### CLEMSON, NOTRE DAME SQUARE OFF AGAIN ON SATURDAY

After meeting only twice in Clemson's first 119 seasons of play, Clemson and Notre Dame will meet for the fifth time in eight seasons when the Tigers and Fighting Irish renew acquaintances on Saturday, Nov. 5. Kickoff at Notre Dame Stadium is set for 7:30 p.m. ET.

In its most recent contest, Clemson recorded its 38th consecutive home victory, setting the ACC record and tying the 1919-27 Fighting Irish for the 10th-longest home winning streak in FBS history. Those Irish teams under the guidance of College Football Hall of Famer Knute Rockne were a combined 78-7-3 at all venues in the seasons comprising that streak.

But Clemson has supplemented its historic home streak with the nation's best road record since 2015. Clemson's 34-4 road record in that span gives the Tigers a national-best .895 road winning percentage, and Clemson's 34 road wins since 2015 are three more than any other FBS program and five more than any other Power Five program.

1995, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019 seasons.

At Notre Dame in 2020, the Irish ended Clemson's 36-game regular season winning streak, tied for the fourth-longest FBS regular season winning streak since 1936. The game came during Notre Dame's lone season of ACC membership to also end Clemson's 28-game conference winning streak. On Saturday, the Tigers can end Notre Dame's 26-game regular season winning streak against ACC opponents since 2018. Clemson, though, is 2-0 against Notre Dame in postseason play in that span, including victories in the College Football Playoff Semifinal at the 2018 Cotton Bowl Classic and in the 2020 ACC Championship Game.

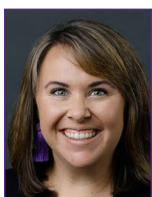

- Clemson attempting to open a season 9-0 for the seventh time in program history (1948, 1981, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019). Each of the previous six teams won a conference title, and five of the six played for the national championship (1981, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019).

- Clemson attempting to improve to 5-2 all-time against Notre Dame.

- Clemson attempting to move to 2-1 in road games at Notre Dame. Clemson won its first trip to Notre Dame Stadium to date in 1979 and dropped a double-overtime game in 2020.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to improve to 4-1 all-time against Notre Dame.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 31-6-2 against FBS independents since the NCAA split Division I into the divisions now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision and Football Championship Subdivision in 1978.

- Clemson attempting to win a 14th straight game against FBS independents dating to 1988. (Note: Clemson's loss to Notre Dame in 2020 came during Notre Dame's lone year of ACC membership.)

- Clemson (34) attempting to add to the most road wins by any program in the nation since 2015.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 35-4 in true road games since 2015.

- Clemson seeking a seventh consecutive road win. Clemson's six-game road winning streak is the second-longest active streak in the country.

- Clemson attempting to tie seven-game road winning streaks from 1939-40 and 2012-13 for the fifth-longest road winning streak in program history.

- Clemson attempting to record a perfect record in true road games in a season for the 10th time in school history, joining the 1900, 1917, 1948, 1981, 1995, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019 seasons.

- Clemson attempting to win a 39th consecutive game against unranked opponents when ranked in the AP Top 5, the longest active streak in college football according to ESPN Stats & Info.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 123-13 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney. The win would be Clemson's 100th against unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season (currently 99-3).

- Clemson playing a sixth night game in the first nine games of a season for the first time since 1949. Clemson's six night games this season (including Saturday) are already tied for fourth-most in a full season in Clemson history.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 27-4 in night games since the start of the 2018 season. A win would move Clemson to 46-7 at night since 2015.

- Clemson facing Notre Dame Head Coach Marcus

Freeman for the first time. A win would improve Clemson to 42-4 since 2011 (and 2-0 this season) when facing an opposing head coach for the first time.

- Clemson attempting to improve to 44-19 in games following regular season open weeks since 1953. Clemson would improve to 17-2 in such games under Dabo Swinney.

- Clemson attempting to earn its 100th victory against Power Five opponents since 2013. Clemson's 99 victories in that span against Power Five teams are the most in the country.

- Clemson attempting to even its all-time record on NBC at 4-4.

- Head Coach Dabo Swinney attempting to improve to 27-12 against the only 17 programs in college football history to win 765 or more games all-time, including Ohio State (3-1), Alabama (2-2), Notre Dame (3-1), Oklahoma (2-0), Nebraska (0-1), Georgia (1-2), LSU (1-1), Auburn (4-1), West Virginia (0-1), Texas A&M (2-0), Virginia Tech (6-0) and Pitt (2-2).

- Clemson entering the game having scored at least one rushing touchdown in 62 of its 63 games since the start of the 2018 season.

- Clemson (four) entering the game tied for fourth nationally in blocked kicks (both kicks and punts).

- Clemson (four) entering the game with its most blocked kicks (including punts) in a season since 2016 (five).

- Clemson attempting to post multiple sacks in six straight games for the first time since a nine-game streak last season.

- Clemson attempting to record five or more sacks in back-to-back games for the first time since games against UConn and Wake Forest in November 2021.

- Clemson attempting to have one player record at least 2.0 sacks in four consecutive games for the first time under Head Coach Dabo Swinney. Xavier Thomas, Myles Murphy and Tyler Davis have each recorded a two-sack day across Clemson's last three games, Clemson's first time having three different players reach 2.0 sacks in three straight games since 2016, when Ben Boulware (vs. South Carolina), Dexter Lawrence (vs. Virginia Tech) and Carlos Watkins (vs. Ohio State) accomplished the feat.

- Clemson attempting to hold consecutive opponents below 200 passing yards for the first time this season.

- Tight end Davis Allen (10) needing one touchdown reception to pass Bennie Cunningham (10 from 1972-75) for sole possession of the fifth-most touchdown catches by a tight end in Clemson history. He is two touchdowns shy of a four-way tie with John McMakin (12 from 1969-71), Dwayne Allen (12 from 2009-11) and Brandon Ford (12 from 2009-12) for second.

- Allen (three) needing one more touchdown catch to tie his single-season career high in touchdown receptions (four in 2020).

- Allen (three) needing a touchdown reception to make Allen and Jake Briningstool the first tight end duo in Clemson history to each record four touchdown catches in a single season.

- Tight end Jake Briningstool (four) attempting to add to his single-season career high in touchdown receptions.

- Wide receiver Beaux Collins (five) attempting to add to his single-season career high in receiving touchdowns this year.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis attempting to become the first Clemson player to post at least 2.0 sacks in back-to-back games since Clelin Ferrell in 2018 against Texas A&M and Georgia Southern.

- Davis (7.0 tackles for loss, 4.0 sacks) entering the game within striking distance of his single-season career

highs in tackles for loss (9.0 in 2019) and sacks (5.5 in 2019).

- Safety R.J. Mickens attempting to become the first Clemson player to record an interception in consecutive games since Andrew Booth Jr. against Wake Forest and South Carolina last season. He would be the first Clemson safety to do it since Nolan Turner in 2020.

- Defensive end Myles Murphy (six) needing one forced fumble to tie Levon Kirkland, Keith Adams and Vic Beasley (seven each) for seventh-most forced fumbles in a career in Clemson history.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter (68) needing four field goals to tie Nelson Welch (72 from 1991-94) for the Clemson record for career field goals.

- Potter (216) needing two PATs to break Greg Huegel's Clemson and ACC record for career extra points made (217 from 2015-18).

- Potter (420 career points) needing five points to become the sixth player (and fifth kicker) in ACC history to reach 425 career points. Note: Syracuse's Andre Szmyt

has 421 career points and can also reach the milestone earlier in the day on Saturday.

- Potter entering the game having scored in 48 consecutive contests. Potter has scored in every game since earning the starting placekicking job prior to the 2019 season. He served as the team's kickoff specialist in 2018.

- Potter attempting to add to his Clemson records for career field goals of 40 yards or more (32) and 50 yards or more (eight).

- Running back Will Shipley attempting to post three consecutive 100-yard rushing games for the first time in his career. He would be the first Clemson player to do so since Travis Etienne's school-record six-game streak in 2019.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson player to rush for 150 or more yards in consecutive games since Travis Etienne in 2018 (vs. South Carolina and Pitt).

- Shipley attempting to rush for multiple touchdowns in consecutive games for the first time since a three-game streak to open the season.

- Shipley (10) needing two rushing touchdowns to set a new single-season career high by surpassing his 11 from his freshman campaign in 2021. Shipley (739) already has a single-season career high in rushing yards by one yard (738 in 2021).

- Shipley (21) sitting six touchdowns shy of entering the Top 10 in school history in career rushing touchdowns. Cliff Austin and Woodrow Dantzler are currently tied for 10th with 27 each.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson player with 200 or more all-purpose yards in three consecutive games since C.J. Spiller in 2009.

- Shipley attempting to become the first Clemson player to record 200 all-purpose yards in three games in a single season since Sammy Watkins in 2011 (three).

- Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei attempting to improve to 20-4 as a starter. He would become the 10th Clemson quarterback since World War II to record at least 20 wins as a starter.

- Uiagalelei returning to the stadium in which he passed for 439 yards against Notre Dame in 2020, the most by any opponent in Irish history.

- Uiagalelei (4,974) needing 26 passing yards to become the eighth player in Clemson history to throw for 5,000 career passing yards.

- Uiagalelei (31) needing two touchdown passes to pass Kyle Parker (32 from 2009-10) for eighth-most career touchdown passes in Clemson history. He is four shy of tying Nealon Greene (35 from 1994-97) for seventh.

- Uiagalelei (12) needing one rushing touchdown to pass Rodney Williams (12 from 1985-88) for sole possession of the seventh-most rushing touchdowns by a Clemson quarterback since 1953.

- Uiagalelei (four) needing one rushing touchdown to set a new single-season career high. He has rushed for four touchdowns in each of the 2020, 2021 and 2022 seasons.

- Uiagalelei (436) needing 14 completions to become the eighth player in Clemson history to record 450 career pass completions.

- Cornerback Nate Wiggins (eight) sitting five pass breakups shy of the Clemson sophomore record for pass breakups in a single season (13), shared by James Lott (1987) and Justin Miller (2003).

## -- ON THE OPPONENT --

### SERIES HISTORY AGAINST NOTRE DAME

Saturday's game will be the seventh meeting all-time between Clemson and Notre Dame, and only the third meeting at Notre Dame all-time. All four on-

campus regular season meetings have been decided by one possession, while Clemson convincingly won both postseason matchups, a 30-3 win in the 2018 Cotton Bowl in Arlington, Texas and a 34-10 win in the 2020 ACC Championship Game in Charlotte, N.C.

Only five current FBS schools have played Notre Dame at least five times and have a winning record against the Irish. At 4-2 against Notre Dame all-time, Clemson stands with Florida State (6-5), Michigan (25-17-1), Nebraska (8-7-1) and Ohio State (5-2) in that category.

Clemson has ranked in the top 15 in the nation heading into the Notre Dame game in every meeting, including a No. 2 vs. No. 3 matchup in the 2018 Cotton Bowl that was the first meeting of undefeated teams in College Football Playoff history and a No. 1 vs. No. 4 matchup in 2020 that was the highest-ranked matchup of ACC teams in conference history.

After two neutral site games and two games at Notre Dame from 2018-22, Notre Dame will return to Clemson in 2023 for the teams' first meeting in Death Valley since a memorable rain-soaked classic in 2015.

### PREVIOUS GAMES VS. NOTRE DAME

#### Notre Dame 21, Clemson 17

#### Nov. 12, 1977 at Memorial Stadium

Clemson held a 10-7 lead at intermission and the lead could have been larger. The Tigers held a 213-101 advantage in total offense and Steve Fuller was on fire in the first 30 minutes, hitting 9-of-12 passes for 124 yards. Joe Montana was held to 3-of-9 passing for 53 yards by the Clemson defense by intermission.

Clemson controlled much of the third quarter. On the Tigers' first possession, Fuller hit Warren Ratchford for a 35-yard completion. Four plays later, Lester Brown scored around left end from two yards out, a play that drew the ire of Notre Dame coach Dan Devine because an official had gotten in the way of Notre Dame defensive back Ted Burgmeier as he was trying to make the tackle.

It was still 17-7 Clemson entering the fourth period when Montana led Notre Dame on one of his famous comebacks. On the last drive of the third period, which continued into the fourth, Montana led the Irish on a drive that officially gained 119 yards in total offense.

Devine picked up an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty when he went on the field and picked up a flag that negated a 30-yard-run by Vagas Ferguson. It set up a second-and-31, but Montana overcame his coach's tirade, hitting Ken MacAfee for 27 yards then 16 yards on fourth-and-two. Montana finished off the drive with a one-yard run to make it 17-14.

After a Clemson turnover, Notre Dame got the ball back at midfield. Montana had been saving a screen pass for a special occasion and he connected with Ferguson for 36 yards, bringing the ball to the Clemson 14. Montana scored later in the possession to make the count 21-17 in favor of the Irish.

Clemson, which was going for its 100th all-time win in Memorial Stadium, had two more possessions but could not get a first down and the Irish escaped Death Valley with the four-point win, keeping Notre Dame's hopes for a National Championship alive.

### Clemson 16, Notre Dame 10

#### Nov. 17, 1979 at Notre Dame Stadium

Notre Dame had a 10-0 lead at halftime and appeared to briefly hold a 16-0 lead for a few seconds. The Irish were up 10-0 in the second period when quarterback Rusty Lisch scored on a 10-yard run to make it 16-0, but a holding call nullified the play. The Irish could not get the first down, and when Chuck Male missed a 32-yard field goal, and the score remained 10-0.

Danny Ford said many times that the first five minutes of the second half are the most important in a football game, a maxim that was true in South Bend. Clemson had to punt on its first possession of the second half. Notre Dame return man Ty Dickerson fumbled David Sims' punt at the Notre Dame 21 and Chuck Rose recovered for Clemson. It was the last time Dickerson would touch the

ball in a Notre Dame game. Clemson drove to the Notre Dame four, but the drive stalled and Obed Ariri kicked the first of his three field goals on the day.

The momentum had changed, as Notre Dame failed to move the ball and Dick Boushka punted to Hollis Hall. The Clemson defensive back tried to return the favor and fumbled, but he recovered his own fumble at the Clemson 18. Clemson then drove for another field goal by Ariri.

On the next Notre Dame possession, Ferguson, who would break George Gipp's 59-year Notre Dame record for 100-yard rushing games in a season on this day, fumbled on the first play after being hit by Bubba Brown, and sophomore Jeff Davis recovered for the Tigers.

Four plays later Billy Lott, who had a team-best 73 yards rushing on the day, kept the ball around right end and raced 26 yards for a touchdown. It was Clemson's third score in its last three possessions and the Tigers had taken the lead, 13-10. The Tigers scored on a fourth straight possession after a 15-play drive that culminated with a 37-yard field goal by Ariri, giving Clemson a 16-10 lead.

There was still 8:30 left in the game, so Notre Dame had plenty of time, but just as turnovers had hurt Clemson in the game in Death Valley two years earlier, turnovers were the difference in this game.

The Irish drove to the Clemson 25 and had a third-and-nine, but Lisch's pass was deflected by Notre Dame receiver Tony Hunter and then intercepted by redshirt freshman safety Terry Kinard.

Clemson could not move the ball and Notre Dame got it back at its own 16 with 2:34 left. This time Devine called an end-around pass with Pete Holohan, who had been a high school quarterback. His long pass was intercepted by Kinard again and he returned it 40 yards to the Notre Dame 19.

On Clemson's second play, Lott fumbled the snap and freshman Mark Zavagnin recovered for the Irish with 2:02 left. It was Clemson's only turnover of the day. On Notre Dame's first play, Steve Durham sacked Lisch back at the Notre Dame two-yard-line. Three more passes were incomplete and Clemson ran out the clock for the 16-10 victory.

### Clemson 24, Notre Dame 22 Oct. 3, 2015 at Memorial Stadium

No. 12 Clemson battled sixth-ranked Notre Dame through torrential rains from Hurricane Joaquin under the lights, but the wet weather did not hold the Tigers back in a hard-fought 24-22 victory.

Deshawn Watson led the Tigers to an explosive start. First, he had a 38-yard run on the first offensive play of the game and culminated the possession with a touchdown pass to Jordan Leggett. Clemson took an early 14-0 lead with another Watson touchdown, this time a 13-yarder to Artavis Scott. Clemson held a 14-3 lead at intermission.

On the opening kickoff of the second half, Ammon Lakip, Clemson's kicker, jarred the ball loose from C.J. Sanders. The Tigers recovered and Watson led the Tigers on another touchdown drive. He completed the drive with a 21-yard touchdown run to give Clemson a commanding 21-3 lead.

DeShone Kizer led the Irish back and would throw for 321 yards for the game, 216 more than Watson for the night. He threw a 56-yard touchdown pass to C.J. Prosise on a wheel route, then scored another touchdown himself on a three-yard run.

The Fighting Irish pulled within two at 24-22 on a touchdown by Torii Hunter Jr., but Deshone Kizer's designed quarterback run was stuffed by Carlos Watkins and Kevin Dodd, and Clemson survived the furious rally.

Watson accounted for three scores, while rushing for

93 yards. Wayne Gallman recorded 23 carries for 111 yards.

Clemson held Prosise to 50 yards rushing in 15 attempts and his longest run all night was 10 yards. He came in averaging 150 yards a game on the ground. Will Fuller, who entered the game averaging 113 receiving yards and had scored six touchdowns, had just two receptions for 37 yards.

Following the contest, Dodd was named ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week and B.J. Goodson earned ACC Linebacker of the Week honors. Dodd posted 3.5 tackles for loss, with two sacks and a forced fumble. Goodson had two takeaways in the fourth quarter, the first Tiger to do so in a game won by seven points or less since Terry Kinard, who also did it against Notre Dame in 1979.

### Clemson 30, Notre Dame 3 Dec. 29, 2018 at AT&T Stadium (Arlington, Texas)

No. 2 Clemson advanced to its third College Football Playoff National Championship Game in four years by defeating No. 3 Notre Dame, 30-3, in the Cotton Bowl Classic at AT&T Stadium.

Quarterback Trevor Lawrence, the game's Most Outstanding Offensive Player, completed 27-of-39 pass attempts for 327 yards and three touchdowns, including 19-of-26 for 264 yards and three touchdowns in the first half alone. Travis Etienne ran for 109 yards on 14 carries, including a 62-yard touchdown run that pushed him past Wayne Gallman's 2015 school mark for the most rushing yards in a single season. Austin Bryant added two sacks and six total tackles en route to Most Outstanding Defensive Player honors.

Both defenses proved stout in the first quarter, as the teams traded field goals by Clemson's Greg Huegel and Notre Dame's Justin Yoon. Yoon's field goal proved to be the only scoring Clemson allowed all game.

The Tigers first found the end zone on a 52-yard scoring connection from Lawrence to Justyn Ross that gave Clemson a 9-3 advantage. Ross also hauled in a 42-yard pass from Lawrence for his second touchdown of the day 11 minutes later. Tee Higgins then sealed the second quarter with an acrobatic, juggling 19-yard touchdown reception that gave Clemson a 23-3 lead with two seconds remaining in the half.

The first score of the third quarter, which would ultimately be the final score of the game, came with two minutes remaining in the quarter, when Etienne broke away for the 62-yard touchdown rush that was set up by a Nolan Turner interception three plays earlier. A scoreless fourth quarter left the final score at 30-3. It was the fewest points scored by Notre Dame in a bowl game in its history.

### Notre Dame 47, Clemson 40 (2OT) Nov. 7, 2020 at Notre Dame Stadium

Top-ranked Clemson fell to No. 4 Notre Dame in double overtime by a score of 47-40 in the highest-ranked matchup of conference opponents in ACC history. The loss ended Clemson's ACC record 36-game regular season winning streak and its FBS-record 50-game winning streak on Saturdays.

After the two teams traded touchdowns in the first overtime period, Notre Dame punched in a three-yard touchdown run and the Tigers failed to respond with their possession, ultimately handing them their first loss of the season and dropping them to 7-1.

The loss came despite an incredible statistical performance by freshman quarterback DJ Uiagalelei, who threw for 439 yards and two touchdowns in place of Trevor Lawrence. His 439 yards were the most ever thrown by a quarterback against Notre Dame in Fighting Irish history.

### COLLEGE FOOTBALL PLAYOFF RANKINGS (NOV. 1)

Coming Tuesday

The Fighting Irish jumped out to an early 10-0 lead, highlighted by a 65-yard touchdown run on the first play from scrimmage following a Clemson penalty. The Tigers responded with a 53-yard touchdown bomb from Uiagalelei to Cornell Powell, at the time the longest of both their careers. Powell totaled a career-high 161 yards on six receptions to go along with his touchdown.

The second quarter saw the two teams exchange field goals before a fumbled pitch was recovered by Notre Dame and returned for a touchdown to give the Irish a 20-10 advantage.

Clemson turned the ball over on the following drive as well, but the Tiger defense held stout and the Irish were forced to settle for a field goal. The Tigers responded with a 45-yard B.T. Potter field goal that cut the halftime deficit to 23-13.

The Tigers came out of the break firing, scoring 10 consecutive points on another Potter field goal and a 10-yard touchdown reception by Davis Allen. The game-tying score capped a 13-play, 60-yard drive spanning 6:29 of game time.

The Irish looked to regain the lead on the following drive, but Jake Venables stripped Ian Book on a run that would have set Notre Dame up for first and goal at the Clemson five-yard line. The forced fumble was the first of Venables's career and kept the game in a 23-23 draw entering the final frame of regulation.

Another Notre Dame field goal gave the Irish a 26-23 lead, which was quickly erased by Potter's career-high fourth field goal of the game.

With 9:14 remaining and the score locked at 26-26, Uiagalelei led the Tigers on a 12-play, 74-yard touchdown drive lasting 5:41 capped by a Travis Etienne three-yard touchdown run that gave Clemson the lead.

In their last possession of regulation, Notre Dame cashed in on a 91-yard touchdown drive that sent the game into overtime. Both teams scored touchdowns in the first frame, but when Notre Dame opened the second overtime period with a score, the Tigers took two sacks and ultimately came up short.

## Clemson 34, Notre Dame 10

**Dec. 19, 2020 at Bank of America Stadium (Charlotte, N.C.)**

No. 4/3 Clemson avenged its November loss to Notre Dame with a 34-10 victory at Bank of America Stadium to win the Tigers' sixth straight ACC title. The victory was highlighted by stellar performances from standouts Trevor Lawrence and Travis Etienne.

Lawrence, who did not play against Notre Dame in November, was 25-of-36 passing for 322 yards and two touchdowns to go along with a 34-yard touchdown run. Etienne ran for 124 yards on 10 carries and a touchdown, marking the fourth ACC Championship Game in which he scored in his career. The offense combined for 541 total yards.

The Tigers' defense held the Fighting Irish to just 263 yards and sacked quarterback Ian Book six times. James Skalski, who became the first player to ever appear in five ACC Championship Games, recorded a sack and five total tackles.

Notre Dame opened the scoring with a 51-yard field goal on the first drive of the game but failed to cash in on a 24-yard attempt on its next possession. The Tigers quickly capitalized on the missed field goal with a 67-yard touchdown bomb from Lawrence to Amari Rodgers to take a 7-3 lead entering the second quarter.

After stopping the Irish on fourth down, Clemson went on a six-play, 72-yard scoring drive culminating in a 33-yard E.J. Williams touchdown reception. B.T. Potter's 27-yard field goal extended the Tigers' lead to 17-3.

On fourth down and one with 29 seconds remain-

ing in the half, Etienne took a handoff 44 yards to the end zone, capping off a run of 24 unanswered first-half Clemson points, sending the Tigers into halftime with a 24-3 advantage.

Lawrence opened the second half scoring with a 34-yard touchdown scamper that closed out an 83-yard scoring drive. Potter added another field goal and the Fighting Irish scored their first points of the second half on a 21-yard rushing touchdown to bring the score to 34-10 with 8:09 remaining in the contest.

On the ensuing drive, Lawrence and the rest of the Clemson offense exited the game to a standing ovation and the Tigers closed out the victory to clinch their sixth consecutive ACC Championship and conference-leading 20th ACC title.

## CLEMSON-NOTRE DAME CONNECTIONS

**Joe Montana and Dwight Clark:** Montana (Notre Dame, 1975-78) to Clark (Clemson, 1975-78) was one of the top passing combinations in the NFL from 1979-87. The duo combined on what is regarded as "The Catch" in the 1982 NFC Championship game between the 49ers and the Cowboys. Clark led the NFL in receiving in 1981 and 1982 and was the NFL MVP in 1982. They played on Super Bowl Championship teams at the end of the 1981 and 1984 seasons. The two were on opposite sides of the field when the two schools met at Clemson in 1977.

**Frank Shaughnessy:** Shaughnessy holds the Notre Dame record for the longest play of any kind in school history. In 1904, the field was 110 yards long, so Shaughnessy caught a mid-air Kansas fumble and raced 107 yards for a score. Just three years later he was the head football coach at Clemson. Shaughnessy's fascinating life included playing Major League Baseball, managing a team to the Stanley Cup Finals, serving as a minor league baseball manager in the Dodgers organization, and acting as President of the AAA International Baseball League when Jackie Robinson played in the league (1946). But, among his many stops, he was the head football coach at Clemson in 1907, leading the Tigers to 4-4 record. He beat John Heisman's Georgia Tech team in the season finale by a 6-5 score.

**Frank Leahy:** Leahy was the head coach at Boston College in 1939 and 1940. His first Boston College team lost to Clemson in the 1940 Cotton Bowl, the only bowl loss of his career. He won a bowl game as Boston College's head coach the next year over Tennessee, then went to Notre Dame as head coach for the 1941 season. Notre Dame had a self-imposed ban on bowl participation his entire tenure (1941-53) with the Notre Dame program due to the school's academic schedule. He is still the second-winningest coach in college football history on a percentage basis, trailing only his mentor, Knute Rockne, but he was 0-1 in his career against Clemson.

**Ricky Gray:** Gray lettered for both schools. The former DeMatha High School player enrolled at Clemson as a freshman in 1980 and lettered for the Tigers that season as a tight end. He transferred to Holy Cross Junior College, a school across the street from the Notre Dame campus in 1981, then matriculated to Notre Dame and lettered for the Irish from 1982-84 under Gerry Faust.

**Troy and Thad Ridgley:** Troy Ridgley was a defensive lineman who was a letterman on Notre Dame's 1988 National Championship team. He also lettered in 1989 and 1991. Thad Ridgley, his brother, lettered at Clemson in 1992 and 1993. It is the only known brother combination to play for both schools in football.

**Banks McFadden and Moose Krause:** Only eight athletes in college sports history have earned All-America honors in football and basketball over their careers. Clemson and Notre Dame each had one of the eight. McFadden was an All-American in basketball first in 1938-39 when he took

Clemson to the Southern Conference championship. He then made All-American as a quarterback and defensive back in the fall of 1939 when he led Clemson to a 9-1 record and a win in the Cotton Bowl.

Krause was better known for his basketball and was a three-time All-American from 1931-33. He was the second three-time All-American in college basketball history. The first was Purdue's John Wooden, later the coach at UCLA. Krause, who was recruited to play football by Knute Rockne before the legendary coach died in a plane crash, was an All-America tackle in 1932 on the gridiron. Later as Notre Dame Director of Athletics, Krause brokered the deal with Frank Howard to play a two-game series between Clemson and Notre Dame in 1977 and 1979.

**Chansi Stuckey:** Notre Dame Wide Receivers Coach Chansi Stuckey starred at Clemson from 2003-06, playing quarterback as a freshman before transitioning to wide receiver at the behest of Dabo Swinney, who was Clemson's receivers coach at the time. In his three years as a receiver, he totaled 139 receptions, 1,750 yards and seven receiving touchdowns. Following a successful NFL career after being drafted by the New York Jets, Stuckey served as a graduate assistant at Clemson in 2019 and as an offensive player development assistant in 2020. Back in 2001, Swinney, who was part of a staff at Alabama that was let go after the 2000 season, attempted to get the wide receivers coaching job at Notre Dame vacated that offseason by new Bowling Green State head coach Urban Meyer. Though Swinney never got the job, 21 years later, one of Swinney's receiver protégés — Stuckey — did.

Since the NCAA split Division I into the divisions now known as the Football Bowl Subdivision and Football Championship Subdivision in 1978, Clemson has a 30-6-2 record against FBS independents. Clemson has won each of its last 13 games against FBS independents dating to 1988.

Clemson's last loss to an independent program was in 1988, when Florida State utilized its infamous "Puntruoskie" to beat Clemson, 24-21, at Memorial Stadium. Of note: Clemson lost to Notre Dame in 2020, but the Irish were temporary members of the ACC during that pandemic-impacted season.

## SAME TEAM, DIFFERENT NETWORK

Clemson will be making a rare appearance on NBC this week, representing only Clemson's second game to air outside the ESPN/ABC family of networks since the 2018 season opener vs. Furman, which was produced by Raycom Sports for distribution via regional networks.

A win would even Clemson's all-time record on NBC at 4-4. Clemson made its NBC debut in 1958, earning a 13-6 win against NC State to win the program's second ACC title in three years. Clemson played on the network again at the end of that season in the Sugar Bowl against LSU on New Year's Day in 1959. Clemson wore navy blue jerseys with wide numerals on the front and back as well as orange helmets with a white stripe to provide a contrasting color for the game's national television audience.

Clemson's next NBC broadcast came on the game's biggest stage. The Tigers won the program's first national championship in 1981 on NBC, as announcers Don Criqui, John Brodie and Bob Trumpy called Clemson's 22-15 Orange Bowl win against Nebraska.

Clemson has played on NBC four times since 1990, including a Hall of Fame Bowl win against Illinois in 1990, Gator Bowl appearances against Syracuse and Virginia Tech in 1995 and 2000, respectively, and at Notre Dame in 2020, a broadcast that was interrupted and temporarily moved to another network for an address by the President Elect. That game against Notre Dame was the highest-rated game of the 2020 regular season, averaging 10.07 million viewers.

## ON THIS DATE

- **Nov. 5, 1938:** Clemson scored with big plays in a win over George Washington, 27-0. The Tigers scored three touchdowns on plays of at least 65 yards, the first time in history Clemson had scoring plays of that distance in the same game. Banks McFadden ran 70 yards for a score on the first Clemson play from scrimmage. Later, Shad Bryant scored on a 65-yard punt return and on a 65-yard run off a lateral. George Washington actually had more first downs, 15-13, yet lost by 27 points.

- **Nov. 5, 1994:** Nelson Welch became Clemson's career scoring leader with five field goals and a PAT in Clemson's 28-17 upset of No. 12 North Carolina in Chapel Hill. Clemson's defense held the Tar Heels to just 11 rushing yards. Clemson started an all first-year freshman backfield.

- **Nov. 5, 2005:** Charlie Whitehurst's 37-game streak as the starting Tiger quarterback came to an end when he missed the Duke game due to a sore shoulder. Will Proctor took the reins and led Clemson to a 49-20 win

by completing 13-of-21 passes for 201 yards and two scores.

- **Overall:** Clemson is 11-3-2 all-time in games contested on Nov. 5, including wins in its five Nov. 5 games dating to 1983.

## NOTES FROM LAST GAME

- Death Valley hosted its first matchup of two undefeated teams 6-0 or better in the facility's 81-year history.

- The game represented only the fourth all-time meeting of two ACC teams 6-0 or better, joining the 1997 Florida State/North Carolina game, 2013 Florida State/Miami game and the first Clemson/Notre Dame game in 2020.

- Clemson rushed a season-high 60 times for a season-high 293 yards.

- The game represented Clemson's 75th time rushing for 200 yards under Dabo Swinney. Clemson is now 74-1 when rushing for 200+ yards in his tenure.

- Clemson recorded 27 first downs to Syracuse's 17. Clemson now has a 121-2 record when totaling more first downs than its opponent since 2011 and has won its last 62 such contests.

- Quarterback Cade Klubnik entered in the third quarter and helped engineer the comeback victory. He became the first backup quarterback to engineer a fourth-quarter comeback win for Clemson since 2018 when Chase Brice also accomplished the feat at home against Syracuse.

- Running back Will Shipley rushed for a career-high 172 yards on a career-high 27 carries with two rushing touchdowns.

- Including 53 kickoff return yards and 17 receiving yards, Shipley finished with 242 all-purpose yards, four more than his previous career high set last week at Florida State (238).

- Shipley recorded the eighth game of his career with multiple rushing touchdowns, tying Woodrow Dantzler for the third-most by a Clemson player since 2000.

- The game was Shipley's seventh 100-yard rushing game of his career and gives him back-to-back 100-yard games on the ground for the third time in his career. Clemson is now 60-2 when having a 100-yard rusher since 2011.

- Shipley opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run on Clemson's opening possession. Clemson improved to 73-4 when scoring first since 2015.

- The rushing touchdown was Shipley's 20th of his career. He reached 20 career rushing touchdowns in his 18th career game at Clemson, matching the pace of Clemson (and ACC) all-time rushing touchdown leader Travis Etienne (70), who scored his 20th career rushing touchdown in his 18th career game.

- With the score, Clemson rushed for a touchdown in a 19th consecutive game. Since the start of the 2018 season, Clemson has scored at least one rushing touchdown in 62 of its 63 games, the most in the nation.

- Running back Phil Mafah scored his second touchdown of the season on a one-yard touchdown run on fourth down in the fourth quarter.

- Mafah finished the game with a career-high 94 rushing yards on a career-high 18 carries.

- Clemson retook the lead with 11:26 remaining in the second quarter on a 50-yard touchdown run by Shipley.

- The 50-yard touchdown run was the longest scoring play of Shipley's career and his second-longest run overall, just shy of a 53-yard non-scoring run at Wake Forest earlier this season.

- Following Shipley's 50-yard touchdown run, Klubnik connected with wide receiver Joseph Ngata for the two-point conversion. It was Clemson's second two-point conversion of the season, joining DJ Uiagalelei's

successful conversion to Beaux Collins at Wake Forest.

- Clemson recorded a season-high five sacks.

- Clemson has now posted multiple sacks in five straight games for the first time since a nine-game streak last season.

- Defensive tackle Tyler Davis recorded a career-high 2.0 sacks.

- Davis recorded his third sack of the season, chasing Syracuse quarterback Garrett Shrader out of bounds after pressure by Bryan Bresee.

- Davis added his second sack of the game in the third quarter.

- On the ensuing play, linebacker Trenton Simpson and defensive end Myles Murphy split a sack to force a Syracuse punt.

- Bresee added his first full sack of the season on a third-down stop in the fourth quarter.

- Defensive end K.J. Henry recorded his second sack of the season in the game's final minutes.

- Safety R.J. Mickens sealed the victory with Clemson's only takeaway of the game, an interception on Syracuse's final drive.

- Defensive tackle Ruke Orhorhoro recorded a game-high two pass breakups, including one on a fourth-down stop on Syracuse's opening possession.

- Mickens' interception was his second of the season and the fourth of his career.

- Placekicker B.T. Potter converted two 44-yard field goals in the game.

- Potter added to his Clemson records for career field goals of 40 yards or more (32).

- On his second field goal, Potter (68) passed Chandler Catanzaro (67 from 2010-13) for second in Clemson history for career field goals.

- Potter (2,542 yards on 68 career field goals) became the first player in school history to convert 2,500 yards of field goals.

- Punter Aidan Swanson punted twice. Both punts exceeded 50 yards and were downed inside the Syracuse 20-yard line, including one that bounced out of bounds at the Syracuse four-yard line.

- Antonio Williams recorded a career-long 18-yard punt return in the third quarter.

- Clemson's streak of consecutive red zone scores to start the season ended at 36 in the second quarter. Clemson's 36 consecutive red zone drives with a score this season were the program's longest on record in the last 12 seasons.

- Though Clemson gave up a defensive touchdown, Clemson did not surrender any points off of its other three turnovers. Clemson's defense has only surrendered three points off turnovers through eight games this season.

- The victory was only Clemson's fifth by seven points or less during its ACC-record 38-game home winning streak (two against Syracuse, two against Boston College and one against Georgia Tech).

- Clemson hosted the 15th matchup of AP Top 15 teams in Death Valley history. Clemson improved to 10-5 in those matchups and would be the Tigers seventh straight win in AP Top 15 games at home dating to Clemson's 2015 win against Notre Dame.

- Clemson was ranked No. 5 in both polls and has been ranked in the Top 25 of at least one major poll in every all-time contest against Syracuse. Clemson has had a Top 5 ranking in eight of the teams' 10 all-time matchups.

- Clemson faced a ranked Syracuse squad for the first time in series history.

- Captains for the contest were offensive tackle Jordan McFadden, defensive end Myles Murphy, wide receiver Joseph Ngata and safety Jalyn Phillips.

- Clemson extended the nation's longest active winning streak to 14 games.

- Clemson's 14-game winning streak now stands alone as the fourth-longest winning streak in Clemson history, trailing a 29-game winning streak from 2018-19, a 17-game winning streak from 2014-15 and a 15-game winning streak from 1947-49.

- Clemson has now opened a season 8-0 for the ninth time in program history (1948, 1981, 2000, 2011, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019). Five of Clemson's seven most recent teams to start 8-0 went on to play for the national championship (1981, 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019).

- Clemson won its 38th consecutive home game to take sole possession of the longest home winning streak in ACC history. Clemson was previously tied with the 1992-2001 Florida State Seminoles (37). Note: Miami's FBS-record 58-game home winning streak from 1985-94 predated the Hurricanes' ACC membership.

- Clemson extended its school record for both the longest home winning streak and longest home unbeaten streak in school history. It extended the nation's longest active home winning streak. No member of Clemson's roster has lost a home game at Clemson in their careers. - Clemson's national-best 57-1 record at home in the College Football Playoff era (since 2014).

- Clemson overcame an 11-point fourth-quarter deficit for the first time since the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl against LSU (overcame an 11-point deficit in a 25-24 win). Clemson is now 13-27 under Dabo Swinney when trailing after three quarters.

- Clemson trailed by 14 points in the second quarter. It was Clemson's 16th time overcoming a deficit of 14 or more points in a win. It was Clemson's seventh such game under Swinney.

- Clemson overcame an 11-point halftime deficit in the victory, Clemson's first victory after facing a halftime deficit since overcoming a 15-point halftime disadvantage in a 34-28 win against Boston College in 2020.

- Clemson earned its 16th win when trailing at halftime and its 13th win when trailing after three quarters in the Swinney era.

- Clemson is now 6-0 in ACC play and has won at least six regular season conference games for a 12th straight year to pull within two of the longest streak of six-plus-win conference seasons in ACC history (Florida State, 14 from 1992-2005). Clemson's longest streak in school history prior to the current 12-year streak was three (1981-83).

- Clemson improved to 9-2 all-time against Syracuse.

- Clemson tied the 1919-27 Notre Dame Fighting Irish (38) for the 10th-longest home winning streak in FBS history. Those Irish teams under the guidance of College Football Hall of Famer Knute Rockne were a combined 78-7-3 at all venues in the seasons comprising that streak.

- Clemson won its fifth straight game against Syracuse to surpass the longest streak by either team in series history (four by Clemson from 2013-16).

- Clemson remains undefeated at home against Syracuse all-time (5-0).

- Clemson improved to 6-1 at Death Valley all-time in games between teams with perfect records of 4-0 or better. Clemson earned one such win earlier in the year against NC State. Before this season, the last time Clemson had won two such games in a season was in 2018, when Clemson also defeated undefeated Syracuse and NC State teams at home.

- Clemson beat a team with no losses for the fifth time this season. The 2022 squad joins national championship squads from 2016 (five) and 2018 (seven) as the only teams in school history to earn at least five wins against teams with no losses and no ties.

### 10-WIN SEASONS

Clemson entered 2022 riding a streak of 11 consecutive seasons with 10+ wins. The program's 10th consecutive 10-win season in 2020 made Clemson only the third program in FBS history to produce a "double-double" — double-digit wins in a double-digit number of consecutive seasons. Clemson's gritty 10-win season in 2021 extended the streak to 11.

The record for consecutive 10-win seasons is 14, shared by Florida State (1987-2000) and Alabama (2008-21). This season, Clemson will attempt to join those two as the only programs ever to reach 10 wins in a dozen straight seasons.

The Tigers have 18 10-win seasons in school history, with 11 coming under Dabo Swinney.

Every January, Head Coach Dabo Swinney conducts his first official meeting with his new team. The first order of business in the meeting is to "reset the room," reorganizing the seating arrangement with seniors in front and all succeeding classes in order behind them in the team auditorium.

Clemson's recent senior classes have placed themselves among select company in college football history. The 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clemson seniors account for four of only 13 four-year classes in FBS history to reach 50 career wins. That includes the 2018 and 2019 groups that are tied with the 2018 Alabama seniors for the most wins in FBS history (55 wins in four years).

## HISTORIC CONFERENCE REIGN

Even though the Tigers entered the final week of the season still alive in the conference title race for "A"nother "C"lemson "C"hampionship, Clemson's six-year reign atop the ACC ended in 2021.

With a sixth straight conference title in 2020, Clemson became the first program ever to win 20 ACC Championships, five more than Florida State, which ranks second with 15. That year, Clemson became the first program in the conference championship game era to win six straight conference championship games. Clemson also became the first ACC program to win six consecutive outright titles, as Florida State had a streak of nine straight ACC titles, but that streak included two co-championships that prevented Bobby Bowden's Seminoles from ever winning more than three straight titles outright.

Including titles from its days as a member of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association and Southern Conference, Clemson has 26 conference championships overall, also the most of any current ACC school. Duke ranks second among the ACC's current membership with 18 overall conference titles, including 11 Southern Conference titles and seven ACC titles.

The Tigers won the 1900, 1902 and 1903 SIAA Conference championships under John Heisman, then the 1906 SIAA title under Bob Williams. Clemson also won the 1940 and 1948 Southern Conference titles under Frank Howard. Howard won eight total conference titles, including two in the Southern Conference and six in the ACC.

## POWER OVER THE POWER FIVE

Early in his head coaching tenure, Dabo Swinney laid out his belief to then-Clemson athletic director Terry Don Phillips that the Tigers needed to add tough non-conference challenges on top of their tests in ACC play to serve as a foundation for the program's growth.

"I had a conversation with Terry Don and said, 'Terry Don, I know we are not very good right now, but we need to play people because that is going to help me teach and help me develop the culture and the mindset that you have to have to win at the highest level,'" recounted Swinney. "I didn't think we had that, and that's what we committed to. That's what we've done."

That scheduling philosophy and culture change has resonated in the Clemson program, and since 2013, no team can claim more wins against Power Five Conference opponents than the Tigers.

## SIGN AND DEVELOP

While proud of his incoming classes, Head Coach Dabo Swinney has long stated that a true ranking of a recruiting class cannot and should not be published until four years later when the group can be evaluated on performance rather than potential.

Much to Swinney's delight, The Athletic has annually assumed that role in recent years, re-ranking every recruiting class four years later to account for on-field performance.

For its re-rankings, The Athletic uses the following grading scale: 5 points: All-American, award winner, top-50 NFL Draft pick; 4: Multi-year starter, all-conference honors; 3: One-year starter or key reserve; 2: Career backup; 0: Minor or no contribution, left the program. The outlet also adds a bonus to each program's class average, derived from its total number of wins from 2017 through 2020 (e.g.: For re-ranking the Class of 2017, Clemson won 51 games, so its class average received a bonus of 0.51).

Even in its current stretch of recruiting success,

Swinney has often pointed out Clemson drops in rankings as its commitment to not oversigning leads to smaller recruiting classes, as well as noting that much of Clemson's on-field success is a function of the program's development, citing All-Americans like former three-star Isaiah Simmons or former two-star Nolan Turner. The re-rankings illustrate Clemson's pristine recent track record of talent identification, culture fit, resource allocation and player development.

On average, Clemson finished roughly 12th in the 247 Composite team rankings across the 2014-18 recruiting cycles. Upon re-ranking those groups, despite having little room for improvement while recruiting at a Top 15 clip in that span, Clemson ranked 3.2 on average in the re-rankings, a ratings bump of about eight-and-a-half spots. Each of those Clemson classes averaged at least 12 wins a season during their careers.

## ESTEEMED COMPANY

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's run of excellence in his tenure at Clemson has placed him in the company of college football legends.

Swinney boasts a career winning percentage of .814, sitting as one of only 14 head coaches in history with at least 10 seasons of FBS head coaching experience to post a mark of .800 or better.

## ONE OF THE FASTEST TO 150 WINS

With a win against Iowa State in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Head Coach Dabo Swinney earned his 150th career head coaching win in only his 186th career game.

Among coaches who qualify for the NCAA FBS record book by virtue of five years or 50 wins as a major college head coach, only 16 entered 2022 having reached 150 career wins in 200 games or less. Fourteen of the 16 are College Football Hall of Famers, with the 15th and 16th — Swinney and Urban Meyer — likely to be inducted upon meeting eligibility requirements.

Swinney became the sixth-fastest FBS coach to 150 career wins — two games behind Fielding Yost and Joe Paterno — and the fourth-fastest in the modern era.

Four previous Clemson head coaches earned 150+ FBS wins in their careers: John Heisman (186), Jess Neely (207), Frank Howard (165) and Ken Hatfield (168). Howard, a College Football Hall of Famer, is the only coach to reach 150 career wins as Clemson's head coach. He recorded his 150th victory in his 273rd career game, in a 14-10 victory against Maryland in 1966 that clinched a piece of what later became an outright ACC title. Heisman earned win No. 150 in game No. 203, Neely earned it in game No. 268, and Hatfield did it in game 259, though none of those three won more than 43 games in their Clemson tenures.

## FIRST 15 SEASONS

With his 150th career win in the 2021 Cheez-It Bowl, Dabo Swinney moved into third on the all-time leaderboard for the most wins through the first 15 years of a head coaching career in FBS history, moving past College Football Hall of Famer Barry Switzer.

Impressively, Swinney has amassed his total despite not having the benefit of a full season in his first year. Swinney went 4-3 on an interim basis in his first season in 2008 after taking over for Tommy Bowden in October.

Swinney can continue to add to his total in his 15th

## HEAD COACH CONTINUITY

Over the last decade, Clemson became a beacon of stability in the increasingly unstable environment of college football. Clemson Head Coach Dabo Swinney is in his 20th overall season at Clemson in 2022,

including his 14th full season as head coach (and his 15th including an interim stint in 2008).

From the start of Swinney's first season as full-time head coach in 2009 through 2021, there were more than 400 head coaching tenures in the FBS (excluding those by interims), but only one such tenure at Clemson.

Clemson is the only school in the ACC with only one head coach since the start of the 2009 season, and among the 13 schools ever to qualify for the College Football Playoff, only Clemson and Alabama have had only one head coach since 2009.

## SIX "FINAL FOURS" FOR SWINNEY

While the term "Final Four" may still be the linguistic property of college basketball, since the advent of the four-team College Football Playoff in 2014, Head Coach Dabo Swinney had Clemson among the sport's final four teams six times from 2015-20, becoming the first coach to lead a team to six consecutive College Football Playoffs since the format's institution in 2014.

The NCAA men's college basketball tournament dates to 1939. In the history of that tournament, only John Wooden of UCLA (nine from 1967-75) and Mike Krzyzewski of Duke (five from 1988-92) coached teams to at least five consecutive Final Fours. With his sixth "Final Four" appearance in 2020, Swinney joined basketball's Wooden as the only college football or men's basketball coaches to take teams to six consecutive Final Fours in their respective sports.

During Wooden's streak of nine straight Final Fours, he recorded eight championships and a semifinal loss. Coach K's Blue Devils recorded two championships, a second-place finish and three semifinal losses. Nick Saban's Final Four history includes three championships, three runner-up finishes and a semifinal loss, while Swinney so far has two championships, two runner-up finishes and two semifinal losses.

Swinney is among only nine coaches in football and men's basketball to record six career Final Four berths. He is one of only six with a winning record in Final Four games.

Swinney's ability to place his team among the nation's elite quartet has also been illustrated by the polls. Clemson finished first in the AP Poll in 2016 and 2018, second in 2015 and 2019, third in 2020 and fourth in 2017. Swinney became just the fourth coach to record at least six consecutive top four finishes since the AP Poll began in 1936, an exclusive list that also includes Florida State's Bobby Bowden (13), USC's Pete Carroll (seven) and Oklahoma's Bud Wilkinson (six).

Clemson's streak represented the fifth time a program has had a run of at least six top four finishes in the AP Poll. Miami (Fla.) had a seven-year run from 1986-92 with two different head coaches leading the program.

## HISTORY AT NO. 1

In the 2019 and 2020 preseason polls, Clemson became the sixth program since the inception of the preseason poll in 1950 ever to open consecutive preseason polls at No. 1, joining Alabama (2016-18), USC (2004-05), Oklahoma (1985-87, 1974-75, 1956-57), Ohio State (1969-70) and Notre Dame (1953-54).

Prior to topping out at No. 3 in 2021, Clemson appeared at No. 1 in at least one AP Poll in six consecutive years from 2015-20. Dabo Swinney joined Nick Saban (14) as the only coach in AP Poll history (since 1936) to lead a team to at least one No. 1 ranking in six consecutive years. ## WHEN IN DOUBT, CLEMSON RESPONDS

In Head Coach Dabo Swinney's tenure, the Tigers have routinely responded well following dips in the AP rankings.

Under Swinney, Clemson is 30-6 in games in which it enters ranked lower in the AP Poll than it did in its previous contest. This includes the 2014, 2016, 2017, 2018 and 2021 season openers in which Clemson opened the season lower than its ranking from the final game of the previous campaign.

Clemson is also 29-7 in games following a loss under Swinney, including season openers following a loss in the previous season finale. Losses to Top 5 opponents Ohio State and Georgia across the 2020 and 2021 seasons ended a streak of 127 games since losing back-to-back contests, which had been the longest active streak in the nation and the longest in ACC history.

Previously, Clemson's last time losing back-to-back games had come in 2011. That also represents the last time Clemson has lost consecutive games in a single season.

## ACC WINNING STREAKS

Clemson has won 64 of its last 69 games vs. ACC opponents, a time frame that includes ACC Championship Game wins against North Carolina (2015), Virginia Tech (2016), Miami (2017), Pitt (2018), Virginia (2019) and Notre Dame (2020). Clemson has an active winning streak against 12 of its 13 ACC counterparts, with at least three games comprising 11 of those 12 streaks.

## TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS

Prior to a loss at NC State in late September of 2021, Clemson had won 36 consecutive games against teams unranked in the AP Poll, the program's second-longest such winning streak since the inception of the poll in 1936. Prior to the loss to NC State, Clemson's last defeat at the hands of an unranked squad had come in 2017 at Syracuse.

Clemson's longest winning streak against unranked teams came across the 2012-16 seasons, when Clemson won 46 in a row starting with a season-opening win against Auburn in 2012 and ending with an upset loss to Pitt in 2016.

Clemson is 122-13 against AP-unranked teams under Dabo Swinney, including wins in 99 of 102 games against those unranked teams since the start of the 2012 season. Clemson enters this week having won 12 consecutive games against unranked teams.

## SHIP HAPPENS

Despite Clemson's roster featuring a backfield group that players and coaches have described as a trio of NFL-caliber running backs, sophomore Will Shipley has emerged as a difference maker early in his career and early in the 2022 season.

Shipley recorded multiple touchdowns on the ground in each of Clemson's first three games and has rushed for multiple touchdowns in eight of his 18 career games. This year, he became the first Clemson player in single-game records back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season.

Shipley is already one of six Clemson players since 2000 to record at least seven career games with multiple rushing touchdowns.

## SHIP'S MAIDEN VOYAGE IN 2021

Despite missing three games of his debut season due to multiple injuries, Shipley led Clemson in rushing touchdowns (11), total touchdowns (11), rushing attempts (149) and rushing yards (738) as a true freshman in 2021.

Shipley's freshman performance in 2021 was another entry in Clemson's recent history of feature backs declaring their arrival immediately. Clemson was led in rushing yards in each of the previous seven years by either Wayne Gallman (2014-16) or Travis Etienne (2017-20), both of whom led Clemson in rushing in their freshman seasons (Gallman's redshirt freshman season in 2014 and Etienne's true freshman season in 2017). Before Shipley, the last time someone other than Etienne or Gallman led Clemson in rushing in a season was 2013 (Rod McDowell), when Shipley was in fifth grade.

Shipley's 2021 performance ranked second in rushing touchdowns by a Clemson true freshman since 1972.

## YEAR TWO AS THE STARTER

Uiagalelei is in his second season as Clemson's primary starter. Even with an Oct. 22 game against Syracuse in which he was pulled in the second half in favor of freshman Cade Klubnik, Uiagalelei's completion percentage, touchdown-to-interception

ratio and pass efficiency rating through eight games exceed the numbers posted by Deshaun Watson through eight games in 2016, when Watson finished second in Heisman voting.

In his debut season in 2020, Uiagalelei became only the second FBS player since 2000 to throw at least 115 passes and record at least five passing touchdowns and no interceptions, joining Georgia Southern's Shai Werts from 2018.

Uiagalelei's first career interception came on his 12th pass of the 2021 season opener, the 129th pass attempt of his career. His interception-free streak of 128 passes concluded only 37 attempts shy of the Clemson record for most pass attempts without an interception to start a career, held by Cullen Harper (first 165 passes of his career that spanned 2005-07).

He ranks second in Clemson records in career interception percentage among qualified passers.

## "BIG CINCO'S" BIG COMEBACKS

In Uiagalelei's first career start in October of 2020, Clemson trailed Boston College at home, 28-10, with 1:02 remaining in the first half. With no timeouts, Uiagalelei led a 10-play, 42-yard drive in 55 seconds to get a B.T. Potter 50-yard field goal before half. The drive jumpstarted Clemson's comeback 34-28 victory, as the Tigers scored 24 unanswered for the win. Of note:

- Clemson trailed by 18 points in the first half, making the win Clemson's largest home comeback victory in school history.

- The win tied for the second-largest comeback win in school history at any location, matching an 18-point comeback at Maryland in 2011, which had also stood as Clemson's largest comeback win under Dabo Swinney.

In 2021, Uiagalelei helped engineer fourth-quarter comeback wins in back-to-back games against Florida State on Oct. 30 and at Louisville on Nov. 6. Against Florida State, Clemson led going into the fourth quarter but fell behind on a strip-sack recovered for a touchdown with fewer than eight minutes to play. Uiagalelei and Clemson engineered a three-play, 58-yard touchdown drive to reclaim the lead with fewer than three minutes to play in the win.

A week later, Clemson trailed 24-17 entering the fourth quarter but outscored the Cardinals 13-0 in the final frame to earn the victory. The wins gave Clemson fourth-quarter comeback victories in back-to-back games for the first time in the Dabo Swinney era.

Uiagalelei is one of seven Clemson quarterbacks since 2000 to engineer multiple fourth-quarter wins (tied or trailing) and one of three to do so at least four times. He engineered his fourth career fourth-quarter comeback win in Clemson's dramatic double-overtime win at Wake Forest on Sept. 24.

## DJU'S RIVALRY DEBUT

Uiagalelei made his Clemson-South Carolina rivalry debut in 2021 and led the Tigers to a 30-0 road win in Columbia. ## MAVERICK CLEARED FOR TAKEOFF

In the summer of 2021, a pair of Clemson enrollees faced a difficult decision. Though both had signed as dual-sport scholarship athletes to play football and baseball at Clemson, incoming freshman quarterback Bubba Chandler and wide receiver Will Taylor were both slated as presumptive early-round picks in the 2021 MLB Draft.

When the draft came, Chandler made known his services would be available to MLB teams and opted for pro baseball after being selected in the third round by the Pittsburgh Pirates. However, despite first-round feedback, Taylor told MLB teams he wanted to pursue his dream of playing both sports at Clemson and told Clemson coaches Dabo Swinney (football) and Monte Lee (former baseball coach) of his intent to play collegiately.

"I've heard the term 'life-changing' [money] and that's true, but also it was going to have to be the perfect situation for me to leave this place," Taylor said of his options. "We kind of knew what the college experience was going to be like. We didn't really know what the professional life was like."

The Texas Rangers took a flyer on Taylor in the 19th round, but Taylor was already mentally on his way to carving out a role on Clemson's football team. He won the starting punt return job in Clemson's season opener against Georgia and a week later recorded a 51-yard punt return against SC State.

Taylor's attitude garnered him the nickname "Maverick" from former offensive coordinator Tony Elliott.

"I called him Maverick first [because] he reminds me of a young Tom Cruise from Top Gun. He's got that feistiness to him, that edge to him. I think he likes it too," Elliott said in 2021. "He provides a spark around here. What I think he's done, too, he has garnered the respect of everybody in that locker room. It's obviously tough for him, coming in as a baseball and football guy, so he came in with some challenges. But he came in here and right away showed the guys in the locker room that 'Hey, I'm a football guy. I'll do whatever it takes,' and kind of dispelled all of that."

The electrifying slot receiver who trained as an emergency quarterback in his first year had his freshman

football season end prematurely — and his freshman baseball season start late — as the result of an ACL tear in Clemson's fifth football game.

Beyond his multi-sport skillset that has Swinney and his baseball counterparts debating whether his future is as an NFL slot receiver or as an MLB outfielder, Taylor's demeanor, mindset and drive continue to impress them most.

"This kid turned down millions of dollars to play football and baseball and chase his dream," Swinney said. "He's just a natural. He's a gamer. He's got incredible moxie and poise."

### IT'S BEAUX TIME

As a true freshman last season, wide receiver Beaux Collins debuted a touchdown celebration in which he pointed to an invisible watch on his wrist. The message? "It's Beaux Time."

The clever play on the "It's Bo Time" motto of fast food giant Bojangles was on display early this season, as Collins caught a touchdown pass in each of the Tigers' first four games, becoming the first Clemson player to record a receiving touchdown in each of the first four games of a season since freshman phenom Sammy Watkins in 2011.

After being held out of the end zone for the first time in Clemson's fifth game of the season, Collins scored his fifth touchdown of the season in Clemson's sixth game, a prime-time win at Boston College. In doing so, Collins became the first Clemson player to catch a touchdown in five of the first six games of a season since 2012 when DeAndre Hopkins accomplished the feat as part of his ACC-record 18-touchdown campaign.

Only six FBS players — Old Dominion's Ali Jennings (7), Houston's Nathaniel Dell (6), Ohio State's Emeka Egbuka (6), Texas State's Ashlyn Hawkins (6), Tennessee's Jalin Hyatt (6) and Toledo's Jamal Turner (6) — have a touchdown catch in more games this season than Collins (5).

With a touchdown reception at Florida State on Oct. 15, tight end Davis Allen became the sixth tight end in Clemson history to reach double-digit career touchdown receptions.

Clemson's dominant 2018 defensive line that featured three first-round picks (Clelin Ferrell, Christian Wilkins and Dexter Lawrence) and a fourth-round pick (Austin Bryant) famously had its Power Rangers alter-ego. Clemson's highly lauded 2022 group was in search of its own identity and took on the identity of The Avengers.

Injuries have plagued various members of Clemson's 2022 group at various points of their careers. Since Bryan Bresee and Myles Murphy joined the unit in the class of 2020, four of the most high-profile members of the group in the eyes of NFL talent evaluators (Bresee, Murphy, Tyler Davis and Xavier Thomas) have played only eight of a possible 33 games together. Clemson is 8-0 in those contests.

Clemson produced a fully assembled group of Avengers for the first time in 2022 on Oct. 15 at Florida State. Super senior Xavier Thomas made his return on Oct. 8 at Boston College after a foot injury in fall camp cost him the first five games of the season. He recorded 2.0 sacks and a forced fumble in only six snaps against Boston College, earning ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week. One week after Thomas produced two sacks and a forced fumble, Myles Murphy matched the stat line with two sacks and a forced fumble at Florida State to retake the lead as Clemson's active career sack leader.

One week later, Tyler Davis posted 2.0 sacks vs. Syracuse, becoming the third different member of the group in as many weeks to record 2.0 sacks in a game. It marked the first time Clemson has had three different players record 2.0 or more sacks in a game in a three-week span since 2016, when Ben Boulware (vs. South Carolina), Dexter Lawrence (vs. Virginia Tech) and

Carlos Watkins (vs. Ohio State) accomplished the feat.

## WELCOME BACK, POTTER

Head Coach Dabo Swinney joked on Signing Day in February that Clemson's biggest signee of its 2022 recruiting class wasn't a freshman or a transfer, it was placekicker B.T. Potter, who opted to use his extra year of eligibility and return for his super senior fifth season. Potter was a Groza Award semifinalist in 2019 and enters 2022 as a prime candidate for that award, as he is Clemson's school record holder in career field goals of both 40-plus and 50-plus yards and field goal yardage and ranks among the leaders in Clemson history in career PATs, career points by a kicker, career points and field goals.

Potter is the only player in Clemson history to score 100 points in three different seasons, has been one of the nation's foremost kickoff specialists and holds the Clemson record for consecutive PATs made (122 from

2018-20).

Potter's 68 career field goals have covered a school-record 2,542 yards. He surpassed the 2,000-yard mark on made field goals in Clemson's season opener at Georgia Tech. With a 35-yard field goal at Boston College on Oct. 8, Potter broke the Clemson career field goal yardage record of 2,370, set by Nelson Welch from 1991-94.

## THE OTHER SWINNEY DYNASTY

Like Colquitts punting at Tennessee, Swinneys holding at Clemson are becoming a dynasty of their own.

Head Coach Dabo Swinney's oldest son, Will, arrived at Clemson in 2017 and immediately earned Clemson's starting holder position on placekicks. He played five seasons and a record-tying 69 games at Clemson through 2021. In those five seasons, Clemson scored 565 points on placekicks, including field goals and PATs, and he held for 558 of those 565 points.

The only seven Clemson kicking points not held by Will in his career were instead held by his brother, Drew, now Clemson's starter at the position in 2022. Drew is joined on the roster this season by the youngest of the three Swinney boys, Clay, who could claim the role in future seasons. Clay's arrival creates a plausible scenario in which every Clemson placekick in a full 10-year span from 2017-26 could be held by a Swinney.

Clemson's last hold by any player outside the Swinney family was on the final point of Clemson's 2016 national championship, as Seth Ryan, coincidentally also the son of a famous long-time coach (Rex Ryan), held the PAT following Hunter Renfrow's game-winning touchdown with one second remaining.

## -- LESSONS FROM 2021 --

### SUCCEEDING DESPITE ATTRITION

Attrition unlike any Clemson had faced in the Dabo Swinney era reared its head in 2021. By the time Clemson wrapped up its 2021 Cheez-It Bowl win, for various reasons, the Tigers were without the services of 30 scholarship players from the start of the season.

Clemson had 48 different players record at least one start in 2021, eight more than its 40 different starters in 2020's erratic and unpredictable pandemic-impacted season. Only 23 Clemson players played in every game, and only six started every game (including kicker and punter).

## RETURNING EXPERIENCE

The 2021 Tigers faced a perfect storm of injuries, attrition, adversity and inexperience in key positions but battled to finish 10-3 in what Head Coach Dabo Swinney called a victory for the team's culture. Clemson continued its historic 10-win-season streak despite only four offensive or defensive players starting every game and despite the Tigers ending the season with an incredible 30 scholarship players unavailable.

But for all the strife those injuries created in 2021, Clemson has benefited from them greatly in 2022. Entering fall camp, Clemson returned 53 lettermen among its 81 returning players that have appeared in at least one game at Clemson, and while Clemson returned 15 of its 22 primary offensive and defensive starters from 2021, a total of 36 different returning players entered 2022 having started at least one career game for the Tigers.

## STRENGTH OF RECORD

One of the metrics used by the College Football Playoff committee to evaluate teams is Strength of Record, described by SportSource Analytics as such: "The Strength of Record (SoR) Rating is a measurement of a team's performance against the average margin of victory of the opponent. For example, if a team plays an opponent that wins by 7 points on average and they beat that team by 10 points, then they would have SoR Rating of +17 for that game. Each game is also adjusted for home and away factors. When viewed as an overall rating, it tells you that a team typically performs better (if positive) or worse (if negative) against opponents than teams typically perform against them."

Clemson ranks first in the ACC and 10th in the nation in Strength of Record this season.

Last year, Clemson's only losses came in one-score games against No. 1 Georgia and No. 20 North Carolina State and a 10-point loss to No. 13 Pitt, three teams that finished 2021 with a combined 34-7 record (all AP rankings from final poll).

Clemson has lost only 10 games since 2015 and only six games since 2018. Six of Clemson's 10 losses since 2015 have come against AP Top 5 teams, and those six were all College Football Playoff participants that season.

The opponents to whom Clemson has lost since 2015 have a combined final record of 104-25, a winning percentage of .806. Since 2018, opponents responsible for Clemson's defeats have a combined final record of 65-10 (.867).

### OWNING THE "MIDDLE EIGHT"

Since 2015, Clemson has frequently won one of the hidden "games within the game" on each side of halftime. SportSource Analytics tracks the "Middle Eight," the section of the game defined as the final four minutes of the first half and the first four minutes of the second half. Clemson has outscored opponents in that time window 63 times since 2015, posting a 61-2

record in those contests.

After finishing -30 in that category in a three-loss campaign in 2021, Clemson has rebounded in the category in a big way in 2022.

Clemson's Middle Eight performance has been critical in October. Clemson surged to a 30-20 victory against No. 10 NC State on Oct. 1 thanks to a 14-7 advantage in the Middle Eight that turned a four-point deficit (after a late second-quarter Wolfpack touchdown) into a 10-point Clemson lead. A week later, Clemson outscored Boston College, 14-0, in the Middle Eight. On Oct. 15, Clemson outscored 17-0 in that window to seize control of a tight game at Florida State.

In four of the last five seasons, Clemson led all Power Five conference teams in average players per game. Prior to the 2021 season in which Clemson's playing rotations were limited by significant attrition, the last time Clemson did not lead Power Five teams in that category was in 2016, when Clemson finished second in that category.

The approach to creating functional depth and rewarding players ready to play has been a key philosophy for Head Coach Dabo Swinney, whose own collegiate playing career was hatched as a walk-on fighting for playing time in Alabama's receiving corps.

"We're fully committed to playing guys who deserve to play," Swinney said. "You commit to a guy early in the season, and even if a guy has only played 10 percent of the snaps, when you get to game eight or nine, they've got some good experience."

Clemson played 90 players in its 48-20 win against Louisiana Tech, one shy of cracking the Top 10 under Swinney.

## YOUTH IS SERVED

In the first year of new redshirt regulations in 2018, Clemson played a then-school-record 20 true freshmen. Clemson immediately shattered that record in its 2019 season opener, with 27 true freshmen making their collegiate debuts in that contest. An additional eight true freshmen made their debuts to push that 2019 total to a school-record 36.

In 2020, Clemson played 27 true freshmen, tied for the most in the country at the end of the regular season. Twenty-two first-year freshmen made their debut for Clemson in 2021 and another 22 have debuted for Clemson already in 2022.

Coinciding with redshirt rule changes, Clemson's four most recent seasons have resulted in the most game action for first-year freshmen since 1982.

In the 2021 season opener against Georgia, Clemson started two true freshmen in the first game of a season for the first time under Dabo Swinney. Safety Andrew Mukuba became the first Clemson true freshman to start at defensive back in records back to 1973, and guard Marcus Tate became only the third true freshman offensive lineman to start a season opener at Clemson since 1973, joining center James Farr (1980) and tackle Mitch Hyatt (2015).

In 2022, true freshman Blake Miller added himself to the list, as his physical and mental preparedness impressed Clemson's veterans, including fellow offensive lineman Walker Parks.

"Blake came in in January, and we had to check his birth certificate because we thought he was 25 years old," Parks said. "That might be the most developed freshman we've ever seen, out-lifting dudes and out-running dudes... He's a great player, he's smart, picks things up fast and he's physical."

By starting the season opener against Georgia Tech, Miller became only the third true freshman offensive tackle to start a season opener for Clemson since 1944 (Hyatt in 2015, Phil Prince in 1944).

## THIRD-DOWN SUCCESS

Clemson reliably produced a Top 30 national ranking in third-down conversion percentage every year from 2015-20, including three Top 15 rankings and two Top 10 finishes in that category. Then in 2021 with its offensive line and corps of playmakers besieged by injuries, Clemson plummeted to No. 87 in third-down conversion percentage.

This season, Clemson is back to its old ways on the money down, again ranking in the Top 25 in the nation at 48.39 percent.

Not surprisingly, the success on third down is reflected in the statistical growth of quarterback DJ Uiagalelei. After not even ranking among the Top 100 quarterbacks in the nation in passer rating on third down a season ago, he now ranks 29th in the nation among qualified passers in pass efficiency (and sixth in the nation in passing yards) on third down in 2022.

Clemson has reached 500 yards in 50 of those contests, including efforts of 521 and 559 yards, respectively, against Louisiana Tech and Wake Forest this season.

Clemson's recent track record of prolific offense and stingy defense has helped Clemson produce nine of its 11 best single-game yardage differentials in school history since 2014. Only Clemson's plus-467-yard margin in total yards against The Citadel in 1954 and its plus-464-yard margin against Wake Forest in 2000 predate the 2014 season among the Top 10 yardage margins in Clemson annals.

## OFFENSIVE BALANCE

Clemson's distribution of talent throughout its offense and its willingness to adapt to how defenses are game planning has resulted in the Tigers fielding one of the nation's more balanced offenses in recent years. In 2018, Clemson set a school record with 3,723 rushing yards. In 2020, Clemson set a school record with 348.5 passing yards per game.

Clemson has exceeded both 200 passing yards and 200 rushing yards in 57 games under Dabo Swinney, posting a perfect record in those contests. Clemson's 23 such games since the start of the 2018 season are among the most in the country.

Since 2018, Clemson is one of only two programs in the nation to both rush for at least 11,000 rushing yards and pass for at least 15,000 passing yards. Clemson was also the only program in the country to rush for 150+ rushing touchdowns and throw 120+ passing touchdowns from 2018-21.

Clemson has averaged at least 200 rushing yards and 200 passing yards per game four times in school history, with two of those seasons occurring in the 2018 and 2019 campaigns. Clemson broke the 3,000-yard mark both rushing and passing in both 2018 and 2019, two of three 3,000/3,000 seasons in school history (2015).

## YARDS PER PLAY

Clemson shattered its school record for yards per play in 2018 at 7.35, the program's first time exceeding seven yards per play in a season. That record stood for barely 12 months until Clemson broke it again in 2019 by averaging 7.38 yards per play. Including Clemson averaging 6.69 yards per play in 2020, Clemson's top three yards-per-play averages in school history have all come within the four previous seasons.

In 2018-19, Clemson became only the third school since 2000 to average 7.35 or better yards per play in back-to-back seasons, joining Alabama, which did it across 2018-19, and Oklahoma, which was in the midst of a four-year streak across the 2016-19 seasons.

Collectively, Clemson averaged 7.2 yards per play across the 2018-20 seasons, joining Oklahoma (7.9) and Alabama (7.8) as the only programs to average at least seven yards per play across those three seasons.

## 650-POINT SEASONS

Clemson remains responsible for two of the 22 650-point seasons in major college football history and two of only 16 since Division I split in 1978. Clemson was the first school with back-to-back 650-point seasons since Yale in 1888-89, predating the start of official NCAA recordkeeping in 1937 and the second year of which was coincidentally the year Clemson was founded.

## POINTS OFF TURNOVERS

Clemson's offense and defense have both been dominant in possessions following turnovers since the 2018 ACC Championship Game. Since that time, the Tigers hold a 377-103 advantage against opponents in points off turnovers, including a 45-10 margin in that category in 2022.

In 2021, Clemson allowed only 27 points off turnovers. However, 21 of those points came off two pick-sixes and a strip-sack fumble return, so the Clemson defense surrendered only an incredible six points on possessions following Clemson turnovers last year. The only offenses to score following a Clemson turnover in 2021 were South Carolina State, which turned a fumble at the Clemson 36 into a field goal, and Iowa State, which turned an interception at the Clemson 28 into three points.

This season, the Tigers won the points-off-turnover battle, 21-3, against Louisiana Tech and also added a touchdown after a turnover on downs, accounting for 28

points in Clemson's 28-point win. Clemson also won the points-off-turnovers margin by a 10-0 mark against No. 10 NC State in a 10-point win.

Of Clemson's 10 points allowed off turnovers this season, only three have been surrendered by the Clemson defense. The other seven came on a 90-yard scoop-and-score by Syracuse.

## FINISH

In 2018, Clemson debuted a new version of its "This is Why We Work" fourth quarter video at Death Valley, a hype video imploring the team to finish and featuring Director of Strength and Conditioning Joey Batson bellowing:

*"Let me tell you something right now: they don't put championship rings on smooth hands! You gotta go earn it! You gotta go earn it six seconds at a time! You win championships when the stadium is empty, when the band ain't playing, when the cheerleaders ain't cheering, when it's just you and your brothers right beside you. That's when you win championships! In the fourth quarter, that is when we shine!"*

The video and the speech became a part of Clemson lore, buoyed by its playing during Clemson's comeback win against Syracuse that year en route to a 15-0 national championship season. Over the years, the video has changed but the speech remains the same, with many Clemson fans yelling it in unison as it plays.

Clemson's fixation on finishing has led to the Tigers owning the fourth quarter, with Clemson holding a 124-2 record since 2011 when leading after three quarters.

And though Head Coach Dabo Swinney frequently reiterates the phrase, "There is nothing less important than the score at halftime," Clemson is the only Power Five school to be undefeated since 2017 in games in which it holds a lead at halftime.

## ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

- Through the summer of 2022, of 328 eligible players who completed their athletic eligibility at Clemson and/or graduated early in Dabo Swinney's 13+ full years as head coach, 322 (98 percent) have earned a degree during their time at Clemson.

- Clemson broke program multi-year APR records in three straight years from 2017-19 (987 in 2016-17, 992 in 2017-18 and 993 in 2018-19) before the NCAA suspended APR reporting during the COVID-19 pandemic. Upon reinstatement of APR reporting in June 2022, Clemson shattered its multi-year APR record with a 999 covering the 2017-18 through 2020-21 academic years.

- Clemson's 999 APR in that span tied Ole Miss for the FBS lead and finished tied for second nationally across all of Division I, trailing only Columbia University of the Ivy League. Clemson lofty academic success in that period coincided with on-field excellence that included four ACC titles, four College Football Playoff berths, two national championship game berths and the 2018 national championship.

- Clemson is the only FBS program since the NCAA created the APR metric in 2003 to win a national championship and an APR Public Recognition Award in the same year multiple times. Alabama is the only other school to accomplish the title/APR double in a single year once (2011-12 academic year).

Clemson's national academic success has understandably resulted in the shattering of its own internal metrics:

- Clemson posted a program-record 3.11 cumulative GPA in Spring 2022, including a record 81 of 109 players earning a 3.0 or better, far exceeding the previous spring record of 63. Of the 81 with a 3.0 or better, 14 earned a perfect 4.0.

- According to current projections by Clemson's academic staff, 31 different players on Clemson's current roster are expected to have completed their degree program prior to bowl season. Entering the bowl season of its 2018 national championship campaign, Clemson's roster featured 26 graduates, the most of any bowl team that year.

## ALL EYES ON CLEMSON

"Where the Blue Ridge yawns its greatness, where the Tigers play..."

Those are the opening words to Clemson's alma mater. In recent years, "where the Tigers play" has also been where eyes and television sets inevitably turn.

From 2018-21, Clemson games accounted four of the five most-watched college football games and five of the 12 most-watched games in that span.

The interest in watching Clemson play hasn't been limited to television broadcasts. Clemson continues to provide one of the marquee in-venue experiences in all of sports, as Clemson enters 2022 having been ranked in the Top 20 in the nation average home attendance at Memorial Stadium for 41 straight seasons.

## DEATH VALLEY RENOVATIONS

Clemson's home opener against Furman on Sept. 10 also represented the debut of a substantial number of enhancements to Memorial Stadium and the gameday experience at Death Valley. Among the most recent updates:

- Clemson's videoboard got its first major upgrade since 2005, with nearly five times the surface area of the previous board, which was last updated before the 2012 season. The new video system, affectionately and unofficially nicknamed "DaboTron," measures 127 feet wide by 57 feet tall, eighth-largest in the NCAA. It also sits 20 feet off the ground, giving fans a 365-day open view into the stadium. The new board also features color LED fixtures on the inside and custom portal LED lights for the team entrance. Ribbon boards on the north, south, and west, along with new corner video boards in the west were also upgraded to be higher quality, easier to read, and more immersive.

- The eight main stadium light poles were updated to an LED system, which allows for individual light fixture control, spotlighting of Howard's Rock, and higher-quality field lighting.

- A Tiger has sat atop the video board since the 1970s, and a new Tiger will debut this season, measuring nearly 17 feet wide, with eyes that light up and a tail that wags. The Tiger will also be able to be raised and lowered out of the board as needed. Later this season, the previous Tiger is expected to be available as an interactive element at Tigertown Tailgate. Fans will be able to take a photo with the Tiger and have the tail wag and eyes light up.

- The west side of the stadium received a facelift with the addition of IPTAY's Masters Club, a 688-seat premium area on the concourse level. As part of this renovation, concessions and restrooms in the west were relocated and expanded to the terraces, allowing easier pedestrian flow and access.

- Clemson Athletics partnered with Kulture City to make all its venues and all the programs and events that those venues host sensory inclusive. This new initiative promotes an accommodating and positive experience for all guests and fans with a sensory issue that visits athletic events at Clemson University. Clemson is the first school in the country to be Sensory Certified at every venue. Memorial Stadium, Historic Riggs Field, Littlejohn Coliseum, Jervy Gym, Doug Kingsmore Stadium, and McWhorter Stadium will all carry the Certification and will have available sensory bags, noise canceling headphones, fidget tools, verbal cue cards, and strobe reduction glasses to guests, at Guest

Services Stands while attending Events in Clemson Athletic Venues.

- As part of the stadium facade updates, Clemson installed new signage honoring the all-time greats, championship years, and backlighting the traditional "Clemson Welcomes You To Death Valley" signage.

Clemson will begin Phase II of renovations following the 2022 season, including a new gameday locker room and a complete reimagining of Lot 5 and the Tiger Walk experience as a 365-day destination for Clemson fans.

## NEW CONTRACT FOR SWINNEY

Clemson Director of Athletics Graham Neff announced on Sept. 8 that Clemson and Dabo Swinney had agreed to a new, enhanced contract. The terms of the agreement, approved by the Clemson University Board of Trustees Compensation Committee that day, extended Swinney's contract through the 2031 football season.

The contract reflects both Swinney's status as one of the nation's elite coaches and Clemson's continued commitment to its storied football program. Swinney, who has led Clemson to two of its three national titles in school history, is one of only two active head coaches with multiple FBS national championships.

Clemson's football success has mirrored Clemson University's continued ascent as one of the nation's premier public universities. As Clemson has made six College Football Playoff appearances in the last seven years, the University set records in applications, fundraising and numerous academic benchmarks while being named in August as one of the nation's three most-trusted public universities.

Quotes from key figures are included below:

Director of Athletics Graham Neff: "I am appreciative of the support from the Board of Trustees to President Clements to ensure we can continue to build on a firm foundation, as Clemson football and Coach Swinney's leadership are a key driver for our university. Coach Swinney and his family's impact on our community and department cannot be understated, and his success and stability nationally is truly uncommon. It is critical that Clemson continue to invest in our football program, and ensure our head coach is at Clemson for a long, long time. The best is yet to come."

Head Coach Dabo Swinney: "It is hard for me to believe I am in my 14th full season as your head coach, and I remain eternally grateful and honored for the opportunity to continue coaching and developing young people of excellence at Clemson." Swinney said. "This agreement is representative of what has been collectively built here and the success we've had both academically and athletically. It is a reflection of the ALL IN commitment of so many people, including our players, our staff, our fans, our administration and our University leadership. While I am certainly proud of our accomplishments on the field, the most rewarding part remains the relationships forged within this program and the ability to positively impact those around us. I am appreciative of the leadership of President Jim Clements, our Board of Trustees and Director of Athletics Graham Neff, and I am thankful for their continued faith in me as well as their steadfast commitment to the future of Clemson Football. Our core mission remains unchanged: Graduate our players, equip them with the tools they need for life, give them a great college experience, and win championships. I do not take for granted the Clemson Family's unwavering love and support and its faith in our program to carry out that mission every day. It is a blessing to be your head coach and to call Clemson our home."

Clemson University President Jim Clements: "Over

the past 20 years, Coach Swinney has impacted our football program, our university and the entire Clemson area community, in profound ways. The culture of success and achievement he has instilled in our student-athletes, through both on-field victories and academic accomplishments, is truly remarkable," said Clemson President Jim Clements. "I'm excited Dabo, Kathleen, and their family will remain part of the Clemson Family for years to come."

## ALL-ACC SELECTIONS IN 2021

Clemson's 10 selections to the 2021 All-ACC Team were second-most in the conference. Clemson has now produced double-digit All-ACC selections in each of the last seven seasons.

Clemson collected four first-team selections, all from the defense, as defensive tackle Tyler Davis, linebacker James Skalski and cornerbacks Andrew Booth Jr. and Mario Goodrich all earned first-team nods. Three Clemson players were selected to the second team, including offensive tackle Jordan McFadden, defensive end Myles Murphy and placekicker B.T. Potter. Defensive end Xavier Thomas, defensive tackle Bryan Bresee and safety Andrew Mukuba rounded out the selections with third-team honors.

Las Vegas Raiders wide receiver Hunter Renfrow enjoyed a career year, catching a team-high 103 passes for 1,038 yards and nine touchdowns, including two scores in a playoff-clinching prime-time win in Week 18. Renfrow joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Tim Brown and Jerry Rice as the only wide receivers in Raiders history to record 90 or more catches in a season.

Los Angeles Chargers wide receiver Mike Williams posted career highs in receiving yards (1,146) and receptions (76) while adding nine touchdowns. And despite playing two fewer games than the year before, Cincinnati Bengals wide receiver Tee Higgins put up career numbers with 74 catches for 1,091 yards and added six touchdown catches for a second straight regular season before catching two touchdowns in Super Bowl LVI.

Clemson has had 11 receivers drafted since the 2013 NFL Draft, tied for the most in the country.

ATLANTA — No. 4 Clemson defeated Georgia Tech, 41-10, at Mercedes-Benz Stadium on Labor Day night. Clemson's special teams had a superlative performance, as Carson Donnelly and Wade Woodaz both blocked punts to give Clemson multiple punt blocks in a single game for the first time since 2007.

Clemson's defense made an impact on the game's first play from scrimmage, as pressure from defensive end K.J. Henry resulted in safety Andrew Mukuba's first career interception.

In the second quarter, after its first punt block, Clemson opened the scoring on a one-yard touchdown run by running back Will Shipley. Clemson then drove 67 yards in eight plays and extended the lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from quarterback DJ Uiagalelei to wide receiver Beaux Collins. Clemson would carry a 14-3 lead into halftime.

Georgia Tech drew to within four on a 13-yard touchdown pass early in the third quarter. The Tiger offense provided a quick answer to take a 17-10 lead, as B.T. Potter hit a 29-yard field goal with 5:41 to play in the third quarter, capping a 12-play, 63-yard drive.

The field goal started Clemson's run of 27 unanswered points down the stretch to earn the win. Potter converted field goal attempts of 29 and 32 yards, and the first-team offense added rushing touchdowns by Uiagalelei and Shipley before ceding to the second unit, when true freshman quarterback Cade Klubnik led Clemson 66 yards and found Will Taylor in the end zone for a three-yard touchdown pass, pushing the final margin to 41-10.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5/4 Clemson scored touchdowns on five of its first six drives in a 35-12 win against Furman. Clemson debuted new renovations to Memorial Stadium, including its 7,100-plus-square-foot videoboard, on a cool, overcast afternoon.

The win was Clemson's 35th consecutive victory at home, only the 15th home winning streak of 35 games or more in FBS history.

Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei completed 21-for-27 passes for 231 yards for a career-high 166.7 passer rating. Clemson rushed for 147 yards on 28 carries, led by Will Shipley, who scored two touchdowns.

Clemson's defense held Furman to 12 points, forced two turnovers and recorded two fourth-down stops. The unit registered nine tackles for loss. Five different Clemson players registered at least seven tackles, including LaVonta Bentley, who had three tackles for loss.

Clemson scored touchdowns on each of its first three possessions with two touchdown runs by Shipley bookending a two-yard touchdown pass from Uiagalelei to Jake Briningstool, giving the Tigers a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter. The teams traded touchdowns in the final two minutes of the first half to enter halftime with a 28-9 Clemson advantage.

Clemson opened the second half with a stop on Barrett Carter's first career interception. On the ensuing drive, Beaux Collins toe-tapped a nine-yard pass from Uiagalelei in the right side of the end zone to give Clemson a 35-9 lead. Furman added a field goal with 48 seconds to play in the third quarter, and a scoreless fourth quarter resulted in the 35-12 final score.

CLEMSON, S.C. — Sophomore running back Will Shipley rushed 12 times for a career-high 139 yards and two touchdowns as Clemson used a 35-point second half in a 48-20 victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson gained 521 total yards, including 280 on the ground, and forced four turnovers, leading to 21 Tiger points.

The Tigers' defense kept the Bulldogs out of the end zone for the first three quarters and held Louisiana Tech to only six total rushing yards. Quarterback DJ Uiagalelei was 17-of-29 for 221 yards and two scores through the air and picked up 62 yards on the ground on nine carries.

Clemson scored on eight of its 13 drives, not including running out the clock on its final possession. With the game set at 13-6 entering the second half, Clemson exploded for three touchdowns, including a twice scoring 32-yard touchdowns on one-play drives.

Shipley's performance made him the first Clemson player on record back to 1950 to score multiple rushing touchdowns in each of the first three games of a season. He averaged 11.6 yards per carry and became the first Clemson player to average at least 10 yards per carry on at least 10 attempts since Travis Etienne in the 2020 ACC Championship Game against Notre Dame.

R.J. Mickens, Jeremiah Trotter Jr. and Malcolm Greene all recorded interceptions in the contest, while Kevin Swint recorded his first career fumble recovery on a wild snap.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — No. 4/5 Clemson scored 17 points in a two-minute span on either side of halftime to take command of a 34-28 win at Florida State. Running back Will Shipley tallied a career-best 238 all-purpose yards (121 rushing, 48 receiving, 69 kickoff return).

Defensively, Clemson allowed touchdowns on two of the first three drives before settling in and holding the Seminoles scoreless for its next six drives, which included three fourth-down stops. Myles Murphy had six tackles, including 3.5 for loss, and two sacks.

DJ Uiagalelei accounted for four total touchdowns (three passing, one rushing), was 15-of-23 through the air for 203 yards, and added a five-yard rushing touchdown.

After Florida State struck first, Uiagalelei avoided a sack, stepped up in the pocket, and threw a 59-yard touchdown to Antonio Williams on Clemson's second drive.

The Seminoles took a 14-7 lead on a 15-play, 93-yard touchdown drive, but Clemson responded with 27 consecutive points to take a 34-14 lead, as tight ends Jake Briningstool and Davis Allen added scores in addition to Uiagalelei's touchdown on the ground. B.T. Potter also added field goals 47 yards and 34 yards, and with his second extra point of the game, he passed Chandler Catanzaro (404 from 2010-13) to become the highest-scoring kicker in Clemson history.

The Seminoles scored two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to bring the score to 34-28. Brannon Spector then recovered a Florida State onside kick attempt, enabling Clemson to run out the clock for the win.

CLEMSON, S.C. — No. 5 Clemson overcame four turnovers and an early 14-point deficit to earn a 27-21 win against No. 14 Syracuse at Memorial Stadium. The victory was Clemson's 38th in a row at home, breaking the ACC record set by Florida State from 1992-2001.

Running back Will Shipley had another career day, recording 242 all-purpose yards including a career-high 172 rushing yards on a career-high 27 carries with two touchdowns to spark Clemson's 293 rushing yards. Clemson's defense recorded a season-high five sacks and shut out the Orange in the second half as Clemson scored 20 unanswered points for the win.

Clemson took a 7-0 lead on a one-yard touchdown run by Shipley on its opening possession. Syracuse responded with a 75-yard touchdown drive to tie the game at seven.

Clemson's next two possessions resulted in turnovers. Ja'Had Carter intercepted DJ Uiagalelei to terminate one possession, and on Clemson's next drive, the Tigers drove to the Syracuse three-yard line, but Carter returned an Uiagalelei fumble 90 yards for a 14-7 Syracuse lead. A Garrett Shrader touchdown run later in the quarter pushed the Orange to a 21-7 lead. BT Potter cut the Clemson deficit to 21-10 with a 44-yard field goal before halftime.

A scoreless third quarter was not without drama. After Uiagalelei's second interception of the day, Clemson inserted Cade Klubnik at quarterback. Klubnik and the Clemson ground game led Clemson to touchdown drives of 80 yards and 61 yards to give Clemson a 24-21 lead. An additional Potter field goal and a game-winning interception by R.J. Mickens sealed the 26-21 victory.

The win was Clemson's first in a game in which it trailed by 11 or more points in the fourth quarter since the 2012 Chick-fil-A Bowl against LSU.
