GAME NOTES

-BACK IN SOUTH BEND: Monday's game marks the third all-time meeting between Long Island University and the University of Notre Dame, and the first of the Shark era of the program. The two programs have met three times before, with the last occurring in the 2007-08 season.

-CHALLENGING NON-CONFERENCE SCHEDULE: Including Monday's season-opener at Notre Dame, the Sharks will take on four Power 4 programs in their non-conference schedule; the Fighting Irish, the University of Illinois, Mississippi State University, and the University of Georgia.

-NEC PRESEASON POLL: LIU was unanimously picked to finish first out of nine teams by the conference's head coaches

-2024 IN REVIEW: LIU finished second in the NEC standings last winter, posting a 17-15 overall record and a 12-4 mark in conference games. The Sharks reached the semifinals of the NEC tournament.

-2 SHARKS NAMED PRESEASON ALL-NEC SELECTIONS: Redshirt senior guard Malachi Davis and graduate student guard/forward Jamal Fuller were both named NEC Preseason All-Conference selections. Both received All-NEC honors last winter.

-RETURNING TO THE FLOOR: LIU returns 59.2% of its scoring from the 2024-25 season, headlined by returning their top two leading scorers from a season ago in Malachi Davis (565 points) and Jamal Fuller (413 points). The Sharks also returning their top two rebounders (Shadrak Lasu, 226 rebounds; Jamal Fuller, 199 rebounds) and blocks (Lasu, 42 blocks; Fuller, 25 blocks)

-STRONG DEFENSIVE PLAY: Last season, LIU finished at the top of the NEC in opposing field goal percentage allowed (.410) and steals per game (8.15), along with the third-highest mark in blocked shots per game (3.55)

-2024-25 ALL-NEC: Last winter, the Sharks had four student-athletes receive All-NEC honors; guard Malachi Davis was named First-Team All-NEC, forward Jamal Fuller received Second-Team All-NEC honors, forward Shadrak Lasu was selected to the NEC All-Rookie team, and now-graduated guard Brent Davis was named to the NEC All-Defensive team.

STEINBERG WELLNESS CENTER



The largest building project on the Brooklyn campus' history, the \$45 million, 114,000 square foot Steinberg Wellness Center opened in January 2006. Located at the corner of Ashland and DeKalb avenues, the Wellness Center is a hub of activity for student activities and athletic events. The SWC is home to the LIU men's and women's basketball, women's swimming, women's volleyball, and women's fencing teams.

The LIU men's basketball team christened the new home court with a 63-60 win over Sacred Heart on Jan. 26, 2006. The grand opening of the Wellness Center was for the LIU vs. St. Francis (N.Y.) men's basketball game on Feb. 27, 2006 - a 67-64 LIU victory.

The SWC features a 2,500-seat arena, an NCAA regulation-size swimming pool and a state-of-the-art fitness center and weight room. In addition, two tennis courts and a running track sit atop the roof. The SWC also features a wellness center that is geared toward a growing Brooklyn community. Cardiac rehabilitation, orthopedic therapy and asthma education services are available. The pool also features a hydraulic floor for aqua therapy.

The facility also serves as a venue for community civic and social events. The Steinberg Wellness Center has also hosted the VH1 Celebrity Hip-Hop Basketball Classic and various local high school sporting event.

HEAD COACH ROD STRICKLAND



Rod Strickland, the NBA executive, All-NBA point guard and member of the New York City Basketball Hall of Fame, was named men's basketball head coach of the Long Island University Sharks on June 30, 2022. Strickland joins LIU from the NBA G League, the National Basketball Association's official minor league, where he served as director of the professional path program since 2018.

"Rod Strickland has a demonstrated eye for recruiting and developing student-athletes and we are confident he will elevate Long Island University's winning tradition to even greater heights," Long Island University President Kimberly R. Cline said.

Under Strickland, the Sharks finished second in the Northeast Conference standings in the 2024-25 season, ending the season with a 17-16 overall record and a 12-4 mark in NEC contests. Since Strickland was named head coach ahead of the 2022-23 season, LIU has received seven All-NEC selections, including four in the 2024-25 season.

In his role with the G League, Strickland evaluated, educated and mentored top high school prospects in the professional path initiative to prepare them for a career in the NBA. He served as a player and coach relations manager and program director of G League Ignite, a selective team of the most elite NBA prospects. He is eager to use his proven track record of recruitment and player development to bring top national talent to Long Island University and build a perennial Division I contender with the Sharks.

"Developing young players on and off the court has always aligned with my passion while I was playing and after retiring from the NBA," Strickland said. "I am appreciative to Long Island University for the opportunity to become a head coach at home, in New York City. The Sharks are going to be a competing program for top athletes who not only want to take their game to the next level but prepare for success."

Strickland, a Bronx native, was a three-time All-American with three straight NCAA Tournament appearances and was selected in the first round of the 1988 NBA Draft by his hometown New York Knicks. He enjoyed a 17-year NBA career in which he scored more than 14,000 points and recorded nearly 8,000 assists while playing for nine franchises. During the 1997-98 season, he led the league in assists per game and was named second-team All-NBA. He ranked in the top 10 in assists per game in seven seasons and ranks 13th all time in career assists.

Strickland retired from the NBA in 2005 and began his post-playing career as a director of basketball operations at the University of Memphis. He served in an administrative role at the University of Kentucky under coach John Calipari, and as an assistant coach at the University of South Florida.

"Rod has done a tremendous job as program director for NBA G League Ignite, from leading our recruiting efforts to aiding in the development of our young players, including six NBA Draft picks in the last two seasons," said Shareef Abdur-Rahim, NBA veteran and president of the NBA GLeague. "We wish him the best with Long Island University. LIU is getting an amazing person and great basketball man."

Long Island University is a two-time national champion and seven-time conference champion in Division I men's basketball. Its national championship teams were led by Naismith Memorial Hall of Fame Coach Clair Bee and point guard Ossie Schectman, who is credited with scoring the first basket in NBA history, with the New York Knicks in 1946.
