



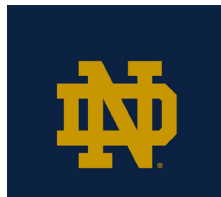

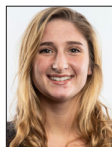

That seven-game losing streak came to an end as the Irish handed the Hoyas a 12-9 loss to move on to the NCAA finals, held at Boston University. In the semifinals, the Irish faced Dartmouth and saw the most successful season in the program's history come to an end as the Big Green downed Notre Dame, 14-8, to move on to the finals against Northwestern.

For the first time in the program's history, the Irish advanced to the NCAAs in three consecutive seasons from 2008-10.

Following a year's absence, the Irish returned to the NCAAs in 2012, losing to eventual national champion Northwestern, 12-7 in Evanston.

In 2014, Notre Dame was selected as a top-eight seed nationally and was awarded the privilege of hosting its first and second round games. It marked the fourth time that the Irish had played host to the NCAAs and the first since 2006.

In 2016, Notre Dame returned to the quarterfinals for the first time since 2009 by topping #10 Northwestern, 15-3, at Arlotta Stadium after earning a first-round bye as the sixth national seed.

In 2021, the Irish returned to the quarterfinals again after a pair of home wins over Robert Morris (16-0) and Virginia (13-8), with that win over Robert Morris being the first shutout in the history of the Division I Women's Lacrosse Tournament. 2021 also marked the first time the Irish have won home NCAA Tournament contests in the same year.

Entering 2022, The Irish have earned an NCAA Tournament berth in eight of nine seasons under head coach Christine Halpeny in which the NCAA Tournament was played. There was no NCAA Tournament in 2020 due to COVID-19.

Jen White led Notre Dame to the NCAA quarterfinals in 2002. She recorded 11 saves in a win over Ohio State and 11 more in the 11-5 loss to Princeton in the quarterfinals.

Making their first-ever NCAA Tournament appearance, the Notre Dame Fighting Irish opened at home against 12th-ranked Ohio State and had to battle back from a three-goal deficit in the second half to pull out an 11-7 win over the Buckeyes.

Sophomore Meredith Simon led the way with three goals and two assists while Alissa Moser, Natalie Loftus and Kassen Delano each scored two goals in the victory. Lauren Cochran led Ohio State with three goals while Regina Oliver had a pair for the Buckeyes.

Princeton's offense was led by Whitney Miller, Lauren Simone and Charlotte Kenworthy as each player recorded three goals and two assists for five points in the game. The Irish got two goals each from Danielle Shearer and Meredith Simon while Natalie Loftus had a single goal.

The Tigers jumped out to a 5-1 lead in the first half as Notre Dame goalkeeper Jen White made several big saves to keep the game close.

Second-half goals by Loftus and Simon would cut the lead to 6-3, but that would be as close as the Irish would get in the 11-5 loss.

Notre Dame Women's Lacrosse in the NCAA Championship

The Notre Dame Fighting Irish women's lacrosse team has advanced to the NCAA tournament 14 times since the 2002 campaign, highlighted by the 2006 appearance in the national semifinals in Boston, Massachusetts.

In 25 seasons as a Division I program, Notre Dame women's lacrosse has become a major player on the national lacrosse scene.

The Irish first appeared in the tournament following the 2002 season and hosted their first-ever tournament game versus Ohio State, taking an 11-7 win over the Buckeyes.

In 2006, the Irish returned to the NCAA Tournament, recording the biggest turnaround in NCAA history, going from 3-12 in '05 to 15-4. That helped the Irish get their second-ever home NCAA game as they played host to Cornell. Notre Dame responded with a 16-8 win to advance to the quarterfinals for the second time in program history. That game would also be at Moose Krause Stadium against fourth-ranked Georgetown, a team the Irish had never beaten.

The Tigers outshot the Irish, 36-20, in the game. White made 11 saves for Notre Dame while Sarah Kolodner had five saves in the victory.

#2 Northwestern 12, #8 Notre Dame 7 May 12, 2012 • Evanston, Ill.

The No. 8 Notre Dame women's lacrosse team saw its first season under head coach Christine Halpenny come to an end on Saturday afternoon at Northwestern's Lakeside Field, as the No. 2 Wildcats defeated the Irish, 12-7. The Irish end the season with a 13-5 record, a mark that is one of the best in school history.

In a game that was in doubt until the very end, the Wildcats used the draw (15-5) to control the possession for much of the game, as they outscored the Irish 7-4 in the second half to hold on for the win. Their last two goals came against an empty net as they Irish added an extra defender to try and get the ball back. The Wildcats piled up 25 shots compared to 15 for the Irish, and also scooped up 19 ground balls to Notre Dame's 14.

Leading the way for the Irish were junior Betsy Mastropieri and sophomore Kaitlyn Brosco, who each tallied a pair of goals. In her last game, Maggie Tamasitis scored a goal and dished out a pair of assists. Also scoring goals were Caitlin Gargan and Margaret Smith.

Northwestern was led by Erin Fitzgerald's hat trick, while Lacey Vigmostad and Taylor Thornton scored two goals each. Alyssa Leonard dominated the draw control for the Wildcats, as she faced off against the Irish and collected eight, often times out of the air. Thornton led the way with five ground balls. Goalie Brienne LoManto picked up her 18th win, as she allowed seven goals while stopping five shots.

Despite only collecting two draws in nine opportunities, the Irish trailed by only two goals at half-time, 5-3. Notre Dame was helped by a ferocious defense that forced Northwestern into 11 turnovers. When the Irish did have the ball they were hurt by nine turnovers, many after forcing a Northwestern

turnover. However, the Irish were efficient around the goal, scoring their three goals on only seven shots, while the Wildcats took 13 shots to score their five goals. The 5-3 margin put the Irish squarely in the game after trailing 12-3 just three weeks ago against the Wildcats at the half.

In the second half the two squads traded goals until the Wildcats went on a 3-0 run from 17:52 to 11:39 to go up 10-5. The Irish cut the lead to 10-7 with 5:18 left after goals from Brosco and Mastropieri, but could get no closer.

The contest marked the final game in an Irish uniform for eight Notre Dame student-athletes. Seeing their final action were Tamasitis, Megan Sullivan, Kate Newall, Jordy Shoemaker, Flannery Nangle, Brittany Mallory, Kristin DeSpiris and Kelly Driscoll.

Tamasitis ends her career as the Irish leader in assists with 151. She is also fourth in points with 228. The Boyertown, Pa., product and senior teammate M. Sullivan end their careers tied for second for most games played with 76.

A Hannah Farr free position goal with four seconds remaining in regulation completed a Stanford comeback that overshadowed a late Notre Dame rally as the Cardinal advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship with an 8-7 win over the Irish Friday night at Northwestern's Lakeside Field.

Having trouble on the offensive end all day, the Irish trailed 6-3 after a Julia Burns goal with 17:06 left in the second half gave the Cardinal a three goal lead.

However, Notre Dame didn't give up as it put together a remarkable comeback. Having scored only three goals in the game's first 49 minutes, the Irish offense came alive as they proceeded to score four goals in the next six minutes to take a 7-6 lead with 5:07 remaining in the game.

Junior Lindsay Powell got the comeback started with an eight-meter goal at 11:15. Senior Betsy Mastropieri came off the bench and scored the next two goals for Notre Dame, putting one in on her own accord, while receiving help from Powell on the other. Both goals came within 1:22. With the score tied at six, junior Kaitlyn Brosco gave Notre Dame its first lead since the game's opening minutes as she swiveled around and powered the ball past Stanford goalie Lindsey Munoz.

The Cardinal didn't give up though as they took possession with under two minutes remaining and were rewarded as Lucy Dikeou scored her third goal of the game to knot the score at seven.

Stanford again regained possession with under a minute remaining and caught a break as shooting space was called on the Irish defense with seven seconds remaining in the game. That penalty gave Farr a free position attempt to win the game. She capitalized, finding the back of the net with just four seconds remaining in regulation.

"Obviously it's incredibly disappointing to have a first round NCAA Tournament exit," said head coach Christine Halfpenny. "After fighting incredibly hard all game, especially in the final 11 minutes, it's disappointing to have such an evenly contested game decided on an eight-meter goal with seven seconds left."

"The fight, heart and execution shown in the last 11 minutes of the game in the comeback attempt will certainly help build a foundation for the young players on this year's team for them to remember and build off of for next season."

Cortney Fortunato (six points), Kaitlyn Brosco (five points) and Rachel Sexton (four goals) all scored at least a hat trick as the No. 8-seed Notre Dame women's lacrosse team cruised to an 18-4 win over High Point in the first round of the NCAA Women's Lacrosse Championship at Arlotta Stadium.

The Irish remain perfect all-time in postseason play on their home field at 5-0. The 18 goals are the second-most the team has ever scored in NCAA Tournament play, eclipsed only by a 19-13 win over Vanderbilt on May 10, 2009. It was by far the largest margin of NCAA Tournament victory ever for the Irish as the 14 goals easily surpassed the eight-goal margin in a 16-8 win over Cornell on May 14, 2006. Fortunato's six points tonight are the most in the NCAs for a Notre Dame player since Jillian Byers had five goals and an assist in a 16-10 loss at North Carolina in the 2009 quarterfinals.

Against the Panthers (15-5), Notre Dame wasted little time taking control of the contest. The Irish scored each of the game's first seven goals, including tallies on each of the team's first three shots. Casey Pearsall grabbed the game's opening draw and it led to an unassisted goal by Brosco at 29:11. Just under a minute later, Sexton converted a Fortunato pass into a goal at 28:15. Brosco scored again, this time on a free position shot, at 26:51 and momentum was all on the Irish side. Kiera McMullan would score twice, Sexton would add her second and Fortunato her first of three goals on the night in the game-opening 7-0 run. High Point scored two of the next three goals, coming off of the sticks of Kendyl Gardner and Sara Kuhlman, to make the score 7-2 at 7:25.

Notre Dame scored four times in the first half's final 4:37 to take a 12-2 lead into the locker rooms at halftime. Two of goals were by Sexton, giving her a career-high-tying four in the game's opening 29:43 alone. The Irish also scored the first four goals of the second half to make it an 8-0 run in all and hold a 16-2 advantage. Fortunato scored twice in this string as a part of her three-goal, three-assist, six-point night. It was the freshman phenom's ninth hat trick of the year. The Irish are now 8-1 when Fortunato collects a hat trick.

The two teams scored twice each over the game's final 16:18 to account for the 18-4 final score. Stephanie Toy and Shauna Pugliese picked up the late goals for Notre Dame while Kuhlman got her second for the Panthers and Alec Perry scored as well.

Liz O'Sullivan got the win in net for Notre Dame, playing the first 51:51 and making four saves while allowing four goals. Allie Murray played the last 8:09 and made two saves without allowing a score. Julie Burns started in net for High Point and went 25:23 while Hayley Peets played the remaining 34:37. Both netminders allowed nine goals and made five saves.

Notre Dame enjoyed a 34-15 edge in shots on the night and a 25-18 ground ball advantage. High Point won the battles in the center circle, winning 15 draws to Notre Dame's nine. The Panthers were hindered by 26 turnovers, however while Notre Dame committed just 15.

Rachel Sexton netted a hat trick for a No. 8-seed Notre Dame women's lacrosse team that was unrelenting in its attempt to end the score against Duke in an NCAA second round game at Arlotta Stadium, but the Irish couldn't quite get over the hump as the Blue Devils came away 10-8 victors. It was Notre Dame's first loss all-time in six NCAA Tournament home games as the Irish finish their season at 10-9.

Senior All-American candidate Margaret Smith made a defensive statement in her final collegiate appearance, causing five turnovers, gathering five ground balls and controlling four draws. Smith's final ground ball was her 64th of the season, breaking Holly Manthei's school record of 63 set back in 1998. During the game, she also broke the Notre Dame career record for caused turnovers, passing Jackie Doherty (2008-11) and ending her decorated career with 122 for the Irish.

Along with Sexton's hat trick, Brie Custis also had a three-point game with the sophomore scoring twice and adding an assist to accompany three draw controls, a caused turnover and one ground ball. Senior Lindsay Powell scored a pair of goals for Notre Dame as well. Sexton scored a total of seven goals in the team's two NCAA Tournament games after netting four in Friday night's win over High Point.

Duke posted some big offensive individual numbers as Maddy Morrissey scored four goals and assisted on two more while Kerrin Maurer had three goals and an assist. Kelsey Duryea made 11 saves in the Blue Devil net, several of them in crucial situations late in the game to maintain Duke's lead.

Notre Dame wasted no time in opening the scoring. Casey Pearsall controlled the opening draw and just 23 seconds into play, Sexton scored on a free position. Duke equalized just 23 seconds later though when Morrissey scored at 29:14. The first half of the opening stanza would be a low scoring one as over the next 16 minutes of play the only goal would come

from Custis whose unassisted strike gave Notre Dame a 2-1 lead at 21:19. Once Brigid Smith scored from Maurer at 13:10, however, it triggered a five-goal Duke run that gave the Blue Devils a 4-2 lead at intermission and a 6-2 advantage by the 25:35 mark of the second half when Maurer completed her hat trick.

The teams traded each of the next four goals, eventually making the score 8-4 for Duke with 17:07 left to play. Caitlin Gargan broke that run when she scored her 30th goal of the year, off of a Lauren Sullivan feed, at 21:44. Morrissey got that back on a free position shot at 19:04. Notre Dame responded with a Custis goal, set up by Stephanie Toy, at 17:49 but 42 seconds later Taylor Trimble scored for the Blue Devils.

Notre Dame mounted its signature late-game rally at that point, scoring each of the next three goals to make the score 8-7. Powell scored on a free position at 13:34, followed by an unassisted Sexton goal at 11:53 and a second Powell strike, this one with a helper from Custis, at 8:29. Morrissey gave Duke some breathing room with a goal at 4:50 and, following a lengthy stall, the Blue Devils got an insurance goal from Smith with 27 seconds to play. Unfazed, as usual, Custis controlled the ensuing draw and Sexton tallied on a free position with 15 seconds to play, making it a 10-8 game, but Duke would get the final draw and hang on for the win.

Reflecting the tight nature of the game, shots were 21-20 for Notre Dame, ground balls went 22-18 for Duke, draw controls were 12-8 for Notre Dame and the Blue Devils committed more turnovers, 18-16. Liz O'Sullivan made five saves in the Notre Dame net, four of them in the second half.

The Irish should return strong in 2015. Of the team's 12 most frequent starters in 2014, 11 of them are set to return. Players who accounted for 295 of the team's 334 points scored (88-percent) will be wearing the Irish uniform in 2015 as well.

Ohio State's women's lacrosse team raced out to a 7-4 lead late in the first half but a resilient Notre Dame squad scored seven straight goals to seize control of their NCAA tournament first round matchup late Friday night and roll to a 13-11 victory at Northwestern's Lakeside Field.

Scoring the first six goals of the second half against the Buckeyes (13-8), the Irish (11-8) earned themselves a matchup with the homestanding Wildcats at 1 p.m. CDT on Sunday in the tournament's second round and a matchup of the top two teams in the Midwest.

Cortney Fortunato compiled a robust stat line for the Irish, scoring twice, adding two assists, controlling four draws, scooping up three ground balls and causing a turnover. The four draw controls matched her career high.

Along with Fortunato, Annaheim also had a four-point night on two goals and two assists. Stephanie Toy netted a hat trick while freshman Molly Cobb chipped in three assists. Cobb entered tonight with just two assists spread over 15 games played. A team which relies heavily on its starters, the Irish got five points off of its bench tonight with Cobb's three assists and Kiera McMullan's two goals. Sexton had a goal and an assist. This year, Notre Dame is 10-2 when Sexton picks up at least two points and just 1-6 when she is held to one or zero points.

Tonight marked Notre Dame's first win this year when trailing at the half and could not have come at a better time than in the NCAA tournament.

The two teams had met on March 21 at Notre Dame's Arlotta Stadium with a similar result - a close first half and then an Irish runaway in the second half. Notre Dame won that first meeting 13-5 after leading 3-2 at intermission. Tonight the Buckeye led 7-5 at halftime but eight second-half goals pushed the Irish over the top.

One category which made a significant difference in the game on Friday night was Notre Dame's draw controls, leading the Buckeyes 18-8, going 9-4 in both half. Barbara Sullivan led the way with eight draw controls, one shy of her own school single-game record sum of nine.

Liz O'Sullivan made seven saves in the Irish net while Tori DeScenza made 10 stops for the Buckeyes. Stephanie Peragallo caused a pair of turnovers playing in front of O'Sullivan.

The Buckeyes drew first blood on a Molly Wood free position goal but Notre Dame scored each of the next three goals over a 1:15 burst to take a 3-1 advantage. After the initial Buckeye goal, Brie Custis controlled the ensuing draw for the Irish. At the offensive end, Sexton found Fortunato for the goal, knotting the score at 1-1. Just nine seconds later, the Irish were on the board again. Annaheim controlled the draw and rushed up field, feeding McMullan for a goal. The Irish made it a 3-1 game when Toy rolled off of a defender and scored unassisted.

Ohio State scored six of the next seven goals, sandwiched around an Annaheim goal from Fortunato, to take a 7-4 edge by the time 8:11 left in the first half. Notre Dame got one of the goals back before intermission when McMullan scored on a free position

with 7:56 to go, making it a 7-5 score at halftime.

The six-goal run to open the second half began when Custis set up Toy 1:05 into the half. Notre Dame forced the fourth and final tie of the game at 7-7 just 48 seconds later. Fortunato controlled the draw and dished to Katherine Eilers, a native of neighboring Winnetka, Illinois, who found the back of the net against the Buckeyes. The Irish took the lead for good three minutes later on Fortunato's 56th goal of the year. Sexton, Annaheim and Caitlin Gargan would also add goals for Notre Dame in this run that upped the Irish lead to 11-7.

Ohio State snapped the seven-goal Irish run on a Mary Kate Faccina free position goal at 17:42 of the second half, the first Buckeye goal in 21:29 of game action. It remained an 11-8 Irish lead until a crazy final 3:05 in which the Irish scored a pair of empty net goals but the Buckeyes continued to fight on the offensive end. Five goals were scored in those final 3:05, three of them by Ohio State, accounting for the 13-11 final.

A nine-goal second half offensive burst tore open a game that had been tied at halftime and pushed No. 8 seed Northwestern (14-6) past Notre Dame (11-9), 16-11, in an NCAA Tournament second round game on Sunday at the Wildcats' Lakeside Field.

Heidi Annaheim and Rachel Sexton each had a hat trick and an assist to pace Notre Dame on offense. Irish goalkeeper Liz O'Sullivan made 10 saves and senior Caitlin Gargan scored twice and added an assist for a three-point game.

Gargan crossed the 20-point plateau on the season during the game, giving the Irish a school-record nine players this spring with at least 20 points. Eight

of those nine (all but Gargan) will return to the Irish in 2016 led by Cortney Fortunato who scored 56 goals and added 20 assists for 76 points in a 2015 season that will likely net her All-American accolades. Overall, players who accounted for 312 of Notre Dame's 336 points this year (93 percent) are expected back in 2016.

Tewaaraton Award finalist Barbara Sullivan controlled four draws in the game today with a pair of caused turnovers and a ground ball. She finishes the season with a school-record 85 draw controls while her 36 caused turnovers will likely continue to top the Atlantic Coast Conference.

The Wildcats scored five of the second half's first six goals to take command of the contest and ultimately earn a quarterfinal matchup next weekend at top-seeded Maryland. Kaleigh Craig and Selena Lasota both scored five goals for Northwestern while Sheila Nesselbush added four more tallies.

The Irish got on the scoreboard first when Sexton set up Gargan for a goal just 1:01 into the game. After Northwestern tied the score, Notre Dame scored twice in a row to take a 3-1 lead. Anaheim struck first, picking the top corner on a free position shot. Gargan then sent a great pass from behind the net to Molly Cobb for the freshman's first career goal. Cobb had a goal and three assists in the team's two NCAA tournament games after compiling just two assists over her 15 regular season games played.

Sunday morning, thousands of Notre Dame students became Notre Dame alumni as they received their degrees. Hours later, 11 senior student-athletes and one graduate student on Notre Dame's women's lacrosse team ensured that their time at Notre Dame will continue as the Irish matriculated onto the NCAA quarterfinals for the first time since 2009.

The sixth-seeded Irish (14-6) outshot Northwestern 21-5 in the first half and outscored the Wildcats 8-0 in the second half en route to a 15-3 demolition of one of the sport's standard-bearers in an NCAA second round matchup at Arlotta Stadium.

Cortney Fortunato and Grace Muller both scored four goals to pace the Irish offense while the Notre Dame defense caused 16 turnovers (led by three apiece from Barbara Sullivan and Brie Custis) and held the Wildcats to a season-low 16 shots.

By scoring on just three goals it is the best scoring defensive performance against Northwestern since May 3, 2003, when Syracuse downed the Wildcats, 14-3, prior to the purple-clad northsiders claiming their seven national titles in eight years. The 12-goal defeat makes the worst in Northwestern's lengthy NCAA Championship history. The scope of the victory is only enhanced by the foe it came against as the Irish improved to 6-1 all-time in home NCAA play.

Notre Dame controlled the game on Sunday from start to finish, opening the game on a 4-0 run and closing it on a 9-0 run which was punctuated by seven second half saves from goalkeeper Samantha Giacalone.

Sullivan, now a Tewaaraton Award finalist for the

second consecutive year, controlled five draws and collected three ground balls to accompany her three turnovers. She also stood front and center in an Irish defense that held an opponent to less than five goals for the school-record eighth time this year.

Notre Dame finished with a slim 21-19 edge in total shots, although North Carolina held a 16-14 advantage in shots on goal. Each team scooped 15 ground balls, while the Fighting Irish forced 13 UNC turnovers, committing 12 on their own.

Molly Cobb added the other goal for Notre Dame, while Marie McCool scored three goals and Hendrick added a pair of scores to lead North Carolina. UNC goalkeeper Megan Ward made eight saves between the pipes for the Tar Heels.

"The first thing you have to look at is (UNC goalkeeper) Megan Ward was outstanding today," Notre Dame head coach Christine Falgout said. "She was all over us. She turned away multiple point-blank opportunities and I think when your goalie is hot like that ... that's something that we struggled with today, adjusting our shooting and going 6-for-21, that's just a tough day out for us. 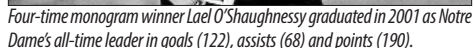
