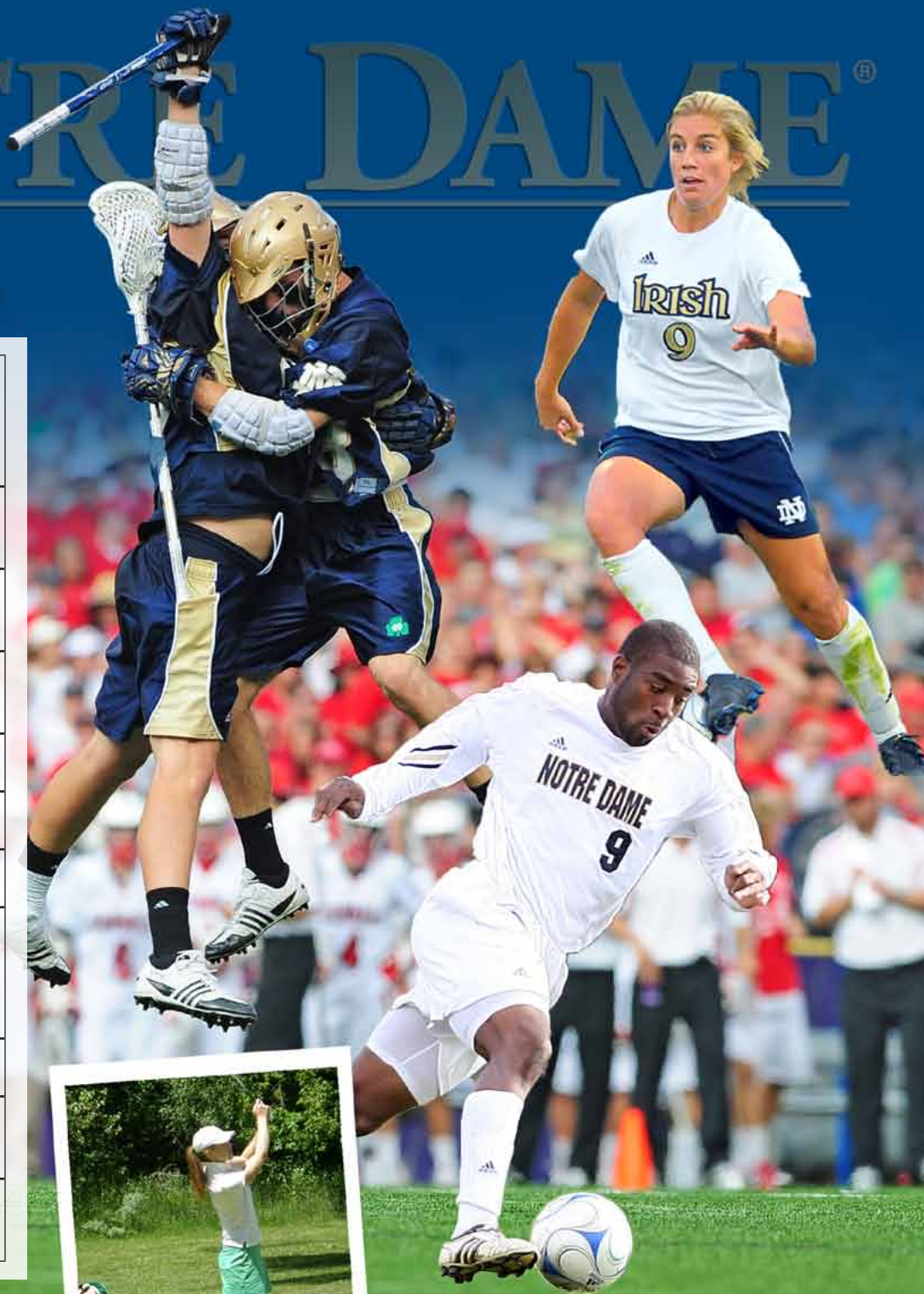

Academic Services — for — Student-Athletes

First Year of Studies

The First Year of Studies program provides all first-year students with the opportunity to gain a wide-ranging liberal arts background before choosing a specific major within Notre Dame's five undergraduate colleges. A progressive advising program for all student-athletes enables the University to follow the academic progress of all student-athletes on a regular basis. Key to the program is the fact that it is not run by the athletics department but by the University administration.

Student-Athlete Success

Notre Dame expects the best out of its student-athletes just as it does of every other student on campus. Notre Dame has had unprecedented academic success among its athletes, consistently ranking among the top NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision schools in graduation rates and academic progress. With more Academic All-Americans than any other school since 2000, Irish athletes have shown themselves capable of performing in the classroom while competing on the field at an elite level.

Sports Medicine

While no athlete plans on an injury, Notre Dame is prepared with one of the top sports medicine teams in the country to help keep its athletes fit and ready to compete. With training facilities in the Joyce Center, Notre Dame Stadium and the Guglielmino Athletics Complex, the training staff is always there to care for athletes. With approximately 225 years combined experience on the full-time staff, Notre Dame also boasts a partnership with the renowned South Bend Orthopaedics to provide first-class care.

Sports Nutrition

Notre Dame has incorporated Erika Whitman, a full-time sports dietitian, as a part of its Strength and Conditioning staff. Whitman continually provides accurate and up-to-date nutrition education to student-athletes and coaches. Including nutrition as an integral component of all training programs enables Irish athletes to achieve optimal health and maximize performance.

Strength and Conditioning

The task of keeping athletes in top physical condition is up to the strength & conditioning staff. The strength and conditioning staff knows the demands of competing on an elite level and is committed to ensuring Irish athletes are always in the best possible condition. From weight lifting to wind sprints and from warming up to cooling down, the strength and conditioning staff has every aspect covered.

The University of Notre Dame

When Father Edward F. Sorin started his school in the northern Indiana wilderness, he had only \$300, three log buildings badly in need of repair and a far-sighted vision of establishing a liberal arts school to meet the growing educational needs of the frontier. He dreamed of building a great university, and in 1842, he founded the University of Notre Dame du Lac.

Over the years, the University of Notre Dame du Lac would evolve into a preeminent place for Catholic thought. While becoming one of the top undergraduate institutions in the country, Notre Dame has also been at the cutting edge of research, including such innovations as the transmission of wireless messages and the development of synthetic rubber. The University also has stressed residential life, with four of five students living on campus. Students come to Notre Dame not only to learn how to think, but to learn how to live, keeping faith with the vision of Father Sorin.

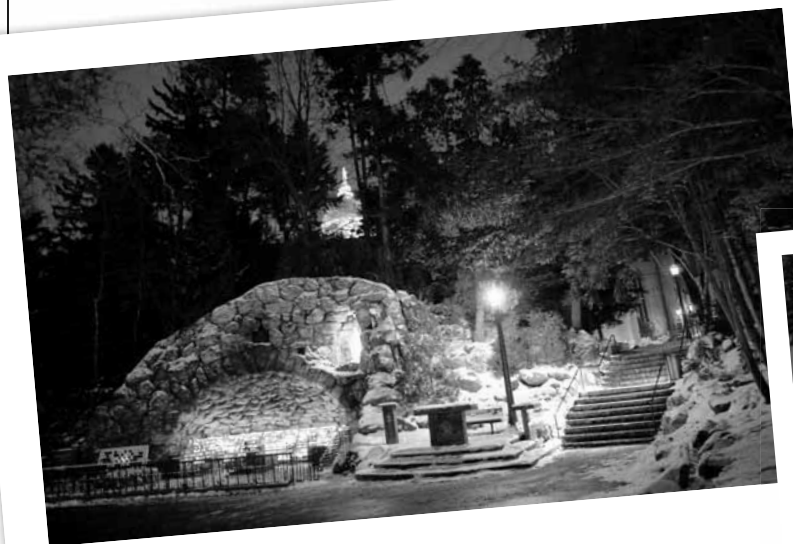

Student Body

Notre Dame is one of a handful of universities with a truly international student body, coming from more than 100 nations and all 50 states. The most recent freshman class featured 89 percent of students in the top 10 percent of their high school class. In addition, there are no fraternities or sororities at Notre Dame, with the school's 28 residence halls housing more than 80 percent of the student body, serving as the focal point of social, religious and athletic activities.

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C.

President

Rev. John I. Jenkins, C.S.C., took office as the 17th president of the University of Notre Dame on July 1, 2005. He was elected by the University's Board of Trustees to a five-year term April 30, 2004.

An associate professor of philosophy and member of Notre Dame's faculty since 1990, Father Jenkins had served as a vice president and associate provost at the University from July 2000 until becoming president.

Prior to his service in the provost's office, Father Jenkins had been religious superior of the Holy Cross priests and brothers at Notre Dame for three years. As religious superior, he was a Fellow and Trustee of the University.

Father Jenkins specializes in the areas of ancient philosophy, medieval philosophy and the philosophy of religion. He is the author of *Knowledge and Faith in Thomas Aquinas*, published by Cambridge University Press in 1997.

Father Jenkins earned degrees in philosophy from Oxford University in 1987 and 1989. He earned his master of divinity degree and licentiate in sacred theology from the Jesuit School of Theology in Berkeley, Calif., in 1988. Prior to entering the Congregation of Holy Cross, he earned bachelor's and master's degrees in philosophy from Notre Dame in 1976 and 1978, respectively.

Father Jenkins was ordained a priest in Notre Dame's Basilica of the Sacred Heart in 1983. He served as director of the Old College program for Notre Dame undergraduate candidates for the Congregation of Holy Cross from 1991 to 1993.

A native of Omaha, Neb., Father Jenkins was born Dec. 17, 1953.

Jack Swarbrick

Director of Athletics

John B. "Jack" Swarbrick Jr., a University of Notre Dame graduate who rose to national prominence as a lawyer, consultant and executive in the collegiate and Olympic sports industries, is in his third year in 2010-11 as director of athletics at his alma mater.

Among Swarbrick's athletics initiatives are meeting the performance needs of Notre Dame student-athletes through establishment of a new sports performance division, reaching out to more former Irish student-athletes via the Notre Dame Monogram Club and other programs, utilizing emerging digital technologies to deliver better information on and access to Notre Dame athletic programs via expanded production and distribution of programming, and restructuring Notre Dame's approach to sport administration through assignment of a unique administrator to each of the 26 Irish sports.

The past two years combined in Notre Dame athletics have featured 68 All-Americans, 14 Academic All-America selections and four NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship winners; record involvement in community service hours by Irish student-athletes; NCAA runner-up team finishes in 2010 men's lacrosse,

2009 fencing and 2008 women's soccer; NCAA semifinal appearances in 2009 and 2010 women's tennis and 2009 women's soccer, plus a 2010 third-place fencing finish; the hiring of new Irish head football coach Brian Kelly to start the 2010 season; the decision to build a new, freestanding ice hockey arena, scheduled to open for the 2011-12 season, plus the 2009-10 dedications of new facilities for soccer and lacrosse – as well as opening of the new Purcell Pavilion within the south dome of the Joyce Center, and 15 BIG EAST Conference titles along with four other league crowns in hockey, men's lacrosse and fencing.

Notre Dame ranked number one in the country (among Football Bowl Subdivision schools) in the two most recent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) surveys -- in 2009 with a 99 (including a 97 score in football that also ranked number one).

Born in Yonkers, N.Y., and raised in Yonkers and Bloomington, Ind., Swarbrick is a 1976 magna cum laude graduate of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in economics. Upon graduating from Stanford University Law School in 1980, he returned to Indiana to accept a position as an associate in the Indianapolis law firm Baker & Daniels. He made partner in 1987 and spent 28 years overall with the firm.

As a member of the Indiana Sports Corporation, including the chairmanship from 1992 to 2001, Swarbrick led most of the city's successful proposals to a wide array of athletics organizations – from the National Football League to the United States Olympic Committee to the Big Ten Conference. His leadership efforts resulted in the city earning the right to play host to the 2012 Super Bowl in Indianapolis at Lucas Oil Stadium; becoming the home of the National Collegiate Athletic Association national headquarters in 1999; hosting the 1987 Pan American Games, 1991 World Gymnastics Championships, NCAA Men's Basketball Final Fours and other college championship competitions and an array of national and world championships in Olympic sports.

Swarbrick's practice at Baker & Daniels focused on the representation of owners of sports teams and organizations that sanction or conduct athletic competitions. He served as general counsel for numerous national governing bodies of Olympic sports, including USA Gymnastics and USRowing, and as a consultant to the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta.

In his work as an advisor to the NCAA, Swarbrick coordinated the men's College Basketball Partnership, an NCAA-led group that addresses the opportunities and challenges in the sport, and developed the business plan for the new NBA/NCAA youth basketball enterprise, iHoops. In 2000 Swarbrick received one of the NCAA's highest honors, The Flying Wedge Award, for his work in establishing Indianapolis as the new home of the NCAA. In 2001 the State of Indiana presented him with the Sagamore of the Wabash Award.

Born March 19, 1954, Swarbrick was named Notre Dame's 12th athletics director on July 16, 2008. He and his wife, Kimberly, are the parents of four children: Kate, a 2010 graduate of St. Louis University; Connor, a senior at Wake Forest University; Cal, a freshman at TCU; and Christopher, a high school senior.



Homes of the Fighting Irish

In the midst of a master plan that will touch nearly every varsity team, Notre Dame has shown its commitment to providing athletes with the best possible facilities to help them compete on a national level. From new facilities to the extensive renovation of existing ones, Notre Dame is committed to giving Irish athletes every edge imaginable. The plan will result in a drastically altered footprint on the south-east corner of campus, creating an athletics quad that will give every Irish athlete a place they will be proud to call home.

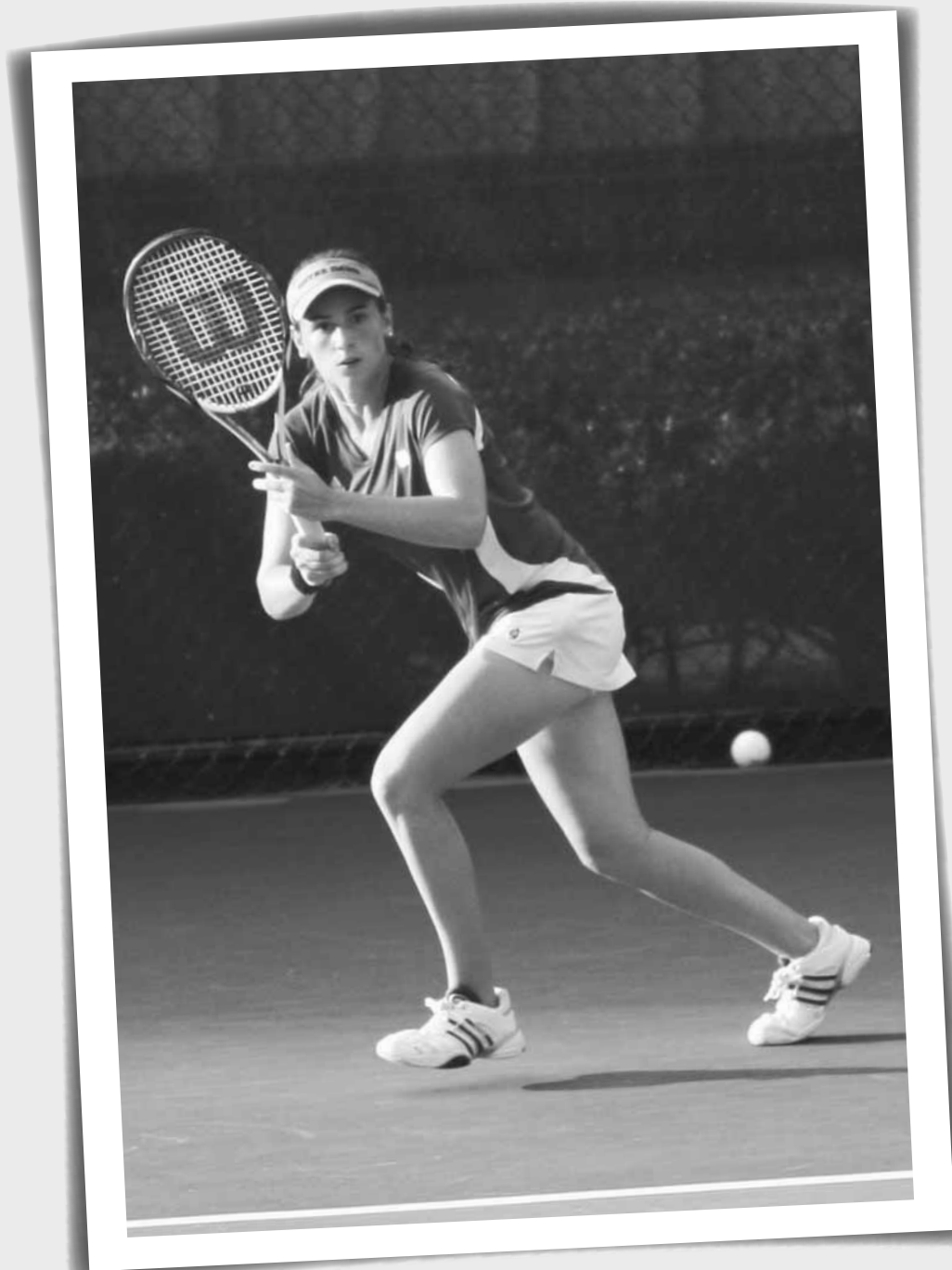

Youthful Irish Squad Looks To Continue Recent NCAA Success

After back-to-back NCAA semifinal trips in '09 and '10, the Irish look to a relatively young team to continue tradition of excellence in the upcoming campaign.

After making back to back appearances in the NCAA Championship semifinals, the 2010-11 Notre Dame women's tennis team will look to build off the success of the past two seasons. Eight-time BIG EAST Coach of the Year, Jay Louderback will have one of his youngest teams in his 22-year tenure at Notre Dame, mixing in one senior, two juniors and one sophomore amongst a group of four talented freshmen.

The Irish are coming off a 26-4 season and a perfect 7-0 BIG EAST conference record in 2009-10, while defeating 16 top-50 teams (according to ITA polls), with 10 of those opponents falling inside the top 25. This success led Notre Dame to a fifth-place finish in the final ITA poll. The 2010-11 campaign will be spearheaded by four veterans that have enough experience to continue the tradition of a national power.

Kristen Rafael represents the lone senior on the Irish roster this season and serves as the only team captain. After being a junior mentor the past season, Rafael looks to take the leading role for this year's young team. She completed the '09-'10 season at No. 5 and No. 6 singles with an 11-8 dual record and spent most of the season at No. 3 doubles, finishing with a 12-8 record. The Grand Prairie, Texas product has plenty of tennis knowledge on her side entering her fourth year and will look to share valuable experience with the youthful Irish roster.

"Kristen is going to be a key for us," Louderback says. "Not only on the court, but off the court as well because she is our only captain and our only senior, so a lot of the leadership responsibilities will fall on her. In the past we have had more than one, but now with just one she is the only senior and we are expecting a lot out of her. She is doing a great job so far. Tennis-wise, she just needs to be more consistent. She has always shown times where she has been very good in the past, and usually when it comes down to the end of the year and we need her to play well, she has, but its going to be a key for her to be consistent all year. She plays a big game. She hits the ball hard, and has the ability to play high in our lineup."

Leading the junior attack for the Irish this year is last year's BIG EAST Player of the Year, Kristy Frilling. The Sidney, Ohio native amassed a 21-7 singles dual record and a 36-5 doubles mark, both at the No. 1 position. Frilling teamed up with Kali Krisik ('10) in doubles, advancing to the NCAA doubles tournament quarterfinals. The duo finished the year with a 34-3 mark on the season – including a perfect 25-0 mark during the dual season – while posting a streak of 27-consecutive match victories. The tandem also earned national recognition in the rankings, climbing as high as No. 2 in the doubles

polls. In addition to great doubles success, Frilling also earned a berth into the NCAA singles tournament last year. She was named to the '09-10 ITA Collegiate All-Star team for the second consecutive year as well as being named a 2010 ITA All-American in both the singles and doubles teams.

"Kristy Frilling is just an explosive player," Louderback exclaims. "She can hit every shot from every spot on the court. She hits the ball hard, and she has worked hard on being able to slow the ball up occasionally, and to play better defense. Usually her defense is a hardly hit ball, and that gets her in trouble. Now she is doing a much better job if she gets in trouble on a point to slow the ball down and getting back in it, and not trying to win the point from a ridiculous spot on the court, even though she has the ability to do that. She is doing a much better job of it. She also is volleying much better. She's taking advantage of how hard she hits by hitting more balls out of the air, and I think that will help her move up through the top 10, and maybe even help her win a national championship."

Shannon Mathews bookends the talented duo of juniors for the Irish and looks to build off her 17-11 singles dual record at the No. 2 spot and 19-6 doubles record. She showed her talent in spurts last year, including knocking off five nationally-ranked opponents. The Birmingham, Mich. product was one of five Irish players named to 2009-10 all-BIG EAST team, her second consecutive season earning that honor.

"Shannon has always been at the top of our lineup in singles and I'm not concerned at all about her singles," Louderback says. "She is a great competitor, works really hard in practice and in matches, and her big thing for us this year is going to be how well she does in doubles. We need her

to step up and play high in our doubles lineup, and she has the doubles ability. She has gotten a lot better around the net, and she has that ability to step up and do it. For her it's just a matter of consistency, and being consistent in our doubles."

Chrissie McGaffigan returns after a stellar freshman season where she competed at third singles. She posted a 16-9 dual singles record and an 18-9 mark in doubles action. The highly-recruited Davenport, Iowa native was named to the 2009-10 All-BIG EAST team on top of earning BIG EAST Freshman of the Year honors, the second consecutive Irish player to win the award. McGaffigan also was honored as the 2010 ITA Midwest Rookie of the Year, becoming the first Irish women's player to receive that accolade since Irish great Michelle Dasso earned that title in the 1998 season.

"Chrissie is a little bit like Frilling because she likes to hit the ball hard. Her biggest thing, as well, is getting her to come to the net more. She hits a

big ball. She is very fast. She has a good serve. She really can do everything. It is just a matter of her putting it all together and doing everything. Instead of trying to hit the ball hard, she has to be a little bit more of an all-around player because she does everything so well. She needs to use all of her strokes - her volley, her overhead, she has a good drop shot and great touch. She really has everything. She just needs to get to a point where she uses all of them."

Four talented freshmen join the fold for the upcoming season and will be counted on to make immediate contributions for the dual rotation. The '10 recruiting class is ranked as the 11th best class in the nation according to tennisrecruiting.net.

Brittany Sanders, the standout from Ontario, Calif., was rated fifth in the state and 21st in the nation. She played three years at No. 1 singles while collecting three league individual titles at Ontario H.S. Sanders competed at the USTA National Winter Championships, winning the girls-18 double competition with current teammate and fellow freshman Julie Sabacinski in Scottsdale, Ariz.

The top recruit out of the state of New York, freshman Jennifer Kellner joins the lineup as a very sound player, taking advantage of every inch of the court with a precision style of game. The Smithtown, N.Y., product was a decorated high school player, taking home a singles and doubles state title during her four years. The 28th-best recruit in the nation was named captain her senior year while collecting All-American honors.

Julie Sabacinski enters as a talented product out of Plantation, Fla. She finished rated the ninth-best recruit in the state and 49th-best nationally and helped guide her team from the No. 1 singles position to four Class 2A Florida state titles.

JoHanna Manningham joins the Fighting Irish from nearby Mishawaka, Ind. She was rated sixth in the Hoosier State in the '10 recruiting class, garnered conference championship honors and made it as a state finalist in singles in 2008. She also was selected all-conference and all-state four years and chosen captain her senior year.

"The freshmen will be a good group," Louderback remarks. "They are going to be a good class. They are all good doubles players, which is a key for us because we lost a lot of good doubles players from last year's class. They also compete well. They all bring something a little bit different to the team.

"Brittany Sanders hits the ball big. She is a big, big hitter," Louderback continues. "Julie Sabacinski is a kid that is a little more all-around. She can come in or stay back. She is a good doubles player and volleys well. Jennifer Kellner is just a great competitor and doesn't miss. She is on the baseline and is as solid as you are ever going to find. She can come in if she has to, but she is just really solid from the baseline. JoHanna Manningham is a kid that works hard and is really going to develop. She has a lot of ability. She has some speed, moves well and now we are just

working on some things with her. So I think as a whole, they bring a lot of different things to the table. I don't think this is a class that is all one thing. They aren't all just big hitters, they bring a lot of different things to the program."

The Irish have yet another difficult road ahead of them to get back to the NCAA Championships in 2011.

The Irish will open up in Champaign, Ill., on (Jan. 22) with a match versus Illinois before opening up a two-match home stand competing with Yale and then either Arkansas or Utah. Notre Dame then hits Tobacco Road to battle North Carolina on Feb. 5 and Wake Forest on Feb. 6. After another three match home stand (Feb. 10-13) against Michigan, Vanderbilt and Wisconsin, the Irish hope to compete in the National Team Indoor Championships in Charlottesville, Va., from Feb. 18-21.

The Irish then hit the road four days later as they travel to Montgomery, Ala., to compete in the eight-team Blue-Gray National Tennis Classic, Feb. 25-27. The Irish return to the Crossroads of America following that to take on Indiana in Bloomington before returning home to take on Baylor on March 6.

The team then travels to the Sunshine State to take on USF (March 15), Duke (March 17) and Tennessee (March 19) in Tampa, Fla. The Fighting Irish continue on to play Georgia Tech in Atlanta before traveling back to northern Indiana for matches against Long Beach State and Texas A&M.

Trips to Evanston, Ill., and Milwaukee, Wis., to play Northwestern (April 7) and Marquette (April 17), respectively, close out the road portion of the season. The Irish finish up regular season play by taking on BIG EAST foe DePaul (April 23).

The Courtney Tennis Center/Eck Tennis Center and Leeper Park will then once again be the

dwelling place for the BIG EAST Championships from April 28-May 1 as the Irish will look to win their fourth straight BIG EAST title.

The NCAA First and Second Rounds will be held at various school sites (May 13-15), and the winners will get the right to travel to Palo Alto, Calif., for the NCAA Championships May 20-30.

"The BIG EAST is getting tougher," Louderback affirms. "We had three teams in the top 30 last year, and that's good for us. South Florida is going to be very good this year, and they are going to want to do everything they can to come in here and win the BIG EAST. So the BIG EAST is important to us, and then the NAAs. Seeing how we have had two really good runs the last two years, and really the last five years, we have done really well; we just hope we can compete with how we have done the last few years. I think the key for that to happen will be our doubles. I think our singles lineup could be as strong as we have ever had, but the key is going to be doubles. Losing Krisik and (Cosmina) Ciobanu last year from the doubles lineup is tough because they were as good as you are going to find in doubles. That is going to be the key for us, getting the right combinations."

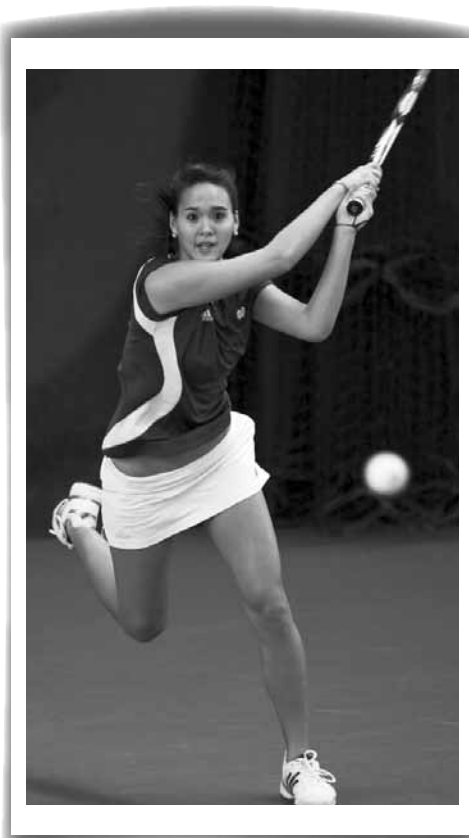

When Jay Louderback took over as women's tennis head coach at Notre Dame in the fall of 1989, he inherited a program that had competed on the Division I level for just four years and had never participated in the NCAA tournament or earned a national ranking. As he enters his 22nd season at the helm, Louderback has turned Notre Dame into one of the premier women's tennis programs in the nation.

The Irish have finished in the national top 30 in each of the last 18 seasons and have earned 17 berths to the NCAA Championships in that span. Notre Dame has captured 16 conference titles during Louderback's tenure and has reached the round of 16 or further in the NCAA tournament on nine occasions, including four appearances in the quarterfinals (1996, 2006, 2007) and two consecutive trips to the semifinals (2009, 2010). The Courtney Tennis Center also has served as host of the 1998 NCAA Championships, largely due to his efforts.

Last season, Louderback and the Irish advanced to the NCAA tournament semifinals for the second year in a row. Notre Dame finished with a 26-4 record and ranked fifth in the final Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) poll. The Irish also won their third straight BIG EAST title with a 4-0 win over DePaul. Louderback's squad also earned a trip to the ITA Indoor Championship.

Individually, his athletes earned several academic and athletic acknowledgements for their efforts. Cosmina Ciobanu ('10) earned second team *ESPN The Magazine*/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and was the finalist from the state of Indiana for the NCAA Woman of the Year award. NCAA Woman of the Year Award. Kristy Frilling was selected to represent the U.S. in the Master'U BNP Paribas. Frilling, along with teammate Kali Krisik, entered the NCAA Championships

ranked third in the nation and were both named to the 2009-10 ITA Collegiate All-Star Team as well as being named ITA All-Americans. Krisik also was named the BIG EAST Championship's Most Outstanding Player after leading the Irish to their third-consecutive conference title while earning all-conference honors for the second consecutive season.

Louderback's players have enjoyed great success under his tutelage. Twenty-six All-America awards have been given to his Irish players, and four have garnered national awards from the ITA. In 21 years, 27 Notre Dame players have garnered invitations to the NCAA Singles Championship and 19 doubles squads have gained berths into the NCAA Doubles Championship.

Louderback's players also have dominated University awards, winning the Francis Patrick O'Connor Award, given to one male and one female athlete each year who best embody the true spirit of Notre Dame, on seven occasions - more than any other sport. Louderback has had 10 winners of the Byron V. Kanaley Award, the most prestigious honor awarded to Notre Dame student-athletes, the most for any sport in the time since the Wichita State graduate arrived.

Another feature of Louderback's leadership is academic excellence. Since the ITA began awarding the All-Academic Team award to squads maintaining a 3.20 GPA for the year, the Irish have earned the distinction 14 times in 15 years. Only one Division I school, Western Michigan, has a better mark, as the Broncos have won the award all 15 years. In addition, Louderback's players have had a history of being named ITA Scholar-Athletes, which recognizes monogram winners who maintain a 3.50+ GPA for the year. He also has produced a trio of Academic All-Americans.

Louderback also has been decorated with eight conference coach-of-the-year awards, and seven times he has been named Midwest Region Coach of the Year. He was awarded the Wilson/ITA National Coach of the Year in 2006.

In 31 years of coaching, Louderback holds a 617-348 (.639) record, including a 572-315 (.645) mark coaching women's tennis. At Notre Dame, he is 413-170 (.708), making him the winningest coach in program history. After guiding Notre Dame to a 17-8 record during his first year with the Irish in 1990, Louderback led the Irish to their first-ever national ranking the following season, finishing the year at 23rd after a 16-9 season. In individual action, Melissa Harris advanced to the second round of the NCAA Singles Championship, becoming the first player in school history to accomplish the feat.

The 1992-93 season saw the Irish earn their first berth to the NCAA Championship at the Division I level. Notre Dame shut out Alabama in the first round before falling to #2 Stanford to

finish 18-8 and 19th in the nation. Wendy Crabtree and Lisa Tholen also became the first Irish team to earn a berth in the NCAA Doubles Championship.

In 1993-94, Notre Dame again earned a trip to the NCAA Championship and again fell to Stanford in the second round. Crabtree and Lisa Tholen advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship to become the first Irish All-Americans at the Division I level. Crabtree also earned singles All-America honors.

The 1994-95 season marked the last of seven consecutive Midwestern Collegiate Conference titles, including six under Louderback. Crabtree was a singles All-American for the second year in a row.

The 1996 Irish squad put together one of the best seasons in school history. Notre Dame won the BIG EAST title in its inaugural season in the league, advanced to the NCAA quarterfinals, compiled a 23-7 mark and finished with a No. 6 national ranking.

Crabtree finished her career by becoming the first women's tennis player to earn Academic All-America honors. Freshman Jennifer Hall completed an outstanding season, winning the BIG EAST Championship Most Outstanding Player award in addition to being named the Penn National Player to Watch. Hall also became the first Irish player to advance to the round of 16 of the NCAA Singles Championship, which assured her singles All-America honors.

After playing host to early-round NCAA action in 1997, the '98 season saw the NCAA Championships come to Notre Dame. Hall and Tiffany Gates, spurned on by a hometown crowd, advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Freshman Michelle Dasso stepped in for the Irish at No. 2 singles and finished with a 40-8 record, setting a new all-time mark for singles wins in a campaign.

Louderback's '99 Irish won the program's third BIG EAST championship and posted wins over ninth-ranked Wake Forest and No. 9 William & Mary. Notre Dame finished with a final national ranking of No. 15. Hall completed her career by breaking the 13-year-old school record for career singles wins and also added Academic All-America honors, as well as her third straight athletic All-America distinction. She again advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship, this time with Dasso, who was named to the USA Tennis Summer Collegiate Team.

The 2000 Irish delivered a second straight 23-7 season and advanced to the national site of the NCAA Championship for the first time since '96, finishing with a final ranking of 13th. On April 15, 2000, Louderback registered his 400th career win with a victory over Miami.

Louderback's teams continued their strong regular-season performances, as the 2001 squad posted a 20-win season for the fourth consecutive year, with a 25-5 record. Ranked 10th

in the final ITA poll, the Irish advanced to the NCAA round of 16 for the second consecutive year and were ranked as high as No. 5 during the regular season.

Four-time All-American Dasso became the first Irish player to be named the ITA National Senior Player of the Year and qualified for the NCAA singles tournament for the fourth time. She capped off the best season for an Irish women's tennis player when she reached at least the semifinals in three of the four ITA grand slam events.

She became the first Notre Dame player to reach a grand slam final, at the now-defunct National Clay Court Championships and made it to the semifinals of the NCAA Singles Championship. Dasso teamed with Becky Varnum in doubles at the 2001 NCAA Doubles Championship for the second consecutive year in her third straight doubles appearance.

After a top-25 season in '02, the Irish won another BIG EAST title in 2003 and finished 21st nationally. The '03 season saw Notre Dame knock off #14 VCU to snap the Rams' 38-match regular-season winning streak and 40-match home winning streak, while the Irish went on to finish 27th in the country.

The 2004-05 campaign was marked by the outstanding play of sophomore twins Catrina and Christian Thompson, who reached the title match of the Riviera/ITA All-American Championships and the semis of the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships en route to being the first squad in Irish history to reach the national #1 ranking in doubles.

Despite a loss in the second round of the NCAA tournament, Notre Dame's appearance in the '05 event assured that 20 consecutive classes, dating from 1990 through 2009, will have made at least one trip to the NCAA national event - a range of classes that includes every freshman since Louderback arrived at Notre Dame.

In recognition of Louderback's effort and success, Notre Dame's Monogram Club bestowed upon him an honorary monogram in 1998. He joined an elite group of six active Notre Dame head coaches to have been awarded an honorary monogram.

In 2006, Louderback and the Irish, went 27-2 and climbed as high as No. 2 en route to the NCAA quarterfinals. The Irish finished the season fifth in the ITA Rankings. After finishing 24th in 2005, ND was 22nd in the pre-season before moving into the top five for good on Feb. 28.

The Irish finished 2007 with a 28-4 record and their second straight appearance in the NCAA Tournament quarterfinals. Twins Catrina and Christian Thompson earned All-America honors in doubles for the third straight year.

Louderback guided Notre Dame to a 22-9 record in 2008 and its 13th consecutive appearance in the NCAA Tournament. The Irish also captured their third BIG EAST title in four years. For his efforts, Louderback took home 2008 BIG EAST Coach-of-the-Year honors for the seventh time overall and second time in three seasons.

Brook Buck and Kelcy Tefft captured the program's second-ever title in an ITA national championship following their triumph at the ITA National Indoors in November. Buck and Tefft went on to earn All-America status and even reached the semifinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship - the furthest that any Notre Dame duo has advanced in the program's history.

The 2009 season saw the Irish make history when, for the first time in program history, the team advanced to the NCAA tournament semi-



nals. Notre Dame finished the year with a 28-5 record and ranked fifth in the final ITA poll. The Irish also won their second straight BIG EAST title and advanced to the ITA National Team Indoor semifinals.

Kelcy Tefft and Kristy Frilling opened the season as the nation's top-ranked doubles duo, before advancing to the second round of the NCAA Doubles Championship and earning All-America honors. Tefft was named the ITA National Player of the Year and the BIG EAST Player of the Year, while Frilling earned ITA National Player to Watch billing and BIG EAST Freshman of the Year honors.

Prior to coming to Notre Dame, Louderback headed the men's and women's tennis programs at Iowa State for three years. He led the men's squad to a 45-33 mark and the women's team to a 37-51 record from 1986-89. In his final season with the Cyclones, Louderback's men's team finished fourth in the Big Eight, Iowa State's highest conference finish in 25 years.

Louderback began his coaching career at his alma mater, taking the helm of the Wichita State women's program in just its fifth year of competition.

He guided the Shockers to a 122-94 record in seven years, including two Gateway Conference championships (1984 and 1986) and a Missouri Valley Conference title (1982). Five of his seven teams either won a conference championship or finished as runners-up. During his tenure, the Shockers won 14 or more matches each season while 10 of his players qualified for postseason competition. Two of his players qualified for the

NCAA Championships in both the 1983-84 and 1984-85 seasons.

The 1980-81 Shockers set a school record with 21 wins, as the team earned its first postseason berth. The 21-win plateau was reached again the following season when Wichita State captured the MVC and Region IV championships.

Louderback was voted 1982 Region IV Coach of the Year for his team's outstanding accomplishments.

A native of Arkansas City, Kan., Louderback was an assistant tennis professional at the Riverside Tennis Center in Wichita, Kan., and head tennis professional at the Y Tennis Center in Battle Creek, Mich., before taking the coaching position at Wichita State.

Louderback, who earned a bachelor's degree in business administration from Wichita State in 1976, won a Missouri Valley Conference title at No. 3 singles during his senior year. For his efforts that season, Louderback was voted most valuable player by his teammates.

In April 2003, the Louderback family was honored by the USTA with the Tennis Family of the Year Award, presented to one family consisting of USTA members and volunteers who have excelled in advancing the USTA's mission to promote and grow the game of tennis both on and off the court. He and his wife, Denise, have one daughter, Bailey, who earned four monograms with the Irish tennis team and graduated in May 2008.

Former Harvard assistant Julia Scaringe enters her third year as an assistant coach with the Notre Dame women's tennis team after joining the squad in September 2008.

During the 2009-10 campaign Scaringe helped coach the Irish to one of their best seasons in the program's history, capped off by a third consecutive BIG EAST Championship title and a second consecutive trip to the NCAA Championships.

The Irish finished the year with a 26-4 record and ended the season fifth in the ITA rankings.

Three of her players earned preseason rankings and at the close of the season five Irish players earned national honors (Cosmina Ciobanu, Kristy Frilling, Kali Krisik, Chrissie McGaffigan and Colleen Reilley).

Scaringe not only saw her student-athletes receive accolades for their successes on the court, but received her own honors as well. After the completion of the '10 season, she was selected as a coach of the 2010 USTA Women's Summer Collegiate Team, which is an elite training program for the top American collegiate tennis players.

In 2009, Scaringe helped the Irish to a very successful season. Notre Dame advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Championships for the first time in program history and achieved a final ranking of fifth in the ITA poll. The Irish went 28-5 and won their second straight BIG EAST title.

Kelcy Tefft and Frilling opened the season as the top-ranked doubles duo before advancing to the second round of the NCAA Doubles Championship and earning All-America honors. Tefft was named the ITA National Player of the Year and BIG EAST Player of the Year, while Frilling garnered an ITA National Player to Watch billing and BIG EAST Freshman of the Year honors.

Five Irish players - Tefft, Frilling, Ciobanu, Krisik and Shannon Mathews - earned all-BIG EAST recognition, while Mathews and Rielley were named to the NCAA all-tournament team.

Scaringe joined the Irish staff after spending a year with the women's tennis program at Harvard, where she helped coach two all-Ivy League players League and 2008 NCAA singles participant Beier Ko.

A 2003 Florida graduate, Scaringe played the No. 1 singles position for the Gators. During her time in Gainesville, Florida won a national championship, two Southeastern conference championships, three SEC tournament championships and finished as the NCAA runner-up and national team indoor runner-up. She received Florida's Most Improved Player award, the SEC Outstanding Senior award and was named the ITA South Region Player of the Year as a senior in 2003. Scaringe achieved a career-high ITA singles ranking of 24th and seventh in doubles.

She also was a two-time Dorothy Anderson Award recipient, given to an athlete who displays the best combination of academics and character on and off the court, as well as being named a 2002 Sportsmanship Award honoree. Scaringe graduated 11th all-time in combined singles and doubles wins in Florida history and seventh all-time in doubles victories. She also was a member of Florida's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.

As a junior player, Scaringe was a member of the U.S. National team, playing in all four junior Grand Slams and achieving a world ranking of 54th in singles and 42nd in doubles. Her best result came at the Australian Open where she reached the round of 16 in singles play.

She graduated from Florida with a bachelor's degree in business administration.

Tennis Tradition

With 18 straight finishes in the national top 30, including a program-best No. 2 ranking in 2006 and 2007, and 17 berths in the NCAA tournament during that time, Jay Louderback's women's tennis program at the University of Notre Dame has solidified its spot among the country's finest. Louderback enters his 22nd season at Notre Dame having elevated the Irish to new levels.

His teams have captured 16 conference titles and have advanced to the NCAA round of 16 or further nine times, including back-to-back appearances in the NCAA Semifinals in 2009 and 2010. Success, however, is nothing new to Notre Dame women's tennis, which began in 1976 as the first varsity women's sport at the University.

The roots of the program's recent success can be traced back to when Notre Dame first became a coeducational institution in 1972, and there were only 365 women present on the campus. This minority did not provide enough interest or depth to immediately warrant a women's tennis program above the club level. But, by 1976, female enrollment had risen to 1,550, and the tennis team gained varsity status.

Led by head coach Kathy Cordes, the Irish finished their first varsity season 7-3-1, and Jane Lammers and Mary Shukis became the first women to earn varsity monograms at Notre Dame.

Notre Dame made great progress in its initial years and became a force on the state and national level in just its fourth season. The Irish notched an impressive come-from-behind victory in the 1979 Indiana Intercollegiate Women's Championship and went on to finish 22nd in the national tournament. This showing led to the team's promotion to Division II after only four years at the Division III level.

A spring tennis season was added to the schedule for 1980-81, and the team successfully charted its first 20-win season, more than doubling its victory total from the previous year. In addition, the Irish captured the AIAW Division II State Championship title. This led to an appearance in the AIAW National Championship (20th-place finish).

In 1982, the Irish placed first once again in the AIAW state and regional tournaments, going on to tie for sixth in the national championship. Much of the squad's success was due to the play of freshman All-American Laura Lee. In individual action, Lee ran off six straight victories to capture the AIAW Division II national singles title in the No. 5 flight, becoming Notre Dame's first women's tennis national champion. Joining Lee as one of the first two All-Americans in Irish women's tennis history was sophomore Pam Fischette, who was the national runner-up at No. 3 singles.

When the AIAW dissolved, the women's tennis program took on NCAA Division II status and immediately became a contender for the national title. The Irish notched three consecutive top-three finishes from 1983-85 before being moved up to Division I. In both 1983 and '84, Notre Dame

finished third in the NCAA Division II Championships. The following year, the Irish advanced to the national title match, losing to Tennessee-Chattanooga. With the team's runner-up finish, head coach Sharon Petro earned Division II national coach-of-the-year honors.

After competing as an independent during its initial seven years of varsity action, the Notre Dame women's tennis team joined the North Star Conference in 1983-84, beginning a tradition of dominance in conference action that would see the Irish win 14 league titles in a row and 18 in the 25 years since giving up their independent status.

The 1985-86 season saw the women's tennis team reach another milestone in its short history – the team's debut at the NCAA Division I level. First-year head coach Michele Gelfman led Notre Dame to a 28-6 record, with four of the losses coming by 5-4 scores. The win total still stands as the highest by an Irish team at the Division I level.

The tradition of freshman excellence continued in 1987-88 as rookie CeCe Cahill became the first Irish women's tennis player to compete in the NCAA Division I Championships. The first Notre Dame player to be listed in the national singles rankings, she qualified for the singles tournament, but dropped her first-round match 7-6 (7-3), 6-3 to Stanford's Katy Tittle.

The 1988-89 season proved to be another landmark in the program's growth, marking the Irish debut in the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, in which it would win seven

straight titles (after going unbeaten in five North Star Conference Championships).

Louderback took over the Irish program in the fall of 1989, ushering in an era of unparalleled success. After a 17-8 campaign in his first season, the '90-91 Irish became the first team in the program's history to crack the Division I team national rankings, while three individuals also received national listings. Melissa Harris – who was ranked as high as seventh nationally in singles during her career – became the first Notre Dame women's tennis player to win a match in the NCAA Division I Singles Championship when she beat Northwestern's Lindsay Matthews 6-3, 4-6, 6-2.

Notre Dame entered the national stage in '92-93, earning its first invitation to the NCAA Division I Championship and knocking off No. 19 Alabama to advance to the round of 16. Freshman Wendy Crabtree gained entrance to the NCAA Singles Championship and teamed with Lisa Tholen in the doubles draw, the first Irish doubles team to earn a spot in the event.

Crabtree became Notre Dame's first All-American on the Division I level in '93-94, garnering honors in singles and in doubles with Tholen. In addition, the team earned its second straight trip to the round of 16 and, for the first time in the history of the program, two players – Crabtree and Holyn Lord – earned spots in the NCAA singles field.

The 1995-96 Irish squad reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship – tied for the farthest Notre Dame has ever advanced in the

Academic Tradition

In addition to its success on the court, Notre Dame's track record in the classroom is virtually unparalleled in college tennis. Over the past 14 years, the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) has recognized teams posting a grade-point-average of 3.20 or higher for the year as ITA All-Academic Teams. The Irish women's tennis program has earned that distinction 14 times during that span, including each of the last 11 years. Only one Division I school, Western Michigan, has a better string, with the Broncos having received the award each year from 1996-2010. Southern Illinois and Evansville are also 14-time winners.

After having the highest combined GPA of any of Notre Dame's 26 varsity teams in 2002-03 (3.444), the Irish were even better in 2003-04, posting a 3.467 mark for the academic year (second-best among Notre Dame teams). During the spring semester, the Irish combined for an incredible 3.552 team GPA, which is the highest single-semester team GPA for any Notre Dame team on record (since 1992).



In 2002-03, seven Notre Dame players were honored as ITA Scholar-Athletes, a total tied for the highest by a Division I team in a single season. To earn the honor, one must be a varsity letterwinner and have a GPA of at least 3.50 for the year. Prior to the 2002-03 year, one also had to be a junior or senior.

Since 2000, a total of 18 players have earned the accolade. Colleen Rielley and Cosmina Ciobanu are the only four-time selections in Irish history.

The University of Notre Dame ranks second all-time in the number of student-athletes who have been named Academic All-Americans by the College Sports Information Directors of America. The 216 selections for the Irish trail only Nebraska's 277. Three women's tennis players — Wendy Crabtree (third team in

1996), Jennifer Hall (third team in 1999) and Cosmina Ciobanu (second team in 2010) — have earned that coveted accolade.

event. In addition, the Irish finished the season ranked sixth — the second highest final ranking in program history. Notre Dame also came away with the BIG EAST title in its inaugural year in the league. Jennifer Hall earned All-America honors as a freshman, and she played in the NCAA singles event, while Crabtree and Lord closed out their impressive careers playing in the NCAA doubles tournament for the second straight year.

In '97, Hall advanced to the second round of the NCAA singles tournament and to the final 16 in the doubles championship with Tiffany Gates. Notre Dame also won its second straight BIG EAST championship, and Louderback was named the league's coach of the year for the second consecutive year. Michelle Dasso, now an assistant coach for the Irish, began her illustrious career by setting the school record for singles wins in a season with a 40-8 record.

Notre Dame's Courtney Tennis Center served as the national site for the 1998 NCAA Championships (it remains the northern-most location ever selected for that distinction). Hall teamed with Tiffany Gates for the first of her two consecutive appearances in the NCAA doubles quarterfinals.

Notre Dame turned in the first of back-to-back 23-7 seasons in 1998-99, putting together a 12-match winning streak and winning its third BIG EAST title. Dasso joined Crabtree as the only players in school history to earn All-

America honors in singles and doubles in the same season. She teamed up with Hall to reach the final eight of the NCAA Doubles Championship, matching the best-ever finish for an Irish team. A year later, Notre Dame advanced to the NCAA round of 16 for the first time since 1996 and won 14 of 15 matches in one late-season stretch.

For the fourth time in five years, the Courtney Tennis Center was selected as a host site for early-round NCAA Championship action in 2001. Notre Dame reached the final 16 for the second consecutive year and finished 25-5 after peaking at fifth in the national rankings. It was the fourth consecutive 20-win season and the fewest losses for a Notre Dame team at the Division I level.

Four-time All-American Dasso became the first Irish player to be named the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) National Senior Player of the Year and qualified for the NCAA singles tournament for the fourth consecutive season. She capped off the best season for an Irish women's tennis player when she reached at least the semifinals in three of the four ITA grand-slam events. She became the first Notre Dame player to reach a grand-slam final, at the now-defunct National Clay Court Championships, and made it to the semifinals of the NCAA Singles Championship. Dasso was ranked as high as No. 2 nationally in singles and

fifth in doubles (with Becky Varnum), establishing program bests in both instances.

Notre Dame won its fifth BIG EAST Championship in '03, pulling out a thrilling 4-3 win over host and arch-rival Miami with a victory at No. 2 doubles in the last match remaining on court. Caylan Leslie and Alicia Salas both earned berths in the NCAA singles tournament, marking the fifth time since 1991 that two Notre Dame players gained entrance to the event.

Salas became one of the nation's top players during the 2003-04 season, peaking at 10th in the national singles rankings, while twins Catrina and Christian Thompson continued the tradition of freshman superlatives. The duo filled the No. 1 doubles spot all season and played Nos. 2 and 3 singles. The Thompsons became the first all-freshman doubles team (for any school) to be invited to the NCAA Doubles Championship since 1998, rallying for a three-set victory in the first round before falling in three sets in the round of 16 to finish the season ranked 26th.

The Thompsons reached new heights in '04-05, advancing to the title match of the season's first grand slam, the Riviera/ITA All-American Championships, for the best-ever result by a Notre Dame doubles team. The sophomore sisters then reached the semis in the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships and surged to the national No. 1 ranking in doubles in early spring, achieving another program first. They earned a spot in the NCAA Doubles Championship and won a match to reach the round of 16 for the second consecutive season. Catrina also garnered an invitation to the singles event and prevailed in the opening round.

The Irish earned an automatic bid to the 2005 NCAA tournament and advanced to the second round. Notre Dame's appearance in the tournament — its 10th in as many years — assured that 19 consecutive classes dating from 1990 through 2009 will have made at least one trip to the NCAA tournament — a range that includes every freshman class since five-time BIG EAST coach of the year Louderback arrived at Notre Dame.

Notre Dame went 27-2 and climbed as high as No. 2 en route to the NCAA quarterfinals in 2006. The Irish finished the season fifth in the ITA Rankings, the highest final ITA ranking since becoming a Division I program in 1985-86. After finishing 24th in 2005, ND was 22nd in the pre-season before moving into the top five for good on Feb. 28.

The Irish were the top-ranked team in the ITA's Midwest Region for the first time since 1999-2000.

The Irish did not miss a beat in 2007. Notre Dame climbed as high as No. 2 in the rankings, again, and reached the NCAA quarterfinals for the second consecutive season. The Irish went 28-4 on the year and knocked off 13 opponents ranked in the top 25. Catrina and Christian Thompson were named All-Americans for the third straight year in doubles.

The Irish stayed on track in 2008, finishing with a 22-9 record and making their 13th consecutive appearance in the NCAA tournament. Notre Dame also captured its third BIG EAST title in four years. Louderback took home BIG EAST Coach of the Year honors for the seventh time overall and second time in three seasons.

Brook Buck and Kelcy Tefft captured the program's second-ever title in an ITA national championship, following their triumph at the ITA National Indoors in November. Buck and Tefft went on to earn All-America honors and reached the semifinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship – the furthest that any Notre Dame duo has advanced in the program's history.

The 2008-09 season turned out to be one of the best in the program's history. After winning their second straight BIG EAST title, the Irish advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Championship, the best showing by a Notre Dame team in history.

Tefft and freshman Kristy Frilling earned All-America honors and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Individually, Frilling made an appearance in the second round of the NCAA Singles Championship, while Tefft competed in the national singles event for the second straight season.

The Irish made it consecutive trips to the NCAA semifinals in the 2009-10 season, finishing the year with a 26-4 mark and their third-straight BIG EAST title. Louderback earned his eighth conference Coach of the Year honor as a result of the performance.

Frilling and Kali Krisik dominated the doubles season, posting a 25-0 record during the dual season, earning a berth into the NCAA doubles tournament, reaching the Quarterfinals and climbing as high as the No. 2 duo in the nation. Frilling also earned a spot in the NCAA singles tournament and both girls were honored as ITA All-Americans for making the tournament.

A Family Tradition

Notre Dame women's tennis has long featured members of the same family on its teams. A total of seven sets of sisters have earned monograms in women's tennis, second most of any of the 13 Irish women's sports. In 2002-03, Liz Donohue and Lauren Connelly joined the Notre Dame squad as freshmen, combining with sisters Maggie Donohue and Sarah Jane Connelly to mark the first time in school history that a team (in any sport) featured two sets of sisters at the same time. Though Maggie Donohue graduated in '03, the Connelys were joined by twins Catrina and Christian Thompson to give Notre Dame women's tennis two sets of sisters again in both 2003-04 and '04-05. In all, 27 sets of sisters in eight different sports have earned monograms in the same sport at Notre Dame. See below the full list:

In addition to coaching his daughter, Bailey, Jay Louderback added another family connection in 2006, when Kali Krisik, his niece, joined the Fighting Irish.

Louderback became the 11th Notre Dame head coach – just the second in a women's sport – to have coached his son or daughter with the Irish, joining softball's Brian Boulac; football's Ara Parseghian and Lou Holtz; men's basketball's John MacLeod; baseball's Paul Mainieri; hockey's Lefty Smith; fencing's Pedro De Landero, Mike DeCicco and Yves Auriol; and men's soccer's Mike Berticelli.



Michell Dasso ('01) still holds the school record for most singles wins (140) and wins at No. 1 singles (67) over a career in Irish program history, and her second-place national ranking during her senior year remains the benchmark for the Irish.

Notre Dame Women's Tennis All-Americans

In the 34 years of varsity competition, 14 Irish women's tennis players have been tabbed All-Americans. In 1982, Pam Fischette and Laura Lee became the program's first two All-Americans. To qualify for All-America honors in AIAW Division II (in which Notre Dame competed at the time), a player had to reach the title match at her position in the national championships.

Since becoming a Division I program in 1986, Notre Dame has had 12 players earn a total of 24 All-America honors. The All-America teams are selected by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) each year, with the governing body of collegiate tennis naming all players who meet at least one of three criteria in singles or doubles. In singles, an individual must 1) finish in the top 20 of the final ITA national singles rankings; 2) earn one of the 16 seeds in the NCAA Singles Championship; or 3) advance to the round of 16 in the NCAA Singles Championship. To earn All-America mention in doubles, a player must 1) finish in the top 10 of the final ITA national doubles rankings; 2) earn one of the eight seeds in the NCAA Doubles Championship; or 3) advance to the quarterfinals in the NCAA Doubles Championship.

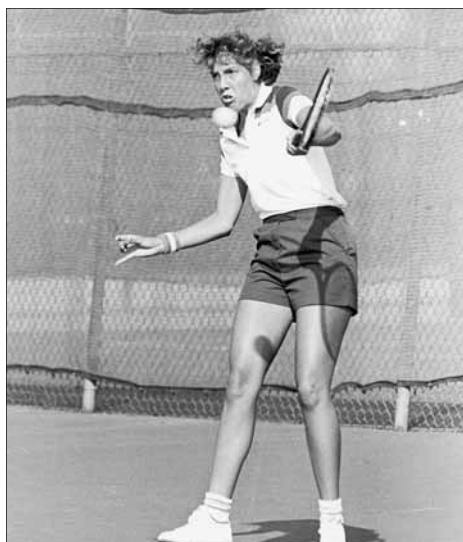

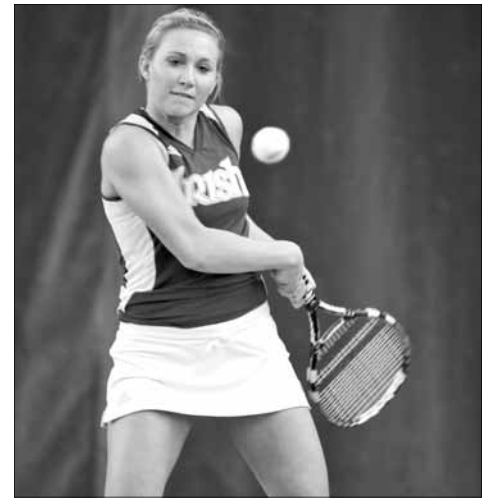

Byron V. Kanaley Award

The most prestigious honor awarded to a Notre Dame student-athlete, the Byron V. Kanaley Award has been presented each year since 1927 to senior monogram athletes who have been exemplary as students and leaders.

The awards, presented by the Faculty Board on Athletics, are named in honor of a 1904 Notre Dame graduate who was a member of the Irish baseball team as an undergraduate. Kanaley went on to a successful banking career in Chicago and served the University as a lay trustee from 1915 until his death in 1960. Ten members of the Notre Dame women's tennis team have received the award since 1990, the most of any sport during that span.

Francis Patrick O'Connor Award

Notre Dame in the NCAA Tournament

The Notre Dame women's tennis team has a long tradition of postseason play, especially since the move to NCAA Division I in 1985-86. The Irish have advanced to the team portion of the NCAA Championships in 17 of the past 18 seasons, including the last 15 in a row. Notre Dame has advanced to the round of 16 on nine occasions, including three appearances in the national quarterfinals in 1996, 2006 and 2007 and back-to-back semifinal appearances in 2009 and 2010. Only once have the Irish failed to win a match in the NCAA tournament.

In its four seasons on the Division II level (1981-82 to 1984-85), Notre Dame was a national power, finishing among the top six in the nation in each campaign. In the final year of AIAW play, the Irish tied for sixth in the national championship in 1982. The following season saw Notre Dame lose to UC Davis in the national semifinals, but rebound to beat Northern Colorado for third place. In 1984, the Irish fell to Tennessee-Chattanooga in the semis, but gained revenge on UC Davis to again claim third place. Notre Dame's final season in Division II saw it reach the title match before losing to Tennessee-Chattanooga.

In their first national tournament experience, the Irish were 22nd in the 1979 AIAW Division III National Championship (played in the fall) before taking 20th in the following season.

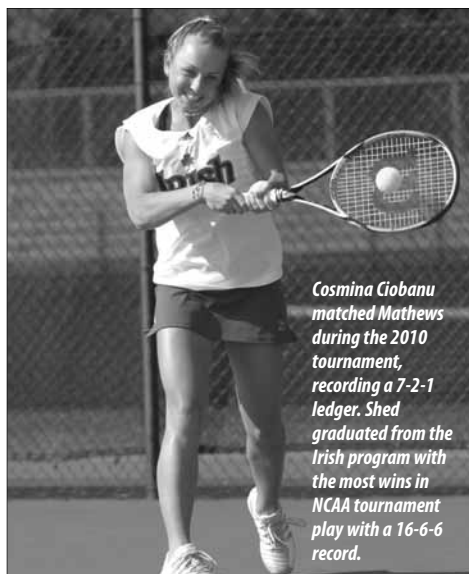

Irish in NCAA Singles and Doubles Tournaments

Notre Dame players have been regular participants in the NCAA Singles and Doubles Championships since moving to the Division I level. The Irish have had at least one player earn a berth in the NCAA singles tournament in 21 of the last 23 seasons. On seven occasions, a pair of Irish competitors earned invitations to the event. In 1992, Melissa Harris became the first Notre Dame player to win a match in the NCAAAs. In her fourth consecutive singles appearance in 2001, former Notre Dame assistant coach Michelle Dasso reached the semifinals, marking the best finish ever for an Irish player.

In doubles play, Wendy Crabtree and Lisa Tholen made history when they became the first Irish duo to play in the NCAAAs, in 1993. In '94, they advanced to the final eight to earn All-America honors. Jennifer Hall and Tiffany Gates matched Crabtree and Tholen with their '98 quarterfinal appearance, with Hall and Dasso also reaching the quarters in '99. Dasso made return trips to the tournament in 2000 and '01 with Becky Varnum. The Irish have had at least one entrant in each of the NCAA Doubles Championship in 17 of the last 18 years.

The Thompson twins, Christian and Katrina, became the first Irish duo to reach the tournament three times (eventually participated all four years).

In the early days of the program, the Irish excelled in the AIAW national championships. Laura Lee, just a freshman at the time, won the national title at No. 5 singles in 1982, while Pam Fischette was the runner-up at No. 3 singles the same year.

Irish Players in the Collegiate Grand Slam Events

The collegiate grand slam consists of the three most prestigious individual national tournaments in college tennis: the ITA All-American Championships (played in October), the ITA National Intercollegiate Indoor Championships (played in November now after being a February event until 2001-02), and the year-end NCAA Championships. From 1986 until 2000-01, the September National Clay Court Championships made up the fourth leg of the collegiate grand slam, but the event is no longer played.

Irish players have had considerable success in the collegiate grand slam events. Michelle Dasso reached at least the quarterfinals in each of the four events in 2000-01, highlighted by a runner-up finish in the Clay Court Championships. Jennifer Hall is the only other player to reach the singles semifinals in a collegiate grand-slam event, with her finish in the 1996 National Indoors. In 2005-06, Catrina Thompson and Christian Thompson became the first Irish doubles team to capture an Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) national championship.

Conference Dominance

Following seven years competing as an independent, the University of Notre Dame women's tennis team has had incredible success in conference action over the past 26 years. The Irish have been league champions 22 times, including a streak of 14 consecutive conference titles from 1983-84 to 1996-97 and a 27-match conference winning streak from 1983-98. Notre Dame has a 75-6 (.926) all-time record against conference foes, including 43-1 (.977) in the regular season. The Irish won North Star Conference championships in each of its five years of membership (1983-84 to 1987-88), then captured seven Midwestern Collegiate Conference titles from 1988-89 to 1994-95. Since joining the BIG EAST Conference in 1995-96, Notre Dame has won 10 championships and finished as the league's runner-up on four occasions.

All 16 members of the BIG EAST Conference field teams in women's tennis, but the league does not require round-robin competition during the season. The top 12 teams, as selected by the conference based on national ranking and head-to-head results, earn invitations to the year-end BIG EAST Championship, a single-elimination team tournament with the winner gaining the league's automatic berth in the NCAA Championship. Prior to 2001, all 14 teams qualified for the conference tournament, with the top two seeds gaining byes into the quarterfinals. For more information on the BIG EAST Conference, see page 91.

Notre Dame defeated Syracuse in the 2005 final and South Florida in the 2006 final, but lost to the Bulls in the 2007 championship. Notre Dame topped South Florida for the '08 title, edged DePaul in 2009, and defeated DePaul again in 2010. The Irish faced now-departed Miami in the title match of the BIG EAST Championship over nine straight seasons, winning in 1996, '97, '99, 2001, and '03. In 23 early-round matches (first round through semifinals), Notre Dame is undefeated, having registered 22 shutouts. Overall, Notre Dame is 32-5 in the event. The Irish have been the top seed heading into the tournament in every year but 2003, when they were the No. 2 seed. Notre Dame mentor Jay Louderback has been named the BIG EAST's Coach of the Year seven times, while Irish student-athletes have been tabbed the league championship's Most Outstanding Player on seven occasions.

Courtney Tennis Center

Notre Dame's Courtney Tennis Center, the home of Irish women's tennis since the establishment of the varsity program in 1980, has played host to the nation's top players on a number of occasions, while becoming an extremely difficult place for opposing teams to win.

Playing at both the Courtney Tennis Center and in the Eck Tennis Pavilion, the Irish have compiled an all-time home record of 296-63 for an impressive .825 winning percentage. Only once has Notre Dame had a losing home record, when it won just one of four matches at the Courtney Tennis Center in 1977, its second varsity season. The Irish have posted undefeated marks at home on eight occasions: 12-0 in '81; 6-0 in '82; 14-0 in '86; 8-0 in '89; 8-0 in '90; 12-0 in 2000, 16-0 in '06; 11-0 in '07. Notre Dame has posted one-loss seasons at home in nine other campaigns.

Due to its exceptional facilities, Notre Dame has played host to a number of prestigious events, including serving as the national site of

the NCAA Championships four times. Just four years after it was built, the Courtney Tennis Center played host to the 1971 NCAA Division I Men's Tennis Championships, which featured what is still considered by coaches to be the finest collection of collegiate tennis talent ever assembled. In that spring classic, freshman Jimmy Connors of UCLA defeated Stanford's Roscoe Tanner in five sets to capture the singles title. That pair would go on to reach a combined 17 grand-slam singles finals on the pro tour, including eight victories.

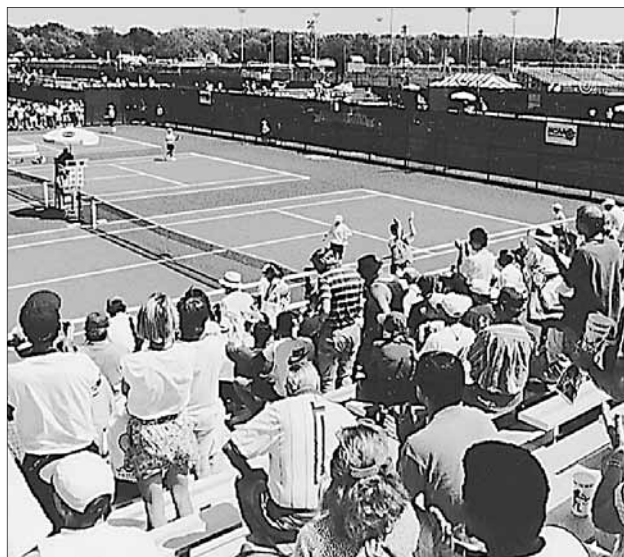
The NCAA men's tournament came to Notre Dame again in 1994, while the NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships were played at the Courtney Tennis Center in 1998. It still stands as the northern-most facility ever to play host to the NCAA women's tennis championships. Florida defeated Duke in the title match, while Blue Devil Vanessa Webb claimed the singles crown. In doubles, the California pair of Amanda Augustus and Amy Jensen won the first of their back-to-back NCAA doubles titles.

In all, the Courtney Tennis Center has been the site of NCAA action on 15 occasions, including every year from 1994-2002 for either women's or men's play. In addition, it has played host to conference championships on 10 occasions (three North Star, six Midwestern Collegiate, one BIG EAST), as well as an Intercollegiate Tennis Association Summer Circuit event for 10 straight years (1994-2003). During the early days of the program, Notre Dame played host to the Irish Invitational, a fall event, for 11 consecutive years from 1977-87.

The Irish played exclusively at the Courtney Tennis Center during their first 11 varsity seasons, compiling a 79-22 (.782) record. Since the Eck Tennis Pavilion was completed in 1987, it has become the predominant location of Notre Dame's home matches, while the Courtney Tennis Center has become a regular site for late-season matches and NCAA competition, as well as continuing to be an integral practice facility during both the fall and spring. The Irish have been particularly effective at the Courtney Tennis Center since '88, posting a 34-6 (.850) mark.

Notre Dame has put together a number of long winning streaks at home, highlighted by a 31-match win streak from Feb. 27, 2005 to April 6, 2008. The Irish won 25 in a row at the Courtney Tennis Center over a span of more than four years from 1979-83. Notre Dame won 23 straight from 1988-91, and, more recently, put together a 21-match regular-season home winning streak from 1999-2000.

On 38 occasions (in 66 matches), top-25 opponents have come to Notre Dame and left with a defeat. Among the biggest home wins have been seven victories against top-10 foes,

including a pair of victories over BYU and DePaul (both ranked No. 9 at the time of the match) in 2006 and a win over No. 7 North Carolina in 2007. In all, the Courtney Tennis Center and Eck Tennis Pavilion have combined to play host to a showdown of top-25 teams 64 times, with Notre Dame prevailing on 35 occasions.

The Irish have been particularly dominant at home against teams not ranked in the national top 25, as Notre Dame holds a remarkable 153-7 (.956) record since the 1988-89 season. That includes a current streak of 50 consecutive wins against non-top-25 foes at home, dating back to 2002.

Since opening in 1967, the Courtney Tennis Center has undergone a variety of improvements. Most recently, 14 of the courts were newly resurfaced during the summer of 2003 and the facility was reoriented in the winter of 2004 as construction began on the neighboring Guglielmino Family Athletics Center. That undertaking saw the construction of a new tournament center tower, while the seating was moved from the west to the east end, which now plays host to varsity matches, making it more convenient for the teams headquartered in the Eck Tennis Pavilion. The reoriented Courtney Tennis Center, which features 14 courts, saw its first varsity action on April 15, 2003, when the Irish nearly pulled off an upset of No.11 Northwestern before falling 4-3.

The home of Irish tennis for nearly 40 years, the construction of the Courtney Tennis Center was financed entirely by prominent Washington, D.C., attorney Jeremiah Courtney. The numerous courts and brand-new laykold surface make it a popular spot for students and faculty, as well as the varsity tennis teams. Courtney is a 1932 graduate of Columbia University, where he captained the tennis team. His two sons attended Notre Dame and played tennis under legendary coach Tom Fallon.

The first home of Irish tennis was the Notre Dame Fieldhouse, which played host to Irish home matches until the Courtney Tennis Center was built. The structure was razed in 1983. Indoor courts in Notre Dame's Joyce Center also were used sporadically before the Eck Tennis Pavilion's construction.

Since its completion in June of 1987, Notre Dame's Eck Tennis Pavilion has been an integral part of the success of Irish tennis, allowing the team to practice year-round, regardless of weather conditions, and providing an alternative surface to further develop the all-around skills of Notre Dame's players. Additionally, it has become an extremely difficult for opponents to be victorious and has attracted some of the top events in collegiate tennis.

Playing at both the Eck Tennis Pavilion and Courtney Tennis Center, the Irish have compiled an all-time home record of 296-63 for an impressive .825 winning percentage. Only once has Notre Dame had a losing home record, when it won just one of four matches at the Courtney Tennis Center in 1977, its second varsity season. The Irish have posted undefeated marks at home on eight occasions: 12-0 in 1981; 6-0 in '82; 14-0 in '86; 8-0 in '89; 8-0 in '90; 12-0 in 2000; 16-0 in '06; 11-0 in '07. Notre Dame has posted one-loss seasons at home in nine other campaigns. In 21 years of competition in the Eck Tennis Pavilion, Notre Dame has compiled a stellar 185-36 record, for a winning percentage of .837.

The combination of the Eck Tennis Pavilion and Courtney Tennis Center has allowed the University of Notre Dame to be the national site of the NCAA Championships. The NCAA men's tournament came to Notre Dame again

in 1994, while the NCAA Division I Women's Tennis Championships were played at the Courtney Tennis Center in 1998. It still stands as the northern-most facility ever to play host to the NCAA women's tennis championships. Florida defeated Duke in the title match, while Blue Devil Vanessa Webb claimed the singles crown. In doubles, the California pair of Amanda Augustus and Amy Jenson won the first of their back-to-back NCAA doubles titles.

In all, Notre Dame has been the site of NCAA action on 15 occasions, including every year from 1994-2002 for either women's or men's play. In addition, the Eck Tennis Pavilion has three times welcomed the Intercollegiate Tennis Association's Midwest Region Indoor Championships and six times helped play host to the Midwestern Collegiate Conference Championship and most recently the BIG EAST Championships in 2010. After its completion, the facility featured the Eck Classic for 16 consecutive years and also has provided additional courts for the men's Tom Fallon Invitational.

Notre Dame has put together a number of long winning streaks at home, highlighted by the 31-match win streak from Feb. 27, 2005 to April 6, 2008. The Irish won 25 in a row at the Courtney Tennis Center over a span of more than four years from 1979-83. Notre Dame won 23 straight from 1988-91, and, more recently, put together a 21-match regular-season home winning streak from 1999-2000.

On 38 occasions (in 66 matches), top-25 opponents have come to Notre Dame and left with a defeat. Among the biggest home wins have been seven victories against top-10 foes, including a pair of victories over BYU and DePaul (both ranked No. 9 at the time of the match) in 2006 and 2007's win over No. 7 North Carolina. In all, the Courtney Tennis Center and Eck Tennis Pavilion have combined to play host to a showdown of top-25 teams 64 times, with Notre Dame prevailing on 35 occasions.

The Irish have been particularly dominant at home against teams not ranked in the national top 25, as Notre Dame holds a remarkable 153-7 (.956) record since the 1988-89 season. That includes a current streak of 50 consecutive wins against non-top-25 foes at home, dating back to 2002.

The summer of 2003 saw the Eck Tennis Pavilion newly renovated, as all six courts were resurfaced (changing them from red to green) and the color scheme was changed to blue and gold throughout the building. Among

the other highlights were numerous pieces of new wood furniture, as well as additional trophy cases and other accessories. The facility features the offices for both the men's and women's tennis coaches, as well as locker rooms for both teams and a spacious spectator viewing area upstairs that is ideally suited for videotaping.

"It is truly one of the great collegiate indoor tennis facilities in the country," says Irish head coach Jay Louderback.

In Sept. 1988, the Eck Pavilion received the 1988 United States Tennis Association (USTA) Award for architectural design. As a result, the USTA presented the facility with a handsome wooden plaque, a large sign placed in front of the pavilion and a complimentary one-year membership in the USTA. In addition, the facility and its award are recognized in an inscription on a large mahogany board displayed in the lobby of the USTA National Tennis Center in Flushing Meadow, N.Y.

The facility was underwritten by Franklin E. Eck. He is chairman and chief executive officer of Advanced Drainage Systems, Inc., which produces corrugated plastic drainage pipe for agricultural and commercial purposes. A 1944 chemical engineering graduate at Notre Dame, Eck earned an M.B.A. from Harvard University in 1949. In 1984, he endowed a collection in Notre Dame's Hesburgh Library. The generosity of Eck also made Notre Dame's baseball facility, Frank Eck Stadium, and the Eck Visitor's Center possible.

The Eck Tennis Pavilion is the third facility to play host to indoor Irish tennis action. The Notre Dame Fieldhouse, which was razed in 1983, was the first home of Notre Dame's varsity team, and the Irish also sporadically used courts in the Joyce Center.

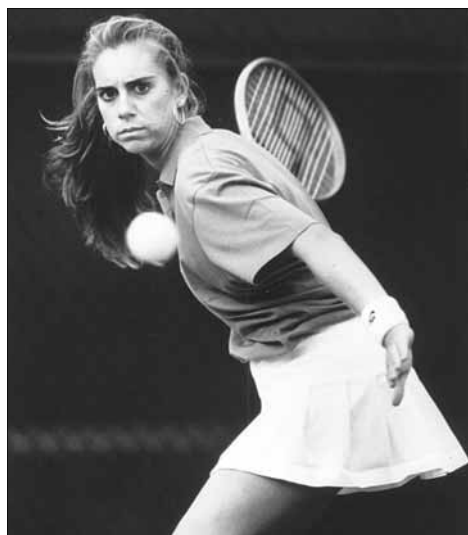

The 2010-11 academic year will be the 32nd in the history of The BIG EAST Conference as the unique consortium marches on competing at the highest level with integrity and sportsmanship.

The BIG EAST has gone through membership changes since its birth, but the 2010-11 year will mark the conference's sixth straight with the same 16-member group, the nation's largest Division I-A conference.

The BIG EAST Conference's goals have always been the same. The outstanding performances of the student-athletes at BIG EAST schools are evidence of the league's proud tradition of success. The league has always been able to boast that many of its best students are also its best athletes. The 2009-10 year was no different.

Seven BIG EAST student-athletes were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship winners. Maya Moore, Connecticut's women's basketball standout, won the NCAA Honda-Broderick Award as the nation's top female student-athlete. She also was named the ESPN The Magazine Academic All-American of the Year for women's basketball. Moore was the fifth BIG EAST women's student-athlete to win the Honda-Broderick Award.

In the athletic arena, BIG EAST student-athletes again enjoyed success on the national stage. The Connecticut women's basketball team won its second straight national championship and its seventh overall crown. The Villanova women's cross country team also won the NCAA title. The Notre Dame women's soccer team reached the NCAA College Cup for the second straight year. The Syracuse women's lacrosse squad reached the Final Four.

On the men's side, West Virginia's basketball team became the BIG EAST's 16th team to reach the NCAA Final Four and won the conference's academic achievement award. The Notre Dame men's lacrosse team advanced to the NCAA championship game.

Individually, three BIG EAST student-athletes won NCAA titles. Cincinnati's Josh Schneider won the 50 freestyle in men's swimming. In track, Louisville's D'Ana McCarty repeated as the NCAA indoor winner in the weight throw. Louisville's Matt Hughes won the 3,000 steeplechase. Another Cardinal, Austen Childs, was the national runner-up in men's tennis singles.

BIG EAST football maintained its national profile as a competitively balanced group. Cincinnati won its second straight league championship in 2009 and compiled an undefeated regular season. The Bearcats finished third in the final Bowl Championship Series standings. Six of the league's eight squads went to bowl games and helped the BIG EAST post a 4-2 bowl record. Rutgers, one of the bowl winners, also was recognized for having the nation's highest NCAA APR rating, which measures academic success.

The BIG EAST has continued to produce student-athletes who are at the forefront of athletic and academic achievement. In 2009-10, 22 BIG EAST players from 10 schools were chosen to their respective ESPN The Magazine Academic All-America Teams. Over 400 student-athletes have earned academic all-America honors.

The BIG EAST became the nation's largest Division I-A conference in 2005-06 when five new members began competing. The new schools were: University of Cincinnati, DePaul University, University of Louisville, Marquette University and the University of South Florida.

BIG EAST institutions reside in nine of the nation's top 35 largest media markets, including New York, Chicago, Philadelphia, Washington, D.C., Tampa, Pittsburgh, Hartford, Cincinnati and Milwaukee. With its newest members, BIG EAST

markets contain almost one-fourth of all television households in the U.S.

Since opening its doors in 1979, the league has won 28 national championships in six different sports and 128 student-athletes have won individual national titles.

In 2003-04, Connecticut became the first school in NCAA history to win the men's and women's NCAA basketball titles in the same season. In '02-03, the BIG EAST became the first conference in NCAA history to win the men's and women's titles in the same year when the Syracuse men and the Connecticut women captured their respective national championships. In men's basketball, BIG EAST squads have won three of the last 12 NCAA championships. BIG EAST women's teams have taken seven of the last 11 NCAA titles.

Proactive movement has been a signature strategy for the conference that was born in 1979. The BIG EAST continually turns challenges into opportunities to become stronger.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST added men's lacrosse to its growing list of sports, which increased its total to 24 sport championships.

The BIG EAST became a reality on May 31, 1979, following a meeting of athletic directors from Providence College, St. John's, Georgetown and Syracuse universities. Seton Hall, Connecticut and Boston College completed the original seven-school alliance.

While the membership has both increased and changed, the focus of the BIG EAST has not wavered. The conference reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity. Its student-athletes own significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably show a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Any successful organization has had the good fortune to have outstanding leadership. The BIG EAST primarily was the brainchild of Dave Gavitt, who was the conference's first Commissioner. Michael Tranchese, the league's first full-time employee, and for 11 years the associate to Gavitt, became Commissioner in 1990. In his first year, he administered the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference.

In 2009-10, the BIG EAST had one significant change. Tranchese stepped down from his position on June 30, 2009. John Marinatto, who had served as senior associate commissioner, moved into the Commissioner's chair and continued to steer the conference on its path of success.

The league has long been considered a leader in innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television. Those efforts have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. The conference has enjoyed long-standing relationships with CBS, ESPN, Inc. and ABC.

BIG EAST men's basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public arenas, including the annual men's BIG EAST Championship in Madison Square Garden. The women's basketball championship has led all conferences in attendance for the past seven years. Attendance figures also are significant in soccer and baseball.

More than 575 BIG EAST student-athletes have earned all-America recognition and dozens have won individual NCAA national championships. The BIG EAST has been well-represented in U.S. or foreign national and Olympic teams. Several athletes earned gold medals.

The BIG EAST has its headquarters in Providence where the conference administers to more than 5,500 student-athletes.

UNIVERSITY OF NOTRE DAME



History

- The University of Notre Dame du Lac was founded in 1842 by Father Edward Sorin. Adjacent to South Bend, Ind., and nestled next to St. Mary's and Saint Joseph's Lakes, the University was started with \$310 in cash and three log buildings in disrepair.
- Notre Dame would establish many firsts for Catholic institutions of higher learning, including the first Catholic law school, the first Catholic engineering school and the first student residence with private rooms, Sorin Hall.

Academics

- The University is organized into four colleges — Arts and Letters, Science, Engineering and the Mendoza College of Business — the School of Architecture, the Law School, the Graduate School, six major research institutes, more than 40 centers and special programs and the University library system.
- Notre Dame is rated among the nation's top-25 institutions of higher learning in surveys conducted by *U.S. News and World Report*, *Princeton Review*, *Time*, *Kiplinger's* and *Kaplan/Newsweek*.
- The Mendoza College of Business is ranked #1 among the nation's top undergraduate business schools by *Bloomberg BusinessWeek*.
- Notre Dame is among a select group of schools that ranks in the top 30 on the *U.S. News & World Report* survey of the nation's top colleges and in the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors' Cup for overall success in athletics.

Students

- Graduate and undergraduate students at the University come from all 50 states 100 countries worldwide.
- Notre Dame's graduation rate of 95 percent is exceeded by only Harvard and Princeton.
- Notre Dame's 98 percent retention rate between the freshman and sophomore years is among the highest in the country, thanks in large part to the University's unique First Year of Studies Program.
- Notre Dame has one of the highest undergraduate residential concentrations of any national university, with 80 percent of its students living in 29 residence halls.



- The medical school acceptance rate of the University's preprofessional studies graduates is 80 percent, almost twice the national average.
- Notre Dame ranks first among Catholic universities in the number of doctorates earned by its undergraduate alumni — a record compiled over some 85 years.

Service

- Community service is a hallmark of Notre Dame. About 80 percent of Notre Dame students engage in some form of voluntary community service during their years at the University, and at least 10 percent devote a year or more after graduation to service in the United States and around the world.
- The University's Alliance for Catholic Education (ACE) annually sends 180 recent graduates to teach in some 100 understaffed Catholic schools in the southern, southeastern and southwestern United States and in South Bend. A national model, ACE has received the Higher Education Award from the Corporation for National Service for leadership in using national service resources through AmeriCorps.

Alumni

- The University's network of nearly 270 alumni clubs — including 60 international clubs — is the most extensive in higher education.
- With graduates renowned for their loyalty and generosity, Notre Dame annually ranks among the top-five in percentage of alumni who contribute to the University.
- In recent years, Notre Dame alumni have won a Nobel Prize in medicine, a Pulitzer Prize in journalism and an Emmy Award for contributions to television technology.
