

INDOOR FACILITY

Since the weather is not always conducive to outside practice during the winter months in northern Indiana, the Notre Dame softball team takes full advantage of the indoor batting and pitching facility adjacent to Frank Eck Stadium – the home of Notre Dame baseball. Donated by alumnus Frank Eck, the facility features wall-to-wall artificial turf, four full batting tunnels and a regulation clay pitching surface. To sharpen its defensive skills during the winter months, Notre Dame heads to the Loftus Sports Center, which features a full Prestige Turf football field that is also lined for softball drills.

IVY FIELD

Once the home of the Fighting Irish, Ivy Field was the place to be for every Notre Dame home game since the program began in 1989. It played host to the BIG EAST Tournament in 1998 and 2006, and Notre Dame posted a 288-48-2 (.855) mark within its friendly confines.

Facility-bests include 24 wins in 1996 and a perfect 18-0 mark at home in 2001.

Ivy Field was retired after Notre Dame swept an April 9 doubleheader from Eastern Michigan. Christine Lux had nine RBI during the twinbill, tying a school record with seven RBI in the opening contest.

HOME RUN POWER

Notre Dame exploded for a team-record 54 home runs during the 2002 season, shattering the previous record of 36 in 2000. Jarrah Myers ended up with a then single-season-record 13 round trippers, followed by Andrea Loman (11), Andria Bledsoe (7) and Liz Hartmann (7). Hartmann's total was the most-ever by a freshman at Notre Dame until Stephanie Brown notched as many during her rookie campaign in 2004.

the mark for the second-most wins in a single season.

Teammates Stephanie Brown, Meagan Ruthrauff, Sara Schoonaert and Nicole deFau all share the school record for games played, as each player appeared and started in all of 2004's 69 contests.

The Irish have seen action in a total of 1,246 contests.

GOLD AND BLUE

The origin of Notre Dame's school colors can be traced back to the founding of the University in 1842. At that time, Notre Dame's original school colors were yellow and blue; yellow symbolized the light and blue represented the truth. However, sometime after the Dome and Statue of Mary atop the Main Building were gilded, gold and blue became the official colors of the University.

GOLDEN DOME

The Main Building, surmounted by a statue of Our Lady atop the world-famous Golden Dome – actually gold leaf periodically replaced, most recently in

All About The Irish

In all, 10 different Irish players hit at least one home run during the 2002 season.

The Irish threatened the record once again in 2003, cranking 49 balls out of the park. Eight players hit three or more home runs, led by Loman and Hartmann with nine apiece.

Notre Dame also started on a torrid pace with the home run ball in 2004, ending up hitting 39 dingers in 69 games. The Irish again flexed their muscle in 2006 by hitting 44 home runs with Meagan Ruthrauff ending the season with 12 home runs.

However, the 2009 season saw 66 Irish home runs leave the yard, led by Christine Lux's 15 (Lux also had 15 as a sophomore in 2008). Linda Kohan belted 11 with Dani Miller posting a freshman-record 11 more. Lux, Kohan and Miller comprised the first threesome of the Irish teammates to post 10+ home runs in program history. The record-setting 66 single-season home runs included four grand slams and 20 multi-home run contests.

HAYES, SARA

The premier hitter for the Irish in the early 1990s, Sara Hayes' name appears all over the Notre Dame career offensive record book. She ranks in the top seven for doubles (44), triples (11), home runs (26), RBI (137), walks (66) and putouts (964). Hayes was named the Midwestern Collegiate Conference's Player of the Year in 1995 and was a three-time first-team all-conference pick.

INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL

The Notre Dame softball team has enjoyed three memorable international trips over the past several years. Prior the 2000 season, the team spent its fall break in Australia, while the 2004 team ended up in Ireland and England for several days in October of 2003.

While in Europe the Irish had a chance to develop softball at the grassroots level, as the team spent time

in Dublin and London during its trip, offering clinics to local softball players.

Gumpf's 2008 squad trekked through Italy during fall break (2007), including stops in Rome, Florence and Venice. Upon leaving Venice, the team traveled to the town of Forli (near San Marino) where they competed against a compilation of players from Italy's professional softball league and members of the Italian national team.

KOBATA, TERRI

One of the most dominant pitchers in all of college softball in the early 1990s, Terri Kobata became Notre Dame's first softball All-American by claiming the honor in 1994. She ended her career with 42 shutouts, an overall record of 79-15 (.840), 907 strikeouts, 285 hits allowed, and a miniscule 0.63 ERA. Kobata's legacy also is highlighted by 15 career no-hitters – 14 of which were solo – which helps make her one of the greatest hurlers in Notre Dame history. She posted a 10.09 strikeout ratio for her career, the 10th-best mark ever in NCAA history. Her single-season 10.90 strikeout ratio led all of college softball in 1993.

LOMAN, ANDREA

It would be a difficult challenge to proclaim who the greatest player in Notre Dame softball history may be, but 2003 graduate Andrea Loman would be one of the first players brought up in the conversation. Loman compiled one of the greatest careers in Irish history from 2000-03, claiming two All-America honors along with the BIG EAST Player of the Year, BIG EAST Championship's Most Outstanding Player and BIG EAST Rookie of the Year trophies.

Loman's presence in the Irish record book speaks for itself, as the Riverside, Calif., native stands second in career runs (164), third in walks (87) and home runs (31), fourth in RBI (148) and fifth in batting average (.347), and seventh in doubles (44) and fielding percentage (.977). In 2003, Loman led the Irish in batting average (.402), runs (43), hits (68), doubles (12), home runs (9), RBI (42), total bases (111), slugging percentage (.657), on-base percentage (.466) and stolen bases (18).

MELISSA COOK STADIUM

A 1993 Notre Dame graduate and softball letter-winner, Melissa Cook was the first former player to pass away when she left us in 2002 – but her legend and spirit continue to thrive at the University.

At Ivy Field, head coach Deanna Gumpf – along

with the 2003 Irish team and Cook's family – dedicated a bench near the facility to the former second baseman and shortstop during the team's fall alumni game scrimmage.

In the summer of 2006 Cook's parents – Linda and Paul Demo – made a generous donation to the Notre Dame softball team to help defray the costs of construction for a new softball stadium in Melissa's memory. The Melissa Cook Stadium, a \$4.8 million facility, is located on the southeast corner of the Notre Dame campus near Eck Baseball Stadium. The stadium was dedicated in April 2008, and is considered one of the more remarkable softball facilities in the Midwest.

Raised in Merrillville, Ind., Cook played for the Fighting Irish softball team in 1991 and 1992, seeing time at second base, shortstop and catcher. She led the team in triples as a freshman and earned a monogram before opting to study abroad one year later. An accounting major, she earned her bachelor's degree and was the controller for Teamsters Union Local 786 prior to her death.

She was a standout athlete in high school, excelling in basketball, volleyball and softball. When Notre Dame offered her a scholarship to play softball, she had achieved a lifelong dream.

Notre Dame broke ground on the stadium in April 2007 on the weekend the University celebrated 35 years of women's athletics.

MIDWESTERN COLLEGIATE CONFERENCE

Notre Dame competed in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference – now called the Horizon League – from 1989 through 1995 before joining the BIG EAST Conference. The Irish racked up a record of 66-15 (.815) in MCC regular-season play and won the league tournament title in five of its seven years of membership. Notre Dame's first coach, Brian Boulac, was named MCC Coach of the Year in 1989 while Liz Miller landed the same honor in 1994 and 1995.

MILLER, LIZ

The architect of Notre Dame softball's rise to prominence, Liz Miller coached the Irish for nine seasons (1993-2001) and led the team to six NCAA Tournament appearances. Miller posted an outstanding 377-156 (.707) record at Notre Dame, which was the final coaching stop of her stellar career. She was



named to the NFCA Hall of Fame in the fall of 2005. Among her career highlights, Miller implemented the women's athletic program at Lake Michigan College and compiled a 1,047-331 overall combined record while coaching volleyball, basketball and softball at the school. After narrowing her focus solely on soft-

ball, she amassed 12 conference championships and 11 regional titles for Lake Michigan.

Miller received an honorary monogram from the University of Notre Dame upon her retirement at the end of the 2001 season. She and her husband, Lloyd, who also played a large part in the development of the Notre Dame program while Liz was head coach, are still very close to the program and to this day attend many of the team's games both at home and on the road.

Miller ended her softball coaching career with 918 career victories in 26 seasons, winning more than 75 percent of the games she coached.

MONOGRAM CLUB

The Notre Dame Monogram Club is comprised of some 4,300 due-paying individuals who have earned the University's varsity athletic insignia for their athletic or team support endeavors or have been honorary monogram recipients. The club supports the primary goal of the University: the spiritual, intellectual, and physical development of its students and alumni. By providing its members the opportunity to foster and maintain relationships across different sports, generations and geographical locations, the Monogram Club aspires to contribute – through the common bond of sport – to the social and professional enrichment of its members while providing a means for ongoing association with the University. As an integral part of the Notre Dame family, the Monogram Club endeavors to uphold and enrich the great tradition of Notre Dame athletics.

MYERS, JARRAH

Possibly the greatest power hitter to ever don the blue and gold, Myers completed her career in 2002 with a trunk full of awards. In 2002 alone, she was named the BIG EAST Player of the Year, the BIG EAST Scholar-Athlete of the Year, first-team CoSIDA Academic All-American, third-team NFCA/Louisville Slugger All-American, CoSIDA Academic All-American of the Year for softball, and earned the Notre Dame Monogram Club Team MVP. Even more, she took home Notre Dame's Knute Rockne Scholar-Athlete Award and became the fourth Notre Dame softball player to land the school's prestigious Byron V. Kanaley Award.

Myers sits atop the Irish career lists in home runs (36), RBI (174) and putouts (1,337). Myers is also fourth in walks (76), seventh in stolen bases (43) and tenth (.976) in fielding percentage.

NCAA TOURNAMENT

The Notre Dame softball team has appeared in the NCAA Tournament 14 times overall including visits in each of the last 11 seasons. The Irish have reached the final day of regional competition six times before being eliminated by Michigan (1995, 2003 and 2009), Iowa (2001), Nebraska (2002) and Northwestern (2005 and 2006). Although Notre Dame has made 14 different trips to The Show, they have only visited four different post-season sites (Bloomington, Ind. – 1994; Ann Arbor, Mich. – 1995-96, 1999-2000, 2003-04, 2008-09; Iowa City, Iowa – 2001-02; Evanston, Ill. – 2006-07).

The Irish served as a tournament host to regional competition in 2005, tacking on a 2-2 record during play at Ivy Field.

UNITED STATES NATIONAL TEAMS

Four Irish players have made their presence felt on the United States National Team over the past several years. Jarrah Myers, Lizzy Lemire and Jennifer Sharron became the first Notre Dame players to earn a spot on the U.S. National Team, doing so in the summer of 2001. Lemire played on the USA Red team, which competed in the 2001 U.S. Cup. Myers and Sharron landed on USA Blue, which traveled to Maracay, Venezuela, for the Pan Am Qualifier. USA Blue dominated the tournament, not allowing a single run to any of the competing teams. Sharron even tossed a perfect game for USA Blue in their battle with Brazil.

Mallorie Lenn earned a spot on the U.S. Junior National team in Hermasillo, Mexico, for the first Pan American championship team during the summer of 2002. Lenn was a key member of the gold-medal winning U.S. team, providing the game-winning RBI in its final round-robin game, and was behind the plate for the tournament's final contest, which the United States won against Canada.

Alexis Madrid competed as a member of the Puerto Rican National Fastpitch team during the summer of 2002.

In 2006, Linda Kohan earned an invitation to join the Israeli National team, but declined the offer.

NATIONAL PRO FASTPITCH

National Pro Fastpitch, a six-team professional softball league, began competition in the summer of 2005. Megan Ciolli, who played for the Chicago Bandits, represented Notre Dame during the league's inaugural season. She made her alma mater proud by batting .241, adding eight RBI, eight stolen bases, and a homer.

Stephanie Brown was drafted by the Chicago Bandits in 2007 and enjoyed a successful, but brief, playing career that was cut short due to injury.

NO-HITTERS

There have been 36 no-hitters thrown in Notre Dame softball history, including a pair in 2008.

Brittney Bargar recorded the program's first no-hitter in an NCAA Tournament game, a 9-1 decision over Kent State in 2008, which also gave Bargar the honor of becoming the first Irish pitcher to record 30 wins in a season. Bargar's first no-hitter of the season came at Syracuse to celebrate Notre Dame's 800th overall win.

Terri Kobata ended her career as the queen of no-hitters at Notre Dame with 15 on her resume.

ONE OF THE BEST

The NFCA announced the USA Today/NFCA All-Time Top 50 during the fall of 2003 and Notre Dame ranks among the top softball programs in the nation. The Irish were tagged with the poll's 32nd spot.

Based on the weekly national rankings from 1995 until the end of the 2003 slate, the poll was led by Arizona, followed by UCLA and Washington.


RANKED TEAMS

The Irish have a tendency to pull off the upset and defeat a ranked opponent on an annual basis. In every season dating back to 1994 – with the exception of the 2003 campaign – Notre Dame has downed at least one team that was in the top-25. Overall, Notre Dame has 53 wins over 28 ranked opponents. Among some of the higher ranked programs the Irish have knocked off in recent years are: Washington (#4), Nebraska (#4), Michigan (#5), Tennessee (#5), Oklahoma (#6), Fresno State (#7), Florida State (#9), and Arizona State (#10).

RECORD BREAKERS

Since Deanna Gumpf assumed control of the program for the 2002 season, the Irish have continued to match or eclipse several single-season records.

The 2002 team set school records for home runs (54) and runs scored (318). The 2003 edition set the school mark (at the time) for fielding percentage (.971). In 2004, the Irish established the record number of double plays (22), games played (69) and complete games pitched (52). One year later, Notre Dame

set the school records for strikeouts thrown (527), strikeouts per seven innings (8.74) and attempted steals (134). The 2006 edition of the Blue and Gold holds the school record for single-season walks (144) and fielding percentage (.977). The single-season walks record was rewritten in 2008 (148).

A number of top single-season team marks were set during 2009 including: runs (2nd – 310), doubles (3rd – 90), home runs (1st – 66), RBI (1st – 282), total bases (1st – 748), slugging pct. (1st – .501), walks (1st – 152), on-base pct. (2nd – .371) and complete games (3rd – 46).

ROAD WARRIORS

During the program's second complete varsity season in 1990, Notre Dame began to hit the road and take part in what has become a staple tradition in collegiate softball – the early season, warm-weathered tournaments. The Irish are one of the many softball programs that annually seek the top competition in the top tournaments slated for the season's first several weeks.

Notre Dame has traveled to 46 destinations in 17 different states for early-season tournaments since 1990.

RUTHRAUFF, MEAGAN

Over a historical four-year career with the Irish, Meagan Ruthrauff established herself as one of the most productive hitters to play under the Golden Dome. Ruthrauff set a new standard for single-game offensive production during a 2006 meeting with Pittsburgh as she clubbed a team-record three home runs on her way to knocking in a school-record seven runs against the Panthers. The former first baseman and designated player ranks second in ND single-season history in walks (36), RBI (54), and on-base percentage (.477) and fifth in home runs (12). Ruthrauff is the career leader in games played (247) and walks (112).

SHARRON, JENNIFER

Jennifer Sharron graduated from Notre Dame in 2001 but left her mark in the circle as a storied pitcher. The only lefthander to ever pitch for Notre Dame, Sharron sits among the all-time leaders in wins (88), complete games (76) and innings pitched (772.1). She became the first BIG EAST player to win four consecutive conference pitcher-of-the-year awards (1998-2001) and earned first-team all-conference honors four consecutive times.

STENGLEIN, STEFFANY

One of the greatest strikeout pitchers the Irish has produced, Stenglein ranks among the best for single-season strikeouts (310), innings pitched (250.2) and wins (27). She also finished her career in 2005 ranking among the top-three in appearances (154), games started (132), wins (79) and innings pitched (744.0). Stenglein was also a three-time all-BIG EAST first-team selection and a two-time conference pitcher-of-the-year.

SEVEN FIRST-TEAMERS

Notre Dame has improved its school record for first-team all-BIG EAST honorees three times in the last several seasons. The 2001, 2002 and 2004 teams included a record seven first-team award winners:

2004 – Steffany Stenglein, Heather Booth, Mallorie Lenn, Liz Hartmann, Stephanie Brown, Megan Ciolli and Nicole deFau; 2003 – Andria Bledsoe, Ciolli, Andrea Loman, Lisa Mattison, Stenglein, Jarrah Myers and Jenny Kriech; 2001 – Loman, Mattison, Kriech, Melanie Alkire, Lizzy Lemire, Jennifer Sharron and Kristin Schmidt.

VICTORY MARCH

The most recognizable collegiate fight song in the nation, the "Notre Dame Victory March" was written in the early 1900s by two brothers who were University of Notre Dame graduates. Michael Shea, a 1905 graduate, composed the music while his brother, John Shea, who earned degrees in 1906 and 1908, provided the corresponding lyrics. The song was copyrighted in 1908 and a piano version, complete with lyrics, was published that year. Michael, who became a priest in Ossining, N.Y., collaborated on the project with John, who lived in Holyoke, Mass., the song's public debut came in the winter of 1908 when Michael played it on the organ of the Second Congregational Church in Holyoke. The Shea brothers later presented the "Notre Dame Victory March" to the University, and it first appeared under the copyright of the University of Notre Dame in 1928. The copyright for the beginning of the song still is in effect. The more well-known second verse, which begins with the words "Cheer, cheer for Old Notre

Dame," now is in the public domain in the United States (for both the music and lyrics) – but the second verse remains protected in all territories outside of the country. Notre Dame's fight song first was performed at Notre Dame on Easter Sunday, 1909, in the rotunda of the Main Building when the Notre Dame band performed the Victory March as part of its traditional Easter morning concert. It was first heard at a Notre

Dame athletic event 10 years later. In 1969, as college football celebrated its centennial, the "Notre Dame Victory March" was honored as the "greatest of all fight songs." Michael Shea was pastor of St. Augustine's Church in Ossining until his death in 1938. John Shea, a baseball monogram winner at Notre Dame, became a Massachusetts state senator and lived in Holyoke until his death in 1965.

The original lyrics, written when all athletes at Notre Dame were male, refer to "sons," but in recognition of the fact that the Victory March is now played for athletic teams composed of men and women, many modify the words accordingly. The "Victory March" earned a number-one ranking in ratings compiled in 1998 in a book, "College Fight Songs: An Annotated Anthology." The "Victory March" was also the No. 1-ranked fight song in a 1990 survey conducted by Bill Studwell, a librarian at Northern Illinois University.

Rally sons of Notre Dame:
Sing her glory and sound her fame,
Raise her Gold and Blue
And cheer with voices true:
Rah, rah, for Notre Dame

We will fight in ev-ry game,
Strong of heart and true to her name
We will ne'er forget her
And will cheer her ever
Loyal to Notre Dame

Cheer, cheer for old Notre Dame,
Wake up the echoes cheering her name,
Send a volley cheer on high,
Shake down the thunder from the sky.
What though the odds be great or small
Old Notre Dame will win over all,
While her loyal sons are marching
Onward to victory.

WEBSITE

Notre Dame's website also offers a variety of press releases, media guide information, individual team pages and other print material.

WOMEN'S ATHLETICS

Notre Dame celebrated 35 years of women's athletics in April 2007 with the Monogram Club serving as the primary sponsor and organizer of the historic event. More than 100 former Notre Dame women's athletes attended the weekend celebration, which included a Friday-night dinner at the home of athletics director Kevin White; athletic events on Saturday; sports-specific social events; and the concluding Mass and Sunday brunch that were held in the Joyce Center Arena. The Mass took on added significance for those in attendance, as current University president Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., was joined by his predecessors – Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, C.S.C., and Rev. Edward "Monk" Malloy, C.S.C. – as the celebrants.

Quest For Back-To-Back BIG EAST Titles Underway For Fighting Irish Softball

Irish aim for 22nd consecutive winning season in 2010 with a roster balanced with experience, youth and athleticism.

The defending 2009 BIG EAST Tournament champions may have lost five seniors heading into this year's campaign, but head coach Deanna Gumpf has taken the momentum from the back half of last year's drive to the league title into what could be a breakout venture for the Notre Dame softball program. Six returning all-BIG EAST performers including All-American slugger Christine Lux provide the Irish with one of the league's most decorated returning nuclei.

"We are a very experienced and talented team with an unparalleled blend of young, yet mature, student-athletes," Gumpf said. "This is a group of young ladies who approach the game with a plan. Even though the core of our lineup from last season returns to the field in 2010, this is a completely different team. Things that worked last year won't necessarily work this year. Things that we are doing differently this year, we would never have done last year. Our strengths are different, and this team is deeper position by position."

While the 2009 team set single-season school records for home runs (66), RBI (282), total bases (748), slugging percentage (.501) and walks (152), Gumpf truly believes that the Irish could trump any or all of those accolades this year.

"Our approach this year is to give our best shot to every team we play," Gumpf said. "We are playing a lot of teams from different regions around the nation, and they are going to be gunning for us. But regardless of whom we play, our team has one thing in mind – to win games."

"We did lose some big bats in the lineup, but I am expecting some of our youngsters to step up in those positions," Gumpf said. "There is a lot of flexibility on our roster. A bit of our slugging is gone but we're gaining so much speed."

"Losing a pair of all-BIG EAST players in Beth Northway and Linda Kohan takes away two big bats, but we're getting back a seasoned Dani Miller and a healthier Heather Johnson, who has gotten better every year. And of course, Lux will be a threat every time she steps into the batter's box. In that regard, we have a lot of veteran power which will fill the gaps."

Miller cemented herself as one of the top freshmen in the BIG EAST in 2009 and was the lone league rookie to earn first-team all-BIG EAST honors. Her 11 home runs set a Notre Dame freshman record, bettered

only by Lux's total of 15. Miller should see time at second base while Lux and Johnson – who will have another year of eligibility after her senior season – are slated to take care of the corners of the infield. Kathryn Lux will play behind her older sister at first base and

in 2009, starting each of the team's 60 contests.

"The mainstays in the corners will be Christine Lux and Johnson, who combined to start almost every game last year in those spots," Gumpf said. "They are quick on their feet and not much gets past them. They are veterans and do a great job of predicting the game. They are both big playmakers that are quick and agile."

Rounding out the infield is junior Katie Fleury, an all-BIG EAST selection as a freshman in 2008. Fleury will be a fixture at shortstop, where she has been a starter since her first game with the Irish. Fleury's experience and instincts will be counted on to anchor the middle infield.

"Katie is getting better and better every year and she is expecting more from herself, which is good," Gumpf said. "She is a lot more mature than last year. She is learning how to slow the game down. Katie can get to any ball, and now we are focusing on her defensive mechanics. I expect her to have a great year and really lead the way for the infield."

Junior Erin Marrone has played several positions throughout her career – catcher, outfield, first base and second base – and offers a versatile force for the lineup wherever she is situated. Marrone went from hitting .196 in 55 games as a freshman to a .355 average in 2009, which helped earn her all-league and all-region citations. The coaching staff should be confident putting her anywhere in the park as she also boasts a very respectable .994 fielding percentage.

Big-time playmakers in Brianna Jorgensborg, Sadie Pitzenberger and Alexa Maldonado will provide a stable corps of outfielders. Also in contention will be freshman Kelsey Thornton, a slasher from the heart of Texas.

"Having a healthy Pitzenberger, who has missed the bulk of the last two seasons with injuries, back in the lineup will be essential," Gumpf said.

Pitzenberger will make the transition from the middle infield to the outfield for the Irish this season, also bringing a solid stick to the plate with speed to burn. Maldonado, a lefty slapper at the plate, raised eyebrows across the nation last year after making a number of spectacular plays in centerfield. Jorgensborg's slugging percentage of .509 in 2009 provides an insight to what should be a promising junior campaign. She earned all-BIG EAST honors in 2008. Marrone and Miller could also spend time in both the infield and outfield.

Kasey O'Connor could see time at second base.

Johnson's batting average has progressively improved since her freshman year when she hit at a .306 rate. An injury halted her sophomore year (.250) as she bounced back to hit .356 with 14 doubles and 39 RBI



Losing a dominant tosser in Brittney Bargar to graduation will certainly have an impact on the Irish pitching staff, as Bargar left as the program's all-time leader in appearances (172), games started (137), complete games (99), and innings pitched (931.0) and ranked second with 92 wins. However, Notre Dame is in great hands with junior Jody Valdivia, a right-hander who did not drop a BIG EAST Conference game in 2009 (10-0). In fact, Valdivia was victorious in each of the last 17 decisions of her sophomore campaign.

"Jody definitely found her swagger last year," Gumpf said. "She definitely gained the knowledge and ability to know exactly how to beat teams. She is stronger and smarter than she was a year ago, and last year she was again stronger and smarter than the year before. Jody keeps getting better and I expect some dominant innings from her this year. She is able to do everything on the mound."

Joining Valdivia in the rotation are freshmen Jackie Bowe and Brittany O'Donnell, a pair that combined for 2,689 strikeouts during their high school careers. Shannon Kelly will also see time in the circle for the Irish.

"Although our pitching staff is younger this year as a whole, they are much more well-rounded," Gumpf said. "Having Shannon back in the mix is good. Also with the two freshmen, I think they bring a lot to the table, and their styles are so different which gives us more options."

"Brittany is a down-pitcher, but she's been working her corners better in the last few months and finding the college strike zone. Jackie is 100 percent pure competitor. Bringing Shannon back to the game after her injury provides a fourth dimension for us. Shannon will keep hitters on their toes and teams won't know what to expect from her. I like what she brings to the table and she'll be an excellent closer for us."

"With all of our new pitchers, teams really won't know how to scout us unless they saw Jody last year. And now Jody is different pitcher than she was last year."

Calling the shots behind the plate for any of the four pitchers will be senior Alexia Clay, sophomore Kristina Wright and freshman Amy Buntin.

"Having the addition of Amy has been very helpful for Alexia and Kristina, and each of the three have different strengths," Gumpf said. "Alexia does a great job of being a general on the field. She is very calming for the pitchers and does a great job of keeping things very calm, collected and cool. She does a great job of receiving. Kristina has grown a lot from her freshman year. She has been able to take a deep breath and just play the game. When she does that she will be very helpful from behind the plate because she has such a great arm. Amy has great physical tools and just needs to get her feet wet and get some experience back there. She will be the catcher who will continue to get better every time she is back there. All three will see plenty of action throughout the season."

Leading the Irish on and off the field is a trio of team captains in Johnson, Fleury and Christine Lux.

"The captains have done a great job after being chosen by their teammates," Gumpf said. "They have

done a great job of embracing their position, not only in the sense of the position, but also the job behind it. They are working very hard to make their team different than before, but better than before, and take care of business off the field and on the field."

The three captains will be counted on to lead the Irish back to the BIG EAST Tournament title in 2010, as the Irish were tabbed third in the BIG EAST Preseason Coaches' Poll. The Irish received two first-place votes for 125 total points. Four squads received

first-place votes and topped 110 points in the poll. Furthermore, Notre Dame received votes in the NFCA / USA Today Top 25 Preseason Poll.

Louisville was named the favorite to win the BIG EAST title this season, as 2009 BIG EAST Player of the Year Melissa Roth leads a group of six returning players for the Cardinals who were all-BIG EAST selections last season. Louisville garnered six first-place votes and 137 total points to earn top billing in 2010.

DePaul was second with six fewer points than Louisville. The Blue Demons received four first-place votes and 131 points.

The final first-place vote was awarded to USEF, who entered last year's BIG EAST finale as the No. 5 seed and upset No. 4 Syracuse before falling to top-seeded DePaul in the semifinals.

Notre Dame opens the 2010 season against Creighton on Feb. 12 as part of the Kajikawa Classic in Tempe, Ariz., tipping off a schedule which features trips to 10 different states and includes 16 home dates.

"Like every other season, we want to play the best teams across the nation," Gumpf said. "And as the BIG EAST Conference continues to improve every year, we have to prepare ourselves for league play by putting together a solid non-conference schedule. This sched-

ule has it all, from the defending national champion (Washington) to a number of last year's conference champions."

Notre Dame begins the season at the Kajikawa Classic hosted by Arizona State. The Irish will face Creighton (Feb. 12), Oregon (Feb. 12), Auburn (Feb. 13), Oregon State (Feb. 13) and Washington (Feb. 14) in Tempe, Ariz. In fact, the matchup against the Huskies will mark the eighth time in the last 10 seasons the Irish have been slated to face the defending national champion (Notre Dame was scheduled to play Arizona in 2008 but the game was called off due to rain).

From Feb. 20-21, Notre Dame will take part in the Southern Miss Mizuno Classic in Hattiesburg, Miss., where the Irish will square off with Louisiana Tech, Stephen F. Austin, Alcorn State and the host Golden Eagles.

The University of Virginia Invitational in Charlottesville, Va., will feature matchups against Lehigh (Feb. 26, Feb. 28), Ohio (Feb. 26), George Washington (Feb. 27) and the host Cavaliers (Feb. 27).

Nine days in California will feature nine contests against teams from around the nation. The UC Riverside Aten Construction Tournament (March 6-7) and the Long Beach State Invitational (March 12-14) will sandwich a non-conference meeting at Cal State Northridge.

The home portion of the schedule begins March 23 against Eastern Michigan with a doubleheader versus Toledo one day later.

BIG EAST Conference play gets going at Seton Hall (March 27-28), with the first home league series April 1-3 against Rutgers. That will start an 11-game homestand – including series with USEF (April 10-11) and Georgetown (April 14) – which ends April 15 against Cleveland State.

Notre Dame travels to Louisville (April 17-18), DePaul (April 22) and St. John's (May 8-9) in the regular-season's closing weeks.

Louisville will host the BIG EAST Championship (May 13-15) at Ulmer Stadium for the third consecutive season. The league's regular-season format differs for the 2010 season, as most meetings will consist of three-game series instead of the previous two-game format utilized in the past.

The NCAA Tournament starts May 20 and culminates with the Women's College World Series (May 31-June 6) in Oklahoma City, Okla.

Notre Dame will play each of its home games at Melissa Cook Stadium.

The BIG EAST Conference -- Louisville was named the favorite to win the BIG EAST softball championship this season in the annual Preseason Coaches' Poll. Melissa Roth, 2009 BIG EAST Player of the Year, leads a group six returning players for the Cardinals who were all-BIG EAST selections a year ago. Four squads received first-place votes and topped 110 points in this year's poll.

Louisville garnered six first-place votes and 137 total points to earn top billing in 2010. DePaul came in second in this year's poll, only six points behind Louisville. The Blue Demons received four first-place votes and 131 points.

Notre Dame, last year's BIG EAST Tournament champion, was third in the poll with two first-place votes.

The final first-place vote in 2010's coaches' poll was awarded to USEF.

This season's BIG EAST Championship returns to Louisville, Ky., for the third straight season. The three-day tournament begins on May 13 with four quarterfinal games. The semifinals on May 14 and the championship game on May 15 will be aired live on CBS College Sports.



AS A SOPHOMORE (2008): Established herself as one of the most prolific home run hitters in Irish history through only two years with the program ... set a school record with 14 homers during the regular season and tied the BIG EAST Conference's second-place mark with eight bombs in league play ... Notre Dame led the BIG EAST with 39 overall homers during the regular season, 22 of which were hit in conference games ... ninth in school history with 18 career home runs ... her slugging percentage of .661 was fifth-best while her 17 runs scored tied for first in the league ... was on the receiving end of eight double plays at first base and her 19 putouts against Connecticut on April 29 was the highest total recorded by any conference player in any game throughout the season ... homered six times in Notre Dame's last 10 outings of the regular season ... was batting .182 heading into an April 9 doubleheader against Eastern Michigan ... two games and a few hits later, that average was bumped up to .223, aided especially by a record-setting performance at the plate ... she hit for the cycle over the two-game swing with the Eagles, knocking a homer, double and a single in game one ... she settled for a triple and one single in the second contest ... that effort tied a school record with seven RBI to open the day, matching Meagan Ruthrauff's total from a 2006 conference game at Pittsburgh, which was played exactly two years prior ... though Lux accomplished the feat in an abbreviated five-inning game, seeing the plate only three times ... Through only eight seasons as the head softball coach at Notre Dame, Deanna Gumpf has already established herself as one of the premiere college coaches in the nation.

Under her tutelage, the Irish have claimed four BIG EAST Tournament titles and eight trips to the NCAA Tournament. Even more, Notre Dame staked the BIG EAST's regular-season championship during her first four seasons on the bench to extend its dominance over league opponents.

In fact, Gumpf enters her ninth season as the Irish head coach with a record of 332-153-1 (.684) for the highest victory average of any BIG EAST skipper.

Gumpf and the Irish enter 2010 on the heels of a landmark 2009 campaign in which Notre Dame posted its 21st winning season in as many years with a 43-17 record. It was the 11th 40-win campaign in program history and fifth under Gumpf. Notre Dame also advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 11th straight year and was ranked 25th in the final regular season NFCA Top 25 poll. The ranking was a first since 2004 and the first to end the season since 2002.

A number of top single-season team marks were set during 2009 including: runs (2nd - 310), doubles (3rd - 90), home runs (1st - 66), RBI (1st - 282), total bases (1st - 748), slugging pct. (1st - .501), walks (1st - 152), on-base pct. (2nd - .371) and complete games (3rd - 46).

That season also saw Christine Lux earn third-team NFCA All-America accolades, becoming

the 17th Irish player to cop the honor. Over the course of the 60-game season, Lux amassed a .329 batting average while also tallying 15 home runs, a number that ties the program's single-season mark for home runs that she herself set in 2008.

Pitcher Brittney Bargar thrived under Gumpf's guidance and earned her second NFCA All-Region honor in as many seasons as she was one of five Notre Dame players to receive the distinction. She was joined in the award column by classmate Beth Northway, sophomore Erin Marrone, freshman Dani Miller and Lux. The five honorees comprised the largest group of all-region selections since Notre Dame placed six on the team in 2001.

Notre Dame beat three teams - St. John's, No. 17 Louisville and No. 19 DePaul - without allowing an earned run en route to claiming the program's sixth BIG EAST Tournament title. And not only did Notre Dame hand Louisville just its second home loss of the season, but the Irish became the only team to blank the Cardinals on the year. It was the first time Notre Dame beat ranked opponents in two consecutive contests since 2005 and the first time the Irish beat a pair of top-20 teams on consecutive tries since 2000. Bargar, who was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player, earned two shutout wins while giving up eight hits.

And for the second season in a row the Irish placed seven players on respective all-BIG EAST Conference squads. Northway, Lux and Miller were each named to the first team and both Irish pitchers - Jody Valdivia and Bargar - sat on the second team with Linda Kohan. Marrone was voted to the third team.

Gumpf also aided in the development of Valdivia from the circle, as the pitcher was victorious in each of her last 17 decisions, including all of her 10 BIG EAST contests. Valdivia went over two months after a March 14 loss to No. 12 Arizona without a defeat.

When assuming control of the Irish program in July of 2001 from her mentor and close friend, Liz Miller, Gumpf inherited a team that was fresh off a school-best 54-7 record one season prior. Without missing a beat, the Irish once again advanced to the final day of competition at the NCAA Regional Tournament and in the process smashed the school record for home runs in a season. Notre Dame also came through with a dramatic run in the 2002 BIG EAST Championship, rallying from a first-day loss to hand Virginia Tech a pair of defeats on the final day to claim the league title.

The second year of the Gumpf era began with a 10-11 start to the season before Notre Dame ripped off a 20-game win streak from April 1-26 to assume control of the BIG EAST Conference standings. The team then swept through the BIG EAST



Championship by scoring 21 runs in three games and won the title on a walk-off home run from conference player of the year Andrea Loman in the bottom of the ninth inning against Villanova.

The Irish rode their momentum into the start of the 2004 slate, upsetting No. 8 Nebraska during the first weekend of the season to claim the program's first-ever bracket championship at the National Fastpitch Coaches Association Leadoff Classic. The team also won the Hoosier Invitational title and the BIG EAST regular-season crown while taking part in a record 69 contests. Notre Dame was victorious in 49 of those games - the second-best win total in school history - aided by an 18-2 mark in conference play.

By claiming her 100th victory at Notre Dame in record time in 2004, Gumpf was able to reach the 100-win plateau faster than any previous Irish head coach. She reached the 200-win plateau,



again in record time, with a victory in the second game of an April 9 double-header against Pittsburgh in 2006. The Irish ensured the victory would be a memorable one, as they pounded out 21 hits to tie the school record. Two Irish players – Stephanie Brown and Meagan Ruthrauff – both finished with four hits apiece, as Ruthrauff would also set school records with three home runs and seven RBI.

Yet another landmark season came about in 2005 as the Irish hosted their first NCAA Championship competition at Ivy Field. Bolstered by a 20-game win streak – the second 20-game run of the Gumpf era which included tournament titles at the GRU Classic and Hawaii's Spring Fling – the Irish won the BIG EAST Conference regular-season title and advanced to the BIG EAST Championship final game.

Over the next two seasons, the Irish posted a 74-45 mark including 22 contests against 16 different top-25 opponents. The early stage of the 2006 slate was highlighted by a 3-2 comeback victory over No. 10 Arizona State, which came at the hands of Stephanie Brown's two-run game-winning homer. After dropping a pair of games to No. 4 Texas and No. 7 Alabama, the Irish proceeded to post a nine-game winning streak including four wins in conference play. Notre Dame kept themselves among the top teams in BIG EAST play with the only five conference losses heading into the league tournament. The Irish entered the post-season showdown as the third-seeded squad and rolled through the competition with wins over Providence, Pittsburgh, and No. 18 Louisville to claim Gumpf's third conference crown in only five seasons.

Notre Dame then headed to Evanston (Ill.) for the NCAA Tournament and defeated UC Santa Barbara and Southern Illinois before falling to Northwestern – who would go on to earn a seat in that season's World Series – to finish the year with over 40 wins for the third consecutive season.

Gumpf and the Irish rallied to a runner-up finish in the 2007 edition of the BIG EAST Tournament upon entering the event as the fourth-seeded team. Behind the solid play and leadership of senior Brown, Notre Dame advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the ninth consecutive season before bowing out to Illinois State in regional action. Brown would later be named a second-team Academic All-American, finishing her career ranked among the program's all-time leaders in eight career offensive categories (including hits, runs, stolen bases, home runs and batting average).

As an assistant coach at Notre Dame (1998-2001), Gumpf worked primarily with the Irish pitchers and hitters. In each of those four seasons, Notre Dame lowered its team earned run average and eventually posted a spectacular 0.89 ERA in 2001, which ranked seventh-best in the nation.

And as the team ERA dropped, its batting average steadily rose as the team set single-season program records for home runs, batting average, runs scored and strikeouts thrown with Gumpf on the staff.

Irish players have mirrored their coach's competitive fire over the past eight seasons and continue to show a flair for the ability to make clutch plays at key times. This became apparent in Gumpf's first season, when she led the team to face No. 4 Nebraska for the dedication game of the Cornhusker's Bowlin Stadium. Facing her alma mater for the first time as a head coach, Gumpf and the Irish left Lincoln with a 3-2 win after Liz Hartmann drilled a three-run homer in the top of the sixth inning for the upset victory.

The La Palma, Calif., native played at Nebraska from 1989-92 while earning a degree in business management. Gumpf was an all-Big Eight Conference second-team selection in 1991 and an honorable mention pick in both 1989 and 1990.

Prior to her collegiate success in Lincoln, Gumpf enjoyed an outstanding prep career with Gordon's Panthers, one of the most dominating Amateur Softball Association teams in Southern California.

Gumpf pursued a professional position with Delta Airlines after graduating from Nebraska but did not stay too detached from softball. She started to give private pitching lessons in the Southern California area and what began as a small side job turned into a major venture. After earning her master's degree from Azusa Pacific University in physical education and coaching in 1997, Gumpf entertained countless offers from college coaches hoping to entice her with the opportunity to get back into the college game. Perhaps not too surprisingly, one of the first coaches to call Gumpf was Liz Miller.

Miller discussed the possibility of having Gumpf join the Irish staff, but a position was never established and Gumpf would opt to become the pitching coach at Long Beach State.

Two years later, Miller phoned Gumpf again to offer a position and the future Irish head coach jumped at the chance.

After winning her third BIG EAST Tournament championship in 2006, Gumpf soon inked a multi-year contract extension with Notre Dame.

Gumpf and her husband, John, reside in South Bend with son, Brady and daughter, Tatum. John coached high school baseball in Southern California before serving as a volunteer assistant coach for the Irish from 1999-2001, and is currently the head coach and assistant athletics director at St. Joseph High School in South Bend. He spent four years as a professional baseball player in the Minnesota Twins' minor league ranks from 1989-94.

Arguably the best all-around catcher in Irish history, Kris Ganeff is now in her ninth year of work with the Notre Dame softball program, this season on the sidelines as an assistant coach. Ganeff spearheads the recruiting efforts for the Irish, which annually attracts the top players from across the nation. In addition to being the program's recruiting coordinator, she also runs and directs Notre Dame's camps and clinics.

A key member of the 2002 and 2004 BIG EAST Coaching Staff of the Year, Ganeff works closely with each player on hitting and defense while specializing in the development of the Irish catchers. In fact, she helped mold catcher Mallorie Lenn into an all-BIG EAST performer in 2004 – a season in which the Irish also finished with a 49-20 record and took home the conference championship. Then in 2008, the Irish were without a catcher when starter Sadie Pitzenberger's season was cut short due to injury. Ganeff took freshman utility player Erin Marrone, who had never played catcher before in her career, under her wing and to call the shots for all-region pitcher Brittney Bargar. Marrone saw action in 55 contests for Notre Dame that season and did not commit a single error in the field or behind the plate.

Ganeff has been a pivotal cog in aiding the development of the Irish bats and batteries as Notre Dame has posted seven school records since



her first season on staff. The 2002 team set a school mark for runs (318) and home runs (54); the 2003 team posted the highest fielding percentage in school history (.974); the 2004 group logged a program-best 52 complete games and 22 double plays, and the 2005 squad set marks for strikeouts (547) and strikeouts per seven innings (8.74).

The Irish went on to rewrite the record books during their 2009 BIG EAST Championship-winning campaign: runs (2nd – 310), doubles (3rd – 90), home runs (1st – 66), RBI (1st – 282), total bases (1st – 748), slugging pct. (1st – .501), walks (1st – 152), on-base pct. (2nd – .371) and complete games (3rd – 46).

Ganeff completed her Notre Dame career by earning all-BIG EAST and all-NFCA Mid-east Region honors in 1999. She hit a career-high seven home runs in her final season while snagging out 16 attempted steals from behind the plate.

Ganeff was drafted by the Virginia Roadsters of the Women's Professional Softball League after graduating from Notre Dame in 1999, though the former Irish team captain and MVP instead chose to head into the coaching ranks by taking an assistant position at UNLV.

Prior to the 2006 season she was promoted to the first assistant position with the Irish.

The shift paid off well for all parties involved – Ganeff would assume full control of the team during the first three weeks of the season and led the team to a 7-6 record while head coach Deanna Gumpf was on maternity leave.

"Moving Kris into the first assistant position was an easy decision because of her coaching strengths and love of the team and University," said Gumpf.

"Kris and I complement each other well. We see things from different angles and have the ability to find a common ground. She has a strong desire to help our program get to the highest level possible."

A native of Westerville, Ohio, Ganeff earned a bachelor's degree in history from Notre Dame and completed her master's degree in physical education from Ball State in 2009. The former Kris McCleary has been married to John Ganeff since 2002, and the couple resides in South Bend with their daughters, Deven and Hayden.

A former member of the U.S. National Softball Team and 2001 BIG EAST Player of the Year, Lizzy Lemire returned to her alma mater as an assistant coach for the Irish softball team in the fall of 2005.

Lemire works closely with the Irish outfield corps and is also a polished hitting instructor. She has helped Notre Dame advance to the NCAA Tournament in each of her last four seasons as part of the coaching staff, including BIG EAST Conference tournament titles in 2006 and 2009.

"Over the past several seasons, Lizzy has become one of the top hitting coaches in the country," Irish head coach Deanna Gumpf said. "She has committed herself to become not only a student of the game, but a master of the profession. She is such a determined individual and gets better with each season under her belt. I am very proud of her accomplishments and look forward to seeing how she continues to develop our already extraordinary hitters here at Notre Dame."

Lemire's influence was extremely evident throughout the Irish batting order in 2009, helping produce five all-region and seven all-conference performers. Additionally, Christine Lux was

named an NFCA third-team All-American after turning in one of the most outstanding single-seasons at the plate for the Irish. Over the course of the 60-game season, Lux amassed a .329 batting average while also tallying 15 home runs, a number that ties the program's single-season mark for home runs that she herself set in 2008.

Batters under Lemire's tutelage posted a number of program single-season bests in 2009 including: runs (2nd - 310), doubles (3rd - 90), home runs (1st - 66), RBI (1st - 282), total bases (1st - 748), slugging pct. (1st - .501) and walks (1st - 152).

Lemire also developed (then) freshman Dani Miller in 2009, converting the athlete into an outfielder as Miller went on to post a 21-game hit streak, a school record and the longest of any BIG EAST player that season.

It was under the guidance of Lemire that outfielder Sarah Smith posted one of the greatest single-season improvements in program history during the 2008 campaign. Smith saw limited action for the Irish in her first three seasons, then broke out as a senior as the lefty slapper went on to earn first-team all-BIG EAST and all-NFCA regional honors. Furthermore, Smith was one of three Notre Dame outfielders to claim all-league recognition that season. Her .370 batting average and 60 hits in 2008 rank among the best single-season performances ever by an Irish outfielder.

Lemire trekked from coast-to-coast after earning a pair of degrees from Notre Dame in 2001 before landing back in South Bend. Upon graduation, she earned a spot on a U.S. National team that steamrolled the competition with four consecutive victories and a tournament title during the 2001 U.S. Cup in Hawaii.

After her time with the U.S. National team, Lemire returned to Notre Dame as an athletic department intern through the summer of 2002. It was then that she was accepted into the sport management program at the University of Massachusetts as she went on to earn a master's degree in that field. While pursuing her degree, Lemire also served as an intern in the athletic department compliance office. In addition, Lemire was also a volunteer assistant coach for the softball squad, coordinating team travel and developing the play of the Minutewomen outfield.

In 2003, Lemire shifted gears by landing a position at Boston College within the athletic



department's development office, and was one year later hired as an annual giving associate at Stanford University.

During her first season back in the blue and gold as a coach, Lemire steered the 2006 Irish squad to a collective batting average of .291 while the sluggers sent 44 homers out of the park. Lemire mentored outfielder Stephanie Brown to a pair of All-America honors, as Brown also became one of only a handful of Irish players - including Lemire - to earn all-BIG EAST honors on four occasions.

Lemire captained the most successful team in the history of the Notre Dame program, powering the Irish to an overall record of 54-7 along with an all-time best No. 7 national ranking and the first number-one seed in the NCAA Tournament. As a senior, Lemire hit .324 (including a .383 mark in BIG EAST play) with 38 RBI, 10 stolen bases and three home runs. She shares the single-season record for doubles with Katie Laing, logging 17 two-baggers in 1999. Lemire's career numbers included a .332 average, 28 stolen bases, 126 RBI, nine home runs and 43 doubles. Lemire is regarded as one of the most fearless and skilled defensive outfielders in Notre Dame history.

Her personal efforts were reflected in her team's success, as Lemire was part of a senior class that compiled an overall record of 177-63 (.738), earned two BIG EAST Tournament championships, four regular-season conference titles, and made three consecutive trips to the NCAA Tournament.

Lemire prepped at Woodbridge High School after growing up in Irvine, Calif., where she was the city and high school's scholar-athlete of the year in 1997. The Irvine World News also recognized her as its female athlete of the year following her senior campaign. Lemire led Woodbridge to a No. 2 national ranking and was an ASA All-American in 1997. The daughter of Kathi and Tom Lemire, this Irish coach's love for Notre Dame began at an early age aided by her mother's passion and respect for the University.

Season in Review



Notre Dame streaked through the competition at the 2009 BIG EAST Championship, picking up three wins without allowing an earned run to win the team title. It was the sixth tournament title for the Irish program.



Irish Return To Top of BIG EAST

Conference tournament title and NCAA appearance caps off record-breaking season.

The Irish posted their 21st winning season in as many years with a 43-17 record in 2009. It was the 11th 40-win campaign in program history and fifth under head coach Deanna Gumpf. Notre Dame also advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the 11th straight year and was ranked 25th in the final regular season NFCA Top 25 poll. The ranking was the first since 2004 and the first to end the season since 2002.

- Junior Christine Lux was named an NFCA third-team All-American, becoming the 17th Irish player to cop the honor ... over the course of the 60-game season, Lux amassed a .329 batting average while also tallying 15 home runs, a number that ties the program's single-season mark for home runs that she herself set in 2008.

- A number of top single-season team marks were set during 2009 including: runs (2nd – 310), doubles (3rd – 90), home runs (1st – 66), RBI (1st – 282), total bases (1st – 748), slugging pct. (1st – .501), walks (1st – 152), on-base pct. (2nd – .371) and complete games (3rd – 46).

- Heading into the NCAA Tournament the Irish were ranked (25th) for the first time since 2004 ... Notre Dame received votes in five of the season's NFCA polls before cracking the list ... it was the first time Notre Dame has ended a season in the top 25 since 2002.

- Senior pitcher Brittney Bargar earned her second NFCA All-Region honor in as many seasons as she was one of five Notre Dame players to receive the distinction ... she was joined in the award column by classmate Beth Northway, sophomore Erin Marrone, freshman Dani Miller and Lux ... the five honorees comprised the largest group of all-region selections since Notre Dame placed six on the team in 2001.

- Three Notre Dame players –Lux, Marrone and Northway – were part of the Academic All-District V team in balloting by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA) presented by ESPN The Magazine ... Lux and Marrone were both part of the award's first team and Northway was a second-team choice ... Lux is an accounting major from Glendale Heights, Ill., with a 3.42 grade-point-average ... a native of Alexandria, Va., Marrone sports a 3.98 grade-point-average as an outfielder for the Irish ... Northway was an accounting major with a 3.83 grade-point-average from Kentwood, Mich.

- For the second season in a row the Irish placed seven players on respective all-BIG EAST Conference squads ... three players earned the honor for the first time and four were repeat winners, as Notre Dame's roster now includes 10 all-BIG EAST performers ... Northway, Lux and Miller were each named to the first team ... both Irish pitchers – Bargar and Jody Valdivia – along with Linda Kohan were on the second team as Marrone was voted to the third team ... Miller was the only freshman named to the first team but

missed out on the league's Rookie of the Year Award, which went to Syracuse's third-team pitcher Jenna Caira.

- Notre Dame beat three teams – St. John's, No. 17 Louisville and No. 19 DePaul – without allowing an earned run en route to claiming the program's sixth BIG EAST Tournament title ... and not only did Notre Dame hand Louisville just its second home loss of the season, but the Irish became the only team to blank the Cardinals on the year ... it was the first time Notre Dame beat ranked opponents in two consecutive contests since 2005 (No. 21 USF and No. 19 Florida) ... it was also the first time the Irish beat a pair of top-20 teams on consecutive tries since 2000 (No. 16 Louisiana-Lafayette and No. 6 Oklahoma) ... the wins over Louisville and DePaul were earned despite both teams tossing their best pitchers



Brittney Bargar was named the 2009 BIG EAST Championship Most Outstanding Player, the sixth such honor for an Irish player. Bargar, a first team all-BIG EAST choice, also earned NFCA all-region nods during her senior campaign.

(Louisville's Kristen Wadwell and DePaul's Becca Henteniak), who ranked among the finest pitchers in the nation ... in fact, both tossers were first team all-BIG EAST choices ... however, Notre Dame placed both of its second team all-league pitchers on the all-tournament team ... Valdivia was 1-0 and allowed two hits at the tournament while Bargar, who was named Most Outstanding Pitcher, earned two shutout wins while giving up eight hits ... the pair combined to hold opposing

teams to a .143 batting average ... Bargar was the sixth Irish winner of the tournament's top award ... pitcher Heather Booth was the last winner in 2006 ... Lux, Heather Johnson and Kohan were also part of the all-tournament team ... Johnson had one of two Irish hits in the final game against DePaul, which happened to be the game-winning RBI double ... Kohan had four hits in eight at-bats for the Irish, while Lux had 31 putouts and two assists at first base throughout the three-game stretch, including the starting leg of a game-ending double play in the championship matchup.

- After starting the season with a 2-5 record, Valdivia was victorious in each of her last 17 decisions, including all of her 10 BIG EAST contests ... Valdivia went over two months after a March 14 loss to No. 12 Arizona without a defeat and carries that streak into the 2010 season.

- Miller saw her one-month, 21-game hit streak come to an end against North Dakota State on April 22 ... the school record streak was the longest of any BIG EAST player in 2009 ... she also blasted a pair of home runs at Providence (April 30) including her third grand slam of the season ... Miller added a career-high six RBI in game one against the Friars.

- With double-digit home run totals Lux (15), Miller (11) and Kohan (11) comprise an elite Irish group – the first trio of teammates to hit at least 10+ home runs in the same season ... Miller hit a Notre Dame freshman-record 11 home runs as nine hitters belted multiple home runs and five Irish players hit at least 11 doubles.

- Notre Dame now has a total of six BIG EAST Championship titles ... each of the titles have been earned in the last 11 seasons as Notre Dame's first trophy was hoisted in 1999 ... the Irish have finished second in five tournaments ... Notre Dame has made four appearances in the BIG EAST Championship finals under head coach Deanna Gumpf ... the Irish have four times won the tournament under her tutelage ... Notre Dame is now 29-15 all-time in the BIG EAST Championship (19-6 under Deanna Gumpf) ... the Irish have made 10 trips to the final game of the BIG EAST Championship since joining the league in 1996.

- Bargar was named the BIG EAST Pitcher of the Week on April 20 ... she held BIG EAST opponents to just one earned run in 14.0 innings for the week ... Bargar went 2-0 with a 0.50 ERA including a shutout against league foes ... she struck out eight while surrendering just one hit for extra-bases ... in three overall appearances, Bargar posted a 0.33 ERA with a second shutout at Wisconsin ... she struck out eight Badgers in that midweek affair ... Bargar also walked just two batters in 21.0 innings.

- Notre Dame split an April 22 non-conference doubleheader with North Dakota State ... the 2-1 game-one loss was the first home non-BIG EAST Conference defeat for the Irish since 2007, break-



ing a 14-0-1 (10-0-1 at Melissa Cook Stadium, 4-0 at Ivy Field) streak for Notre Dame ... the Irish were previously a perfect 8-0 on their turf for the season against non-conference foes.

- A two-run dandy by Kohan against North Dakota State in game two of the April 22 doubleheader snapped a three-game homerless streak for Notre Dame ... it was the longest drought without a home run since the second week of the season.

- Notre Dame got seven hits from seven different players during the second game of a doubleheader at Wisconsin (April 14).

- Three different Notre Dame players homered against Valparaiso (April 9) as the Irish swept the Crusaders by scores of 11-0 and 17-9 ... Miller jacked two home runs - including her second grand slam of the season - to bring her season total to six, and Kohan delivered a game-one home run that gave the senior six round trippers on the year ... it was Kohan's third home run in as many games ... a pair of home runs in game two by Lux brought her career total to 30 and tied her for fourth on the school's all-time list ... the 17 runs in game two marked a season high and was one score shy of the school-record 18 set against Robert Morris in 1994 ... Bargar tossed a one-hitter to start the day and did not allow a single walk ... after a first-inning Valparaiso single, Bargar retired 18 straight batters and recorded seven strikeouts along the way ... Notre Dame recorded 16 hits in game two.

- One of the best BIG EAST Conference softball rivalries got better after an April 8 doubleheader with DePaul ... the Irish and Blue Demons exchanged a number of blows before splitting the twinbill at Melissa Cook Stadium ... Lux had five hits across the two games with a pair of home runs including a game-one shot that cleared the right field fence and landed on Twickenham Drive, a 334-foot shot that would have sailed the right field fence at Frank Eck Stadium, the home of Notre Dame's baseball team ... both Lux and Linda Kohan sent home runs out of the park in each of the two games as the teams combined for eight home runs on the day.

- The Irish hit three home runs in one inning against Northern Illinois ... Kohan, Johnson and Katie Fleury homered in the fourth inning to spark an Irish scoring fest of nine unanswered runs ... it was the third time Notre Dame recorded three home runs in one inning, with the first two occurring in 2008 ... Kohan, Fleury and Christine Lux homered in the same inning during a home game versus Wisconsin (April 16) and the same trio duplicated the feat exactly one month later in an NCAA Tournament bout with Kent State ... the last time Notre Dame hit four home runs in a single game was against the Badgers last season.

- Northway was named the BIG EAST Conference Player of the Week on March 30 ... the designated player earned the honor after her consistent bat helped the Irish run their winning

streak to seven games with three conference wins at Georgetown (March 28) and USF (March 29) ... Northway came through in pinch-hitting duties for Notre Dame with nine hits in 16 at-bats as the Irish posted a 6-0 record for the week ... Northway hit for a .562 batting average with a 1.125 slugging percentage in the six contests, including a pair of home runs and three doubles ... she had four multi-hit games, scoring seven runs and collecting seven walks ... Northway connected for four hits in seven at-bats at USF to help Notre Dame secure its first ever sweep of the Bulls ... at the time of the honor, Northway's .500 batting average in league play was tied for sixth overall among BIG EAST batters while her 1.200 slugging percentage tied for first ... the Kentwood, Mich., native began the 2009 campaign as a non-starter and emerged as one of the Irish's most

four-game invite with a 1.889 slugging pct. which came courtesy of three triples and two home runs in nine at-bats ... her .556 batting average led Notre Dame throughout the weekend ... Jorgensborg tripled in three consecutive contests, becoming the first player to accomplish the feat in the 21-year history of the program ... she also had two home runs.

- In a home-opening doubleheader sweep against Toledo (W, 15-0 / W, 9-1); Notre Dame moved to 19-2 all-time in home openers, winning its last 12 ... the two losses came in 1992 and 1997 ... the Irish posted the most runs in a home opener (15) and the most runs in a doubleheader (24) since 2003 ... first back-to-back five-inning wins since 2004 ... first five-inning home opener ... first home opener at Melissa Cook Stadium ... Sadie Pitzenberger scored a career-high four runs


in game one against Toledo ... Lux had five hits - including two home runs and two doubles - to pace the Irish ... her 13 total bases yielded a single-day slugging average of 2.167 ... Miller had two doubles and one home run in her home debut.

- Trailing by a 1-0 count in game two against Toledo, the Irish put up a nine-spot in the bottom of the fourth to secure the victory ... ironically, Notre Dame had scored a total of nine runs in the fourth inning of its last 19 games combined, doubling that output against the Rockets ... the Irish scored seven runs in a single inning against Sacramento State (Feb. 21) earlier in the season ... in '08, Notre Dame scored nine runs in one inning against Charleston Southern (March 14) only to score 10 - tying the school record - in the third frame during a rematch with the Buccaneers one day later.

- An 18-game road trip that included stops in four states (Alabama, California, North Carolina and Nevada) and featured six ranked opponents came to an end against Toledo on March 18 ... since starting the season at No. 1 Alabama, Notre Dame has faced No. 5 Stanford, No. 5 UCLA, No. 9 Oklahoma, No. 12 Arizona and No. 6 Arizona State.

- UC Santa Barbara (March 8) had two runners on base in its half of the seventh when Tiffany Wright flew out to Alexa Maldonado in center field, who started the first leg of a triple play by throwing to Fleury at second who relayed the favor to Lux at first to end the game in not-so-routine fashion ... it was the first triple play in Notre Dame history.

- Maldonado had her coming-out party at Stanford's Nike Invitational ... after not recording a single hit in her first four games with the Irish, Maldonado went 5-for-10 with a pair of multi-hit affairs against Stanford and Sacramento State ... she scored a pair of runs and hit two triples over the four-game stretch at The Farm.



Not only did she drive in the lone run of the BIG EAST Championship finale, Heather Johnson was also on the receiving side of the game-ending double play that gave Notre Dame its 1-0 win over DePaul for the league title.

productive hitters ... after her sophomore season she underwent shoulder surgery and converted her throwing technique from right- to left-handed.

- Seven unanswered runs helped Notre Dame dig itself out of an early 3-0 deficit to post a 7-3 victory over Pacific in the second day of the Judi Garman Classic ... Lux, Fleury and Northway each homered as Notre Dame recorded nine hits in the contest ... Bargar got the complete-game win with five strikeouts while giving up six hits, and the Irish defense stood strong to help strand seven Tigers on base.

- Notre Dame downed No. 9 Oklahoma, 4-3, on the opening day of the Judi Garman Classic hosted by Cal State Fullerton ... the Irish sat on a 3-1 lead but committed three errors in the top of the seventh, though Oklahoma saved its lone error for the bottom of the seventh to help give Notre Dame the win ... the victory was Notre Dame's first against a top-10 opponent since downing No. 5 Tennessee in 2005.

- Brianna Jorgensborg was named the BIG EAST Conference softball player of the week on March 9 ... Jorgensborg put together one of the most prolific slugging stretches in Notre Dame history at the UNLV Invitational and finished the

Notes: The Irish were tabbed third in the BIG EAST Preseason Coaches' Poll. The Irish received two first-place votes for 125 total points. Four squads received first-place votes and topped 110 points in the poll.

Louisville was named the favorite to win the BIG EAST title this season, as 2009 BIG EAST Player of the Year Melissa Roth leads a group of six returning players for the Cardinals who were all-BIG EAST selections last season. Louisville garnered six first-place votes and 137 total points to earn top billing in 2010.

DePaul was second with six fewer points than Louisville. The Blue Demons received four first-place votes and 131 points.

The final first-place vote was awarded to USF who entered last year's BIG EAST finale as the No. 5 seed and upset No. 4 Syracuse before falling to top-seeded DePaul in the semifinals.

Louisville will host the BIG EAST Championships (May 13-15) at Ulmer Stadium for the third consecutive season. The league's regular-season format differs for the 2010 season, as most meetings will consist of three-game series instead of the previous two-game format utilized in the past.

NCAA Championship

May 20-June 6

Notre Dame has appeared in the NCAA Tournament 14 times overall and made its eleventh consecutive appearance following the 2009 regular season. The Irish have advanced to the final day of regional action five times. They were eliminated on the final day by Iowa in 2001, Northwestern in 2005 and 2006 and Michigan in 1995 and 2009.

Liz Miller guided the Irish to their first NCAA appearance and returned five more times. Deanna Gumpf has steered her Irish squads to eight NCAA trips in as many seasons.

Notre Dame has an overall record of 21-28 (.429) in the NCAA Tournament through 14 trips. The program registered three of those wins in one of the more memorable showdowns at the NCAAs in 2001.

Furthermore, the scheduled matchup against Washington (Feb. 14) at Arizona State's Kajikawa Classic will mark the eighth time in the last 10 seasons the Irish have been slated to face the defending national champion (Notre Dame was scheduled to play Arizona in 2008 but the game was called off due to rain).

The travel, though challenging at times, gives the Irish an opportunity to not only mount a schedule packed with high-caliber competition but the chance for players to compete in front of family and friends across the country. No fewer than nine games this season will be played in California, the home state of six Irish players. Trips to Illinois, New York, Michigan and New Jersey will also provide a homecoming of sorts for several more players.





Byron V. Kanaley Award

The most prestigious honor awarded to a Notre Dame student-athlete, the Byron V. Kanaley Award has been presented each year since 1927 to the senior monogram athletes who have been most exemplary as both students and leaders. The awards, presented by the Faculty Board on Athletics, are named in honor of the 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the Irish baseball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and served the University as a lay trustee from 1915 until his death in 1960. Notre Dame's softball team has had five winners of the award in its 20-year history. Terry Proksch claimed the honor in the first season of varsity softball at Notre Dame in 1989, followed by Kathy Verneti 1991 and Katie Marten in 1997. Jarrah Myers became the fourth Irish softball player to win the award in 2002 with Katie Laing racking the latest honor in 2008.

Meagan Ruthrauff ('06) hit three home runs and accounted for seven RBI against Pittsburgh on April 9, 2006. Both marks are single-game school records.





Nicole Wicks ('05) tied a school record in 2004 when she hit a pair of triples against Syracuse.



Joy Battersby ('97) was a three-time Academic All-American (1995, 1996 and 1997).



Katie Marten ('97) has a hand in two single-game records: most at-bats (7) and triples (2).



Stephanie Brown ('07) was a third-team All-American in 2006 and was a finalist for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award in 2007.



Joe Speybroeck, former St. Joseph County Sheriff, worked with the Irish softball team during its developmental years. Speybroeck was an assistant coach from 1989-91, then followed up as a volunteer assistant coach from 1994-96. He and his wife Kathy, also a former assistant for the Irish, are still close to the Notre Dame softball program and can be seen at many of the team's home games.

Irish in the NCAA Tournament

Notre Dame has appeared in the NCAA Tournament 14 times overall and made its eleventh consecutive appearance following the 2009 regular season. The Irish have advanced to the final day of regional action five times. They were eliminated on the final day by Iowa in 2001, Northwestern in 2005 and 2006 and Michigan in 1995 and 2009.

Liz Miller guided the Irish to their first NCAA appearance and returned five more times. Deanna Gumpf has steered her Irish squads to eight NCAA trips in as many seasons.

Notre Dame has an overall record of 21-28 (.429) in the NCAA Tournament through 14 trips. The program registered three of those wins in one of the more memorable showdowns at the NCAAAs in 2001.

• The Irish have traveled to Big Ten regional sites since it began to qualify for NCAA regional play ... Indiana (1994), Iowa (2001-02), Michigan (1995-96, 1999-2000, 2003-04, 2008-09) and Northwestern (2006-07) have hosted the Irish in regional competition ... Notre Dame played host to its first regional at Ivy Field in 2005.

• First appearance: 1994 (Bloomington, Ind.) ... The Irish faced top-seeded Indiana in the first game of the tournament and dealt the Hoosiers a 3-0 defeat in eight innings ... the host team avenged the loss one day later with an 8-0 victory.

• First pitching victory: 1994 (Terri Kobata) ... Arguably the greatest pitcher in Notre Dame softball history, Kobata won the first NCAA Tournament game for the Irish with a two-hit, nine strikeout performance against Indiana in 1994.

• First No. 1 seed: 2001 ... Notre Dame was ranked as high as seventh in the nation during the 2001 campaign and earned the team's first NCAA Tournament number-one seed ... the team could not host the event that season, however, and would bow out on the final day of the tournament to No. 2 Iowa on the Hawkeye's home field.

• First no-hitter: 2008 ... Nine runs on seven hits by the Irish offense and pitcher Brittney Bargar's second no-hitter in as many weeks gave the second-seeded Irish a victory over third-seeded Kent State in six innings to open the 2008 tournament in Ann Arbor ... the 9-1 decision marked the fourth no-hitter of Bargar's career but the second in which the hurler allowed a run ... it was the 36th no-hitter in school history and the first for Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament, also giving Bargar the honor of becoming the first Irish pitcher to record 30 wins in a season.

• Three-In-One: 2008 ... In the 2008 opener against Kent State, Linda Kohan and Katie Fleury were joined in the home run department by Christine Lux, with each of the three bombs coming in the game's third inning ... it was the second time in school history the Irish hit three home runs in the same inning - a feat last accomplished exactly one month prior against Wisconsin (April 16) by the same trio.

• The BIG EAST Conference has sponsored a softball championship tournament since 1990.

• The top eight teams in the final regular-season conference standings advance to the championship, and the winner of the now single-elimination tournament receives the conference's automatic bid to the 2009 NCAA Tournament.

• Notre Dame has won the league championship title six times, with each of the six victories coming in the last eleven seasons ... the Irish joined the BIG EAST in 1996.

• Two of Notre Dame's most notable tournament runs occurred at the Salem, Va., site ... in 2002, the Irish rallied from a first-day loss to win four straight games to claim the tournament title in Deanna Gumpf's first season ... the next season the Irish utilized a walk-off home run by Andrea Loman in the bottom of the ninth inning to capture their second straight league title ... bolstered by that home run, Loman became the third BIG EAST player to earn the tournament's Most Outstanding Player trophy two times (UConn's Bridgett McCaffery and Janna Venice also earned the award twice) and joined McCaffery as just the second BIG EAST player to claim the award in back-to-back tournaments.

• In 2006, behind the strong pitching of senior hurler Heather Booth, the Irish won their three tournament games over Providence, Pittsburgh and No. 18 Louisville by the combined score of 10-1 ... Booth started and threw complete games in all three games of the tournament, including a one-hit shutout of No. 18 Louisville in the championship game ... for her efforts, Booth was named the 2006 Most Outstanding Player.

• The 2007 BIG EAST Championship was hosted in South Bend, Ind., for the third time in as many seasons ... the tournament was played at the Belleville Softball Complex.

• Notre Dame beat three teams - St. John's, No. 17 Louisville and No. 19 DePaul - without allowing an earned run en route to claiming the program's sixth BIG EAST Tournament title in 2009 ... not only did Notre Dame hand Louisville just its second home loss of the season, but the Irish became the only team to blank the Cardinals on the year ... it was the first time Notre Dame beat ranked opponents in two consecutive contests since 2005 and the first time the Irish beat a pair of top-20 teams on consecutive tries since 2000 ... Brittney Bargar, who was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player, earned two shutout wins while giving up eight hits.

• Louisville will host the 2010 BIG EAST Championship at Ulmer Stadium from May 13-15.

The BIG EAST Conference

With 30 years under its belt, The BIG EAST Conference continues on a path of success in and out of the athletic arena. The goals have always been the same. The league wants and expects to compete at the highest level and does so with integrity and sportsmanship. The commendable performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are the indicators of the league's proud tradition of success.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth, but the 2009-10 academic year will mark the conference's fifth straight with the same 16-member group, the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

In 2008-09, BIG EAST student-athletes again succeeded on the national stage. The Connecticut women's basketball team won its sixth national championship by defeating conference-foe Louisville in an all-BIG EAST NCAA title game. The Notre Dame women's soccer team reached the NCAA championship game and the Syracuse field hockey squad advanced to the NCAA Final Four. Three BIG EAST women's cross country teams finished in the top 10 at the NCAA Championships. West Virginia was fourth followed by Villanova in sixth place and Georgetown in ninth.

Individually in women's sports, Providence's Dannette Doetzel won the 10,000 meters at the NCAA Outdoor Track & Field Championships. Connecticut's Maya Moore was the conference's sixth winner of the Wade Trophy as the top player in women's basketball. Notre Dame's Kerri Hanks won the Hermann Trophy, the top award in women's soccer.

On the men's side, Connecticut and Villanova advanced to the Final Four in basketball. The 2008-09 campaign was arguably the best men's basketball season in the history of the BIG EAST with the league setting NCAA standards with three No. 1 tournament seeds, four teams in the round of the Elite Eight and five in the Sweet 16.

The St. John's men's soccer team reached the NCAA College Cup before losing in the national semifinals.

BIG EAST football has maintained its high profile and its reputation as a balanced group. Seven of the league's eight squads were nationally ranked or received votes in the national polls in 2008. Cincinnati was the league champion. The BIG EAST, a charter member of the Bowl Championship Series, has won three of its last four BCS bowl games. West Virginia, Louisville and Connecticut also have won or shared league crowns over the past four seasons.

The BIG EAST has continued to produce student-athletes who were at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. In 2008-09, 19 BIG EAST players were chosen to their respective *ESPN The Magazine* Academic All-America Teams, including eight first-team selections. Nearly 400 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top-34 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Milwaukee and Cincinnati. With its newest members, BIG EAST markets contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 26 national championships in six different sports and 126 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

The BIG EAST has enjoyed tremendous basketball success, especially in this decade. In 2008-09, the BIG EAST produced four of the eight Final Four teams in men's and women's basketball. It was only the second time in NCAA history that one conference placed that many Final Four teams in the same season.

In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 11 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken six of the last 10 NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST will add men's lacrosse to its growing list of sports, which will increase its total to 24 sport championships. The first women's golf championship was held in the spring of 2003. Women's lacrosse and rowing were added in 2001.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student

athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably shows a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has been fortunate to have outstanding leadership. Michael Tranghese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Dave Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

For 2009-10, the BIG EAST will undergo one significant change. Tranghese stepped down from his position on June 30, 2009. John Marinatto, who has served as senior associate commissioner, has moved into the Commissioner's chair.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sell-outs at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past six years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

More than 550 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned All-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals in each of the last six summer Olympiads.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 athletes.

The Irish unveiled their new playing facility during a ceremony on April 12, 2008. University president Rev. John Jenkins, C.S.C., blessed the site which will house the Irish softball program for years to come, and remarks were given by former athletics director Dr. Kevin White, head softball coach Deanna Gumpf, senior captain Katie Laing, Lisa Hoffman and Paul and Linda Demo. The Demos, parents of Melissa Cook, also helped bless a bronze relief of the former Irish player that sits just inside the main entrance of the stadium.




Cook, a 1994 Notre Dame graduate, was one of four people involved in a March 2002 construction accident at the John Hancock Building in Chicago that claimed their lives. The families of the departed reached a settlement with the skyscraper's owners and other companies named in a joint lawsuit.

Her parents, Paul and Linda Demo, contributed a considerable amount of their portion of the settlement as a gift to Notre Dame and to the Melissa Cook Memorial Foundation, established to provide scholarship assistance to students in Northwest Indiana.

Raised in Merrillville, Ind., Cook played for the Fighting Irish softball team in 1991 and 1992, seeing time at second base, shortstop and catcher. She led the team in triples as a freshman and earned a monogram before opting to study abroad one year later. An accounting major, she earned her bachelor's degree and was the controller for Teamsters Union Local 786 prior to her death.

She was a standout athlete in high school, excelling in basketball, volleyball and softball. When Notre Dame offered her a scholarship to play softball, she had achieved a lifelong dream.

Melissa Cook Stadium, a \$4.9 million state-of-the-art facility, sits on the southeast corner of the Notre Dame campus near Eck Baseball Stadium.

Brian Boulac

Brian Boulac, with 40 years of experience on the Notre Dame athletic staff behind him as both a full-time coach and administrator, announced his retirement in August 2009.

He originally came to Notre Dame in 1959 to play football, earned both bachelor's and master's degrees from the University — then returned to campus to coach first football, later softball, and also serve 24 years with the Notre Dame athletic administration.

From the time he enrolled as a freshman at Notre Dame in '59 through the 2008 season, Boulac saw (or played in) every Notre Dame home football game for 50 consecutive seasons (282 games).

"Considering his long and valuable efforts as a player, a coach and as an administrator, I don't think it's possible to find anyone on campus who has made more contributions to athletics at Notre Dame than Brian Boulac has made over the past five decades," said Notre Dame athletics director Jack Swarbrick.

"We will miss Brian dearly, as much as anything because of the relationships he has maintained over the years with former football players and others close to our athletics program. He has been a tremendous ambassador for the University, particularly for athletics," said Notre Dame president Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.

Boulac matriculated at a time when freshman were not eligible to play on the varsity — and he wore a leather helmet during that first season in '59. A three-year member of the varsity football team, he earned a monogram as a sophomore player at Notre Dame in 1960. Following his graduation from the University in 1963, he had a tryout with the NFL's St. Louis Cardinals, but elected to stay on campus as a graduate assistant coach under interim head coach Hugh Devore in 1963. Ara Parseghian retained him as a graduate assistant from 1964-67 and Boulac served as assistant freshman football coach in 1966-67 (helping the 1966 varsity team win a national championship).

Boulac participated in ROTC as an undergraduate and fulfilled his active duty commitment by serving 20 months in the Army Medical Service Corps at Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio, Texas, from June 1968 through January 1970.

Parseghian brought him on staff as an offensive line coach on Feb. 1, 1970. Over the next 13 years at various times, Boulac coached the offensive and defensive lines, receivers and special teams under Parseghian, Dan Devine and Gerry Faust. He spent the last seven years of his coaching career as recruiting coordinator for the football program. In its March 3, 1975 issue, *Time* recognized his recruiting technique in an article entitled "Brian's Pitch."

He also served as administrative assistant to Devine for two years and as assistant head coach for two years under Faust. Boulac was a member of the

coaching staff for eight seasons that culminated in postseason bowl appearances, including six Irish victories (three Cotton, one Orange, one Sugar, one Gator). In addition, he was the offensive line coach on Notre Dame's 1973 and 1977 national championship teams. In 1999, the All-American Football Foundation honored him for his years of service as an assistant coach.

Among the Irish All-America standouts he coached were guard Larry DiNardo, tackle John Dampeier, guard Gerry DiNardo, tackle Steve Sylvester, guard



Ernie Hughes, center David Huffnag, tackle Tim Foley and center John Scully.

Boulac is currently in his 24th year of working in the day-to-day operation of the Notre Dame athletic administration. After 13 years as a member of the Irish football coaching staff, at the invitation of athletic director Gene Corrigan, Boulac moved into the administrative ranks in March 1983 working with all of the Notre Dame athletic teams.

As the administrative staff expanded, Boulac served as an administrator for various Irish teams, including men's and women's track and field and cross country, men's and women's swimming and diving, softball, hockey, volleyball, baseball, and men's and women's fencing — with the fencing program earning national championship honors in 1986 (men), 1987 (women), 1994, 2003 and 2005 (the last three combined). Boulac was an eight-year member of the NCAA Division I Fencing Committee and served as chairman of that committee in 1996-97. He is a member of the United States Fencing Association college and high school advisory committee. He

worked the fencing venue at the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, Ga.

Boulac spent four seasons (1989-92) as the first head coach of the Notre Dame women's softball team. During his tenure, he guided the Irish to four 30-win seasons, including Midwestern Collegiate Conference tournament titles in 1990 and 1991, and the league's regular-season title in 1992. In 1989, the first varsity season for the program, he was selected as MCC Coach of the Year.

He also served as an athletic department liaison with the admissions and financial aid departments and worked with fellow Notre Dame administrators Charmelle Green and Mike Karwoski in the student development area.

While also serving as the general manager of the Joyce Center in recent years, Boulac has been responsible for the day-to-day operations of the building, including personnel management, budget management, crowd control, technical services, custodial services and special events.

He traveled to Hamburg, Germany, in the summer of 2000 to help coach a Notre Dame alumni football team to a victory over the Hamburg Blue Devils — and he has served as an assistant coach at the Notre Dame Football Fantasy Camp for all of the six years it has been in existence.

Boulac has been a member of the Edward W. Moose Krause Chapter of the College Football Hall of Fame since 1983, chairing the scholarship committee since 1985. The Chapter honored him for his contributions to football in 1991.

In 2006, Boulac received the James E. Armstrong Award for distinguished service to the University — and on the same weekend he was honored by many of his players and friends when a plaque with his name was placed on a football locker in the new Guglielmino Athletics Complex.

Being at Notre Dame provided Boulac with opportunities to serve in areas not directly related to athletics. He spent two summers in a Notre Dame Peace Corps-type program (CILA) in Lima, Peru, the first between his junior and senior years with teammate and '63 football captain Bob Lehman and the second in 1965 with '66 captain Jim Lynch. A longtime member of the St. Joseph's County DARE board, he also has served on boards at Real Services, Inc., and at Madison Center in South Bend.

Boulac earned 10 letters in high school while playing football, baseball, basketball and track — his freshman and sophomore years at Gonzaga Prep in Spokane, Wash., and junior and senior years at Olympia High School in Olympia, Wash., garnering all-state honors in football and basketball and captaining both those squads, all the while keeping the dream of playing at Notre Dame alive. It was a dream that began in 1949 when his father took him to his first Notre Dame football game — Notre Dame versus Washington in Seattle (Notre Dame won 27-7).

Born May 8, 1941, in Walla Walla, Wash., Boulac and his wife Micki (a 1983 graduate of the Notre Dame Law School) have four daughters, all of whom are Notre Dame graduates: Dawn, Denise, Debbie and Dyan, three of whom (Dawn softball, Debbie softball and Dyan volleyball) earned varsity monograms.



Liz Miller

University of Notre Dame softball coach Liz Miller announced her retirement in June 2001 after nine seasons with the Irish and 26 years of coaching overall, bringing to an end one of the most notable coaching careers in Notre Dame athletic history.

Miller stepped down after leading the Irish through a string of highly-successful seasons and helping establish Notre Dame as one of the top softball programs in the nation.

Miller's announcement came on the heels of the most celebrated season in Irish softball history. Her 2001 team won a school-record 54 games while losing just seven, was ranked as high as eighth in the country and earned the team's first number-one seed in the NCAA Championship. Four members of the 2001 Irish squad earned National Fastpitch Coaches Association (NFCA) All-America honors, three were chosen for the United States National Softball Team and two were named to the Verizon Academic All-America first team.

Over the course of her nine years at Notre Dame, Miller led the team to nine conference regular-season titles, earned five conference coach-of-the-year awards, and compiled a 376-156 (.707) record. Combined with her 17-year record at Lake Michigan College (1975-91), Miller won 917 career games, lost just 298, claimed 21 conference titles and posted 13 consecutive winning seasons. While at Notre Dame, the Irish won over 30 games every season of her tenure and made six NCAA Championship appearances.

Many of the major Notre Dame softball records were established during the Miller era and she coached 10 All-Americans, 14 Academic All-Americans, 25 NFCA all-Mideast Region selections, 27 all-BIG EAST first-team selections and 13 all-Midwestern Collegiate Conference selections.

Miller became just the second softball coach in Notre Dame school history in 1993 and built off the success of former head coach Brian Boulac, who began the program in 1989. Miller constructed a national program, bringing talented players in from as far away as Connecticut and Hawaii. Her aggressive scheduling took the Irish to numerous early-season tournaments, including the traditional yearly trek to the highly prestigious Kia Klassic tournament in Fullerton, Calif.

Miller came to Notre Dame from Lake Michigan College, where she implemented the women's athletic program and served as the head coach for basketball, volleyball and softball. The LMC Hall of Fame inductee posted an unprecedented 1047-331 (.760) combined

record in all three sports, including a stellar 541-142 (.792) mark in softball. Her success at the junior college level led to her induction into the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Coaches Hall of Fame in 1999.

She began her athletic career at Western Michigan University where she earned a bachelor's degree in physical education in 1969 and a master's degree in counseling and personnel in 1971. She played both field hockey and volleyball at WMU, while also spending six summers on an American Softball Association travel softball team. While at WMU, Miller presided over the Women's Recreation Association and has since been named to the Western Michigan Athletic Hall of Fame.

History

- The University of Notre Dame du Lac was founded in 1842 by Father Edward Sorin. Adjacent to South Bend, Ind., and nestled next to Saint Mary's and Saint Joseph's Lakes, the University was started with \$310 in cash and three log buildings in disrepair.
- Notre Dame would establish many firsts for Catholic institutions of higher learning, including the first Catholic law school, the first Catholic engineering school and the first student residence with private rooms, Sorin Hall.

Academics

- The University is organized into four colleges - Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering and the Mendoza College of Business - the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, six major research institutes, more than 40 centers and special programs and the University library system.
- Notre Dame is rated among the nation's top 25 institutions of higher learning in surveys conducted by *U.S. News and World Report*, *Princeton Review*, *Time*, *Kiplinger's*, and *Kaplan/Newsweek*.
- Notre Dame ranks fifth in a listing of "dream schools" in a survey of parents by the *Princeton Review*. The top five are Princeton, Stanford, Harvard, New York University and Notre Dame.
- Notre Dame is among a select group of schools that ranks in the top 25 on the *U.S. News & World Report* survey of the nation's top colleges and in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors' Cup for overall success in athletics.

Students

- Graduate and undergraduate students at the University come from all 50 states and more than 100 countries worldwide.
- Notre Dame's graduation rate of 95 percent is exceeded by only Harvard and Princeton.
- Notre Dame's 98 percent retention rate between the freshman and sophomore years is among the highest in the country, thanks in large part to the University's unique First Year of Studies Program.
- Notre Dame has one of the highest undergraduate residential concentrations of any national university, with 80 percent of its students living in 27 residence halls.



- The medical school acceptance rate of the University's preprofessional studies graduates is 80 percent, almost twice the national average.
- Notre Dame ranks first among Catholic universities in the number of doctorates earned by its undergraduate alumni - a record compiled over some 85 years.

Service

- Community service is a hallmark of Notre Dame. About 80 percent of Notre Dame students engage in some form of voluntary community service during their years at the University, and at least 10 percent devote a year or more after graduation to service in the United States and around the world.
- The University's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) annually sends 180 recent graduates to teach in some 100 understaffed Catholic schools in the southern, southeastern and southwestern United States and in South Bend. A national model, ACE has received the Higher Education Award from the Corporation for National Service for leadership in using national service resources through AmeriCorps.

Alumni

- The University's network of 270 alumni clubs -- including 60 international clubs -- is the most extensive in higher education.
- With graduates renowned for their loyalty and generosity, Notre Dame annually ranks among the top five in percentage of alumni who contribute to the University.
- In recent years, Notre Dame alumni have won a Nobel Prize in medicine, a Pulitzer Prize in journalism, and an Emmy Award for contributions to television technology.
